CANADA WILL NOT
ADHERE TO LEAGUE
NATIONS PROTOCOL

Council Adopts Propo-
sal to Refer Considera-
tion of Security Proto-
col to Next Assembly

Geneva, March 13.—The debate at the League of Nations council on the Security Protocol deliberated at the last assembly ended this morning by the adoption of a proposition by Dr. Benes, the Czecho-Slovakian Foreign Minister, to refer to the next assembly the declaration regarding the Protocol made by British Foreign Secretary Chamberlain, and other members together with any further declarations received from governments of the League.

Canada has notified the League of Nations that she cannot adhere to the League's Security Protocol, but is prepared to consider acceptance of compulsory jurisdiction by the World's Court of Justice, with certain reservations, and is willing to participate in any general conference for reduction of armaments, which does not involve prior acceptance of the Protocol.

Among the grounds for this conclusion, is consideration of the effect of the non participation of the United States upon attempts to enforce penalties, and particularly so in cases of contiguous countries like Canada.

Geneva, March 13.—The war, Dr. Benes declared, had put states in opposition to one another, and created new problems of great complexity. The world, he declared, desires to fight out measures which forced to settle disputes, and this was true, especially for the smaller nations, which desired to live in peace and security. That is why arbitration was put in the Protocol.

To Trade Exposition

Washington, March 13.—President Coolidge has filed a proclamation, inviting foreign governments to participate in the International Trade Exposition to be held in New Orleans on September 15th, next.

Tribesmen Fire on
British Cable Ship

Gibraltar, March 13.—Rif tribesmen today fired on the British ship, Amber, engaged in laying cables for the Eastern Telegraph Company just off the African coast. The tribesmen disregarded the hoisting of the British flag, but the Amber was not damaged. The Spanish Gun Boat, Bonifaz, later intervened, opening fire on the shore.

McKellar to Oppose
Isle Pines Treaty

Washington, March 13.—At the inaugural three hour debate agreed upon by the Senate before ratification of the Isle of Pines Treaty is voted here today at 3 o'clock, Senator McKellar, Democrat of Tennessee, stated that he regretted that the United States had any claim to more territory in the Caribbean, but that in as much as the Treaty of Paris conveyed title of the Isle of Pines to the United States, he would not vote for ratification of the pact, unless the Senate adopted his resolution, which would give American citizens there, practically all of the rights they had under the American constitution.

TRIBES OF BORNEO BURY
HATCHET IN OLD CEMETERY

The Hague.—Dutch officials, give interesting details of a peace ceremony between the different Dyak tribes of that island. These clans have been constantly fighting each other for years, and have the reputation of being ferocious and bloodthirsty headhunters.

Some 1,600 Dyaks came to the gathering. There were present also a few Dutch and British officers, who witnessed curious war dances, songs and prayers by medicine men. Finally the head priest killed a pig by a slow method and sprinkled its blood over the multitude, pronouncing a terrible curse upon anyone who should presume to revive the inter-tribal quarrels.

BORGLUM MAY AGAIN
TAKE UP HIS WORK
ON STONE MOUNTAIN

Deposed Sculptor Ar-
rives in Raleigh for
Conference Today
With Georgia Repre-
sentatives

Raleigh, March 13.—Gutzon Borglum, formerly sculptor for the Stone Mountain Confederate Memorial, this afternoon stated that during the day he had held a conference with several men from Atlanta, relative to resuming charge of the work at Stone Mountain.

The sculptor declined to name those with whom he conferred, nor would he make any statements as to the result of the conference.

A group of news paper men, who had been on the sculptor's trail all day, were unable to say when the conference was held, or who was present. Efforts to locate parties from Atlanta, who might have business with Mr. Borglum were unsuccessful.

Raleigh, March 13.—Gutzon Borglum, formerly sculptor of the Stone Mountain Confederate Memorial, arrived here shortly before 11 o'clock this morning, and prepared for a conference this afternoon with representatives from Atlanta relative to resuming work on the memorial.

The sculptor declined to name those with whom he expected to confer. He stated, however, that he had not yet seen the men from the Georgia city, but he understood they would arrive shortly after noon. He added that he did not have anything to say until after the conference.

