GENERAL ASSEMBLY MAY NOT ADJOURN SESSION UNTIL FIRST OF WEEK

Carries With it a Record for Legislation Drastically Changing Administration of the State Government; Will Complete Allotted 60 Day Span of Life Saturday

Raleigh, March 6.—With a record for legislation drastically changing the administration of State Government, the General Assembly is scheduled to adjourn tomorrow with the completing of its allotted 60 day span of life. However, leaders have admitted that adjournment probably will not be taken before the first part of next week.

Behind it in Raleigh will be left a State Government, in which the Governor has been given largely increased powers; some of the major duties of the State and Insurance Departments have been transferred to the Revenue Department; powers of the Corporation Commission have been increased by giving it control of inter-city bus lines; all institutions and departments have been placed on definite appropriation; a new Budgetary System has been adopted, designed to effect economies in government; two new State departments have been created, and various other measures of vital importance have been acted upon.

One of the outstanding acts, about the 1925 General Assembly, is the extent to which it has followed the Governor's lead. With only one exception, every request made by him has been granted. Measures concerning the State's financial affairs, which have been enacted into law at his bidding, and in every way he has been the real outstanding leader of the body during the past session. Taxes have been increased by legislature so as to provide an annual revenue of approximately \$12,000,000, compared with approximately \$8,000,000 heretofore.

A deficit in the general funds of the State of approximately \$9,000,000 has been recognized as existing as of June 30, 1925, and \$400,000 per year has been provided for in the Appropriations bill to begin the funding of this deficit.

A Road Bond Issue of \$20,000,000, divided equally between 1925 and 1926, was passed for continuance of the highway program of the State, and it brought the total bond issue for this purpose to \$85,000,000. Legislative leaders had planned for an issue of \$35,000,000, but Governor McLean, in a message to the body, urged that it be limited to the smaller sum, and his advice prevailed.

Committee Orders 2nd Favorable Report Nomination Warren

Washington, March 6.—A second favorable report on the nomination of Charles B. Warren, of Michigan, to be Attorney General, was ordered today by the Senate Judiciary Committee.

At the same time, Senate Republicans in the conference voted 28 to 11 against consideration of the nomination in the opening session of the Senate.

Application for Writ of Error Behalf Forbes Filed Today

Chicago, March 6.—Application for a writ of error on behalf of Colonel Charles R. Forbes, former head of the United States Veterans Bureau, recently found guilty, with John W. Thompson, on conspiracy, was filed in Federal Court today. Forbes' counsel sought to appeal to the United States Circuit of Appeals. There was a stay in the sentence of Forbes, who like Thompson was fined \$10,000, and his sentence to prison for two years was extended forty days by Samuel Alschuler, of the United States Circuit of Appeals, but he refused to pass on the application for writ of error in the absence of the trial judge.

WOMAN BEING HELD CHARGED WITH THE MURDER OF HUSBAND

Mrs. Dora Fentress in Currituck Jail While Officers Search for Reddie Capps, Also Charged With the Murder

Elizabeth City, March 6.—Mrs. Dora Fentress today was held in jail, and officers were searching for Reddie Capps, farmer of Knotts Island, following indictment of the two yesterday afternoon by a Currituck grand jury, charging them with the murder of Mrs. Fentress' husband on Nov. 9, 1924.

Four other men here held in connection with the killing, but were not indicted. Fentress' body was found at the door of the barn late one night, and an investigation has since been underway.

Text Book Commission Will Select Books If Bill Is Enacted

Raleigh, March 6.—Full power to select the text books to be used in the public schools of the State will be vested in the Text Book Commission if a bill now pending before the General Assembly is enacted into law. The measure would make the Commission the final arbiter as to the text books and its decisions would rule absolutely.

The present law gives the Commission only the power of recommendation and the State Board of Education makes the final decision. The State Board would be eliminated as a factor if the new legislation is enacted.

