RESOLUTION ADOPTED ASKING INVESTIGATION FISHERIES PRODUCTS CO.

Everett's Resolution Is Adopted by Senate Under Suspension of Rules, Sent to House for Concurrence

Raleigh, Feb. 20.—An investigation of the affairs of the North Carolina Fisheries Products Company is requested to be made by the Attorney General of North Carolina in a joint resolution received and adopted by the North Carolina Senate today. The resolution was sent to the House for concurrence.

In the House the most important measure was a bill sent forward by Braswell of Nash, designed to amend the charters of co-operative associations so as to allow members the privilege of withdrawal. Favorable reports were returned on the executive budget bill, and that to exclude Bunham County from the provisions of the absentee voters law.

Both Houses recessed shortly after the noon hour to meet again for a joint session at which the trustees of the University and of State were elected. Acting on request, Woodley, of Moore county, sent forward a measure designed to regulate bathing suits. The measure would specify how far up and how far down a bathing suit shall come, and would provide penalties for those who would not wear suits in accordance with the regulations. It was to bar the use of bathing suits except at swimming pools and at beaches, and it would be against the law for any one to appear on state roads or highways wearing a bathing suit.

Senator Everett, of Pitt, introduced the bill calling for an investigation of the Fisheries Products Company, of Wilmington. The measure went on its immediate passage under suspension of the rules. Senator Grant, of Davis, requested the author to allow him to amend the bill so as to provide investigations of the Paul Rubber Company, of Salisbury, and Baile Bros. Tobacco Company, of Winston-Salem, but Senator Everett suggested that another resolution be introduced to provide for these investigations.

Facts Concerning the Cotton Industry In North Carolina

Catawba county has sixteen cotton manufacturing plants, with a combined capital of approximately \$9,539,860.

There cotton mills are located at the following points: Brookford, Newton, Hickory, Long, Malden and Newton.

C. A. Brown, J. W. Abernathy, G. N. Hutton, G. H. Geitner, L. C. Wagner, W. B. Murray, G. L. Ainsmith, J. A. Abernathy, Sr., J. P. Young and S. J. Plymmer are the presidents of the cotton mills in Catawba county.

Chatham county has two cotton mills, one at Pittsboro and one at Siler City. These two mills have a combined capital stock of \$255,890.

The presidents of the Chatham county mills are J. A. Ode, and W. G. Sydnor.

Chowan county has one cotton mill, which is located at Edenton. This firm has a capital stock of \$250,000, and Frank Wood is president. Twenty-one mills are located in Cleveland county, eleven at Kings Mountain, one at Lawndale, and eight at Shelby.

The Cleveland county mills have a capital stock of \$5,347,000.

The presidents of the cotton mills in Cleveland county are J. S. Mauney, F. Dilling, A. G. Myers, W. A. Mauney, C. E. Neslier, J. C. Mason, R. H. Johnston, E. A. Smith, L. A. Kiser, John F. Schenck, J. J. McCurry, C. C. Blanton, A. W. McMurry, and J. R. Dwyer.

Cumberland county has seven cotton mills, one located at Cumberland five at Fayetteville, one at Hope Mills.

The Cumberland county mills have a capital stock of \$2,288,000. The presidents of these mills are J. M. Butler, E. H. Williamson, John Tolar, Robert Lassiter, and D. Ambassador Kellogg, who is now on his way to the United States.

Quit Cabinet?

According to Washington reports, Secretary of War John Weeks and Secretary of the Navy Curtis D. Wilbur have threatened to resign from the Coolidge Cabinet unless Brig. Gen. William Mitchell is discharged as Assistant Chief of the Army Air Service and thus automatically reduced to a colonelcy. Mitchell has bitterly attacked both secretaries in his demand for a unified air service.

NEVADA WOULD GO BACK TO FIRING SQUAD EXECUTION

Proposed Measure Declares Shooting More Humane Than Present Lethal Gas Form of Execution

Reno, Nev., Feb. 20.—Substituting of shooting for gas in legal executions would be provided in a bill introduced in the Nevada Legislature. It has the endorsement of the warden of the state prison. Until the passage of the lethal gas law, condemned persons in Nevada were allowed to choose either hanging or the firing squad. "Execution by lethal gas is atrocious," said Warden Dickerson. "I am convinced, from my experience, that either hanging or shooting is more humane, and that shooting is least objectionable from a humanitarian view point." Dickerson was United States Superintendent of prisons under President Wilson.

