Rescuers Hope Reach Collins By Tomorrow

Three Feet of Earth Now Separate Diggers From Limestone Roof of Tunnel Believed to Lead to Imprisoned Cave Explorer

Cave City, Feb. 14.—The roof of an avenue expected to lead to the natural rock trap where Floyd Collins has been imprisoned for 15 days was only three feet from the diggers in the rescue shaft, according to an official bulletin issued here today.

M. S. Posey, executive secretary of the state highway department, who was sent here by Governor Fields, wired the governor at Frankfort, saying that he had fixed 8 o'clock Sunday night as the zero hour, unless unexpected difficulties were encountered. It had taken nine and one half hours to complete a three foot section last night, the bulletin said. The rotten character of material encountered, and four cave-ins, made progress slower than the record.

"Three feet immediately below the earth still to be removed, is a layer of limestone which was believed to be three feet thick," said Henry T. Carmichael, in charge of operation. "Once we have penetrated this roof we expect to find a passage through which we can reach Collins," he said.

Cave City, Feb. 14.—Digging will continue until three o'clock this afternoon, when a new section of timbering will be lowered into place, one of the diggers, said at noon today. This will take until about 8 o'clock tonight, and "when the digging is resumed, we may cut into Sand Cave any minute," he said.

Cave City, Ky., Feb. 14.—Men in the natural passage to the cave, talked to men in the rescue shaft being sunk toward Floyd Collins, entombed cave explorer, while making soundings at 11 o'clock this morning.

"Henry T. Carmichael and Albert Marshall, a minor, went to the bottom of the shaft and held distinct conversation with Ed. Brenner, and two other men, who were in the passage as far as the cave-in," said an official statement. "It is estimated that we will reach Collins in approximately 20 hours, providing no other difficulties occur. We still have six more feet before we reach the original limestone top, believed to be the roof of the cavern leading to Collins."

The shaft, according to Mr. Carmichael, will tap Sand Cave between Collins and the point where the cave-in occurred in the natural passageway last week. The distance between the cavern and Collins was estimated at 20 feet. The penetration of Sand Cave will be in front of Collins. Previously it had been believed that it would be behind Collins.

Cave City, Ky., Feb. 14.—Only a few feet of earth early today separated the Sand Cave rescue party from the cavern that they believe will lead to Floyd Collins, imprisoned in Sand Cave for two weeks, by a huge boulder on his foot. The shaft was more than 55 feet down, and at 60 feet the diamond core drill had indicated a cavern approximately 9 feet high, although the depth at the shaft is very small, due to the accumulation of mud and sand.

Collins is still alive, members of the State Military Board in charge of the situation declared late yesterday. Five of the miners, in the rescue squad stated that they heard coughs or groans from him, come through the crevice located yesterday morning in the shaft well, while two men heard them from the upper side of the cave in the sand hole.

"Before hearing this testimony," Gen. Denhardt, in charge of operation, said "some members of the board said they had felt resigned to the fact that Collins was dead." There had been no airing of those opinions for fear that they might exert an adverse influence on the morale of the rescue workers.

"Now the members are optimistic that rescue will be effected, and the prisoner will be brought out alive."

BANDITS ESCAPE WITH PAYROLL OF CHARLOTTE MILL

Bookkeeper Knocked Unconscious and the Bandits Escape With Payroll in His Auto- mobile

Charlotte, Feb. 14.—Edward C. Whittant, 40, bookkeeper for the Atherton Cotton Mills here, was knocked unconscious by two bandits today, and the week's payroll of the mill taken. The bandits escaped with \$809.40, it was said.

The robbers, according to Whittant, who was taken to a hospital, but is not seriously hurt, jumped on to the running board of his automobile as he was stopping at the mill entrance. The men then escaped in Whittant's automobile, but soon abandoned it, and took the road. Officers said that they believed they had the men surrounded this afternoon in the woods at Sharon, several miles from this city.

