NEW TAX ON GASOLINE
BECOMES EFFECTIVE IN
NORTH CAROLINA TODAY

Auto License Department
Announces Machinery for Enforcement
of New Act is
Now Ready to Operate

Raleigh, March 5.—The added one cent per gallon tax on gasoline became effective throughout the State today. The tax raises the levy on gasoline from three to four cents a gallon. It was added by the General Assembly for the purpose of funding the additional \$20,000,000 bond issue for roads approved by the body, and was to become effective immediately upon ratification. The act was ratified on February 1st, and the Auto License Department announced today that the machinery for its enforcement had been completed, and it would become effective on this date.

SEA LIONS WOULD MAKE
PRIZE HOUSEHOLD PETS

London.—The sea lion is the ideal pet and the perfect friend of man, according to recommendations made by members of the Amateur Menagerie Club, who published recently a book on their various experiences with animals. Owing to the expense of the upkeep of a sea lion, however, it is not probable that they will ever replace cats and dogs as pets. A sea lion has all the intelligence of a dog, adaptability and affection, and requires no license, but ordinarily it costs from \$500 to \$700 a year to keep a pet of this kind.

One of the club members, L. B. Brightwell, has had much experience with sea lions as pets and highly recommends them. In his opinion it is only the high rate for the use of water and the cost of fish as food which prevent the sea becoming a universal pet.

"Greed is undoubtedly the sea lion's one great fault," writes Mr. Brightwell, "but given enough fish, a sea lion may be taught anything. His amazing gifts of balancing, diving and forming picturesque groups are of the total value of paper exports, implanted in him by nature."

The ministerial benches cheered as the labor members left the House.

PRISON SCHOOLING
FORGER MORE CRAFTY
IN HIS ILLEGAL ART

London.—While Ernest Everett was serving a sentence at Camp Hill prison for forgery he was taught engraving by prison authorities as part of their scheme for the rehabilitation of prisoners. Recently he was arrested and found guilty of uttering spurious treasury notes, cunningly engraved.

Lord Hewart, the Lord Chief Justice, has demanded an explanation of why a forger, of all persons, should be taught engraving in prison.

CANADA INCREASES EXPORT
NEWSPRINT ACROSS BORDER

Ottawa, Ont.—Newsprint totaling 242,876,900 pounds and valued at \$88,993,785 crossed the international boundary from Canada into the United States last year, according to the annual report of the Canadian pulp and paper industry. This was an increase of 16,000,000 pounds over the exports of 1923. The American market now takes 97 percent of the total value of paper exports. Practically all of Canada's paper is

NEW GOVERNMENT
LOSES NO TIME IN
GETTING TO WORK

President, Vice-President
and New Cabinet
Take Up Duties for
Four More Years

Washington, March 5.—Having pledged himself anew to service of the Nation in an inaugural ceremony of the most unprecedented simplicity, President Coolidge today took the four year burden placed upon his shoulders by the people, with no indication that he might change his simple program, or as he terms it "doing the day's work."

Vice-President Dawes, inducted into that office yesterday shortly before the President's inauguration, faced his second day as presiding officer of the new Senate with the startling effects of his precedent-breaking inaugural address still fresh in the minds of members. Some sided with him in his attack on Senate rules, which permits one man to tie up legislation with a filibuster; some frankly and vigorously disagreed, when few others were neutral. With the induction of Frank B. Kellogg, of Minnesota, as Secretary of State, succeeding Charles E. Hughes, and Mr. Jardine, of Kansas, as Secretary of Agriculture, to take the place vacated by Howard M. Gore, who became Governor of West Virginia, the President's Cabinet still lacks one member, an Attorney General.

The nomination of Charles B. Warren, of Michigan, to fill this post left vacant by the elevation of Harlan F. Stone, to Supreme Court, was allowed to expire with the 68th Congress at noon yesterday, and its re-submission to the special session of the new Senate, called chiefly to act on such matters, will be one of the principal nominations to engage its attention. Everett Sanders, of Indiana, successor to C. Bacon Slemmons as Secretary to the President, was sworn in late yesterday, after his term as Representative from Indiana, ended with the Congress.

Washington, March 5.—Vice-President Dawes' departure from the usual procedure of the Senate yesterday became the subject of debate today immediately after the Senate convened. The new Vice-President was presiding, and he and Senator Curtis of Kansas, the Republican leader, were undertaking to hasten the proceedings when Senator Hale, Republican of Maine, arose to explain that he alone was responsible for Mr. Dawes leaving the Senate for a time yesterday without a regular constitutional presiding officer. Then Senator Reid, of Missouri, explained that he wanted to find out just how the journal recorded the events yesterday of the first special session over which Mr. Dawes presided.

