SAYS BATTLESHIP IS MAIN FACTOR IN NATIONAL DEFENSE

Coolidge Accepts Findings of Naval Board That Air Power Cannot Supersede Battleships in Sea Warfare

Washington, Feb. 19.—Definite acceptance by President Coolidge, after careful inquiry of the Naval Department theory that air power can not supersede battleships at sea, is implied in his announced \$30,000,000 naval program for the present and ensuing years, now before Congress. This was disclosed in publication today of the report of the Naval General Board, acting as a special board of inquiry by the President's direction on military value of aircraft, submarines and battleships along with a statement showing the basis of the statements he has forwarded to Congress.

The board recommended immediate modernization of six of the old battleships, as requirements of the navy, but the President cut the number to three ships, and another recommendation for the modernizing of seven other battleships "as soon as possible."

In the board's recommendation for prompt completion of the new aircraft carriers and their planes, as the second step the President concurred. Where the board recommended building "without delay" the eight 10,000-ton cruisers already authorized, the President reduced this number to two ships to be started at once.

As fifth on its priority list, the board submitted the following recommendation for which no provision has been made in the President's program: "that a progressive and adequate airplane building program be authorized to increase the fleet in complete outfit of up-to-date planes with 50 per cent replacements in reserve, as well as the necessary training plans at a total expenditure for the first year of \$20,000,000."

The program before Congress was proposed in an effort to carry out the board's six recommendations for laying down in 1927 of the three fleet submarines, already authorized. While the seventh provision authorizing the building of a 23,000 ton additional aircraft carrier was substituted by the President with a provision to start work on a group of gun boats, already authorized for patrol work on Chinese Rivers. In his statement, the President said, that did not feel that the expenditures recommended by the board were warranted at the present time.

616 Applicants Placed for Work During Last Week

Raleigh, Feb. 19.—Six hundred and sixteen applicants for work were placed by the six offices of the State and Federal Employment Service, according to the weekly report of the department made public today by Frank D. Grist, Commissioner of Labor and Printing. Of this number 476 were men and 140 were women.

Labor conditions throughout the State are practically normal, according to the report, although the registrations for the week exceed the number placed by the department. The registrations for the week totaled 819, of which number 608 are men and 211 women. Requests for help numbered 757 and a total of 694 applicants were referred.

The placements for the week are classified as follows: Skilled, 87; unskilled, 370; clerical and professional, 29; industrial, 0; domestic, 124; total 616.

Dawes Expects to Take it Easy

Chicago, Feb. 19.—Charles G. Dawes, Vice President elect, plans to spend his first six months in office at his ease, he has announced in connection with his arrangements. After he assumes office, he will stay in Washington only long enough to familiarize himself with his work, and then he will return to Evanston, a suburb, to loaf and smoke during the summer months.

PRESIDENT URGES ABOLISHMENT OF INHERITANCE TAX

Declares That Total Levies On Inheritance Closely Approaches Confiscation

Washington, Feb. 19.—Gradual withdrawal of the government from the inheritance tax field, and greater economy and tax collections, were recommended for public consideration by President Coolidge in an address at the opening session today of the National Tax Association Inheritance and State Conferences. The President condemned the measure, which amounted in its highest bracket, to 40 per cent, declaring that in some instances, which with the state levies "closely approaches as it is in actual confiscation."

If we are to adopt socialism, it should be presented to the citizens of the country as socialism, and not under a guise to collect revenue. The people are quite unable to determine for themselves the desirability of a particular public policy and do not ask to have such policies forced upon them by indirection.

Establishment of "Economy income of revenue" is an equal necessity with economy in the out go of revenue. Mr. Coolidge said, adding the first field for the practice of economy in inheritance tax collections lay in state corporation.

Declaring there is "competition between states to reach inheritance taxes, not only from the property of its own citizens, but the property of citizens of other states." The President, by way of illustration, showed how a share of stock, upon the death of its owner might be made subject to seven separate and distinct inheritance taxes by the Federal and various state governments.

