GOVERNOR McLEAN DELIVERS ADDRESS GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Message Which Was
Unexpected Carries
With it Three Recom-
mendations; Read Be-
fore Legislators Noon
Today

Raleigh, Feb. 27.—Consolidation into the department of all revenue collecting function of the departments of state, revenue and insurance; transfer of all banking activities of the state to the State Treasurer so that he may handle all revenue from day to day; and the appointment of a commission to supervise and fix the salaries of all employees of the State Government on a scale commensurate with the work done, were the three recommendations made by Governor McLean in a message which he read to the General Assembly today at noon. The Governor's address, came unexpectedly, and it was not until he actually began his speech that the legislators had any idea what he wished to discuss.

The Governor declared that collection of all taxes, if placed under the jurisdiction of a single department, would be done at a smaller cost to the state if overlapping to tax collecting functions would be done away with. He recommended that all tax collecting function be directed in the Department of Revenue.

Taking up the subject of State Banking, he said that at the present various departments were handling their deposits as separate units, and very often obtained a large balance apart from the State Treasury. He declared that if the treasury were authorized to obtain daily check of moneys collected by the state, that a portion of the short time finance of the state would be necessary, and funds now scattered would be concentrated. The present law provides for all departments to account to the treasury for funds collected once a month.

Declaring that recently published statements into the salaries paid subordinates in the state government, and that it was a fact "that the cost of conducting public business" exceeds the cost of "private business," and "must not continue." The Governor urged the creation of a commission to go over the work done by every employee, fix a standard salary scale, which adopted and approved by the governor, would be strictly adhered to by all departments.

Son Born to Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Today

Asheville, Feb. 27.—Mr. and Mrs. John F. A. Cecil are the parents of a son born at the Biltmore House here at 4:30 o'clock this morning. Physicians report that the mother and child are doing well.

Mrs. Cecil, before her marriage last April, was Miss Cornelia Vanderbilt, the only child of the late George W. Vanderbilt. Mr. Cecil was first secretary to the British Embassy at Washington, and resigned this post following his marriage.

The name given the child is George Henry Vanderbilt Cecil. The first name is for Mrs. Cecil's father, the late George Vanderbilt, Henry was selected for the second name because of Mr. Cecil's brother, Henry Cecil, and also in compliment to Henry Anderson, of New York, the counselor of the Vanderbilt Estate. The first announcement was signal for a demonstration on the Biltmore Estate, in keeping with the English Feudal Custom.

Dr. Whitfield Cobb Dies in Twin City

Dr. Whitfield Cobb, 45, died in Winston-Salem last night at 7:30 o'clock.

Dr. Cobb was a leader in the dental profession in his community and was the youngest child of the late Rev. Needham B. Cobb, of Fayetteville.

The deceased was a brother of Mr. J. W. Cobb, of this city, who with Mrs. Cobb, has been at his bedside for the past several days.

SEVERAL MEASURES FATE OF POSTAL PASSED BY SENATE BILL NOW RESTS AND HOUSE TODAY WITH COOLIDGE

**The Squires-Health Bill
Passes Final Reading;
Measure Requiring
Daily Deposits With
State Treasury Passed
By Senate**

Raleigh, Feb. 27.—The North Carolina Senate today passed one administration bill, the one that requires daily deposit with the state treasury, and received another measure proposed by Gov. McLean, which provides for the establishment of a state wage commission of five members, whose duties would be to regulate salary schedules for state employees, both of these recommendations were made by Gov. McLean in an address to the General Assembly today.

The House of Representatives passed on its final reading, the Senate bill to pave the way for gubernatorial inaugurations to be held on January first in the future, and received a new bill by Poole, of Hoke, to reduce the salaries of all state officers and employees, from 5 to 25 per cent.

Representative Poole's bill would cut all salaries of \$8,000 and over 25 per cent, \$4,000 to \$6,000 20 per cent, \$2,000 to \$4,000 10 per cent, and \$1,500 to \$2,000 6 per cent.

The Senate passed on final reading the Squires-Health bill to fund the state prison indebtedness and authorize the establishment of additional prison industries without discussing. This bill has a companion measure behind it, which has not yet reached the Senate, which will make all state prisoners a new department of the State Government on an appropriation basis, instead of on its own fund, as at present. The Senate also passed on final reading, without debate, the measure to allow Power Companies to condemn undeveloped water power in cities. Committee substitute for the Mendenhall Speed Regulation bill passed its second reading. The measure would raise the present state speed limit from 30 to 35 miles on highways, 20 to 25 in residential districts and 10 to 20 miles in business districts. The bill had already been approved by the House.

