

M'LEAN ADDRESSES
GEN. ASSEMBLY ON
PRISON CONDITIONS

Address is Read Separately to Each Body; Clerk Calls Attention to Deficit in Prison Finances; Local Measures and the Address Consumes Practically Entire Session Today

Raleigh, Feb. 23.—Local measures and an address by Gov. McLean on prison conditions, and recommendations for their improvement, occupied practically all of today's session in the General Assembly. Only one measure of state wide importance was introduced, this being a bill in the Senate to provide for the appointment of the state treasurer and state auditor as a special fund commission at all times keep an accurate check on the fund. It is sponsored by Gov. McLean.

In the House a mass of local legislation was received, and a number of local measures were passed on their final reading. Governor McLean's speech was read in each body separately, shortly before one o'clock. In sending his address to the General Assembly to be read, Gov. McLean, for the first time during his administration, and for the first time in 6 years that the governor's address has not been delivered in person, established a new precedent. During the Morris administration, all addresses were delivered by the executive in person.

Raleigh, Feb. 23.—Change of state prisons from a separate corporation to a regular department of the State Government, provisions for working able bodied persons on State Highways and roads of State sub-division, and also on of her public works, and a request that state prisons be placed upon a definite appropriation basis, were the outstanding recommendations of an address by Governor Angus W. McLean on prison conditions before the General Assembly today. The Governor did not appear in person to deliver his address, and the address was read separately to each body by the Reading Clerk.

Mr. McLean called attention to the deficit of \$186,317.13 existing in the prison's finances on January 1st, 1925 as a result of its operation for three years and one month prior to that date, and added that it appeared there would be a gradual increase and re-occurring deficit unless steps were taken to prevent it. He declared that the report of the Superintendent of the prison showed that the large number of non-producing prisoners at the prison was largely responsible for the deficit. He said that for permanent improvements, the state prison had exceeded its allotment by \$112,539.29, bringing the total amount, for which the general state fund is liable, to \$298,847.42.

The Governor declared that the use of convicts had been so restricted in recent years that now they were only allowed to be worked on highways, or in farm work. He recommended changing of the present law so that they could also be used on other public works, and so that the prison management might purchase machinery to install for other industry in the prison so that all convicts might be employed, and the state prison be placed on a self supporting basis.

The Governor's recommendations for changes in the operation of state prison, included that it be made a department of the state government with a board of directors appointed by the governor and approved by the Senate. The new department is to be operated on the appropriation basis under the proposed executive budget system, and all of its revenues turned over to the state fund, while the outstanding deficit and expressions for permanent improvements to carry on its work, are to be handled also from the state fund.

The Governor closed his address with the statement that he would submit, for consideration of the General Assembly, bills embodying his recommendations.

JUDGE DECIDES IN
FAVOR CAVEATORS
MANNING WILL CASE

Case Growing Out Two Wills of J. L. G. Manning Consumes Practically Entire Week's Session Superior Court

One of the most interesting cases of a civil nature tried in the Pitt Superior Court for some years, was the controversy over the two wills of the late J. L. G. Manning, which ended yesterday afternoon when the jury returned a verdict in favor of the caveators, they being several daughters of the deceased.

The controversy that brought about the action was due to there being two wills bearing the signature of the late J. L. G. Manning. The first will which was written Jan. 24, 1920, bequeathed to his daughters all of his property and belongings with the exception of one hundred dollars in cash and four notes which he left to his son, W. J. Manning, the notes being due the father for money borrowed by the son. A second will was made and signed August 18, 1921, in which his holdings were equally divided among his heirs, the son, W. J. Manning being given a proportionate part.

The deceased died during December of 1921, and immediately both wills were presented for probate, and it was then that the action was brought for the annulment of the second will.

The case occupied the entire time of the court last week with the exception of Monday. The verdict rendered by the jury was in part "that the signing of the last will was brought about by undue influence." If this holds the first will will be legal and one upon which the disposal of the property will be made.

It will not be known until the order of the court has been signed whether or not an appeal will be taken.

