FOURTH ANNUAL PUBLIC SCHOOL TRACK MEET TO BE HELD MONDAY, APR. 6

Boys' Work Committee of the Rotary Club to Have Active Charge of Meet; Literary Contest to Be Held in the Morning; Final Preliminaries to Be Held on March 20

The Fourth Annual Public School Track Meet will be held at the Pitt County Fair Grounds in Greenville on Monday, April 6 beginning at 2 p. m. This track meet held under the auspices of the Greenville Rotary Club has proved to be, one of the finest things that has come into the lives of the youth of Pitt county. The Boys Work committee of the Rotary Club has active charge of the meet. The committee this year is composed of the following men: J. H. Rose, J. H. Blount, J. E. Winslow, J. H. Wilcox, Dr. E. T. Dickinson, W. H. Rodgers, Jr., and Mayor D. M. Clark. The list of events this year will be the same as they were during the three preceding years and the regulations governing the meet are practically the same. The merchants of the town of Greenville, who have been so liberal with their prizes for the other meets will again offer worth while prizes. The Beautiful Loving Cup offered by the Club will go to the school winning the greatest number of points. And the prizes mentioned above will be given to the winners of all first places. The announcements concerning the meet were sent out about one month ago, and members of the Boys Work Committee have visited some of the schools of the county to explain the meet in detail. Indications now are that there will be a greater interest taken in the meet this year than ever before. Last year the Farmville schools were quarantined on account of measles and could not participate. This year they are putting a strong team in the field. During the coming week the schools are going to hold their own preliminaries for the purpose of picking their teams to compete at the Group Centers. On Friday March 20 the final preliminary will be held at five places in the county for the purpose of picking the five composite teams which shall contend at Greenville. The places where Group Center preliminaries will be held are as follows: Grafton, Bethel, Farmville, Grimesland and Greenville. On the date mentioned three members of the Rotary Club will go to each of these places and act as judges. In case March 20 is a rainy day, the preliminaries will be postponed until Mar. 27. The judges for the final meet in Greenville will be men selected from different parts of the county. This meet coupled with the Literary Contests of the morning under the auspices of the Kiwanis Club always brings to Greenville more people than any other event of the year.

CAMPAIGN AGAINST SALE OF LIQUOR ON BROADWAY NOW ON

United States District Attorney, Buckner Appeals to Public to Aid Him in the Fight

New York, March 7.—United States District Attorney, Buckner, has appealed to the public to aid him in his campaign against the sale of liquor along Broadway in which the same way that District Attorney Branton, of New York, enlisted the public's aid in his movement to suppress salacious plays in Broadway Theatres. Mr. Buckner's drive is intended to padlock cabarets. Mr. Branton's appeal to the public resulted in the recruiting of 300 citizens to serve on play juries, which will pass on questionable productions. Mr. Buckner has appealed to the patronizing Broadway Cabarets, asking that every one witnessing a violation of prohibition laws send an affidavit to that effect to his office. In addition to aid of the public, Mr. Buckner is mapping out a new and closer co-operation of his offices with police and Federal Prohibition Agencies.

Work On Union Station Twin City Already Begun

Winston-Salem, March 7.—Actual construction on the new union passenger station for this city has begun. The concrete forms for the first story of the building are already in place and the concrete poured. Officials in charge of the work state that the work of construction will be rushed as much as possible.

Thompson Appeals to U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals

Chicago, March 7.—Appeal to the United States Circuit Court of Appeals was taken today by John W. Thompson, St. Louis and Chicago Contractor, who was found guilty with Colonel Charles R. Forbes, former head of the United States Veterans' Bureau, of conspiracy to defraud the government. Thompson was also prosecuting separate appeal to the United States Court on constitutional grounds.

GEORGIA RECALLS REQUISITION FOR NOTED SCULPTOR

Confederate Memorial Association Requests That Borglum Not Be Brought Back for Trial

Governor Clifford Walker, of Georgia, today telegraphed Georgia officials in Greensboro, N. C., to request withdrawal of all requisition papers, which he had issued to the Governor of North Carolina for the return to that State of Gutzon Borglum to answer indictments growing out of alleged destruction of working plans for the Stone Mountain Memorial, after the discharging of Borglum as directing sculptor.

The Governor's action was taken after the Stone Mountain Confederate Memorial Association, in response to the request from Mr. Walker, had withdrawn the association's application for extradition of Borglum to stand trial in Georgia.

