

\$20,000,000 HIGHWAY BOND MEASURE PASSES FINAL READING TODAY

**Bus Regulation Bill Re-
ceives Favorable Ac-
tion; Vehicle Light
Law Bill Finally Tabl-
ed By Senate Vote of
27 to 20; Poole Reso-
lution Debated in the
House**

Raleigh, Feb. 18.—\$20,000,000 in bonds for continuing North Carolina road program was authorized today when the bill providing for this issue passed the House of the General Assembly on its final reading. The measure previously had been approved by the Senate.

Authorizing of motor propelled busses in the state was placed under the regulatory powers of the state corporation commission. The so-called bus bill was given final approval when the House concurred in the report of the Senate and House conference committee. This measure had previously been approved by the Senate except for one House amendment, which the conference report settled.

In the Senate, Mark Squires introduced a bill providing for a constitutional convention, and considerable discussion took place on the bill to provide a new code of laws for the state. The measure requiring busses to carry lights at night on the highways of the state was finally tabled in the Senate by vote of 27 to 20. Following passage of the bus and highway measures, the House went into prolonged discussion of the Poole resolution to place the General Assembly on record as disapproving the teaching of evolution in the schools of the state. Representative Burlington, of Iredell, led off for the proponents of the resolution, which came up on a minority report. Previously the floor had been cleared of all except those entitled to be there.

Final passage of the bus bill means that commercial busses now in operation between the cities of the state, that exceed a width of 84 inches, will be allowed to operate for one year longer only. An amendment approved by both Houses would limit the width of busses to 84 inches, but a companion measure was passed which would allow those exceeding that width, now in operation, to remain in service only one year longer.

The only other amendment of any importance, which came up on the bus bill, was that they limit the number of passengers to 21, but this was defeated by the Senate and the House agreed to the Senate Committee's report.

Passage of the bond issue for highways means that \$20,000,000 will be available during the next two calendar years, divided equally between the two periods for highway improvements. In addition, according to Gov. McLean, who championed the \$20,000,000 issue, there will be about \$12,000,000 from other sources, for road purposes, making a total of \$32,000,000. This will bring the total for highway improvement, during a six years period beginning in 1920, to \$80,000,000 in bonds.

Raleigh, Feb. 18.—With discussion running high, the House of Representatives of the General Assembly today adjourned at 2:30 o'clock after three hours of debate on the Poole resolution, which would place the teaching of evolution in the schools of the state.

A motion to table the resolution was lost 48 to 52 and after several representatives had spoken for an amendment which came up on a minority report, it was moved that it be made the unfinished business on the calendar, and be taken up for consideration tomorrow morning at 10:00 o'clock.

COMMITTEE CALLS SEC'Y WEEKS FOR AIRCRAFT REPORT

**House Committee Re-
quests Confidential
Reports on Bombing

Washington, Feb. 18.—The House Aircraft Committee today adopted the resolution asking Secretary Weeks for a confidential report on the 1923 bombing tests against the battleships New Jersey and Virginia. This action was taken after Representative Laguardia, Republican, of New York, had testified that the War Secretary in a letter to him refused to give this information, due to it being of a "confidential nature."

The secretary's letter said that the material could be furnished to a Congressional committee only, so Representative Laguardia stated.

**American Society
Mechanical Engineers
Meet in Charlotte**

Charlotte, Feb. 18.—The annual meeting of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers is to be held here March 16, according to an announcement made here. Plans for the entertainment of members of the executive council of the society are being made by the officers of the Charlotte chapter of the Charlotte branch of the Society. W. S. Lee is chairman of this committee, J. S. Cothran, vice-chairman, and F. B. Davant is secretary.

The Carolinas Branch meeting, it is stated, will bring members of the chapters of Charlotte, Raleigh, and Greenville, S. C., here. Other members, in addition to the member of the three chapters in the Carolinas are also expected. In all 250 well known engineers and about 15 members of the National Council are expected to attend.

The executive council has one field meeting each year at some point outside New York City. All other meetings of the National body are held in the home headquarters, of the organization in New York City, it is said.

One of the items of entertainment that has been announced will be a banquet at a local hotel, where all sessions of both the Executive Council and the Carolinas branch are to be held. This banquet will be held on the night of March 16. A varied program of entertainment is being arranged for this banquet, according to the committee.

