RADIO EXPERIMENTS INDICATE ENTOMBED MAN IS STILL ALIVE

Experts Declare They Can Hear Collins' Heart Beats; Shaft Being Sunk By Rescuers Will Not Reach Level of Entombed Man Before Thursday

Cave City, Feb. 9.—The electrical tests conducted with voice amplifiers today have convinced H. Thomas Carmichael, in charge of the Floyd Collins rescue work at Sand Cave that Collins is still alive after ten days imprisonment.

H. G. Leane, operating the lighting system which supplies the light to the globe left around Collins' neck, after listening 20 minutes on the wire, said he was satisfied that he had heard Collins' heart beat at the rate of 20 times a minute. The test was made on the wire which had been placed around Collins' chest last week by rescuers. "Many people on the outside would not believe our test proved that Collins is alive," said Leane, adding that a statement would be given out later "proving that Collins was alive."

Sand Cave, Feb. 9.—Work was started today on a narrow fissure discovered some 50 feet from the entrance to Sand Cave when Floyd Collins was entombed. William D. Faulkner, geologist, believes that the fissure may prove to be a back entrance to the chamber of imprisonment. The fissure is too small for a man to enter.

Cave City, Ky., Feb. 9.—The shaft through which rescuers hope to reach Floyd Collins in Sand Cave was approximately thirty feet deep at 9 o'clock this morning, four days after work was started. At the present rate the level where Collins is thought to be will not be reached before Thursday or Friday.

Cave City, Ky., Feb. 9.—Circumstances surrounding the trapping of Floyd Collins in Sand Cave, and the efforts of volunteer workers to reach him will be made the subject of a military court of inquiry, Brigadier General Henry H. Denhardt in command of guard here, announced today. "I hope by this court of inquiry to lay at rest all suspicion and whisperings of efforts to block rescue work, and that Collins' entombment was not genuine," said General Denhardt.

The commander said that plans for the military investigation had been started by the Governor. "It is my purpose to determine exactly why the efforts to rescue Collins through the natural passage-way failed," Denhardt continued. "Whether Collins went into Sand Cave through the regular entrance, and was caught coming out, and whether he knew of any other way out, are matters which will be delved into."

Washington, Feb. 9.—The American Red Cross today assumed the entire expense of providing material needed to rescue Floyd Collins entombed in Sand Cave.

Boiler Stoker to Inherit Fortune if Litigation vs. Church is Successful

Fayetteville, Feb. 8.—Edmond Anderson Edwards, boiler stoker in a local hospital, will inherit approximately \$12,000,000 if the litigation against Trinity Church, New York City, by the Edwards, heirs is successful, the boiler stoker announced here following a visit of Attorney Mansfield of Norfolk, his legal representative in the big suit.

Edwards said Mansfield told him he had definitely established his connection with the Edwards family said to have made a lease to the wealthy New York church on which the Edwards heirs are basing their claims. The local boiler stoker says he will give away his share of the fortune, mostly to hospitals and orphanages, should he ever receive it.

DEATHS RESULT OF COLLISIONS CAUSED BY HEAVY FOG TODAY

Many Persons Injured In Series of New York Smash-Ups Early Today; Shipping Greatly Handicapped

New York, Feb. 9.—Two collisions of elevated trains occurred this morning during one of the worst fogs in years. Harbor traffic from ferry service to big vessels was seriously hampered. Several persons were reported killed and others injured when elevated train collided in the Bronx, several were injured in a Brooklyn elevated collision, and women were trampled when a rear car of one train caught fire.

Ten coal barges with several women and children aboard were reported adrift in upper East River. Police said that two persons known to have been killed in the collision in Bronx were a motorman in charge of one of the trains, and a passenger.

A subway train loaded to its full capacity had come to a stop at 219th street when an elevated train crashed into it from the rear. During the excitement of the crash, a second subway train crashed into the rear of elevated train. In the harbor many liners were kept to their docks or remained anchored off quarantine. Ferry service on all lines was seriously delayed.

LENOIR CO. FARMER COMMITS SUICIDE

Despondency Over Financial Affairs Believed to Have Been the Reason for Rash Act

Kinston, Feb. 9.—Alonza Harris, 50, a prominent farmer residing outside of Kinston, shot and killed himself this morning. The man used a shot gun, and virtually shot away his head. Despondency over financial affairs was thought to be the cause of the suicide. He is survived by a widow and several children.

A few weeks ago a neighbor of Harris', family, named Jackson, shot and killed his wife and then committed suicide. Mr. Harris discovered the bodies and was the first to report the double tragedy.

Washington, Feb. 9.—Action by the Senate Interstate Commerce Committee on the nomination of William Humphrey of Washington to be a member of the Federal Trade Commission and of Thomas F. Woodlock of New York, to be a member of the Interstate Commerce Commission, was postponed today until Wednesday.

