RESCUERS CONTINUING THEIR EFFORTS REACH MAN ENTOMBED IN CAVE

Discovery of New Passageway May Lead to Collins; Radio Resorted to in Effort to Ascertain if Prisoner is Still Alive

Cave City, Feb. 6.—Andrew Collins, brother of Sand Cave prisoner, Floyd Collins, arrived during the night from Illinois and has found a new cave near the scene of the present rescuers. A party of men have gone underground on an immediate trip in hope to find a new access to the trapped passageway. The new cave is described as little more than a sink hole, and it has apparently escaped all attention heretofore, and none of the men of the cave country, who were on hand this noon, knew where it might lead to.

Cave City, Ky., Feb. 6.—All hope of reaching him through the natural passage gone, rescuers are making a new entrance to Sand Cave in attempt to reach Floyd Collins, who has been entombed since last Friday morning.

Whether Collins is dead or alive is not known definitely since a cave in blocked the natural passageway to where Collins is pinioned by rock. The general belief was that he has succumbed by being crushed to death by suffocation, or by pneumonia from exposure.

Early today, however, radio was resorted to in the hope that cave would give up its secret. A two stage radio frequency amplifier was connected to the lighting circuit leading into the cave which is known to be intact. The light was turned on and with head phones clamped to their ears, they expected a sound as coming from Collins. After the first test men said they heard sounds, and believed them to have been caused by jarring of the filament in the electric bulb fastened around Collins' neck. If alive, he had probably moved when the light went out, thus shocking the filament. On the other hand it was pointed out that other noises might have caused the sound in the filament. The second experiment, according to a correspondent of the Louisville Courier-Journal, brought hope that Collins was alive. The light was suddenly turned off, and a definite movement as of a body turning over was heard in the radio head piece. This movement, the radio man said, was made by some body in the vicinity of the bulb around Collins' neck, thus creating a noise carried to them on the hill top. With the bulb intact, Collins evidently has not been crushed to death, because the light circuit would have been broken by the breaking of the globe.

Work on the shaft from above was begun yesterday and today a hole ten feet deep has been made. Work slowed up by necessity of timbering the shaft as it deepened. It has been estimated that Collins is 55 feet below the surface. The time estimated to sink the shaft is from 24 to 72 hours. Every precaution is being taken to guard workers from tumbling into any cavern that might be between them and Collins.

The new opening is expected to reach the natural passageway from 18 feet behind Collins. In this way, workers hope to enter the shaft on the side of the rock which is holding Collins.

Louisville, Ky., Feb. 5.—"A corpse now lies in a relentless trap down in the rocky tunnel where, but a few hours ago, an undaunted man lived on his faith and hope," says William B. Miller, staff correspondent, in a copyrighted story to the Courier-Journal tonight. "Through the hour of agony he kept his eyes on an imaginary ray of light, but the light is dark forever."

"It might be different if Floyd Collins could only know, if he could only see beyond the cave which is his tomb. If he only knew that here, at last, on the outside, was order where order was not before, that rescue workers are diving forward as a man whose before they tugged in opposite directions, that one man's word is final, where before many men spoke with authority. Floyd Collins might yet nurse the

AMERICANS QUIT OPIUM CONFERENCE HOLDING AT GENEVA

Chairmen of Delegation Advises Conference American Delegates Will Depart for Home Tonight

Geneva, Feb. 6.—The American delegation has withdrawn from the International Opium Conference. Mr. Porter and his associates are to leave Geneva tonight and will sail for home next Thursday on the steam ship "President Harding." Mr. Porter officially informed the conference that despite more time, from the two months discussion, and repeated the announcement of adjournment, it was clear that the purpose, for which the conference had been called could not be accomplished. The American withdrawal was announced in a letter from Mr. Porter to M. Zhal, President of the conference. "In pursuance of the authorization of the President of the United States, the American delegation expresses deep regret as to being unable to longer participate in the deliberations of the opium conference."

CITIZENS OPPOSE CITY EXTENSION

Appear Before Board of Aldermen and Express Opposition to Measure

The Board of Aldermen met in regular monthly session last night with the mayor and every member of the board present.

Several petitions were presented regarding the curbing and gutters on South Eighth street, west Third St., Elizabeth and Latham streets, Eighth street being the only one with sufficient numbers of signatures was passed and work ordered to be begun at discretion of street committee. Other projects were deferred until a meeting to be called the ally part of next week.

An ordinance was passed designating streets, and side walks upon which skating is forbidden. The mayor was instructed to draft such an ordinance and publish same in interest of the public.

A few parties appeared before the board objecting to the proposed extension of the city limits. The bill as drafted already being in the hands of the county legislators, by their appearing so much opposition to the proposed line especially in the western part of the city a motion was made to recall the bill and changes made to conform with some suggestions, offered by property owners involved. The motion was defeated 5 to 3, and the bill will be presented probably the early part of next week with its original boundary line.

Dr. C. L. Outland, and Mr. Miller, of the State Board of Health, appeared before the Board in regards to better milk and better meats and presented resolutions from several organizations, asking for the passing of an ordinance for the grading of the city's milk supply and the sanitary condition surrounding the dairies which are now furnishing Greenville. The Health Department also asked the Board to pass an ordinance prohibiting the sale of any fresh meats without the examination of same by local officers. The Board without a dissenting vote adopted the standard milk ordinance, also the ordinance regarding meats.