Newark Club of International League To Train High Point

High Point, Feb. 18.—The Newark club of the International League probably will train in High Point again this year, according to advice that has been received here. Bernard Moore, secretary and treasurer of the club, has written local officials requesting the use of the grounds. In case the Bears come to High Point, they will arrive about March and remain until April 4, it is said.

CALLING OF ARMS CONFERENCE BEING TALKED IN LONDON

**Washington Government Will Make No
Statement Further
Than That Conversa-
tions Are in Progress**

Washington, Feb. 18.—Informal discussion of a new arms conference, to be called by President Coolidge, has been proceeding in London, but officials indicated here today that no definite results had been attained.

The State Department would not discuss the subject beyond authorizing the statement that conversations had not yet reached the point of an exchange of formal notes. It is assumed in the absence of official comment that the steps taken look to an extension of the Washington Naval treaty so as to include limitation on the auxiliary craft, as well as capital ships. Such a project was under consideration here at the time the League of Nations brought forward it, plans and arms conference. That plan, since has encountered many obstacles, and President Coolidge said that he was awaiting an opportune moment to make suggestion, of his own.

URGES CESSATION OF FIGHT AGAINST COT'N OIL PRODUCTS

**Overman Declares Leg-
islation Now Pending
in Several States Will
Produce Virtual Civil
War**

Washington, Feb. 18.—Legislation pending in several states pertaining to cotton oil products, will lead eventually to a virtual civil war, Senator Overman, Democrat of North Carolina, declared in the Senate today stating that he was calling upon the Senators to ask their legislatures to drop all bills of this nature.

Senator Overman read a telegram from Gov. McLean of North Carolina, calling his attention to the fact that certain State legislatures had such measures under consideration. He described the proposals as, "intolerable," and warned that retaliatory moves might be enacted by the cotton producing states to place embargoes on manufactured goods. Senator Gooding, Representative of Idaho, agreed that legislation complained of by Senator Overman was "outrageous," and promised that he would try to have his state legislators end any such bills.

Fake Revenue Agent Working This Section

Raleigh, Feb. 18.—A white man giving his name as A. J. Postel, and representing himself as a representative of the Raleigh office of the United States, Internal Revenue Department, has been soliciting funds in the city under the pretense of rendering aid in making out income tax returns, according to an announcement that has been made by Collector Gillam Grissom. "The complaint against this man has been lodged by a negro merchant of Raleigh," said Mr. Grissom, "and I am anxious to bring about his arrest and face him with his accusers."

Mr. Grissom further stated that the complainant, W. W. Jones, negro merchant, alleges that he paid Postel twenty-five dollars, when he was informed that he had been sent by Collector Grissom to "straighten out" his income tax returns.

The negro, according to his statement to Mr. Grissom, was told by Postel that he and two other men were engaged in this work, and that they were going to Rocky Mount, Wilson and other eastern points when they had finished their work in Raleigh. "If the statements made by the negro are true," said Mr. Grissom, "the man is not only impersonating an officer, but is securing money under false pretense, and I am anxious to locate him."

NEGRO PAYS DEATH PENALTY THIS A. M.

**Dave Jones Confesses
to Murder Before Go-
ing to Chair; Governor
Commutes Sentence
of George Russell**

Raleigh, Feb. 18.—Dave Jones, negro, paid the extreme penalty in the electric chair at the state prison this morning, for the murder of Sam Small, a white farmer of Chowan county. The negro confessed to the crime just before his execution. Gov. Russell, negro, who was to have been electrocuted for complicity in the same crime, was given a commutation by Gov. McLean to life imprisonment. Jones was seated in the chair at 10:26 this morning, the current turned on, and at 10:31 was pronounced dead.

Confab Principals Class AA-I Schools Be Held Feb. 20-21

Winston-Salem, Feb. 18.—A conference of the principals of the class AA-I high schools of the state has been called by John W. Moore, principal of the local high school, for Friday and Saturday, February 20 and 21. This conference, it is announced, is for the purpose of discussing the problems of high school principals and attempt to solve some of the difficulties that confront the principals of the larger schools in the state.

The class AA-I high schools, it is announced, are those which have a daily attendance of at least 350 pupils, and whose schools maintain a certain standard.

Among the schools that are expected to be represented at the meeting here are Asheville, Charlotte, Shelby, Salisbury, High Point, Greensboro, Durham, Raleigh, Fayetteville and Wilmington.