200 Gallon Still Captured Stokestown Section Yesterday

Chief of Police Moore, of Ayden, with Deputy Sheriff Seymour, on yesterday visited the Stokestown section about ten miles of Ayden and captured a two hundred gallons capacity steam plant still located in a weed thicket on the Hooker place. A well trodden path was followed leading the officers to the home of Noah Leary, negro, who resides on the Hooker farm.

Leary was arrested and with the still was brought to Greenville. One thousand gallons of beer which were to be used for the manufacture of corn whiskey were poured out. This is one of the biggest hauls made in this section in several months.

MUSCLE SHOALS IS AGAIN THE SUBJECT OF SENATE DEBATE

Conferees' Report on Underwood Muscle Shoals Leasing Bill Comes Up in Senate Today for Action

Washington, Feb. 19.—The fight in the Senate against the adoption of the Conference Report on the Underwood Muscle Shoals leasing bill was opened today when Senator Norris, Republican of Nebraska, and leader of the opposition, raised a point of order against the report.

Senator Norris declared that the conferees had no real right to go outside of the Senate bill because the House passed a bill to lease the property to Henry Ford, who has since withdrawn his offer. "Technically, he declared, today did not have a right to have under consideration both Senate and House bills.

British Ambassador To Be Invited to Visit Wilmington

Wilmington, Feb. 19.—Sir Esme Howard, British Ambassador to the United States, who will present the cornerstone for Flora MacDonald College in behalf of the King of England, has been invited by Walter P. Sprunt, British Vice Consul at the port of Wilmington, to visit this city after his visit to Red Springs in May, it was announced here today.

The secretary of the local Chamber of Commerce, has addressed a letter to Sir Esme, asking him to come here, and Mayor Katherine Cowan has also signified her intention of extending an invitation to the ambassador to include this city in his itinerary.

New Zealanders Love Raisins. Fresno, Cal.—New Zealand eats more raisins per capita than any other country, according to a statement issued by a raisin growers' organization here.

Residents of New Zealand average 4.40 pounds of raisins, and 1.20 pounds of currants every year. England eats 1.85 pounds of raisins and 2.77 pound, of currants, to each person annually. England's large consumption of currants is attributed to their wide use in sweet breads, cakes and puddings.

In the United States, the per capita consumption of raisins is 2.96 pounds, and that of currants only .34 of a pound.

SEES FLOTATION LOAN IN AMERICA AS SALVATION OF FRANCE

Paris, Feb. 19.—A promise of \$100,000,000 loan for the improvement of French finances, and another \$35,000,000 for the devastated regions to be floated in the United States as soon as the budget is definitely balanced and voted, was one of the remedies for France's troubled financial and economic situation, advanced by Finance Minister, Clementel, in an address before the Chamber of Deputies today.

DR McLEES DECLARES VISION NECESSARY SUCCESSFUL LIFE

"How May We Find Out God's Plan for Our Life," Subject of Last Night's Sermon

The attendance at the revival meeting at the Presbyterian church continues to increase in interest, the attendance at the services yesterday being larger than before. Dr. McLees preached a great sermon last evening on the subject, announced "How may we find out God's plan for our life." He said that a life with no vision would never amount to much as all great people have had their vision before succeeding. That any life that made its own plan instead of looking to God for his plan for the life would fail. He said that anyone who wanted to know what God's plan for his life was could find it out just as Abraham, Moses and Paul did, and oftentimes our plan and God's were far different. We can find out God's plan for our lives by surrendering ourselves to Him first, then in His Word which is His voice speaking to us, by seeking it in prayer, and by Providential leadings as well as by His Spirit. He then urged us to seek to know God's plan for our lives, knowing that His plan is far better than our could ever be.

The crowd at the night service overflowed into the side room, and chairs had to be used in addition. It was announced that if the crowd became too big, the Methodists had kindly offered their church for use which would be accepted if the attendance was equal or greater this evening.

