FIFTY MEN ENTOMBED IN INDIANA MINE BY AN EXPLOSION YESTERDAY

Mining Officers Fear That All Trapped Men Will Be Found Dead; Disaster Occurs in the City Coal Company Mine Near Sullivan; Sixteen Bodies Taken Out During the Night

Sullivan, Ind., Feb. 21.—A handful of weary, grief-stricken women waited at the top of the City Coal Mines to day for information, while a score of men toiled underground to recover the bodies of 35 of the 50 miners entombed in an explosion yesterday afternoon. Mining officers said they thought it impossible that any of the trapped men would be found alive. A cave-in early today halted, for several hours, the work of rescue, after 16 bodies had been taken out. Most of the night was spent in repairing the mine's ventilation, and fresh air made it possible for the workers to penetrate into the mine, after the debris of the cave-in was cleared away.

The blast trapped all of the men workers in a little room of the 3, 4, 5 and 8 entries of the mine. A flash of flames quickly consumed all the life sustaining oxygen, and consumption of the explosion brought down coal and timbers down on the workers. Mine experts said a cutting machine working close to the wall of an abandoned mine, had cut through and let loose an accumulation of gas. A flame from a miner's lamp ignited the gas and caused the explosion, they believe. Rescuers were hopeful today that all of the bodies remaining in the pit would be recovered.

The scene of the explosion was in the extreme South Western part of the city. The blast was so terrific, that it was felt in the central part of city, and caused so many telephone calls, that the city Electrical Company and the Telephone wires became confused.

Election for Issuance \$1,500,000 for Roads Be Held in Wilson

Wilson, Feb. 21.—An election to ratify the issuance of \$1,500,000 for good roads and \$250,000 for permanent bridges, will be held in Wilson county March 5. If the proposition is carried, it is announced, a Wilson County Highway Commission will be automatically created. This commission will be composed of five members, to be selected by the board of county commissioners, through delegates from each township in the county.

The County Highway Commission will have charge of all roads in Wilson county now controlled by the board of county commissioners. The highways that have been taken over by the State will remain under the control of the State Highway Commission. Under the provisions of the act, if the election carries, the proposed county highway commission will be empowered with authority to lend the State Highway Commission as much as \$500,000 to be expended only in Wilson county.

PLANS BEING MADE FOR RADIO TO CARRY ADDRESS COOLIDGE

First Time in History That Nation Has Been Able to Listen to Such Ceremony by Wireless

Washington, Feb. 21.—A coast to coast radio to carry the inauguration of President Coolidge was outlined today in an announcement of the plans of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, and Radio Corporation of America. It will mark the first time the country at large has been able to listen to such a ceremony by wireless. The ceremonies at the Capital will be picked up by microphones and transmitted by long distance telephone lines to various broadcasting stations of the country, and these in turn will send them out by the air.

The difference between the tax collected and the amount actually owed by the Company, was \$24,036.09, the suit alleges.

DR M'LEES PREACHES STRONG SERMON ON WAY OF SALVATION

Presbyterians Will Conduct Sunday Services in Methodist Church; Services Will Continue in the Presbyterian Church Through Next Week

Another crowd that filled the Presbyterian Church heard Dr. McLees preach a powerful sermon on "The Way of Salvation" last night from the text: "What must I do to be saved?" Dr. McLees described the prison scene when Paul and Silas sang praises to God, the accompanying earthquake, the terror of the jailer, and his urgent question of the way of salvation. He didn't ask how can I get wealthy, how can I attain success, but how can I be saved?

Paul tells him that there is nothing that he can do to be saved, that is an act of faith, all has already been done for the salvation of men on the cross by Jesus, we have only to take what he offers. Any man, however black his past can be saved by simply believing on Christ as his Saviour. He then defined faith as "the trusting of oneself to another, with all of one's interests." Faith in Christ is the putting of ourselves in to the hands of Christ with all of our eternal interests. He then took up some of the excuses offered for not accepting Christ, as "I am not ready, I am not good enough, I am afraid that I cannot hold out" and said that it is not a question of our being ready, of our sinfulness, or of our holding out: all had been done for us already—all that we need to do is to accept what has been done for us. He then made a strong appeal to accept Christ as a Saviour at once.