The purpose of the measure, it is stated, is to vest the power in a body which is composed of educators familiar with the books used in the schools and well posted on new books which might prove of aid in the educational system. The Text Book Commission is to be composed of teachers, principals, supervisors and superintendents under the proposed law and would consist of nine members. The Governor would be ex-officio chairman but would not have any power of veto or appeal from the decision of the Commission. He would have one vote only. The State Superintendent of Public Instruction would be ex-officio secretary of the Commission and would have one vote. He, however, would have to approve the suggested course of study as outlined by the Commission.

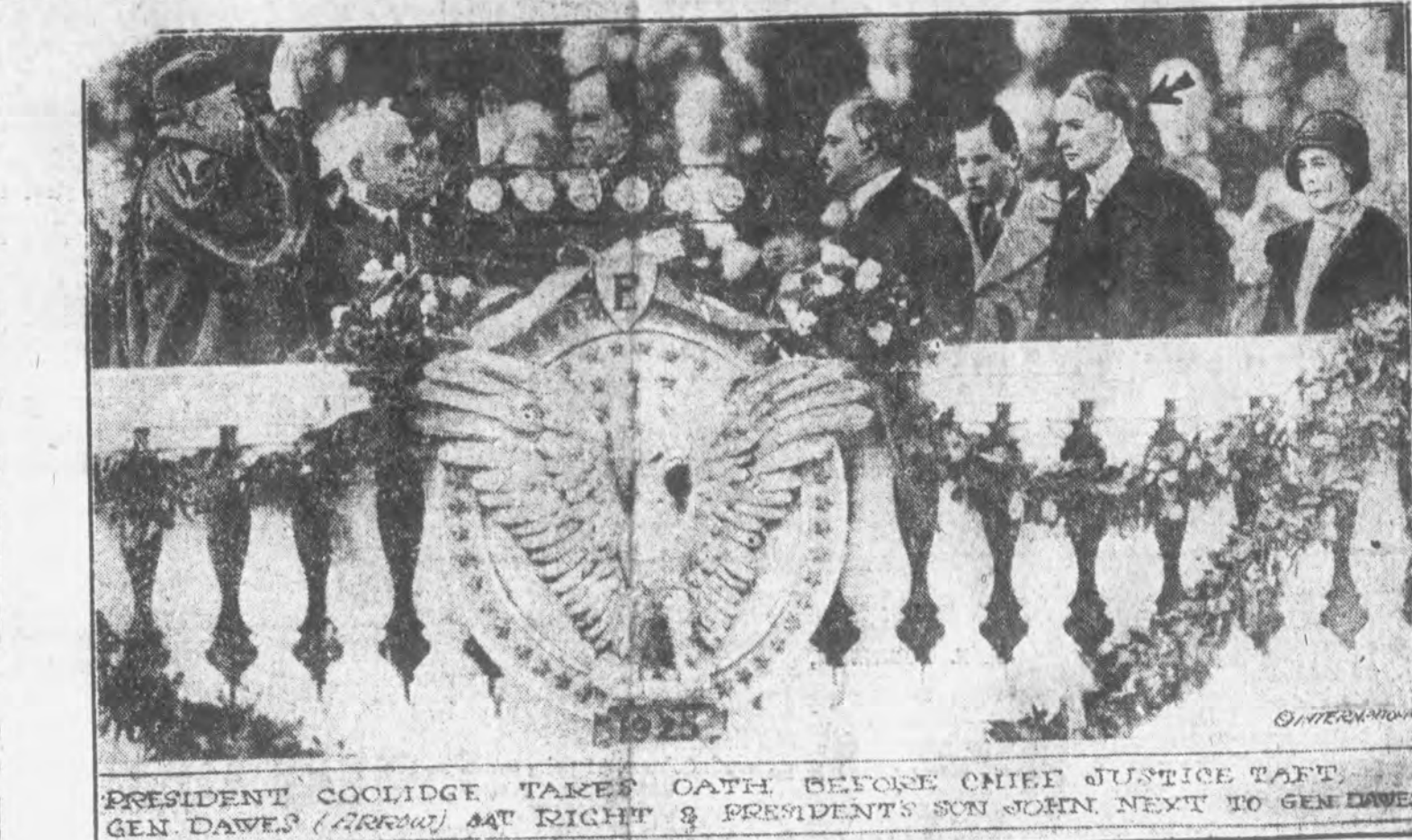
The measure would provide for the members of the Commission to serve for five years, subject to removal by the Governor and Superintendent for good cause. They would receive \$200 for their services and after the first year five dollars per diem of actual service for expenses.