The Executive Committee in acquiescing to the Governor's request, gave notice that the withdrawal of the application for extradition "does not in any way mean that there is the remotest probability of Borglum ever resuming work on this memorial," and further declaring that "any resumptive relations with Borglum would be fatal to the building of this memorial, and the committee breathes a sigh of relief that it is now largely rid of him." The Governor, in Georgia, in taking this action, issued the following statement: "I might say that I can not see any profit to Georgia in bringing Borglum would be fatal to the building I have requested that acquisition papers to the Governor of North (Continued on page 2)

HORTON MAY GET PARDON OFFICE

Forecast That Judge J. Lloyd Horton May Retire to Become Pardon Attorney

Raleigh, March 7.—Retirement of Judge J. Lloyd Horton from the Superior Court bench and his appointment as State Pardon Attorney by Governor Angus W. McLean was forecast here yesterday as among the possibilities that will develop within the next few days. Nothing has emanated from any official source to lead color to the rumor but during the day it gained strength enough to be taken seriously.

Close friends of Judge Horton have known for some time that he contemplated retirement from the bench during the year to resume the practice of law. He is understood to have discussed a partnership with two well known lawyers of Raleigh. Neither of these negotiations have yet developed a formal agreement thus far.

Judge Horton desires to leave the bench. In his five years' service he has held court in 50 counties and he has been compelled to be away from his family almost constantly. The impelling reasons that move him are a son eight years old and a daughter five years old. They are growing old and they are almost strangers to him. Judge Horton was 30 years old a month ago.

Governor McLean has made no announcement of his selection of the pardon attorney, but to friends with whom he has discussed the matter he has indicated that he desires a man with judicial experience, and a man with youth and strength enough to give full justice to the hundreds that the office will impose.

Simons to Serve Temporary Pres. of German Republic

Berlin, March 7.—The majority parties in the Reichstag have agreed to frame a measure appointing Dr. Walter Simons, President Interim of the German Republic. Dr. Simons is a former foreign minister, and now President of Supreme Court at Leipzig.

Issue Warrant in McClintock Case

Legislature Would Require Physical Examination Of Children Who Enter School

Raleigh, March 7.—A bill requiring that every child entering the public schools of North Carolina for the first time shall undergo a physical examination within six months of the time of such enrollment, introduced in the Senate by Senator Everett, and reported favorably by the committee on Education, is expected to come up for final disposition before the final adjournment of the General Assembly.

The bill is entitled "an act to provide more adequate care for the health of school children," provides that every parent, guardian, or other person having charge or control of a child shall cause such child to be physically examined by the county health officer, or in counties where there is no whole-time health officer, by medical examiner for school children who shall be designated by the county board of education.

According to the provisions of the bill, the scope and manner of such examination will be designated jointly by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction and the Secretary of the State Board of Health. A record of the examination will be kept and in case of a child who is examined and found to have a physical defect or impairment, the degree or extent of the defect or impairment will be designated and recorded on cards A, B, C or D defect.

In counties where full-time health officers are employed it will be the duty of the aforesaid officer to designate and publish the places and dates where and when the parents and guardians of children to be examined may bring such child for the examination prescribed. In counties

ACTION ON REQUEST FOR PARDON COMMISSION IS DEFERRED NEXT SESSION

PRESIDENT MAY APPOINT COMMISSION TO DEAL WITH MUSCLE SHOALS QUESTION

Washington, March 7.—President Coolidge is considering favorably the proposal to name a commission to investigate the Muscle Shoals, Alabama, property with a view to recommending means for its disposal to Congress next session.

Following the failure of Congress to enact the Underwood Muscle Shoals leasing bill this session, the House adopted a resolution requesting Mr. Coolidge to appoint a Commission. Those close to the chief executive believe that he soon will name a commission. Senator Underwood, Democrat of Alabama, today called on Mr. Coolidge and discussed the Muscle Shoals situation. He also favored the appointment of a Commission. The bill of Senator Underwood, which would have authorized the President to lease the property, failed to become law.

First of Governor's Measures to Be Withdrawn From Legislation; Bill to Tax Moving Pictures Sent to Senate

Raleigh, March 7.—After working under heavy pressure for several hours on important legislation, the House of Representatives today heard Speaker Pharr announce from the chair that the present status of legislation precluded the possibility of adjournment before Monday night, at the earliest.