FAMOUS EATER OF LONDON
COUNT NINETY-TWO YEARS

London.—Francis Bourne is a candidate for the Hall of Fame, for he just completed a run of 72 annual helpings of the famous but heavy meat puddings, the product of the "Old Cheshire Cheese" of Fleet Street. The pudding is served free at the hostelry to all customers at the opening of the season each year. Mr. Bourne is 92 years old and still healthy. He has been a constant customer at the Cheshire Cheese, he says, since 1851.

The inaugural ceremony is usually presided over by some noted figure, such as the premier, a cabinet minister or an ambassador, and a place of honor is always reserved for the person who can claim to be the oldest customer of the inn. Mr. Bourne has received the first helping in this best of honor for the last years and has had his pudding served by the late American Ambassador, Walter Hines Page, and Ambassadors Davis and George Harvey.

The famous pudding is known to contain rump steak, kidney, lark and oysters.

TWENTY-EIGHT DIE
FROM INFLUENZA IN
THIRTEEN HOURS

Despite Number Deaths
Chicago Health Au-
thorities Say There Is
No Epidemic

Chicago, March 13.—Although 28 deaths occurred in 13 hours, ending at 9:30 o'clock last night, and 78 new cases were reported, Dr. Hermann N. Banderson, city health commissioner, declared today that there is no real epidemic of influenza, and respiratory diseases here.

The normal number of deaths would be 13, and new cases would be 40 a day for this time of the year, health authorities said, warning that public carelessness would cause the spreading of diseases.

City laboratories are furnishing free, rapid diagnosis, pneumonia antigen, serum used as a preventive.

The deaths yesterday, brought the total due to influenza and pneumonia since March 1 to 279.

PLAYFUL ELEPHANTS DELAY
TRAVELLERS IN SUMATRA

The Hague, Holland.—Further reports recorded here concerning the mysterious deserted city in the Upper Langkat region of Sumatra state huge quantities of elephants' bones have been found there. This gives rise to the belief that here may be one of the hidden places to which elephants retire when they feel death approaching. African and Indian elephant hunters agree that sick elephants withdraw from their herds to some remote spot only known to themelves to die alone.

Elephants seem to be on the increase in Aceh, the Eumatra Post observes in this connection. A light railway train which runs along the edge of the jungle was held up the other day by a herd of 40 big tuskers which leisurely amused themselves by pulling up all the fencing and boundary posts in right before they deigned to move on.

REV. V. P. SCOVILLE
LAID TO REST HERE
LATE YESTERDAY

Funeral Services Con-
ducted in Jarvis Mem-
orial Methodist Church of Which He
Was Pastor

Funeral services for Reverend V. P. Scoville, who died of pneumonia Tuesday night, were held yesterday afternoon in the Jarvis Memorial Methodist Church, of which he was pastor, and interment followed in Cherry Hill Cemetery.

In compliance with former requests of the deceased the funeral services were conducted by Reverend John Wright, of Carthage, assisted by Mr. John G. Clark, of this city, who in turn were assisted by the Presiding Elder, Rev. S. A. Cotton, representatives of the local Methodist Association and visiting ministers.

The scripture lesson by Rev. John Wright was followed by a prayer by Rev. J. H. Stone and another scripture lesson by Presiding Elder S. A. Cotton. Following the second scripture lesson there were remarks by Mr. J. G. Clark, of the Methodist Association; Rev. W. S. Hadden, of the Methodist Association; Rev. John Wright and Rev. John Eason. Each of these in their remarks of praise set forth a glowing tribute to the life of the follower of the cross and his untiring efforts in behalf of his fellowmen. SIX CANDIDATES
SEEK PRESIDENCY
OF GERMAN EMPIRE

With Large Number of
Observers See Little
Hope for Majority in
Election

Berlin, March 13.—With five candidates for the German Presidency already, and some probability that the National Socialist may nominate a sixth candidate, it seems almost certain that the election of March 29, to choose a successor to the late President Ebert, will fail to develop a majority of all the vote cast for any one candidate.

It is generally considered that the election on March 29 will be a test of strength between the right and left groups.