2495 People Given Employment in State During February

Raleigh, March 6.—Two thousand four hundred and ninety-five people were given employment through the six bureaus of the North Carolina State and Federal Employment Service during the month of February, 1925, according to the monthly report of the department which has just been compiled by Frank D. Grist, Commissioner of Labor and Printing. Of this number 1,976 were men and 519 women.

Reports for the month from the various offices indicate that the prospects for the employment of skilled and unskilled labor during the month of March are much more encouraging than during the month of February. All stations report that with fair weather numerous building projects will be begun that will afford employment for several hundred people.

Asheville led the list in the number placed during the month, with a total of 511, while the Raleigh bureau trailed behind with only 270 reported as placed. As a whole the six bureaus averaged the placement of 106 applicants during each of the twenty-four days the bureaus were kept open during the month.

FIRE LOSSES IN JANUARY HEAVY

Fires Do Almost a Million Dollars Damage in State During First Month of Year

Raleigh, March 6.—The total fire loss in North Carolina during the month of January, 1925, was \$979,685, according to the statistics compiled from official reports to the State Insurance Department, and made public here today by Commissioner Wade. The fire loss in January, 1924, according to the report, was \$889,553. The property at risk is given as \$3,423,792 against \$3,378,830 for the same month last year. The insurance involved in January, 1925, was \$2,708,298, as compared with \$2,382,356 in January, 1924.

The report further shows that there was a total of 164 fires during the month, as compared with 276 in January, 1924. The number of rural fires during the month was 27, with a loss of \$232,428, the town and city fires aggregating 137 with a loss of \$547,257. Of this number 12 were country or suburban dwellings, with a loss of \$50,950; and 88 were town and city dwellings, with a loss of \$42,302.

In commenting on the heavy loss during the month, Commissioner Wade said that the record for the number of fires, 164, was comparatively low, and that the average loss in 138 of these fires was only \$800 per fire while the average for the 26 that had a loss of \$5,000 or more, was about \$34,000 per fire. "In other words this group of 26 had a total damage, and loss of \$861,458," said Mr. Wade, "leaving a loss of only \$117,227 for the remaining 138."

The greatest loss occasioned by any one fire during the month, according to the report, was the garage and livery stable fire in Raleigh. This fire loss totaled \$299,000 and was followed by the destruction of a hotel and business block at Troy valued at \$100,000. Other heavy losses included a store and contents at Wilmington, loss \$75,000; two separate fires in stores at High Point, loss \$67,500; two at Greensboro, loss \$80,100, and a garage at Greenville, loss \$52,000. There were 10 fires in schools during the month, and six of these totaled a loss of \$178,100. With the exception of a dormitory fire at the University, which caused a loss of \$17,000, five of the school group were in rural schools, says the report. These fires included one in Gaston county with a loss of \$55,000 and one in Union county with a loss of \$65,000. Two fires occurred during the month at the State Normal for Negroes at Durham, these fires totaling a loss of \$35,000.

Washington, March 6.—Fred P. Dennis, of Princess Ann county, Maryland, was nominated today by President Coolidge to succeed David J. Louis, also of Maryland, as a member of the Tariff Commission.