There were several minor matters presented but on account of the late hour these were deferred until another meeting.

ALDERMEN TAKE STEPS TO IMPROVE CITY MILK SUPPLY

Ordinance Adopted Which Provides for Regular Laboratory Tests in Addition to Existing Regulations

At the regular meeting of the Board of Aldermen Thursday night definite and decisive steps were taken to regulate and improve the city milk supply. An ordinance was adopted which provides for regular laboratory tests of milk delivered in Greenville in addition to the existing regulations which provided only for sanitary inspection of the dairies. The new ordinance also embraces certain additional important items with regard to dairy equipment and precaution to be observed in connection with the handling of milk, which the board believes will aid materially in better safeguarding the quality and safety of milk delivery in Greenville.

The discussion developed among the board members the opinion that the old ordinance could have been much more effective with more frequent inspection. The action of the board in adopting the new ordinance therefore contemplates the employment of an inspector to devote much more attention to dairy inspection than has heretofore been possible. The mayor and members of the board have contemplated action toward improving the milk supply for several months, but have given the matter very thorough investigation before taking any definite steps.

Dr. Outland, the County Health Officer was called into conference with the board on this matter and explained the importance of early action in the matter in order to have the city milk supply in good condition before the summer months. A representative of the State Board of Health was called upon by the board to discuss some of the problems of dairy inspection that have given the board much concern in the past.

The ordinance adopted is a grading ordinance recommended by the State Board of Health, and has within the past few months been adopted by Rocky Mount, Tarboro, Washington and Goldsboro, as well as Greensboro and other towns in the western part of the state.

The board had before them resolutions of indorsement of this action from the County Medical Society, the County Board of Health, Kiwanis and Rotary Clubs, the Parent Teachers Association, the Woman's Club and a resolution signed by five dairymen supplying the city, which indicates the support of the public in putting into effect the improved milk regulation decided upon by the board.

CLAN - BOOTLEGGERS CONFLICT AROUSES CITY MILK SUPPLY ASHE CO. CITIZENS

Many "Dry" Violators Arrested as Result of Activities of Masked and Robbed Men Believed to Be Klansmen

Winston-Salem, Feb. 6.—The town of West Jefferson in Ashe county has been aroused to the activities of masked men alleged to be members of the Ku Klux Klan, who have started a conflict between bootleggers and themselves. People from West Jefferson stated that masked men have been turning out at night, robbing and armed and several automobiles.

McFADDEN BANK BILL IS REPORTED TODAY

Committee Amends Section Which Would Have Prevented Reserve Membership for Banks With Branches

Washington, Feb. 6.—The McFadden Banking Bill was reported today by the Senate Banking Committee after amending the section which would have prevented state banks with branches from holding membership in the Federal Reserve. National Banks would be authorized to maintain branches acquired by consolidation, and these established branches can authorize members subject to state laws.

TRIAL OF COOPER IS NEARING CLOSE

Case Against Horace Cooper, Former Cashier, Expected to Reach Jury Today

Wilmington, Feb. 6.—The trial of Horace Cooper, former cashier of the defunct Commercial National Bank of Wilmington, was expected to reach the jury here today. The trial started yesterday and before the close of the testimony the state had rested its case. It was indicated by court officials this morning that the jury is ready to try former Lieutenant Governor W. B. Cooper, father of the man on the trial, and chairman of the board of directors of the bank, Thomas E. Garton, 144; Wilson, 161; Rockingham, 150; Wayne, 150.

Mrs. L. A. Stroud has returned from Richmond where she has been for the last two years ago. The trial will be started late this afternoon.

MITCHELL APPEARS BEFORE AIRCRAFT COMMITTEE TODAY

Declares War Department Organization Incapable of Administering Army Air Power Efficiently

Washington, Feb. 6.—Brigadier General Mitchell, assistant chief of the Army Air Service, informed Secretary Weeks today, "The present War Department organization and its administration is quite incapable of creating, handling, or administering air power in an efficient manner."

In the letter replying to a request from the House Air Craft Committee which had gathered to hear General Mitchell and Brigadier General Drum of the Army's General Staff.

"The general view of the War Department," General Mitchell wrote, "is to limit the ability of aviation in a military way and despite findings of the Army and Navy Board of the most conclusive evidence, the Navy Department still appears before Congress and testifies incorrectly on the question of Air Craft efficiency as compared with battle ships. 'Persistent effort of the War Department toward the creation of an independent organization and personnel is insistent and constant.' 'I have fully criticized the system now in operation, which I am positive is detrimental to the country's good and will seriously compromise our National Defense should an emergency arise.'"

The General's letter was placed before the House Air Craft Committee which had gathered to hear General Mitchell and Brigadier General Drum of the Army's General Staff.

5,648 New Titles Issued for Cars In State in Dec.

Raleigh, Feb. 6.—A total of 5,648 titles for new cars were issued in North Carolina during the month of December, 1924, according to a report made public here today by the license department of the Department of State. Guilford county led the list with a total of 329, while Mecklenburg was second with 305. None were reported for Dare county, while Avery was next to the end of the list, with only one new car reported titled during the period covered in the report.