Pershing's Condition
Greatly Improved

Havana, Cuba, March 5.—General John Julian Pershing, who was taken ill on his arrival here last Tuesday, was sleeping early this morning. Last night, it was said at the hotel that the General was in good spirits, and probably would be out by Sunday when the main memorial monument is due to be dedicated by the Cuban government.

SOVIET RUSSIA USES RADIO
TO BROADCAST PROPAGANDA

Moscow.—Soviet Russia has three radio sending stations, at Moscow, Leningrad and Nishchontetahoin, Leningrad and Nishchontetahoin, Leningrad and Nishchontetahoin. These are under the control of the commissariat of posts, telegraphs and telephones.

GERMANY'S FUTURE
STILL UNCERTAIN

Discussions on Security
Question Have Not
Yet Taken Concrete
Form Says Statement

Berlin, March 5.—Supplementing what are termed the inadequate acts in the Foreign Press of the German government discussions on the security question, a semi-official statement today denies an assertion from French quarters that Germany is endeavoring to secure the mediation of the British Government in the matter, but that Foreign Secretary Chamberlain declined to give his assent.

It appears that the German government communicated to all allies its attitude toward the problem, but that no definite problems have been submitted, nor any problems met for formal discussions.

The German Government's view, the statement says, is that it is impossible to put forth concrete details at the present time.

Washington, March 5.—Frank B. Kellogg was sworn in today as Secretary of State, succeeding Charles E. Hughes, who has held this post for the last four years.

WRANGLER FLEET ROTS
AT ANCHOR IN RIZERTA

Bizerta, Tunis.—The warships of the Wrangler fleet, interned here since the collapse of the operations of this Tunisian leader against the Bolsheviks, are in a bad way.

Russian refugees have been living on board the ships for three years, and their ships are covered with clustering bunches of mussels. Neglected and without upkeep, the engines, and consequent experts doubt if the vessels will be put to sea again.

BRITISH ARMY RAISES BARS
AGAINST INFIT RECRUITS

London.—Of every 100 young men who applied to join the British army during 1923, about 82 were rejected as physically unfit. It was announced recently by recruiting officers. This compares with 55 per cent in 1921 and 58 per cent in 1923.

Authorities disagree as to the cause some containing the increase in the proportion of rejections was due to a raising of the standard when men came up for examination.

Child Sacrilegious in Japan

Tokio.—A marked increase in child sacrifice in Japan is revealed by the psychological bureau of the department of education. In the last ten years 2,316 children have taken their own lives and for the year just ended there were 427.

Raleigh, March 5.—Dan Boney, attorney of Goldsboro, today was appointed by Stacey W. Wade, State Insurance Commissioner, as chief clerk of the department, to succeed Silas F. Campbell, resigned. Mr. Wade announced the appointment in a statement in which he referred to the record made by Mr. Boney during the world war, and asserted belief that the appointment would meet with general approbation. Mr. Boney is a native of Winston, but has been practicing law in Goldsboro for some years.

COME UP AS SPECIAL
ORDER IN HOUSE TONIGHT

WEATHER IS NOW
FAVORABLE FOR
PLANTING CROPS

Recent Freeze Damages
Truck Farming
and Tobacco Beds;
Warmest February
Since 1890

Washington, March 5.—The Department of Agriculture in its weekly review of crops and weather conditions in the Southern States, says weather will continue mild throughout the rest of the week, and favor the planting of spring crops and the growth of vegetation where there is sufficient soil moisture to be found. The report stated that "There was a hard freeze as far as the coast on March 3rd, the coldest on record in this state at Raleigh, with one exception, and following the warmest February since 1890. There was considerable damage to truck farming, the swollen buds, and tobacco buds, through it is too early to determine the extent. Considerable plowing and planting of truck and work to be done in the South East will be behind some weeks on account of wet soil."

LIST OF OFFICERS
SUCCEED MITCHELL
REDUCED TO THREE

Final Decision of Successor
to Assistant
Chief of Army Air
Service Expected Today

Washington, March 5.—The list from whom Secretary Weeks has recommended to the President as a successor to Brigadier General William Mitchell, Assistant Chief of the Army Air Service, has been reduced to three officers and a final decision is expected late today. None of the men under consideration rank below the grade of Lieutenant Colonel. Previously, several majors had been mentioned. The friends of General Mitchell, who have given up hope of securing his reappointment to his present assignment when it expires on March 26th, have turned their efforts today toward helping him secure a future place in the air service which would conform with the rank of Colonel, to which he reverts automatically, and give an opportunity to him for utilization of the long experience he has had in aviation.