Forestry Demonstration Held Mebane Recently

Mebane, Feb. 14.—One of the largest forestry demonstrations ever staged in the State was held here recently by County Agent W. Kerr Scott. Seventy-five people, representing ten different townships in the county, attended the demonstration, it is said.

Charles C. Cates, known as the Alamance pickman, has, for several years, been carefully thinning his pine and hardwood forests. These thinned areas, were shown the visitors, after which a half acre of thirty-five year old pines was selected for a demonstration. The visitors were divided into four crews, one at each corner of the property. Extension Forester H. M. Curran, selected and marked the tree, for cutting. Within an hour the marked trees were on the ground and cut into firewood lengths. The tops were cut to lie flat, and in place of a thicket, an orderly grove of tall straight pines was left on the area. Two hundred trees were left for the future crop, and between six and eight cords of wood were removed in the thinning. Two more thinnings will be necessary before this timber is matured, it is stated.

Among those attending the demonstration was the veteran Alamance county agricultural educator, R. W. Scott, father of the county agent, two truck loads of farm life school boys. District Agent O. F. McCrary, of State College Extension Service, was also present.

The last official word of the situation at the bottom of the shaft was that it was 52 feet deep and three feet more was about to be timbered. The material encountered now is feet.

PARKS NOMINATED GOVERNOR OF ALASKA

Washington, Feb. 14.—Geo. Alexander Parks was nominated today by President Coolidge to be governor of Alaska. Mr. Parks, who has been in Alaska for several years, will succeed Scott C. Bone, whose term of office as governor will expire in a few months.

EDWARD TYNDALL INJURED BY AUTO

Loses Hold While Standing on Running Board; Car Over His Body

Edward Tyndall, 19, was painfully injured yesterday afternoon when he fell under a Coupe at Five Points. According to witness the young man jumped on the running board of the car while at a standstill, and lost his hold when the car started, the car passing over his body.

The young man was carried to the Pitt Community hospital where it was ascertained that he had received injuries about the head and shoulders.

According to a report from the hospital today he is getting along as well as can be expected.

MEEKER WON'T WASTE HIS TIME

Tacoma, Wash., Feb. 14.—A 95-year-old man has no time to waste in the opinion of Ezra Meeker, trail blazer, who in the early days crossed the plains in a covered wagon and recently went over the same route in an airplane.

Mr. Meeker visited a newspaper office here recently and inquired for a friend. He was asked to wait for him half an hour.

"Good gracious," answered Meeker, "I'm 95 years old and I have no half hours to spare."

German Colleges Report Big Decrease In Registration

Leipsic, Feb. 14.—Educational statistics for German universities covering a period of ten years show an increase of women students; a falling off in total enrollments, and a neglect of the ministry.

The women today are about twice as numerous as they were in 1914; 7,467 as against 4,956. After the war a large number of young people rushed blindly to the schools, many of them untrained for university work; these have now departed, and attendance is becoming normal. Medical and theological schools report great declines the attendance today being less than half what it was ten years ago.

JARDINE SELECTED BY PRESIDENT AS NEW SECRETARY AGRICULTURE

Washington, Feb. 14.—William M. Jardine, president of the Agricultural College, of Kansas, was selected today by Pres. Coolidge to be secretary of agriculture. He is to take office upon retirement of Secretary Gore, who on March 4th becomes governor of West Virginia.

Along with Mr. Jardine's nomination, the President today sent the Senate the nomination of Frank B. Kellogg, of Minnesota, now in London, to be Secretary of State, after Secretary Hughes leaves, the cabinet on March 4th.

300 AUTOMOBILES DESTROYED BY FIRE LATE LAST NIGHT

Fire Sweeps Buildings Housing Kansas City Auto Show With An Estimated Loss of More Than \$2,000,000

Kansas City, Mo., Feb. 14.—Motordom's newest offerings for 1925 were reduced to a mass of twisted and charred wreckage early today in a fire that ended the Kansas City Motor Show, by destruction of the American Live Stock Pavilion. Three hundred pleasure cars, approximately 75 motor trucks, two airships, and all of the accessories were destroyed with a value of \$1,500,000. The building was valued at \$650,000 and was completely devastated.