CRIMINAL ATTEMPT
IS ATTEMPTED BY
NEGRO LAST NIGHT

Captured in Home in Time to Prevent the Crime; Reported En Route to Raleigh for Safe Keeping

Raleigh, Feb. 23.—State prison authorities, at 10:00 o'clock this morning, indicated that Robert Farabow, a negro alleged to have attempted a crime on a Hillsboro woman last night, and reported en route here for safe keeping, had not yet arrived. It is thought that he has been taken to some county jail where he will be secure.

The negro is said to have been discovered in the Hillsboro home in time to prevent the crime, which is alleged he sought to commit. He was later captured by a posse, and taken for safe keeping. It was said that there were no indications that violence would be taken to harm the negro, but that he was moved as a precautionary measure.

ADVOCATES CONTROL
BY U. S. OF BANKING
CREDIT OF WORLD

Shipstead Says That Such Would Mean the "Greatest Power for Good or for Evil That Was Ever Given to Any Nation"

Washington, Feb. 23.—Control by the Federal Government of all American Banking and Investment credit in the National Field as a means of protecting the world's peace, was advocated today in the Senate by Senator Shipstead, of Minnesota, former leading member of the Foreign Relations committee.

Through a control of the banking credit of the world, Senator Shipstead said, the United States is given the "Greatest power for good or for evil that was ever given to any nation in the world to control."

He said that the manner in which that control is exercised "will determine for good or evil the elevation of nations, and the destiny of humanity."

Secretary Shipstead is chairman of the Foreign Relations Sub Committee, which is to begin hearing this week on the Ladd resolution to declare to the sense of the Senate that American Armed forces should not be used for the collection of American private loans. The Minnesota Senator, and others on the Foreign Relations Committee, who have been urging that European Nations refund their war debt to the United States, and should be guided by the amount of private American loans to Europe, and more especially by a recent statement of the French Finance Minister, Clemenceau, that negotiations were under way for a new loan to France by American Banking interests. Senator Shipstead told his colleagues in an address that he hoped President Coolidge would take a position of frowning on a huge foreign loan, and said, if the executive "would force that road to the end," he would be praised by nations and generations yet to come.

Germany Aids Shipbuilders
Hamburg. — To stimulate German shipbuilding, the German government will make available credits equal to 50 per cent of the price agreed upon between the ship owners and the builders. This step is taken because the ship construction companies have no ready cash to advance to their workers, and the ship owners are likewise suffering from a scarcity of capital.HINES ADDRESSES

BIRTHDAY MEETING

Discloses War Department's Study of Woman Power, and Difficulties Facing Regular Army

Washington, Feb. 23.—The War Department's study of woman power, three possible solutions of the National Defense problem, and some of the difficulties now facing the regular army, were disclosed in General John L. Hines' chief of the staff, talked before the George Washington Birthday meeting.

"Things women can do in war will be studied by the General Staff," said General Hines, not with an idea "of making fighters of our girls, or of creating any such thing as a woman battalion of death", but experience has proved that there are some tasks that women can form better than men. But the theory is to show how women volunteers may be used to the best advantage, in order to release the men for heavy and dangerous duties.

Referring to the National Defense Problems, General Hines said, there are three solutions, the first is to not wait until war comes and "then pay the full price; the second" try to prepare hurriedly for great tasks, and waste when war is eminent; the third is: build according to program, year by year, which is the only economical sound way.

GEN. MITCHELL MAY
NOT BE REAPPOINTED

Secretary Weeks Gives No Indication As to How He Views Question of Reappointment of Assistant Army Air Chief

Washington, Feb. 23.—The sudden fading out of the House Aircraft investigation, with determination of its committee hearings Saturday, switched interest in the matter today to the War Department on the impending decision of Secretary Weeks as to who shall occupy the position of Assistant Army Air Chief after the present appointment of Brigadier General Mitchell expires next month. General Mitchell's term expires on March 20. His statement before the House Aircraft Committee stirred up a warm controversy on questions relating to aircraft defense, and it has been announced that the Secretary of War would await conclusions of the Committee hearings before reaching the decision, which will either continue General Mitchell in the position of Assistant Air Chief, or mean his assignment to other duty, with the return of rank of colonel.

