FREDERICK EBERT FIRST PRES. GERMAN REPUBLIC DIES IN BERLIN TODAY

Public Receives Announcement Through the Half Masting of Flags; News Is Great Shock to Citizens of Berlin; Guided the Infant Republic Through Its First Turbulent Years

Berlin, Feb. 28.—Frederick Ebert, the first President of the German Republic, died at 10:15 o'clock this morning from peritonitis, which followed an operation for appendicitis, a few days ago.

The former saddle maker, whose skill in guiding the infant republic through the first turbulent years of its existence, was acknowledged even by his bitter enemies, made a gallant fight for life. His system had been undermined from influenza, and his heart was not equal to the burden imposed on it by poison, which had spread through his system.

Around his bedside, when the end came, were his wife, and daughter, and her husband, and their only son who survived the war. He had two sons killed in the war.

Theater and jibes from monarchists who could not bear the idea of a working man succeeding the Hohenzollerns, had helped to undermine his once rugged constitution. But the firmness with which he managed the political crisis arising from the tangled system, and the simple and straight forward way with which Ebert met her duties, as first president of Germany, disarmed many of her sharpest critics. Death came to the President in a West Sanatorium. The public received the announcement through the half masting of flags over buildings of the American and British Embassies, and the government buildings. The news came as a shock to Berliners, as the morning newspapers published bulletins indicating a marked improvement in President Ebert's condition, and the crisis was supposed, by many, to have been passed.

Facts Concerning Cotton Industry in North Carolina

The Moore county cotton mills have a combined capital of approximately \$600,000 and the presidents include W. W. Cowgill, J. W. Woody and A. Cameron.

The Rocky Mount Mills are located at Rocky Mount, Nash county and B. Cameron is president of the concern. The corporation has a capital stock of \$1,000,000.

New Hanover county is the home of two cotton manufacturing plants, both of which are located at Wilmington. John D. Bellamy and Robert R. Bellamy are the presidents of the concerns, which have a combined capital of about \$150,000.

Three cotton mills, with a combined capital stock of a proximately \$2,000,000 are located in Orange county, one at Carboro and two at Hillsboro. The presidents are C. M. Carr, S. Strudwick and J. C. Webb.

Lincolnton, Feb. 28.—County Agent J. G. Morri on announces that four pruning demonstrations, attended by 88 Lincoln county orchard owners, were held in the county last week. Glenn O. Randall, Extension Horticulturist from State College, Raleigh, was in charge of the demonstrations. One of the meetings, says Mr. Morri on, was held on the farm of Julian Saine, Vale, N. C. This orchard, declares the county agent, is one of the best young orchards in the county. The owners are following all instructions as to pruning, spraying and cultivating, and it is expected to prove a most profitable investment.

Braswell Bill Is Killed, Vote 12-11

Raleigh, Feb. 28.—Twenty-three to eleven was the vote of the House committee on agriculture for an unfavorable report on the Braswell bill to permit members of co-operative selling associations to withdraw by filing notice, after three hours of discussion in the House chamber yesterday afternoon.

WEEKS DECLARES G. E. N. DISOBEYED ORDER PRESIDENT

Says Assistant Army Air Chief Had Written Magazine Articles Without Approval of War Department

Washington, Feb. 28.—Secretary Weeks today told the House Aircraft Committee that Brigadier General Mitchell, assistant Army Air Chief, had directly disobeyed President Coolidge's order in writing magazine articles without receiving the approval of the War Department. The General, Mr. Weeks said, had the articles published without the War Department approving them in spite of the fact that President Coolidge had written him, cautioning against it.

Mr. Weeks explained he had sued the order regarding General Mitchell after the Secretary of the Navy had objected to the articles on the 1921 test as reflecting on the Navy.

"Then there was a case of muzzling," asked Representative O'Sullivan, Democrat, Connecticut.

"No, it was not," answered the Secretary.

"What was it?"

"He might have printed everything he wrote if it had been submitted."

"Then it was not muzzling?"

"No."

"Didn't you tell General Mitchell that you were going to remove him?"

Asked Representative Prall, Democrat of New York.

"I did not. I never told him anything as that."

"Didn't you threaten to order him away?"

"I did not."

Secretary Weeks then explained that neither he, nor President Coolidge had the power to force General Mitchell's resignation from the service.

Houston, Tex., Feb. 28.—Four children of Mr. and Mrs. Merle Corson, living near Peerland, Texas, were burned to death early this morning when their home was destroyed by fire. The parents were painfully injured, if not seriously, when jumping from windows. Four other children escaped without injuries.

INVESTIGATION IS BEING MADE INTO RAID ON BEAUFORT

Norfolk, Feb. 28.—The question of whether the personal and traditional rights of the United States Navy were violated in the search of the Navy Transport, Beaufort, and the seizure of 40 cases of whiskey when she docked here last Tuesday night, was raised today in the investigation sitting at the Naval Base here.