Says England Is Willing to Cooperate Naval Situation

Washington, Feb. 20.—Unofficial reports of British willingness to cooperate towards the limitation of the Naval Auxiliary Craft, for the new Army Conference, were received by officers here today with gratifications. Similar expressions of co-operation from Paris and other capitals will be awaited before any steps of a formal kind, relating to the question of time and place for the conference, can be given any serious consideration. No detailed information on the subject has been received here from R. Tolar, Robert Lassiter, and D. Ambassador Kellogg, who is now on his way to the United States.

CHASE REPLIES TO CRITICISM OF HIS RECENT STATEMENT

Head of State University Declares Institution Stands for Constructive and Not Destructive Teaching

Chapel Hill, Feb. 20.—"The University stands for constructive and not destructive teaching. It makes every attempt to surround its students with influences that make morality and religion." This statement was issued by Dr. Chase, president of the University, last night, as a comment on the recent committee meeting of the General Assembly, which considered the Poole Anti-evolution resolution. "It has been reported that during the public hearing on the resolution, before the committee, I held that the teaching of Atheism was a matter of conscience," Dr. Chase said.

"Such a sentiment is wholly foreign to my whole velocity of a teacher." "I do not believe, that for one moment, a teacher would be tolerated who teaches or advocates such a doctrine, and I am glad to say that at the University there is no one that does. To the best of my recollection, I stated in reply to a question regarding the teaching of Atheism and Bolshevism that no statutes existed regarding the teaching of these. I believe this to be a fact. But to my mind, the conduct of a teacher teaching or advocating such doctrines, is positively reprehensible, and a grave abuse of the position of trust."

TO INVESTIGATE DEATH STUDENTS

Governor Ohio Orders Another Investigation In Connection With Poisoning of University Students

Columbus, Ohio, Feb. 20.—Governor Vick Donahy today requested Mathew M. Neford, secretary of the Ohio State Board of Pharmacy, to conduct a personal investigation of the poisoning of several of the Ohio State University students here several weeks ago, with a view to prosecute the person, or persons, responsible for the alleged laxity in the conduct of the University dispensary.

Burke and Renault in Ten Round Bout Fort Bragg Tonight

Fort Bragg, Feb. 20.—Charlie Burke, Marine heavyweight, who meets Jack Renault, of Canada, in the main bout of ten rounds here tonight, ended his week of training yesterday, and is spending the time in keeping in just the right condition to face his contender here. Followers of the sport state that if Burke should happen to slip over the knockout blow on his opponent tonight and lay low the lion of Moravia for the count of ten, he will be in line for place in the class of ten selected by Tex Richard as probable contenders for Dempsey's crown.

Burke, it is said, has lost only one decision, that being to Sandy Seifer at Madison Square Garden last November. Burke, his friends aver, was forced to go ahead in the match with a badly sprained ankle, which is given by his manager as the reason why his showing was not especially wonderful in this match. He has several knockout victories to his credit, among them being Joe White, Alabama heavyweight, and Jack Townsend, negro, of Chicago.

Interest is being manifested by local fans in the Mayle-McCune bout, McCune, it is said, is the best heavyweight Mayle has yet faced. The Indian made a trip to Paris as America's amateur heavyweight representative, but was not permitted to enter the ring where the Olympic Games were staged.

FIVE PERSONS KILLED AND FOURTEEN INJURED IN TROLLEY CAR WRECK

MANILA, P. I., Feb. 20.—Five persons, including two army officers, were killed early today, and 14 others, including two men and a lieutenant, were injured, when a runaway trolley car dashed out of control from the peak of Corregidor Island, in the entrance to Manila Bay. The car jumped, and overturned on a sharp turn and pinned many of the dead and injured beneath it. Major John H. Hunter, and Lieutenant-Colonel Robert E. Herring, were the army officers killed in the accident. Major Herring saved many from leaping from the speeding car by clinging to the running board and holding them back. The car was running along the edge of a cliff, and had any jumped they would have met certain death in falling to the bottom.

SARTAIN AND RIEHL CONVICTED CHARGE RECEIVING BRIBES

Riehl Given One Year, and Sartain One Year and Six Months; Will Seek New Trial

Atlanta, Ga., Feb. 20.—Following conviction of Arthur E. Sartain, former warden, and Laurence Riehl, of Columbus, Ohio, on charges of conspiracy to accept and receive bribes, and acquittal of Louis J. Fletcher, former deputy warden, on the same charge, in the United States Court here today, and after attorneys for Sartain and Riehl had announced that they would seek a new trial, Sartain was sentenced by Judge Erwin to serve one year and six months in the Atlanta Federal Penitentiary.