At the morning's service this morning, Dr. McLees spoke on "Witnessing for Christ" in which he gave the command of Christ in Acts 1:8 and the obedience to that command in Acts 8:4. He said that our business in life as Christians is to witness for Christ, and that by our lives each day we are witnessing either for Him or against Him. That we are the only Bibles that some people read, that we are letters that are known and read by all men; that we are to begin at home, then in our own town, to the towns next us, and finally to the ends of the earth in our witnessing. It is possible for those who profess Christ here to turn the world upside down even as the few disciples of the early church did.

WOULD PREVENT THE FLOTATION OF LOANS TO DEBTOR NATIONS

Seeks to Prohibit Floating Loans in America for Countries Which Have Not Agreed on Debt Funding

Washington, Feb. 19.—A resolution designed to prevent flotation of loans in the United States to France or any other nation that had failed to reach an agreement with the American government for funding of its war debt, was introduced today by Representative Blanton, Democrat of Texas. Machinery of the Federal Reserve Board would be brought in to play in enforcing the measure.

Chief Figures in News Spotlight

Equal rights for peacemakers are being fought by Viscount Astor, who has introduced a bill to give sons of the House of Lords to women holding peerages in their own names. When Henry Clews, Jr., grandson of the late millionaire New York banker, sailed on the Mauretania, for Europe, Baron Willy Drotte, an interpreter dancer, and Miss Vera Leightner, of Great Neck, L. I., were left on the dock, though their trunks went along. They declared Clews had invited them to go as his guests, but failed to furnish tickets. Young Clews' grandmother denied he had promised to furnish them transportation, declaring they were held up by lack of passports. Colonel Robert E. Olds, of New York, wartime European director of the American Red Cross, has accepted a position on a League of Nations committee to report on a plan for forming an international federation of mutual assistance in the relief of peoples oppressed by disaster.

GEN MITCHELL AGAIN STORAGE WAREHOUSE APPEARS BEFORE THE OF QUINN-MILLER CO. HOUSE COMMITTEE DESTROYED BY FIRE

Officials Deny Knowledge of Alleged Summons of Gen. Mitchell to the White House

Washington, Feb. 19.—Instead of going to the White House today for his much advertised "reprimand" from President Coolidge, Brigadier General Mitchell appeared once more before the House Aircraft Committee and reaffirmed his opposition to the administration's aircraft policies.

Before he took the stand, the general disclaimed all connections with the report of the White House summons, which broke up yesterday's court meeting. Court members, who received the report by telephone yesterday refused to say who had been their informant, but indicated that their source of information was from some interested person at the executive end of Pennsylvania Avenue. Both the White House and the offices of the Secretary of War denied flatly that any such information had been issued.

After hearing General Mitchell, the committee unanimously adopted the resolution to recall Secretary Weeks for further questioning on the adequacy of our national defense against an air attack.

England to Have Larger Air Force

London, Feb. 19.—Parliament will be asked to sanction an expenditure of 21,319,300 pounds for an air force during the financial year 1925-26, the Air Secretary announced today. This is an increase of 1,927,300 over last year's estimate.

While the service, itself, only asked 15,512,000 pounds, the secretary explained that the Colonial Offices asked 316,700 for air use in Palestine, Trans Jordan, and Iraq. The Admiralty wants 1,320,000 pounds for the fleet air arms, and the army appropriation takes care of the balance of the total request. The Air Secretary takes care of the balance of the total request. The Air Secretary plans an increase in the invested personnel from 35,000 to 36,000, and the addition of seven more completely equipped home defense squadrons, making a total of 25. The fleet arms will be increased by 4 additional flights.

Building and Contents Total Loss Estimated at \$10,000 Partially Covered by Insurance

The Storage Warehouse belonging to Quinn-Miller and Company, was destroyed by fire yesterday afternoon at 5:30 o'clock. The estimated loss is \$10,000, partially covered by insurance.

Mr. L. A. Stroud and Mr. J. N. Quinn, of Kingston, were in the warehouse taking inventory. Mr. Quinn was on the balcony taking the number of chairs and struck a match to examine a coat tag.

