

SENATE SENDS BUS
REGULATION BILL
BACK TO THE HOUSEMeasure Passes Senate
Without Opposition;
Two New Banking
Measures Presented in
the House

Raleigh, Feb. 5.—The legislative session today was marked by the tabling of the investigation of charges against S. J. Turner, Republican Representative from Mitchell county. The House decided to reconsider the vote by which the resolution for the inquiry had been passed and when the matter again was brought up on the floor the resolution was tabled.

In the Senate routine matters occupied the attention of the members. A number of local bills were introduced in the first hour and the public calendar was read but no matter of outstanding importance came before the upper body.

The House took up consideration of the state-wide game law bill and after some discussion set it for next Wednesday morning. Representatives explained that at the public hearing on the matter they had not had opportunity to express their views and urged that the matter go over until next week for further consideration.

The House took its action in the Turner case on the grounds that the charges against the Republican legislator were the result of a local factional fight in which the House had no interest and no authority to act. Turner's right to a seat in the House had been challenged by certain citizens of Mitchell county on charges based on an alleged illegal action 25 years ago.

Later in the Senate session Senator Johnson, of Robeson county, introduced two bills in the upper branch designed to strengthen the State Banking Laws of North Carolina along the line approved by the Corporation Commission and the State Bankers' Association.

After a speech by Senator Heath, of Union county, the bill to repeal the prison compensation act and substitute a gift of \$30 and a suit of clothes for the present system of paying prisoners five to ten cents a day for the time served was referred to the committee on penal institutions.

The bus regulation bill on its third reading in the Senate passed without opposition and was sent back to the House.

The joint resolution requesting the State Auditor to furnish legislators with a statement giving the payrolls of various state departments and institutions and the number of automobiles used by each department and institution together with their purchase price, and upkeep expenses was adopted by the Senate and also sent back to the House.

One of the bills relating to the banking laws introduced by Senator Johnson would make violation of the State Banking Laws prima facie evidence of intent to defraud. Under the present law the burden to prove intent to defraud rests on the state. The other bill would limit the loans of the bank to one person of corporation to ten per cent of its capital and surplus instead of 25 per cent, the present maximum loan limit, and would prohibit loan to officials or employees of the bank except when ample security is given and the loan is approved by a majority of the board of directors. The bill would also make the minimum amount of capital necessary for incorporation of a bank \$25,000 instead of \$15,000.

EX-GOVERNOR WILL
CONTINUE TO FIGHT
THE DEFICIT REPORTMorrison Declares He
Will Continue His
Fight to Prevent
Increase Taxes to Offset
Reported Deficit

Raleigh, Feb. 5.—Former Governor Morrison's anti-deficit report campaign, according to Mr. Morrison, will probably be continued. He indicated after his appearance before the Finance Committee of the General Assembly yesterday afternoon that he will continue his efforts against any reported deficit so long as any legislative attempt was made to increase taxes, to offset any deficit reported to have been created in his administration.

On the basis of the Price-Waterhouse audit and figuring on the system of bookkeeping installed by this concern with the approval of the Legislative Investigating Committee and Council of State, there is no deficit in the state's funds, Mr. Morrison declared. To estimate the deficit on any other basis is unjust because the Price Waterhouse audit and system has been the basis for legislative appropriations for the past two years, he said. The recent statement of Auditor Baxter Durham, showing a deficit of \$6,000,000 as of June 30, 1924 is unfair and misleading declared Mr. Morrison adding that not only Auditor Durham and Treasurer Lacy but three members of the Budget Commission who were members of the former commission attached their signatures to the contradictory statement.

Mr. Morrison declared these men signed a statement two years ago showing a deficit as of certain periods. Now, he added, they have signed a statement giving a deficit to those periods. However, he said, he thought they did this through an unintentional error of judgment. "I love 'em all," he declared.

of Pitt County's Oldest

Mr. Josh W. Smith, 74, died last night at his home near Bell Arthur. Funeral services were conducted from his late home this afternoon at 3 o'clock by the Rev. Lee Sadler, interment following in the family burying ground. Services at the grave were in charge of the Winterville Masonic Lodge.

