REVIVAL SERVICES TO CLOSE TONIGHT IN PRES. CHURCH

Doctor McLees Has Brought Wonderful Messages and Accom- plished Much Good; Everybody Invited to Attend Service This Evening

The sermon last night was the story of Peter's fall and restoration, and was so similar to most people that he has our sympathy. God took this frail man and made him the chief of the apostles, just common clay and made out of it a rock. The steps in the downfall of Peter are: First, self-confidence, he was sure that though all men forsook Christ he would not. The safety of every Christian is humility, humility, humility, the second step was following Christ afar off. As long as he was with Christ, he was brave, but as soon as he left him, he began to deny him. So must every Christian live close to Jesus if he would be brave and strong. The third step in his downfall was associating with the enemies of Christ, warming by the fires of the world. So will we if we begin to live and are led by the things of this world. But Peter came back, Christ received him, restored him, and made of him a great preacher, fearless in proclaiming his name. The message sent to the apostles was: "Go tell my disciples and Peter," that encouraged him to believe that Christ would forgive him, but he didn't suppose that he could ever be used by the Saviour, any more. Christ did not rebuke him, he only asked him: "Lovest thou me?" and when confident of that he gave Peter the greatest commission any man could have. It was to feed his flock, take care of his church for him. Dr. McLees then appealed to the people to reconsecrate themselves to Christ, whatever they had done to grieve Him. Many came forward to grasp his hand and to promise to live better lives. Two made a profession of faith also. The largest crowd of the meeting with the exception of the Sunday crowds heard Dr. McLees at this service.

The morning service today was intended for every church member in Greenville, and was different from any that Dr. McLees has preached yet in that it was full of real humor and wit. It was a plea to church members to stand by and hold up the hands of the pastor. He said that in every church there are at least two classes of people, the hinderers and the helpers. The hinderers are the fault-finders, the gossipers, the indifferent and careless. Some people are a dead weight to the church, instead of pulling the load. He urged that church members prepare for worship before leaving their homes, and thus help themselves and their pastor. The attendance at this morning service was the largest yet, and all were rejoiced for coming. Some business men came and offered to close their places that all employees attend.

The closing service of the meeting will come this evening at 7.30, when Dr. and Mrs. McLees will say farewell to the people of Greenville. It is hoped that this will be the best of the whole series, and that many will come to the 15 minutes prayer service before this service.

The people of Greenville will long remember this godly minister of the gospel, and already many are asking that he be invited to come back next year. He has done untold permanent good, and the fruit will be gathered in days to come.

Let none stay away fearing that seats will not be had, chairs and benches have been added that will give room for practically all who may come.

Bill Providing For The Redistricting Of The State Is Killed By Senate Today

Raleigh, Feb. 26—After a debate lasting for more than two hours, the North Carolina Senate today defeated, 25 to 19, the bill already passed by the House of Representatives, to provide for redistricting the state, with an increase of four judicial districts, calling for four new judges and four new solicitors.

In the House, consideration of the Revenue bill continued far into the afternoon, with every effort being made to dispose of the bill before the luncheon recess. At 2:30 o'clock, the body was considering the last section of the bill, and it was predicted, unless unforeseen obstacles arose, the measure would be cleared from the calendar before 4 o'clock.

The section under consideration was a corporation income tax schedule, with speaker Phary leading the movement to make it commensurate in its increases in personal income. He was arguing in favor of a 4 1-2 per cent income tax against corporation profit.

Raleigh, Feb. 26. — While the House re-arranged its calendar and consideration of the Revenue bill today, the Senate plunged into a long debate on the House bill to provide for redistricting of the state, and adding four additional judicial districts. The House decided to consider the Revenue bill at the days session, after proponent of the Australian Ballot bill had announced their intention of pressing for its consideration today. It was agreed to displace the Revenue bill from its special status for tonight's session.

LOCAL THEATRE WAS RAIDED LAST NIGHT AIRCRAFT INQUIRY RESUMED TODAY

Everybody's Theatre on Dickinson Ave., Raided by Officers; Manager and Woman Arrested

Everybody's Theatre, located on Dickinson Avenue was raided by police officers, Nobles and Alford this morning about 6:30 o'clock, and a woman giving her name as Ellis, and claiming Durham as her home was arrested and placed in jail.

G. W. Williamson, manager of the Theatre, was placed under bond for his appearance in Saturday's session of court. The woman was found near the organ in a drunken stupor, both from whiskey and morphine, and Williamson was found in a goods box on the second floor.