Inter City Meeting Rotary Clubs Will Be Held March 24

Salisbury, Feb. 27.—An inter-city meeting of Rotary Clubs, in this section will be held here March 24, according to an announcement made here by the President of the local club. Invitations have been extended to the members of Rotary Clubs in nine cities to attend the meeting. These cities include Greensboro, Winston-Salem, High Point, Thomasville, Lexington, Statesville, Mooresville, Charlotte and Concord.

Don Clement, of this city, has been appointed general chairman of the committee on arrangements. It is expected that several hundred Rotarians will be in attendance at the meeting.

**Leaders Believe That
Bill Will Receive the
President's Approval**

Washington, Feb. 27.—The fate of the Postal Pay and Rate Increase bill now rests with President Coolidge, the Senate having joined the House in approving the conference report virtually substituting the substitute for the measure previously twice approved by the Senate. Administration leaders believe the bill will receive President Coolidge's approval.

During the short debate, which proceeded the Senate's adoption of the report yesterday, by a vote of 69 to 12, Senator McKeller, Democrat of Tennessee, one of the conferees, insisted on some of the higher rates given in the House bill, a comparison with those in the Senate bill.

SEARCH FOR NOTED SCULPTOR STILL ON

**Pres. of Georgia Division
Urges That Differences Between Association
and Borglum Be
Submitted to Arbitration**

Atlanta, Feb. 27.—A demand for the appointment of a committee of sculptors to pass upon the work done on the Stone Mountain Memorial, and conduct an audit of the affairs of the Stone Mountain Confederate Memorial Association, was asked after the passage of a resolution yesterday by the Atlanta Chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy.

Along with the resolution was a letter from Mrs. Walter Grace, President of the Georgia division of the organization, urging it to submit the differences between the Association and Gutzon Borglum, sculptor of the memorial, to the heroes of the Confederacy to arbitration, "unless the differences between Mr. Borglum and the Association can be adjusted," her letter said, "the splendid enthusiasm and interest of our people will undoubtedly suffer a serious suspicion."

In the meantime, search for Borglum and Jessie Tucker, former superintendent of work at the Mountain, was being extended over one-half dozen states. They are being sought on warrants charging malicious mischief for the alleged destruction by them of the models for continuing the work of the memorial, following the discharge Wednesday of Borglum, a sculptor of the project.

CREATION UNIFIED AIR SERVICE IS OPPOSED BY SIMS

**Admiral, However, En-
dorses Building Up of
Powerful Air Force by
the United States**

Washington, Feb. 27.—Rear Admiral William S. Sims today vigorously opposed, before the House Aircraft committee, the creation of a unified air service, as urged by Brigadier General Mitchell, Assistant Army Air Chief. The Admiral endorsed the building up of a powerful air force by the United States, however, and declared that air power "will play a predominate part" in the next war.

Coupling the airplane with the submarine, the Admiral said an enemy fleet can not exist "unless steaming a zig zag course under full speed."

"If a fleet comes up against ours with more airplane carriers, and can command the air, I do not see how we can win."

He added, "If there is anything I know about the Navy, it is gun fire and after making of calculations, it is a piece of good luck if an anti-aircraft gunner hits an airplane."

**Senators Return
to Indiana and the
Sessions Resumed**

Indianapolis, Ind., Feb. 27.—Sessions of the Indiana Senate, locked for two days by the absence of Democratic members, who left the state and went to Dayton, Ohio, in an effort to prevent action on a bill, which they opposed, resumed today when the Senators returned to their seats. An agreement had been reached with the Republicans on the proposed legislation.

**Trial of Gov't. Suit
Annul Naval Oil
Leases Proceed Mar. 9**

Cheyenne, Wyoming, Feb. 27.—Trial of the Government Suit for annulment of the Tea Pot Dome Naval Oil Reserve lease held by the Mammoth Oil Company, will proceed on March 9th, next. Judge Kennedy in United States District Court, decided today the overruling of the government petition for a continuance.

**Sergeant Lindsay
Has Been Retired
By War Department**

Fort Bragg, Feb. 27.—Master Sergeant Robert C. Lindsay, a member of the First Battalion, Service Battery, Second Field Artillery, has been retired by the War Department following a long period of service. Master Sergeant Lindsay has received fifteen discharge certificates, each bearing the notation "Character. Excellent." He has seen service in Cuba, the Philippine Islands and in France.

