REVIVAL SERVICES NEARING A CLOSE IN PRES. CHURCH

Public Urged to Hear Last Three of Dr. Mc- Lees' Sermons; Strong Sermon Last Night on "Christ, the Only Way Back"

At the evening service Dr. McLees preached a powerful sermon on "Christ, the only way back" to a large audience which were held throughout by the flow of great thoughts and beautiful words used by the speaker. His text was from Hebrews 2:3 "How shall we escape if we neglect so great salvation?" He said in part, that any sort of salvation must be great, even though it saved us only for this life; and if we knew that we could secure one that would rid us of the miseries of this life, and send us to a dreamless sleep at the end any sensible man would take it, but the salvation that has been wrought for us is greater than that. It must be great because the great God of the Universe designed and executed it in just as wonderful a way as he did when he made the Universe, that it must be great when it took the Son of God to execute it, and the price he paid for it was his own death on the cross.

And the only thing that men need to do to miss it, is just to do nothing. Many are lost by doing nothing. "We don't have to reject it, we just neglect it." But some say, "I don't need it." I am as good as those in the church, men are not saved by goodness, they are saved by faith in Christ. But may we not keep the law, and be saved? No man can keep the holy law of God; none but those who are perfect sinners, and even if we could, what of the sins of the past; they must be atoned for, and only by the death of some one can sin be atoned for, either by the death of the sinner or by the death of Christ for him. Christians inherit heaven, are accepted in God's sight, their sins are not counted to them, but it is by the righteousness of Christ, not our own. So, we are shut up to this, either we must accept this salvation by faith, and be saved from the consequences of sin, or we must pay the penalty of sin ourselves. He appealed to the audience to be sensible, and realize that their only hope of salvation was through Christ, and accept Him.

The morning sermon was spoke to Christians specially from the subject: Living in the right Climate. The text was from Galatians 5:22-23, "But the fruit of the Spirit is love. He said that the purpose of the growth and the whole life of a tree was fruitage. That was the whole effort of the whole tree, that this is also the purpose of the Christian life, and the output of the life determined what kind of Christiansmen are. Some men manifest the works of the flesh, while others bear the fruit of the spirit. He said that it was essential to the life that first of all it be planted in the right kind soil and atmosphere, that it breathe the right kind of atmosphere, that it feed on the most wholesome kind of food. So, with Christians, if we are to be beautiful and, well rounded Christians, we must live in the right kind of an atmosphere, and not in the atmosphere of the world, with its dwarfing influences, we must breathe daily prayer in private, with the family, and live a life of constant prayer, that we must feed on good books, good literature, and above all on the word of God. We must meditate on it, ruminate on it, that we may digest and assimilate it.

Services for this evening are: prayer service at 7:15, followed by the telling of a wonderful story by Dr. McLees.

It is hoped that for tomorrow the church will be filled with the church members of all churches, and that all who are anxious to hear this message will close their places of business, leave their work at home and come to this service at 10 a. m. Only three more services and Dr. McLees must leave. Whatever you do must be done quickly. Some persons in Greenville will regret forever that they have missed these sermons after he has gone.

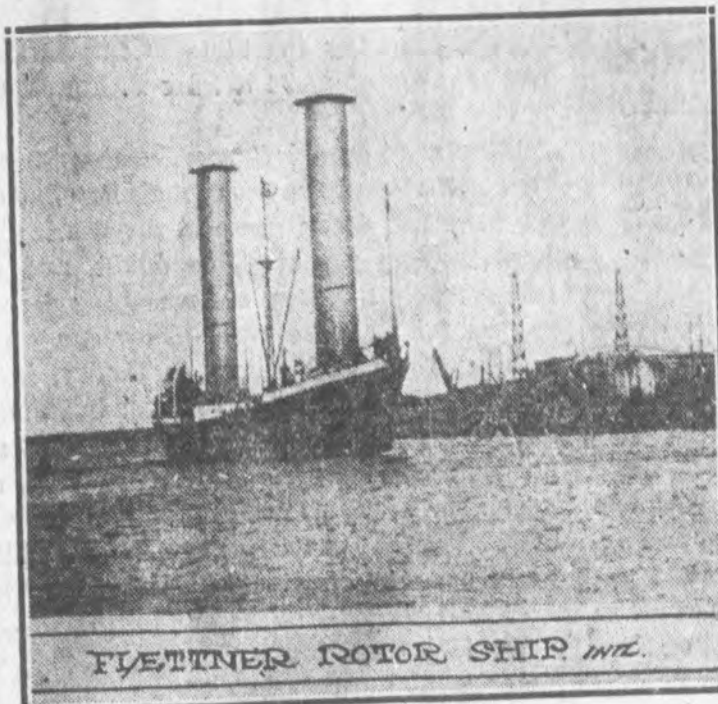
MRS. FLORENCE P. KAHN & SON, INC.