The officers became suspicious last night when they noted that people kept coming and going from the Theatre. They kept watch from about 3 o'clock until the time of the raid. Finally deciding that the opportune time had arrived, Officer Alford went to the rear of the theatre while Officer Nobles remained at the front. After "listening in" for a few moments Officer Alford heard voices and notified Officer Nobles. The officers asked for admittance and were refused. Mr. Nobles then went up the stairs to the side of the building and located a trap door through which he lowered himself into the theatre. The woman was drunk and had in her possession a hypodermic syringe and a small cocaine bottle, containing morphine. A search was then made for others, and it was found that another trap door in the front of the building opened on the second floor. A search was made of the second floor, and Williamson was found in a goods box.

The woman, although drunk, declared that she was carried to the theatre during the night. Both Williamson and the woman will be given a hearing on Saturday morning.

INDIANA SENATORS LEAVE ASSEMBLY

Blanket Warrants Are Served on Democratic Senators Who Leave State as Protest Against Step

Dayton, Ohio, Feb. 26. — The blanket warrant for the arrest of Democratic Senators of Indianapolis General Assembly, who bolted at legislation yesterday, and came to Dayton, was served on all but two members early today. Jerome Brown, sent here to take the law makers back to the State House at Indianapolis, said they refused to acknowledge his implements and challenged his authority.

Mr. Brown said he was awaiting from Indianapolis, and was uncertain as to his next plans. He declared, however, wherever the "runaways" went, there he would go to.

The dispute in the Indianapolis General Assembly, which resulted in the sudden departure of the Democratic Senators, was brought about by a Republican move, which it was said would create a new congressional map for the Republicans, if the measure was passed. The Senate consists of 50 members, 32 of whom are Republicans and 18 Democrats. The departure from the state of the Democrats left the Senate unable to transact business, because of the lack of a quorum, which under the law would be 34 Senators.

Railroad Ray to Play With Raleigh Team This Season

Raleigh, Feb. 26—Railroad Ray, recently secured from the Greensboro Club of the Piedmont League by local officials in exchange for Steve Siner, was one of the heavy hitters in the Piedmont league during the 1924 season, according to the official records. Ray's batting average for the 91 games in which he participated was .338. He was at bat 240 times, drove out 81 hits for a total of 127 bases and scored 27 runs.

Brown was convicted of assault in the Forsyth county Superior Court and was received at the State penitentiary April 23, 1924.

INDIANA SENATORS LEAVE ASSEMBLY OFFICIALS SWEAR OUT WARRANT FOR GUTZON BORGUM

Sheriff With Warrant Still Seeking Noted Sculptor; Deputies Guarding Stone Mountain

Atlanta, Ga., Feb. 26—Armed deputies today were guarding Stone Mountain and the property of the Stone Mountain Memorial Association, after deputizing of yesterday when Gutzon Borglum was dismissed from his position as sculptor of the memorial. Deputy sheriff, with warrant, charging Borglum and John C. Tucker, superintendent of the operation at the mountain, with destruction of the designs and models for the work, early today were still seeking the two men.

Charges will be pressed, officials of the Association said, as well as a damage suit filed against Borglum in Superior Court yesterday for \$50,000 for alleged damages caused by destruction of the models.

Under the contract with Borglum, attorneys for the Association said, the models and design for the work were the property of the organization. However, it was pointed out, that they can be replaced by the sculptor selected to continue the work.

Everett to Appear Before the Finance Committee Today

Raleigh, Feb. 26—At his request, Secretary of State W. N. Everett, will appear before the Senate Finance Committee at three o'clock this afternoon, when the committee will take up the proposed bill to transfer the collection of automobile license taxes from the State Department to the Department of Revenue.

Dickinson Bill Is Passed by House Today

Washington, Feb. 25—By a vote of 281 to 95 the Dickinson Cooperative Marketing Bill was passed today by the House.

LONDON PORT AUTHORITY MAKES FIFTH REDUCTION IN DOCK CHARGES

London, Feb. 24—To relieve traders, various dock charges on shipping and goods in the Port of London have been reduced 7 1-2 per cent effective February 1. This is the fifth reduction authorized by the Port of London Authority since charges reached their highest point, 150 per cent above pre-war levels, in 1923.

