RESCUERS FIND FLOYD COLLINS DEAD

FLOYD COLLINS DEAD WHEN RESCUERS REACH HIM IN CAVE PRISON

Cave City, Ky., Feb. 16.—Floyd Collins was reached dead at 2:45 o'clock this afternoon, said an official announcement after rescuers had penetrated into what they believed was the original sand cave cavern where Collins was caught. No medical examination was made as it was impossible for physicians to reach the victim.

H. T. Carmichael, in charge of the rescue operations was the first to go to Collins and said he appeared to be dead.

The announcement was made by Dr. W. A. Funkhouser, geologist, of the University of Kentucky.

Preparations are being made for Major Howard and Captain Francis, medical officers of the 149 Infantry, holding Green, Ky., and Dr. Hazlett, of Chicago, to go to Collins.

Dr. T. Carmichael, in charge of the rescue operations, and M. E. F. Bosny, executive secretary of the State Highway Commission and personal representative of Governor Fields, were to accompany the physicians on their trip to Collins.

Guards are standing about the mouth of the cave with fixed bayonets and there has been little conversation despite the great excitement. An announcement was made that an official bulletin would be forthcoming immediately.

All physicians have been hurriedly called into service in case they should be needed.

Homer Collins, brother of the entombed man, was at the mouth of the shaft when the announcement was made.

No estimate has been given as to how soon Collins will be extricated from the natural rock vise which trapped him January 30.

Cave City, Feb. 16.—Progress through the hole being driven in a lateral of the shaft, sunk to rescue Floyd Collins from a natural tomb in Sand Cave where he is, is now a one-man job, said an official bulletin issued about noon today. The workman is forced to use hand tools, as the pneumatic tools cannot now be used because of vibration.

The last sound test made today, between the lateral and the original tunnel, verified the fact that former tests had been clearly heard, the announcement said.

Cave City, Feb. 16.—Surmounting serious obstacles and overcoming large slides, it now remains a question of cubic yards and time until the Floyd Collins rescue party expects to reach a cavern, which leads directly to him, said official bulletins issued at 8 o'clock this morning. However, as it requires one hour to move one cubic yard of material, immediate results in reaching Collins can not be expected, the bulletin says.

Cave City, Feb. 16.—Homer Collins, brother of Floyd Collins, who is trapped in Sand Cave near here, this morning broke by the military guard on duty at the cave, and almost succeeded in going down the shaft, when a report reached the surface that Floyd was being brought up the shaft. Additional soldiers were assigned to guard duty around the Sand Cave area this morning.

This is the first time that the guard has been increased since official report that the rescue workers had found fissure, and laterals extending from the side of the shaft being sunk to rescue Collins.

The official statement follows: "Results in the lateral, heading last night are very encouraging, and at a distance of 12 feet from the main shaft an attempt is being made to break through the limestone roof and drill vertically into the avenue where Collins lies." PISTOL FOUND HERE MAY HELP SOLVE BEAMAN MURDER

Pistol, Said to Be Property of Johnnie Stewart, Found at Home of Carl Ross, Mrs. Ross Being Held as State's Witness

The Wilson County coroner and his jury, investigating the murder of Clayton Beaman which occurred near Wilson several days ago, spent yesterday in Greenville, for the purpose of gathering information relative to the shooting.

Shortly after their arrival here they visited the home of Carl and Lucy Ross, who reside a short distance from Greenville, and found a pistol which, according to a statement of Ross, belongs to Johnnie Stewart, a frequent visitor to the Ross home, and who is now being held in the Wilson county jail, in connection with the murder.

After finding the pistol and getting all the information which they could concerning same, Lucy Ross and her companion, name unknown, were arrested and carried to Wilson where they will be held a State witnesses. Clayton Beaman, young white man, was found dead in his automobile, near Wilson, on Sunday afternoon, Feb. 8. He had been shot by unknown parties and nothing could be found that would lead to the identity of his murderer. Wilson county officials immediately began an investigation and although many arrests have been made and many clues followed, they are still working on the mystery.

Three of the seven prisoners, Bettie Brinkley, Roger Armstrong and Ed. Sutton, have been brought to this city and placed in the county jail and city jails to await trial.