606 Applicants Are
Given Work During
Week Ending Feb 21

Raleigh, March 5.—Labor conditions in North Carolina during the week ending February 28 were not so favorable as on the preceding week, according to the weekly report of the State and Federal Employment Service, which has just been made public by Frank D. Gris, Commissioner of Labor and Printing. The report shows that a total of 606 applicants were given work through the various State bureaus, as compared with 699 applicants placed during the week ending February 21.

The total registrations during the week are given as 758, of which number 568 were men and 187 women. Bill Designed to Create
Four Special Judicial
Circuits, and Four
Special Judges Passes
Third Reading

Raleigh, March 5.—While the Senate today floundered about with its chief interest centered in the question of raising additional revenue with which to increase school equalization funds, and provide for the Confederate Veterans, the House failed to take up for consideration the minority report on the bill to allow members of co-operative associations to withdraw from such organization.

After much discussion, and committee room conferences, it was announced that proponents and opponents of various legislation to increase equalization funds had reached an agreement, and a measure was sent forward by Senator Sewell, of Lee county, which would provide for the application of all revenue derived from the newly imposed automobile bus tax to be given to the equalization fund. After a short discussion of new proposals, the Senate recessed until 1:00 o'clock this afternoon, with motion pending to put the measure on its immediate passage as an amendment to the revenue bill, and to dispose of the revenue bill.

In the House, the Appropriation bill will come up for consideration in a special order tonight at 8:15 o'clock. It was moved that it be taken up at today's session, but Chairman Murphy, of the Appropriation Committee, suggested that there might be some discussion which might require a longer period of time.

The only business transaction by the House outside of consideration of local measures, was the passage on the third reading of a bill designed to create four special judicial circuits, and calling for the appointment, by the Governor, of four special judges to relieve the congestion of the court dockets of the state. The measure, it was explained, would not effect the present number of judicial districts.

The cotton mills of Scotland county have a combined capital of approximately \$1,500,000.

The cotton mills of Stanly county are located at Albemarle, Norwood, and Coketown. These mills have a capital stock of about \$6,000,000. The presidents of the various concerns include J. S. Efrid, Mrs. J. W. Cannon, D. B. Coltrane and J. A. Groves.

The one cotton manufacturing plant in Sorex county is located at Mount Airy. It has a capital stock of \$100,000 and R. A. Love is president.