FECHT TO SUCCEED GEN. MITCHELL

Colonel Fecht to Assume Duties as Assistant Chief of the Army Air Service on March 27

Washington, March 6.—Selection of Colonel James E. Fecht to be Assistant Chief of the Army Air Service to succeed Brigadier General Mitchell, was announced today by Secretary Weeks.

General Mitchell's term as Assistant Chief will expire March 27th, when Colonel Fecht will assume the duties and rank of Brigadier General. General Mitchell reverting to his own rank of Colonel.

Washington, March 6.—Colonel Fecht's nomination is expected to be sent to the Senate in the near future by President Coolidge, Secretary Weeks having recommended him for the post after examining all records of all officers of suitable rank.

COOLIDGE MEETS WITH HIS CABINET

Secretaries Kellogg and Jardine Join in Discussion of Government Policies

Washington, March 6.—President Coolidge sat today for the first time with his reconstructed cabinet. Secretaries Kellogg and Jardine joined in the discussion of government policies.

The Department of Justice was without a representative at the meeting, in as much as the nomination of Charles B. Warren, to be Attorney General, has not been confirmed by the Senate.

POST WAR ANTI CRAFT GUNS IN TEST WITH AIR CRAFT

Fortress Monroe, Va., March 6.—Post war anti-aircraft guns were matched today in a test with aircraft to demonstrate before doubtful legislators and other Washington officials that they were effective against enemy air bombers. The test was arranged by Secretary Weeks, and was designed to help in the determination of the question of the relative favor of land guns, and anti-aircraft as defense weapons against air invaders in war times. "Only one side of the question, however, was to be emphasized. That was, what progress had been made since 1918 in developing gun fire efficiency against raiding aircraft."

LOCAL GOLFERS ARE PREPARING FOR MEET

Local Tournament and Barbecue Yesterday Marks Opening of Spring Season

The golfers of the Greenville Country Club held their first tournament of the season yesterday afternoon followed by a barbecue and meeting at which time arrangements for the coming spring tournament between clubs of Eastern North Carolina were made.

The tournament yesterday consisted of eight best ball foursomes and was won by L. H. Bowling and W. L. Wichard with a score of 80. The next best scores were made by W. W. Lee, James Little and J. H. Waldrop and J. J. White, each pair turning in a score of 81.

At the meeting which followed the barbecue L. H. Bowling was elected captain of the local team to take part in the spring inter-city tournaments and W. W. Lee, Albion Dunn and J. T. Little were elected local tournament committee to arrange a series of tournaments for the local players to take place weekly or bi-weekly throughout the season. Much enthusiasm is being shown by the golfers and Greenville is expected to make a good showing in the inter-city contests.

The annual tournament for the President's Cup will take place during the month of May.

Cheyenne, Wyo., March 6.—Albert B. Fall, former Secretary of the Interior, will be served at El Paso with a subpoena to appear as witness for the government in the Teapot Dome Lease Annulment trial, opening here Monday, it was announced today.

Danish Steamer Aground Today

Norfolk, March 6.—The Danish Steamer, Sierra Morena, went aground off Cape Henry in thick weather early today, and now lies less than 300 yards off the beach with heavy sea whipped by a 48 mile north wind raking over her.

BERLIN SUICIDES DECREASE

Berlin.—Suicides in Berlin decreased last year to 36 for each 1,000 of population, as against 43.5 to 1,000 in 1923. Efforts are being made to get at the cause of suicide in an effort further to reduce the number.

M'CORMICK LEAVES ESTATE TO WIDOW

Mrs. McCormick Named Sole Executrix and Co-Trustee With Dawes, As Other Trustees

Chicago, March 6.—The late United States Senator, Medill McCormick, left his entire estate, of upward of \$2,000,000 according to the estimate of attorneys, to his widow, Mrs. McCormick, named sole executrix, and Co-trustee, with Vice President, Charles G. Dawes, as the other trustee, it was disclosed when the will was read today.