Whether the sudden breaking off of the committee hearing, after other witnesses had been summoned, might lead the Secretary to advance his decision to a date before the March 4th adjournment of congress, or defer it until after that, as has previously been expected, has not been disclosed. The Secretary, himself, has given no indication as to how he views the question of General Mitchell's reappointment. Those close to him, however, predict the appointment of Assistant Air Chief will go to another officer.

King George Ordered
to Mediterranean
By His Physicians

London, Feb. 23.—Although it is known through a medical bulletin issued from Buckingham Palace, that King George's condition is not serious, as a result of an attack of bronchitis, the fact that physicians have ordered him to the Mediterranean for the remainder of the winter has caused quite a stir for front pages, of which newspaper men are taking advantage.

His Majesty's health is ordinarily so good, and his foreign visits so frequent, that his going abroad is considered important. With the exception of his foreign trips during the war, when he often visited the British Army in France, he has never been south since his accession to the throne in 1910.

She was married on February 21, 1867, to the late Major Henry Harding, her death occurring on the fifty-eighth anniversary of her marriage. Mr. Harding died thirteen years ago. Heavy Docket Given Hearing Today's Session of County Court; Several Defendants Given Road Sentences

REVIVAL SERVICES
LARGELY ATTENDED
DURING YESTERDAY

Dr. McLees in Two Strong Sermons; Morning Subject: "The City Beyond the River;" Evening Subject: "The Wages of Sin"

The services of the revival on Sunday were more largely attended than any so far, both services being conducted at the Methodist church, and filled the auditoriums of the church and Sunday school. The College girls were in attendance at both morning and evening services, and helped to swell the crowds.

Dr. McLees began the day with a talk to the Presbyterian S. S. at which he made an appeal for the acceptance of Christ, which was responded to by nearly 20 boys and girls and young people. He spoke on "How to make the life beautiful." To be a beautiful life it must be useful, it must be diligent energetic, and above all it must be given to Jesus Christ.

The morning sermon at the Methodist church was a picturing of the city beyond the river, which he said was not like the cities of this world that pass away, but was eternal. Jesus left us a message that He has gone to prepare a place for us, and when ready, he would come again and receive us to himself. It was beautiful beyond the imagination, with nothing to mar its beauty or its joy, no sin, sorrow, night, or weeping. It was a prepared place, for a prepared people. Unless we are prepared for it, we cannot enjoy its beauty or its people. It is located whenever Jesus is, for he said that we are to be where he is.

The evening sermon was a thrilling and dramatic one on the subject: "The wages of sin." He said that sin always costs us what we do, that it promises much, and gives little, and what it gives brings nothing but misery, sorrow, and death. On the other hand we have in sharp contrast what God does for us through Jesus Christ: He gives us eternal life. Sin promises happiness, power, success, and doesn't pay what it promises: God gives us, without money and without price eternal life with its blessings, its glories, its everlasting joy. Thus we have set before us life and death, wages and gift, with the opportunity to choose between them. Then, lifting his hand above him, Dr. McLees called heaven and earth to witness that he had set these before the audience, and thus cleared himself of responsibility of their blood.

This morning's sermon was a most comforting one to the Christians present, being an exposition of the blessings which come to those who die, as Stephen did. What seemed a great loss became a great blessing to the church to Stephen himself, to his own people, and even to the universe of God. So we can feel that when any Christian is cut short or taken away when they seem to be so much needed, it may be the greatest blessing that could come to the church, to them, and to us. Just as the lilies which lie in the dark cold earth never know of the beauties of the world until they wither up and die, to bloom in this fair world, so we never will know what the beauties of heaven are, until we die and pass into that world of wondrous beauty and glory.

The services for today are, preaching at 7:30, preceded by a prayer service of 15 minutes.

Catawba Farmers
to Plant Small
Acreage Stork Beets

Newton, Feb. 21.—Twenty-five farmers of Catawba county have pledged themselves to plant a small acreage of stock beets this year, according to an announcement made here today by J. W. Hendricks, county Agent.

"The value of stock beets for feeding dairy cattle can hardly be estimated," said Mr. Hendricks, "and I have spent much time recently in trying to interest the farmers of this county in growing the crop. Very few stock beets have ever been grown in the county, but where tried they have given splendid results."

