COL. ALBION DUNN WILL SUCCEED JUDGE HORTON SUPERIOR COURT BENCH

Dunn Appointed By Governor Following Horton's Resignation in Order to Enter Private Practice

Col. Albion Dunn, of this city and prominent member of the Pitt county bar, last night accepted appointment as judge of the Superior court to succeed Judge J. Lloyd Horton, of Farmville, who tendered his resignation yesterday in order to become a member of the law firm of Jones and Jones of Raleigh. Upon information that Judge Horton would present his resignation Governor McLean tendered the appointment to Mr. Dunn and in a conference with the governor late yesterday the decision to accept the appointment was reached.

"One of the ablest lawyers in the entire State," was the description of Judge Dunn by Governor McLean, who announced his appointment after a conference with Judge Dunn and former Judge H. W. Whedbee yesterday afternoon. Judge Dunn will hold his first court at Burgaw, Pender county, Monday, March 23.

Judge Dunn, while a native of Halifax county, has made his home in Greenville since 1910 and has enjoyed a large general law practice here. In 1915 he was elected Mayor of Greenville and during his two terms of office the town showed wonderful progress; most of the city paving work being done during that time. Mr. Dunn has been active in civic and social affairs of the city and enjoys a host of friends throughout the section. He is 41 years old, married Miss Irma Cobb, of this city. They have a son and a daughter.

Judge Horton, is only 30 years old now and is the youngest man ever to hold a position on the Superior court bench in North Carolina. He was elected for the unexpired term of Judge O. H. Guion in 1920 and was re-elected for a full term of eight years in 1922. He announced his resignation yesterday in Wilmington, where he is holding court.

Judge Horton will immediately begin the practice of law, having announced that he was resigning because of a desire to recoup his private fortunes, which he declared have been depleted by his four and a half years on the bench.

PARIS AGAIN ENDEAVORS TO SET WORLD STYLES

Paris.—A director touch in day costumes and Oriental influence with gorgeous embroideries in evening frocks, marked the opening of the spring season of the Paris dress-making establishments, now in full swing.

Long haired mannequins have virtually replaced the bobbed haired variety at the grand openings of the leading houses.

The lines are straight and skirts flare. The long V and dropped stomach effects are evident. Many of the models have the front cut in the long V, or the ornamentation is arranged with the V as the basis.

In the tiled costumes the colors incline to browns and the various shades of beige, in which kasha cloths are extensively employed.

Evening frocks and wraps run to Oriental styles, many of them having the wrapped around effect finished on one side, with a long tassel where a sleeve might have been. But sleeves, on the whole, appear to be in the majority and they are more or less fancy and curious in their cuts. Some are open at the elbow, and puffed at the wrist. When sleeves are absent, however, they disappear completely. Some evening dresses show deep armholes, and in many instances the bodies seem to be cut away under the arms.

MEMBERS OF PRISON BOARD APPOINTED BY GOV. McLEAN TODAY

Governor Appoints Four Members of the State Board of Agriculture and Six Members of Prison Board

Raleigh, March 10.—The six members of the newly constituted prison board, and four members of the State board of agriculture, were appointed by Governor McLean today. Notice of the appointment was immediately sent to the Senate. The four members of the Highway Commission have not yet been appointed, according to Governor McLean, but it was expected that they will be announced later in the day.

The members of the prison board, as named by Governor McLean, are: Richard Chatham, of Elkin; James A. Leake of Wadesboro; Arthur E. White, of Lumberton; John M. Brewer, of Wake Forest; Preston Wilson, of Warsaw, and Ben B. Everett, of Palmyra.

The members appointed to serve on the State Board of Agriculture are: Dr. Clarence Poe, re-appointed; Fred P. Latham, of Belhaven, re-appointed; Thomas J. Finch, of Wheatmore, to succeed Charles C. Wright, and Edward Grover Robertson, of Leicester, to succeed Mrs. Edith Vanderbilt.

Want Congress Organized to G. O. P. Can Carry Out Pledges

Washington, March 10.—President Coolidge fully supports the action of Senate Republicans in replacing insurgents in important committee places with regulars, and considers that the question at issue is one of making it possible for his party to govern the country.

