SENATE COMMITTEE FAVORABLY REPORTS STONE NOMINATION

For Second Time Judiciary Committee Recommends Confirmation of Attorney General Stone as Supreme Court Justice

Washington, Feb. 2. — For the second time the Senate Judiciary today ordered a favorable report on the nomination of Attorney General Stone to be a Supreme Court Justice.

The action was taken behind closed doors after Senators had reviewed again the circumstances surrounding the new legal proceeding here against Senator Wheeler, of Montana, and the objections raised against Mr. Stone because of his argument before the Supreme Court years ago as counsel for the Morgna estate in the Ownby case.

Administration leaders expect confirmation by the Senate without much delay opponents of the nomination having indicated that they are "little object" in attempting to prolong the fight.

Members of the committee said there were no votes in the opposition when the committee acted today but some Senators withheld their votes.

Senator Walsh, of Montana, who is counsel for Senator Wheeler, and who took the lead in cross examination of Attorney General Stone when he appeared before the committee last Wednesday, was present at the committee meeting.

Anniversary Day of Wake Forest College Be Celebrated Tues.

Wake Forest, Feb. 2.—Anniversary Day at Wake Forest College will be celebrated here tomorrow, February 3, and J. W. Bailey, of Raleigh, is scheduled to deliver the address of the occasion. President Potat has extended an invitation to the members of the General Assembly, now in session in Raleigh, and it is expected that several will attend.

At eleven o'clock Tuesday morning a called meeting of the board of trustees will be held and at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon the annual inter-society debate will be held. At 7:30 in the evening Mr. Bailey will deliver his address, according to the program. Prior to Mr. Bailey's address two short student orations will be delivered and President W. L. Potat will submit his report.

Heretofore, it is said, the Anniversary Day exercises have been entirely in the hands of the Euzelian and Philomathesian societies but this year the exercises have been taken over by the college and has been planned somewhat in the nature of a founder's day.

The subject for the debate, in the afternoon, it is announced, will be the question of a Federal constitutional amendment which will prohibit the issuance of tax exempt securities, O. L. Norment, of Whiteville, and D. D. Lewis, of Winabow, members of the Philomathesian Literary Society, will uphold the affirmative, and Hoyt Blackwell, of Kershaw, S. C., and L. B. Soseley of Selma, Ala., members of the Euzelian Society, will discuss the negative side of the question.

L. F. Paschal, of Siler City and S. L. Blanton of Franklinton will deliver the short orations. Their subjects will be "The Lawyer for a New Day" and "The Church and War," respectively.

COUNSEL ATTACKS SINCLAIR INDICTMENT FOR CONTEMPT SENATE

Washington, Feb. 2.—Counsel for Harry F. Sinclair today attacked his indictment for contempt to the Senate growing out of the naval oil leaves hearings, in District of Columbia Court of Appeals. They contended the Senate has no power to compel testimony or the production of documents when acting in its legislative capacity.

Jack Dempsey, world's champion heavyweight, will be married to Estelle Taylor, motion picture actress, in Los Angeles, on May 20, and will retire from the ring. At the same time, he will sever all his business connections with Jack Kearns, long time his manager and business partner. They will divide several million dollars between themselves. Dempsey announces he will retire from the ring, and declared he and Kearns never had been friends and that their dealings had been purely business.

DOG TEAMS ENTER LAST LAP OF RACE OVER FROZEN PATH

Picked Dog Teams Under Champion Musher Are Covering Last 300 Miles to Bring Relief to Nome

Nome, Feb. 2.—Movements of the fastest dog team procurable racing with 300,000 units of anti-toxin for combating the diphtheria epidemic were today heading in a raging blizzard somewhere near Unalakleet, 200 miles from Nome and Safety 21 miles away.

The 50 dog, urged on by the Champion Musher, Louis Sepele, are believed to be speeding over the course of a frozen river, that being the surest path in the face of the raging storm.