Riehl was sentenced to serve one year and one day, the court announcing that it was taking into consideration the fact that Riehl was not an officer of the United States Government at the time of the alleged crime. The court reported former announcement of a motion of a new trial, and served bail of \$5,000 each, pending action on the application for a new trial.

Atlanta, Ga., Feb. 20.—After 15 hours of deliberation in the United States Court here today, Arthur E. Sartain and Laurence Riehl were convicted by a jury on a charge of conspiracy to accept bribes. Louis J. Fletcher was acquitted.

The three defendants were charged with conspiracy to receive bribes from wealthy inmates of the Atlanta Federal Penitentiary, where Sartain was warden, and Fletcher was deputy warden. Riehl's home is in Columbus, Ohio. The attorney for Riehl filed a motion for a new trial, and Judge Erwin announced that he would defer passing sentence until this afternoon in order that the motion might be heard.

Measure Would Make Flirting With School Girls a Misdemeanor

Raleigh, Feb. 20.—Objectionable flirting with and other annoyances of school girls, would be outlawed in North Carolina, under the provisions of a measure now before the State Senate Committee of Education for consideration.

The bill would class the offender under misdemeanor punishment, with fines not less than \$5 and not more than \$50, or imprisonment of not less than 10 days, and not more than 30 days. Any one disturbing teachers also, would come under the provisions of the measure. Annoyance of the girls would not only be confined to the campus, but any one annoying them on the streets leading to the colleges which would ordinarily be used by the teachers and pupils, would come under the classifications of the bill.

Concede Capitol Levy Among Plans Solution France's Difficulties

Paris, Feb. 20.—Official circles conceded today that a capitol levy, in some form or other, was among the plans the government was studying for a solution of France's difficulties.

HOUSE ADOPTS BILL FOR INCREASED PAY SECTION WIDE MEET BE HELD FARMVILLE THURSDAY, FEB. 26

Approves Senate Measure to Increase Salaries of Congressmen, Vice-President, and Cabinet Members

Washington, Feb. 20.—The proposal to increase the salaries of members of Congress, already passed by the Senate, was approved also today by the House.

Unless vetoed by President Coolidge, it will become effective on March 4th, next. Besides increasing the salaries of Senators and Representatives from \$7,500 to \$10,000 a year, it provides that the speaker of the House, the Vice-President, and the Cabinet members shall receive \$15,000 instead of \$12,000 a year.

Goldsboro Anxious to Abolish Inconvenience Shifting Freight Cars

Goldsboro, Feb. 19.—The members of the local board of aldermen have appointed a committee to confer with officials of the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad in regard to the matter of abolishing the inconvenience caused by the shifting of freight cars blocking the streets as main thoroughfare of the city. It was stated by the aldermen that the efforts of the fire department might be hampered at a critical time by freight cars blocking the streets as was the case several days ago.

Raleigh, Feb. 19.—Mickey O'Quinn, former star on the Greensboro team in the Piedmont League, will start the 1925 season with the local club, according to an announcement made here by local club officials. O'Quinn was sold to the Birmingham, Alabama, club last season.

FREE STATE MAKES O'HIGGINS BARRISTER WITHOUT EXAMINATION

Dublin.—A distinction without precedent in the history of the British or Irish bars was conferred recently upon Kevin O'Higgins, Free State minister of justice, who without the formality of an examination, was called as a barrister, that is, given permission to plead in the Free State courts.

Mr. O'Higgins at one time passed the examinations required of solicitors, but never was admitted to the legal profession.

Schaub, director of the Extension Service of North Carolina, is preparing some very interesting statistics to be presented to the meeting on that day, for the purpose of informing those present as to what may be expected this year. There will be others on the program who will be thoroughly conversant with the best methods of combating the efforts of the weevil. The unusual dry weather last year made it easy to make cotton under weevil conditions, but we have no guarantee that this condition will exist again this year. Mr. John W. Holmer, President of the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce, who lives at Farmville, has issued a blanket invitation to all business men, farmers, merchants, bankers and all to attend this meeting on February 26th at Farmville, and it is hoped that a large crowd will be present to map out the program for this year.