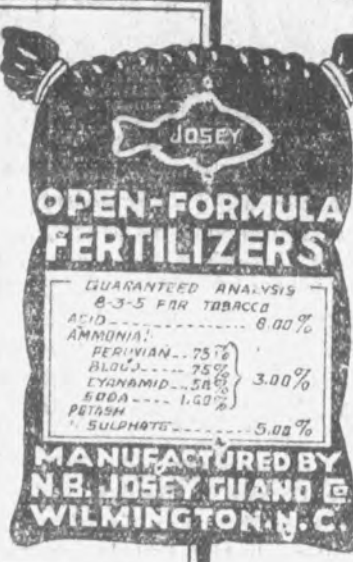

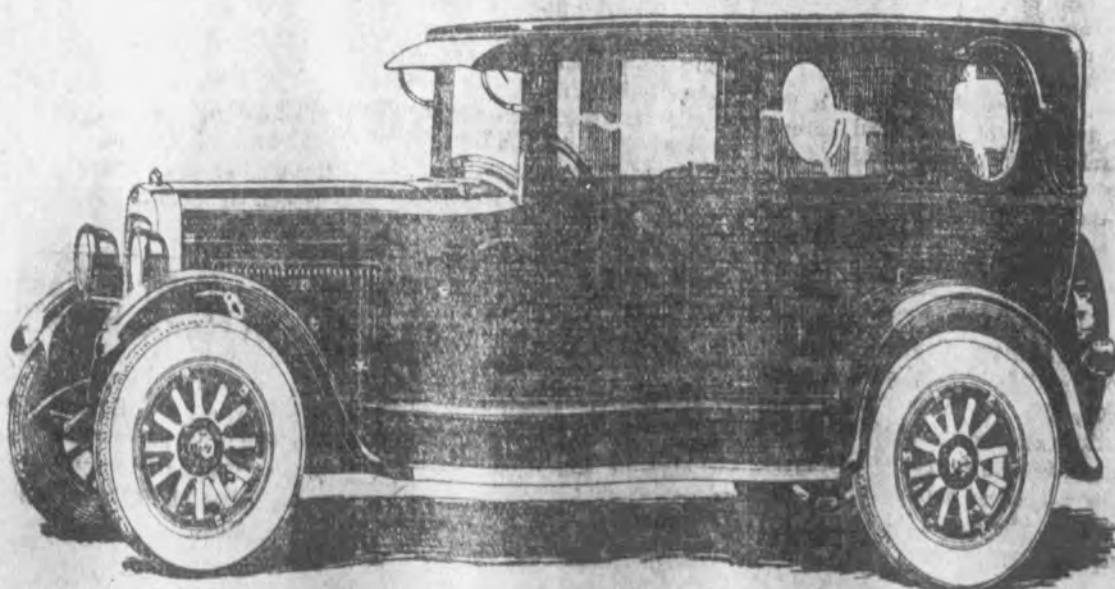

Tar Heels In Mid-Ocean

(By D. J. WHICHARD, Jr.)

The Williams Carolina - Bermuda Cruise, the first of its kind ever to sail from a North Carolina port, terminated on Sunday afternoon, March 1, when the S. S. Fort Hamilton docked at Wilmington and put ashore two hundred and fifty Tar Heel tourists who had spent eight enjoyable days at sea and in Bermuda. Expressing some regrets that the party should break up so soon and new friends and acquaintances must separate to return to their various duties ashore, the crowd seethed with enthusiasm over what they had seen and done and were loud in their praise of Mr. Leon Williams, of the Williams Travel Service, of Charlotte, upon whose initiative and under whose management, with the able assistance of Mr. Walker, of the Furness-Bermuda Line, the itinerary on land and at sea was carried out without a hitch and to the pleasure and comfort of the members of the party.

On Friday afternoon, February 20, the population of Wilmington enjoyed a thrill when the S. S. Fort Hamilton, the largest passenger liner ever to enter North Carolina waters, proceeded up the Cape Fear River and was made fast at the Sprunt docks. Immediately news spread over the city that the great ship had arrived and hundreds gathered along the waterfront to view the craft. Throughout the night members of the cruising party arrived in the seacoast city by train and auto together with hundreds of friends who came to wish us "God Speed." By noon Saturday the city was astir and when the hour of departure arrived every strategic point was crowded to capacity.

Shortly after one o'clock the word "All visitors ashore," was passed about the ship and exactly at two o'clock the lines which held the ship fast to the docks were loosed and the vessel glided smoothly from its berth.

With those on board chanting Carole, Dixie and other southern melodies, accompanied by the orchestra on board and amid the shouts of thousands on shore and a pandemonium of whistles from the whistles of the boats in the harbor, the first passenger sailing from a North Carolina port to foreign soil was begun. As the ship with its Tar Heel cargo glided down toward the sea thousands who had gathered along the shore cheered and waved "Bon Voyage." Slowly but surely, under the guidance of the veteran pilot of the Cape Fear, and accompanied by a number of smaller craft crowded to capacity, we proceeded to South Port, thence past the light house and across the bar. Here our pilot was dropped, the cutter which received him added a salute to our farewell and we were headed eastward to the sea. Glancing backward with love and admiration at the Tar Heel shore line we saw the sun drop behind the horizon and land was lost to view. Members of the party then turned their attention to the ship which was to be their abode for the next two days and members of the crew as well as officers were besieged with numbers of questions, it appearing that every passenger was determined to see all and know all that was humanly possible.

The voyage across was made under ideal weather conditions but despite this a number passed through the ordeal of seasickness but now this is recounted as another experience contingent to the trip and to have missed this would have made the trip incomplete. Throughout the voyage there was continuous merimaking, there being orchestra selections for dancing when desired and numerous vocal concerts by the Charlotte trio and these added to by song and recitations from other volunteer talent among the passengers. All went well at sea and shortly after noon Monday the shout "Land" brought all the party forward eager to get a first glimpse of the wonderful land for which we were bound. By mid-afternoon the tiny speck first sighted had loomed into a group of wonderful islands and we had taken aboard the Bermuda pilot who was to carry us around the islands and into the harbor that was our destination.

As we skirted the shores of this mid-ocean land the sights that were witnessed by all as we gazed shoreward are indescribable except that we use the words of John J. Bushell, author, who wrote of Bermuda as follows:

"Were this to be a fairy tale of an Island of Enchantment, we would say: 'A Fairy waved her magic wand, and from the depths of Neptune's azure domain there came forth a realm of a by-gone age and lost world, a corner of Atlantis, a re-creation of Eden, an island with miniature mountains and valleys, clad in evergreen beauty, bejewelled with exquisite flowers, bathed in the brightest of sunshine, with rainbow-hued waters of crystal transparency ebbing and flowing over coral ledges and atolls, and rippling in gentle caress or dashing in angry surges on beaches of clean white coral sand.'"