MEDICAL STUDENT STARTS TWO YEARS FASTING DIET

Chicago, Feb. 25.—Harold G. Holck, 38 years old medical student of the University of Chicago, today started on a fasting diet that will last for two years. The object is to determine just how much food is needed for a keen thinker. He will eat only when hungry, paying no heed to ordinary meal schedules, and will eat very little, measuring and weighing every bit taken. During the period, mental tests will be given him, including mathematics, puzzles, and typewriting accuracy. At the end of two years results will be tabulated, experts expect to work out from them an ideal human ration.

BILL TO INCREASE MAYOR'S POWER IS KILLED YESTERDAY

Delegations From Here Appear for and Against the Measure; Opponents Win by 8 to 7 Vote

Raleigh, Feb. 25.—Opponents of the bill to give the mayor's courts of Greenville and Farmville the same jurisdiction as the Pitt county court won by a vote of 8 to 7 in the Senate committee on courts and judicial districts yesterday afternoon when the proposed measure was reported unfavorably. Senator Grady gave notice of a minority report.

Sensors Sams, Seawell, Squires and Carter rose before the vote and explained that the measure seemed so clearly unconstitutional to them that they would cast their votes against it.

Two opposing groups of Pitt citizens appeared for and against the measure. Senator Everett took an impartial ground and asked the committee to vote on the bill on its merits alone. Representative Horton, of Pitt, advocated the bill straight out while Representative Pittman, of Pitt, stated that he was opposed to the bill personally but would vote for it as he believed the people wanted the new jurisdiction for the courts.

Judge Harry Whedbee led the forces against the bill while Mayor D. M. Clark, of Greenville, led the supporters. R. C. Flanagan, Greenville attorney, and Mayor Marvin Horton, of Farmville, spoke in support of the measure. J. C. Lanier, solicitor of the county court, opposed it. Both sides offered petitions and attacked the petitions offered by their opponents.

Those who went to Raleigh in favor of the proposed bill were, R. C. Flanagan, C. B. Rowlett, W. H. Hinton, Ralph Garrett, John Hodges, G. A. Clark, John Clark, Chief Lester Jones, R. E. Sellers, Manley Sellers, T. A. Person, J. L. Evans, Swanson Graves, Mayor D. M. Clark and several others. Those that opposed the measure were W. H. Whedbee, J. C. Lanier and Julius Brown.

Negro Killed When He Attempts Escape Negro Prison Farm

Raleigh, Feb. 25.—In the third break for freedom of state prisoners, in as many weeks, Charles Jackson, 29, negro of Edgecombe county, was instantly killed, and John McDowell, a negro of Rockingham, was wounded by guards this morning. The break occurred at the negro prison farm, just outside of Raleigh. The negroes tried to escape while about 30 men were being marched through the prison enclosure for work. Three guards and an overseer were with them. None of the other prisoners attempted to escape. All the guards fired when the negroes tried to make their escape.

Jackson was sent up from Edgecombe county in January for a term of seven to ten years, for an assault with intent to kill. McDowell had been in the prison for nearly six years and was serving a term for murder, from 20 to 30 years. He had previously escaped in 1920, but recaptured.

Refuses to Testify at Inquest Into the Death of McClintock

Chicago, Feb. 25.—Mrs. Wm. D. Sheppard, who was Co-guardian of the millionaire orphan, William M. McClintock, today refused to testify at the inquest into the death of the young man. Her husband, who was foster father and chief beneficiary of the orphan's will, which was drawn less than a year ago, when he became 21 years of age, also refused to testify.

Pres. Ebert's Condition Shows An Improvement

Berlin, Feb. 25.—A official bulletin today announced that President Ebert is progressing normally from his operation yesterday morning for appendicitis. The President had a good night, the bulletin said, and his temperature and general condition are satisfactory.