Dr. McLees Preaching Strong Sermons; Subject Tonight, "The Way of Salvation"

"What shall it profit a man if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul?" was the text from which Dr. McLees preached to a large audience last night. He said in part: "When we begin to talk of profit and gain, we all understand what that means for all of us are interested in gain and loss. He cited those in history who have tried to gain the whole world, its wealth its power, its pleasures, and have not succeeded. How they realized at the last how foolish it was. He asked us to suppose that it were possible for anyone to gain the whole world, what would it count for when we came to die? He tried to picture the worth of an immortal soul by what God had done for its salvation in the gift of His Son, and urged us to be sensible by valuing the soul's eternal welfare above all that we may secure of this world's wealth, its power, its honors, its pleasures.

Dr. McLees spoke to the Y. W. C. A. of the College at 6:30 p. m., and this morning to the High School pupils at 9 a. m.

The morning service was a study of the depths into which Jacob went when he was bereft of Joseph and Simeon, and the prospect of the loss of Benjamin, when he said: "All these things are against me." He showed that what we think oftentimes is a curse becomes one of God's richest blessings as was the case in his life. He cited the saying of the Apostle Paul: "All things work together for good to them that love God." If we believe that God loves us, then we know that all that He sends is best. Dr. McLees had brought so far, and was warmly received by the good audience in attendance.

Again we want to say that some people of our town are missing some of the best sermons ever preached here, and unfortunately many of them will not discover this until the meeting is about over. We can make any sort of excuse for non-attendance, but will it stand the whit light of the judgment?

We have added 100 seats so that none need be turned away. The services this evening will begin with a prayer service at 7:15 and the preaching at 7:30. Dr. McLees will preach this evening on the subject: "The Way of Salvation."

Training School for Sunday School Work Be Held in Wilson

A. I. C. P. INVESTIGATES CAUSE AND CURE OF RICKETS IN CHILDREN

New York. — Three out of four infants in a New York tenement district develop rickets before they are a year old, according to a report made public today by the New York Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor, giving the results of a campaign to combat this disease which the A. I. C. P. has been carrying on for the last five years. The report indicates that rickets, a winter disease, the most marked effect of which is to retard the development of the bony tissues of the very young child, particularly the long bones of arms and legs, is at present a serious obstacle to child health. It is responsible, the A. I. C. P. finds, for the fact that fully 25 per cent of the children have serious orthopedic defects, such as "bow-legs, knock-knees, "funnel chests" and spinal curvatures and this malady is also held to be largely responsible for the appalling death rate of young children in this district from pneumonia and other respiratory diseases. The report in part follows:

"The Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor is carrying on its annual campaign against rickets in the Mulberry district of New York City. Five years of intensive work

has shown that rickets in early infancy presents a real obstacle to child health. It is no exaggeration to say that 75 per cent of the babies in this district develop rickets before they are a year old. The after effects of this condition are seen in the large number of children from two to six years of age (fully 25 per cent) who have serious orthopedic defects, and in the appalling death-rate of young children from pneumonia and respiratory diseases largely due to the narrow chest and constricted breathing space so characteristic of the rachitic child.

"That child has bow-legs because his mother lets him walk too soon" is the popular explanation of the two or three-year-old youngster with badly bowed legs. This thoroughly unscientific theory is, after all, not so far from the truth. Such children usually have suffered from rickets. The most marked effect of this disease is to retard the development of the bony tissues of the body, particularly the long bones of the arms and legs. Their legs, therefore, may be said to be too young, physiologically, to support the weight of their bodies. When they attempt to stand on their feet, the bones of the legs bend under weight of the body like a tender green twig.

"Rickets may be occasioned by one of two factors, or by both together: (1) inadequate exposure to sunlight, (2) a diet deficient in a food accessory vitamin, whose nature is as yet unknown, but which enables the body to store calcium and phosphorus in the bones from the food taken into the body. The disease is most prevalent during the winter months in north temperate climates, particularly

proper plays. among races with dark skins in which the pigment still further retards the effects of the sun's rays. On the other hand, the disease is practically unknown among negroes in the West Indies who are receiving an abundance of sunlight, or among Eskimos, who are used to little sunlight but whose diet from early infancy consists largely of fats and oils of fish. Babies between three months and one year of age are most susceptible to the disease, particularly if they are within this age period during the late winter months when the seasonal incidence is at its peak.