ERA OF OPPRESSION HELPS ESTHONIA TO PLACATE MINORITIES

Reval, Esthonia. — Warm tribute to the tenacity, patriotism and "will to law and order" which inspired the Esthonian people to build a state in such a short time, Esthonia has had but four years of peace, was paid by M. Arenol, deputy general-secretary of the League of Nations, who has just left Reval at the head of a special economic committee which visited Esthonia in behalf of the League.

M. Arenol also praised the methods that enabled Esthonia, without foreign credits or assistance, to put her financial house in established order and to pass through the serious crisis of 1923 unscathed. Esthonia, he said, had adapted the old adage "Help thyself, then Providence will help Thee" into "Help thyself, then the great financiers of the world will also be willing to help."

An interesting glimpse of Esthonian aims and ideals is given in an interview with Karl Pusta, the foreign minister. "Having ourselves lived so long under the oppression of foreign rule, it has been easy for us to fall in with the principles laid down by the late President Wilson as to the minorities living in our country," the minister said. "Of our own free will we have embodied in our constitution various safeguards for the minorities; they have even the right to speak their own languages in parliament, and German and Russian deputies already have availed themselves of this privilege."

"In spite of the 200 years we lived under their rule, we never mixed with the Russians; their mentality was always foreign to ours. We hope to be good neighbors with them, but our intimate family life we have reserved for the nations of our own race and culture, the Finnish, Latvian, Polish and we hope in time, the Lithuanian. I firmly believe that a small nation like ours should unite with other smaller countries, not necessarily in a political sense, but in cultural and economic co-operation."

"Let me say," Mr. Pusta declared in conclusion, "that none of the Baltic states has any aggressive policy in the back of her mind. We are es-

entially a group working for peace. On the other hand, I feel sure that should any of the friendly Baltic states be attacked without provocation by some other power, the rest would join in her defense."