The whole question, as the President sees it, was whether Congress was to be organized in such a fashion that the Republican party could carry out its campaign pledges.

The chairman of the important committee and a majority on each one, he believes, should go automatically to members of the dominant party, and there should be no objection to the exclusion of others from these responsibilities.

RECENT DISCOVERY MAY PROVE TO BE TOMB OF SENEFERU

Seneferu Regarded As One of the Founders of the Egyptian Empire, Reigned Thousands of Years Before Tut- Ankh-Amen

London, March 10.—Egyptologists here agree that if the tomb found by the Boston-Harvard Expedition, deep down in the rocks near the great pyramid at Giza, proved to be that of Pharaoh Seneferu, who immediately preceded the renowned pyramid builder, Cheops, its importance is far greater than that of Tut-ankh-amen, because it is some thousands of years older, and the contents may throw light upon that remote period about which very little is known. The Pharaoh Seneferu was the first king of the fourth dynasty about four thousand B. C., while Tut-ankh-amen reigned as late as the eighteenth dynasty, the history of which is fairly familiar. Moreover Tut-ankh-amen was relatively unimportant as king, while Seneferu was regarded as one of the founders of the Egyptian Empire, and a man of great enterprise and energy.

Sir Wallace Budge, who lately retired from the post as keeper in the British Museum, told the Daily Express that if the tomb proved to be that of Seneferu, and had not been plundered, it was almost certain to yield objects of great value.

The Cairo Dispatches yesterday, in telling of the discovery, said the sarcophagus was a large one of marble, with gold decorated columns, and was resting upon what seemed to be a plate, the seal of which was Seneferu.

Dr. Wilhelm Marks Was Re-elected to the Premiership Today

Berlin, March 10.—Dr. Wilhelm Marks, former German Chancellor, and last month chosen premier of Prussia, was re-elected to the premiership today, receiving 232 out of 443 votes cast in the diet. Dr. Marks resigned late last month after failing to retain a vote of confidence.

Nomination of Warren For Attorney-General Resumed Senate Today

Washington, March 10.—Despite all Charles B. Warren's nomination to be Attorney General was resumed today in the Senate.

Chairman Cummins, of the Judiciary Committee, defended the nominee against the charges that have been brought against him, while the burden of opposition was taken over by Senator Reid, Democrat of Missouri.

ROAD SENTENCES FEATURE MONDAY SESSION OF COURT

Several Defendants Also Fined While a Few Are Given Suspended Judgment

The following cases were disposed of in yesterday's session of county court:

Joe Lang, charged with having liquor in possession was adjudged guilty and fined \$100 and costs, and sentenced to one year in jail to be assigned to work on roads. Capias not to issue except on motion of solicitor.

Blany Sanders was adjudged guilty of assault with deadly weapon was fined \$100 and cost and ordered to pay John Green \$35 and sentenced to serve a term of 12 months in jail to be assigned to work on roads. Capias not to issue except on motion of solicitor.

Will Green, adjudged guilty of assault with deadly weapon and was sentenced to 90 days in jail to work on roads.

Will Green charged with driving car while intoxicated was found guilty was sentenced to 4 months in jail to work on roads.

Will Green charged with driving car without light or number, was adjudged guilty and sentenced to 30 days in jail to be assigned to work on roads. Sentence to run concurrent with sentence in previous case.

Willie Davis was found guilty of the charge of larceny and was sentenced to 4 months in jail to be assigned to work on roads.

Nathan Spivey was adjudged guilty of the charge of driving auto while intoxicated and was fined \$50 and costs.

John Green, Jr., charged with carrying concealed weapon was found guilty and fined \$50 and costs.

BULGARIA RANKS WELL IN MODERN SANITATION

Sofia.—A representative of the Rockefeller Foundation in Europe, Dr. Selskar Michael Gunn, before his departure from Sofia after his visit of inspection of sanitation in Bulgaria, arranged for the sending of six local physicians for a year's course of study and practice in American hospitals. These doctors are to be selected by competitive examination, and will leave next September.