"Physiologists are at a loss to explain how the sun's rays or the oil of fish livers can deposit calcium in the bones, but the fact that they do has been amply demonstrated clinically and in experiments with animals. There are, therefore two methods of attacking rickets: (1) Exposing the babies directly to the rays of the sun or to the ultra-violet rays of a quartz lamp; or (2) giving doses of fish liver oil three times a day during the period of life when rickets is most likely to occur. Sunlight in congested city districts is a rare commodity. For this reason, moderate dosages of fish liver oil is a safe, prophylactic measure."

MOSCOW DISTURBED AT LATEST SIGNS OF BALTIC COOPERATION

Helsingfors, Finland. — While the recent conference of foreign ministers of Baltic states held in this city did not effect a Baltic entente, or Baltic union, and did not result in any formal alliance designed to protect border states from Bolshevik aggression, there were many evidences that the states which grew out of the dissolution of the Russian Empire are gradually coming much closer together.

Care was taken by the foreign ministers to make it clear they were not creating an anti-Soviet bloc, and were not agitating against the Moscow government, but were deeply interested in means to prevent Communist agitation and disturbances within their own borders. Count Skrzynski, the Polish minister for foreign affairs in defining Polish policy toward Russia said: "I make a distinction between the policy of the Russian Soviet government and the policy of the Third Internationale. We must battle against the hellicose propaganda of the communism of the Third Internationale, but it is not necessary to create an anti-Bolshevik bloc. On the contrary we Poles wish to find a means of getting along with the Soviet government, and of co-operation with it."

But while the Baltic states conference was on in Helsingfors the Soviet authorities in Leningrad arranged an anti-Baltic demonstration which was directed against the Helsingfors meeting, and the Bolshevik press denounced the meeting on the theory that it was directed against the Soviet government.

An arbitration agreement, following the lines of the League of Nations protocol, was actually agreed upon by the four states Poland, Estonia, Lat-

via and Finland, represented in the conference, and there were a number of agreements concerning transportation facilities and the simplification of passport formalities. The question of disarmament was postponed until the next session of the League of Nations in March.

Estonia and Latvia already have a defensive alliance and Latvian troops stood ready to lend Estonia aid at the time of the Communist coup in Reval Dec. 1. The fortunes of these two states are so closely linked together, and they have previously cooperated with such success in repelling Bolshevik aggression, that Moscow apparently has spared no pains in trying to break up their union.

DANISH COURT OVERRULES INTERNMENT WITHOUT TRIAL

Copenhagen.—The recent action of the ministry of justice is ordering interned, without further trial, a prisoner who had served four terms for immoral conduct, has roused a demand for more specific legislation dealing with this class of offenses. The Superior Court of Copenhagen ruled that the ministry of justice had no authority under the law to impose internment without a trial, and ordered the man released and compensated to the amount of 1,200 crowns.

The case created a profound sensation throughout Denmark and numerous prominent persons have been outspoken in their approval of drastic action with regard to offenders against public morality. The author, Ogle Eggers, in an open letter declared that "the whole people ought to send the ministry a vote of thanks."

OBLIGATORY PRACTICE MAKES GOOD MARKSMEN OF MANY ARGENTINES

Buenos Aires.—The reason Argentinians rank among the best shots in the world, as shown in various international rifle contests in past years, is that marksmanship is obligatory upon every male citizen of Argentina between the ages of 18 and 45. This is a part of the Argentine system of compulsory military instruction.

Not all citizens have to serve in the army, its ranks being recruited by lot, but those chosen may reduce their one year term of service by three-fourths if they take the marksmanship course. Those not chosen are obliged to take the course anyway.

Statistics recently issued by the ministry of war show that during last year 44,000 citizens took lessons at the 130 rifle ranges in the country, and shot off 4,500,000 cartridges.

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SLAUGHTER ON HIGHWAYS WILL CONTINUE

Again the Senate has seen fit to kill the vehicle light bill for no apparent reason than the fear of loss of a portion of the farmer vote, despite the pleas of thousands of citizens of the state for the enactment of such a measure.

In its comment on the Senate's action the Greensboro News says:

"If the Daily News misquoted Senator Burgwyn, it did so unintentionally. The difficulties of knowing when a senator means what he says and when he does not are manifest. This newspaper, however, would not willingly be unfair and if it has been so it regrets it. It disagrees widely with the senate's interpretation of safety measures and it is not impressed with Senator Squires' belief that 'auto dealers of the city folk' inspired the effort to have lights on horse-drawn vehicles after dark. As to what powers are behind the measure does not make any great amount of difference; the question is whether

the measure is wise. The senate thinks not and proceeds to kill a bill which intelligent opinion all over the state has supported, and then pulls it back to kill it again. The bill has been killed before, it is killed again now, and no doubt it will stand up once more at the next session to be killed yet again. The bogey of the farmer vote still rules. Meantime, the slaughter on the highways will continue."