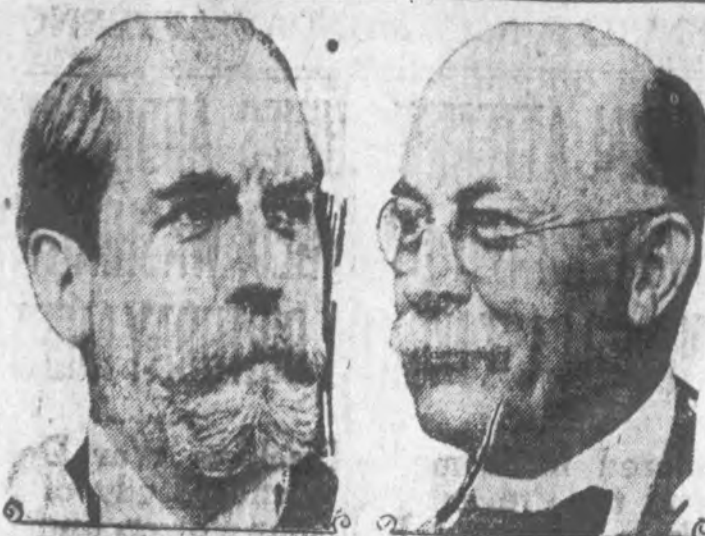

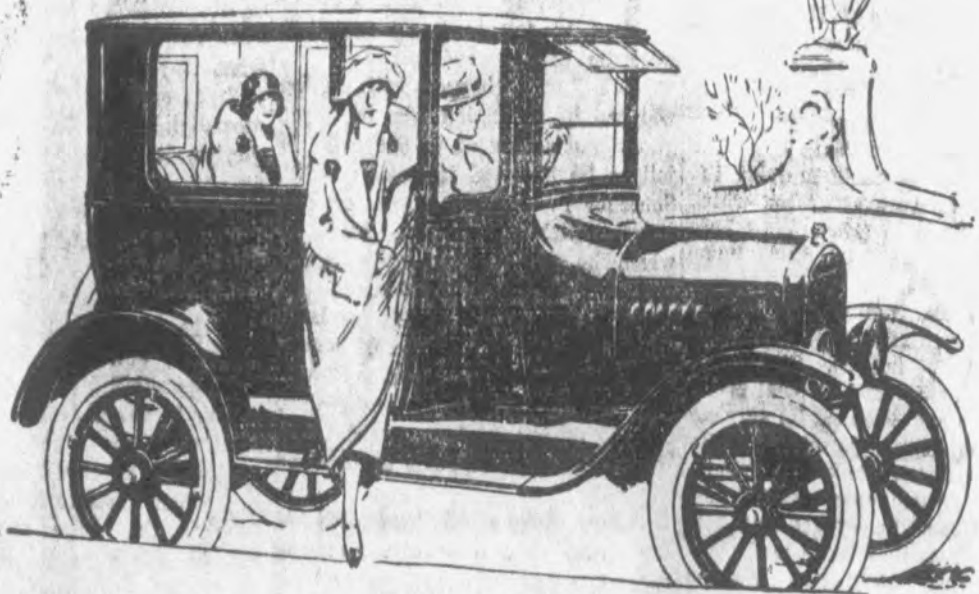

HIGH PROFITS MADE TODAY BY GROWERS OF COFFEE BRAZIL

Santos, Brazil. — The \$1,000,000 which local coffee growers have spent advertising coffee in the United States seems to be coming back into their bank accounts. According to figures released by the American consulate in this city, green coffee exporters shipped 749,894,376 pounds of coffee to the United States during 1924, worth \$139,007,706. This is a drop under 1923 of less than two percent in quantity, but an advance in value of nearly 40 percent.

There has been much criticism in the United States if the system of daily control of shipments at the ports of Santos and Rio de Janeiro, where the demand is maintained at a high level throughout the year by a control over the sale of the crop. It should be noted, however, local dealers get forth, that this public control over sales is fixed on the basis of the average crop. With entries at 35,000 bags a day into Santos and 12,000 bags a day into Rio de Janeiro, the year's arrivals under the original plan, started by the federal government, gave a total of 14,109,000 bags, calculated on a basis of 300 working days a year. This figure is above the average crop for the last ten-year period.

After the July revolution in Sao Paulo was crushed, the federal government ordered the railways to give right-of-way to coffee shipments, and daily arrivals were soon doubled.

Dr. W. L. Schurz, American commercial attaché at Rio de Janeiro, has been in Sao Paulo endeavoring to secure a better system of collecting crop statistics and storage figures for the trade. It is also understood that he intends to tell the Brazilian growers and traders that housewives in the United States have been known to smash corners in food products, and that a ruinous coffee strike is a possible event of the future.

It is undoubtedly true that large profits are being secured on coffee plantations at the present time. The highest price ever recorded for a coffee fazenda was paid a short time ago by an English company organized in Brazil, which paid the equivalent of \$2,500,000 for a farm of 2,500,000 trees. At present prices the average crop grown on this farm is worth about \$1,800,000. A resident population of 3,200 people live on the farm. Wages are low.

If prices remain high, it is thought that rapid development in acreage may occur in Minas Geraes, Sao Paulo's neighbor on the north, where there is a large amount of unsettled public land suitable for coffee grow.

State Sunday School Convention Be Held Greensboro Apr 28.30

Five Sunday School specialists of continent-wide reputation have been secured to speak at the annual State

Sunday School Convention which is to be held in Greensboro on April 28, 29 and 30, according to information received from D. W. Simms, General Superintendent of the North Carolina Sunday School Association.

Dr. Chas. W. Brewbaker, Dayton, Ohio, General Secretary of Sunday School work for the United Brethren Church, who is said to be an authority on Sunday school administration, will deliver several addresses in the convention, and conduct two special conferences for Sunday School Superintendents and other executive officers. Dr. Brewbaker is author of several books on Sunday School administration, which are considered among the best that have been written.

The Adult Division Superintendent for the Christian Disciples Church, Mr. Charles Darsie, St. Louis, Mo., has been secured to do special work in the convention along the line of the Organized Adult Bible Class. Mr. Darsie is widely known as a specialist in the work with adults in the Sunday school. He will conduct two conferences for Adult Bible Class workers.