Dr. Gunn pronounced himself highly pleased with the arrangements for sanitation in Bulgaria, which he pronounced superior to the achievements along the same lines in several European countries.

SPECIAL TERM OF COURT IN NEW BERN

Will Be Held Monday, March 30, to Try Two Capital Cases; Judge Lyon to Preside

Raleigh, March 10.—Governor Angus W. McLean today announced the calling of a special term of court at New Bern, Monday, March 30, to try two capital cases and several other cases, which have arisen during the last few days. Judge Charles C. Lyon will preside over the special term of court.

Rabi Charged With Annoying President Arrested Today

New York, March 10.—Rabi Edward Buck Matthew Browne, head of the American Jewish Seventy Elders, and Pastor of the Temple Zion, in the Bronx, was arrested today on a warrant, in which complainants, Calvin Coolidge, Mrs. Coolidge, and Frank Sterns, charged him with annoying the President. The Rabi is 73 years old. It is charged that Rabi Browne inflicted upon the complainants an avalanche of letters demanding that he be reimbursed for one half of \$25,000 he asserts the American Jewish Seventy Elders spent campaigning for Coolidge last fall.

Mrs. Hannah Chaplain Ordered to Leave This Country By March 26th

Washington, March 10.—Mrs. Hannah Chaplain, mother of Charlie Chaplain, the motion picture star, must leave this country by March 26, under a ruling made by immigration officials. Mrs. Chaplain came to this country from England a year ago to undergo medical treatment, and was inadmissible for admission under the immigration regulations. Officers have notified Chaplain that the permission, under which Mrs. Chaplain has been in this country, can not be renewed.

Says Many Sculptors Ready and Willing to Carry on Memorial

Atlanta, Ga., March 10.—That the Stone Mountain Confederate Monumental Association is making progress toward the employment of sculptors to carry on the memorial work, was declared in a statement issued today by President Hollins Natt Randolph. Many qualified sculptors "stand ready and willing" to do the work, Randolph said. "The Association will survey the whole field and make careful selection, and the public may rest assured that this memorial's future will be in safe, worthy, and competent hands," he said.

ROTARIANS HOLD ENJOYABLE MEET HERE LAST NIGHT

Judges for Preliminaries in County Track Meet Appointed At Last Night's Meeting

Final arrangements for the Pitt county track meet, reservations for the District Conference in Richmond, March 26-27, reception of new members and several short addresses featured last night's regular business meeting of the Greenville Rotary Club.

The evening meal was followed by the secretary's report and reports from various committees. D. L. Turnage, chairman of the "On to Richmond" committee reported that already two thirds of the members of the club had signified their intentions of attending the district conference and many expected to take their wives with them. He stated that arrangements had been made for special pullmans to carry the Greenville Rotarians and their wives to Richmond and that reservations for the entire party had been made at the Richmond Hotel.

J. H. Rose, chairman of the Boys' Work committee, reported that arrangements for the Pitt County Schools Track Meet to be held on Monday, April 6 had been completed. The preliminaries will be held throughout the county on Monday, March 20, weather permitting, and the chairman last night appointed Rotarians to act as judges at these group preliminaries.

The next order of business was the reception of newly elected members and D. L. Turnage presented to the club Ed. S. Williams, elected to membership under the classification of "Music." The address of instruction to the new member was made by J. H. Rose and proved helpful not only to him but to all Rotarians present as well.

C. S. Graves was then called upon for a short talk on "When and Why I Came to Greenville and Something About My Business." D. J. Whichard then made a short talk on Bermuda and the Bermuda Rotary Club bringing greetings from that club to the local Rotarians. Both these talks were full of interest for the Rotarians.

Representative From Virginia Refuses to Accept Increased Pay

Washington, March 10.—Representative Tucker, Democrat of Virginia, has refused to accept the \$2,500 increase in congressional salary on the ground that members of the last Congress, who were re-elected to next Congress, should not accept the increase as they were chosen to a position carrying \$7,500.

Mr. Tucker's grandfather, Judge Henry St. George Tucker, a Representative in the 14th Congress, refused an increase in salary for the same reason, and the money has remained to his credit in the treasury for 108 years.