FOUR EXECUTIONS ARE SCHEDULED FOR THE NEXT TEN DAYS

Four Negroes to Pay Death Penalty in This State, Three for Murder and One for Assault

Raleigh, Feb. 16.—Three electrocutions are scheduled to take place at the State Penitentiary this week. The first will be a double electrocution, set for Wednesday, February 18. The condemned men are George Russell and David Jones, negroes convicted of murder in Chowan county. Friday, February 20, is the date fixed for the electrocution of Len Walton, negro convicted of murder in Hoke county. Walton recently made an appeal to Superior Court for a new trial, but lost the appeal.

A fourth electrocution is set for February 17, when Will Brown, negro, will pay the death penalty for assault committed in Forsyth county.

COOPER MAY NOT APPEAL HIS CASE

Indications Are That Thomas E. Cooper Will Decide to Serve Prison Sentence Without Appeal

Wilmington, Feb. 16.—Thomas E. Cooper, convicted with his brother, W. B. Cooper, former Lieutenant Governor of North Carolina, in Federal Court here Saturday, on charges of violating the National Banking Law, today remained in jail, pending the completion of his appeal to the sentence. Judge Rose, in sentencing Cooper to three years in the Atlanta Penitentiary on each of four counts, the sentences to run concurrently, denied the former bank president an opportunity to make bond until his petition to set aside the sentence had been completed. It was stated today that Cooper was to confer with his attorneys and was considering abandonment of any attempt to appeal, and would proceed to Atlanta. However, no definite statement in this connection was forth coming.

W. B. Cooper, sentenced to 18 months on each of four counts, the sentences running concurrently, was allowed bond on Saturday, in the sum of \$35,000, pending a hearing on his appeal to the circuit court of appeals at Richmond, T. E. Cooper, in addition to Federal Court sentences is facing a seven year's term in the state prison, following his conviction some months ago in superior court on charges coming out of the failure of the Liberty Saving Bank of this city.

Officers Raid Home of Carl Ross and Find Whiskey

Deputy Sheriff Whitehurst, Officer Nobles, and Chief of Police Jones, raided the home of Carl Ross, Saturday night and found one quart of whiskey and all paraphernalia necessary for the selling of same. Ross was arrested and placed under a bond for his appearance for trial on Monday, March 2nd.

EFFORTS TO ABOLISH PULLMAN SURCHARGE TO COME UP IN HOUSE

Washington, Feb. 16.—The House vote on the Senate Amendment to the Independent Offices Appropriation bill to abolish the Pullman surcharge, was assured today when the House went through the routine of disagreement to the Senate Amendment, and sent the measure to the conference.

Representative Wood, Republican, of Indiana, one of the House conferees, assured his colleagues that no effort would be made to agree in the conference on the surcharge, and that it would be brought back to the House.

The Methodist and Immanuel Baptist churches dismissed their evening services and attended in large numbers. WOULD INCREASE PAY OF CONGRESSMEN AND THE VICE-PRESIDENT

Washington, Feb. 16.—A bill to increase the salary of members of Congress from \$7,500 to \$10,000 a year was reported today by the Senate Finance Committee. It was introduced by Senator Ball, of Delaware. The measure, which also provides an increase for the Vice-President to \$15,000 a year, then was ordered to the Appropriations Committee, where the legislative appropriation bill is now under consideration.

MORE TESTIMONY HEARD IN ATLANTA PRISON INQUIRY

Witness Tells of Big Gambling Games Conducted in Room of the Warden's House; Character Witnesses Heard

Atlanta, Ga., Feb. 16.—Gambling in a room of the Warden's house at the Federal Penitentiary, was described by Fred Fuller, inmate of the prison testifying today at the trial of Arthur E. Sartain and Louis J. Fletcher, former warden and deputy warden, and Lawrence Reihl, Columbus, Ohio, charged with conspiracy. The witness told of two games, "one was a big game of stud poker in which the limit was \$25." He mentioned a few players in the game, and said Graham Vaughn, prisoner from Savannah, was the big winner. The witness declared that Vaughn told him that he was about \$12,000 "ahead of the game." Homer Z. Barstwick, probate judge of Franklin County, Columbus, Ohio, and Geo. J. Carb, former mayor and police commissioner of Columbus, Ohio, were character witnesses of Sartain. It was developed in the testimony of Carb, that he defeated Sartain in races for mayor and sheriff. Both witnesses said that Sartain's reputation in Columbus was good. The end of Carb's testimony provoked laughter, when he ended with "The worst thing I can say about Sartain is that he is a Republican. He ought to be a democrat."