In charge of the special conferences for workers with young people from 12 to 23 years of age, will be Dr. Percy R. Hayward, Chicago, Ill., Young People's Division Superintendent for the International Council of Religious Education. Dr. Hayward comes to the State highly recommended for the work he is to do, having had years of training and experience in the work with and for young people in the Sunday school.

Miss Meme Brockway, Philadelphia, Pa., Director of Children's work for the Northern Baptist Church, will be the specialist in charge of several special conferences for workers in the Cradle Roll, Beginners, Primary and Junior Departments of the Sunday school. Miss Brockway is likely and favorably known by Sunday school workers of all denominations throughout the country.

To give special emphasis to the work of the Daily Vacation Bible school, Mr. Thos. S. Evans, New York N. Y., secretary of the International Daily Vacation Bible School Association, has been secured. Mr. Evans has traveled extensively in interest of Daily Vacation Bible school work, and is considered one of the best informed men in America on this subject.

Besides the out of State speakers, the Program Committee for the convention has announced that a large number of the best informed and most experienced Sunday school workers in the State will also take part on the program. The committee hopes to announce a full roster of in State speakers at an early date.

The local committee on arrangements in Greensboro are already busy with plans for entertaining the convention. Delegates will be entertained on the Harvard Plan. The convention is for Sunday school

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STOP, LOOK AND LISTEN

There has been much discussion in recent years of how to eliminate fatalities and accidents at railroad grade crossings. The popular cry has been to build overhead or underground approaches. It has been estimated that the cost of such a procedure would almost equal the value of the railroads. To offset the carelessness of the public, the American Steam and Electric Railways have done much educational work to show the danger of crossing tracks without stopping to investigate. Figures show that there were 738 fatalities from June 1 to October 1, 1924, and that this was 131 less than during the corresponding period in 1923.

Crossing accidents can be practically eliminated if people can be awakened to the fact that it is their own lives which are endangered by their own carelessness at grade crossings.

WHOLE NATION MAY HEAR

It is announced that the inaugural ceremonies, March 4, will be broadcast by a chain of stations scattered across the continent so that every nook and corner of the United States will be in tune with Washington. Forty stations will be linked together by

telephone wires, breaking all records for interconnection between broadcasters.

When President Harding was inaugurated in 1921, the public address system was employed enabling the crowd of 125,000 which filled the plaza and overflowed into the park to hear his voice.

Think of the wonderful advancement during the short period of four years! President Coolidge's voice will be carried to a natural audience of 25,000,000.

THE CITY THAT COULD HAVE BEEN SAVED

Here let us say, stands a village of 2,000 people. And here comes a cyclone and erases that village from the map, every life lost. Fancy the nation-wide excitement and the frantic demand that something be done about cyclones.

Well, 2,000 people were killed. That number represents the mere excess of automobile traffic fatalities in 1923 over those of 1922. It happened not in a moment, but in a year; not in one spot, but all over the country. The 2,000 was not just a number; it was husbands, mothers, sons, daughters.

And that was merely the increase. Let us now rear another imaginary town, in fact a city, of 16,000. Note the crowds on the sidewalks at the center. See the young swarm rush out when school quits. And now the dam bursts, up the river, and carries away the whole outfit, leaving not one survivor. That would be another Johnstown flood, not to be forgotten in a generation. Yet the misfortune would be no greater than that the country suffered in the entire number of automobile traffic fatalities for 1923.

The National Safety Council recently put these at 15,714. The Department of Commerce still more recently, and without doubt more accurately, estimated them at 16,452.

A billion spent to cut down a risk that costs over 16,000 lives a year would be well spent. But money alone will not do it. Public opinion plus public regulation intelligently devised and administered can reduce this destruction of life to the vanishing point.

What state will take the lead along this road to safety?—Collier's.