The match broke and dropped in some excelsior causing a blaze which could not be checked. Mr. Quinn had a narrow escape from receiving serious burns. In fact his clothes were scorched and he received minor burns.

After the fire a watchman was placed at the warehouse, and this morning at 4 o'clock he discovered that fire had again broken out in the warehouse. The firemen responded to the call and the flames were quickly extinguished.

The furniture in the warehouse wrapped in paper and excelsior, burned quickly, and although the firemen responded immediately, the fire had gained such headway that it was impossible to save either the furniture or the building.

Declares That Sugar Refining Would Be Feasible in Wilmington

Wilmington, Feb. 19.—In discussing the possibility of the location of a sugar refinery at Wilmington, Jacksonville, or Savannah, I. N. Whitfield, United States Consul in Cuba, recently declared that he believed such a project would be feasible for the local port and that it would ultimately result in making Wilmington a port of greater importance. "If you do not have trade, what would be the use of port terminals at Wilmington?" said Mr. Whitfield. "What you need here first is trade—not terminals."

EVOLUTION DEBATE CONSUMES TIME OF THE LEGISLATURE

House Adopts Poole Resolution Going On Record as Opposing Teaching of Evolution in Schools of State

Raleigh, Feb. 19.—The Poole resolution to place the General Assembly of North Carolina on record as opposing the teaching of Darwinism or any other theory of evolution linking man with any lower orders of life, was carried in the House today on its second reading and final action with a vote of 67 to 46, came after the motion to suspend the rules and consider the substitute measure by Connor, of Wilson, had failed passage and the Connor resolution had gone to the committee on education.

Raleigh, Feb. 19.—The Legislature today marked time in consideration of state-wide legislation, while the House debated the Poole Resolution, designed to place the legislature on record as opposing the teaching of evolution in the schools of the state. In the Senate a measure was passed on its final reading without discussion, which would set a new scale of licenses for professional fishermen. The bill was amended in the committee so as to exempt amateur fishermen from its provision, and the amendment was accepted. According to the author of the measure, the license will be increased about 50 per cent over those in effect. The upper House got down to consideration of Senator Harris' bill to repeal the taxes of private hospitals doing charity work. After one half hour debate, the measure was overwhelmingly defeated, and the Senate passed on to consideration of the bill before it designed to strengthen the banking laws of the state. In the House, Representative Connor, of Wilson, opened debate on the Poole resolution, by sending forward a substitute, which he said had the approval of many opponents and proponents of the Poole measure, and it would place the body on record as against the teaching or criticism, by any state employee, civil or military, of any doctrine designed to reflect on the religious belief, religious book, or religion of an citizen. Consideration of the Poole resolution was preceded by an introduction of 30 local bills, and a state-wide measure by Senator Madison, which would abolish corporal punishment in state schools. This measure was introduced at the request of Ralph Simerson, a page of the House. Mr. Connor, after introducing his substitute, stated to the House that he had read and heard the criticism of Dr. William Chase, President of the University of North Carolina for appearing before the House Committee, which returned an unfavorable report on the Poole Bill, opposing its passage. He declared, he was chairman of the committee, wished to assume responsibility for Dr. Chase's appearance, as both, he and Dr. Brooks, President of N. C. State College, had been invited by the committee, as they were the heads of the two largest institutions to be affected by the House measure. Representative Poole rose to a position of personal privilege to oppose the Connor resolution, declaring, if the measure is to be eliminated, I wish it defeated on straight vote and not by substitute, which would destroy its intention. Among others who spoke on the measure were Representatives Murphy, of Rowan; Alexander, of Mecklenburg; Braswell, of Nash; Whitaker, of Guilford; Womble, of Forsyth; and Wright, of Guilford. Shortly after one o'clock the debate was still in progress, with a number of representatives having been recognized in order, and placed on a list to speak on the measure.

LEAGUE OF NATIONS SEEKS BETTER PHYSICAL TRAINING

Gen. va.—Coordinating the national battles against disease and delivering sledge hammer blows against those maladies which still seem to defy medical skill constitutes the essence of the future program of the League of Nations in its public health activities.