Capt. John J. Crump, 65, Kansas City's oldest fireman, and the head of the only remaining horsedrawn company in the department, was burned to death. He was caught between the main building and an annex while attempting to work a hose.

Most of the cars on display had been shown at this year's New York, Cleveland and Chicago, motor shows and were intended for San Francisco's motor show after display had ended here tonight.

The fire, the 713th one of the year here, broke out in the last few minutes of Friday the 13th, one hour after the show closed for the night. It originated in the annex among some flimsy decorations, and is believed to have been due to defective wiring, and quickly spread to the main building.

Fine Arts Department Woman's Club Holds Interesting Meeting

The Fine Arts Department of the Woman's Club held an interesting meeting on Thursday afternoon at the High School.

The last week in January being MacDowell Memorial week, the meeting was held in connection with the event. The program was featured by a paper by Mrs. T. E. Hooker, "Music Appreciation" and a paper on the "Life and works of MacDowell" by Mrs. J. L. Fleming.

Edward Alexander MacDowell was born in New York 1861 and was the greatest musical genius which America has produced. He was a master of short, expressive themes. He became prominent as a concert performer, and the Boston Symphony Orchestra featured his orchestral productions. In 1904 he became professor of music at Columbia University, but lost his mind through overwork. In his memory, a colony of creative artist, has been established at MacDowell's farm to which artists are invited for work each summer. MacDowell died in 1908.

Miss Elizabeth Andrews delighted those present with a piano solo. MacDowell's "To a Water Lily."

Several records which will be played in the Music Memory Contest, were played and these proved most enjoyable.

The papers by Mesdames Hooker and Fleming were very instructive and well presented. The life of MacDowell makes an interesting study.

The method of dividing the day into twenty-four equal parts was first used by the ancient Egyptians.

NINE OF ESCAPED CONVICTS RETAKEN

Officers Are Continuing Search for Other Ten of Prisoners Who Escaped From State Farm

Raleigh, Feb. 14.—Nine of the 19 prisoners, who escaped from Caldonia Prison Farm Wednesday night, had been recaptured at noon today, according to George Ross Pou, superintendent of the state prison. Mr. Pou stated that an additional posse was on the track of another prisoner just outside of Scotland Neck, and they expected momentary recapture.

Co-Op Truck Growers Have Joined Nation- Wide Organization

Wilmington, Feb. 14.—The Wilmington Co-operative Truck Growers Association, which comprises a large percentage of the local truck growers, has aligned itself with a nation-wide co-operative organization, it is announced. At a recent meeting in Wrightsboro the board of directors authorized the formal signing of a marketing agreement with the Federated Fruit and Vegetable Growers, the contract becoming effective immediately.

The contract, it is said, calls for the distribution and sale by the Federated, of all produce raised by the members of the local organization and turned over to it. They will act as exclusive agents of the growers.

Roy Parker Adopts Bob Cat "Pets"

New Bern, Feb. 14.—Roy Parker, well known Craven county farmer residing on the Neuse road, has adopted as pets a pair of full grown bob cats. The wild beasts are not as gentle as the domestic or "Lap" variety, but Mr. Parker states that he has hope that they will eventually become quite friendly. He has had them about three weeks and is now having a large cage built in which to display his "pets."

GOVERNMENT STILL CONTINUES PROBE OF PRISON BRIBERY

Witness Declares He Could Find No Evi- dence of Former Of- ficials Having Received Any Bribes

Atlanta, Ga., Feb. 14.—Joseph F. Fishburn, formerly of the Department of Justice, today testified in the trial of Arthur E. Sartain and Louis J. Fletcher, former warden and deputy warden of the Atlanta Federal Penitentiary, and Lawrence Riehl, of Columbus, Ohio, that Father Thomas P. Hayden, prison Chaplain, told him in January 1925 that neither Sartain or Fletcher had ever received any bribe money.

