HOUSES TODAY

Bill Introduced to Create Board of Pardons; Marriage Bands Bill Again Tabled; 50 New Local Bills Introduced

Committee Finds That It Has More Than \$2,000 Left for Expenses; Vote Stands 5 to 1 to Reopen Hearings

Raleigh, Feb. 24.—Passage on final reading in the House of the bill to create an executive budget system and the introduction of two bills which would limit the powers of Governor and Secretary of the state, and turn these powers over to other agencies, were the outstanding developments in the General Assembly today.

In the Senate, which operated at top speed, both Houses disposed of a mass of minor legislation, and proceeded further with clearing the calendar for the important work of the remaining two weeks of the session. In the Senate, a bill was introduced by Senators Tapp and Hargett, which would take away from the Secretary of State the control of automobile license department, and its subsidiary department, and give it to the Department of Revenue. In the House a measure went forward which would provide for a constitutional amendment to create a board of pardon, which would take all the clemency powers now exercised by the governor.

Raleigh, Feb. 24.—Having for its purpose the relieving of the Governor of his pardon duties, Representative Sutton, of Lenoir, today introduced a bill in the House, which would provide for an amendment to the constitution, creating a board of pardons to act on all clemency cases. This authority at the present is in the chief executive. In the Senate, Senator Spencer, of Hyde, sent forward a measure designed to prohibit the establishment of branch banks, and to limit branch banking. The Senator stated that the measure was introduced by request. Senator Heath also introduced an important bill embodying Governor McLean's recommendation as to state prisons, made in his message of yesterday. Both Houses operated at top speed today, disposing of a mass of local legislation. Approximately 50 new local bills were introduced in the House, while half that number fell in the Senate Copeias.

In the House, Representative Whitaker, of Guilford, introduced a measure to create a department of conservation to take over and enlarge the activities of geological and economic survey. Senator Womble, of Forsyth, introduced a bill, which was designed to create a department of real estate. A favorable report was returned on the measure to allow New Hanover county the issuing of \$1,250,000 in bonds to bridge Cape Fear River so as to connect Wilmington with the Asheville, Charlotte and Wilmington hard surfaced Highways.

In the Senate, after disposing of the routine, both bodies got down to the discussion of the committee substitute for the State wide game bill. There were a number of amendments to the measure sent forward for consideration. The House, after an hour of debate, again tabled the marriage bands bill, which would have required 15 days notice of intent before licenses could be procured for marriage.

After extended debate, the State Wide Game bill was passed by the Senate and sent to the House.

HJALMAR BRANTING
FORMER PREMIER OF
SWEDEN DIED TODAY

Stockholm, Feb. 24.—Hjalmar Branting, former premier, died shortly afternoon today. Mr. Branting, thrice premier of Sweden, and known as one of the most active European statesmen in the affairs of the League of Nations, was taken seriously ill with inflammation of the lungs, about the middle of December. He resigned his premiership on January 24, but was retained in the cabinet. He was 64 years old.

CONFEREES AGREE
ON POSTAL PAY AND
RATE INCREASE BILL

Would Increase Postal Salaries as of Jan. 1; Rate Increase to Become Effective April 15

Washington, Feb. 24.—A postal pay and rate increase bill, substantially the form as that passed by the House, was agreed on today by conferees on the Senate and House measures.

The only important modifications of the House measure was made in second class rate. The conferees accepted the form of the lower rate in this class. In the form agreed on by the conferees, the bill would increase postal salaries as of January 1, this year, and the rate increase would become effective next April 15th.

President Coolidge today asked Post Master General Hughes to furnish him an analysis of the House bill. These provisions, Mr. Coolidge believes, would involve direct tax on the treasury of \$22,000,000, and suggests that an outlay is given him.

Senator Stanley
Is Injured in Auto
Accident Today

Washington, Feb. 24.—Senator Stanley, of Kentucky, was severely but not critically, injured in an automobile accident here today. The Senator was taken to Emergency Hospital, where it was said that in addition to bruises, he appeared to have suffered a fractured rib. Physicians who made the examination, said there was no indication of serious consequences, and predicted an early recovery without complications.