The officers of the church decided to accept the kind offer of the Methodists and hold the Sunday morning and evening services in the Methodist church that all may have an opportunity to hear Dr. McLees coming back to the Presbyterian church on Monday for the rest of the meeting unless it was found necessary to move to larger quarters.

Services for Sunday will be as follows: Dr. McLees will speak to the Sunday school at 10:15 a. m. and preach at 11 a. m. and 7:30 p. m., the morning sermon being on the subject: "The land beyond the River."

The services for today are: Prayer services of 15 minutes beginning at 7:15, followed by preaching at 7:30. It is hoped that all who have not heard Dr. McLees will come to hear him tomorrow at both services, as there will be plenty of room for all to have a seat.

Services will continue next week at the hours of 10 a. m. and 7:30 p. m. each day.

House Refuses to Favorably Report Sur-Charge Bill

Washington, Feb. 21.—The House Commerce Committee today refused to favorably report the bill authorizing elimination of the Pullman sur-charge.

The House will have an opportunity to vote on the question, despite the committee's action. TWO LINERS COLLIDE IN HEAVY FOG TODAY

New York, Feb. 21.—Two incoming ocean liners, the Tuscania of the Cunard line and the Rochambeau of the French line, collided off the Quarantine station. Both of the vessels were damaged, but not seriously.

The crash occurred in a heavy fog just off the harbor. Part of the Rochambeau's railings were ripped away, while the Tuscania's stern was injured. The Tuscania carried 230 passengers, and the Rochambeau carried 245.

GOLDSBORO VISITED BY \$50,000 FIRE DURING THE NIGHT

Fire Chief Yelverton Rendered Unconscious by Acid Fumes; Fire Has Its Origin in Garage of Goldsboro Battery Company

Goldsboro, Feb. 21.—Fire, which resulted in the destruction of \$50,000 worth of property, and which nearly caused the death of fire Chief Leslie Yelverton, occurred here late last night. It was three hours before the blaze was under control, and at one time it appeared as though one of the city's main business blocks would be wrecked by flames.

The fire started, it was said, in the garage of the Goldsboro Battery Company on Center street, and was greatly intensified by an explosion, which occurred shortly after the fire was discovered. The Goldsboro Battery Building was completely destroyed. The Scott Motor Company Garage, and the Goldsboro Motor Garage and Transportation Company, suffered the loss of equipment, and the Smith and Sherrard Wholesale Grocery store suffered heavy damage by water. When the blaze was nearly under control, it was discovered that Fire Chief Yelverton, was missing, and after a search, he was found in the ruins of the building, rendered unconscious by acid fumes caused by the blaze. He was rushed to a hospital and after medical assistance he rallied, and his condition was found not be serious.

In his always delightful manner he spoke of the need for individualized treatment of our children and the chance of standardization carried too far. He emphasized very strongly the necessity for loyal support of our teachers both directly and indirectly. In conclusion Dr. Cook mentioned the four factors which determine what each child shall be: heredity, environment, the love of God, and the child's own effort.

Each member present hopes to have the pleasure of hearing Dr. Cook again on this most interesting subject.

A short business session followed. The minutes were read and approved and the treasurer reported a very satisfactory balance in the bank. The association heartily endorsed the movement to secure a County Home Demonstration Agent.

PROHIBITION AIDS U. S. EFFICIENCY, SAY WELSH MANUFACTURERS

Los Angeles Sighted Off Bermuda This Morning 4:45 A. M.