The league's health section has just closed a successful year. It has extended its sphere of action, improved, completed and defined its technical equipment and has carried out with increasing success its special task, that of giving effective help to the various national administrations in their campaign against epidemic diseases and their attempt, to improve public health.

In the coming year special attention will be given to instruction in health and social medicine in Europe, America and Japan, together with the development and extension of physical training, with the object of securing the general adoption of rational methods of physical education.

Stale Bread Routed.

Pully, Switzerland, Feb. 14.—Jean Matti, a baker of this village, claims to have discovered a method of keeping bread fresh for two years. After bread has been baked in the ordinary way, Matti merely puts it again into an oven which has a temperature of 104 degrees Fahrenheit. Experts who have investigated Matti's bread say that specimen, which he turned over to them 11 months ago are still fresh and edible.

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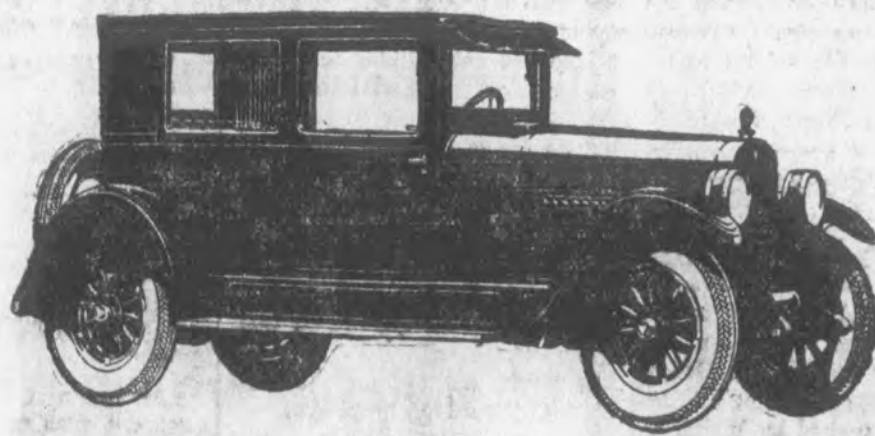

44 Training Schools To Be Conducted By Methodists in March

Nashville, Tenn., Feb. 18.—During the month of March, 1925, there will be forty-four standard training schools, conducted under the auspices of the general Sunday school board of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, according to an announcement made today by J. G. Schisler, of the department of training work. These schools are included in the chain of 260 similar schools held at various points in Southern Methodist territory under the direction of the Sunday School Board. One hundred and fifty schools are scheduled for completion by June 1.

From February 22 to March 7, there will be twelve schools held as follows: February 22-28, Petersburg, Va.; Ardmore, Okla.; Fort Worth, Texas; Tallahassee, Fla.; Knoxville, Tenn.; Shelby, North Carolina; Centerville, Tenn.

March 1-7: Wilson, N. C.; Braden, Fla.; Darlington, S. C.; Waxahatchie, Texas; Muskogee, Oklahoma.

Standard training schools will be held in local centers up to June 1, and during the months of July and August there will be conducted two denominational-wide training centers at Lake Junaluska, N. C., and Mt. Seayash, Ark., says Mr. Schisler.