The number of cars titled in the ten leading counties, follows: Guilford, 329; Mecklenburg, 305; Ireland, 297; Forsyth, 243; Buncombe, 186; Wake, 176; Edgecombe, 173; Gaston, 144; Wilson, 161; Rockingham, 150; Wayne, 150.

QUESTION OF JUDGES AND COURTS OCCUPIES TIME OF LEGISLATURE

URGENT INVESTIGATION INTO THE ALLEGED TOBACCO MONOPOLY

Charge Controlling Companies With An Effort to Crush Co-operative Associations By Means of Boycott

Washington, Feb. 6.—An investigation by the Federal Trade Commission into the allegation that the American Tobacco Company and the Imperial Tobacco Company, of England, control the tobacco markets in this country, was proposed in a resolution today in the Senate.

Immediate consideration of the resolution, which would direct particular inquiry into the alleged boycotting of the American Tobacco Growers Co-operative Association was blocked.

Senators sponsoring the investigation declared that the two companies had been and were boycotting and destroying the Tobacco Co-operative Association of this country. The Imperial Tobacco Company, it was said, had a monopoly on tobacco grown in North and South Carolina and Kentucky, while the American Tobacco Company had a similar monopoly on other grades grown in other sections.

PITT COUNTY BAR ASS'N. ORGANIZED

Mr. F. G. James Elected President; Opposed to Mayors Being Given Power of Recorders

Members of the legal profession of Pitt County, following a calendar meeting on Tuesday afternoon, organized the Pitt County Bar Association, composed of the following members: Judge H. W. Whedbee, Judge L. G. Cooper, L. W. Gaylord, Julius Brown, J. B. James, F. C. Harding, W. A. Darden, F. G. James, Albion Dunn, J. B. Eure, J. L. Evans, F. M. Wooten, W. G. Shepherd, M. K. Blount, S. T. Carson, Arthur B. Corey and M. B. Prescott.

The purpose of the Pitt County Bar Association is to foster the spirit of mutual cooperation between the various members of the Association and to preserve the ethics and high standing of the practice of the law.

Mr. F. G. James acted as temporary chairman, and Mr. Arthur B. Corey acted as temporary secretary.

Mr. M. K. Blount, chairman on constitution and by-laws was called for a report, which report consisted of the reading of a constitution and by-laws which Mr. Blount had drafted.

These were adopted by the Association after some discussion and amendment. The election of officers was next in order, and the following officers were elected for the year: Mr. F. G. James, President, Mr. Albion Dunn, Vice President, Mr. Arthur B. Corey, Secretary and Treasurer.

The President then appointed his executive committee, which consists of M. K. Blount, J. B. James, F. C. Harding, W. G. Shepherd and J. B. Eure.

Upon a motion being offered and carried that the Pitt County Bar Association go on record as disapproving a present bill before the General Assembly of North Carolina, wherein the Mayor of Greenville, or the various mayors of the municipalities throughout the State of North Carolina be given judicial jurisdiction concurrent with that of the County Court. The President, appointed his legislative committee, to draft a resolution to the above effect and forward same to the General Assembly of North Carolina. This committee is composed of Albion Dunn, Julius Brown and H. W. Whedbee.

Supreme Court Decision Declares Legislature Has No Power to Ap- point to or Authorize Power of Courts

Raleigh, Feb. 6.—Extremely quiet sessions marked the two houses of the General Assembly today. In the House, legislation dealing with Courts and Judicial Districts, were halted by the opinion rendered by the Supreme Court that the legislature had no power to appoint or authorize the power of the court. In the Senate there were no measures of importance up for consideration, and the body sat about to clear up its calendar on which appeared several local and minor bills. In clearing up the legislation one-half dozen local bills were drawn into their discussion. Several other minor bills were cleared up with a view to disposing of them.

In the House Representative "Pitt"ington introduced a bill designed to take the veto power in the matter of the appointment of County Superintendent of Welfare away from the State Board of Welfare and vest it in the County Welfare Board, as explained in the measure introduced by Mrs. Kate Burr Johnson, State Welfare Commissioner.

Several reports were rendered on bills to increase the power of Meredith College from one to ten million dollars and that of Wake Forest from one to five million dollars.

Unfavorable reports were made on the two bills affecting the Welfare Department of which one would have broadened their powers, while the other would have narrowed them.

The opinion of the Supreme Court on special judges was rendered under resolution requesting information passed by the House some few days ago. It declared that under the act authorizing the creation of emergency judges, the General Assembly had no power to name or authorize for the court Special or Emergency Judges. The difference between the two is that the former would be appointed to serve a certain number of years until docket congestion is relieved, while the latter includes all judges retired from the bench, who may be called up to handle any term of court without any special limitation of service. The House called on the Supreme Court to interpret its power after several measures designed to relieve congestion of the Court docket had been introduced in the lower body.

The Committee immediately announced that it would today take under consideration the legislation, looking to a reconstruction of the state probably to provide from five to seven additional Judicial districts.

