RESCUERS ARE WORKING UNCEASINGLY TO REACH IMPRISONED CAVE MAN

Hope of Removing Collins Alive Abandoned; Shaft Has Penetrated Half Estimated Depth to Cavern

Cave City, Ky., Feb. 7.—The shaft through which rescuers hope to reach Floyd Collins, dead or alive, in his Sand Cave prison, is 22 feet deep according to latest advices at noon. Operation, thus far, have been at the rate of six inches per hour. More than half the distance remains to be excavated.

Cave City, Ky., Feb. 7.—The tread of Kentucky troops beat staccato today through the frenzied picking by miners, digging away at a new shaft to Sand Cave where Floyd Collins, entombed cave man, has lain pinioned by a boulder for almost 200 hours. Determined that no effort shall interfere in any way with the operations, the guardsmen last night ordered Homer Collins, brother of the victim, and John Gerald away from the cave.

Gerald was leader of one of the numerous parties that earlier in the week made fruitless efforts to get to Collins from the cave entrance. Both men were called to National Guard headquarters, where officers told them that the shaft now boring downward was the last chance to reach the cave prisoner. Their actions, especially Gerald's criticism of the means being employed, made their appearance undesirable because it slowed down the work, and officials explained that it would be necessary to forcibly eject them if they returned to the scene. Both agreed not to offer further interference.

Slowly but surely the shaft, preceded by a diamond point drill for the sake of safety, is going down. Early today it had gone below the 20 foot level and had that much farther or possibly more to go. Work has been digging away for 48 hours, day and night, and another 48 will probably pass before the opening is made. Test drilling was discontinued early today after the diamond drill had reached limestone at a depth of 40 feet. Dr. W. B. Funkhouser, University of Kentucky geologist, expressed opinion that the drill had reached the cap rock of the cave.

Homer Collins, during the night, made a forbidden trip into the cave a few hours before he was called to military headquarters. He found the light near the squeeze still burning and after turning off all lights on the outside for a few moments, determined that the entombed man's light still glowed.

A truck load of ammunition and other supplies is enroute to Cave City from Frankfort today despite denial by National Guard officials that ammunition had been ordered. Eight hundred rounds for rifles are reported in the baggage car from Frankfort.

Short Course for Hay Dealers Be Given At State College Feb. 17

Raleigh, Feb. 7.—The members of the United States Army Veterinary Corps, stationed at Fort Bragg, near Fayetteville, will attend the short course for hay dealers which is to be given at State College February 17, 18 and 19, according to an announcement made here today. Orders for the members to attend have been issued by the War Department, it is stated.

The course will be in charge of Professor W. H. Darst, of the Division of Agronomy at State College. It is also stated that more than 20 hay dealers have already notified the authorities of their intention to attend the course and several have announced that they will bring along samples of the hay they have been feeding for the purpose of ascertaining if it is up to the standard required.

BEGINNING OF THE END WORLD FAILS BEGIN AT MIDNIGHT

Seven Day Adventists Wait Patiently Throughout Night for Some Sign of Second Coming of Christ

Patchogue, N. Y., Feb. 7.—The sun rose in the east today just as it has for untold ages and shown upon the rude home of Robert Redd, the "Apostle of Doom," despite his fervid predictions that midnight last night would mark the beginning of the Millennium and the salvation of the "Chosen Few."

Redd and his flock of thirteen followers, who lived through as hectic a night as ever befell their lots, are still confident today that the promised sign of the Second Coming of Christ is still not far off. Just when they would not say, although they declared yesterday that the end of the world would take fully seven days. Hopeful all night, that the sign would come "as a cloud no bigger than your hand," Redd watched the Heavens until well into the morning. When nothing startling happened at midnight in the east he still felt that it might come within the next three or four hours when it would be midnight in Hollywood where dwells Mrs. Margaret Rowen, leader of the cult. His night was full of discord and in sharp contrast to his wishes to pray in preparation of himself and his followers for the end.

