DIGGERS ARE NEARING LEVEL WHERE FLOYD COLLINS IS IMPRISONED

Another Amplifier Experiment Leads to Belief Collins is Still Alive; Court of Inquiry Now in Session

Cave City, Ky., Feb. 10.—Another amplifier test today, convinced experimenters, that Floyd Collins still breathes in his prison. His respiration is 14 or 15 times a minute, it was indicated.

Cave City, Ky., Feb. 10.—A depth estimated at more than 38 feet had been reached in the shaft at Sand Cave at 11:00 o'clock today. Rescuers are continuing their efforts to reach the cave prison, but spectators had largely moved to Cave City where the preliminary session of the Military Court of Inquiry is being conducted.

Cave City, Feb. 10.—The heroes of the Collins rescue, the volunteers who are driving the shaft toward his underground prison, early today were more than 38 feet down, after five days of ceaseless labor. Work is progressing slightly faster, as much of the material to be moved was heavy rock slab. The bottom of the six foot wide shaft is now saturated with seeping water, but more boulders are being encountered now, preventing the diggers from going very deep. Sometime tomorrow official, expect to strike the "limp rock," strata and then they hope for better progress with their work as little timbering will be necessary.

Cave City, Feb. 10.—The Military court of inquiry investigating circumstances surrounding the imprisonment of Floyd Collins in Sand Cave, adjourned at noon until 3:00 p. m., after hearing two witnesses, William B. Miller, reporter for the Louisville Courier-Journal, and G. B. Blackburn, a farmer near here.

The testimony was to the effect that rumors of whether Collins was still in the cave were false, and that threats of danger to the reporter in his cave rescue efforts, were delivered by friends and not enemies, seeking to warn him of the hazardous undertaking, in which he was engaged.

Plan Mapped for Employment Service to Farmers E. Car.

Raleigh, N. C., Feb. 6.—A plan to extend the employment service of the Federal and State employment service to the farmers of Eastern North Carolina during the crop-harvesting season, is being mapped out by Frank D. Grist, Commissioner of Labor and Printing, according to an announcement made here today. The commissioner has sent out letters to the various Chambers of Commerce in Eastern North Carolina, asking that they lend their assistance in the matter and make known the needs for labor in their respective communities.

According to the present plans it is the purpose to place a number of well-trained employment agents in the eastern section and through these agents find out where labor is needed and place applicants accordingly. "In the strawberry, dewberry, bean, peach and potato belts," said Mr. Grist, "there is usually a shortage of labor at harvesting time. If we can place surplus labor in these communities at the right time not only will employment be furnished for those out of work, but it will mean a saving of several thousand dollars to the farmers. The Department of Labor is anxious to help these farmers if possible, and we will do everything in our power to extend the service of this department."

In his letter to the secretaries of the various Chambers of Commerce in the Eastern section of the state, Mr. Grist says:

"What I have in mind is something like this: Placing an experienced employment agent to cooperate with the different Chambers of Commerce and county demonstration agents in placing labor equally throughout the trucking belt, trying to even things up so there will not be a shortage at one point and a surplus at another. And I also have in mind the possibility of bringing into Eastern North Carolina some high school boys and college students during vacation period, if attention of irrigation engineers from will be of assistance to the industry, many foreign countries.

STUDENT ARRESTED IN POISONING CASE

University of Ohio Student Being Held in Connection With the Death of Two Students

Columbus, Ohio, Feb. 10.—Lewis Fish, Canton, Ohio, who was arrested last night, told authorities that were investigating the death of two Ohio State University students, and the serious illness of several others caused by poison from capsules, of strychnine, that he had filled the prescription of David Puskin, at the University's laboratory. Puskin died from strychnine poisoning.