Interesting Talks Made at Woman's Club Meeting

The Woman's Club held its regular monthly meeting on Thursday afternoon in the Baraca Class room of the Memorial Baptist church. The session proved one of the most interesting held in several months and was featured by an address by Mr. H. E. Miller, of the State Board of Health, a talk by Mayor D. M. Clark and an appeal for the Girl Scouts by Miss Scarborough.

In the absence of Mrs. E. B. Ficklen, president, Mrs. H. E. Austin, vice president, presided. Mrs. E. W. Harvey, secretary, being absent, the minutes of the last meeting were read by Mrs. Wiley Brown. Reports made by Mrs. W. H. Woolard, chairman of the Health Department, Mrs. J. H. B. Moore, chairman of the Home Economics Department, and Mrs. Alex Viola, chairman of the Civic Department were splendid and showed that each department is doing something really worth while for the community. Mrs. E. W. Griffin, chairman of the Fine Arts Department and Mrs. R. L. Carr, chairman of the Library Committee were not in attendance. Mrs. L. H. Bowling, treasurer made a splendid report.

Mrs. J. H. B. Moore, chairman of the Home Economics Department announced that on next Saturday her department would be at home to the ladies of Pitt county. At this time Miss Pauline Smith, District Agent of the State Home Economics Department will be present and will discuss the value of Home Economics work in the school, and clubs of the county. The members of the Home Economics Department have

FINANCES OF OXFORD BURDENED LENGTHY LEASES AT LOW RENT

Oxford, Feb.—The total income of the university and colleges of Oxford during the past year was a trifle more than \$5,000,000. Of this, the larger part is college income. Magdalen, the richest college, has an annual income of more than \$500,000; Hertford, the poorest, has only \$50,000.

In general, the college incomes are small as compared with their capital. Nearly all are large holders of lands which were let one or two centuries ago on enormously long leases at rents which are now ridiculously small—often only two or three dollars per year for a large farm. They are also large holders of church titles and livings of country parishes, which have also greatly depreciated in value.

Queen's College is the most fortunate of the landholding colleges, as the great docks at Southampton are built on its property. Balliol still suffers from the mismanagement of its investments in Elizabeth's time, and Wadham is poor because its money is largely invested in shares in ancient canals.

The great differences in wealth of the various colleges is the chief cause of the differences in their fees and expenses. The college expenses in Balliol or Worcester are almost twice as high as in Queen's or Corpus Christi. As these differences are not set out in an notices or catalogue, many American Rhodes scholars have unwittingly chosen the most expensive colleges.

Unlike the American universities, Oxford receives very little in voluntary gifts and donations. During the past year donations amounted to less than \$10,000. Drives, endowment campaigns and the perennial solicitation of prosperous alumni are unknown.

The colleges annually contribute about \$350,000 to the university. Another quarter of a million is contributed by the government in general and special grants. The largest source of university revenue is examination fees, which amount to about half a million dollars yearly. The examination in Holy Scripture, called Divinity Moderations or, more shortly, Divinity, is one of the most profitable. All members of the university are required to take it at cost of \$25 during their first term and to continue taking it at a like cost for each succeeding term until they pass it. The university administration costs are extremely low—about \$65,000 a year. The largest items of annual expense are the more than half a million dollars paid to teachers, and the \$350,000 spent by the college on teaching and research. The university police costs \$10,000 annually, but the fines they collect from errant and truant students make them a profitable institution.

Conference Vocational Rehabilitation Workers Be Held in Washington

Raleigh, Feb. 5.—A conference of vocational and rehabilitation workers will be held in Washington, D. C., on Monday, February 9, according to word that has been received here by Prof. A. T. Allen, director of the work in North Carolina.

The conference is being called for the purpose of discussing problems, pertaining to the work of the vocational education. H. L. Stanton, Supervisor of Civilian Vocational Education and Rehabilitation in

North Carolina will attend the meeting, as will many supervisors from other States.

HOLLAND'S FOURTH ROTARY CENTER FORMALLY OPEN. ED AT THE HAGUE

The Hague.—A Rotary club was formally opened here recently by B. Verkade, member of the board of directors of Rotary International. In the absence of the American minister, Louis A. Sussdorf, first secretary of the legation, explained the growth and progress of Rotary in America, and toasted its success in Holland. Burgomaster Patyn of The Hague gave the new center his official blessing.

There are now four Rotary centers in Holland.

Health Department Urges Use Sanitary Drinking Cups

During the years of 1918 and when the "flu" was taking such a toll in sickness and deaths the County Board of Health as a wise precaution passed the following resolution to protect the unsuspecting public from the many disease germs lurking on the mouths of ordinary drinking glasses used at the various soft drink stands of the City of Greenville and the county at large:

Therefore be it resolved: It is hereby ordered that no soda fountain, drinking stand, or other place where soft drinks or ice cream is served, shall be allowed to dispense soft drinks, ice cream or any ices or drinks, except in individual sanitary cups which have not previously been used. All spoons shall be thoroughly sterilized before being used the second time. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect on and after February 5th, 1920.

After the peak of the epidemic had passed it was decided to repeal the ordinance due to the insistence of the various soft drink dispensers, who at that time promised to install hot water to wash the glasses in, and also to use a solution of Sal Soda, or a similar disinfectant.