The defendants, who are charged with conspiracy and bribery, had called Fishburn to the stand. Fishburn said that he had been employed by the Department of Justice during the Wilson Administration.

New Ambassador Says Prohibition in Mexico Would Not Be Effective

San Antonio, Tex., Feb. 13.—Manuel Tellez, New Mexican Ambassador to the United States, on his way to Washington, stated here last night that prohibition would not be successful in Mexico, where the national drink is obtained from plants that each Mexican grows in his own back yard.

Prohibition in Mexico, "Would be like putting on the break of a speeding car, and is full of danger," he said. Pulque, the Universal drink of the Mexican poorer class, comes from the Maquey plant, it was pointed out. All that is necessary is to cut the end of the Maquey leaf and let the sap drip into a vessel. The drink is mild, but ferments quickly, and generates alcohol.

Smiles of Fortune Drive Brothers Into Hiding

Pleven, Bulgaria, Feb. 14.—Two brothers, plowing a field to plant it to grapevines, recently turned up some heavy objects that to their ignorant eyes seemed like gold. They were vases and statuettes, 15 in all. To be on the safe side the two men gathered up their finds and disappeared. But rumors of the occurrence got out and the local authorities started to investigate. They found in the field the cover of a vase that had been overlooked. It weighed 90 grams and an assay proved it to be pure gold.

Highway Bond Bill Passes Its Third Reading

Increase In Gasoline Tax and Pardon Com- missioner Bills Also Receive Favorable Action; New Bills In- troduced

Raleigh, Feb. 14.—Third reading passage of the \$20,000,000 Highway Bond bill and its companion financing measure, and the Pardon Commissioner bill by the Senate, and the introduction in the House of Representative, of two bills embodying the Governor's recommendation for an executive budget and judicial conference, were the outstanding features of today's session of the General Assembly. Both branches adjourned until 8 o'clock Monday night.

In the House, it had been agreed to take up no state wide bills for discussion today. There developed, however, a local matter that caused prolonged debate, pertaining to proposed increases in the salaries of Catawba county officials. Representative Clutz, of that county, vigorously opposed the measure, and the bill was finally killed.

The Executive Budget bill was introduced by Representative Connor. This measure would give the governor direct supervision of state departments and institutions. It provides that he would appoint an assistant director of the budget, he being the director, and two other persons of the Senate and House, Finance and Appropriations Committees, who would be members. These chairmen and persons, appointed by the treasurer, would meet every January and July. Also they would meet every two years, to make up estimates of the needs for the subsequent biennial period.

The Judicial Conference bill introduced by Representative Graham, of Orange, would name the Chief Justice of Superior Court as president of the semi-annual conference, which would include Attorney General and Supreme Court judges. They would sit twice a year together with a member of the bar from each judicial district, to be appointed by the governor, for purposes of working out a judicial reform.

Martin is Tendered Contract for Season Baltimore Orioles

Raleigh, Feb. 13.—LeRoy Martin, former catcher on the Wake Forest College Varsity team, has been tendered a contract for the coming season by the Manager of the Baltimore Orioles, according to an announcement made here today. Charlie Carroll, recently chosen to pilot the Winston-Salem Club in the Piedmont League during the 1925 season, has also offered a contract to Martin.

Martin has made no statement as to whether or not he will accept either of the offers tendered him. He is Athletic Coach at Mountain View College in Wilkes county, but is temporarily making his home in Raleigh, where he is engaged as assistant to the chief clerk of the Senate.