**Dr. McLees Delivered
Powerful Sermon Last
Night On Subject of
"Unbelief"**

One of the most unique and at the same time powerful sermons heard in our town was preached last evening at the Presbyterian Church by Dr. McLees, on a text in John 20:24. "But Thomas, one of the twelve called Didymus was not with them when Jesus came."

Dr. McLees said that it was a great loss for him that he was not there when Jesus came to his disciples, after the resurrection, greater than any he could think of; that by it he missed so many wonderful things that he other disciples received, such as a vision of the Risen Christ, the peace he bestowed on them, and the power of the Holy Spirit that he breathed on them. And the reason that Thomas was not there was because of unbelief. He didn't believe that Jesus would be redeemed in heaven today, but he will always regret that he was not there when Jesus appeared to his disciples. And Dr. McLees asked if any of those who heard him would stay away from the morning and evening services for some of the same reason, that Thomas did: business, social, financial or some other. Jesus will be at each morning and evening service throughout the meeting, but some will not be there; and Jesus has to bestow upon them. He challenged them to stay away if the reason they could give would stand the white light of the judgment day, and if it would not be at each service.

A good crowd was present, and listened with rapt attention to this great sermon, every one there will say that those who missed hearing this sermon missed a treat, and it would pay anyone to hear every sermon of the meeting. Let every person that can possibly attend be at the evening service and urge the young people to attend, as the message for this evening is one of special interest to them. The theme of the evening sermon will be: "How to know what plan God has for the life."

The morning sermon by Dr. McLees was on Personal Work, taking the first chapter of John 41-42 as his text. He showed that personal work is the greatest privilege accorded anyone, that that is God's way of winning the world to himself, that it is needed, that we can do it if we are filled with His Spirit, and urging us to go out and bring people to the service and tell them about Jesus. The attendance was good, being larger than any morning service thus far.

All who are interested in prayer for the meeting are urged to attend the fifteen minute prayer service each evening at 7:15.

Sagging of the Walls of Rescue Shaft and Lat- eral Tunnel Today Closed Forever the Natural Tomb Where Remains of Floyd Col- lins Are Pinioned

Cave City, Ky., Feb. 18.—Sand Cave Hill, torn up in the struggle to rescue Floyd Collins from the grip of his underground trap, is slowly being closed in today upon his body, without human assistance. Unable to release him from the clutch of nature, the volunteers, who fought to save him, joined his family in funeral services at the top of the rescue shaft yesterday afternoon, and six of his friends fulfilled the legal formality of identifying him, and announced a verdict of an accidental death.

The cement with which it was planned to seal the boulders, of his rocky grave, did not arrive, and the sagging today of the rescue shaft and its lateral tunnel indicated nature's intention to seal him up forever. The mud and rocks held back for a few days by heavy timbers in the rescue shaft, were settling back upon him. The best efforts of the state of Kentucky, scores of unselfish workers, and the sympathy and prayers of his friends had failed. Dr. William Hazlett, of Chicago, the only physician to see him in his 60 foot grave, announced that Collins had been reached three days too late. When it was decided to make the cave a tomb, a friend crawled down to wash and turn the face of Collins upward. Then six others down, one by one, into the narrow tomb to identify him for the coroner's jury, which they composed. This was entered in the record of the State Military Board, which took testimony from those connected with the story, and the drama was ended.

Department Commerce Issues Jan. Report

Washington, Feb. 18.—Contracts awarded for building construction in 27 northeastern states during January 1925, contemplate expenditures aggregating \$255,367,000 as against \$283,091,000 contemplated by December, 1924, awards and \$261,330,000 by awards in January last year, it is announced by the United States Department of Commerce in its survey of current business. The allocation of awards, according to the report, to the general classes of construction show the decline from the previous month and January of last year to be general except in the case of commercial buildings, which increased over the previous month and January, 1924, both in point of value and aggregate floor space. Concrete pavement contracts awarded in January, 1925, declined from the previous month, but increased over January, 1924.

Postal receipts in 50 selected cities during January, 1925, totaled \$27,271,000 as against \$34,149,000 in December, says the report.

Sales of stock on the New York Exchange in January, 1925, totaled 46,739,000 shares as against 24,876,000 shares in December, 1924, and 27,762,000 shares a year ago. The report also states that prices of 25 industrial and 25 railroad stocks averaged higher in January than in either the previous month or January, 1924. The price index of 40 bonds, relative to par value stood at 76.07 in January, as compared with 75.77 in December, 1924, and 72.23 in January, 1924.