Some time ago the Board of Health directed the Health Officer to obtain data in regard to the efficiency of water used to wash glasses. Specimens of the water were taken from practically every soft drink stand in the entire county. The results are such that the public should know about them. Every specimen taken showed the presence of the Colon

Bacillus which is a member of the same group which causes typhoid fever. The mere fact of finding this particular germ shows that there is a possibility of many other kinds of infection.

The Health Department realizing the many dangers which may come from this source thinks it best to give the public these facts. Is it

not time for the people to make up and ask that the proper kind of protection be afforded them against the various diseases which are liable to transmission through the medium of the common drinking cup; as typhoid diphtheria, whooping cough, common colds, influenza and various other diseases.

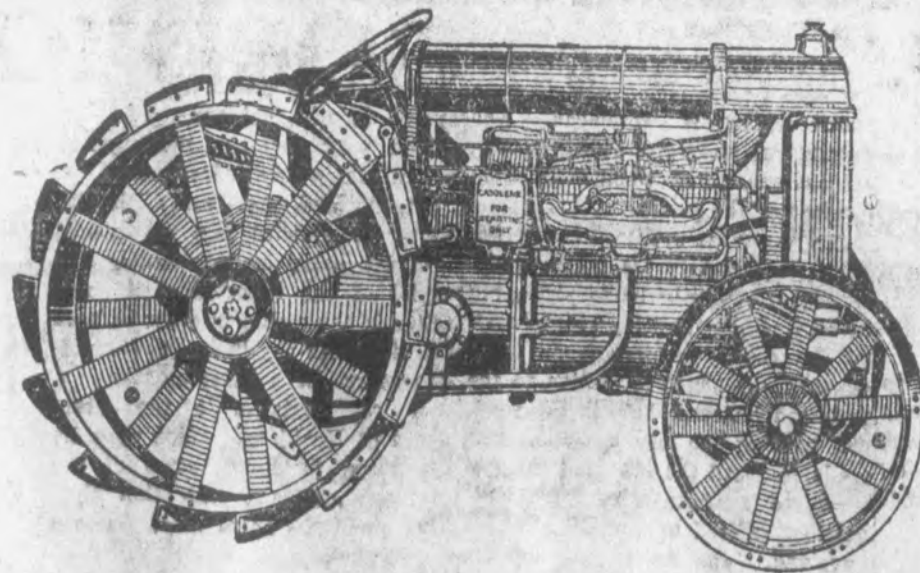

STUDENTS AIDED TROTSKY ESCAPING HANGIN SAYS COUSIN

Wenatchee, Wash., Feb. 5.—How an experience in the early life of Leon Trotsky which resulted in saving him from execution by the Russian Czarist government made him a convert to communism was related recently by his cousin, Mrs. Rose Kornblit of Manon, Wash. The mothers of Trotsky and Mrs. Kornblit were sisters.

When quite young Trotsky, whose real name is Leon Brunschtoen, was sent by his wealthy parents, David and Anna Brunschtoen, from their home in southern Russia to European schools, Mrs. Kornblit said. He sympathized with fellow students less fortunately situated than himself, and divided his means with them.

Later Trotsky was jailed by the Czarist government on a charge of being a Socialist, and was condemned to die. It was then that the friendly acts toward his fellow students bore their fruit. They started to dig a tunnel into his cell and effected his escape on the night before he was to have been hanged, his cousin related.

Dressed in feminine garment he fled to Paris, and kept himself in seclusion until the vigilance of the Russian secret police was relaxed. Then he came to America where he assumed the name of Trotsky to help in avoiding detection.

"So it is only natural that Leon would believe in communism," Mrs. Kornblit said. "He gave to the poor and in return the poor gave him what could not be bought with money—his freedom."

His parents did not know for years after his escape that he had not been hanged. After his return to Russia and his rise to the head of the Red Army he rejoined his mother. With the revolution he had lost her wealth. She now resides in Leningrad.

Mrs. Kornblit, with her husband, Aaron Kornblit, resides on ten acres of highly productive orchard land on the shores of Lake Chelan, not far from this city. She left Russia in 1907 for fear of persecution of the Jews and came to America in 1918. In Seattle, her husband, who also fled also to the Jewish persecutions in Russia.

FIGHTING PROGRESS

Some opposition as usual has arisen to the proposed extension of the corporate limits of Greenville and last night a few citizens appeared before the Board of Aldermen to oppose the extension as outlined in the bill which is to be presented to the General Assembly early next week.

While Greenville has a potential population of around 8,000 a large proportion now reside without the actual corporate limits, yet these suburban residents enjoy every advantage and convenience offered those within the city proper without being required to bear the tax burden borne by city tax payers.

When a site was being sought for the new West End Grammar School now being erected by the city the site outside the city limits was chosen with the understanding that this

and nearby property would be taken into the city. The opposition now arising would exclude most of the property adjacent to the new school from the city although the establishment of the school has greatly enhanced the value of such property. The city pavement has been extended to streets beyond the limits of the city proper with the understanding that such property would be taken into the city and now the opposition to the extension would exclude this also.