WEEKLY GRAIN LETTER.
Wheat—The price of May wheat reached its high, \$2.05 7-8 on January 28th. From there it declined \$1.77 1-2 on February 11th. Since then there has been an irregular advance, the bulk of trading the week being between \$1.84 at \$1.87. The volume of trading was smaller than during the previous weeks, with less steady flow of orders, making the market more or less choppy. It was largely a trading market with sentiment mixed. There was a lull in foreign buying early in the week and European buyers were reported to be reselling earlier purchases, liberal quantities on ocean passage causing an easier feeling. Later however, more interest was shown on the buying side. Confirmation of heavy purchase of flour by Russia had a strengthening effect upon the market. Crop conditions in that country are reported in bad shape. World exports since July 1 have been 460

million bushels against 444 million to like period last year. The flow from the southern hemisphere has been rapid, and should be expected to ease off later. A features of the domestic statistical situation is the rather sharp falling off of primary receipts in the past week. Primary receipts from July 1 to February 14 have been 434 million against 276 million in like period of the preceding year. During the current week receipts have fallen materially below a year ago, this will probably be reflected in a marked reduction of the visible in several weeks. On March 9th the government will issue a report on supplies remaining no farms March 1. With the close balance between estimates of supplies and requirements this report will have more than usual importance on the market.

Corn—After declining nearly 10 cents from the high levels of two weeks ago, the market steadied and recovered part of this loss, the bulk of trading during the week being between \$1.27 at \$1.32 for May, the higher figures ruling in the latter part of the week. The visible last week increased 1,548,000 compared with an increase of 1,676,000 a year ago. The visible normally increases rapidly in February and reaches its maximum in April. In the past week there has been a marked falling off in primary receipts in recent days averaging less than 1.3 of the receipts of corresponding

days of last year. This small movement has had a strengthening influence on the market.

Oats—After a sagging tendency in prices last week, prices this week have become steadier with May averaging between 53 1-2 at 55 cents, as compared with 62 at 64 cents two weeks ago. The falling off in terminal receipts was the main influence in steadying the market. However, the heavy visible supply, 75,000,000 bushels, largest on record, and the relatively light consumption in comparison with the supply, is a heavy load on the market.

Cotton—We have thoroughly reviewed the cotton situation in the last two or three weeks and as far as the old crop is concerned, there is very little that warrants lengthy comment. The March liquidation continues and the market seems to be more or less in a dead lock.

We believe that after March notice day, the cotton trade as a whole will have a better idea of the cotton situation.

As far as the new crop is concerned, we would say that up to this time we have smiled at the alarming talk of lack of moisture in Texas, but we are now beginning to feel that this matter should be taken fairly seriously. We are practically approaching spring and we think that the weather in the southwest should be watched very carefully.

Facts Concerning
Cotton Industry in
North Carolina

Davidson county has seven cotton mills, five at Lexington and two at Thomasville. These seven mills have a capital stock of approximately \$3,000,000.

Coolidge, Davie county, is the location of the one cotton manufacturing plant in this county. B. N. Duke is president of the mill.

Seven cotton mills are located in Durham county, having a combined

capital stock of more than three million dollars.

Four of the Durham mills are located at Durham, one at East Durham, and two in West Durham.

The presidents of these mills are C. M. Carr, G. W. Hundley, Richard Stockton, Jr., W. A. Erwin and B. N. Duke.

The Edgecombe county cotton mills, two in number have a capital stock of approximately \$1,500,000. Both of these mills are located at Tarboro. W. A. Hart is president of both.

Two cotton mills are located in Winston-Salem, Forsyth county. A. H. Bahnsen and M. P. Orr are presidents of the two concerns, which have a capital of \$642,600.

The Sterling Cotton Mills are located at Franklinton, Franklin county. This mill has a capital stock of \$700,000 and S. C. Vann is president. Gaston county has eighty-two cotton mills, twelve at Belmont, six at Bessemer City, seven at Cherryville, one at Cramerton, one at Dallas, forty at Gastonia, one at High Shoals, two at Lowell, one at McAdenville, six at Mount Holly, and five at Stanley.

Millions of dollars are invested in the capital stock of these concerns, the county ranking first in the number of cotton mills, as compared with other North Carolina counties.

RAIL STEEL MILLS
GOOD BUSINESS IN PROSPECT

Chicago, Feb. 23.—Production of rail steel for reinforcing bars is expected to shatter all previous records during the present year. A survey just completed by the Rail Steel Products association shows that most mills are running at capacity to meet the demand.

During the last 12 months production has totaled more than 225,000 tons, the survey shows. Advance orders from all sections of the country have absorbed the output of most mills for the first quarter of the year, or up to April 1.