During the examination of Captain Wilbert Smith, who directed the search, counsel for the officers mentioned as defendants, asked if it were not the traditional custom that officers must be present when their cabins aboard ship, or quarters on shore were searched. Captain Smith admitted that this was the custom. He had previously testified that officers named were not present when the search was made on the Beaufort. The Captain stated further, that he was more interested in "a quick search of the ship" than in requiring the officers to be present.

"He just was not trusting anyone especially after he saw packages, which he believed contained liquor, being thrown over board."

Members of the board objected to a line of questioning, and the room was cleared while the board reached the conclusion that Captain Smith was acting within his rights, and following out orders when he did not await for the officers to return to their cabins before proceeding with the search.

Fires at Speeding Automobile And Kills Young Man

Rock Hill, S. C., Feb. 28.—Robert M. McFadden, a Rock Hill policeman attempted to stop a speeding automobile by firing at the tire, late last night, and one of the bullets instantly killed Dewey Simpson, a young member of a Chester family, who with three other Chester youths, occupied the automobile.

Rock Hill, S. C., Feb. 28.—McFadden told his story to a coroner's jury today, and was held without bail, pending completion of the inquest, which was adjourned until additional testimony could be obtained.

Young Simpson was struck just below the eye, and the bullet went out the back of his head, so physicians said at the investigation. The nature of his wound indicated that he was looking backward when the bullet struck him.

Asheville Business Men Report A Fine Trip Through South

Asheville, Feb. 28.—The party of 125 Asheville business men, who recently made a tour of South Carolina, Georgia and Florida for the purpose of "promoting closer relations between Asheville and other cities in the South," have returned to the city and report a most successful trip. The party chartered a train consisting of five Pullman cars, one observation car, and a baggage car. They visited Savannah, St. Augustine, Daytona, West Palm Beach, Jacksonville, Columbus, and other Southern cities.

It is planned to conduct one of these tours each year for the next five years. The next trip, it is announced, will probably be conducted in the spring of 1926 and will include Alabama, Louisiana and possibly Texas. Other trips will be made to Middle Western States and the East, and one to Toronto, Montreal, Quebec and Canada.

NOTED SCULPTOR VISITS RALEIGH

Gutzon Borglum Denies Charges That He Destroyed the Models of the Memorial; No Effort to Arrest Him in Raleigh

Raleigh, Feb. 28.—Having delivered another verbal attack against the Stone Mountain Memorial Association's Executive Committee of Atlanta, Gutzon Borglum, dismissed as the sculptor of the Confederate Memorial, which is being carved on the mountain, today was supposed to be northward bound, the Raleigh News and Observer said this morning.

Borglum arrived here yesterday and visited a friend, and received a News and Observer reporter before leaving on a train at 11 o'clock last night, the paper says, adding that the sculptor denied charges that he had destroyed the models of the memorial before leaving Atlanta.

Dekalb County officials, of Georgia, have telegraphed officers in many Southern cities, to arrest Borglum on charges of malicious mischief in destroying the models of the work to be done on Stone Mountain. No effort, however, was made to arrest Borglum while he was here.

Raleigh, Feb. 28.—A final competitive examination of applicant for appointment as second lieutenants in the Regular Army will be held during the week of June 15-20, according to an official bulletin received here from the Adjutant General's Office at Washington. It is stated that candidates for these appointments may express their preference as to the branch of service they wish to enter.

REVENUE BILL IS SENT TO SENATE

Two Dissenting Votes On the Final Reading of the Bill; Many Other Measures Considered

Raleigh, Feb. 28.—The House today took up and passed on final reading, the Revenue bill providing for \$12,000,000 annually in revenue, and sent the measure to the Senate. There were two dissenting votes on the final reading of the bill. In addition to this, the House did little else today except consider local measures.

Raleigh, Feb. 28.—Introduction of a bill in the Senate calling for a bond issue of \$5,125,000 for permanent improvement of State institutions, reception of a message from the Governor by both branches asking that proper legislation be enacted to provide by appointment a committee of 12 persons to make an extensive study of the state school system, and passage by the House on a Revenue act on its third reading, and final reading with two dissenting votes, constituted the high spots of today's session of the General Assembly. Both Houses adjourned until Monday. The House to meet at 11 o'clock in the morning, and the Senate at noon.

The House took up for consideration today, the bill providing for a constitutional amendment that would authorize the appointment of a pardon board, but owing to the meager attendance, the bill went over until next Tuesday. Important state wide bills passed by the House on their final reading, included a bill, which would draw the line of demarcation between the State College of Agriculture and Engineering, and the State Department of Agriculture, so as to prevent overlapping of efforts and expense. Included in the House morning routine, was the passage of a bill on it, final reading, which would co-ordinate the state's printing, by requiring all departments on a budget for that purpose to submit their matter to be printed to the department of labor and printing.

Senators Woodson, of Rowan, Chairman of the Appropriation Committee, and Williams of Pasquotank, Chairman of the Finance Committee, introduced the Bond Issue bill. \$3,800,000 was to be raised by the bond issue.