As said above persons residing outside the city are receiving every convenience offered by the city including lights, water, sewerage and fire protection when possible without one cent of additional tax. In view of the opposition it was suggested by certain members of the board last night that should the measure providing for extension of the city limits not be enacted that steps be taken to prohibit the local Water and Light Commission from extending services beyond the city limits.

It is regrettable that such opposition as is now raised against extension of the city limits should be allowed to check the growth and expansion of our city and should such come to pass the suggestion that outlying property be cut off from the conveniences paid for by citizens of Greenville should immediately be adopted.

The fight against extension is a fight against progress and it is to be hoped that citizens of the city proper will immediately get in touch with our representatives in the General Assembly, urging that they give their support to the measure which would include outlying property in the town charter.

Those who are to enjoy the advantages offered by the city should be required to bear their part of the city's burdens.

PUBLIC FORUM

Editor Reflector:

With your permission I would like to address a short article to the people of Pitt county.

Jefferson is credited with saying that "eternal vigilance is the price of liberty," and Chief Justice Marshall with the power to tax is the power to enslave. I presume Jefferson meant that whoever might be in authority would bear watching. That some perhaps many should take it upon themselves to prevent any encroachments upon the liberties of the common people. The constitution of North Carolina is intended to be obeyed by all officers of the state, counties and towns. When any of these officers, seemingly past laws, levy taxes or issue bonds contrary to the intent of said constitution—some explanation is due the body politic.

Article 8, section seven reads as follows: No county shall contract any debt or loan its credit or pledge its faith—except for the necessary expenses thereof, unless by a vote of the majority of the qualified voters therein. This seems to be a reasonable section and one intended to protect the people from burdensome debt. So far, I suppose all will agree but the application. Is the building of hard surface roads a necessity? Is the building of a hard surface road from Ayden to Seafleeton such a necessity as the constitution contemplates? If so, is not the building of a hard surface road from Ballard X Roads to Arthur a necessity? I, not a hard surface road from Grimesland to Venters or Vaneboro equally a necessity? Should we not have one from Farmville to Kings X Roads? Should not the Greenville to Bruce road be extended to Fountain and the Wilson county line?

How about a road from Greenville to Penny Hill? Either one of these roads to my humble judgment is as meritorious as the Ayden to Seafleeton road.