Federal Reserve holdings of discounted notes at the end of January 1925, aggregated \$274,000,000 as against \$314,000,000 at the end of December, 1924, and \$522,000,000 a year ago.

Upham Elected Pres. N. C. Chapt. American So. Civil Engineers

Raleigh, Feb. 18.—At the annual meeting of the North Carolina Chapter of the American Society of Civil Engineers, which was recently held at Chapel Hill, Charles H. Upham, State Highway Engineer, was elected president of the chapter for the ensuing year.

THOMAS E. COOPER WILL SERVE TERM IN ATLANTA PRISON

**Former Wilmington
Banker Will Leave To-
morrow for Atlanta to
Begin Term for Viola-
tion of Banking Laws**

Wilmington, Feb. 18.—Convicted of violation of the National Banking Laws, and sentenced to three years in the Atlanta Penitentiary, Thomas E. Cooper, former president of the defunct Commercial National Bank of this city, will leave tomorrow for Atlanta to begin his sentence. Cooper last night announced abandonment of his appeal.

Cooper was convicted last Saturday in Federal Court here, along with his brother W. B. Cooper, former lieutenant governor of North Carolina, on charges growing out of the failure of the bank here three years ago. The latter was sentenced to 18 months in the penitentiary, but has filed an appeal. Thomas E. Cooper at first announced that he would appeal but later decided against this course.

In addition to a three years federal sentence, Cooper at the expiration of that time, will face an eight year sentence on the road, of New Hanover county. He was convicted in Superior Court here some time ago of violating the State Banking Laws in connection with the failure of the Liberty Savings Bank of this city.

Six Cases Small Pox Now Exist in New Hanover Co.

Wilmington, Feb. 18.—Six cases of small pox now exist in New Hanover, according to an announcement made by Dr. John S. Hamilton, county superintendent of health. However, Dr. Hamilton declared that there is not the slightest probability of an epidemic of the disease.

Dr. Hamilton stated emphatically that practically two-thirds of the city's population is immune from this disease, as a large percentage of the population, both white and black, have been vaccinated. In addition to that, scores are being vaccinated each day.

Gloria Swanson Undergoes Operation

Paris, Feb. 18.—Gloria Swanson, the moving picture star, had to be hurried to a hospital last evening, where she was operated on at mid night. The operation was a sequel to one performed some months ago, after which it appears that the actress did not take sufficient rest before resuming her professional activities. Her condition seems satisfactory today. Miss Swanson was married here last month.

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OUR GREAT NEED

If one will visit the different business men of our city with the question of what Greenville needs for more rapid progress and greater business no doubt nine out of ten of the replies to the question would be "industries with payrolls which would insure a certain amount of business the year around."

We admit that the above is one of the great needs of Greenville, but we would like to ask what Greenville is doing to bring such industries here? We have a good town which offers every advantage to those who would make Greenville their home and place of business, but our main trouble is that we appear to be satisfied in our knowledge of this fact, and are making no effort to let the outside world know it. Were our city to be classed among the dead no doubt a storm of protest would come from our citizens, yet every city that is wide-awake has a Chamber of Commerce or some form of commerce body to exploit its unsurpassed advantages. This, Greenville has not, except in name. We have a Chamber of Commerce only on paper, for since its organization it has done nothing and the president of the organization has been

unable to get even a quorum of the directors together long enough to employ a secretary despite several efforts to do so. So long as the business men of our city show no interest whatever in an organization designed to work for a greater Greenville, by telling the world what we have to offer, just so long will the world be ignorant of Greenville and those seeking places in which to locate will find their way to other communities.

Let's not pretend any longer. If we are to have a city, let us put our shoulder to the wheel to help make it so, or if we are satisfied to stand still, let us disband the now inactive Chamber of Commerce and worry no more about letting the outside world know that there is a GREENVILLE IN NORTH CAROLINA.

A FITTING RESTING PLACE

After every human and mechanical effort to rescue Floyd Collins alive from Sand Cave where for seventeen days he lay pinioned by a huge boulder, had failed, it was fitting that the natural rock tomb where he died should remain his final earthly resting place.

Reared in the cave section of Kentucky, as a child Collins found great delight in the numerous crevices and caverns of the vicinity and as a man he still clung to the fancy of his youth for nature's phenomena and made cave exploring his occupation. To his steel nerve and untiring efforts are due the pleasures which thousands of persons yearly enjoy viewing the scenic beauty of nature in caves discovered and explored by him.