"Such a flight of fancy would not be far amiss in a descriptive narrative about Bermuda—the dreamland of poets and artists, the restland of the weary, the peaceful, beautiful homeland of the people called Ber-

ting for some of the greatest American produced photoplays among them, the Annette Kellerman production of Neptune's Daughter with which most of the members of the party were familiar and to whom the scenery was easily recognizable as the same. On through historic old St. George, where the oldest church of the western hemisphere together with tablets and mountains of historical events including the burial place of the heart of Admiral Somers held the attention of the party, the trail led back in the late afternoon to the Hamilton.

The evening began with a farewell program of song and recitation presented by the Carolina party in the lounge of the Hamilton and which judging from the applause was a delight to all those present. Next began the final view of and participation in the amusements offered the last night on the island for at ten o'clock Friday our visit must come to an end when the good ship Fort Hamilton was to carry us to our homeland.

Friday morning found the hotel a virtual beehive of activity as porters rushed to and fro laden with the baggage of the departing Tar Heels. The hour to depart was approaching and no time must be lost. With hearty handshakes and fond farewells to those who in so short a time we had learned to like so well we hurried aboard, the gangway was lowered and we were off amid cheers aboard for the country and people whom we were about to leave, responded to by an uproar of cheers from the thousands of Bermudians and visitors who had gathered to bid us Au Revoir.

Our parting was heralded by the Royal Gazette and Colonial Weekly, the morning newspaper of Hamilton as follows:

"To-day the Fort Hamilton with the large party from Wilmington, North Carolina, returns to the Southern port after a stay here of the week."

"Every member of the party, including ex-Governor Cameron Morrison, is delighted with the experience and there is every possibility that trips from this port will be regular in the future."

"If the distinguished visitors are kind enough to say courteous things about their reception here, we can sincerely reciprocate the feeling for rarely has such a happy party visited our shores and left such pleasant memories behind. We bid them au revoir."

Around the enchanted islands we glided and out into the sea. Soon the scene of our great enjoyment had dwindled to but a speck on the horizon, then faded from view and our eyes were turned homeward but our hearts and minds carried fond memories of a country and people never to be forgotten.

The routine and amusement on board during the return trip was similar to that of the outward voyage, but varying weather furnished everything that the sea had to offer and added greatly to the experience of all those on board. From a bright sunlit day with a beautiful sunset the ship passed into a night of pitching sea but not of darkness as the moonlight on the blue waters added beauty for all and romance for those sentimentally inclined. Through another day of sunshine we passed into another night of moonlight this time accompanied by a rolling sea which resulted in the crashing of a large portion of the ship's china left unprotected together with an additional sea bath for some few who failed to close the ports of their cabins before retiring. All went well for the remainder of the night and early Sunday morning we passed the Frying Pan Light Ship and considered ourselves nearing home. A few minutes later, however, we were enveloped by an impenetrable fog and when the pilot who was to bring us safely in reached us we were forced to ride at anchor until the fog lifted which was four hours later. Soon we were again in sight of home and a feeling of joy and pride swept over the party. Once more we crossed the bar, but this time inward bound and as we headed up the Cape Fear all were busy gathering together their belongings in order to be the first to get ashore to tell of our wonderful cruise. In mid-afternoon with the air again filled with music and the sound of voices we were greeted by a shore line filled with a milling human mass that had gathered to welcome us home.

Again the gang plank, Immigration and Customs inspection, a hasty greeting to those who had gathered to receive us, a brief farewell to our friends of the voyage and our cruise was at an end.

While the above brief resume of our wonderful cruise brings us back to the starting point it merely covers the movement of the party as a whole as observed by one of its members and it may well be said that so far as the individual activities are concerned a half has not been told. Members of the party while enjoying their hours of liberty had occasion to be received by the Governor of Bermuda, others were received aboard the U. S. S. Patoka while still others had occasion to meet and know American actresses and actors together with nobles now in Bermuda on location in the filming of "The Little French Girl."

Each member of the party no doubt saw something or somebody that escaped the notice of his fellow travelers and each has a different story to tell. However all are in accord that the trip was a huge success and one not soon to be forgotten. For the Fort Hamilton reached Wilmington on

the return voyage the more than a dozen newspaper men and women among them representatives of the South Carolina press passed resolutions giving their hearty endorsement to the cruise and its management. Similar resolutions were passed and signed by every member of the cruise as well as resolutions of esteem for the Bermudians for their generous hospitality to the Tar Heels, Virginians and South Carolinians, who made up the first Carolina-Bermuda Cruise.

WHY NOT A RECORDER'S COURT?