Fish, who had been questioned by authorities at the opening of the investigation, without divulging any information, declared that he had held back because he did not want "notoriety" in connection with the case. Fish, a friend of Puskin's, said Puskin came to him complaining of a cold and that he volunteered to go to the college dispensary and get some medicine, and when refused admission by attendants in charge, he went to another door and got the capsule capsules and gave them to Puskin. The capsules were originally to cost only 20 cents.

WASHINGTON MAN COMMITS SUICIDE THIS AFTERNOON

Edward T. Knott, Prominent Tobacconist, Takes Own Life by Shooting Self Through Head

Washington, Feb. 10.—Edward T. Knott, prominent business man of this city, committed suicide here this afternoon by shooting himself through the head. The act was committed in a bedroom of his home and death followed only a few minutes after the shot was fired. No cause was given for his act but friends stated that he had been in poor health for the past several weeks.

Mr. Knott, a native of Greenville county, has been a resident of Washington for a number of years. In 1919 he was married to Miss Marshall Meyers of this city.

He was proprietor of Knott's Warehouse and a member of the local Rotary Club and other civic organizations.

URGE REMOVAL OF A. S. KEISTER FROM FACULTY OF G. C. W.

Professor's Assertion That Bible is "Israelitish Mythology" Brings Forth Sharp Denunciation

Charlotte, Feb. 10.—The Laurinburg Parent-Teacher Association in a letter to the body of trustees of the North Carolina College for Women has urged that the connection with Professor Arthur S. Keister with the college be severed, saying a special dispatch published in the Charlotte Observer.

The letter states that action in the question was taken "by unanimous vote" in view of alleged public statements quoting Professor Keister as having stated in a recent talk at Charlotte that the Book of Genesis was nearly an Israelitish Book, and that this "Contradicted the Biblical assertions that God wrote the ten commandment, on a slab of stone, and that miracles of the New Testament were not to be taken literally." The letter charges that by such statements Professor Keister assailed the book that is the basis of the religious faith of the people of North Carolina and ask that, while the State Institutions are not required to teach religion, at the same time the citizens of the state have a right to require that the teachers in these institutions do not attack that "which forms the basis of their religion. The Bible." It then expresses the conviction that the large majority of tax payers "view with alarm and keen displeasure the employment of a teacher at North Carolina College for Women that which they hold most sacred."

Greensboro, Feb. 10.—Professor A. S. Keister of the faculty of North Carolina College for Women when informed this morning of the action taken by the Laurinburg Parent-Teachers Association with regard to certain utterances alleged to have been made by him in a speech at Charlotte, declared that he felt it would be futile to attempt to clarify the situation by any formal statement on his part. Mr. Keister declared however, that reports circulated since the talk was made, had given a very distorted view of the matter, and that he felt that any steps to correct them at this time would lead to greater confusion.

Latvia Invites Bootleggers

Riga, Latvia, Feb.—The anti-alcohol wave is sweeping over Latvia. A law has been passed which is tantamount to prohibition, and it has been seized upon by the city authorities of Riga to descend upon some 50 hotels and restaurants on the grounds that they were selling liquor. The city fathers are now considering whether these places should not be made to close down for good.

Electric Heat for Floyd Collins



A miniature electric light plant was established in the woods near Sand Cave, Cave City, Ky., where Floyd Collins was imprisoned so many days. It supplied heat and electric light to the imprisoned man and was connected to the extremely sensitive radio apparatus that was put into use to obtain the faintest of signals from the trapped man.

FINES AND ROAD SENTENCES RULE MONDAY'S COURT

WITNESSES STATE SOFT JOBS SOLD IN ATLANTA PRISON

Declare Former Deputy Warden Was to Receive \$15,000 for Taking Care of Prohibition Violator

Atlanta, Ga., Feb. 10.—Samuel Rothberg, Atlanta, Ga., business man testified today in the trial of A. E. Sartain and Louis J. Fletcher, former officials of the Atlanta penitentiary, that he told Fletcher early in 1924 that if he would "take care" of Fred Haar, Sr., Savannah, Ga., convicted of violation of the prohibition law, that he would be given \$15,000. Fletcher and Sartain are charged with conspiracy and bribery in connection with the sale of "soft jobs" at the Atlanta Federal Penitentiary.