Three Persons Killed
and Many Injured
In Train Collision

Harris, N. J., Feb. 24.—Three persons were killed and one reported missing, and more than a score injured when a New York-Philadelphia express train on the Pennsylvania railroad crashed into the rear of a New York-Washington train at Manhattan today. Most of the injured were in the dining car of the Philadelphia train, which was hurled from the track, and later caught fire. Most of the injured were employed by the railroad.

Russia Produces New Bee

Berlin.—Professor Moschewnikoff, of Moscow, is reported to have bred a new type of bee which is a cross between a mother bee and a working bee. This bee, upon the development of which the Russian scientist is said to have been working for over a year, has the ovaries of the mother bee fully developed and also the wax glands of the working bee. The professor believes it may be of great value in bee culture.

Rep. Burton Defends Right
of House to Express Itself
On International Policies

Washington, Feb. 24.—The right of the House of Representatives to express itself upon certain international policies, was defended today in a report drawn up by Representative Burton, of Ohio, a member of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, which is to be filed at the request of that committee. It will accompany a resolution recently approved by the committee, which would place the House on record as favoring American Adhesion to the World Court.

Constitutional provision for the advice and consent of the two Houses of Congress in regard to treaties and international agreement, Mr. Burton said, "is largely based upon the necessity for secrecy and dispatch."

TWO PRISONERS
STILL AT LARGE

Seven Prisoners Escape Through Roof of the Tubercular Ward in Central Prison, Raleigh

Raleigh, Feb. 24.—Five of the seven prisoners, who escaped from the Central Prison here, about eleven o'clock last night, had been captured at ten this morning, and prison authorities stated that they expect to recapture the remaining two during the afternoon. The fugitives, all negroes, made their escape through the roof of the tubercular ward. Three of them were retaken before they were able to leave the prison inclosure. Two others were recaptured by Wake county deputies near Apex, after they had beaten their way that far on a country wagon. The prisoners still at large are James Hannah and Kenith Shepherd.

Appropriation Bill
Increase Salaries
Sent Budget Bureau

Washington, Feb. 24.—The Legislation Appropriation bill with its provision for an increase in the salaries of members of Congress and of the Cabinet, was received today at the White House and to the Budget Bureau for study. Meanwhile, Senator Borah, Republican of Idaho, has announced that he will try, through an amendment to a deficiency appropriation bill now pending, to kill the increase.

California Oil Production Drops

San Francisco.—The production of oil in California during the last year was 230,045,000 barrels, 33,688,895 barrels less than in the previous year according to a statement issued by the state mining bureau.

Means of Reduction Avoidable in Handling of Cotton Subject of Conference in Raleigh Today

Raleigh, Feb. 24.—Means of reduction avoidable in the handling of cotton was the subject of discussion at conference here today of the Department of Agricultural experts and representatives of various branches of the industry. Secretary Gore, in calling the conference, invited suggestions for eliminating waste of the staple through careless ginning practices, inadequate warehouses, and general irregularities in handling.

The Secretary himself addressed the gathering, and among those attending was Dr. B. W. Kilgore, of Raleigh, President of the American Cotton Growers Exchange, Harvis Gordan, Secretary of the American Cotton Association, and John M. Brown, President of the New Orleans Spot Cotton Associations.

DR. MCLEES TELLS
OF LAST MESSAGE
OF GOD TO SINNERS

Sent to Show How Anxious God Was for Sinners to Come to Him; Subject This Evening "Christ, the Only Way Back"

The sermon last night at the revival services being conducted at the Presbyterian church was on the last message of God as found in the last book of the Bible and the 17th verse. Dr. McLees said that the last messages of great men and women are preserved and held sacred, that the last message of some loved one is treasured by those left behind, and this message was the message of our Lord Jesus Christ after he had ascended into heaven. It was one sent to the sinner to show how anxious he was that all men might come to Him. It is brought by the Holy Spirit, by the Church of Christ over the whole world, it was to be carried by all who heard it: it was intended for all who thirst for salvation, and then as if to make any who might doubt that he was included, he closed this invitation with these words, "Who-soever will, let him take of the water of life freely." That puts a barricade between the sinner and any evil influence, even Satan himself, that he might be free to accept it if he wills. The responsibility for our salvation therefore rests on us, on our being willing to be saved, and if men will not then there remains nothing for him but utter darkness, misery and ruin after this life. It was one of Dr. McLees' great sermons, and was listened to by a very attentive audience. In the appeal made for prayer for sinners, for those who had some they wanted converted, many hands went up.