Meanwhile, without the badly needed serum to combat it, the epidemic has taken the lives of three persons, in the past 48 hours and 28 other cases were listed in the population of 1,000.

The danger of the anti-toxin being frozen and destroyed through the breaking of the glass containers increases every hour the dog team remains on the frozen road. A team of picked dogs, is waiting at Safety to take up the journey of the dogs that started with the serum originally, which was brought up from Tidewater to Anchorage over railroad to Nenana and relayed by dog team until it reached Unalakleet, where Sapella started on the 300 miles of the last stretch of road to Nome.

Greensboro Paper Moves to New Home

Greensboro, Feb. 2.—The Daily Record moved into their new home located on North Greene St., near the City Hall today. Most of the work of moving machinery and other equipment from the old building was completed between the Sunday morning edition and the time of the regular noon issue Monday. The building is occupied exclusively by the newspaper.

Bank Records Open to Government Inspection

Washington, Feb. 2.—Bank records are open to inspection by the Federal government in the assessment of income taxes, the Supreme Court declared today, in effect in confirming the lower court's decision in a case brought by the First National Bank of Mobile, Ala.

FORMER GOVERNOR TO APPEAR BEFORE FINANCE COMM.

Morrison Will Ask for Reaudit of State's Books to Show That His Administration Paid Its Own Way

Charlotte, Feb. 2.—Former Gov. and Mrs. Cameron Morrison left for Raleigh early today. It is expected that they will reach the capital during the afternoon. Mr. Morrison plans to go before the Finance Committee of the Legislature and ask for a re-audit of the state's books, in an effort to show that the reported deficit in the state's funds is not as large as reported and that it was not incurred during his administration.

The former Governor contends, according to his statement, that a change in periods of bookkeeping will show that his administration met its expenses instead of running behind.

CABINET VIEWS ON TREATY ARE SOUGHT

Foreign Relations Commission of Senate Asks Opinion of Hughes and Hoover on Commercial Treaty

Washington, Feb. 2.—The views of Secretary Hughes and Secretary Hoover were sought by the Senate foreign relations committee today on the German Commercial Treaty sent to the Senate some time ago for ratification. The treaty has been held up in the Senate by opposition to the provisions granting preferential rates to American and German merchant vessels in favor of Nationals of either country.

The treaty is designed as a model for similar conventions with other nations, which action is also delayed. Some senators contend that preferential rate restrictions would be an obstacle to development of the American Merchant Marine.

Senate Takes Up 120 Years Old Claim

Washington, Feb. 2.—The celebrated French "spoilation claims" pending for more than 120 years was taken up today by the Senate.

FIRE CAUSES \$300,000 LOSS EARLY THIS MORNING

Columbus, Ohio, Feb. 2.—Fire of undetermined origin swept through three downtown stores, and routed 54 guests of the Metropole Hotel from their rooms early today causing a loss estimated at \$300,000.

HUGE BOULDER ON FOOT HOLDING MAN PRISONER IN CAVE

Pinioned to Ground for Three Days Man Directs Efforts of Rescuers to Release Him From Entombment

Cave City, Ky., Feb. 2.—Hope came with dawn today to Sand Cave, where in one of its crooked little crevices 300 feet from the entrance, Floyd Collins, age 35, has lain pinioned by a huge boulder since Friday morning. A squad of men bringing a portable drill was to leave Louisville early today. A truck is here ready to transport the equipment to the cave, six miles away. With this drill rescuers hope to cut away enough of the stone to release the victim.

With his strength ebbing, Collins is devoting his conscious moments directing the workers, who for 40 hours have been chipping tiny flakes from the rock in a futile effort to release his foot, all that was between him and safety. Handicapped by lack of tools and by the narrowness of the passage, the rescuers made little headway.

Water seeping in from the ice covered cliff added to the discomfort of Collins and the men who had journeyed through the arduous task to do it, else, other than take him food.