TWO MORE ARRESTS MADE TUESDAY IN DOPE OPERATIONS

Federal Agents Con- ducting Anti-Narcotic Drive Have Caught Approximately Twen- ty-Five Persons

Charlotte, Feb. 25.—A Dallas Dentist and a pretty Gastonia girl today were in the hands of Federal agents, who are conducting an anti-narcotic drive in this section of North Carolina. Miss Oran Hicks was arrested after officers had raided her home in Gastonia, and had found a supply of morphine valued at \$2,000, and nine hypodermic syringes. Dr. Arthur B. Boyles was arrested in Dallas, while in his automobile in the act of selling morphine, according to officers. His automobile was confiscated. These arrests brought the total number of persons that have fallen into the far flung net of the agents to approximately 25.

The Gastonia girl has been used as a "plant" in the opinion of officers, and her home utilized for storing purposes. She confessed, agents said, that she had been distributing morphine under the direction of some one else in Charlotte, Greensboro, and several other cities in the state. With the arrest of Dr. Boyles, officers said, they had discovered clues which might reveal New York as the supplying point for narcotics received in this section of North Carolina.

WILL REMOVE GRASS BLADE FROM LUNGS

Little Girl Journeys One Thousand Miles for Operation; Sur- geon's Services Free of Charge

St. Louis, Feb. 25.—"Jimmie" English, 11 year old girl, after a journey of one thousand miles from San Antonio, Texas, for the purpose of an operation to dislodge a blade grass, which entered her lungs, four years ago, was due here today. San Antonio Surgeons feared to operate because of an abscess near the heart. Public subscriptions have been raised for \$1,000, and the child with a physician started the trip in a free pullman compartment, as a guest of a transporting railroad. Surgeon's services will be given free of charge for the operation today.

Christian's Condition Reported Slightly Improved Today

Raleigh, Feb. 25.—Representative Christian, of Cumberland county, who was knocked down and seriously injured by a taxi cab Monday night, is reported slightly better this morning. It was stated at the hospital this morning, that he had partially regained consciousness.

NAVAL TRANSPORT CARRYING LIQUOR RAIDED LAST NIGHT

Several Hundred Gallons of Liquor Are Seized When Beaufort Docks at Norfolk; Naval Investigation to Be Held

Norfolk, Feb. 25.—Several hundred gallons of liquor were seized aboard the Naval transport Beaufort when she docked here last night, from the West Indies. The seizure was made by a detachment of marines from the Naval Base here. The liquor was said to have been found in state rooms of various officers, ranging in rank from pay clerks to lieutenants. The order for the raid on the Beaufort was issued by Admiral Welles, Commander of the 5th naval district, who is said to have received his information, of the liquor being aboard the transport, from custom officials here.

As soon as the vessel docked, marines were thrown around her and no one was permitted to leave until a thorough search was made. A naval investigation will be held.

Washington, Feb. 25.—Violations of the prohibition law, as well of Naval Regulations, were involved in the case of the Navy Transport, Beaufort, which transported liquor into Hampton Rhodes, which was pointed out here today by Government officers.

No report has reached the Navy Department, and the action to be taken will not be announced until Secretary Wilbur has had an opportunity to study the case. Under the Prohibition Law, it is illegal to bring liquor into American Waters, and the Navy rules are that no liquor may be kept aboard.

Washington, Feb. 25.—The conference report on the Postal Pay and Rate Increase was adopted today by the House.

The Senate's concurrence is necessary before the measure can go to the president.

MEETING TO DISCUSS BOLL WEEVIL TO BE HELD IN FARMVILLE

Meeting Which Will Be Held Tomorrow at 11 O'clock Promises to Be Largely Attended; Interesting Program Arranged

The section wide boll weevil campaign to be held at Farmville Thursday of this week promises to be one of the best attended and most important meetings of its kind held in Eastern Carolina in a long time.

Recent reports from the Government Experiment Station in Louisiana show that a larger percentage of boll weevils have gone through the winter and come out alive than in many years past. This indicates a large quantity of grown weevils to begin the season with and will mean heavy infestation later on. Government experts are already estimating that the bottom crop is all that can be counted on this year without a very determined fight against this bug.

The meeting at Farmville, under the auspices of the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce and State College of Agriculture, is called for the purpose of mapping out a definite program for this season. Every person who is interested in any line of business in Eastern North Carolina will be directly affected by this pest and is urged to attend this meeting at Farmville, Thursday of this week at 11 o'clock.

WRIGHT HONORED EDUCATIONAL MEET

Elected President of the American Association of Teachers Colleges for the Ensuing Year

At the meeting of the American Association of Teachers Colleges at Cincinnati on February 21, Robert H. Wright, President of East Carolina Teachers College, was elected President of the Association for the ensuing year.

This is a signal honor both to the state of North Carolina and to the newly elected president.