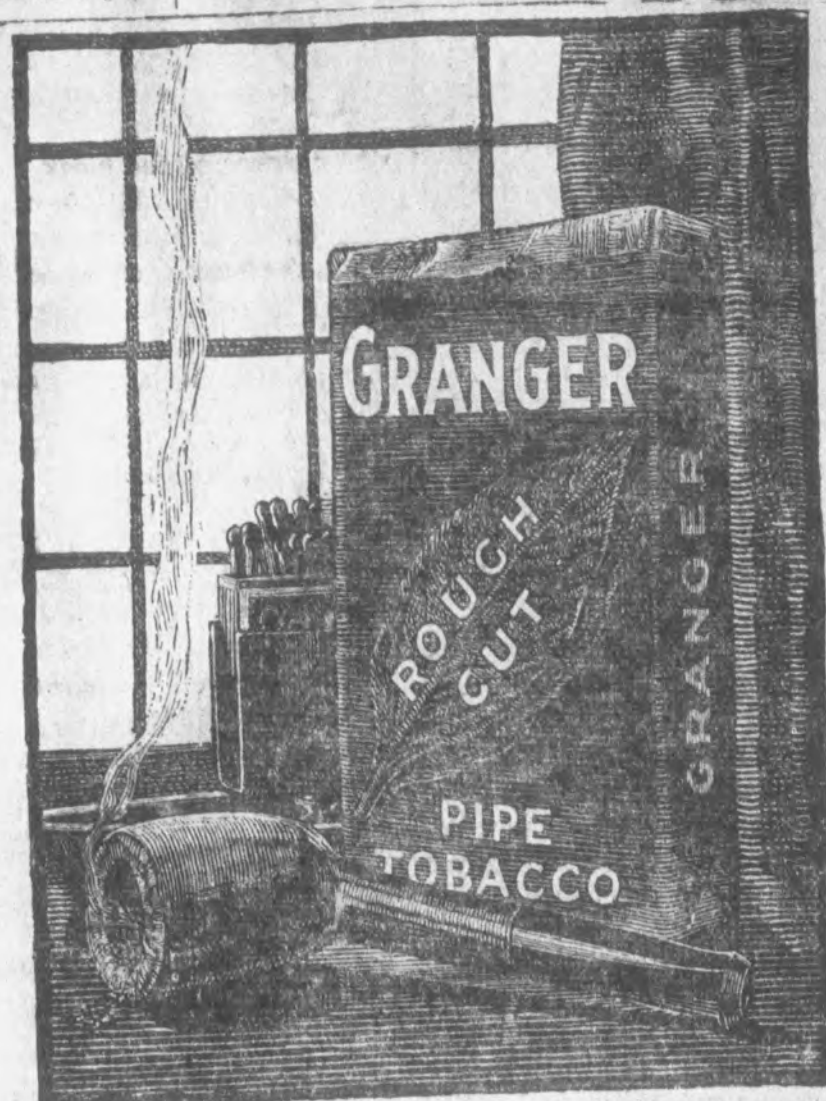

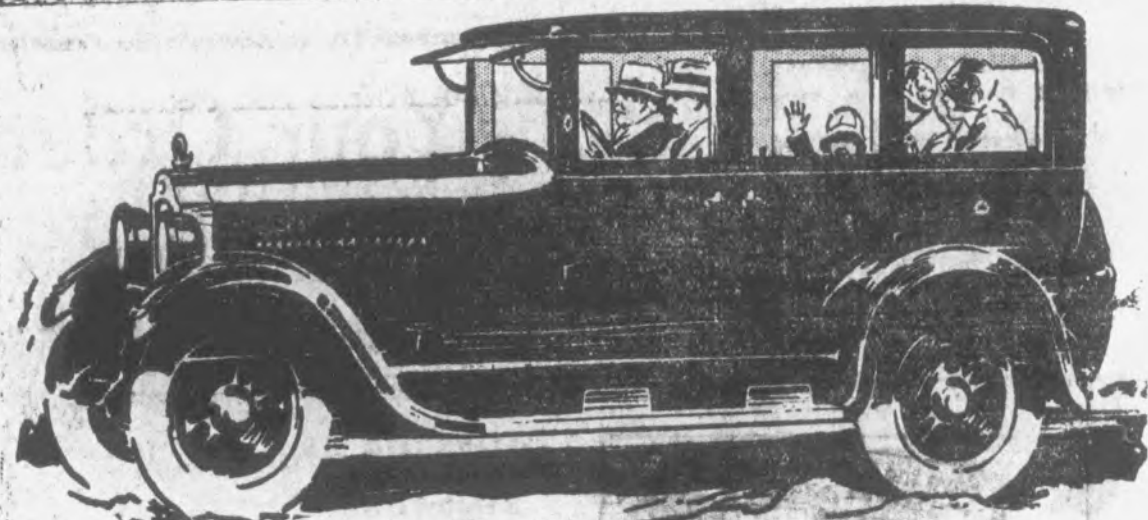

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PASSING THE BUCK

As usual the aged game of passing the buck comes into play ere any controversy is ended and the present controversy over the proposed extension of the city limits is no exception to the rule.