Collins' brothers, who have worked incessantly since he was entombed yesterday offered \$300 to anyone who would rescue him. Ever since Collins' plight was discovered Saturday, 24 hours after the accident, scores of persons have stood ready, but helpless around the mouth of the cave. Collins went to the cave Friday morning to explore it, and was making his way out when the boulder fell on his foot.

Raleigh, Feb. 2.—The program for the Fifth Annual Conference of the North Carolina League of Women Voters, which meets here, Tuesday and Wednesday, February 3 and 4, is practically complete. A number of well-known women speakers will take part in the program. It is announced, among them being Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt and Miss Julia Alexander.

Tuesday morning the meeting will be largely of a business nature, with conferences of the finance committee, resolution committee, executive board, nominating committee, and league presidents. Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt will be honored at a luncheon to be given at one o'clock Tuesday.

"Woman's Influence in Government" will be the subject of an address by Miss Julia Alexander at the Tuesday afternoon meeting, according to the program, and Mrs. Catt will speak on "Men, Women, and Politics" at the Christian Church Tuesday night at 8 o'clock.

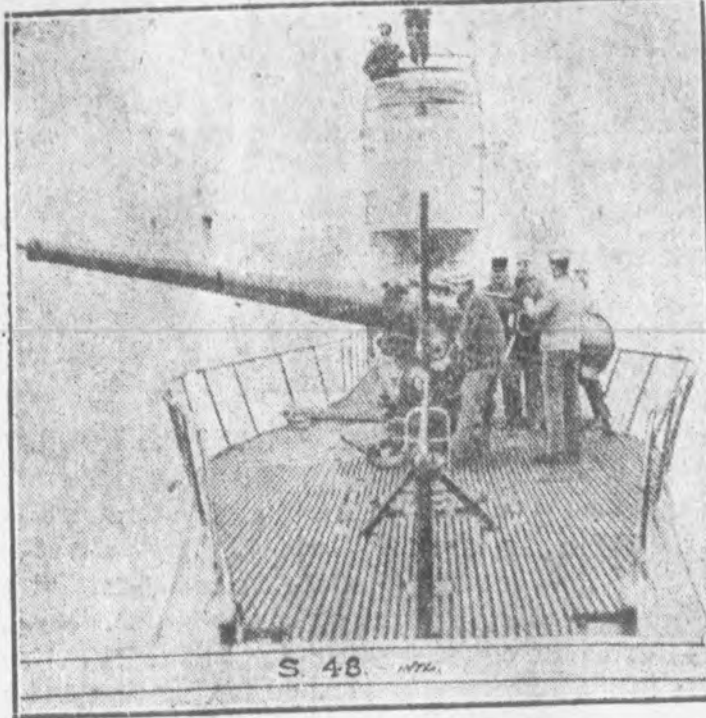

Save Crew of Submarine S-48



Huddled together in one of the compartments of their vessel, to escape the deadly fumes of escaping chlorine gas, the forty-six half-frozen officers and men of the U. S. Submarine S-48, which struck the rocks off Portsmouth, N. H., have been rescued by Coast Guard men. The S-48 had another disaster in 1921, sinking to the bottom of Long Island Sound. The heroism of a sailor, who was shot to the surface through a torpedo tube, resulted in saving the vessel and her crew.

CONFEREES' WORK

**SHOALS MEASURE
NEARS COMPLETION**

Conferees Will Rewrite Fertilizer Provision of Bill to Make it More Attractive to Prospective Lessees

Washington, Feb. 2.—The Senate and House conferees on the Underwood Muscle Shoals bill had reached the point in their deliberations today, beginning the actual drafting of modifications outlined in their general discussions of previous sessions. The conferees, it was understood, this morning, have planned to rewrite the entire Fertilizer Provisions of the bill, with the idea of making it more attractive to prospective lessees. It was said they had already agreed to raise the profit limitations from one to eight per cent and to be considering increasing from six to eight years, the period within which annual production of 40,000 tons of nitrogen must be attained.