Oppose Marriage
of Children

New York, March 13.—After investigating the problem of child marriage, the Russell Sage Foundation, in a report made public today says that it fully dispels the idea that there is something idyllic about such youthful unions.

The investigators' conclusions are opposed to child marriage at too young an age, because of physical and mental maturity not being completed, or because of cases of girl children's marriage to older men as either may know the meaning of genuine comradeship.

The foundation report declared that there are 100,000 persons in the United States who were married under 16 years of age. This percentage of marriages of girls from 15 to 19 years old is the lowest in New York City and New England. Along the Pacific Coast and in the Mountain states there are twice as many as in New England, and in the Central states there are three times as many.

According to Egyptologists, Dr. George A. Reisner, professor of Egyptology at Harvard University and director of the Harvard-Boston Museum Egyptian Expedition, has unearthed an ancient tomb near the Giza pyramids that will prove richer, both in lore and treasure, than that of King Tut Ankh Amen. It is 1,700 years older than that of Tut Ankh-Amen, and may be that of King Seneferu or some member of his royal family.

STATE TO RESTORE
THE CANOVA STATUE

It was stated on the floor of the house that the work could be done at a cost of less than \$5,000. R. O. Everett said that he would help to supplement the \$5,000 asked of the state and that the governor had authorized him to say he would contribute. However, the house killed the bill.

Berlin.—An effective method of getting rid of professional beggars has been devised by the Berlin Welfare Club. It has issued books of coupons in denominations of five and ten pfennigs, which Berlin families can purchase with a view to handing these meal checks to beggars.

The beggars take them to the municipal district welfare office of the district, whereupon he is given a free meal. At the same time his case is looked into by district welfare workers. CHARLES B. WARREN
IS AGAIN REJECTED
AS ATTY. GENERAL

Senate Judiciary Com-
mittee Orders Ad-
verse Report on Nom-
ination by a Vote of
Nine to Seven

Washington, March 13.—An adverse report on the nomination of Charles B. Warren to be Attorney General was ordered today by the Senate Judiciary Committee. The vote was nine to seven. Twice previously the nomination had commanded a majority in the same committee. Although the Democrats, and Senators Borah, of Idaho, and Norris, of Nebraska, Republicans, voted today against a favorable report.

The vote of Senator Borah was cast by proxy. The Idaho Senator being at the time at the White House, where he had been summoned by President Coolidge. Despite the President's decision to call from all the Republican opponents their confirmation in the conference, and make a personal appeal to them, many of the party regulars saw little hope of favorable action on the nomination, which has once been rejected. Borah told Mr. Coolidge here, frankly, that he did not see any chance of confirmation.

Among those voting against a favorable report today was Senator Overman of North Carolina. Senator Overman previously had voted for confirmation, both in the Committee and in the Senate.

The constitutional right of the President to re-submit the nomination was questioned by Senators Reed and Walsh and most of the Democrats. Reed and Walsh, in their speeches, charged that the President had a right to submit a nomination without legislative and right to authority to submit to the Senate a nomination for public office twice in the same year, which is once rejected by the Senate.

The right of the Senate, as well as the fundamental principles of constitutional law, would be completely destroyed by the President's action in re-submitting a nomination which has been rejected by the Senate.

It is not inconsistent with the dignity of the Senate to entertain a reconsideration of a nomination.

Congress Cuts Year's
Budget \$11,000,000

Washington, March 13.—A report that Congress is doing its bit in curbing the government's extravagant program, Chairman Madden, of the House Appropriation committee, today informed President Coolidge that appropriations authorized for the coming fiscal year were \$11,000,000 under the Budget estimate.

BRITISH ARMY SEES VALUE
OF WELL COOKED RATIONS

London.—The British army has never been better fed than it is today, says a war office official. Cooks are specially trained and their work will easily challenge comparison with that of West End chefs.

So sure are the authorities of this fact that Britain's new way of feeding its fighters will be demonstrated at a cookery and food exhibition in London next month. Cooks from the three service branches, army, navy and air force, will be there.

The excellence of the army cooks' culinary efforts is due largely to a new book issued by the army council, which gives full instructions as to baking, steaming, braising and frying, as well as recipes and hints on cooking.