**Debate on Pullman
Surcharge Be Limited**

Washington, Feb. 27.—The House faces a vote before adjournment tonight on the question of repealing the present 50 per cent Pullman Surcharge. A show down on the proposition was assured by presentation of the conference report of the independent offices on the appropriation bill carrying a Senate Rider providing for elimination of the surcharge. Debate will be limited, by agreement, so as to make certain of a vote today.

**PEARLS GROW UNMOLESTED
IN SOUTHERN SULU WATERS**

Manila.—One half of the pearl banks around the Sulu archipelago will be closed for a period of three years beginning January 1, 1925, for the purpose of "protecting the pearl industry of the Philippine Islands."

Insular officials, after an investigation, became convinced that the pearl banks would be exhausted within a few years unless steps were taken to protect the industry by establishing a closed season for a long period. The bureau of customs and the constabulary have organized a patrol to protect the banks.

Blinds Husband; Takes Poison

After blinding her husband of five months, Darby Day, Jr., son of a Chicago millionaire, by throwing acid into his face in Hollywood, Cal., where they were living, Mrs. Bernice Day swallowed a large dose of the drug and was rushed, supposedly dying, to a hospital. She said her "mother-in-law was the blame" for her quarrels with her husband.

Washington Tobacco Co. Redrying Plant Damaged By Fire This Morning

The Washington Tobacco Company redrying plant, Washington, N. C., was badly damaged by fire today. The flames had their origin in the redrying machinery department at 8:15 o'clock and within two hours was under control. The estimated damages could not be ascertained. The redrying department in which the fire had its origin, was completely destroyed. The tobacco storage house received slight damages, if any, as the doors were quickly closed and the flames confined to the machinery department. The building of the Washington Tobacco Company is a large brick structure and due to the excellent work of the fire department no other buildings were endangered.

BETHEL OFFICERS RAID AUTOMOBILE

**Two Men Are Arrested
and Ten Gallons of
Whiskey Found in Car**

G. L. Hopewell and a man by the name of Bolling, white men, from Edgecombe county were arrested in Bethel last night by Deputy Sheriff S. H. Martin and Police Officer Jones, charged with transporting liquor for the purpose of sale and were released under bond for their appearance here next Monday. Matthew Hathaway, white man of Bethel, and a member of the party made his getaway.

Deputy Sheriff Martin and Officer Jones overheard a conversation between the men last night in which they planned to go to Bear Grass for the whiskey. The officers watched the men make their departure and when they came back through Bethel they were arrested.

Hathaway jumped on the running board and made his escape. A search of the car revealed ten gallons of whiskey. Both the car and the whiskey were captured by the officers.

Sussex Needs Men

London.—The stamping ground for Cupid in England should be Sussex county.

Sussex there are more women proportionately than in any county in England, the women numbering 1,274 to every 1,000 men. This is 108 more than the average for the rest of England, and about 188 more than in 1913 before the men went to war and the women to work in the fields.

BRASWELL BILL TO BE GIVEN HEARING THIS AFTERNOON

**Designed to Permit
Members of Co-operative
Association to
Withdraw on May 1 of
Any Year**

Raleigh, Feb. 27.—Preparing to appear at the hearing this afternoon on the Braswell Co-operative Marketing Association bill, hundreds of men from all sections of the state crowded at the Capital early this afternoon. It was reported that more than a thousand others were on their way to Raleigh. Hundreds of people wore a ribbon on their coats with the words "We are for the Braswell bill." It was said that the bill's opponents also would be on hand in large numbers for the hearing. The bill would amend the co-operative law so as to allow for the withdrawal of members from such an association.

Raleigh, Feb. 27.—With the expectation that its consideration would attract as large an audience as the committee consideration of the Poole anti-evolution bill brought to Raleigh, the House committee on Agriculture was scheduled to take up this afternoon the Braswell bill designed to permit members of co-operative associations to withdraw from such associations.

Introduced by Dr. Braswell of North county by request, he stated, the bill would amend the laws relative to co-operative associations and, according to those well informed on co-operative association matters, would strike a deadly blow at the association. The present law makes no provision for withdrawal of members of such association, during the life of the co-operative contract. Dr. Braswell's measure would allow any member to withdraw on the first of May of any year by giving ten days' notice to the Association secretary.

Dr. Braswell has consistently refused to indicate at whose request he sent forward the measure. During the past two years however, there have been several cases in the courts of the State where the co-operative associations sought to compel members to live up to their contracts concerning delivery of all products raised by them in which the associations deal. In most of the cases the associations have won out and a number of planters have been fined or sentenced to jail for contempt of court growing out of violation of the court's order affirming the right of the association to compel deliveries of all products. In legislative circles, it is believed that the measure had its origin among those who have felt the hand of the law in dealing with co-operative associations.