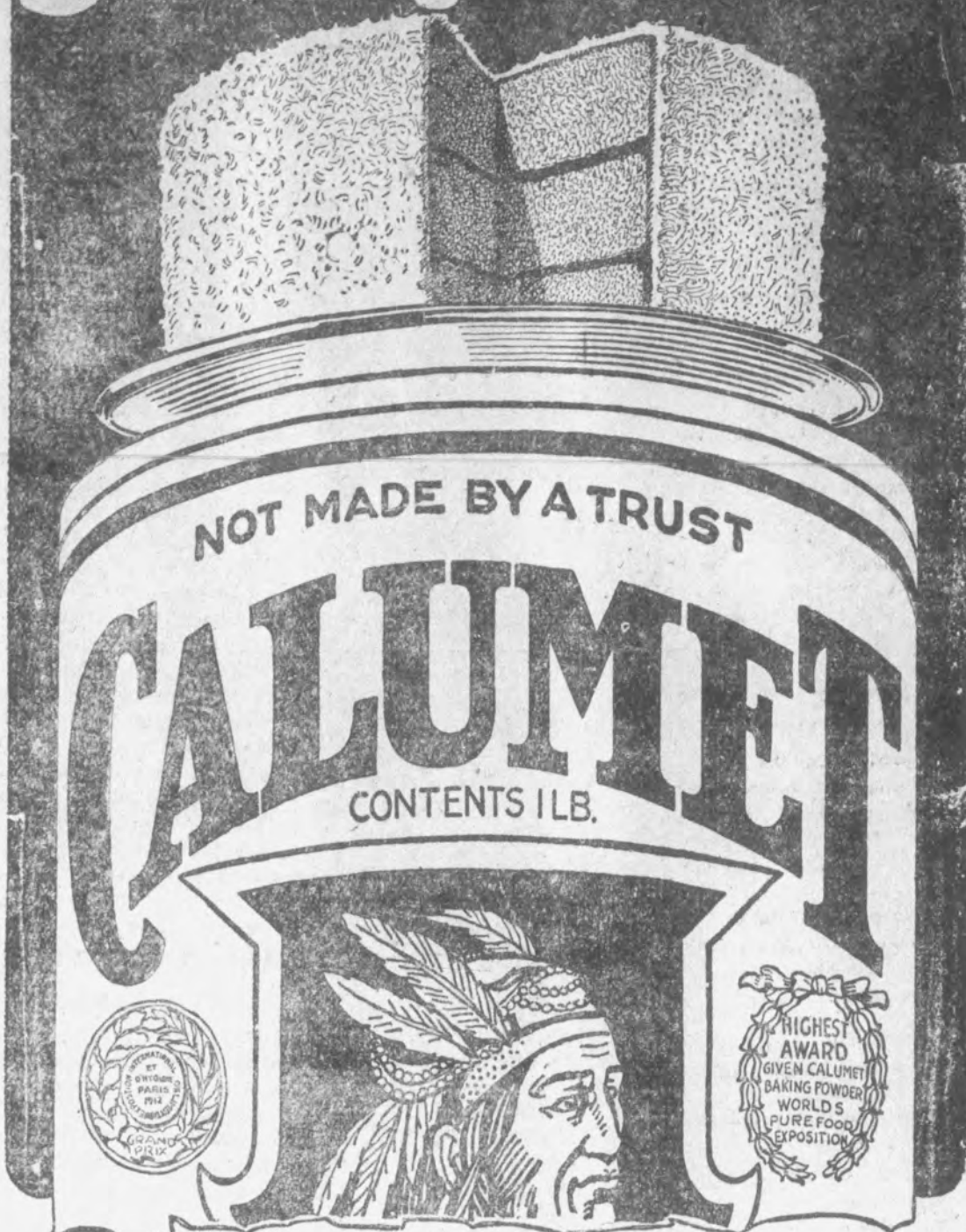

Mrs. Moore also announced that Miss Maude Wallace, Assistant State Home Demonstration Agent, will spend the last week of February in Pitt county, giving demonstrations and holding meetings throughout the county. On Saturday, February 28th, she will hold a county wide meeting in Greenville to which every body in the county will be invited. In March Mrs. Flaboes, of the Gold Metal Flour Company, will under the auspices of the Home Economics Department, visit Greenville and for a week will give demonstrations in making cakes, pies, bread, etc. This promises to be most instructive and enjoyable.

Mr. W. H. Woolard, chairman of Health Department gave a most satisfactory report and was instrumental in having Mr. H. E. Miller, visit the club and make an interesting talk on the grading of milk.

Mrs. Alex Viola, chairman of the Civics Dept. stated that her department had taken up the matter of children skating on the side walks and had written a letter to the mayor regarding same and also stated that they had discussed the matter of the Girl Scouts and presented to the club Miss Scarborough, the present director of the Greenville Girl Scouts.

After several matters of vital importance to the club had been discussed, Mayor D. M. Clark, in his usual attractive manner, presented to the club Mr. H. E. Miller, director of Sanitary Engineering and Inspection of State Board of Health, who explained the importance of clean, safe milk as an essential article of the diet, especially of children.

and explained the value of grading of milk. His talk was made in connection with a resolution which the club presented to the Board of Aldermen in their session last evening, asking for a clean, safe milk supply for the town of Greenville. Mr. Miller was accompanied by Dr. C. L. Outland, Pitt County Health Officer. The Club was delighted to have him present.

Mayor Clark presented in its entirety the matter of extending the corporate limits of the town of Greenville, explaining at the same time the results to be obtained in giving to the mayor the power of recorder. He showed in a few words the benefit to be derived from this, without any extra cost to the town. He appealed to the Club Women to express themselves regarding the two matters, and urged them to write letters to our senator and representatives stating their views on the matter. He explained the extension of the corporate limits showing the necessity of same. Mr. Clark is an interesting speaker and his explanation of the two matters was clear and concise. The matter was referred to the Legislative Committee of the Club with authority to act.

Before discussing the two matters, mentioned above Mayor Clark read a letter which he had received from Mrs. Viola asking that certain streets be roped off for the children to skate on. Mr. Clark discussed the skating problem and offered to assist as far as possible in helping solve the question of skating and its accompanying dangers.

Mrs. Alex Viola introduced Miss Scarborough who spoke interestingly on the work of the Girl Scouts, showing the benefits derived by the girls who belong to such an organization and appealed to the Woman's Club to sponsor the organization. Her talk was very instructive, but due to the absence of Mrs. Ficklen the matter was tabled until a future meeting.

The following nominating committee was appointed, Mrs. H. S. Ragsdale, chairman, Mrs. G. V.

Smith, Mrs. I. F. Lee. They will make their report in March.

It was announced that the club will hold a bridge and ruck tournament in the near future.

One new member was added to the club.

A letter was read asking that the Woman's Club appoint a committee to work with other organizations in establishing community work in the Cotton Mill section. The matter was acted upon favorably and the naming of the committee was left to Mrs. Ficklen.

The meeting was one of the best held in several months.