It was while following his life work of exploring that Collins was trapped by the huge boulder that pinned him to earth where for days he valiantly fought his last battle with the grim reaper, confident that his fellowmen would be able to rescue him from the jaws of death.

It is a soldier's desire to rest on the field of battle where he falls and as a soldier of adventure and lover of nature, no doubt Collins's last resting place would be the spot where he fell in pursuance of his life work were it possible for his wishes to be known.

OPPOSES EXTENSION MAYOR'S JURISDICTION

Mr. Editor:
Please allow me the use of your Open Forum column to present to the public some of the reasons why the proposed bill giving to mayors the jurisdiction of a Recorder should not be enacted. There has been considerable agitation and propaganda used in order to secure the passage of this legislation, and our Representatives at the General Assembly have been bombarded with letters and petitions signed by good citizens, who, I am compelled to believe, have heard only one side of the question, and who do not realize the ill effects of this legislation they are asking to be passed. I am moved to write this article by a profound conviction that to give mayors of Pitt county jurisdiction concurrent with the county court, with appeals going directly to Superior Court, will aggravate the very conditions its advocates seek to lessen, will cost the county thousands of dollars, and will obstruct justice.

In the first place, Mr. Editor, a Mayor is not a proper person to act as a judge in cases where moral turpitude is involved, and the whole tendency in this state is towards separating the Mayor from any judicial authority whatever. In Kinston, in Rocky Mount, in Washington, and other near-by towns, the mayor is not required to try any case. In nearly every town in the state of any size, the people who believe in justice and a fair trial have realized that a mayor who hires and fires the policemen and who has the policemen under his direct control cannot possibly give a citizen an impartial trial with a conflict in testimony between the officers and the defendant. Every man is entitled to a fair and impartial trial, whatever offense he may be charged with, but in a mayor's court, in a case involving moral turpitude, the mayor must either take the evidence of his officer, or brand the officer as a man not worthy to be believed.

The inevitable result of giving mayors power to try such cases would be for many defendants to appeal. If the proposed law should pass, these cases would all be tried in Superior court, thus clogging the criminal docket with cases that are now settled in the county court, and in the interim between Superior Courts would fill the jail to the roof with defendants who could not raise a sufficient bond to bail them out pending the hearing of their appeal. There can be no justification for a law to enable the Town of Greenville to collect all the costs of such cases, when the county of Pitt would be the immediate sufferer. For every dollar that Greenville would get, it would cost Pitt county ten dollars, and I am not willing to sacrifice the finances of the county for the meagre costs that the Town would derive from such a law.

The petition which some five hundred citizens of Greenville signed stated that in order to expedite and properly administer justice, that the mayor should be given this proposed power, and that appeals should go directly to Superior Court. There could be no better way to hinder and delay justice than to send all cases directly from mayor's court, to Superior court. That is the device used now by those who desire to delay the trial of their causes. They avoid the county court by asking for a jury, by which means they get their cases transferred to the Superior Court. To ask that justice be expedited by sending all appeals to Superior Court would be laughable, were it not for the fact that hundreds of good citizens have signed the petition asking that it be done, and that the probabilities are that it will be done.

There can be no construction upon the clause regarding the administration of justice except the construction that the County Court is not properly administering justice. How-

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PUBLIC FORUM

To the Editor of The Reflector:

Having been out of town I did not until yesterday see the article by Mr. E. B. Higgs which appeared in your Public Forum of February 12th.

It is not my purpose to enter into a newspaper controversy and my principal reason for this article is to publicly correct an erroneous impression which Mr. Higgs says was created by your editorial of February 9th, in which you were supposed to have quoted me. I did not have occasion to read this editorial until some days later and then in such a hurried manner that I failed to notice the reference to the School Board. Had I noticed this I would have called attention to the mistake immediately.

As a matter of fact I have never mentioned any agreement between the School Board and Messrs. Higgs Bros. for the very good reason that I have never heard of any such agreement and did not even know of the contemplated purchase of said site until some time after same had been purchased. In fact I have never discussed any phase of this matter with any member of the School Board. What I did say was that Mr. Higgs and myself went upon the ground just prior to the time the proposed extension was published and in our discussion of the matter I pointed out to him that while the lot had been purchased just out of town by the School Board and as naturally city improvement would be expected for the new school building, we thought that at least one block in each direction beyond this building ought to be included. At this time I understood that Mr. Higgs after some discussion agreed to our proposal, but this has since turned out to be a mistake, due possibly to the name of a street.