Department of Labor to Assist Farmers in Securing Ample Help

Raleigh, Feb. 28.—The Employment Division of the Department of Labor will send a special representative to the trucking regions in eastern North Carolina about March 15 to assist the truck growers in that section to secure an ample supply of labor during the harvesting season, according to an announcement made here today by Frank D. Grist, commissioner of Labor and Printing.

Mr. Grist also announced that he had secured the services of Robert O. Pickard, formerly employment manager of the Hotel Association of New York City, to act as the department's representative in carrying out the plans for this work. He stated that Mr. Pickard is an expert in labor employment and that he will visit the trucking regions in the near future to find out just where shortages of labor usually occur during the marketing season.

You don't catch our extension committee asleep like the Durham committee was. Our committee takes time by the forelock and takes in the land before there is anything to move unless it be the land and the owner would have a helluva time moving his farm.

I repeat, don't worry, Mr. Editor. I don't think there is any need for you to fear about the passage of the bill, those "fighting progress" are doomed for defeat. The people's extension committee will see to that.

WEATHER FORECAST

North Carolina, warmer in extreme east Sunday, rain warmer in north and extreme west.

South Carolina, probably rain late tonight and Sunday not much change in temperature.

Georgia, occasional rains not much change in temperatures.

Florida, occasional showers not much change in temperature.

Alabama, Mississippi, unsettled, probably occasional rains slightly warmer Sunday.

COTTON LETTER

New Orleans, Feb. 28.—The passing of February, the last of the winter months has brought no relief of consequence to the drouth stricken sections of the central and western Texas but some relief was obtained by moderate to heavy local rains in other sections of the state during the past week. With the opening of spring an ending of the drouth is to be expected as rains, even in the south-west, are generally more numerous and generous than in any other periods year.

Planting has started already in the lower Rio Grande valley of extreme southwest Texas and much plowing has been done throughout the belt, although somewhat backward in sections of the eastern belt and in central and western Texas, due to too much rain in the Atlantic and too dry in districts of Texas.

From now on returns as to the preparations for the next crop are likely to be more favorable than they have been in the past when plowing will make better progress as result of the recent rains in the west half of the belt, and less moisture to the east of the Mississippi river. Because of the fast disappearing of the old crop, which was a large one the impression prevails that another large crop will be needed for next season.

The opening of March will not find the outlook for the next crop generally satisfactory owing to the backwardness in preparations in districts of the east and the west and a large corn and cotton acreage has to be prepared and seeded this spring. While much more rain is needed in Texas and Oklahoma to put a good season in the ground, it is possible that when the rains do set in, they may be incessant and heavy, which is usually the case in the spring, in which event farm work would be delayed all the more. Nature generally works from one extreme to the other and as one of the longest drouths on record (a) DSHRINSTRDLU on record, of six months duration in the S. W. has been experienced it is only natural for the elements to even up accounts by proving excessive rains when the wet season opens.

Any further delay in preparations for the new crop would be a detrimental thing, since a late crop would be exposed to the possibility of weevil damage later in the year.

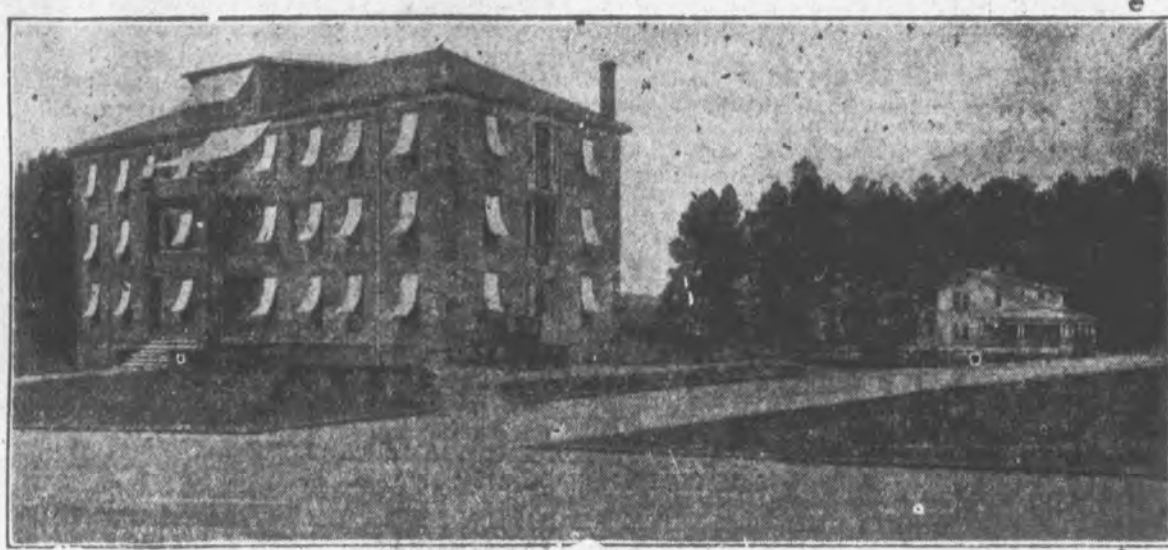