BAILEY TRIAL GOES INTO SECOND WEEK

No New Evidence Was Developed in Testimony Today in Trial of 41 Officials and Stock Salesmen

Greensboro, Feb. 2.—Nothing new in the way of evidence developed today in the trial of 41 officials and stock salesmen of Bailey Brothers, incorporated, former Winston-Salem tobacco manufacturing concern charged with using the mails to defraud in connection with a stock selling campaign.

The testimony introduced by the government today, the first day of the second week of the trial, was similar to that offered last Friday that stock buyers were impressed with the fact that their purchases would bring an income of 30 per cent.

Counsel for the defense, especially the salesmen, strove to bring out the point that the salesmen had declared that Bailey Brothers had earned over a period of years 30 per cent on their capital stock, and that they had not declared that a dividend of such an amount would be paid investors. Sometimes it was stated that this effort on the part of the salesmen was successful while other purchasers were firmly of the opinion that they had been promised a 30 per cent dividend. The difference between the earnings of the company on its capital stock and the amount of a promised dividend appeared to be the main point of contention.

Judge Webb, who is holding the special term of court, announced today that the plan to hold night sessions would not go into effect until Tuesday evening.

ALDERMEN APPROVE

**BILL TO EXTEND THE
CORPORATE LIMITS**

Resolution Adopted to Call Upon Senator and Representatives to Have Bill Enacted Into Law

At a meeting of the Board of Aldermen in the Town of Greenville held Friday the 30th at 7:30 p. m., the bill which had been prepared at the directions of the Board which extends the corporate limits of the Town and confers upon the Mayor jurisdiction in town cases, equal to that of County Record, was unanimously approved and a resolution adopted calling upon Senator Everett and Representatives Horton and Pittman to have said bill enacted into law.

The proposed Corporate limits of the Town as set out in said bill are as follows:

Beginning on the southern bank of Tar river at a point in the western line of Woodlawn street extended, and running thence with the western side of said Woodlawn street S. 34-20-W. to a point in said side of said street, 150 feet north of the northern line of Pine street in the F. V. Johnson subdivision; thence parallel with Pine street south 55-30-E-435 feet to an iron stake in the western line of Rotary Avenue; thence with the western line of Rotary Avenue, S-34-20-W-200 feet to an iron stake in the southern line of Pine Street; thence with the southern line of Pine Street extended, S-55-30-E 1361 feet to a stake in the Johnson field; thence with a ditch S-21-W-838 feet to the southern side of 5th street extended; thence S-57-E-103 feet to the northeastern corner of the East Carolina Teacher's College Campus; thence with the various courses of the East Carolina Teacher's College property and so as to include all of same to a point where said College line intersects the western line of Anderson Street; thence with the Forbe and Gilbrt subdivision; thence with the western line of said Anderson Street S-15-30-W to the northern line of 11th Street; thence with the northern line of 11th Street west to the eastern line of Lawrence Street; thence with the eastern line of Lawrence Street extended, in a straight line S-15-30-W to the Southern edge of the Right Way at a point 127 feet east of the western end of the Norfolk Southern trestle over the Cox Mill road; thence with the southern edge of the Norfolk Southern Right of Way westwardly about 5125 feet to a point where a line 300 feet from the western side of Wauauga Avenue and parallel with said Avenue would intersect the said line of said Right of Way; thence with said line parallel with said Wauauga Avenue and 300 feet there from N-29-30-W to the southern line of Spruce street; thence with the southern line of said

REAL BUSINESS OF LEGISLATURE WILL START UP TONIGHT

Revenues, Appropriations, Road Bonds and Bus Regulation Consideration Will Occupy Much Time of the Lawmakers

Raleigh, Feb. 2.—The real legislative grind of the General Assembly is now well started and this week is expected to bring forth more real work in the legislature than any preceding one of this session. The Budget Commission's report is expected to absorb the attention of the Appropriation, Committees of both houses, while the Legislative Revenue bill of the State Board of Assessments will be before the Finance Committee for consideration.