In a recent editorial we stated that we were informed by the Mayor that Messrs. Higgs Brothers had agreed to the extension of the city limits as now proposed before the purchase of the site upon which the new city school building is being erected. It now develops, according to the statement of Mayor D. M. Clark, appearing in this paper yesterday, that he did not mention nor imply any such agreement between Messrs. Higgs Brothers and the School Board and that the purchase of the school site was unknown to him and that the School Board had no part in the proposed extension of the city limits.

It is not our intention to create an erroneous impression and we have no desire to misquote anyone in connection with the controversy and therefore we relate the circumstances upon which was based our statement as to what the Mayor said regarding the agreement. The writer was going over the proposed extensions with the Mayor for the purpose of learning all facts in the case including the points of controversy. With the map of the city showing the present corporate limits and the proposed extensions each new boundary was discussed.

When the point was brought up that the new school building was being erected outside

side the city limits although the bulk of the money expended was that of the taxpayers of the city, Mayor Clark stated that Higgs Brothers had formerly agreed to the proposed extensions, but now that it had come to a showdown they had appeared before the Board of Aldermen with different maps showing different boundaries. With a map of the city before him, Mayor Clark pointed out the street adjacent to the new school which Higgs Brothers were now willing should be made the city boundary, but declared that under the former agreement they had expressed their willingness that the line should extend the distance of one block beyond the new school building which would bring into the city three more blocks of their property. Since the location of the school was the topic under discussion at this time, it was natural that we should have understood that this agreement was made to or for the benefit of the School Board as it was that body which had the power to select and purchase a site for the new building.

Since our statement as to the existence of this previous agreement it has become a bone of contention and it now appears that the school or School Board has never been mentioned and that the agreement was entirely between the Mayor, acting for the Board of Aldermen and not the School Board, and was effected only a few days before the statement was made by the Mayor. In other words "the buck has been passed to us" and now it would appear that we quoted as a fact something which had not taken place, just because we felt that such an agreement should have been made prior to the building of the school.

We are absolutely willing to shoulder our responsibilities, and if we are in error as to the previous agreement we are more than glad to shoulder this error, but in case our statement as to such an agreement regarding the extension to include the city school was a misquotation, we find it necessary that the buck should once more be passed and this time to the School Board or such other board as is responsible to the citizens of Greenville for using their money to erect a school building outside the corporate limits of the town and in such a place that it now appears that at best the corporate limits can be extended just far enough to squeeze the school building inside the city's limits and leave property across the street outside.

voice their opposition solely on the ground that if this bill is passed they fear that the Mayor would not be as lenient with criminals as the Judge of the County Court. The County Solicitor would draw the same salary and would have less work to do. The Solicitor who prosecutes the criminals is opposed to the bill because he fears the Mayor will turn the criminals loose without punishment, and the lawyers who defend the criminals are opposed to the bill because they fear that the Mayor will turn none of them loose and be too harsh on all. Why the Solicitor should become the spokesman for these conflicting fears in opposition to this bill is a paradox I am unable to understand.

If any one has any real reasons why the Mayor should be denied jurisdiction over town cases equal and concurrent with the County Court except that the criminals will have less chance to escape just punishment, that person owes the people of this community the duty to lay those reasons before the public.