Your mistake was a very natural one under the circumstances as you evidently did not understand that

the discussion between Mr. Higgs and myself took place only a few days ago.

With reference to the other part of Mr. Higgs' article I beg to state briefly:

That in figuring the three blocks in controversy to be six acres I did not include the streets and alleys as these although used for farming purpose while in the present state, really belong to the public and of course are not taxable.

That the estimated valuation of \$200 per acre is about in line with other values of like property and that \$1.00 per hundred of valuation is the additional tax that would have to be paid to the town, if incorporated.

Mr. Higgs seems to take the efforts of the Board to extend the corporate limits as a personal matter, and this we wish to disclaim. The new limits extend both east and west and involve various property owners. In fact the very line that is the bone of contention also takes in two blocks of the Greenville Storage Warehouse property along with the three blocks of Messrs. Higgs Bros. property. Could there be anything personal in this? The western limits of the town have not been extended for at least fifteen years. The proposed new limits ask for only two blocks or about 650 feet further west on Dickinson Avenue. Is there anything personal in this?

We further disclaim any desire to imply non-progressiveness on the part of Messrs. Higgs Bros. They have been a and are now valuable citizens, and without doubt are thoroughly conscientious in their position on this matter, as seen from their standpoint, likewise we who represent the tax payers of the town are conscientious and not personal in our efforts for the public weal, and ask only that degree of tolerance which we are at all times glad to grant those who disagree with us. Honest disagreement does not imply an intellectual dishonesty of purpose, nor carry with it insinuations regarding the opposing party. The Board

proposed one line and Messrs. Higgs Bros. proposed another. Representing different interests, we honestly disagreed, but because we sought to adjust the matter without acceding to their line is no evidence of personal feeling.

For the past four years the tax rate in Greenville has remained the same while others all around us have gone up. And this was accomplished even while making permanent improvements on streets, sewers, etc. During the past year \$200,000 in school bonds and \$100,000 in improvement bonds were issued. This will call for more revenue with which to pay interest, therefore the Board sought ways and means to avoid raising the rate next year. One means decided upon was the extension of the Corporate limits to include property that should justly contribute to the cost of improvements and conveniences enjoyed, and property enhanced in value by reason of same.

If the Board was in error about this and the citizens of the town prefer having the tax rate raised, to extending the corporate limits, I presume it will be immaterial to the Board, as neither the Board nor myself stand any manner of chance to gain anything personal by this undertaking, except unjust criticism.

My part in this matter as Mayor, is only to carry out as near as possible the wishes of the Board and act for what I conceive to be the best interest of the town as a whole. If this conflicts with the interest of