Now that the legislature has defeated the measure which would have granted Recorder's jurisdiction to mayors throughout the state it would be well for the City of Greenville to turn its attention to another and more appropriate manner of handling its police court cases which in the end would prove of greater advantage to the city than the method prescribed in the defeated bill.

Other cities the size of Greenville have Recorder's Courts to handle their police cases and the mayors are relieved of the duties of trial judge. Where this method has been practiced the results have been more than satisfactory both from the standpoint of the court and from that of the management of the city's affairs by the respective mayors.

While this is no attack upon the present method employed by our city nor any reflection upon our city government our present system is fast becoming an obsolete one and the duties of mayor are plentiful without those of judge attached. Aside from this fact there are ever present petty enmities caused from the police court which to an extent tie the hands of the mayor in his efforts in behalf of the city. If our city is to show the progress which it should and take its rightful place among the cities of the state those in charge of its affairs should not be forced to work under the handicaps now resulting from our city court.

A mayor to handle the affairs of our city and a Recorder's Court to try our cases are two of our present needs and it would be well for our citizens to give some thought to such a move for the good of our town.

THE SECOND INAUGURATION

The entry of Mr. Coolidge upon his second term of office as President of the United States is seen by the New York World as quite a contrast from the standpoint of ceremony as the conditions under which he first took the oath of office but beneath it all the same average American placed in the White House this time by the greatest plurality ever cast by the American citizens.

In its comment the World says:

"The contrast is obvious, and will occur to many people.

"He stood in the low parlor of a remote New England farm-house, taking his oath of office on a hot August night while an oil-lamp smoked and the shadow of a highboy cut across the wall at each opening of the kitchen door, and the country had not yet discovered it had lost a President. He stands today in a white-washed portico at the east end of the Capitol, taking his second oath of office before as many of his countrymen as can pack themselves into an open square, while an army of reporters watches every chance for local color and all the modern mechanism of recording history does its best to make a spectacle of a late winter morning.

It is the strength of the man that the second picture will not obliterate the first: that through all the fog-horn ceremony by which we canonize a President will come the simplicity of an impromptu oath of office in a lamp-lit parlor; that out of the maze of hand shaking and back-slapping that is Washington, out of the odor of dead and dying cigars, will come the undramatic figure of a spare New England lawyer.

"The country has endowed Mr. Coolidge with many of the virtues attributed to the canny folk who first settled his New England hills. It matters less in the public's picture of him as he enters his second term that some men regard him as a man of destiny, and others see in him an orthodox machine Republican brought to his present estate by a rare good run of fortune, than that all men regard him as a conscientious American whose life can be identified at more points than one with familiar landmarks in the country's history.

"There will ride back through Pennsylvania Avenue at 2 o'clock this afternoon, in the narrow lane left to him by tourists who will tell their story many times and salesmen hawking plaster models of the White House, an American President chosen to succeed himself by average men in large part because he professed himself an average man, and chosen by the largest popular plurality in history."