LEGISLATION WOULD RETIRE STATE TREAS. ON TWO-THIRDS PAY

After Busy Session Today House and Senate Adjourn; Will Reconvene Monday Morning

Raleigh, Feb. 21.—Introduction of a bill by Representative Harrison that would retire State Treasurer, B. B. Lacy, on two-thirds pay, featured today's session of the House. At which time, by more than a two-thirds vote, the bill to require 10 days notice prior to the issuance of marriage licenses was reintroduced and placed on the calendar as a special order for next Tuesday. Motion to reconsider the vote, by which this bill failed on its second reading, was made by Representative Whitaker, of Guilford. Also there was introduced a bill, which would require that all persons convicted of driving automobiles while intoxicated, would have their licenses revoked for four months. Representative Harrison's bill, if passed, would leave the matter of retirement with Mr. Lacy. There would be nothing about it on his part. However, should he retire, he would be subject to the call of the governor and state treasurer.

The House and Senate both adjourned until 11:00 o'clock Monday morning, instead of 8:00 o'clock Monday night, owing to the pressure of business. The House also received from Representative Townsend a proposed revenue bill adopted by the Joint finance committee, which will come up Monday night. The House today passed on its third and final reading, the bill authorizing the issuance of \$600,000 in bonds for the construction of a bridge across the lower Chowan River, near Edenton. This measure had already passed the Senate. A bill also was passed on final reading, allowing the city of Rocky Mount to issue \$350,000 in bonds for high school purposes.

In the Senate, the session was perfunctory under an agreement reached yesterday which was decided that only local measures would be considered, and a mass of this type of bills came up for consideration.

Both Houses adjourned shortly before one o'clock.

Raleigh, Feb. 21.—The Joint Finance Revenue Bill introduced in the lower House of the General Assembly today provides for the raising of \$12,000,000 annually, according to Chairman Townsend, of the committee. The Budget Commission recommendation called for \$14,000,000 to run state departments and institutions. The problem of making the two fit, must be settled on the floor of the General Assembly. One of the important changes in the bill is in the inheritance tax. There is no change in the schedule as affecting widows and children, but on brothers and sisters, there is an increase of about 25 percent. Inheritance by those of no blood kin taxed at an increase of from 50 to 100 percent. License taxes will be increased from 50 to 500 percent. For instance, the tax imposed on attorneys at law is increased from \$5.00 to \$25.00 a year with a provision that any attorney making less than \$1,000 a year will have to pay only one-half of that amount.

Filling Station under the proposed bill would have to pay a ny where from \$5 to \$20, and Barber's chairs would be taxed \$1 a year each, while the cost of securing marriage licenses would be raised from \$3 to \$5.

Marked increases are proposed in the income schedule. Rates on individual incomes would range from 1 1/4 to 5 percent, as compared with from 1 to 3 percent under the present law. A flat tax of corporation income of 1 percent is asked. The old rate has been 3 percent, while the new rate would be 4 percent. Franchise taxes for railroads would be doubled, and on telephone companies the bill calls for a 50 percent increase.

Sleeping cars would bear an increase tax of 50 percent. Water, Power and Gas Companies would be required to pay about 1-10 of 1 percent on their gross receipts. This, said Mr. Townsend, is an increase of about 200 percent. There is also provided a tax of \$2.00 on all criminal judgments where defendants pay the cost, and \$2.00 on all proceedings filed at court. The tax on contractors being worked but, would yield external revenue between \$300,000 and \$400,000 annually.

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CHURCH AFFILIATION OF COLLEGE STUDENTS IN NORTH CAROLINA

The Christian Education Magazine gives the number of colleges belonging to each of the leading denominations in North Carolina, the number of students enrolled from the several churches and the relative percentage in state and church schools. The figures follow:

Institutions: Baptist, 2; Methodist, 5; Presbyterian, 5; Disciples, 2; Lutheran, 1; Friends, 1; Moravian, 1; State 5; independent, 1; total, 23.

Enrollment: Total, 10,587; Baptists, 2,746; Methodists, 3,589; Presbyterians, 1,357; Disciples, 457; Episcopalians, 513; Roman Catholics, 36; Lutherans, 327; Friends, 98; Moravians, 42.