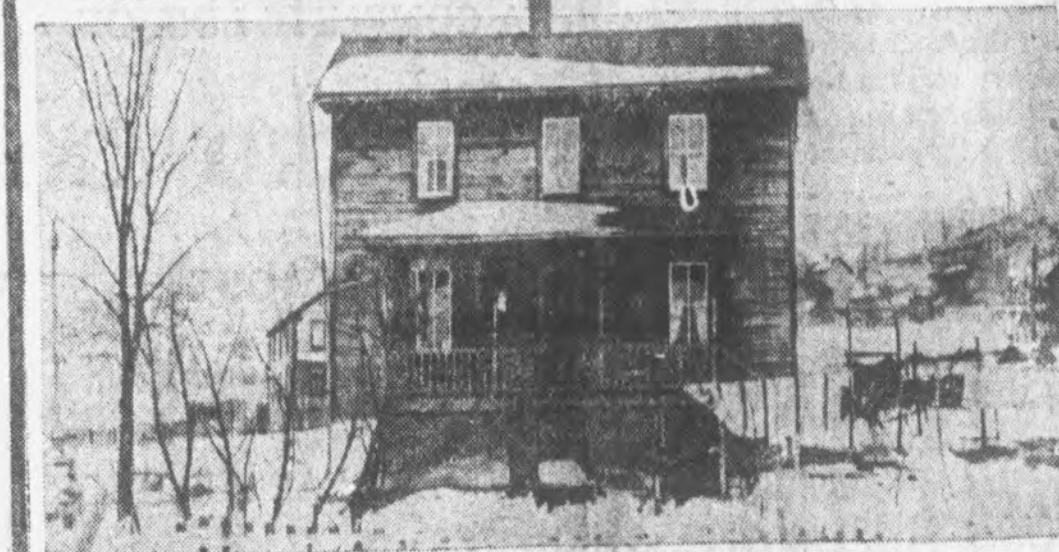

LONG ISLAND GROUP
BELIEVE TOMORROW
MARKS END WORLDGroup of Seven Day
Adventists Dispose of
Property and Await
Cloud Chariot to Bear
Them Away

New York, Feb. 5.—Praying, fasting and singing hymns 13 Seven Day Adventists on Long Island today are awaiting the end of the world which they think is coming tomorrow. They are led by Robert Reid who calls himself the "Apostle of Doom".

The little party is composed of men, women and a family of a grocer. Most of them have sold their worldly possessions and some of them a part of their clothes and are subsisting on carrots and water. Tomorrow they will go to a hilltop near East Patchogue where they expect to be taken in a cloud chariot to the wood, near San Diego, California, where they say about 144,000 "Brides of the Lamb" will be gathered. All other people will perish according to their prediction.

Disagreement from the headquarters of the Seven Day Adventists, at Washington, that tomorrow is the decreed day for the Millennium has not affected the preparations of the little band. Mrs. Margaret Marone, leader of those who have fixed the date for tomorrow has been denounced by the church. It is said that the date fixed by her is premature. The seven plagues including the great battle of Armageddon must take place before the world is doomed it is maintained by the main group of Adventists, but Reid has made his predictions in detail.

The destruction of the world will start tomorrow night and last for seven days and fire, disease, hailstones and pestilence will strike the earth at one time, he declares.

Reid is no longer a member of the Adventists church. He has sold his furniture to a second hand dealer on condition that he may buy it back.

AUTHORITIES PROBE
THE POISONING OF
U. OHIO STUDENTSUniversity Officials Co-
operating With Col-
umbus Police in Inves-
tigation as to Source of
Poison Capsules

Columbus, Ohio, Feb. 5.—Police this morning prepared to question more than 60 Ohio State University students who last week worked in the pharmacy dispensary from which capsules, some of them containing poison, were used to fill prescriptions written by the university health service and which caused the death of at least one student and the serious illness of several others.

University officials are co-operating with police in the investigation and will bend every possible effort to determine the source of the poison which apparently was a factor in the death of at least one of two students who died suddenly last week and in the violent illness of at least four other students.

The belief that the poison was intentionally placed in the capsules was strengthened yesterday by the finding of definite traces of the deadly drug in the stomach of David L. Tuskin, of Canton, Ohio, senior of the University, who died Sunday afternoon after a brief illness. Traces of the poison have also been discovered in the stomachs of two of the three students now violently ill.

The University officials have turned over the investigation to the Columbus police.

SECRETARY WILBUR
DENIES OFFICIALS
THREATENED IF TALKTells House Aircraft
Committee Navy Offi-
cers Are at Liberty to
State Opinions Freely

Washington, Feb. 5.—The House aircraft committee which is considering charges that army and navy officers are gagged by their superiors on questions of military policies was informed today by Secretary Wilbur that naval officers are free to express their views freely.