After making his announcement, the Speaker, in response to a suggestion that he pull legislation for definite expressions as to who would be willing to remain over for the extra days without pay, said he preferred to leave it to the sense of duty to individual members. He inferred that much important legislation was on the calendar which should be considered by the body as a whole.

Meanwhile, numerous prominent Legislators, both in the Senate and House, were freely predicting that adjournment would be impossible before Tuesday night. The House today passed on final reading and sent to the Senate the bill to tax moving picture and theatre admissions for the benefit of the Confederate Veterans. The vote was 80 to 22.

Final action came on the measure only after Speaker Pharr had led a parliamentary fight for reconsideration, which was the first of its kind this session. The Speaker, who was absent from the chamber, when a viva voce third reading vote was taken, made the point that there had been no roll call, and that the measure was a roll call bill. He called for reconsideration of the vote, which was done. (Continued on page four).

LOCAL COMMANDERY KNIGHTS TEMPLAR SHOWING ACTIVITY

Annual Election of Officers One of Features Last Night's Conclave; Banquet Soon

At its regular conclave last night, Bethlehem Commandery, Knights Templar held its annual election of officers, completed arrangements for their installation in the near future and also arrangements for the conclave to be held next Thursday night at which time the Knights Templar degree in sublime form will be conferred upon ten candidates.

The new officers elected last night were R. Williams, Eminent Commander; F. J. Deiner, Generalissimo; H. S. Ragsdale, Captain General; J. H. Phelps, Senior Warden; C. F. Perkins, Junior Warden; F. W. The officers of Word Bearer, Standard Bearer, Warden and Sentinel are appointed and election will be made by the council of newly elected officers at an early date.

Installation of the new officers will take place at the last meeting of the body this month and Grand Officers of the state will be on hand for the ceremonies. Following the installation a banquet will be served for all Sir Knights and their ladies.

On next Thursday night the degree work will be conferred in sublime form with a special musical program and is to be a duplicate of the ceremonies conducted by the local commandery before the Grand Commandery in Raleigh last year. On Thursday work will begin at four o'clock in the afternoon followed by a recess from six until seven o'clock at which time work will be resumed.

Assurance has been received that many prominent visitors will be on hand to witness the work and no doubt as heretofore the local body will show up well in its manner of conducting the degree work.

Already Bethlehem Commandery has made a record before the Grand Commandery of the state of which it is justly proud having conducted the opening ceremonies of the grand body in Winston-Salem and conferred the Order of the Temple in Raleigh last year. This year an invitation to confer the degree of the Illustrious Order of the Red Cross before the Grand Body in Gastonia has been accepted and the degree team is now busily engaged in preparations for this occasion.

Kinston, March 7.—Ticket selling at a local theater was stayed temporarily when a large rat leaped through a round aperture in the glass front of the box office directly into the lap of the young woman selling tickets. The ticket seller fled, leaving money and tickets where they lay. The rat disappeared through the door left open by the young woman in her hasty pursuit.

Educator Assaulted By Two Young Men Dies From Injuries

Fatston, Ga., March 7.—William C. Wright, Putnam County School Superintendent, died this morning from injuries suffered Wednesday when he was assaulted by two young men, to whom he had given a "lift." Three men are held in jail in Atlanta, and are charged in connection with the assault on the educator, who for forty years was connected with the Georgia school system.

Peace Reservation Act Passed By House In Tokio

Tokio, March 7. The Peace Reservation Act, also known as the Anti-Bolshevik Law, provided for imprisonment for any and every form of communist activity, was passed by the House tonight, while a heavy police guard surrounded parliament.

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"THE WORST CONGRESS EVER"

In the adjournment of the Sixty-Eighth Congress, this week, the New York World sees it in the light of all other congresses, "The Worst Congress Ever," and in its comment has the following to say:

"How much has Congress changed?"

"Gen. Isaac R. Sherwood, eighty-nine years old and veteran of twenty-six Congresses, stood before the House of Representatives recently and harked back to the days when Congress had no parliamentary expert and no Rules Committee 'running to the White House,' days when the Union numbered thirty-seven States, when the Dakotas were still Territories and the four wives of the Mormon Delegate from Utah 'sat in the gallery as quiet and uncomplaining as four planted oysters in Lynnhaven Bay.' President Grant still drove a high-stepping team of trotters when Gen. Sherwood came to Washington for his first Congress. And that Congress, as he looks back on it, was generally regarded as the worst Congress ever.