Woman's Club Holds Interesting Meeting

The Woman's Club held a most interesting meeting Thursday afternoon in the Barnea class room of the Memorial Baptist church. There was a splendid attendance to greet the President, Mrs. E. B. Ficklen, who has been absent from the city for six weeks. The treasurer, Mrs. L. H. Bowling, made a good report. Mrs. T. A. Person, chairman of Tubercular Fund reported that \$13.50 had been paid out for milk for a patient in town, and \$15 for two patients in the county. Mrs. Person read a letter from Mr. Futrell asking the club to write or wire our legislators asking that there be no reduction in the appropriation of the Mothers' Aid bill. Mrs. Herring, of the legislative committee, was requested to wire one of our legislators for this not to be done.

Mrs. J. H. B. Moore, chairman of the Home Economics Department reported four weeks of activity, having six programs with four all day meetings. NETTES BILL WILL COME UP SATURDAY FOR THIRD READING

Would Place Tax on Admission to Motion Picture Theatres for Benefit Confederate Veterans; Other Bills Given Consideration

Raleigh, March 6.—The House today called up from the unfavorable calendar the measure designed to place a tax on moving picture admissions for the benefit of Confederate Veterans, and at 12 o'clock took it up as a special order of business. This action followed the rejection by the body last night of a \$2.00 tax on automobiles of the state for the same purpose.

On motion of Senator Short, of Rockingham, and seconded by Senator Burgwyn, of New Hampton, the Senate voted to re-refer the Grady Co-operative Marketing bill, designed to do away with the injunction feature in co-op. contract violations to the committee of Agriculture. This action followed a debate in which Senator Howard, of Edgecomb county, charged that the reference motion was designed to kill the bill.

The Senate disposed of the local calendar in anticipation of hard work ahead, when the appropriation bill was to come up in the body, the measure having received final House approval last night.

In the House, on motion of Brown, of Wilks, the measure designed to take certain territory away from Wilks county, and make it a part of Carwell county, was tabled after a sharp debate.

Raleigh, March 6.—In the second showdown in 13 hours on the Confederate pensions, the House this afternoon voted 71 to 12 to place on its second reading the Nettles bill taxing admission to Motion Picture Theatres, and kindred amusements for the benefit of Confederate Veterans, agreed that the bill should be placed on the calendar so as to come up the first thing tomorrow morning on its third reading.

Outside of the consideration and action taken on the Grady Co-operative Marketing bill, there was little action in the Senate today.

After a three hour session devoted to consideration of local legislation, the Senate recessed until 4 o'clock this afternoon. During the morning session the Appropriations bill did not come over from the House, but it was expected that it would be offered this afternoon.

The House also passed on second and third readings, the Revenue Machinery Act without debate. There were some minor amendments, chief of which was one providing that State bonds bearing interest at not less than 4 1-4 percent interest, shall be taken in payment of inheritance taxes.

PLAIN LANGUAGE IN GUIDE MANNERS 3 CENTURIES AGO

Liverpool. — Letters and other documents dealing with manners and customs of daily life in the 17th century which came to light recently tend to show that it was customary in those days for "persons of quality" to have sets of their own spoons, knives and forks which they took with them when invited out. These papers were of particular interest just at this time to collectors of antiques in connection with an addition made recently to the British Museum. This was the earliest hall-marked table fork known, engraved with the crest of Manners and Montagu, 1632. About the same time a silver spoon of identical hall-mark and crest was taken to Haddon Hall.

Men of such a set is made in the will of Mrs. Katherine Ridgeway, dated May 9, 1627, which was among the documents destroyed in a fire some time ago at the Four Courts, Dublin. The will says:

"I bequeath to the Right Honorable the Lord Chancellor my little seller of crystal bottle item, I give and bequeath to my Lady of Elye my guilt spoon with the forks and penknife suitable to it." Mrs. Ridgeway was widow of George Ridgeway, secretary of the Irish Council, and the Lord Chancellor was Adam Loftus, Lord Loftus of Ely.