Hundreds of curious persons gathered in the neighborhood of his shack, reporters interviewed him and camera men came to take his picture. At one time his chief disciple drove the crowds away under a shower of hot water. At another time the son of his chief disciple attempted to take his father home by force. A scuffle followed and the son was persuaded by police to leave his father alone. This morning Redd was alone. The crowds had dispersed and all that was left was his shack and his faithful little band. Redd has sold his automobile and all his belongings. Neighbors, however, bought the goods and they say they will return them when the present furor has blown over.

Pageant to Be Given In Charlotte During Week of May 20th

Charlotte, Feb. 7.—With the arrival of Dr. George Wood Stevens, who has completed the manuscript for the pageant to be given here four days during the week of May 20 in connection with the sesquicentennial celebration of the signing of the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence, plans for the pageant will go forward rapidly.

The pageant, it is announced, will depict the history and the growth of Charlotte and of Mecklenburg county from the date of the signing of historic declaration. The cast will consist of several hundred people and the pageant will be staged in Independence Park. Hundreds of visitors are expected to be here to witness the performance.

KEYES WILL REQUEST IMMEDIATE ACTION ON MUSCLE SHOALS MEASURE

Washington, Feb. 7.—The conferees' report on the Underwood Muscle Shoals leasing bill was presented formally today to the Senate and House. Chairman Keyes, of the conferees, notified the Senate he would ask for unanimous consent Monday to take up the measure.

KLAN ACTIVITIES IN ASHE MAY LEAD TO OPEN WARFARE

Rumors That Anti-Klan Forces Are Arming Themselves Against Further Masked Activities Are Persistent

Jefferson, Feb. 7.—With legal action threatened against alleged members of the Ku Klux Klan by at least one victim of masked and robed floggers, and reports of anti-klan organizations being secretly formed, tension continued at West Jefferson today although there has been no raid such as characterized several nights last week for three or four days. Several liquor raids and at least three floggings occurred in and around West Jefferson, all performed by masked and robed men, alleged members of the Klan.

Reports that many persons are arming themselves and that further action by the masked men might be followed by bloodshed were persistent. Sheriff Hampton, in a statement, declared there was no need for the Ku Klux Klan in Ashe county, that the law enforcement agencies had not broken down. He asserted he and his men were doing all that was possible to enforce the law and stood ready to serve any warrant issued for any offense whatsoever. He pleaded for support of the citizens as "citizens."

The three men who were flogged had, it was said, committed no crimes, the floggers merely making general charges of misconduct. However, it was said, legal action is planned at once. As many as 200 masked and robed men participated in one of the raids, according to word from West Jefferson. This many one night, it was said, stopped a small coupe by shooting at it and puncturing the gasoline tank. Nothing illegal was found about the car, but it was alleged that liquor was found in the bushes nearby where the car was stopped.

Basketball Team Is Defeated After 159 Consecutive Victories

Pasadena, N. J., Feb. 7.—Just about the end of the world has come for the Pasadena High School basketball team. Weeping and thrusting aside friends who attempted to console them, the members of the "Wonder Team" which had won 159 consecutive victories since March 15, 1919, left the floor at Hackensack last night, defeated 89 to 35.

EXPLOSION AND FIRE CAUSE \$2,000,000 LOSS

TO FILM ESTABLISHMENT
Fort Lee, N. J., Feb. 7.—One man was killed, two persons were seriously injured and 18 were slightly hurt by falling after the explosion of an ammonia tank today in the National Evans Film Laboratories. The explosion which was followed by fire practically destroyed the two story plant which occupied nearly an entire city block. The loss is estimated to be approximately \$2,000,000.

CHINESE WITHDRAW OPIUM CONFERENCE

Delegation Advises the President of Conference it Feels Nothing Will be gained by further Participation

Geneva, Feb. 7.—The Chinese delegation today followed the example set by the Americans yesterday by withdrawing from the International Opium Conference.

The chief of the Chinese delegation, S. Alfred Sze did not appear for today's session and sent his secretary with a letter saying he believed no good purpose could be served by his continued presence in the conference and therefore he felt obliged to cease participation.