Distribution: Baptist—In State institutions, 53 per cent; in Baptist colleges, 31 per cent; in all other colleges, 16 per cent. Methodists—In State institutions, 50 per cent; in Methodist colleges, 38 per cent; in all other

colleges, 22 per cent. Presbyterians—In State institutions, 43 per cent; in Presbyterian colleges, 46 per cent; in all other colleges, 11 per cent. Disciples—In State institutions, 52 per cent; in all other colleges, 15 per cent.

In the Baptist colleges of this state 79 per cent of the students are Baptists; in Methodist colleges 73 per cent are Methodists; in the Presbyterian colleges 77 per cent are Presbyterians; in the Disciples colleges 51 per cent are Disciples; in Friends colleges 40 per cent are Friends; in the Lutheran college 72 per cent are Lutherans; and in the Moravian college only 13 per cent are Moravians.

THE SENATE SALARY INCREASE

It may be that some members of Congress may need more pay for living expenses and that many deserve it. But it certainly does not look well when Senators, hoping that the House from self-interest will concur, rush through a salary increase without warning and without discussion.

The manner of the Senate's performance was not creditable. A Senator whom the voters of his own party have rejected, a lame duck who is not coming up for election—Senator Ball of Delaware—pops up with an amendment to an appropriation bill increasing the salaries of Representatives and Senators from \$7,500 to \$10,000. With the approval of the Senator in charge of the bill—Mr. Warren of Wyoming—it goes through as if it were greased. No debate on the merits of amendment, no roll-call on its adoption to tell the story, is considered worth while.

The country of late has heard a good deal about economy. It has had some notable illustrations of it. What Congress intends to do with the bill increasing the salaries of underpaid postal employees is still in doubt. There are so many reasons for delay. It is a wholly different thing when it's a matter of the Senate's voting higher salaries for members of Congress.—N. Y. World.