The 7 1-2 per cent reduction affects the following charges: On shipping: Dock dues and additional rent; discharging and extra charges. On goods: Imports, landing and extra charges, other than rent; exports, charges other than rent.

WHOLESALE LIQUOR RAID IN RALEIGH DURING LAST NIGHT

Raid Engineered By Solicitor Evans; 15 Persons Arrested; Safety Coach Bus Seized

Raleigh, Feb. 26 — Fifteen persons, Safety Coach Inter City Motor Bus, and more than 50 quarts of liquor, today were in the custody of Solicitor William F. Evans, following a raid last night, conducted by Federal and State officers. Mr. Evans stated that more arrests were to take place today, and that he had evidence that a considerable quantity of liquor would be found in rooms of local legislators in the Sir Walter hotel here. The raid last night was engineered by Solicitor Evans aided by 10 Federal prohibition officers, and three county deputies. A Safety coach bus was stopped near the Union Station, two men arrested, and the bus searched, disclosing 27 pints of liquor. The bus was attached.

From the seizure, the agents went to the Bus station and arrested Mat Veal, Vice-President of the Safety Coach Lines, operating between here and Greensboro. Other arrests followed, several drivers, ex-drivers, and hotel porters were among them. Harry Jones, President of the Jones Bottling Works, of Raleigh, was also arrested. Solicitor Evans stated that his evidence led him to believe that the Safety Coach Buses had been hauling liquor, and using their station here as a distributing center. He also said he believed the Jones Bottling Works, was another distributing center in Raleigh.

Investigation Into Finding Whiskey on Transport Begins Fri.

Norfolk, Va., Feb. 26—Every officer connected in any way with the Naval Transport Beaufort, will be called before a special board of inquiry, which will begin tomorrow its investigation into the finding of 40 cases of liquor aboard the vessel when she docked here from the West Indies Tuesday afternoon, it was stated at the Station today.

Captain Henry C. Coove, Commanding officer of this Air Station, declared that the inquiry will be private.

Coolidge Requested to Give Commission's Report Gas Industry

Washington, Feb. 26—President Coolidge was requested today by the Senate, to transmit to it the Federal Trade Commission's report on the Gasoline Industry, "if incompatible" with public interest.

Action was taken on a modification of a resolution by Senator Trammell, of Florida, which would have directed the commission to transmit the report. Another resolution, by Senator Trammell, demanding the investigation, by the Commission, of recent increases in Gasoline prices, is pending.

Federal Court Receives Cases of Stoneham, Robertson and Dier

New York, Feb. 26—A Federal Court, shortly after noon today, received cases of Charles A. Stoneham, Ross F. Robertson, and Elmore D. Dier, who since January 12th have been on trial on charges that they conspired to use mail in defrauding stock market investors.

Protests vs. Legislation Denying Sale of Cotton Seed Oil Products

Jefferson, Mobile, Feb. 26—A resolution from the General Assembly of South Carolina protesting against passage of legislation, which would practically "deny the sale of cotton seed oil products with special mention of Oleomargarine," was before the Committee of Agriculture of the Mobile House of Representatives today. The resolution was received by Governor Baker, and read before the legislature yesterday.

Raleigh, Feb. 26.—Contracts for the construction of 53.39 miles of hard-surface highways and 37.10 miles of grading will be let by the State Highway Commission Tuesday morning, March 24, according to an announcement made here today. This will include ten projects of the State highway system, and bids for this work are being received by the commission.

TRAVEL OVER POLISH SOAKS RIGHT IN AND QUICKLY CORRIDOR TO DANZIG CAUSES DIFFICULTY LIMBERS UP STIFF CREAKY JOINTS

Marienburg, East Prussia. — The Polish Corridor has probably been the promoter of more profanity than any other creation of the Versailles Treaty. It separates East Prussia entirely from the rest of Germany, being a narrow strip of territory which connects Poland with the Baltic Sea. Therefore all railway travel to Russia and the new Baltic states as well as East Prussia, must pass over this corridor, and nobody can enter Danzig from the west by land without touching Polish soil.

While Polish visas are required for all persons who wish to enter Danzig by rail from the west, travelers going from Berlin or other cities in the west know of this regulation. Danzig is a free city. No Danzig visa is necessary to enter that city. Consequently tourists assume that a trip from Hamburg or Berlin to Danzig does not involve any border difficulties. But there is a great disillusionment when they reach the Polish Corridor. All passengers destined for Danzig, who have no Polish visa, are locked into cars which are sealed while the trains stop in Danzig and are not unlocked until the train reaches German soil again in this city.