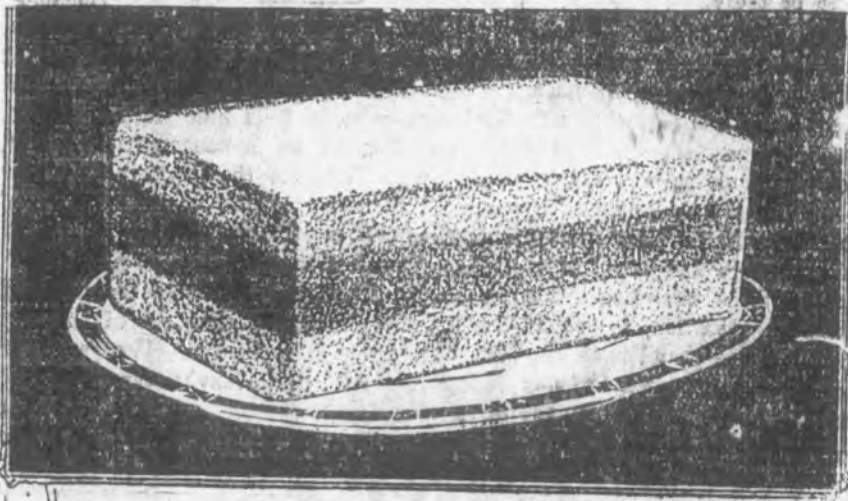

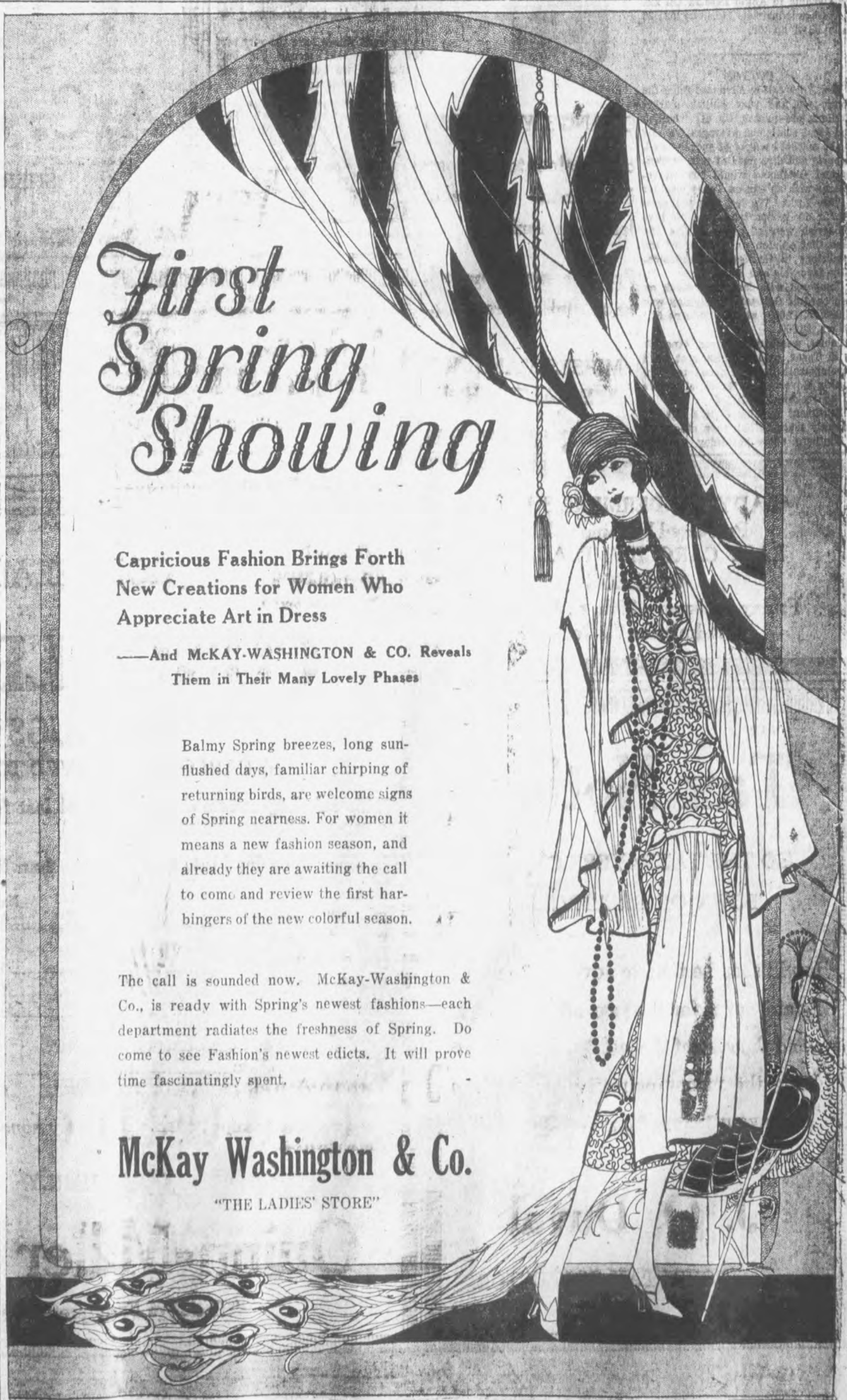

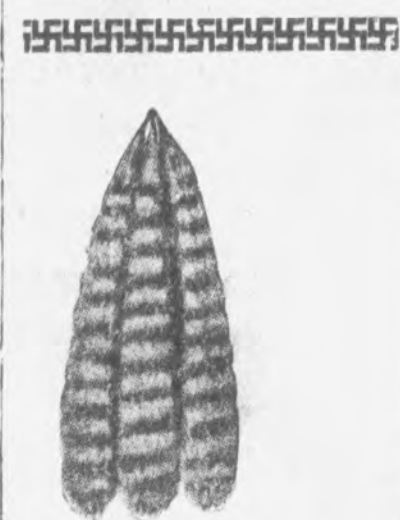