The Congress which has just adjourned is always regarded as the worst Congress ever. It is regarded as the worst Congress ever because it is nearest in point of time to hopes which were entertained of what it might accomplish and irritation over its failure to live up to expectations. And the sharper the distinction between different sectional and economic interests the more certain each

Congress is to be regarded as a failure. It is worth nothing that what the Eastern banker regards as the worst sin of the last Congress—its failure to adopt the Mellon plan—is regarded as its one redeeming virtue by the Western farmer; and that the one fact in the record which the Eastern banker grudgingly approves—the refusal of Congress to have anything to do with McNary-Haugen plans to subsidize farm crops—is the very fact which the Western farmer finds most reprehensible.

The Congress which adjourned on Wednesday had an uneventful second session. It enacted into law the regular appropriation bills—one carrying its own salary increase in a rider. It enacted into law very little else. There was not a single major recommendation either on the President's program or on the farm bloc's program or on the business bloc's program upon which it took action. The Senate made a spectacle of itself in its attempts to legislate on Muscle Shoals; the House lent itself on one occasion to a jingo attack upon Japan. None of the railway legislation, farm legislation, tax legislation, bank legislation, passed. At the very end of the session the House had two belated second thoughts: by a vote of 301 to 28 it went on record as approving the World Court; by a vote of 173 to 3 it petitioned the President to appoint a commission of engineers to study Muscle Shoals. With its two wisest thoughts of the entire session written down as hasty postscripts, the House was through and ready to adjourn.

How does the public make up its mind what it will think of Congress? It begins first, with a profound indifference to the whole process by which Congressional candidates are chosen by both parties. It proceeds thereafter to make so many individual requests for laws that the docket of Congress is clogged with 18,000 measures. It next piles so many private jobbing duties on the shoulders of its delegates that they spend better than half their time on errands. It follows this with demands so sharply sectional as to lay Congress open to sectional criticism, whether it acts or doesn't act. And it winds up by agreeing that each Congress is undoubtedly the worst Congress ever.

Congress is inefficient, second-rate, verbose, pettifogging, slipshod, meddlesome. Granted. Whose is the responsibility?"

TRAFFIC CONGESTION SERIOUS HANDICAP ELECTRIC RAILWAYS

Washington. — A call to the 43,000,000 daily electric railway riders of the United States to rise up and demand traffic congestion relief was sounded recently by J. N. Shannahan, president of the American Electric Railway Association. Addressing his organization in convention here, he declared failure to limit and prohibit parking, and to restrict traffic to certain channels, was playing havoc with electric railway and bus schedules. Four-fifths of all persons who ride are patrons of electric railway company-owned cars or buses and practically all of them are being delayed by a small minority of riders in other vehicles, he insisted.

Mr. Shannahan explained that he was not seeking to array persons not owning motor cars against owners. Many car riders are motor owners who, beset by traffic congestion troubles, are using electric cars and buses. "Traffic congestion is unspeakable," he declared. "Despite the best efforts of local transportation companies to provide service, it is virtually impossible nowadays, by reason of traffic congestion, to maintain any respectable schedules in our city streets. The average running time of an electric car or bus should be from 10 to 12 miles an hour, and yet in some cities it is impossible, in the downtown sections, to move at a greater rate of speed than two miles an hour in any sort of vehicle.

"The majority does not rule in the case of traffic congestion. Oftentimes one person in a single vehicle will get in front of a car and delay 60 persons in it merely by occupying the track. Again, an unoccupied vehicle will be parked in such a position that it will stop or slow up a vehicle containing 60 persons.

"The traffic problem is not impossible of solution, though it admittedly is difficult. For example, there are two major steps which, if taken, would aid very much.

"First: Cease using the streets for storage. They were built to be used as passageways, and not as garages. Some people will, of course, resent not being permitted to store their cars all day long in the streets, but do not forget that when you offend one person by enforcing a no parking regulation, you please several hundred others whose ride has been accelerated by it.

"Second: Unscramble traffic. Establish regular lanes of travel for the separate lines of traffic and compel the different conveyances to stick to their lanes. Let the street car run unimpeded on its rails and make it a misdemeanor, as has been done in Cleveland and Philadelphia, for any vehicle to get in front of it. Give buses and passenger automobiles the right of way on certain streets or parts of streets. Set aside certain streets for trucks and other heavy vehicles. We do not so much need new streets as the complete use of those we have."