As a result of conference with Mr. and Mrs. Marshall McKenzie, formerly of Atlanta, but now of Savannah, Rothberg said that he first told Fletcher, deputy warden, that he was sure that Willie Haar, the elder Haar's son, would appreciate any courtesy that was shown his father. This conversation occurred in December 1923.

Later, Rothberg said he again saw Fletcher and said if he would take care of the elder Haar Willie Haar would see to it that the deputy warden would be cared for in the sum of \$15,000. "What did Fletcher say," asked the judge. "He said that would be alright."

In March 1924, Rothberg made another visit to the prison, and told Fletcher that Willie Haar was in town. "Fletcher then told me not to take any money, that it was all off," he said.

WIFE BEHEADER IS SENTENCED FOR LIFE

Warren Lincoln Confessed to Slaying of Wife and Her Brother and Burning Bodies

Geneva, Ill., Feb. 10.—Warren J. Lincoln, former florist, was sentenced to life imprisonment by a jury which found him guilty of murdering his wife, and also her brother Byron Shoup.

In confessing his guilt, Lincoln told that he killed them, then burned their heads in a concrete block. Lincoln's attorneys accepted the verdict.

GARMENTS WORN 140 YEARS AGO BY SIR WALTER STOTT

Seattle Wash., Feb.—A hand tailored broad-cloth coat and vest worn 140 years ago by Sir Walter Scott, almost identical in line with those worn today on formal occasions, was exhibited in a tailors' show here recently.

A daughter of Sir Walter gave the coat to an English friend of his and it came down from generation to generation. Every stitch in the garment was done by hand. The broad lapels are properly notched, and cut square in front.

Claw-hammer tails reached to the bend in the knee. The waistcoat was of broad purple silk with small, round, colorful buttons.

Both Branches Assembly Hold Record Sitings Today; Increase in Number of Judicial Districts Brings Forth Unprecedented Debate

Raleigh, Feb. 10.—Following a 3 hour debate unprecedented in the 1925 session of the General Assembly, the House this afternoon defeated the bill which would have provided for redistricting the state, and adding seven judges and a like number of solicitors to the judicial forces of the state. The vote was 58 to 48.

Prior to defeat of that measure, an amendment by Representative Wakefield, which would have cut the number of new districts to four instead of seven, was defeated 84 to 21.

The House then adjourned until eight o'clock tonight, when the Bus Control Measure will be considered. The Senate previously had adjourned until tomorrow, after passing on the second reading the Johnson amendment to the divorce law.

Raleigh, Feb. 10.—The House this morning plunged into consideration of the bill to increase the number of judicial districts of the state from 20 to 27, which was carried over from last night's session on the unfinished business calendar. Meanwhile the Senate, following the introduction of a half dozen measures, some of State wide importance began a discussion of the Johnson Divorce Bill, requiring one year of separation after divorce is obtained before remarriage. At one o'clock both Houses had set a record for this session for continuous sittings, both being still in session with debate of a kind which had been absent.

In the Senate, without any discussion, the repeal of the law which forbids white nurses to attend negro patients was passed on its third reading. The Wade-Blue State Wide Game Bill came up as a special order for this morning's session with a favorable report from the Game Committee. However, attention was directed to the fact that the measure would carry an appropriation and the rule was passed early in session requiring all measures of the appropriation to be considered by the Appropriation Committee, the measure was re-referred to that committee.