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NEWSPAPERS AND CRIME

In reply to an open letter published in the Christian Century charging the press of the country with evil effects caused by the publication of stories of crime and urging suppression of such news, the New York World prepares a table of news stories carried in all the morning issues of New York papers for a single day which show the account of only one crime while column after column of news of other natures fill the pages. The World calls attention to the fact that the day's news covered is an example of the average daily run and takes issue with those who from time to time charge that newspapers of the country are responsible for the wave of crime by giving publicity to stories of same.

The reply of the World follows:

"There comes to hand the Christian Century, issue of Jan. 29, 1925, containing an open letter to the newspaper proprietors of Chicago. The letter reads in part as follows:

"Gentlemen—We cannot doubt that as citizens you who control the great newspapers of Chicago share with all your intelligent and respectable readers a grave concern for the evil effects which the press is having upon the moral life of the community. * * * Our proposal is this: That you, the proprietors of the daily press of Chicago, agree to-

gether upon a united shift of news emphasis for the month. * * * It could be decided that all the newspapers of Chicago would for thirty days "play down" crime, bestiality and the sordid aspects of life and "play up" those really significant events and constructive activities that make citizenship in such a city and such a land a high privilege."

"The charges and proposals of the Christian Century are often put forward, in one way or another, by well-intending people. Let us see what substance is in them. Let us examine the newspapers. Yesterday's crop of New York morning papers will do as well as any. Classifying the news on the front pages, we get the following results:

"Crime—World, 1 item; Times, 0; Herald Tribune, 1; American, 0.
"Foreign Affairs—World, 1; Times, 2; Herald Tribune, 2; American, 2.
"Public Affairs, United States—World 3; Times, 4; Herald Tribune, 3; American, 1.
"Miscellaneous—World, 8; Times, 7; Herald Tribune, 10; American, 8.

"The single crime story was the theft of \$40,000 in securities from a messenger, carried by two papers inconspicuously. The only story wherein blood was spilled was the story of an accidental shooting in Wallace's Theatre. But in the light of the Christian Century's plea for "significant events and constructive activities" the news grouped roughly under "miscellaneous" is highly interesting. This includes:

"The story of a policeman wrongly convicted set at liberty on motion of the prosecuting attorney.

"The story of a boy, four years old, heroically rescued from death as he floated down the Passaic River on an ice cake.

"The story of a previously unpublished speech of Abraham Lincoln.

"The story of the heroic efforts to save Floyd Collins.

"The story of an aviator carrying serum to a quarantined liner.

"Just where does the preponderance of 'unclean' matter lie? This is not an unusual day's news; it is about average. If the Christian Century can suggest a 'shift of emphasis' for the better of this showing, it will be doing American journalism a service."

In the field of inter-American commerce, it is recommended that all the American republics arrive at uniform laws respecting contracts and letters of credit making the latter a negotiable instrument by means of endorsement, and to give the holder of the letter of credit a right before law to collect its face value.

Chief among the recommendations contributed by the First Pan-American Woman's Conference are those pertaining to hygiene in schools, means of establishing canteens and refectories where wholesome food is obtainable by children while at school, the establishment of swimming tanks, and a compulsory regimen of physical exercises suitable to the individual.

SCIENTISTS AT LIMA SEEK PROMOTION OF PAN-AMERICANISM

Lima. — Among the most important of the 147 recommendations approved at the plenary closing session of the third Pan-American Scientific Congress, held here this month, were the following:

Recommendation for establishing a Pan-American University at Panama, details of which will be worked out by the Pan-American Union.

Proposal for the celebration of a Pan-American Archaeological Conference in Cuzco, and the general cooperation of American archaeologists in the study and investigation of the remains of the ancient peoples of America.

The endorsement of the work done by the Carnegie Institution and the proposal for the establishment of meteorological and geophysical stations in all the republics of the Pan-American Union.

A recommendation was also made that a Pan-American Institute of Electrical Engineers be established for the purpose of studying electrical development, especially with reference to electrical power as a public utility. Its traffic, standardized voltages, and public and private monopolies. It is also recommended that a "Committee on a Pan-American Railway" study the economic, political and industrial aspects of the Pan-American railway project. Standardization of railway gauges and equipment also is urged.