Among the important measure to come up on the floor will be the Committee Substitute for the bus regulation bill. It is the belief in political circles that the Appropriation Committees will have to do considerable slicing—in measuring the approximate figures in the bill to be supplied for maintenance and improvements for various state institutions during the next biennial period.

Many are of the opinion that the Budget Commission's recommendation for approximately \$14,000,000 a year will have to be cut down to approximately \$12,000,000. This is about all that can be borne even with increases in income tax of 33 1-3 to 50 per cent.

The Finance Committee also have a task similar to that of the Appropriation Committee. Their work will be to determine the taxes for the next two years to meet expenditures provided in the appropriation bill.

The State Board of Assessments will present the Revenue Act with but few changes from that now in effect, leaving the increase in rates strictly up to the legislature.

These bills probably will not come up for action for several weeks. The bus regulation bill is now on the calendar and is expected tomorrow. Tonight's session will probably be brief with but few Senators and Representatives in attendance. However, the lines are expected to be drawn tonight between the opponents of the Bowie-Heath \$35,000,000 bond issue for roads and the supporters of Gov. McLean's proposal limited to the issue of \$20,000,000. The Bowie-Heath measure is already under discussion while the Governor's plan is expected to take definite form tonight in a bill embodying his views.

Court Affirms Conviction of Head African Republic

New York, Feb. 2.—The conviction of Marcus Garvey, self-styled provisional president of the African Republic, for use of the mails to defraud was affirmed by the United States Circuit Court of Appeals today.

Alleges Bootleg Money Procured Senate Seat

Washington, Feb. 2.—Charges of alleged extortion of upwards of \$75,000 from Minnesota bootleggers, for use in the Senatorial campaign of Representative Thomas D. Schall are made in a petition of contest filed today in the Senate by the defeated candidate, Magnus Johnson, Farmer-Laborite.

Senator Johnson alleges the extortion was with the knowledge and consent of Schall and that the money was used in his campaign. He declared it came from persons indicted in Minneapolis and other cities for violation of the liquor laws.

LEAVES CHICAGO PAPER TO GROUP EMPLOYEES

Chicago, Feb. 2.—The Chicago Daily Journal was left by John C. Eastman, who died last week, to a group of employees, the opening of the will disclosed today. Eastman was the sole owner. No estimate of the value of the property has been made but the probate judge fixed a bond of \$1,000,000 for the executor.

GET THE MOST OUT OF OUR ROADS

The Pitt County Highway Commission is today considering bids for the construction of hard surfaced roads to Stokes and for another from Ayden to the Greene county line and no doubt contracts for these two stretches of roads will be let during today.

It is to be hoped that the County Commissioners together with the Highway Commission will give their next consideration to the proposed extension of the Cox's mill road to the Craven county line. While the Cox's Mill road at present means much to the citizens of that section of the county as well as this city the value of the road would be multiplied many times by the proposed extension.

Let us not lag in the construction and maintenance of our roads, for the best is no better than its worst stretch and the load which can be hauled from the farm to town is measured by what can be pulled through the bad places.

TO AMEND OUR CHARTER

A measure drafted by our Board of Aldermen for presentation to the General Assem-

ALDERMEN APPROVE EXTENDING CITY LIMITS

Spruce street to the Eastern line of Paris Avenue; thence with the Eastern line of Paris Avenue extended to the old Farmville road, known as the Stantonburg road; thence in a straight line N-30-E to a point in the northern line of 5th street extended where same is intersected by the eastern line of Hudson street of the Riverdale subdivision; thence with the northern line of 5th street extended S-87-50W 471 feet to a point on the side of said 5th street extended; thence north 10-30-E parallel with Cadillac street and 150 feet west of same to the southern bank of Tar river; thence with the southern bank of Tar river eastwardly to the beginning.