The many friends of President Wright are greatly pleased with this recognition of his ability and of the success of his work as head of the Teachers College.

Barglum's Contract Cancelled Today

Atlanta, Ga., Feb. 25.—Gutzon Barglum's contract with the Stone Mountain Confederate Memorial Association, was cancelled by a formal resolution of the Association's Executive committee at a meeting here today.

President Hollins N. Randolph was instructed to appoint a sub-committee to select another sculptor to carry on the carving on the side of the mountain a group of figures representing leaders of the Confederate forces.

LEGISLATION WOULD INCREASE PENSION CIVIL WAR VETERANS

House Enters Debate on Australian Ballot Bill; Measure Would In- crease Confederate Pension 33 1-3 Per cent

The bill calling for the adoption of the state wide Australian Ballot System, went over today as unfinished business of the House, after parliamentary maneuver had prevented its consideration. The measure came before the House on a minority report, which was adopted by a vote of 65 to 49. An attempt to bring it up for immediate consideration and passage was then made, but a motion to recess until eight o'clock tonight to take up the Revenue bill prevailed, and the Australian Ballot bill went over until tomorrow morning.

Raleigh, Feb. 25.—Coming before it, as a special order of business on a minority report, the Australian ballot bill was brought directly on to the calendar for immediate consideration, when the House threw out the majority report and adopted the minority report 65 to 49. The body then entered upon debate of the measure on its immediate passage.

In the Senate, the outstanding measure was by Senators Heath, Burleson and Bethune, to increase the Confederate Pension approximately 33 1-3 percent. In both Houses a number of bills of minor importance were introduced, the record in the lower body being the largest for any one day's session. 82 new bills were introduced, 15 of them being sent forward by Miss Alexander, of Mecklenburg. Though a number of her bills were of local character, some of them were state wide measures.

Representative Connor, of Wilson, introduced today, the bill which the Senate received yesterday to provide a third \$5,000,000 school fund for the purposes of aiding public schools of the state.

Among the most important measures introduced by Miss Alexander were the following: To provide for the retirement of teachers of the state on pension after 25 years of service. To make it a violation of the law to publish the name of the woman in cases of criminal attack. To make it a misdemeanor for officers to obtain concessions from prisoners by third degree methods. To repeal the Absentee Voters' Law. To prevent public officers from being elected officials.

Watson Plans to Enter Plea of Irresponsibility

Charlotte, Feb. 25.—Thomas I. Watson, of Greensboro, who killed Joseph E. McDonough, of the same city when he found him on February 15 in a local hotel with Mrs. Watson, prepared today, as his case was called in Superior Court, to enter a plea of irresponsibility for his action, due to the great shock of the condition under which he found his wife.

5TH DISTRICT DENTAL SOCIETY MEETING IN KINSTON TODAY

Many Interesting Pap- ers to Be Read By Prominent Physicians; Election of Officers to Feature Session

The Fifth District Dental Society is holding an all-day meeting at the Chamber of Commerce rooms in Kinston today. The Fifth District comprises much of the territory east of Rocky Mount and north of Fayetteville, and the society is composed of 125 members.

An interesting program has been arranged by the chairman, Dr. O. Stanley Waldrop, and the committee, and several papers will be read by some of the state's best known dentists. At 1 o'clock a luncheon will be served.

Election of officers will feature the session. The following are the present officers: Dr. J. Garvis Poole, of Kinston, President; Dr. J. V. Turner, of Wilson, Vice-President and Dr. A. C. Boone, of Rocky Mount is Secretary-Treasurer.

Drs. A. M. Schultz and B. McK. Johnston, of this city, attended the meeting.

SENATOR M'CORMICK FOUND DEAD TODAY

Circumstances Surrounding Death Are Not Available; Room Found Locked

Washington, Feb. 25.—Senator Med. McCormick, of Illinois, died here today. He was found dead in his room at the Hamilton Hotel at 10 o'clock. Circumstances surrounding his death are not immediately available. The office declined to make any announcement. The hotel officials said that his death was the immediate result of gastric hemorrhages. Senator McCormick's death was discovered when Dr. Nobles Peter Barnes, who had been attending him, was called, after hotel attendants found his room locked, and could get no reply for requests for admittance.

Senator McCormick, who was defeated for renomination in the Illinois Republican primaries by former Governor Charles S. Deneer, was to have retired on March 4. He recently had been prominently mentioned for a diplomatic post. The Senator was 47 years of age, and a member of a famous Illinois family.