Dr. Braswell's measure provides that every co-operative association in North Carolina shall, immediately after ratification of the bill, add a by-law to its regulations which will permit withdrawal and that in case of failure to do so, the statute itself shall be considered as a by-law.

New Heir to Leeds' Millions Makes Her Appearance on Scene

New York, Feb. 27.—A new heir, to the William B. Leeds' millions, has appeared on the scene in the person of a seven and one-half pound baby daughter, born last Tuesday to Princess Georgevna, of Russia, and her husband, William B. Leeds, the second son of the late tin plate king. The child was born at the Leeds' home in this city. Mother and daughter are both reported doing nicely. A name for the baby has not yet been chosen.

Purchase 13,033 Acres Land As An Addition To National Forests

Raleigh, Feb. 27.—The purchase of 13,033 acres of land in North Carolina as an addition to the National Forests, has been authorized by the National Forest Reservation Commission, according to information received by the North Carolina Department of Agriculture. Other authorized purchases include 10,578 acres in Virginia, 2,500 acres in West Virginia, 11,559 acres in Tennessee, 3,046 acres in South Carolina, 39,624 acres in Alabama and 5,098 acres in Arkansas.

MR. GASKINS WINS PRIZE IN CONTEST

**Register of Deeds of
Pitt County Wins \$100
for Sending 57-Year-
Old Record to Brown
Paper Co.**

Mr. J. C. Gaskins, Register of Deeds, is in receipt of a check for \$100.00, which he won as first prize in a contest recently inaugurated by Brown's Paper Company, of Adams, Mass., to locate the oldest public record in the country on Brown's Lined Ledger.

Widespread interest was shown in the contest. Just as soon as Mr. Gaskins read the announcement he went to work to find among the records in the court house something on Brown's paper. Mr. Gaskins' entry consisted of a marriage register which has been in continuous use in Pitt county for 57 years. The book is made of Brown's Lined Ledger, and the first record in it appears under the date of June 11th, 1867, during the administration of President Andrew Johnson.

In describing the volume Mr. Gaskins wrote:

"The book is one that is handled a great deal. Despite this fact, it is in most remarkable condition. The paper is as white as if it were made but yesterday, showing absolutely no trace of discoloration."

Its strength has not been impaired in the slightest, in fact, its enduring qualities have been such that it has not been necessary to have the book rebound, even though it has been referred to continually for more than half a century."

Mr. Gaskins entry was the oldest entered in the contest.

Brown's Sentence Is Commuted to Life Imprisonment

Raleigh, Feb. 27.—Will Brown, alias Ezra Steele, negro of Forsyth county, will not die in the electric chair this morning. Governor McLean commuted the man's sentence last night, to life imprisonment.

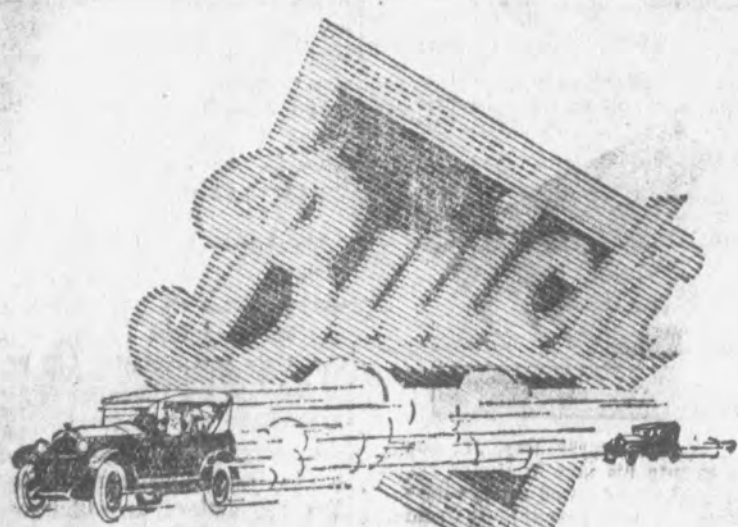
Brown had been in the death row for the past ten months, having been convicted of an attack upon a woman of his own race.

Martin Not to Play Professional Ball During This Season

Raleigh, Feb. 24.—LeRoy Martin, former catcher on the Wake Forest College Varsity baseball team, stated here today that he will not play professional baseball this season, as he plans to return to Wake Forest College next fall to pursue the study of law.

Charlie Carroll, manager of the Winston-Salem team in the Piedmont League, claims to have entered into a contract with Martin for his services this year, according to a statement issued several days ago. Martin, in his statement today, denied that any agreement had been reached with the Winston-Salem manager.