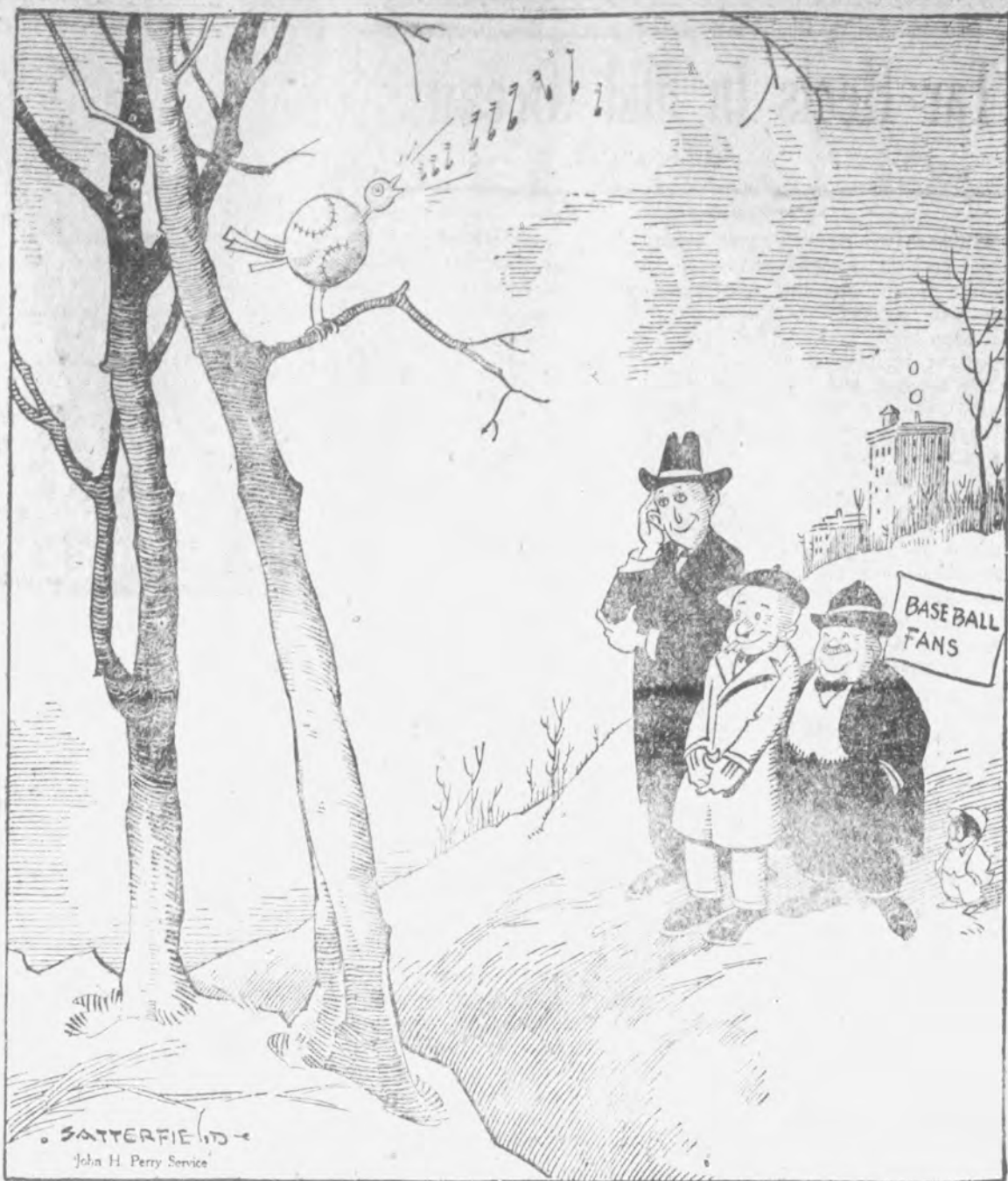

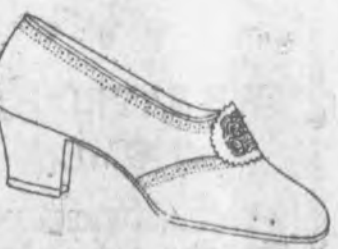

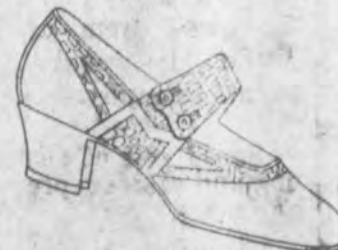

GRAIN.

Trade sentiment last night was mostly bearish on all grains based largely on the high prices and the poor cash demand, especially for corn which is selling at greater discounts under the May. The wheat market has taken an immense load the last few days and it is surprising to those who have watched the developments that prices have held up so well. Lower prices are expected for wheat, corn and rye today unless good supporting orders are forthcoming.

COTTON.

New York—New highs were made on May and July in the first hour due to buying by Liverpool trade interests and local bulls. The advance met heavy southern selling followed by general profit taking and around noon large selling orders came in from New Orleans.

The southern selling was followed by telegrams saying spots were easier. October showed further weakness. The widening of the spread between old and new is due largely of course, to moving of hedges from old to new because of the coming reclassification of the local stock. The general idea is that all the cotton will be found up to standard as previously classed. Sentiment remains bullish for ultimate results, but a further temporary reaction may be in order.

Compared with last year, stock on shipboard at Galveston yesterday was 62,000 vs. 28,000; at New Orleans: 335,000 against 30,000.

Cables, weather in Texas, spot and trade advices have to be reckoned with.

Sentiment rather divided, again, owing to reactionary feeling with some people, but Texas weather outlook likely dominate market.

KING OF IVORIES BROADCAST TO FAME FROM PRISON CELL

How Harry Snodgrass, Serving Sentence at Missouri Penitentiary, Reached Public With His Music

NOW ON WAY TO WIN FORTUNE

Another romance of the Radio comes with the announcement of the Brunswick Company that Harry Snodgrass, up to a few weeks ago Convict No. 1311 at Missouri State Prison, will record exclusively for Brunswick Records. Then the grim gates swung outward to let Snodgrass back into the world again he had the salt-and-pepper suit the state gives all released 'guests' and a new five dollar bill. But he reckoned without his many friends to whom his fame had been broadcast by radio. They had sent him gifts totaling over \$10,000, in cash, a new touring car, and many gifts of appreciation which did much to dispel the gloom that years of incarceration had put on the shy little man. But one of the best presents that awaited him was a contract for the Keith-Albee Orpheum Circuit—"Big time." And another was an invitation to play for Brunswick Records.