THE MAJESTY OF THE LAW

Senator Stanley of Kentucky has delivered a passionate protest against the national mania for passing laws. The Fifty-ninth Congress, he says, passed 30,000 bills and resolutions, and the present Congress has before it 17,946 measures. Exactly.

We have laws making it a misdemeanor to deliver milk and ice for sick children on Sun-

day, provided that nothing in this act be construed to prohibit the sale or delivery of ice-cream; laws against taking bass of less than 2 3-4 inches from the Housatonic River; laws against women's smoking in public places; laws against shooting dice; laws authorizing operation of betting machines at race-tracks upon payment of \$1,000 for each day or fraction thereof to the State Treasury; laws authorizing constables to shoot all dogs not bearing licenses, as provided in section 4 of this act; laws making it a misdemeanor, punishable by \$10 fine, to shoot a buzzard; laws authorizing the State Comptroller to pay the sum of \$7.94 to Silas P. Lundenhopper.

"The main trouble," says Senator Stanley, "is not that we have not enough law but that we have not enough respect for the law we have." Very profound, no doubt, and certainly true. But how are we going to have respect for all these laws? How can we remember them all? Laws, in theory, is the enacted will of human society; but not a single member of our American society, and not all the members added up together, can remember all the laws that are already on the statute books. The very Judges blink when attorneys quote the precedents, and cases halt while citations are prepared.—N. Y. World.

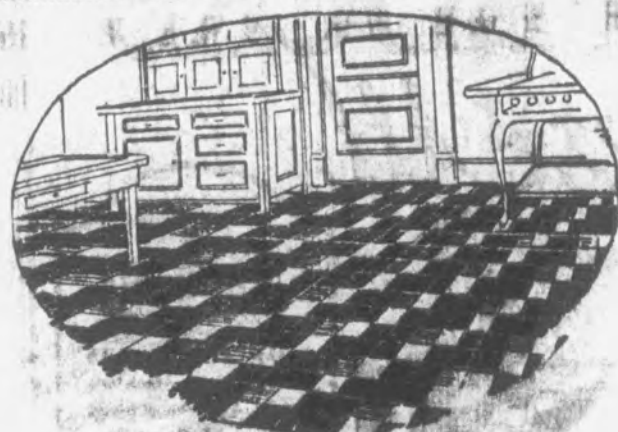

Campaign for the Endowment Fund Begins This Week

Raleigh, Feb. 25.—The campaign in North Carolina to raise North Carolina's quota of the American Legion and Auxiliary five million dollar endowment fund will get under way this week with announcement by Governor McLean of members of his honorary committee, it was announced here today. The governor is expected to name fifty of sixty of the leading men and women in the State to serve with him during the duration of the campaign.

The campaign, backed by the national organizations of the Legion and Auxiliary, is being carried on in every State in the Union. The five million dollars to be raised for the endowment fund is to provide for permanency in the administration of the work of the national rehabilitation committee in the administration of child welfare activities and in the handling of the service and child welfare work in the department.

The State's quota of the fund is \$60,000. It is the announced purpose of the legion to spend in this welfare and rehabilitation work only the income or interest on the money raised, rather than the principal. State Commander Wade Phillips, of Lexington, is lending his support to the campaign, and is aiding John S. Skerry, field secretary of the National organization, in perfecting the State organization for carrying on the drive.

Farmers Advised to Plant Pecan Trees Before Last of Mar.

Raleigh, Feb. 24.—Farmers expecting to plant pecan trees this spring should do so before the last week in March, advises H. M. Curran, farm forester for the extension division of State College.

"This applies especially to these farmers in the Piedmont section and eastern North Carolina," says Mr. Curran, "for after that time the percentage of loss will be too great for profitable planting. Varieties such as the Stuart and Schley are recommended for these sections."

"For farmers and others in Western North Carolina who want a few trees about the house, the Indiana variety is recommended. These trees are grown in Pennsylvania and are especially suited to the mountain section. The trees grow just as large as the southern varieties, the only difference being the nuts are not so large. The best feature of this tree is that it can be planted at least two months later than the varieties recommended for the Piedmont and eastern sections."

Biltmore Forest Country Club Golf Course Be Lengthened

Asheville, Feb. 23.—The Biltmore Forest Country Club golf course will be lengthened to more than 6,500 yards in order to make it conform with the recognized standards of the larger courses in the United States, it was announced here today. The course was recently inspected

by Donald E. Ross, designer of the course, and he suggested several changes.

An invitation has been extended by the Biltmore Forest Country Club to the Southern Golf Association, asking it to hold its 1925 championship tournament on the local links.