Narcotic drugs came in for attention in a recommendation that a Pan-American Pharmaceutical Conference be held to draw up a code of proposed laws governing the production, distribution, and sale of habit-forming drugs.

Diseases of plants and animals are recommended for study, and stock hygiene regulations are urged, especially those connected with the preparation of milk for human consumption. Protection of rare birds and valuable bird-life is recommended. Sociological and educational questions include a Pan-American center of secondary education to be established at Washington, D. C., where equivalent courses in English, Spanish and Portuguese be available for Pan-American students. The conservation of the purity of the Castilian language also is urged. Courses in political science and international law are recommended for all American universities, as well as the introduction into Latin-American universities of the study of journalism as a profession. It is recommended that the schools be established for teaching the

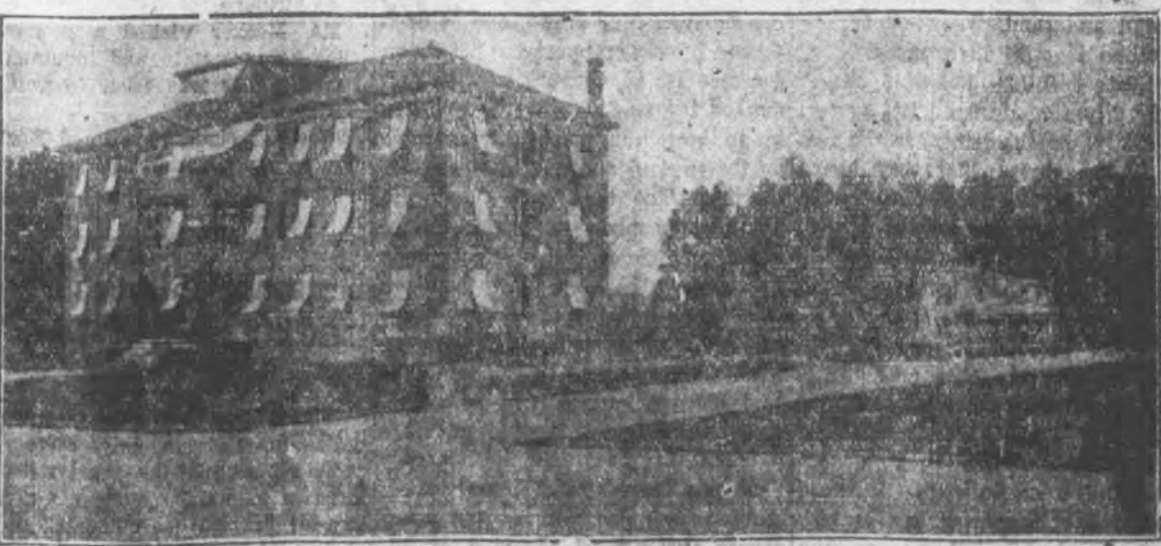

New Orleans to Remain Headquarters of Forest Experiment Station

New Orleans, La., Feb. 13.—This city is to remain the headquarters of the Forest Service's Southern Forest Experiment Station, according to a recent decision of the Secretary of Agriculture. In view of the recently increased facilities of the Station, a number of other locations have been under consideration as possibly being more centrally located with regard to the forest areas to be covered or in other ways, better adapted to the work of the Station. It was at length decided, however, that the system of maintaining local field stations in different parts of the Southern pine region, with central headquarters in New Orleans offered the most workable arrangement for the activities of the Station as a whole.

The Duchess of York, wife of the second son of the British ruler, exceeded even her titled husband's record on their present hunting trip in British East Africa, bringing down an immense rhinoceros with one shot. Dr. Wilhelm Marx, former Chancellor of the German Republic, has been elected Premier of Prussia by the Prussian Diet.