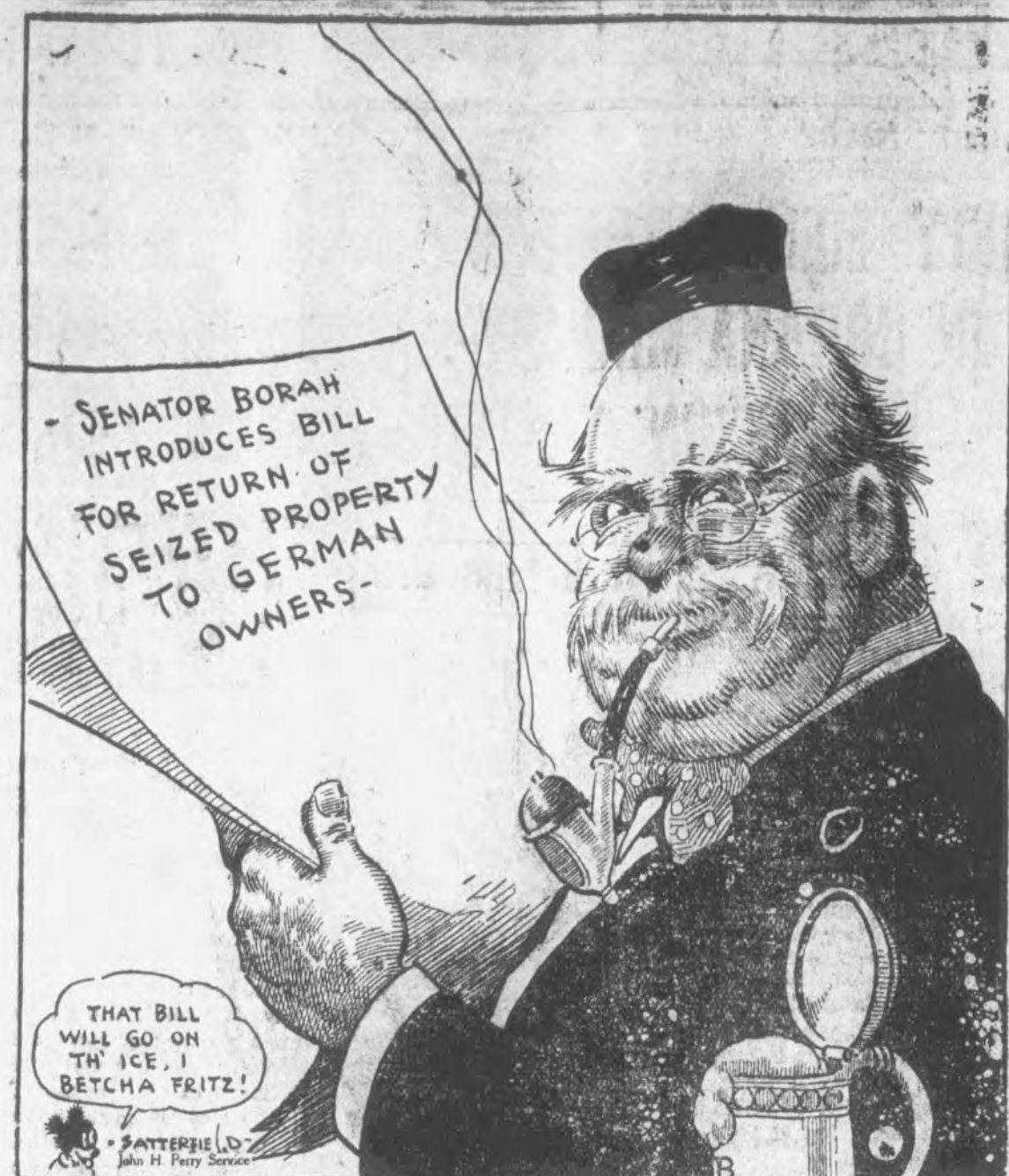

COMMENDS LETTER OF JAMES L. EVANS

Editor of The Daily Reflector:

As one of the signers of the petition to give the mayor of Greenville the power now vested only in a judge of the County Court, I wish to commend the letter to your columns, issue of the 18th, by Mr. J. L. Evans. This was a very good "piece" by James L. and deserves the attention of your readers to such extent that they would lose no time in urging the passage of the bill now before our legislature. The granting of such jurisdiction as is asked in this bill certainly could do no harm, and it would correct a very faulty court system, in my opinion.

As I have been in the recent past number of years an official in several capacities, one being mayor pro tem, I would like to offer a suggestion for the people of Greenville to consider, and that is the establishment of a regular Police Magistrate or Recorders Court in Greenville. This would greatly relieve the Mayor's office, enabling some one else besides a lawyer to be mayor, put a judge on duty all the time in the city hall at no greater expense than we now have, and would further facilitate policing the city. Greenville is too large to have the little antiquated system of a general utilities mayor, and while we could not get the present mayor possibly to agree to a court over which he is not judge we should have a regular police magistrate or judge on the job at all times. Court costs and fees would

amply pay such an officer.

AMERICANS MAY ORGANIZE COUNTRY CLUB IN LONDON

London. — An American country and residential club may be organized in London in the near future. One of the historic tracts near London where Henry VIII used to hunt has been suggested as the site, and as there is plenty of space for golf, Americans interested in the deal rather look upon this place with favor.

It has been proposed by the prime movers in the idea to take over all the buildings as they stand, this including a splendid Georgian mansion known as Addington Park, one of the show places of this section. The site of the proposed club is near Croydon, the large airdrome from which London planes arrive and depart for the Continent, and until a few years ago was the country seat of the Archbishops of Canterbury.

The hunting lodge of Henry VIII stood near where the mansion is located. Originally this site was granted by William the Conqueror to his cook on the peculiar condition that he and his successors should present at royal coronations a certain mess.