M. Zahle, president of the conference, at the opening of the session, read a letter he had sent to Representative Stephen G. Porter in which he assured the head of the American delegation that representatives of all the other countries regretted his departure but hoped that they could find the solution to some of the problems confronting the conference.

SEEK RETURN OF ALIEN PROPERTY

Washington, Feb. 7.—Return of funds and properties held by the Alien Property Custodian would be ordered under a bill introduced today by Chairman Borah of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, who expressed hope for its early enactment in view of the statement that term, had been completed for settlement of American claims.

FORMER CASHIER OF DEFUNCT BANK FOUND NOT GUILTY

Jury Returns Verdict This Morning in Case Against Horace Cooper for Violation of National Banking Laws

Wilmington, Feb. 7.—A verdict of "Not Guilty" was returned in Federal Court here this morning in the case of Horace Cooper, former cashier of the Commercial National Bank of this city. Cooper had been tried on charges of violating the National Banking Laws growing out of the failure of the bank on December 30, 1922.

Court was then adjourned until Monday morning when W. B. Cooper, former chairman of the board of directors, Thomas E. Cooper, former president, and Clyde Lassiter, former customer of the institution go on trial on similar charges.

A report says the jury's first ballot was 11 for and one against acquittal of young Cooper, son of W. B. Cooper, former chairman of the board of directors of the bank. The jury was given the case late yesterday and locked up for the night. The verdict was returned shortly after 10 o'clock this morning.

Dr. Graham Faulkner Dies at Kinston Home

Dr. Thomas Graham Faulkner died at his home in Kinston last night at 7:40 o'clock. Funeral arrangements had not been announced this morning.

The deceased was the eldest son of Dr. and Mrs. Thos. H. Faulkner. He was born in Shelby, June 15, 1886. He was educated at the University College of Medicine, in Richmond, Va., graduating in 1910. On April 7, 1911, while on a fishing party he dived in water which was too shallow and suffered a broken neck which paralyzed his body from the chest down and which he never recovered. He has spent the past fourteen years in a rolling chair always cheerful and always glad to see and welcome his friends. The deceased was well known in Greenville and was beloved by a host of friends, throughout North Carolina and Virginia who will regret to learn of his death.

SECRETARY WEEKS MAKES STATEMENT ON AIRCRAFT ROW

Declares Those Who Disagreed With Mitchell Have Been a Target for Unjust and Supercilious Criticism

Washington, Feb. 7.—Making the first public statement regarding the row that has centered about Brigadier General Mitchell, Assistant Chief of Army Air Service, Secretary Weeks, declared today that those who have disagreed with Mitchell had been the target of "unjust and supercilious criticisms."

Before passing judgement, the secretary said, it would be well for the country to remember that opponent, of the Mitchell air policies include General Pershing and many other figures in the American war army.

"It is incredible," continued Secretary Weeks, "that these officers should wish to take any course relating to the development of air service which would not be for the best interest of the future defense of the United States."

The War Secretary's statement was issued while the House Aircraft Committee was being told by Captain A. W. Johnson, Assistant Chief of Navy Air Service, that some of General Mitchell's sweeping statements to the committee about the result of the joint army and navy maneuvers could not be substantiated by the fact.

In an indirect reference to the general charge that officers were afraid to tell the truth for fear of discipline, Captain Johnson said he asked Secretary Wilbur if there would be any objection to giving the committee certain official correspondence and the secretary had replied, "Tell everything you know."

Secretary Weeks did not touch directly in his statement on the question of General Mitchell's reappointment as Assistant Chief of Army Air Service, which is being held in abeyance while the War Department head examines the general's explanation of his conduct.

The general's assignment to his present post expires next month and unless he is reappointed he will return to the rank of colonel.

Favorable Report On Measure to Combine Prohibition Forces

Washington, Feb. 7.—Favorable report on the Cranston bill, concentrating all prohibition administration under a separate unit in the Treasury Department, was ordered today by the Senate Judiciary Committee.