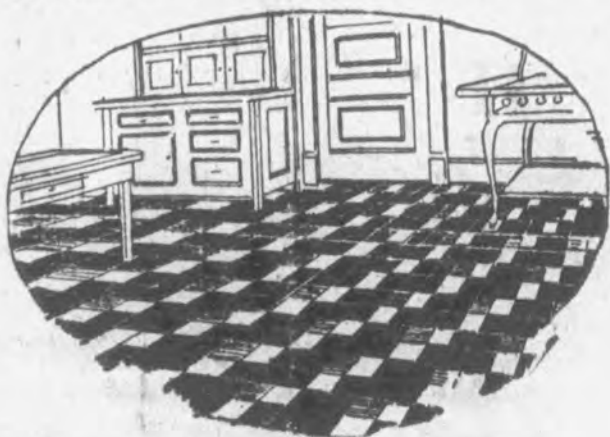

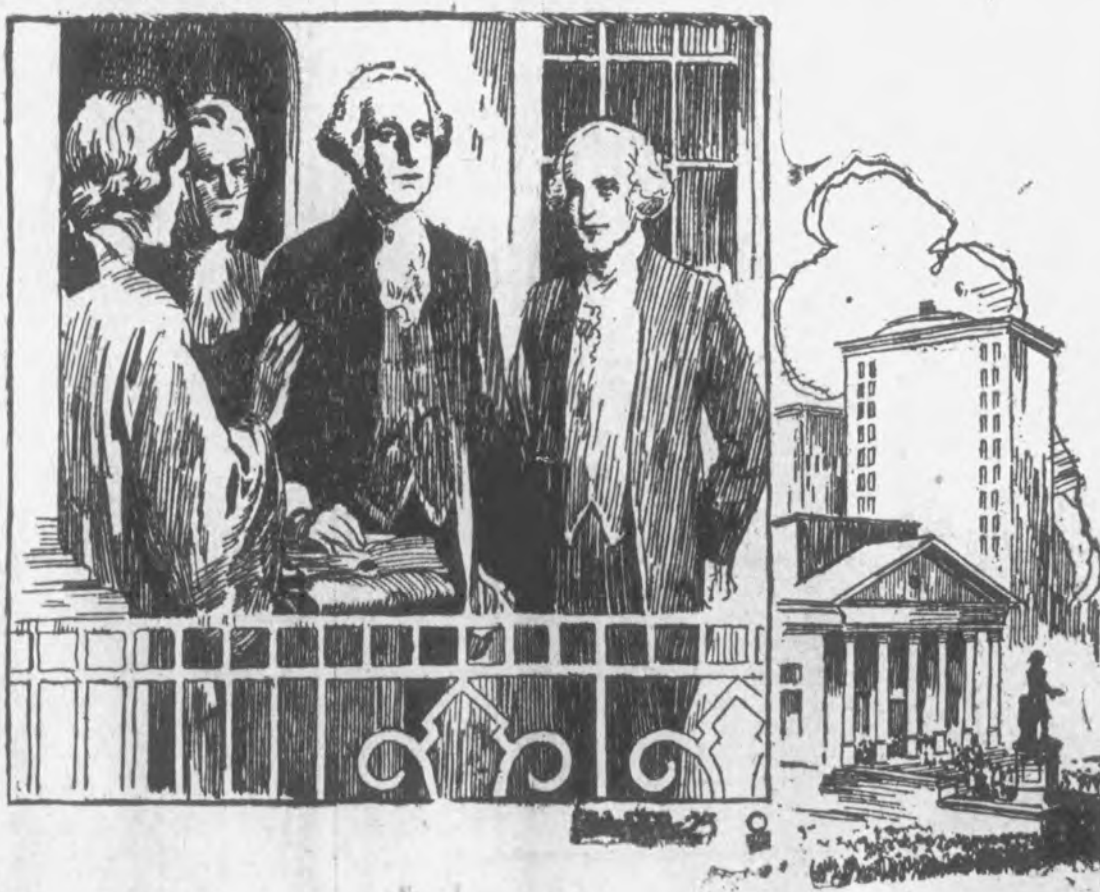