"I wish to assure you," the secretary said in a letter to Chairman Lampert of the committee, "that they are perfectly free to state fully and fairly all the facts within their knowledge not of a confidential or secret character and to fully express their opinions in any matter into which your committee wishes to inquire."

Yesterday the committee was told by Representative Perkins, Republican, of New Jersey, that three naval officers had asked to be excused from testifying because of the fear of disciplinary measures and that he had been informed Rear-Admiral Moffett, Navy Chief of Aeronautics, might lose his post because of his persistent effort for a larger air force.

Secretary Wilbur's letter placed before the committee a session called to consider a resolution expressing dissent from any plan to deprive Brigadier General Mitchell of reappointment as Assistant Chief of Army Air Service. His reappointment is being held up by Secretary Weeks pending explanation of some general statements on aviation policies.

In his letter Mr. Wilbur denied any official had been threatened with disciplinary measures if he testified before the committee and added while certain information of the department could not be released without consent of the department at the same time officers were at liberty to give their personal opinions in matter, in connection with the service even though those opinions approached criticism of the department.

WORLD COURT LAID
ON SHELF IN SENATEAfter Two Hours' Dis-
cussion Senate Com-
mittee Leaves Meas-
ure to Go Over to the
Next Congress

Washington, Feb. 5.—The World Court proposal was virtually laid on the shelf today by the Senate Foreign Relations Committee in so far as this Congress is concerned.

Two hours of discussion got the committee nowhere and afterward Senator Swanson, of Virginia, ranking Democrat on the committee, said he saw no reason for pressing the membership proposal as there was no possibility of action before March 4.

Corp. Com. Issues
Order Overruling
Exceptions S. R. Co.

Raleigh, Feb. 5.—The Corporation Commission has issued an order overruling the exceptions of the Southern Railway Company taken to the Commission's order issued on January 2, requiring the Southern Railway to construct an underpass between Spencer and East Spencer in Rowan county, according to an announcement made by Commissioner George P. Pell.

The exceptions taken by the railway company, it is said, were in regard to the location of the underpass, the railway company desiring to construct the underpass at another point.

HOPE FOR DELIVERY
OF CAVE EXPLORER
VIRTUALLY GIVEN UPRise in Floor of Cavern
Brings Complete En-
tombment; Rescue
From Above is Last
Hope

Cave City, Ky., Feb. 5.—Floyd Collins has been completely entombed in his Sand Cave prison, 125 feet under the ground, by a rise in the floor of the cave and hope for his escape through any natural passage has been abandoned.

Two trips into the cave this morning by a geologist, coal miners and military authorities sent by the governor to take charge of the situation, have convinced them that the only chance to reach Collins is by sinking a shaft from the top of the hill and endeavor to tunnel to the imprisoned man. Any attempt to mine the cave would probably prove fatal to Collins, it is believed, but the plan is adopted as a last resort and Major Cherry, the Governor's agent, has left with instructions to get mine machinery wherever it can be found.

A slow rising of the floor within the cavern began shortly after midnight and a rescue crew which entered at one o'clock this morning found that the floor had apparently swelled from below at the innermost squeeze only a few feet from Collins. Returning to the surface the miners composing the detail made their report and preparations were immediately begun to sink a shaft.

Two trips followed the conference by which the general appearance of the cave was determined so that the shaft might be sunk at the proper place. In as much as a considerable portion of the cave leading from the entrance toward the prisoner still remained undisturbed, however, it was believed that Collins was still alive.

The movement took place just beyond that part of the cavern which had been timbered by rescuers. There have been no more rock falls or cave-ins it was indicated. The swelling apparently had lifted solid rock from the floor to the roof of the cavern. This action closed the passageway for an indefinite distance and may have crushed Collins if it extended that far.

It is estimated that the shaft would have to be 50 to 75 feet deep before any of the caverns beneath were tapped. If the shaft does not tap Sand Cave an effort will be made from this depth to tunnel to the point where Collins is believed to lie.

38 Cars Reported
Stolen in the State
During January

Raleigh, Feb. 5.—Thirty-eight cars were reported stolen in North Carolina during the month of January, 1925, according to the monthly report of the North Carolina Automobile Theft Bureau, which has just been compiled. The report shows that the majority of the automobiles reported stolen were of the touring type, with coupes and roadsters ranking second and third respectively.

During the same period, according to the report, a total of thirty-three cars were recovered and returned to their owners.