Senator Harris, of Wake, brought forward the measure introduced in the House last night to create a state wide constabulary force. While Senator McQueen introduced a measure to require the vaccination of all dogs against rabies. The Fish Commission measure to set a new scale of licenses for fishermen, was put forward as a special order of business for tomorrow. The body then plunged into discussion of the Johnson Divorce Bill requiring one year period of separation after divorces before remarriage. Senators favoring the measure declared that it would eliminate to a large extent, divorces being obtained in order that men might marry other women immediately after obtaining divorces. A number of Senators spoke on the measure.

In the House the fight in favor of increasing Judicial Districts from 20 to 27 was led by Representative Everett, of Durham, and Representatives Ward, of Craven, Fountain, of Edgecombe; Smith, of Rockingham; Townsend, of Harnett; Womble, of Forsyth; Neal, of Caswell; Patton, of Durham; Bailey, of Onslow; and Connor, of Wilson, argued in favor of the measure. The fight against increase of Judicial Districts was opened by Representative Erwin, who declared in favor of judicial reform rather than an increase in Judicial Districts. The Senate, after a discussion which lasted nearly two hours finally passed the Johnson Divorce Bill on its second reading.

Say Naval Officers Permitted to Talk

Washington, Feb. 10.—Taking a hand in the Air Craft controversy, the House Naval Committee today unanimously adopted a resolution declaring so far as its members now knew, no naval officer had appeared before it under any restraint whatever from the Naval Department.

The recent address of Professor Keister, of Greensboro College for Women, before a group of teachers in which he contradicted portions of the Bible and proclaimed the Book of Genesis an "Israelitish Mythology" has caused much discussion throughout the state and has brought forth severe criticism and denunciation from educational as well as religious circles the latest developing, being the action of the Laurinburg Parent Teachers Association in requesting Professor Keister's removal from the college. "While the people of the state do not require the teaching of religion in the schools," the Association declares, they will not stand for the schools to teach contradiction to the Book which is the basis of our life and religion.

An article to the Charlotte Observer by Mr. Al Fairbrother, of Greensboro, attacking the address of Professor Keister, and criticising the employment of such "High-Brows" by our institutions, in part says:

"I refer to my article concerning a high-browed professor who boldly asserted before a class of teachers in Charlotte that the Bible was nothing but Israelitish mythology. I did not undertake to comment on any so-called 'scientific facts' or 'physiological phenomena' cheap theories supported by high-brows who 'see things' and proclaim them with the swagger of a fish-woman or a Falstaff. I made it plain that I did not undertake to even assume what the best of all the world has always believed, that the Bible was divine—because argument on any subject where no positive proof can be ascertained is futile. In establishing any great truth premises must be considered and deductions cannot be guess work. I am satisfied that the Holy Bible is all that countless millions—dead and living—have believed it. That, however, is neither here nor there.

"What I wrote about was the fact that in North Carolina the taxpayers were being held up by State institutions, or, at least one, the North Carolina College for Women, located at Greensboro, to furnish at least the scenery, the background and the recommend-

ation for a man who was imported from a Western city to teach that the faith of our fathers was a joke and that the Grand Old Book that reached a sale last year of 30,000,000 copies was Israelitish mythology.

"That's where I came in. I cannot understand why the people of North Carolina, taxing themselves indirectly to build churches; to employ ministers; to do missionary work; to spread the Gospel of Jesus Christ should allow themselves to be directly taxed to pay professors and support institutions of learning that give the horse laugh and the lie to all that ministers have proclaimed and their votaries believed.

"But I get a letter from a gentleman who wants to throw a monkey-wrench, and he asks me, pointedly: 'Are you opposed to free speech?'

"Let me answer no, although it would appear that some of the dismayed and retreating armies of Israel are, judged by the way they hold their tongues just now. Free speech and free press. All of it and more of it—but let me, through your paper suggest to the gentleman that I am opposed to paying for speech that doesn't interest me. That is just the point. If the Chicago professor wants to come here and give the people the high sign in a public hall, at his expense and not attach himself to the payroll of a college that is supported by the taxpayers, well and good. But what I can't understand is why the people tax themselves to build churches and then in turn tax themselves to tear them down. Why build churches with one hand and with the other discredit them? Why allow these ghouls and vandals to come at the taxpayers' expense and destroy the Hope and Faith of Life?