The sermon this morning from the subject: "The immortality of influence" was one of the best Dr. McLees has preached, taken from the Hebrews 11:4, "He being dead, yet speaketh." He said in part, that no man dies really, when his body is buried and more than did Abel, of whom God said that he still speaks tho' he has been buried nearly 6000 years. As some one has said "I am a part of all I have ever met" so we are a part of every face we have looked upon, every word we have heard, and so are others who look upon our faces, hear our voices note our actions. And it is more than that; the past is irrevocable, it is fixed, we can never alter it, whether it be good or bad; we can be forgiven, we can be changed, but the past of our lives is unalterable, it will live for all eternity, and blast, ruin, or inspire, sweeten throughout every age of the world. And the past is not a dead one, it is a living one: just as truly as was the life of Abel: it will affect the history of the world until the end of time. How careful, therefore we ought to be of our influence, that it is always for that which is good, pure noble uplifting. He then plead that we think on these things, and try to make the remainder of our lives an influence for good and for Jesus Christ.

The services for the evening will be as follows: Prayer services at 7:15 followed by the regular service at 7:30, when Dr. McLees will preach from the subject: "Christ, the Way Back." This sermon will be very helpful to any who have doubts about the atonement.

ATTENTION COTTON FARMERS.
Germination tests from perhaps 500 samples of cotton seed show that the situation this year is much more serious than we have experienced in a long time. Many samples

show a germination of as low as 50 per cent. It seems very important, therefore, that as many growers as possible have the germination test made of the seed they intend to plant. Since the State Department of Agriculture will make these germination tests free of charge to farmers of the state, I feel that the farmers should send in samples.

Representative samples of about a teaspoonful should be sent to J. L. Burgers, State Department of Agriculture, Raleigh, N. C. The sender should state as to whether the seed are from the 1923 or 1924 crop. If more than one sample is sent at a time, each one should be numbered so as to be able to identify them when the report is received. It will probably take about ten days to make the germination test, so it is highly important that those taking advantage of this opportunity should send their samples as soon as possible.

MR. LAMB TO ASSIST FILING STATE INCOME TAX HERE THIS WEEK

Mr. Luke Lamb, State Deputy Commissioner of Revenue, will be in Greenville on Wednesday and Thursday, the twenty-fifth and twenty-sixth of February, 1925, and in Farmville on Friday, the twenty-seventh of February, 1925, for the purpose of assisting in filing state income tax reports for the year ending December 31, 1924. While in Greenville Mr. Lamb will be located at the Proctor Hotel and at the Davis Hotel while in Farmville.

The law requires every single person who had in the calendar year 1924 a net income of \$1000.00 or more and every married person who had a net income of \$2000.00 or more and all corporations whether they had an income or not to make a return on or before March the fifteenth, 1925. Net income is gross income less the deductions, but before the

personal exemption is taken off. All individuals, partnerships and corporations are required to report the names of persons to whom they paid \$1000.00 or more during the year 1924; all partnerships are required to file a return for information, but the income derived therefrom is taxable in the individual return.

If an individual is doubtful whether a return is necessary or not, a State Deputy Commissioner or the State Commissioner at Raleigh should be consulted as failure to file a return when one is required subjects one to a penalty and fine.