Commissioners of New
Hanover Advance
\$2000 Fight "Skito"

Wilmington, Feb. 5.—The county commissioners of this county have voted an advance payment of \$2,000 for mosquito prevention work and those in charge of the work will begin their fight against the pest early, it is stated.

The county appropriates the sum of \$4,000 annually for this work, which includes putting oil on waters that cannot be drained, maintaining the present system of dikes, drainage ditched, dams and tide gates, and trimming and removing debris.

Babies Start With Bank Books.

Dessau, Prussia.—Every baby born in Dessau on Christmas was given a deposit of three marks by the municipal savings bank. The district savings bank of Dessau is doing even more for new arrivals. It has announced that it will give a bond for three marks to the parents of every child born in 1925 on condition that the parents deposit one mark. The four mark, will be held in deposit on interest for 14 years to promote the saving spirit among families.

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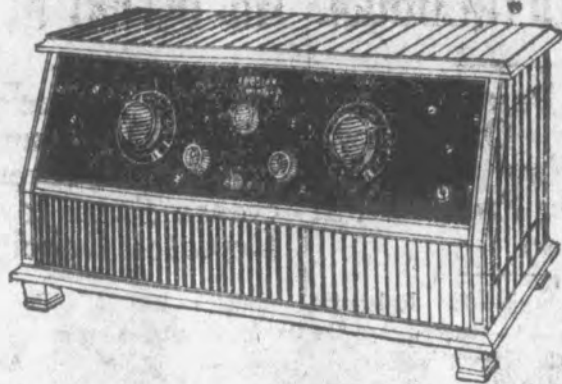

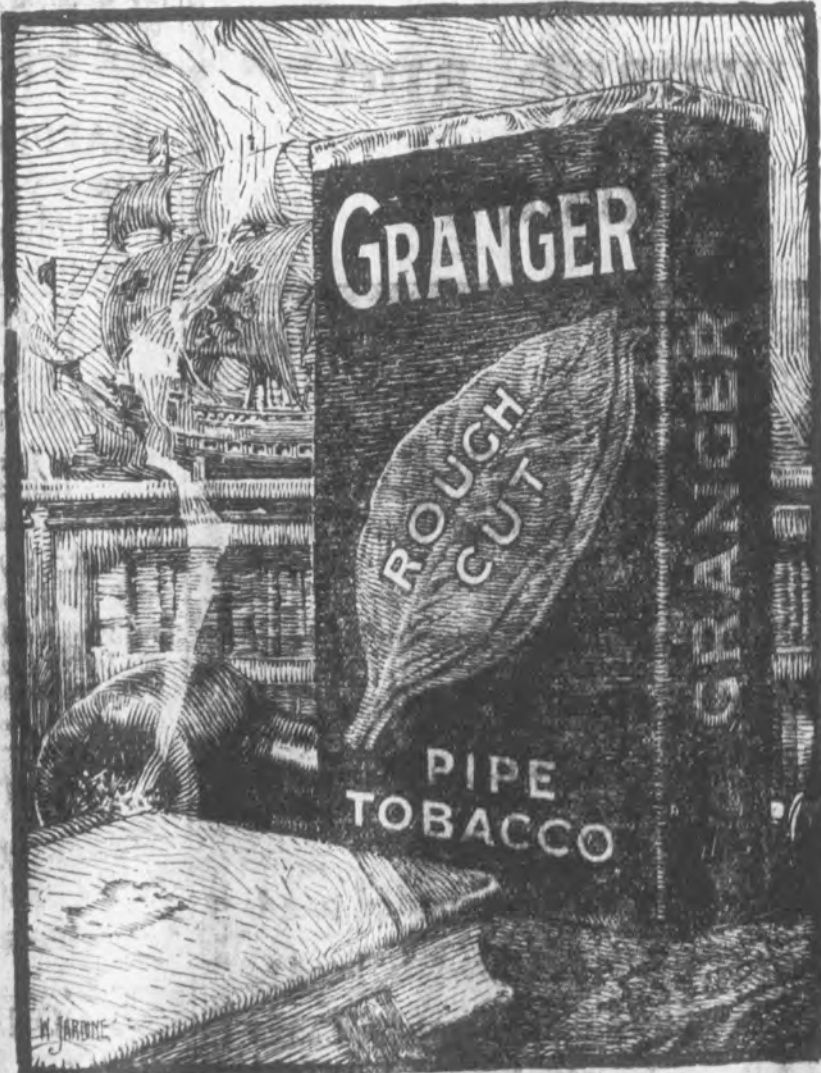