Motion to Continue Case Atlanta Wardens Overruled By Court

Atlanta, Ga., Feb. 9.—Motion by the defense to continue the trial of Arthur Sartin and Louis J. Fletcher, former warden and deputy warden of the Atlanta penitentiary, and Lawrence Rhell of Columbus, Ohio, on charges of conspiracy and bribery today were overruled in the United States District Court. In presenting the motion, the defense contended that it had not been given sufficient time to prepare the case.

Seattle, Wash. Feb.—An account of events connected with the first Japanese embassy in the United States in 1890 has been translated into English by Dr. Herbert H. Gowen, professor of Oriental languages in the University of Washington, with the assistance of a Japanese student.

LEGISLATURE FACES BUSIEST WEEK SO FAR DURING THIS SESSION

TRIAL OF OFFICIALS BAILEY BROTHERS ENTERS THIRD WEEK

M. D. Bailey, Former Head of Defunct Tobacco Manufacturing Concern Relates History of Its Growth

Greensboro, Feb. 9.—Eight minutes, after Federal Court convened here for the third week of the trial of 36 officials, and salaried men of the defunct Bailey Bros. Inc., Winston-Salem Tobacco concern charged with misuse of the mail, eight witnesses had given testimony as to the characters of the above, and when four additional witnesses completed their testimony a few minutes later Judge Webb, presiding, ordered a recess, in order that the defense counsel could make ready to present M. D. Bailey, Jr. on the stand.

Mr. Bailey outlined, at the end of the recess, the growth of Bailey Bros. from the small plant, at Statesville, in 1875 until 1920. At this time Bailey Bros., was pushing big tobacco, but found it was easy to dispose of smoking tobacco and this was placed on the market. During the war, he was in the government service as a tobacco inspector, he testified, and trips to tobacco plants during this period convinced him that it was possible to enter the cigarette field.

The growth of the smoking habit among women and the swing over from hand rolled to "tailor-made" cigarettes created a demand for cigarettes that could not be met. A formula was submitted to him that would produce a profit of \$2.00 per thousand on cigarette. This witness had been on the stand little more than half an hour when court recessed for the lunch hour.

Courts and Judicial Districts, Road Bonds, Bus Regulation, Evolution and Inquiry Into State Expenditures to Receive Attention of Legislators

Raleigh, Feb. 9.—A busier week than any thus far in this session is in view for the General Assembly when it reconvenes tonight after the week-end recess.

A number of important matters are scheduled to come up this week for action, in either the House, or Senate, or both. Among the bill on the calendar of both houses is Senator Sam's \$20,000,000 road bond issue measure. The Bus Regulation Bill passed by Senate last week has been sent over to the House for concurrence, and is expected to come up tonight or tomorrow. Some action on the Judicial Districts proposal is likely in the lower branch of the Assembly this week, and it is possible that body may pass its courts and Judicial District Bill providing for redistricting of the State, increasing the number of districts from 20 to 27.

The Wade-Blue State Wide Game Bill, hearing a favorable report of the Game Committees is on the calendar in both Houses, and in the Senate it is set as a special order for tomorrow. Much interest centers over the hearing of the Committee on Education tomorrow afternoon on the measure by Pool, of Hoke, to prohibit the teaching of Darwinism in public schools and institutions of the state. Senator Johnson's Bill to prevent marriage of divorced persons before the elapse of a year after the divorce is on the calendar for action of the Senate tomorrow.

The House of Representatives will have before it the joint resolution calling for an investigation into the cost of government. Specifically the measure calls for the State Auditor to furnish the legislature with the pay rolls of various departments and in situations, and cost of automobiles bought and operated by each department.

Fire Losses in State Totaled \$5,320,293 During Last Year

Raleigh, Feb. 8.—Fire caused total losses in North Carolina last year of \$5,320,293, according to a statement issued by the State Insurance Department tonight. This amount represents a decrease in losses over 1923 of nearly two million dollars and a decrease over 1922 of over two and three-quarters million dollars.

Full details are given in the Department's statement, which follows: "A comprehensive review of the fire wastes of the state for last year, with comparative data of other years, has been compiled by the State Insurance Department in the form of seven statistical tabulations, containing a mass of information, and detailed data, embracing many angles of the fire problem.

"Table No. 1 shows a total property loss of \$5,320,293, with property at risk of \$41,065,779, insurance involved \$25,001,268. The decrease in fire losses from 1923 is shown as \$1,836,044 and from 1922 as \$2,768,423. A companion table, No. 2, segregates rural and suburban fires, thereby enabling an estimate of the actual cash value of fire representative and protective facilities of the towns and cities. The totals—305 rural fires with losses of \$1,148,834 and property at risk of \$1,945,508 and insurance of \$926,426, as compared with about \$4,000,000 loss in the cities and towns, on endangered property valued at \$41,000,000—plainly point to the saving and investment value of fire protective and preventative measures.