Consequently, Marienburg has become a popular refuge for travelers who have no Polish chop on their pass ports. This city has become the chief station on an underground railway leading into Danzig, and on an average 60 motorcars daily leave Marienburg for Danzig, taking a highway which does not touch Polish territory between Marienburg and Danzig.

This traffic in amazed passengers who are scarcely able to understand what the mystery is all about is in no sense illegal. It is merely a clever subterfuge which enables persons desirous of entering Danzig to dodge the irregular-shaped corridor created by the Versailles Conference in such a manner as to enable Poland to control important railway junctions.

A motorcar or carriage taking the highway south from Danzig to Marienburg, a distance of less than 20 miles, must pass through six different control stations. By taking side roads further to the east than the main road, and crossing the River Vistula on a primitive ferry, it is possible to avoid all these controls and enter the Free City of Danzig without question.

Marienburg hotels are always crowded with persons who are trying to get into Danzig. Every train from the west side of the corridor brings many surprised passengers who thought they were on their way to Danzig, but were not allowed to stop in the city. Day and night motorcars are running to Danzig.

The Polish Corridor control can be avoided by traveling from Stettin to Danzig by boat, and in summer the Germans who come from West Prussia to Zoppot, the celebrated seashore resort near Danzig, generally travel by sea. Many visitors also go to Danzig by air, thus dodging the corridor.

Declares 5,000 Sight Saving Classes Needed In Public Schools Now

Cincinnati, Ohio, Feb. 24.—There is urgent need in our public schools for 25 times as many sight-saving classes—special classes for children with seriously defective vision—as now exist, declared Lewis H. Carris, managing director, National Committee for the Prevention of Blindness, in an address before a conference of school superintendents from all sections of the United States held here today under the auspices of the National Education Association. There are at present, Mr. Carrislink up Buenos Aires with all the

state capitals of Argentina and from Loza, who is the author of the idea and who directed preparation of the plans shortly before retiring from the cabinet, says that the construction could be financed by private interests, in return for concessions over more or less prolonged periods or by a system similar to that pursued by the project.

"There are in the United States," Mr. Carris said, "at least 50,000 children with such seriously defective vision that they are unable to keep up with the work of normally sighted children. There is need for one sight-saving class in every group of 5,000 school children. New York State, Ohio, Minnesota and Massachusetts have been awakened to the seriousness of this situation and are now providing state funds for the establishment of sight-saving classes in co-operation with the local communities requiring them. The remaining states also should recognize not only the need for such classes but that their cost should not be borne entirely by the municipality."

Mr. Carris urged the superintendents to acquaint themselves with the splendid work being carried on in the sight-saving classes in Cincinnati which, he said, is one of the few cities having enough of these classes to take care of all its children with seriously defective vision.