Books on etiquette and table manners were far from being the prerogative of the Victorian age, it is revealed, as in 1663 there was published in London a book entitled "The Accomplish'd Lady's Rich Closet of Rarities," in which the following rules are laid down:

"A gentlewoman being at table abroad or at home must observe to keep her body straight, and lean not by any means upon her elbows—nor

by ravenous gesture discover a voracious appetite. Talk not when you have meat in your mouth; and do not smack like a pig—nor eat speenement so hot that tears stand in your eyes.

"It is very uncourtly to drink so large a draught that your breath is almost gone, and you are forced to blow strongly to recover yourself. Throwing down your liquor as into a funnel is an action fitter for a juggler than a gentleman. In carving at your own table distribute the best pieces first, and it will appear very decent and comely to use a fork; so touch no meat without it."

Reference to the fork was of particular interest to the museum authorities, for those present-day indispensable instruments had not then been long introduced, it appears.

Forks were first imported from Italy, and their use in England at the time was considered pedantic and laughable. One writer of the time speaks of a silver fork as "being used of late by some of our spruce gallants," which did not tend to make the fork popular at all among certain sets.

IRISH CHARGED WITH BOYCOTTING OWN COUNTRY'S MANUFACTURES

Dublin. — The Irish people have been boycotting their own goods, it was declared at a meeting of the executives of the Cork Industrial Development Association. Some few years back customers used to insist on Irish manufactures, but this is now exceptional.

The secretary commented upon a recent statement of Professor Smiddy in America that "Ireland is a creditor country rather than a debtor country," and that "Irishmen have a billion dollar investment in foreign countries drawing an income of about \$55,000,000 a year."

The secretary argued that this export of Irish capital was suicidal and it was suggested that the government should put an embargo on further capital export.