Heavy Fighting In Kurdistan Today

Constantinople, March 10.—Heavy fighting has occurred in the vicinity of Diarbekir, in Kurdistan. It is reported that the Kurdish rebels have been repulsed by the Turkish Government troops with heavy losses to the insurgents.

Use Found for German Dock.

London.—A job has been found at last for the former German floating dock which has been berthed in the Mersey since being delivered under the peace treaty. The admiralty has decided to send it to Malta for service in docking the capital ships of the Mediterranean fleet.

Adjournment of General Assembly Expected Today; Anti-Flirting Measure Dies Amid Much Merriment

Raleigh, March 10.—The Senate today reconsidered the vote by which it passed on second reading yesterday the bill to increase the Confederate Veterans pensions by taxing theatre admissions, and after a bitter fight defeated the measure 26 to 18. This vote ended the attempt to increase the pensions for this session. Final action was taken, after Senate Burgwyn, of North Hampton, again had sent forward his amendment to substitute the tax on the admission with an ad-valorem tax of one cent per \$100 value of property. This amendment was defeated for the second time.

The chief argument against the bill today was that the Senate amendment of yesterday to exempt all theatre admissions under 50 cents practically nullified the purpose of the measure. It was stated that without the smaller admissions, the revenue proposal would not accrue \$25,000.

In the House, adjournment was brought a step nearer when the body adopted the report of the Conference Committee, which recommended concurrence in all of the Senate Amendments to the appropriation bill.

The body then began to mark time, and have some fun while it waited the pleasure of the Senate. Only one bill of serious import was considered, and this was eliminated as a possibility, when some one moved that it go over until tomorrow, thus giving up all hope of its passage. This bill would have limited the salary of the Secretary of the State Board of Health to \$6500.

Then the body took up the anti-flirting measure previously passed, and then the House called its outstanding batchelor author to defend their rights to flirt with College girls unmolested. Representative Wakefield, well over the half-century line, made a stirring speech in the defense of the right of single men but despite his oration, the measure was killed amid much merriment. The body then took up the measure to move the Capitol to Charlotte, and other measures of similar import.

One facetious Representative sent forward a motion to adjourn until March 15th and then to reconvene, so as to give the overworked Senate an opportunity to get itself together and handle the work before them. Adjournment is expected to be taken either during the afternoon or night session.

The Senate passed on final reading, a bill to restrict the use of the title "Certified Public Accountant," and this measure became a law. The body then considered the measure to establish an Agricultural Credit Corporation, and the motion was tabled.

SLAVEHOLDERS IN ARABIA MODIFY THEIR METHODS

Jerusalem.—The slave trade still flourishes in Arabia where a state of war exists between the Hashemite family, the former rulers of Mecca, and Sultan Ibn Saud, the Wahabi leader and contestant of the Hashemite's vested rights to Moslem's holiest city. One of Ibn Saud's first acts after attacking the Hedjaz was to free many slaves.

Conditions, however, differ considerably from the methods of former days. The slave markets have now been closed, and it is very rare to hear of a slave being offered for sale openly. But this does not prevent the existence of slaves in the service of the noble and wealthy, who still have the children of their slaves in their service. These were neither freed by their masters, nor did they ask their masters to free them, being content to live in the houses where they were born.

In the Yemen, it is said, the children of negroes may be offered for sale. The masters who have such slaves are free to do what they like with them; even if a slave is killed by his master the latter cannot be held responsible for the crime.

STATISTICS REVEAL HOW GERMANS FEEL ABOUT HARD LIQUOR

Brain. — The faces of hard liquor distillers at Halle grow long when one asks them how business is. They relate that during 1924 only 1,000,000 hectoliters (over 26,000,000 gallons) of distilled liquors were consumed. Before the war, they say, Germany used to be good for 4,000,000 hectoliters and more.

When statistics first began to be assembled on this question, around 1830, the annual consumption was about 1,200,000 to 1,500,000 hectoliters. From 1900 on the consumption was at least three times and usually four times what it was in 1924.