"Go into millions of homes where the Family Bible occupies honorable position on the center table in the parlor of the old house, and pick up that treasured volume and see where mothers, long since in glory, with trembling hands and tear-dimmed eyes underscored the promises of eternal life; sought and found consolation and compensation for their toils and their struggles, recompensed nowhere else and rewarded only beyond the grave—put the picture before you of a high-brow monkey but recently evolved casting that Hope and that Faith aside, and leaving the helpless victim of his vandalism in the back cave of eternal night. No hope. No staff upon which to lean. No Rock of Ages cleft for them. Nothing but blackness and despair. Taking it all and giving nothing. Robbing the cripple of his crutches and the mother of her love!

High-browed and high-priced business this! Missionaries sent among the heathen to show them the goodness of God and the teachings of Christ—and missionaries imported from Chicago to tell them that it is all a lie. And the taxpayers who build the churches and support the ministers, plucked for this sportive pastime!

"And these be thy gods—O Israel!"

Hand Book Department Agriculture Is Praised By W.M. Librarian

Raleigh, Feb. 4.—Commissioner

of Agriculture William A. Graham has received from E. G. Librarian at William and Mary College, a letter in which the writer refers in glowing terms, of praise to the Department of Agriculture's hand book, "North Carolina, The Land of Opportunity." This book was prepared and the first issue, gotten out during the life time of Major Graham.

Referring to the North Carolina hand book, Librarian Swem wrote: "Allow me to thank you very much for this book. I have written to

WEATHER.

Temperatures cooler over belt. Light rainfall scattered east belt. Forecast—Entire belt mostly part cloudy except West Texas generally fair. Belt colder.

Stocks. Hornblower—Irrrespective of a trading reaction wherever reaction takes place it is likely to prove the last opportunity to acquire stock prior to a strong advance running into the spring months. Continue to buy rails, stock of all descriptions.

Block Maloney.—Under the circumstances various issues are likely to work higher soon.

Cotton—Hubbard.—The liquidation of the march position continues and while it does not bring about any decline it very naturally tends to check advances for the time being. Orvis—Bulls have been very much encouraged by Monday's market showing and feel that the downturn is but an incidental fluctuation. We expect a trading market with an upward trend probable.

Munds.—We regard this fundamental as sound, and favor taking advantage of recessions to make purchases.

GRAIN

In speaking of wheat prices, Dr. Duvel says it is difficult to justify daily market fluctuations such as have been witnessed of late with the law of supply and demand for real wheat. By way of illustration on February 5, May wheat at Chicago moved thru a range of 93-4 cents with a net decline of six cents from the previous close; at Kansas City the range was 91-4 cents with a net loss of 61-2 cents; at Minneapolis a range of 101-2 cents with a net loss of 63-4; at Winnipeg a range of 12c with a net loss of 9c from previous close.

The trade was so enormous that we have not been able as yet to determine the cause. Nevertheless the fact remains that a multitude of small holdings by individuals who entered the market at the twelfth hour, must have gone overboard and some at a considerable loss. As viewed from the standpoint of the basic principles underlying transactions in grain futures, wide daily fluctuations such as there are of no little concern, unless they can be justified as in keeping with the law of supply and demand, which should govern at all times.

They must be classed as ultimately unwarranted and it will become necessary to find some means of preventing them. Such remedial measures as may be necessary, however, should come from within the grain exchanges, rather than from without, and they

might profit well by giving the matter serious consideration. The New York cotton Exchange has long since taken steps along these lines by a limitation of 200 points in price movements during any single day's trading; a similar rule likewise

applies to cotton trading at New Orleans and Chicago. If reports are reliable this rule has served its purpose well and is worth considering from a grain standpoint.