AT THE POSTAL WORKERS' COST

For the second time this session the Senate has passed a Postal Rate and Pay Bill. It is pretty much the same bill that the Senate passed before and that the House, in vindication of its rights, refused to consider. And it is a bill that the Senate has no reason to think the House would accept or the President could approve.

For since the Senate by a narrow margin sustained the President's veto of the bill increasing the postal employees' pay it has made little pretense of meeting his objections. It has voted twice now for higher postal rates, but neither time has it planned to raise sufficient revenues to pay the higher salaries. Purposely it still stands out against following the House's example.

On the question of higher salaries for postal workers the House and the Senate were from the start in full agreement. But since merging the two questions of higher salaries and higher postal rates they have been far apart. In fact, the Senate's motives in refusing to meet Mr. Coolidge's conditions, as the House has done, are doubly open to question. If it were seeking to defeat all attempts to increase the postal workers' pay it could have gone about it in no surer way.

It is a matter of doing justice to a large class of greatly underpaid Government employees, to whom Congress has promised relief. The time is short for the Senate to give convincing proof of its sincerity.—N. Y. World.

LONELY WHITE BEAR OFFERS COMFORTABLE HOME TO MATE

Victoria, B. C.—An attempt is to be made to capture alive a mate for Ursus Kermodei, a lonely white bear, the only one of its species known to be in captivity, now housed in a new \$1,000 home of its own at Beacon Hill Park. A report has been received from Princess Royal Island, on the northwestern British Columbia coast, that bears of the same species are at large there. Smaller than polar bears, they have a limited habitat and, owing to the isolated and rugged character of the islands, it is almost impossible to capture the animals alive.

EUROPE FINDS WAY TO DERIVE REVENUE FROM RADIO FANS

New York. — The United States leads the world in radio development but Europe, though still hampered by governmental restrictions, is beginning to "tune in," according to E. A. Brofos, European manager for the International Western Electric Company who recently returned to this country.

"England is the only country which compares with the United States," Mr. Brofos said. "Germany, with 13 stations, is progressing rapidly. Czechoslovakia sees the radio as a means of establishing Prague as one of the outstanding musical and cultural centers of the world. The plan is to broadcast the national opera. Other countries are also considering musical programs to knit the national spirit and to advance culture."

Installation of receiving sets is still illegal throughout continental Europe generally, but outlaw listening is being practiced on a wide scale, Mr. Brofos continued. The freedom with which the governmental regulations are being ignored, he said, indicated a trend of policy which forecasts acceptance of broadcasting on a systematic plan.

"Licensing of owners of receiving sets, and diversion of parts of the proceeds to the broadcasting companies, is an almost universal characteristic of the expansion. Germany has under consideration a plan for renting receiving sets at a low price. Spain makes it profitable for the broadcasting companies by allowing publicity."

"Expected interference between the broadcasting stations in the several countries is said to have been one of the reasons for governmental restrictions of radio. Italy has affected a combination of groups which has received the concession for the entire country. It is understood that Spain will follow this procedure."

"England's system centers about the British Broadcasting Company, which operates 17 stations. A license fee paid to the government by 800,000 people is partly diverted to the company. Holland has seven concerns, but no regular programs are as yet sent out."