Snodgrass' prison history reads like pure romance. A man with a number, with hope cut off—with no outlet for normal things, he sank his identity in the wood working shop of the prison.

Station WOS, located in the dome of the State Capital—a few blocks from the grey prison on the Missouri river—called for talent to broadcast to the thousands who nightly tuned in for their programs. Warden Crawford, the humanitarian boss of the prison, organized a band among the prisoners. Time was allowed for rehearsals. Instruments were donated by friendly citizens. Soon the first program was sent out into the darkness by the ethereal waves. Great acclamation followed this first program. It was repeated. It became a regular feature. The prisoners who broadcast each night were put on honor when they went to the broadcasting station.

Radio fans began to ask for solos by the band's pianist. Modestly enough, Snodgrass, who previous to going to the cells had been a splendid pianist, gave his first program—solo.

His success was sensational. The papers carried stories of the men who, despite their pent-up lives took their own time to entertain others more unfortunate than they. Soon from coast to coast Station WOS was picked up by radio-lovers who recognized the signing in and off signal of the station. The Missouri Waltz, played by 'the professor,' Jack Witten the announcer became famous for his cheery voice, his clear enunciation, his unflinching humor.

Thus fame was reached by a man not of the world but merely in it. A man who might well have been disheartened by fate but who sought out his chance even under the most discouraging handicaps.

The first Brunswick Record on Snodgrass—called "King of Ivories"—is a reproduction of the famous broadcast so many thousands have heard nightly. It begins with Witten announcing the station—then announces the feature of the evening, Harry Snodgrass. Snodgrass renders, with his superlative skill, his first number "Three O'clock in the Morning Waltz." His artistry is perfect. As his fingers go trippingly over the keys with a technique that breathes of perfection, his hearers gasp with admiration. On the other side of

this record, Snodgrass plays "Dustin the Keys," which was composed by the "King" and which allows his art full scope. His rhythm is "perfect," the piano notes are full and clear, as only Brunswick plays piano notes. The record is unusual, unlike any heard before.

Surely Snodgrass' fame is only starting. But again has been demonstrated the power of radio in the lives of people—radio, the new stepping stone to fame and power.

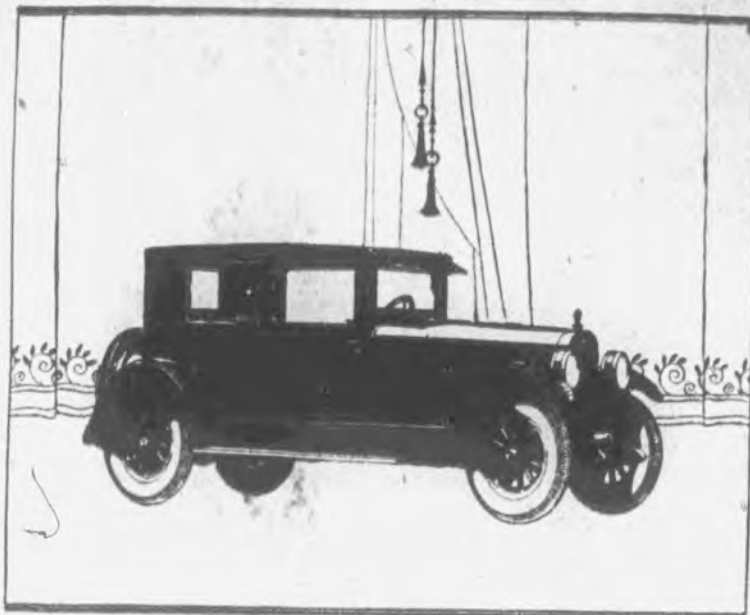

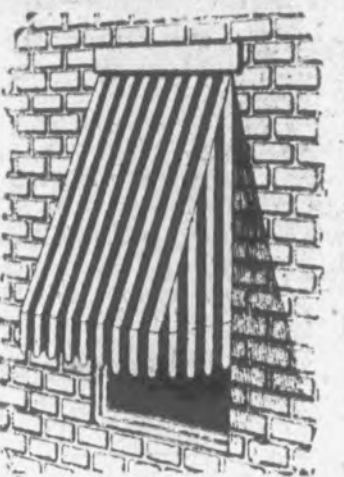