PUBLIC FORUM

FAVORS GIVING MAYOR JURISDICTION OF RECORDER

Mr. Editor:

Believing that the proposal to give the Mayor of Greenville equal and concurrent jurisdiction with the County Court as to cases originating in Greenville would be beneficial to law enforcement in our community, I must confess that I am one of the five hundred or more citizens who signed the petition asking our General Assembly to give this power to the Mayor. I am fairly well conversant with local conditions effecting the administration of law and I know the invisible powers and influences that are constantly present and eternally attempting to block the road to justice. These secret powers and influences are always busy and are even now trying to camouflage and muddy the waters of public sentiment by parading before the public warning of dangers that do not exist. I have given the matter some thought and with all the facts before me I am unable to see any new dangers in this bill to the well-being of the community, either moral or financial. Any objection that can be lodged against the Mayor in his official capacity as a Recorder can with equal force be made against the Judge of the County Court in his official capacity, as both would have the same jurisdiction as to cases originating in Greenville and the same power with the same right on the part of defendants to appeal. Why should it be said to be more dangerous to permit a Mayor who is elected by the people of Greenville to deal with the violators of the law in Greenville, than it is for the Judge of the County Court who is elected by the whole county and who might be susceptible to influences outside of Greenville which might be antagonistic to its best interests?

I have read with a great deal of interest the article in yesterday's Reflector by Mr. J. C. Lanier, County Solicitor, in opposition to enlarging the power of the Mayor. He seems to be much excited over the fact that the Mayor would be given authority to dispose of liquor cases originating in the town of Greenville and that the jail would be filled to the roof with poor innocent bootleggers and other violators of the law who would be dissatisfied with

justice as administered by the Mayor and who would be unable to give bond pending their appeal to the Superior Court. It is well known that the right of appeal exists in the County Court and is it not strange that the jail is not now filled with defendants who appealed from the County Court especially in view of the fact that we have such a vigorous prosecutor to uphold and defend the law in said court?

Mr. Lanier says that it will cost the county thousands of dollars and will obstruct justice. How can it cost the county thousands of dollars? What facts does he give to substantiate such statement? He gives none. The only money the county could lose would be the court costs in town cases and why should not the town be entitled to this small amount when it maintains the Police Department at its own expense? In what way can the Mayor obstruct justice? Mr. Lanier says that a Mayor is not a proper person to try a case involving moral turpitude because he would believe the testimony of police officers instead of those charged with the violation of law. I wonder if Mr. Lanier thinks that the County Judge would discredit the officers of the law and believe those who violate the law instead? Surely, the County Prosecutor of those who violate the law, does not believe that the police officers of the town of Greenville are a gang of huns unworthy of belief and are seeking to persecute innocent victims who have done no wrong nor violated any law? As to there being no right of appeal from the

Mayor except by defendants, Mr. Lanier knows that this is true of any criminal court, the defendant always having the right to appeal. So, the only way the Mayor could obstruct justice would be to turn loose guilty bootleggers and other violators of the law, and in the event that this happened would it be any worse upon the community for the Mayor to turn them loose without punishment than it would be for the County Court to do so?

Mr. Lanier is not very consistent in his argument. He blows both hot and cold. He first fears that the Mayor of Greenville would believe the police officers instead of law violators and be too harsh on innocent bootleggers and others who have no respect for the law, and with the next breath he fears that the Mayor would turn loose all the bootleggers, debauch justice and make a mockery of the efforts of the officers of the law to clean up the bootleggers of the community. I ask in all earnestness and fairness is there any more danger that the Mayor would do this than the Judge of the County Court?

I desire to state that there is nothing personal in this article either in favor of Mr. Clark the Mayor, nor against Mr. Lanier, the Solicitor. I am discussing official matters only and such as concerns the public. I simply can not understand the reasoning and the logic of the situation which places the one officer of the county charged with the prosecution of law violators, in becoming the chief spokesman in opposition to a bill opposed chiefly by those who defend violators of the law, and who

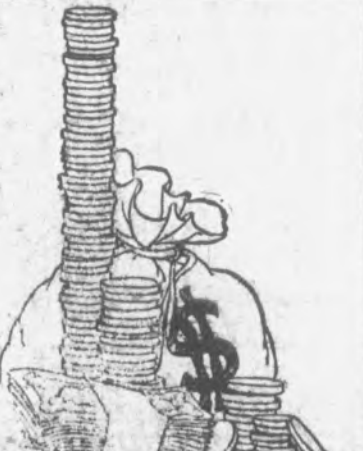