John F. Breckwith, of Albany, N. Y., a prisoner at the Federal Penitentiary for 8 years, testified that the reputation in the prison community of Father Thomas Hayden, Chaplain of the prison, could not be worse. The witness is serving a 15 year sentence.

GUILFORD PROF. COMMITTS SUICIDE

Head of Department of Education of Guilford College Takes His Own Life Today

Greensboro, Feb. 16.—Lee White, head of the Department of Education at Guilford College, near here, is believed to have ended his life shortly after 7 o'clock this morning. Mrs. White heard the shot, and when she hurried into the yard, the body of her husband was found with a pistol by his side.

Mr. White had been a member of the Guilford College faculty for the last five years, and was very popular with the students, and had been a professor. No cause was found for the act.

GREENSBORO MAN SHOT TO DEATH IN CHARLOTTE HOTEL

T. I. Watson, Traveling Salesman, Held on the Charge of Murder for Killing Joseph Donough, Greensboro Engraver

Charlotte, Feb. 16.—Joseph E. McDonough, an engraver of Greensboro, is dead, and Thomas I. Watson, a traveling salesman, also of Greensboro, is in the local county jail on a charge of murder as a result of a shooting in a local hotel here late last night.

The shooting occurred in a room occupied by McDonough and Watson's wife, and in the presence of a policeman and the manager of the hotel, Watson, according to the detective, firing over the officer's shoulder from the door of the room, after accompanying the policeman to the room to identify the couple, for whom a warrant had been issued, charging statutory offense. Inquest will be held today.

Watson, who became suspicious of his wife and McDonough, trailed the couple here from Greensboro, and swore out the warrant, which was to have been served last night when the shooting took place.

FRED WILLIAMS SHOOTS AT AUTO AND KILLS BROTHER

Negro of Swift Creek Township Shoots and Kills Dennis Williams; Claims He Thought Pistol Was Empty

Fred Williams, negro, of Swift Creek Township, in Pitt County jail charged with shooting and killing his brother, Dennis Williams, at their home yesterday.

According to information Dennis Williams accompanied by three or four other negroes, was in an automobile at the time of the shooting. As they were driving off, Fred Williams, drew his pistol and fired, the bullet taking effect in the head of his brother. Death resulted about thirty minutes later.

When questioned concerning the shooting, Williams stated that he thought the pistol was empty and he had no idea of killing his brother.

The coroner and his jury returned the verdict that the negro came to his death by a shot from a pistol in the hands of Fred Williams, through carelessness and the unlawful handling of a deadly weapon.

Legislature Is Now Facing Real Work Of Session

Revenue, Bus Regulation, Appropriations, Game Laws and Budget System Are Major Tasks That Now Confront Lawmakers

Raleigh, Feb. 16.—With the peak of the session apparently just ahead, the General Assembly, following another week-end rest, will meet tonight at 8 o'clock. Members returning to Raleigh from their homes, were ready to tackle their big tasks in the legislative halls, and in the committee rooms. This week will probably see some of the major legislation, including the Highway and Bus bills, and probably a State wide game bill enacted into law.

The Evolution fight will come up tomorrow night in minority report, and is expected to draw considerable attention.

With a tentative revenue bill drawn up, the Joint Finance Committee will spend the greater part of the week going over this proposed measure, section by section, in an attempt to squeeze dollars out of every available sentence. Members have expressed the opinion that this and the appropriations bill form the major tasks of the legislative session. There will be every effort exerted to co-ordinate these two measures so as to make them fit with a view of setting up a balanced budget. Backing up these efforts, Representative Connor, has introduced an executive budget bill embodying the recommendations of Gov. McLean. There will be made efforts to put the state on a "Cash and Carry" basis to prevent the recurrence of any deficit.

The Game bill has many interesting backers; the anti-evolution measure will call for a debate on how far the state will go in regulating its teachings; the Bus regulation bill is practically agreed upon, and the executive budget is expected to be accepted in some form. Although a number of local bills are being introduced together it is the general opinion that public measures are expected to take precedent for the remaining 20 days of the session.

A petition signed by nearly one hundred Pitt County citizens requesting the reappointment of W. A. Hart, of Tarboro, as a member of the State Highway Commission, from this district, has been forwarded to Governor McLean.