It does not necessarily follow from this that the use of alcoholic drinks in Germany has declined to one-fourth the pre-war consumption. It must be remembered that many farmers, for economic reasons, make their own liquor. Nevertheless, it is safe to say that hard liquor is no longer consumed in as large quantities as before 1914.

Drunk men have become such a menace and nuisance at some railway stations and on trains in Germany that railway officials have issued a general order to employes to remove all intoxicated men from railroad property and deny them the right to travel until they are sober. Employes are instructed to tell drunkards that they are denied the right to travel for their own safety, as well as for the protection of the public.

Prof. Reimberger, rector of Bonn University, made the opening address at the conference recently held in Bonn by organizations fighting alcohol. He said that half of Germany's almshouses and prisons would be superfluous if it were not for the crimes committed under liquor, and said he was in favor of treating drunkards in special institutions, as well as preventing them from getting liquor.

On the occasion of the fifth anniversary of American prohibition, the newspaper Vorwaerts gave a long review of the statistics concerning the temperance movement in the United States and said in conclusion: "The working classes of all countries, and particularly of poverty-stricken Germany, have good reason to support the anti-alcohol movement and hasten the coming of a prohibition law."

A despatch received here from Vienna says that local restaurants and bars will be closed to habitual drunkards, if a bill now pending in the Austrian diet is enacted. The measure stipulates that two convictions for drunkenness will bar tipplers from all places where drinks are sold for a period of one year. It will be against the law for anyone to sell alcohol to such persons, a list of whom will be posted at the entrance to every establishment which sells liquor.

LEIPSI'S FREE HAND GIRLS PREFER DOLES GIVES FAT HARVEST GREATER LIBERTY TO BEGGAR SOF CITY TO DOMESTIC SERVICE

Leipzig. — It seemingly pays to beg in Leipzig. The municipal welfare office of this city has unearthed facts as to the profits of the begging profession that would seem fanciful were they not borne out by first-hand testimony.

One blind woman, for instance, managed to scrape together 1,000 marks, about \$250 a week. Daily earnings of \$15 to \$25 a day are not at all unusual with men and women beggars of experience. Two brothers who were offered jobs energetically declined them, saying they were making much more money with their concert. These concerts consisted in singing before the houses of the middle class and following the performance with a sad story ending in a plea for alms. One of the brothers, it developed, spent his Sundays driving a motor-cycle with his fiancée.

In another instance a beggar offered the owner of a certain clever dog \$100 for the loan of the canine during begging hours because, he said, the animal would help his business. Another beggar engaged two cripples to beg for him. He paid them a regular salary, but claimed the entire earnings. In still another case a beggar who pretended he was a disabled veteran paid two watchers twenty-five cents an hour each to warn him when ever a policeman appeared.

Investigation further developed that one of the most lucrative forms of begging was that of exhibiting children by way of winning public sympathy. It was discovered that there exists a school in Leipzig at which children are taught by experienced beggars what to say and what sort of doleful face to put on. Children thus trained are then hired out to professional beggars, who in return hand over a share of the proceeds to the director of the school.

"There never will be enough natural diamonds to satisfy the demands," the speaker added. "Even if that mysterious syndicate of which we hear so much fulfilled its threat and flooded the market today with \$100,000,000 worth of diamonds, no lasting harm would be done. They would be bought up in ten minutes; the trade would suffer a temporary depression and the demand in a short time would be as keen as ever."

Rules Germany

Pending the coming Presidential elections, Dr. Walter Simons, famous German politician, has been selected by the Reichstag as President ad interim of the German Republic, to permit Dr. Hans Luther to resume his work as Chancellor. Dr. Simons is president of the Supreme Court at Leipzig.

HIGH COST OF BRITISH COAL INJURES STEEL TRADE SAYS OFFICIAL

Leeds.—British steel manufacturers have found difficulty in selling steel in their own territory, India, because they have been outbid by the Germans and Belgians, it was announced here by A. M. Samuel, parliamentary secretary to the Department for Overseas Trade, addressing the Leeds Chamber of Commerce.