Sheffield Will Use Wireless Melt Metals

Sheffield, Eng. — Wireless is to be introduced into the steel industry of Sheffield for the purpose of melting metals, announcement to this effect being made by Dr. C. H. Desch, dean of the University of Sheffield. Wireless valves can be used to melt masses of steel into white-hot liquid, Dr. Desch said, and within a few months there would be furnaces here worked by these valves.

"Furnaces have actually been built in which the motive power for melting the metal is supplied by large thermionic valves," Dr. Desch announced, "and these are of special use in the manufacture of certain nickel alloys."

Further it was explained that a 200 volt direct current is passed into the valves, which converts it into alter-

nating current of extremely high frequency—much higher, in fact, than can be obtained from a mechanical generator of alternating current. This current is passed through the metal, which may be said to melt itself. "The melting metal," Dr. Desch added, "is often far hotter than the crucible in which it is being heated. A piece of Swedish iron was melted in this way before the crucible in which it was contained was thoroughly warm."

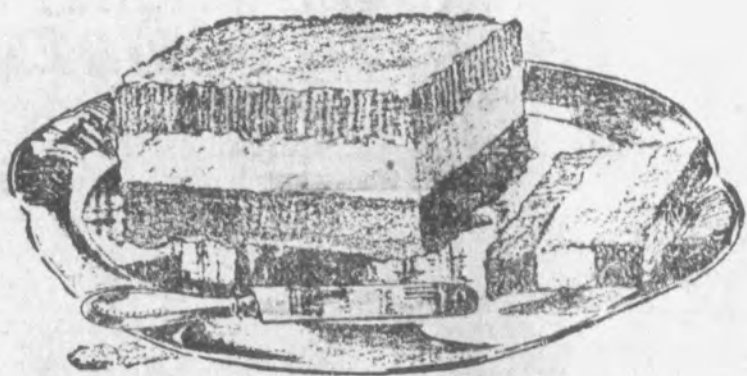

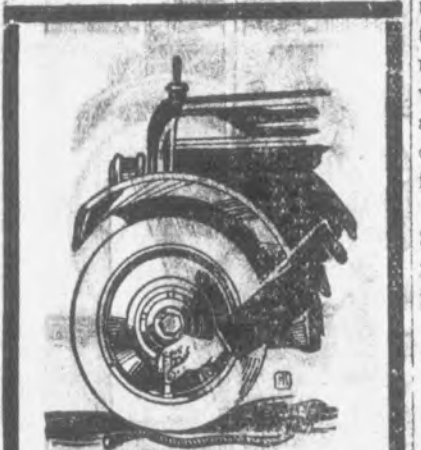

COTTON LETTER

There being no statement in the demand for spot cotton in the South, notwithstanding the basis being the highest of the season, the market, after ruling lower in early session, advanced again in afternoon owing to bullish spot advices from the interior and the absence of rain in the Southwest. Inland stocks decreasing and as the cream of the crop has been sold and shipped, low and medium grades represents most of the unmarketed remnant of the crop and it is probably only a question of time when buyers will be so particular as to grade and staple since they will probably be glad to get the pick of what is left.

Additional March notices for about 30,000 were tendered on contract this morning and were stopped by spot interests. The character of the local certificated stock is unusually good, of the 80,000 bales only about 4,501 bales grade lower than mid and of 7-8 staple. Pretty much the same condition applies as to the situation in New York.

It is not surprising therefore for trade interests to be anxious to get control of such large lines of good spinnable cotton for which the demand so far has been for better staples, the inquiry now that inch staples or better are scarce, is likely to improve for contract cotton in the future.

The local weather bureau gives a promise of rain in the Southwest tomorrow, perhaps rain or snow in the Northwest Texas and Oklahoma. If the rains materialize the market may be lower temporarily, but if the dry weather continues a further advance is probable.

MULE-DISEASE PLAYS HAVOC WITH LIVE STOCK IN SWEDEN

Stockholm, Feb. 23.—Nearly the whole of Sweden has been swept by an epidemic of mule-disease and in an effort to stamp it out thousands of animals have been killed. The first cases of the disease were noticed in Scania in the south, and immediately every precaution was taken to prevent its spread.

Farms affected were isolated, military forces were mobilized and formed a ring around the farms. All birds in the vicinity were shot and the grim method of slaughtering all the livestock—cattle, swine, poultry, etc.—was exercise. This proved of no avail and the disease then spread to the north of the country, where the best bred herds suffered greatly. During November and December the government has paid out over two million crowns as compensation.