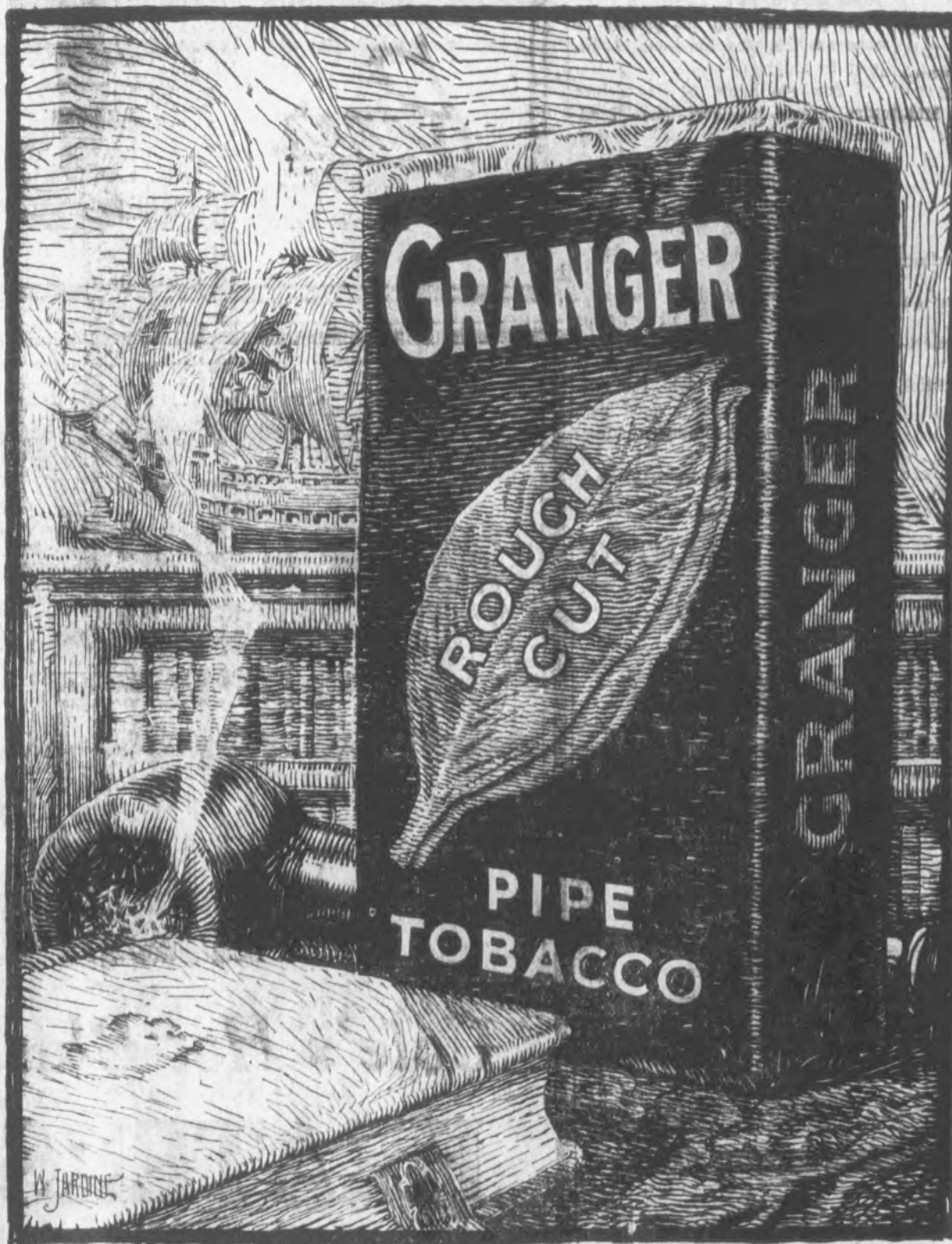

RESCUERS CONTINUING THEIR EFFORTS REACH MAN ENTOMBED IN CAVE

spark off.

"Camp fires are twinkling on the hillside tonight where 100 men are sinking a shaft which, it is hoped, will enable them to bring Collins out in 36 hours. Lieutenant Governor H. H. Denhardt is in command and the work, as a result, is systematic.

"It is hard to realize how conditions have changed in such a short time. It seems but a little while ago since I crawled back to the prisoner who, when I last saw him, had spent more than 130 hours in the grip of a cave he was exploring.

"I look now and see workers hurrying backward and forward in front of many fires. I hear the voices, some of which are not in keeping with the scene. I close my eyes and again, vividly, I see Floyd Collins as I crawl and squirm over him.

"I feel anew the thrill that his prayer sent to me. I respond again to his plea for help, his plea to be taken out, his plea for food, his request to aid him.

"I come to know, as the picture swims before me, how much I admired the man who lived through torture where others would have died. To realize how this man's misfortune brought us together in a friendship I hoped would continue indefinitely. But all hope seems lost.

"A seal was placed on the passageway today, barring all further rescue parties from getting back to Collins. At noon work on the shaft was started and by night the men penetrated ten feet. With good luck, Collins' body will be in sight in fewer than 36 hours.

"A chart of the passageway, made

early today by Edward Williams, of the Standard Sanitary Manufacturing Company, Louisville, revealed that Collins is trapped beneath the entrance. But in getting there, it was necessary for him to make many turns. I had imagined him farther away, but I was bewildered by the twisting and turning channel.

"A drill and derrick have been set up and are in use. All other machinery necessary to speed up the work is here or on the way and, from now on, all obstacles probably will be overcome without undue delay.

"Williams, after his last trip in the cave at dawn, reported to Lieut. Governor Denhardt that the earth inside was bucking, bringing together the wall of the passageway and making it extremely dangerous for anyone to go in. He reported that there was little chance of reaching Collins.

"Nearly everyone is convinced that

Collins is dead. Some think he may be alive, but unconscious. But no one I have seen expects to see him come out alive.

"The workers, themselves are confidently digging for a corpse. I have been unable to find anyone who has fed Collins since I carried food to him late Tuesday night. I talked with Collins Wednesday and his voice was strong, but I feel that he cannot have endured the days of fasting in his condition."

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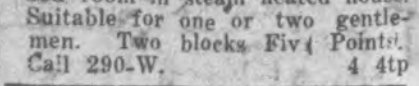
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