The "situation which brought this about," said Mr. Samuel, was the high price of coal. The price of steel, which was largely dependent on the price of coal, was so high today that it paid to import steel from abroad. Two or three shillings per ton of the price of coal, he suggested, would make all the difference to the prosperity of British trade, and the existing high price of coal was doing harm which extended much farther than to the 100,000 men who were out of work in the coal fields.

Mr. Samuel, however, was quite optimistic as to the future for British trade generally. With the exception of coal, steel and shipping, he believed that the clouds of trade were breaking, and that there would be a reawakening of prosperity for all, and particularly the workingman. With about 1,250,000 men unemployed there was much misery, but through the whole policy of existing government ran the motive of getting the people back to work. He could see in trade today a greater spirit of confidence.

In 1923, the people of Our Country destroyed by fire \$535,372,782 worth of property. This almost unbelievable loss is over twice that of 1913 and nearly three times as large as the loss of 1902.

The matches and smoking is ascribed the largest part of the loss, \$29,045,007. Second comes defective chimneys and flues which caused a loss of \$20,828,162. Then comes stoves, furnaces, boilers and their pipes, with \$18,658,248; spontaneous combustion, with \$16,110,945; sparks on roofs, with \$15,931,342 and electricity, with \$14,091,789.

If this aggregate fire loss in 1923 is to be any less it must be accomplished by individual effort. If the loss continues to mount by 1933, this, also, will have been accomplished by individual effort, it might better be said, lack of effort. Which way will the balance swing?

MOSCOW UNDECIDED HOW BEST TO CURB MARIA SPIRIDONOVA

Riga. — Maria Spiridonova, probably the most famous of all Russian woman revolutionists, is on a hunger strike in a Moscow prison and it is reported that the Bolshevik officials are about to deport her to Turkey.

Emma Goldman and other radicals have been exerting every effort to have Spiridonova released from Russia, that she might recruit her broken health in Germany. But Moscow officials are apparently afraid to let her leave Russian soil. She is the idol of the peasants, and is believed by them to have a charmed life.

As a young girl Spiridonova bombed a Russian provincial governor who was notorious for his brutal treatment of the peasantry. She suffered every indignity at the hands of czarist officers and was sentenced to death. But this young school teacher who had made such a battle against the inhuman treatment of the peasantry was too well known to be executed, and was banished instead to Siberia.

The 1917 revolution brought her back to Petrograd, and although she was not a Bolshevik, she induced the social revolutionists of the left to cooperate with the Lenin forces, and became a powerful factor in the congress of soldiers, sailors and workers which brought the Bolshevik government into existence and hastened the end of the Kerensky regime.

But Spiridonova was opposed to the Brest-Litovsk Treaty. She battled against the shipments of grain and cloth from starving Russia to Germany, and opposed Lenin's efforts to arraign the penniless peasants against the thrifty peasants who had managed to buy a few sheep and cows. In the All-Russian Soviet Congress in July, 1918, Spiridonova openly defied the German ambassador.

After that, who was subsequently murdered.

Since that time Spiridonova has never been a free woman. For a time she was in a sanatorium and the Bolshevik authorities declared she was mentally irresponsible. Later she has been in various prisons and under guard in villages near Moscow. But at all times she has realized her steps were dogged by the secret police and she has more than once appealed to the officials to throw her back in jail. She said she preferred actual confinement to life under constant espionage.

Emma Goldman and other liberals who have seen Spiridonova frequently in Russia scout all suggestions that her mind is affected.

English Court Features Sevens. Selby, Eng.—There was a sequence of sevens at one of the courts here recently. Seven magistrates sat on the bench; seven cases relating to the lighting of motor vehicles came before them; seven policemen gave evidence; seven letters were read admitting the offences; seven defendants were fined ten shillings each, and seven minutes were required to dispose of the cases.

Bob Invades Bering Sea. Seattle. — On St. Lawrence Island, American territory in the Bering Sea, the Eskimo girls are cutting off their pigtails. The news that the bob's the thing has been carried there, relates Jonathan Wagner of this city, chief of the Alaska Division of the United States Bureau of Education, by a radio receiving set of wide range which the division installed on the island.