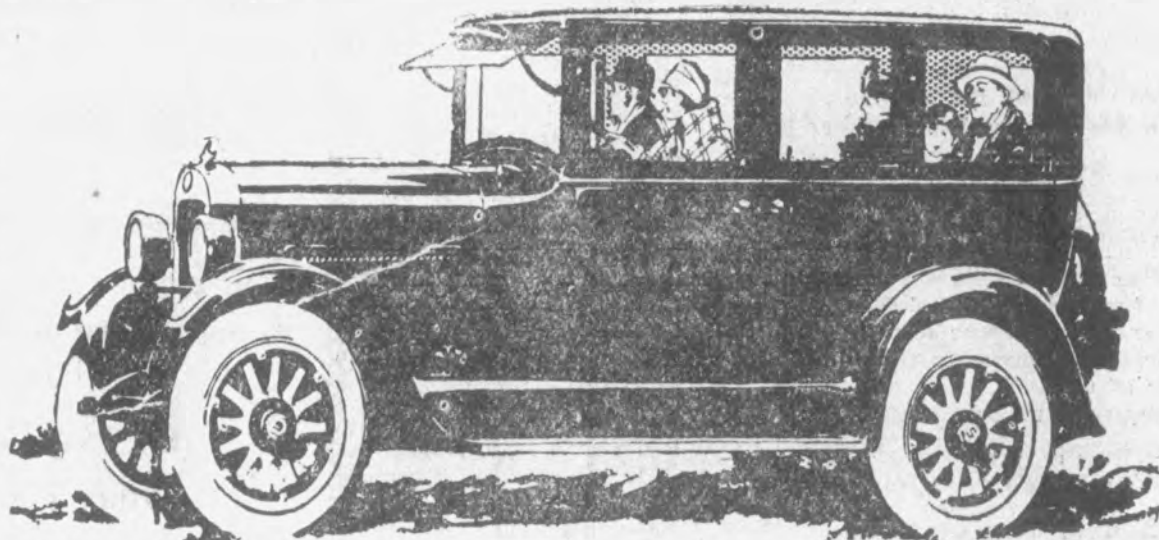
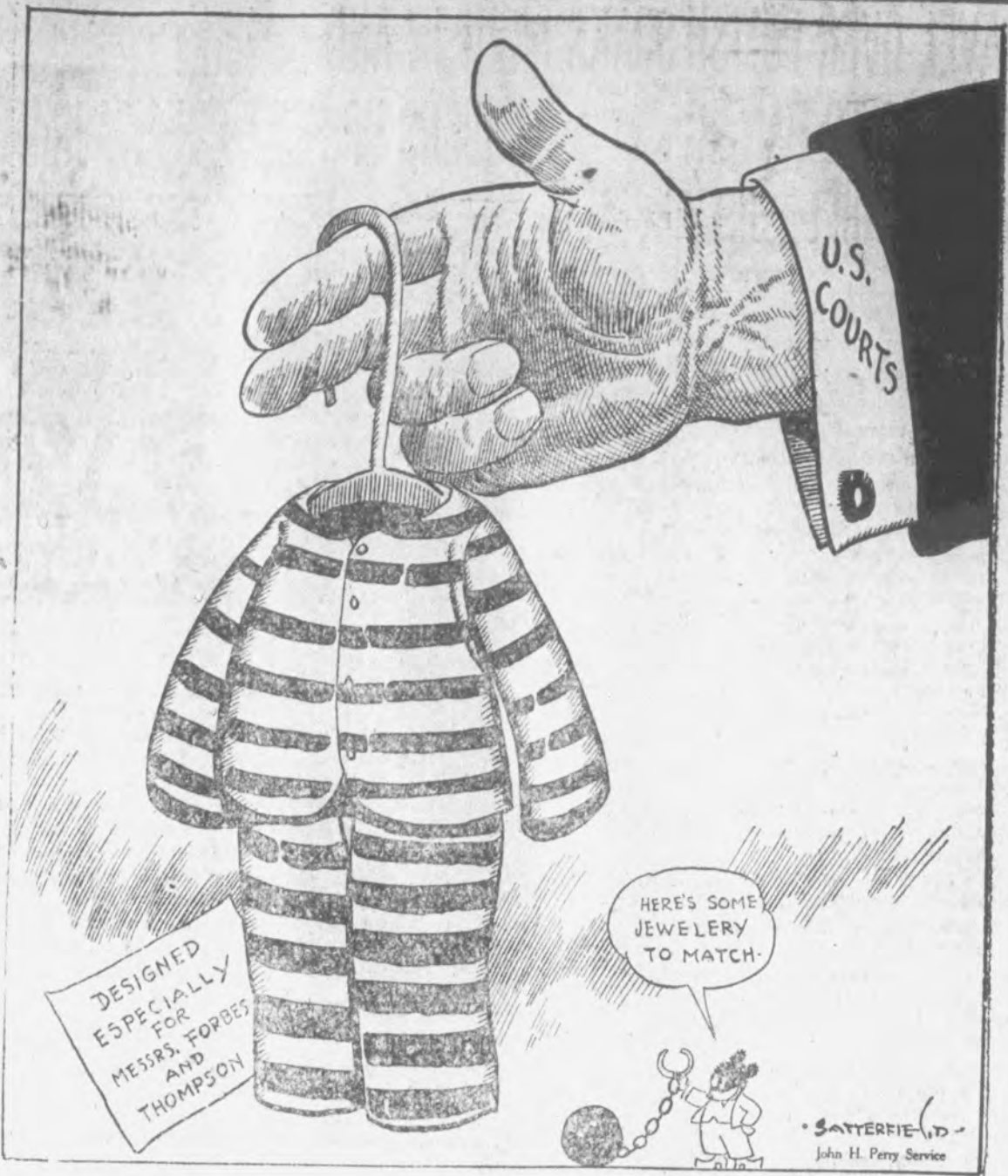