Interest in Cross Word Puzzle Contest Increasing Rapidly

Fayetteville, Feb. 7.—Interest in the cross-word puzzle contest that is to be held here Monday night between teams of the North Carolina University and Wake Forest College Alumni, is increasing rapidly. Each team is composed of five members. C. M. Walker, attorney and president of the Fayetteville alumni chapter of the University men is captain of one team, and H. C. Blackwell is leader of the Wake Forest five.

The contest, which is believed to be the first of its kind to be held in North Carolina, will be staged before an audience. The puzzle for the contest is being furnished by the Fayetteville Observer and Miss Louise Dixon, of the newspaper staff will be referee and judge.

Indications are that a number of spectators will be here from Rutherford, Dunn, and surrounding towns.

SHORT SESSIONS MARK END OF WEEK FOR LEGISLATURE

Bill Introduced in the House Would Provide for Seven New Judicial Districts and Same Number Judgeships

Raleigh, Feb. 7.—Both branches of the General Assembly held snappy sessions today and adjourned until eight o'clock Monday night.

The Senate with 16 members present sat for less than 15 minutes during which time it received one new bill. The House buzzed along in rapid fire action for nearly 45 minutes during which time 16 new bills found their way to the hopper and 22 measures, all local, passed their final readings.

The House received from the Senate a bill designed to regulate commercial motor traffic and will take it up for final action Monday. Also there was introduced in the House, by Representative R. O. Everett for the Committee on Courts and Judicial Districts, a bill designed to create seven new judicial districts and a corresponding number of number of judgeships. If it passes there will have to be another bill—an enabling act—to redistrict the state.

The question of the constitutionality of passing bills to increase the pay of jurors in the counties came up again this morning when a bill designed to increase the pay of jurors in Rowan county was read for its final vote and brought from Representative Wakefield objection on the ground that it was unconstitutional. The bill was passed over the objection.

A Greensboro delegation introduced a bill authorizing the city of Greensboro to acquire land for a memorial park.

Representative Murphy, of Rowan introduced a bill designed to authorize the State Board of Health to pay its secretary an increased salary. Mr. Murphy, in explaining the bill, stated that it was introduced by request and simply authorized the board to pay a sufficient salary to keep a good man.

The Woman's Missionary Society of the North Carolina conference, M. E. Church, South will hold its thirteenth annual meeting in Greenville on April 20-24, 1925. This meeting will bring to the city some of the leading speakers of the Southern Methodist Church. Many matters of importance affecting the work of this, and other protestant churches as well will be ably discussed. In attendance will be representative women from the Methodist Churches of eastern North Carolina. About three hundred visitors are expected.

The Thursday evening meeting was held in the spacious home of Mrs. Hortense Moya. While the guests were arriving a short musical program was given by Mrs. J. G. Hough, Misses Helene Higgs and Emma Mallison. The business session, was conducted by Mrs. C. M. Early, Gatesville, N. C., the president.

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RADIO REJECTS RUBBISH

Secretary Hoover with his usual perception lays stress on the fact that one of the most important radio developments is not of an apparatus but of an attitude. Broadcasting is developing a discriminating audience.

Its clients are not minded to give their concentrated attention to the mere flotsam and jetsam dumped on the sea of the atmosphere by those who think that any noise will do if it makes a sufficient vibration. The motion pictures had to go through the same winnowing process.

At first the public was victimized by rubbish. It rose up and protested. Every day as Hoover says the radio is striving more closely to fulfill the popular requirement of better service.

So many worthy attractions are now competing for the possession of the ether at convenient hours that by a natural process of survival the dross is eliminated.

ONLY ONE DANGER

That we are entering a new era of prosperity seems to be the consensus of opinion all over our Country.

Confidence in the sanity and solidity of our national administrations, is the foundation for this belief.

The great improvement in the status of ag-

riculture is having a marked influence on all industry.

Over-optimism, however, which often breeds speculation and inflation, should be carefully guarded against.