The jurisdiction which the bill confers upon the Mayor effects only the Town of Greenville and the territory within one mile thereof. It carries no additional expense to the town or litigants, but on the other hand would be a source of much saving in expense to both the town and county and would also save much time of the police officers which of necessity is now spent in attendance on the County Court. If this bill is passed the Mayor will be able to dispose of liquor cases and similar misdemeanors and from his decision appeal would be directly to the Superior Court without the case having to be first sent to County Court as is the case at present. This would in no way effect the County Court except to relieve congestion and take some of the work off of the clerk of county court. The town of Wilson is at present operating very successfully under this plan, and therefore, seeking to serve the best interest of Greenville the Board of Aldermen has sought to adopt a similar plan here, and has petitioned our Senator and Representatives to have the bill passed.

This information is given to the public with the view of obtaining expressions concerning same, and everyone approving or opposing the bill is requested to see personally or write Senator Everett and our Representatives and give them the benefit of their views.

WHY NOT A FEDERAL COURT?

Members of the Pitt County Bar Association have written to our Senators and Representatives in Washington urging that in the redistricting of the Federal Court of North Carolina that Greenville be included in the designated points for holding such courts. The request is made for a spring and a fall term of federal court here. The fact is pointed out that Pitt County has a population of fifty thousand people and the conveniences that such a court here would offer are set forth. Effort is being made to have the Board of County Commissioners agree to furnish facilities to hold such a court here should the government deem it advisable to designate this city as one of the official courts.

That a federal court here would afford much convenience and be a great benefit to the people of this vicinity is a foregone conclusion and other members of the Bar and citizens of the county are urged to request our representatives to make an effort to secure the establishment of the court here.

REAPPEARS IN MOUNTAINS OF CALIFORNIA

San Francisco.—The California grizzly bear, supposed extinct, has appeared after a lapse of 40 years in the Sequoia National Forest, according to a reliable report.

At one time the California grizzly ranged the Sierra Nevada and Coast ranges in such large numbers that he was made the official emblem of the state and still graces the state

flag. He is considerably larger than the Rocky Mountain grizzly, is of a grayish tinge and has a distinct hump on top of his shoulders. As a fighter he was feared by all other animals of the early California days. Yet he was not considered by man a dangerous animal, and he usually took to flight on man's approach, than the smaller black or brown bear and lived largely on acorns, berries, roots and grasses.

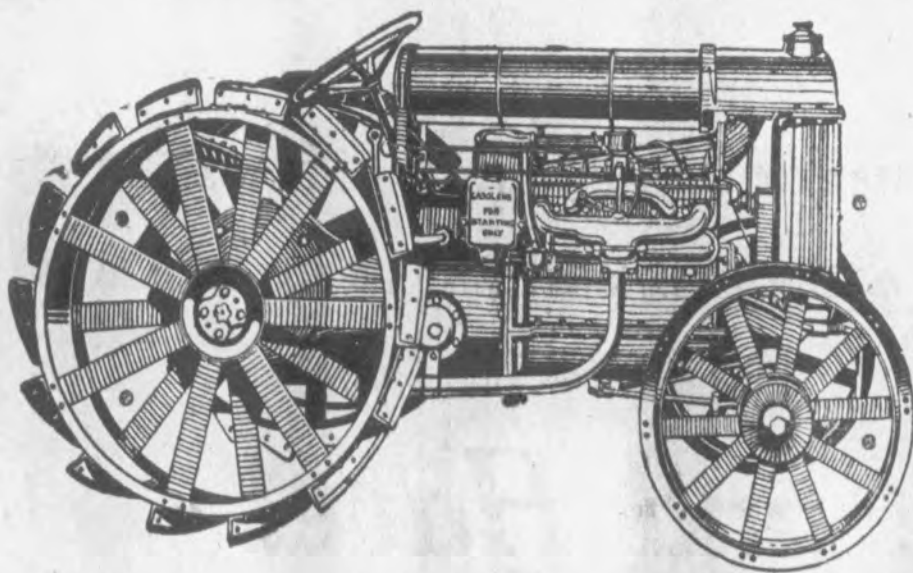