Sought in Memorial Imbroglio

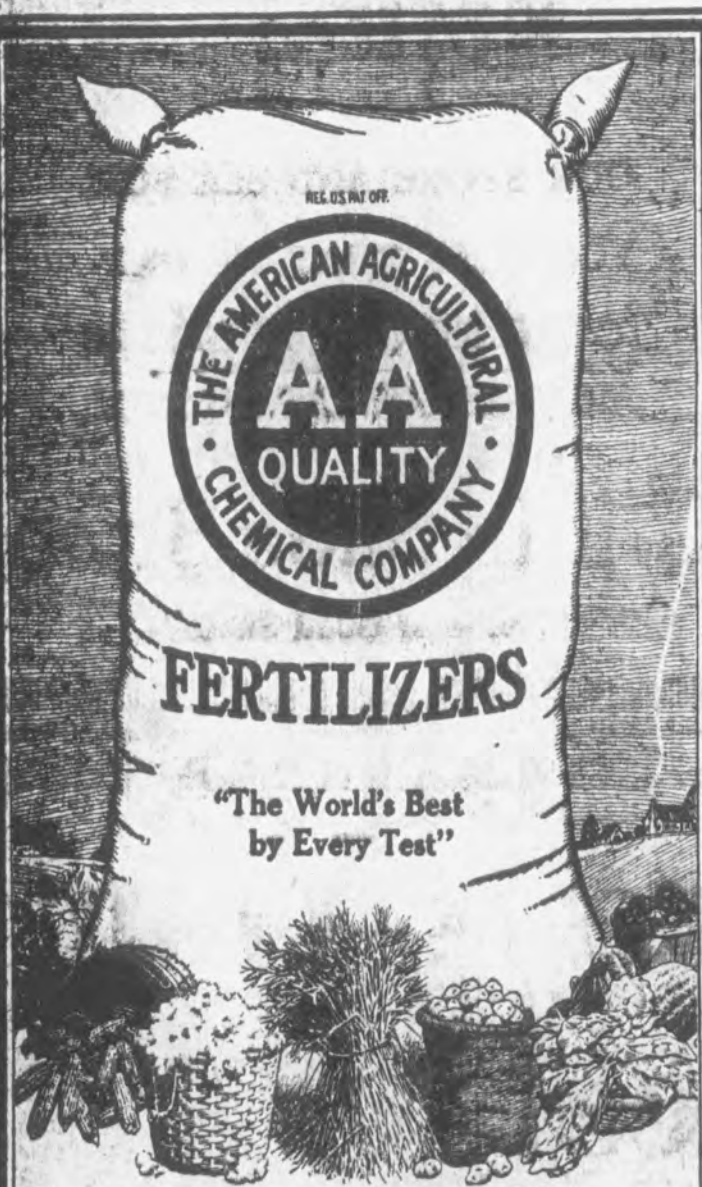

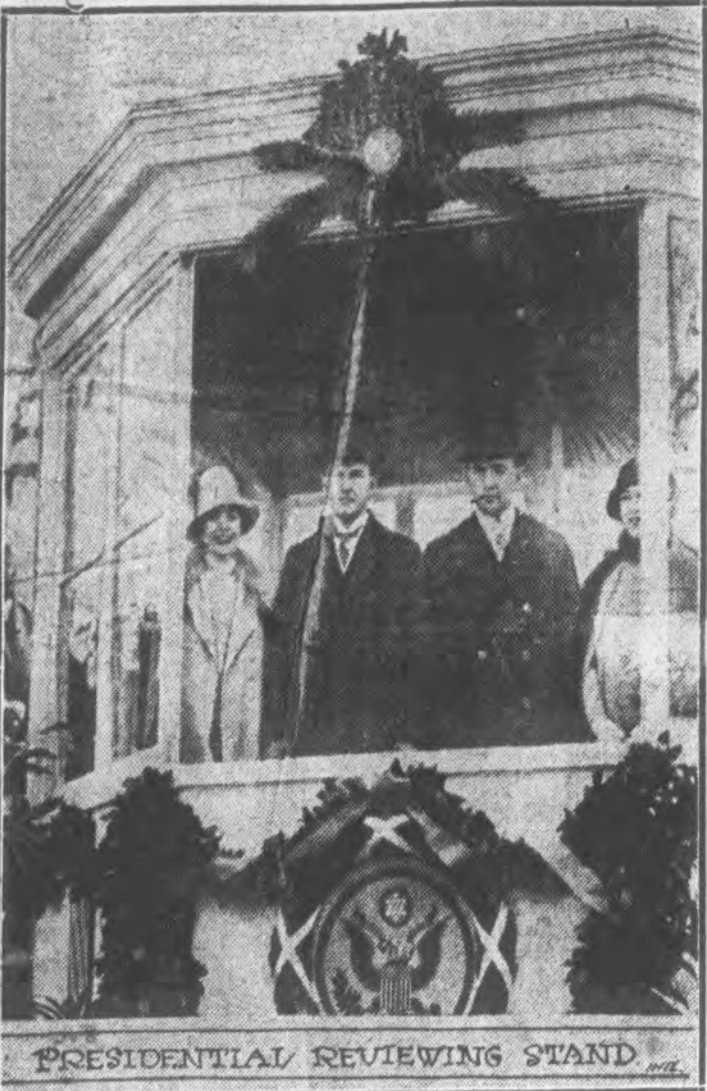

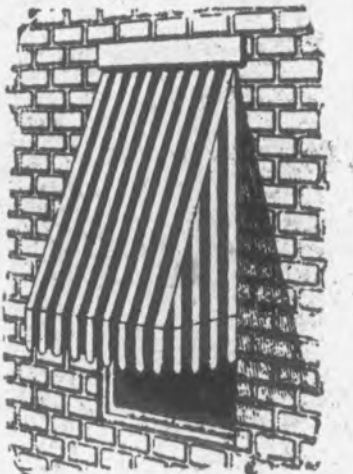