TEACHING RESPONSIBILITY

School savings bank balances increased from \$11,807,000 to \$20,435,000 during the year ending June 30, says an American Bankers' Association report. The number of savings bank pupils increased 328,475 or almost 17 per cent. In one group of 400 districts the total number of pupils increased 4 per cent, pupil bank participation 8 per cent, collections 23 per cent and bank balances 44 per cent. With the growing sense of responsibility, school honor rolls have grown from less than 30 per cent to more than 33 per cent.

Many an irresponsible man has been cured by giving him something to do. Many a "bad" boy, many a rebellious girl can be started on the safe road by the responsibility of a bank account. No child was ever helped by being robbed of the privilege of property; the two dangerous extremes of society are the submerged few who have been so robbed, and the exotic few who have so much that things have no intrinsic meaning or value. This school bank account idea beats all the languages, dead or alive, for developing character and social stamina. Let's have more of it; not for the riches themselves—we're rich enough, as a nation—but for what it will do in teaching responsibility.

Richard F. Grant, President of the United States Chamber of Commerce, says:

"The function of business is to provide the material necessities of mankind,—it is doing this, and more. Business today is rising to new heights, it has a conscience and a soul. Business today realizes that it must enter into the various community problems and it is helping to solve them. The hospitals, the research laboratories, the various other charities and scientific achievements are promoted and sponsored chiefly by business men. This is the answer to the oft-repeated charge that business is sordid, is not on the level."

HIGGS BROTHERS REPLY TO EDITORIAL

Your editorial in yesterday's paper is misleading and unfair. You mentioned no names, but it is perfectly clear that most of your remarks are directed to us. Let us say that we did not oppose extension of the city limits to take in paying referred to in your editorial. On the contrary, we willingly agreed for the city limits to take in five acres of unimproved land adjacent to the school property, and this includes the paving mentioned. As a matter of fact, until the last few days this paving in question was thought to have been within the town's limits. Conclusive proof of this is the fact that the owners of the property abutting on this paving have been paying city taxes since 1915.

Every dwelling house we own is already in the city limits save the one in the grove used as a farm house. We already have from eight to ten acres of unimproved land under cultivation within the city limits. The new bill if passed, will increase these to about twenty five acres. Is it right to incorporate into the city limits large tracts of land being used exclusively for agricultural purposes? Should extension precede or follow improvements?

COTTON LETTER

New Orleans, Feb. 7.—The undertone of the market was better today owing to better cables than due and the absence of any rain of consequence in Texas, but the weather outlook in Texas is uncertain for over the weekend, which caused a nervous feeling among traders.

Judging from the smaller spot sales at the ten reporting Southern markets yesterday, 21,522 bales against 30,000 Thursday and 36,349 Wednesday, the demand does not seem to be so urgent of late, although some advice from the interior are to effect that the demand continues in excess of offerings.

In the cotton goods market of the North, however, there appears to be more inquiry, larger sales having been made recently, with values somewhat higher, for certain descriptions.

Exports from the United States now 629,000 bales; since August 1 against 3,900,000 to even date last season, promise to continue free. Compared with last year, the stock on shipboard at Galveston today awaiting exportation is 76,000 bales against 50,000; at New Orleans 47,000 vs. 26,000.

Liverpool cables: Some trade calling. London bought distant months. Spot demand very good.

Nothing further has been heard from Manchester as to the developments in connection with the recent recommendation of the Master Spinners Federation to reduce working hours in Lancashire mills using American raw cotton and it is likely nothing will come of the proposal.

Recent Government returns indicate that the world's production of cotton this season will be about as follows, perhaps somewhat larger since Washington allowed only 13,153,000 bales for the United States, whereas 13,498,000 were ginned to Jan. 16, and since the total ginnings for the season are apt to be about 13,900,000. Consumption figures are not government estimates.

World's carry-over, all kinds, Aug. 1, 3,351,000 vs. 6,341,000. World's production estimate 23,990,000 against 18,989,000. Linters U. S. estimate \$160,000 vs. 600,000.