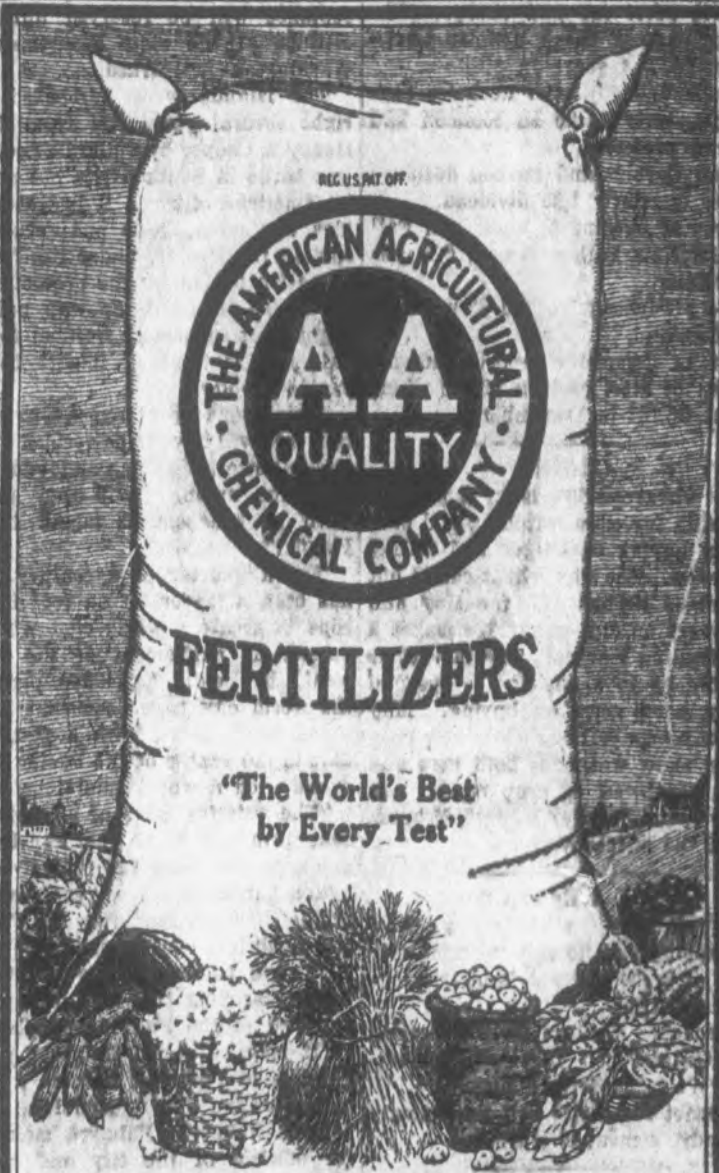

SOUTH SEA ISLANDS MAY BE SITE FOR WORLD PEACE CITY

Honolulu. — The Palmyra Islands, some 1,000 miles south of Hawaii will be dedicated to the Pan-Pacific union as a gift if the United States agrees to withdraw sovereignty from them and recognizes the islands as a neutral inviolate place of refuge for all persons who wish to confer on matters looking to the advancement of all interests common to the Pacific peoples, according to announcement made by the owner L. Fullard-Leo at a Pan-Pacific luncheon.

Alexander Hume Ford, director of the Pan-Pacific union, said that the offer will be taken under advisement by the union, and its decision as to acceptance will be reserved until the attitude of the state department at Washington is learned.

The islands were purchased outright several years ago from Judge Henry E. Cooper by Fullard-Leo, who was born in South Africa but now is an American citizen. It has been his idea to provide some one recognized spot in the Pacific, under the flag of no nation but under the protection of all where in peace or war persons might meet in perfect freedom to discuss any matters of import to the Pacific peoples.

"This opens up a tremendous question that will have to be decided by the Pacific powers," said an announcement from the union. "Will they permit such an independent island in the Pacific?"

"For a quarter of a century there has been a movement on foot in Europe to create a world city, where a permanent parliament of the world would be held. Extensive plans of the world city have been sent to the union from Rome, with a statement that in the center of the Pacific alone would such a world capital be safe.

"The tentative offer of an independent principality of the Pan-Pacific union, to be under the control of no nation but its perpetual peace assured by the countries bordering the Pacific, will doubtless cause world-wide comment, and possibly a line of international reasoning that may lead to the approval of the Fullard-Leo plan.

"It may be stated in passing that Palmyra is a part of Hawaii, a word in fact of the City of Honolulu. Any persons living in Palmyra may vote for officials of the city and county of Honolulu. The city might lose an outlying ward, but if the whole world be the gainer, she can afford to give her assistance."

GENEVA LABOR CONFERENCE URGES FULL ATTENDANCE

Geneva. — Workmen's compensation will be the chief item on the agenda of the next annual international labor conference, which will open at Geneva May 19. Three other items on the program are really matters left over from last year's conference where, in the form of conventions, the ywere given preliminary approval by the delegates. Now, however, they require a final vote. They include equality of treatment for national and foreign workers, as regards workmen's compensation for accidents, the weekly suspension of work for 24 hours in glass manufacturing processes where tank furnaces are used, and night work in bakeries.