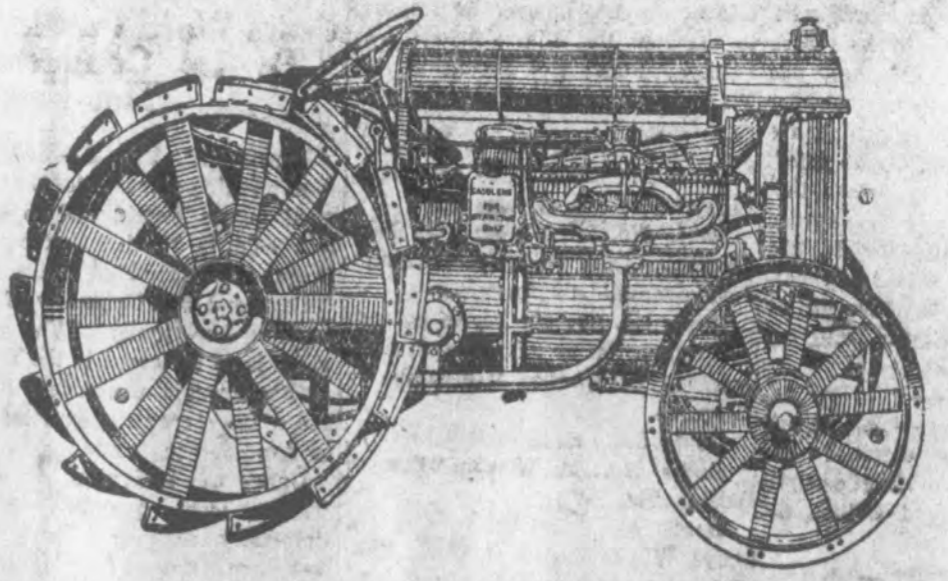

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EXPANSION SHOULD CONTINUE

In our criticism of the protest raised against the proposed extension of the city limits with which Higgs Brothers, owners of a portion of the property involved, took issue and to which they replied in Saturday's issue of this paper with the assertion that our criticism was unfair and misleading, it was not our intention to start a controversy with any individual or group of individuals but as always to exert our right to voice just criticism when same is believed to be to the best interest of the community.

The proposed extension of city limits as outlined would bring into the city approximately 40 blocks of property while the contention has arisen over portions of the property aggregating less than 25 per cent of the total.

As expressed in their article Saturday, Messrs Higgs Brothers have agreed that certain portions of their property be brought into the city but the plan as outlined by them would bring the city line up to the west side of the new city school while the city's plan would extend the line to take in property one block beyond the new school now under construction.

We understand from the mayor of the city that when the site for the school was being chosen the town's plan was outlined to Messrs Higgs Brothers and that they signified their willingness to such extension of the limits in case the school was built on the proposed site. In view of these circumstances we see no reason now why the city limits should not be extended to take in the property as originally outlined.

Our experience in the case of the Teachers

College and the increased values of property in its vicinity shows that the presence of the College enhances the value of the property as residential sites and the same is true of the property adjacent to the city school now being erected. The increase in the value of the property together with the advantages offered by the city more than offsets the increased taxes brought about by placing the property on the city books.

We reiterate that it was not our intention to make an attack upon Messrs Higgs Brothers as individuals, when we used their case as an example of the opposition raised against extension of the city limits. In general what we have said in their case applies to every piece of property which has become a bone of contention in the present controversy. When city advantages increase the value of outlying property to that of the property within the corporate limits and the former can enjoy all the advantages offered by the city it should be made a part of the city and no individual or group of individuals, less than a majority, should be allowed to hinder the progress of the city.

CAN TAXES BE MADE MORE UNIFORM?

Florida promises, by vote of the people, never, never to tax incomes or inheritages. Thus a cordial welcome is extended to rich folk to move in and make themselves at home. Meanwhile Wisconsin and other western states bear more and more heavily upon wealth, both productive and non-productive. And many states levy mean and harassing inheritance taxes even upon the poor, some of them on legacy as low as a few hundred dollars. The federal estate tax, no doubt now a permanent part of our fiscal system, is the same no matter where you live. But in relation to the various state taxes, and the duplication and pyramiding of state taxes, make chaos.

Seven years ago a conference of forty-four states recommended that the Federal Government and the states get together on this matter of revenue laws. President Coolidge said in a message last spring:

"I believe also it would be advisable to call a conference of the taxing authorities of the states and the Treasury, before the next session of Congress, to give consideration to some comprehensive plan of division in this field of taxation between the various states and the Federal Government, and the elimination of overlapping and unfair taxes."

In the present stir over publicity of tax returns, and the demand for further reduction of federal taxes, we must not forget this important job of untangling the crossed wires.