Mr. Shannahan announced also that in co-operation with Secretary Hoover's accident prevention movement, the electric railway industry is starting a nationwide advertising poster campaign. He said that accidents to passengers on cars were being reduced, but that accidents due to other vehicles striking electric cars and alighting passengers were increasing.

Farmers' Boys See the World

Berlin. — A group of farmers of Pomerania are planning an exchange of their sons with farmers' sons of equal age in other parts of Germany. The purpose is to give the boys a broader view of life, and an opportunity to observe and become familiar with agricultural methods other than those of their home districts.

Carolina be withdrawn, taking this act following a resolution passed by the Memorial Association Executive committee at a special meeting today.

Greensboro, March 7. — Gutzon Borglum, sculptor of the Stone Mountain Confederate Memorial, declared he was willing to return to Georgia to face felony charges, but that his counsel had advised him to fight extradition proceedings.

The sculptor arrived here this morning to confer with his attorneys, previously to appearing before Judge Shank, of Superior Court, tonight in connection with habeas corpus proceeding, which he instituted here last Saturday night, after being arrested on a Georgia fugitive warrant. Charges of malicious mischief were made against Borglum on February 25th by the Executive Commission of the Stone Mountain Monumental Association, after the artist was alleged to have destroyed several models used in constructing the monument. The fugitive warrant, on which he was arrested here, was based on these allegations. When informed that City Court Solicitor Charles W. Ramspect, of Decatur, Georgia, and Sheriff John A. McKardur, of the same city, were planning to have a new warrant charging malicious mischief, larceny of the House, and simple larceny, served on him in event of his release by Judge Shank tonight, Borglum laughingly remarked that he was prepared for such action. "They can do that if they want to," he said, "but it won't get any of us anywhere." We can turn right around and again institute new habeas corpus proceedings. I am ready for the fight of my life; ready for a fight to clear my name of defamation made by the executive committee.

and the final vote was by roll call. The purpose of the fight evidently was to get to the records, it was said, the stand of representatives on the measure. On roll call, Speaker Pharr cast a "nay" vote.

The House then passed, without discussion, the measure providing for the issuance of bonds for permanent improvements and institutions, carrying a bond issue of approximately \$4,000,000.

Action on Governor McLean's request for a Pardon Commission to take all executive functions of clemency was deferred until next session of the legislature, at the request of Representative Sutton, of Lenoir. Mr. Sutton explained that the Governor was willing for the measure to go over and wanted to try out for the next two years the Pardon Attorney already created to assist in such cases.

This was the first of the Governor's measures to be withdrawn from legislation.

The House then passed on final reading and sent to the Senate the bill to transfer to the Revenue Department from the Department of State, the entire supervision over the automobile license bureau. The legislature previously had passed the measure to transfer the Revenue Collecting Agency of the Bureau.

In the Senate the local and public local calendars were considered during the first hour, and at noon the body took up as a special order of business, the Appropriation bill, previously passed by the House.

Talk in the lobbies and in the chambers, this morning, was to the effect that adjournment would be impossible before Tuesday night, unless there was an agreement on outstanding measures on which the House and Senate hold conflicting views. The Senate having refused to concur in the conference report, each

which eliminated its amendment.

The House passed the Educational Investigation Commission bill, sponsored by the Governor, and then took to consideration the School Equalization Fund of \$1,500,000.

In the Senate, after the local calendar had been disposed of, the Appropriation bill came up as a special order, and verbal fire works were turned loose, such as have not been heard in the Senate in the present session. Senator Seawell, of Lee county, a staunch exponent of Educational aid for rural schools, sent forward an amendment to increase the General Education Fund from \$2,080,000 to \$2,630,000 and the School Equalization fund from \$1,500,000 to \$2,100,000. This brought on lengthy debate and the Senate, with its calendars crowded with important legislation at 2:45 o'clock was still considering these and other amendments to the Appropriation bill, with adjournment a dim prospect for the future.

Raleigh, March 6.—The bill introduced in the House of Representatives by Mr. Bailey, of Onslow county, requiring that each applicant for license to practice law in North Carolina be a graduate of a high school, or that he have literary attainments equivalent thereto, has been tabled in the House and will not come up again for consideration this session.

The amendment to the present statute, as offered in the bill and tabled in the House, follows:

"Each applicant shall present satisfactory evidence to the Supreme Court as a Board of Examiners that he is a graduate of a State or a public high school, or that his literary attainments are such that he has an academic education equal to such, as recognized by the Department of Education of the State of North Carolina."