YOUR DUTY AS A CITIZEN

In an interview today with Hon. K. A. Pittman, one of the Pitt County Representatives in the present General Assembly, Mr. Pittman urged that the citizens whom he and his colleagues represent, make their wishes known regarding legislation affecting this town and county now before the legislature. He urged especially that the citizens make known to the legislators their wishes regarding the proposed extension of the city limits of Greenville and the extended jurisdiction of the mayor. It is the desire of the legislators, Mr. Pittman pointed out, to carry out the desires of those whom they represent but if the citizens fail to make their wishes known the only alternative of the Representatives is to act according to their own personal convictions.

There seems to be some division of opinion as to the proposed legislation and while the representatives have received favorable petitions containing large numbers of signatures, there has arisen enough opposition to cause the legislators to desire expressions from a greater number of the citizens in order that their action may comply with the wishes of the majority.

As a citizen, your duty does not end when you vote for those whom you desire to represent you, for what they do directly affects you and it is your duty to see that they are informed as to your desires. While our legislators are highly intelligent gentlemen they are not mind readers and they cannot

serve intelligently unless they know what their constituents want. Do your duty as a citizen by corresponding immediately with the legislators letting them know whether or not you favor this extension legislation. If you remain silent and the legislators do not act in accord with your wishes, do not then criticize their action for you will have but yourself to blame.

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COTTON

Three moderate low pressures of 29.83 in the west one over Southern Colorado, one over Oklahoma and one off West coast Texas which likely bring some rain to southwest immediate future to be followed by cold wave.

Weld: We believe a higher market amply justified by the supply and demand situation and think well of purchase around present prices.

Hirsch Lillenthal: The market looks an attractive purchase on recessions.

Hentz: To us the market seems to be a more healthy condition than at any previous time during the season with prices at or near present levels.

We would purchase contracts in this market during periods of orice depression watching new crop prospects with great interest for unfavorable developments in that quarter would be of unusually serious price portend.

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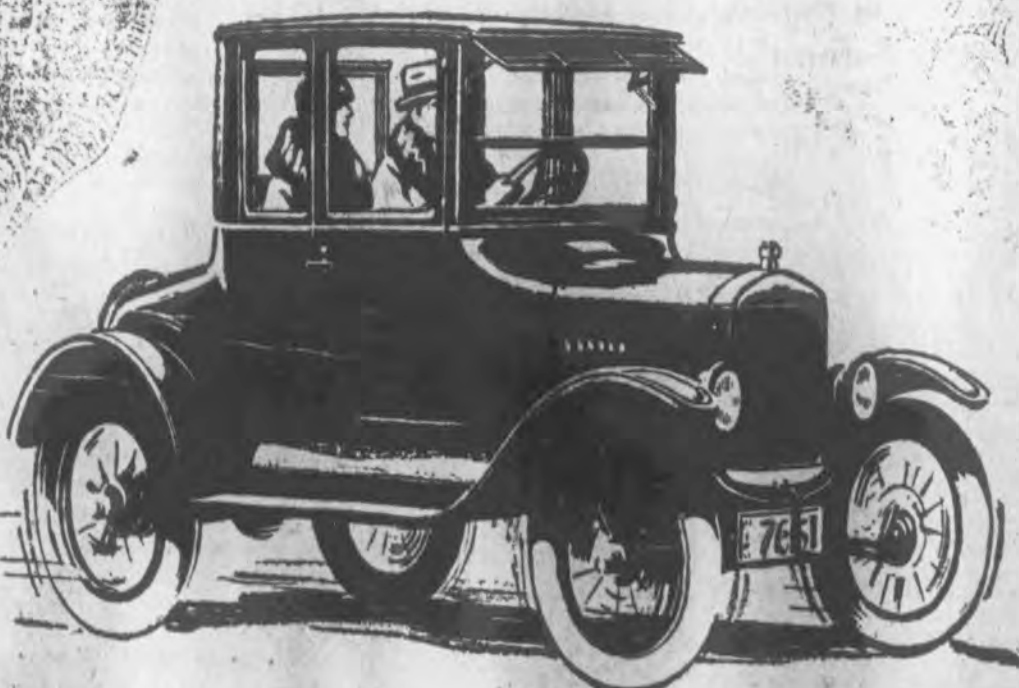