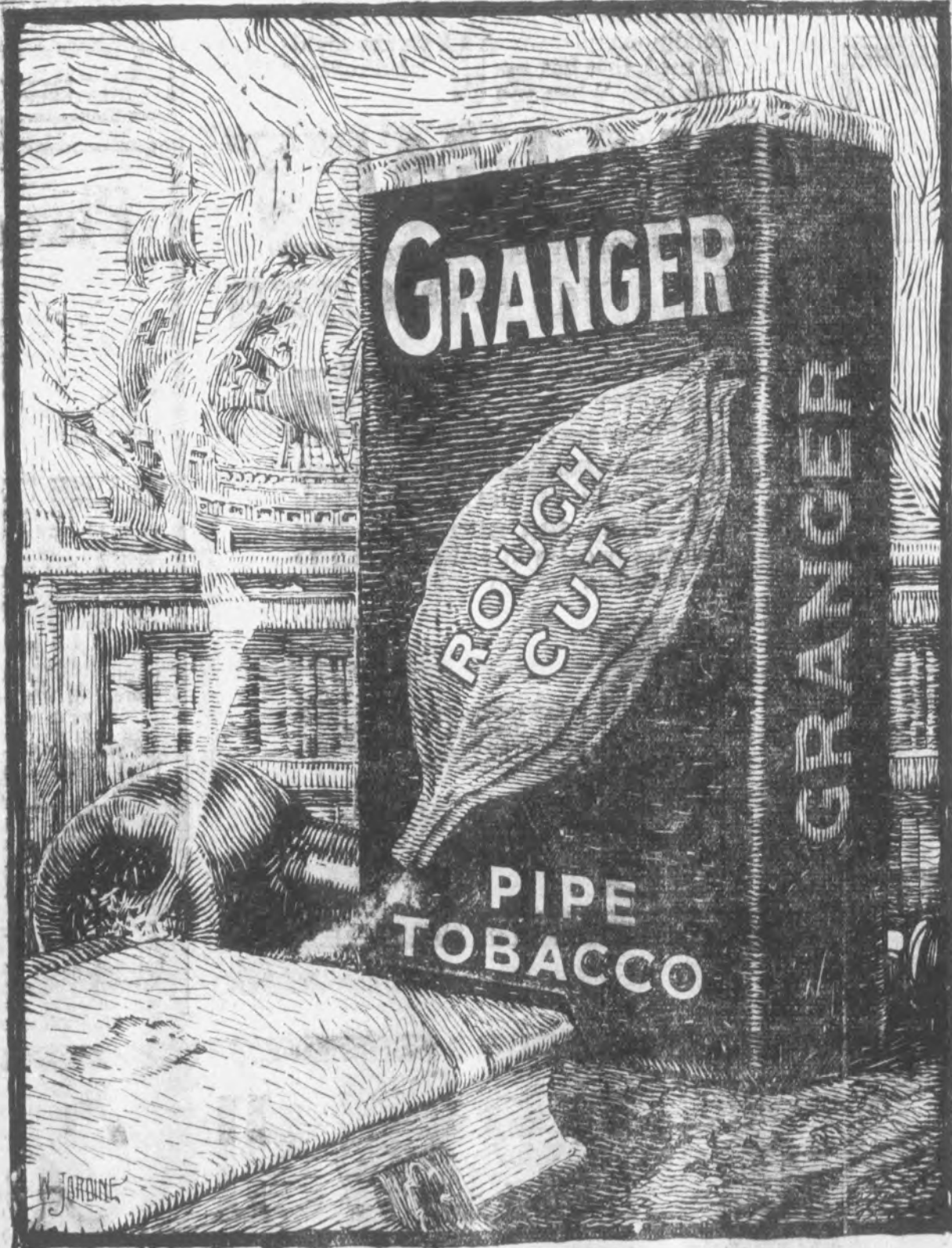

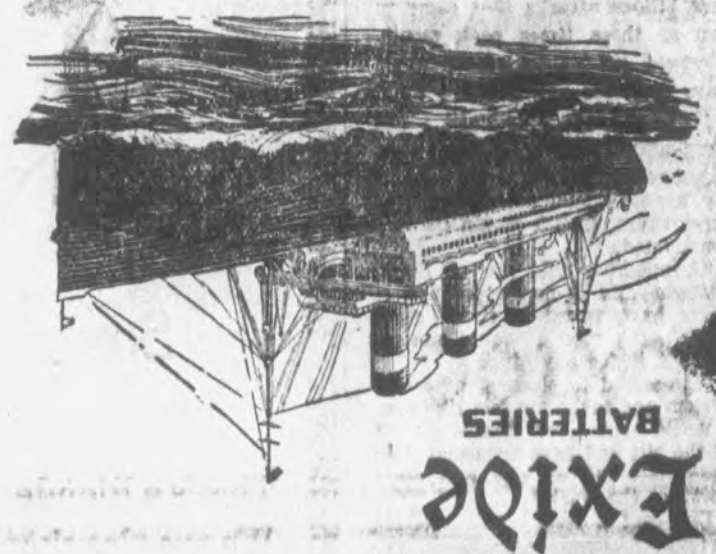