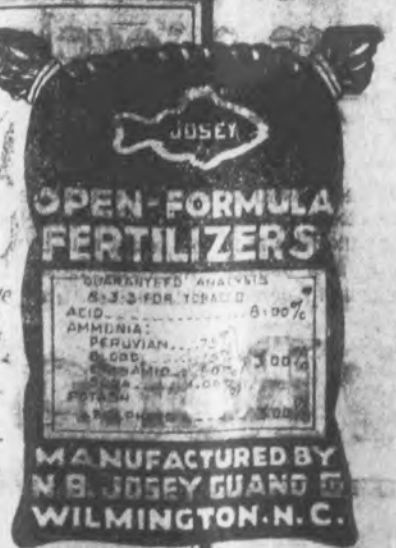

699 Applicants for Work Placed During Last Week

Raleigh, Feb. 26.—Six hundred and ninety-nine applicants for work were placed by the six bureaus of the State and Federal Employment Service in North Carolina during the week ending February 21, according to the weekly report which has just been compiled by Frank D. Grist, Commissioner of Labor and Printing.

This report shows that there were a total of 899 registrations during the week, of which number 713 were men and 186 women. The requests for help received during the week totaled 806, and 772 applicants were referred, with 699 reported as placed.

The placements for the week, according to classification, were: Skill-

ed, 95; unskilled, 451; clerical and professional, 42; domestic, 111; total, 699.

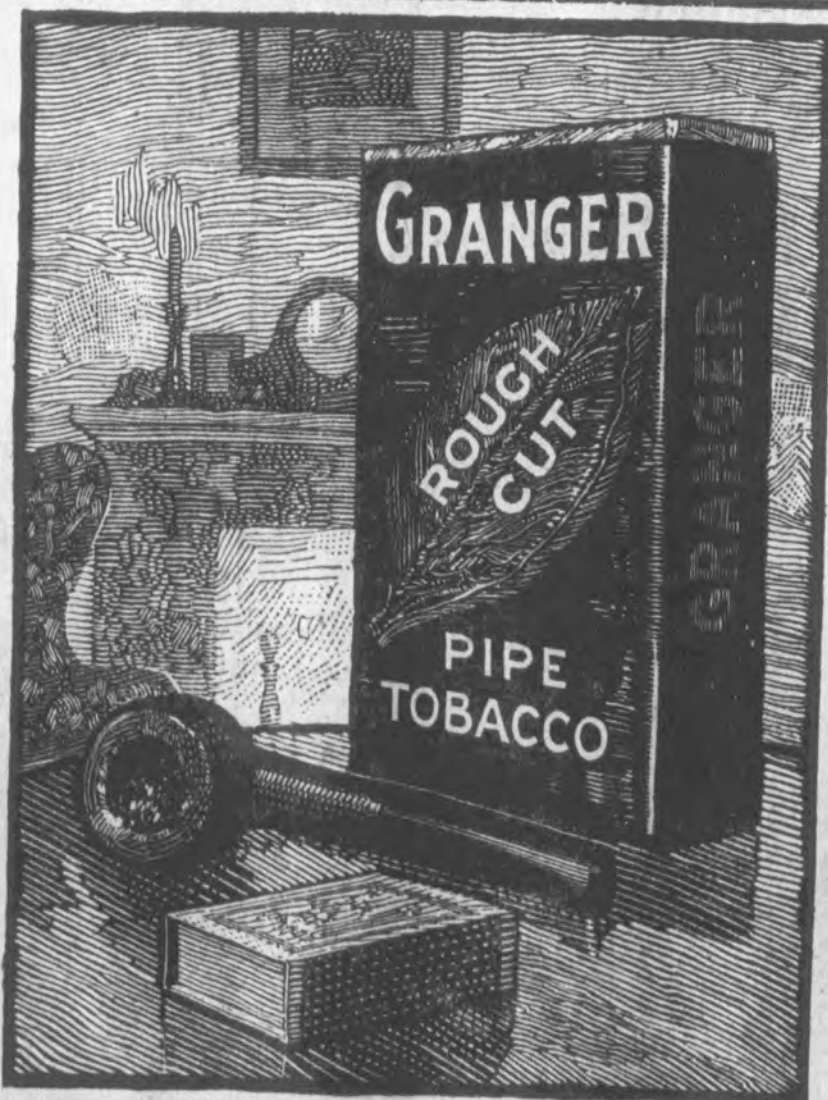