STATE MUSEUM ADDS TO EXHIBITS BUT LACKS ADEQUATE BUILDING

Seattle. — A state museum, whose number of specimens increases at the rate of 1,050 yearly, but which has been closed to the public more than a year due to lack of funds to erect a modern building, is owned by the state of Washington. The museum is on the University of Washington campus here in a structure that formed a part of the Alaska-Pacific Yukon Exposition of \$1909.

In the last two years 2,100 specimens in 133 collections have brought the total number of specimens to 105,000. They are valued at \$215,000 and illustrate the entire historical growth of the Pacific Northwest. The public has been excluded from viewing the exhibits until they are in a new building.

THE GAS CONSUMPTION INDICATES ENGLISH CITIES' COOKING HOURS

London.—The hot Sunday mid-

day dinner is still a fetish among the majority of English people, says a report on gas consumption, which in England is at its maximum between 11 o'clock in the morning and 1 p. m. on Sunday.

Close observers of gas consumption say that the hours of cooking vary in different towns. Brighton, for instance, spends more time on the seafront and pier and goes on cooking until nearly 3 p. m. Nottingham in lines to the Continental style and uses more gas for cooking in the evening. Scotland, with stricter observance of the Sabbath, does most of its cooking for Sunday on the previous day.

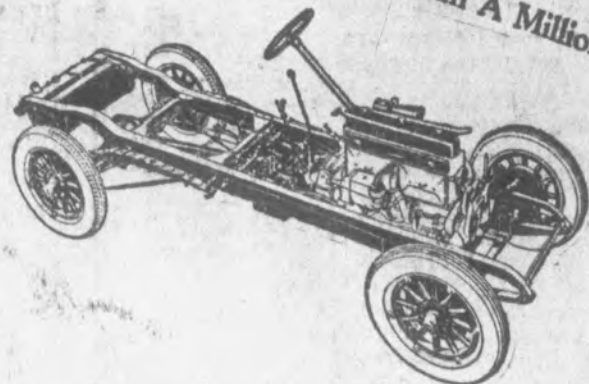

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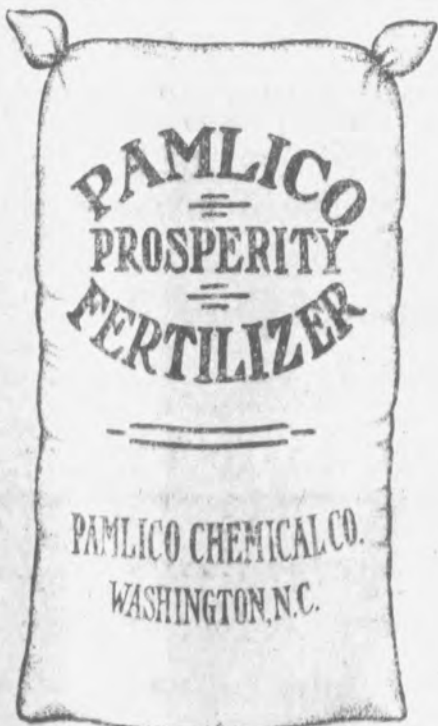

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AN EXPERT WITNESS

In a letter to National Commander Drain, General Frank T. Hines, Director of the United States Veterans Bureau, clearly and completely explains the necessity for The American Legion's \$5,000,000 Endowment Fund now being raised by popular contributions throughout the country.

As head of the Government's vast program of extending relief and assistance to disabled service men, Director Hines is able to judge better than any other man in the country the importance of the work The American Legion is doing to make the Government's program effective. Director Hines, by reason of his official position and his knowledge of conditions among the families of many deceased or helplessly disabled service men, is also best qualified to pass judgment on The American Legion's work for the needy and orphaned children of service men. Therefore, when Director Hines expresses without reservations his indorsement of the purposes for which the Legion is raising its \$5,000,000 Endowment Fund, he gives to the Legion a recommendation and a testimonial which is bound to be accepted by every American who is financially able to help the Legion raise its funds.

Mr. Hines renders to the Legion and to the public alike a valuable service at this time by pointing out the limitations which the Government must observe in its dealings with the disabled men and the dependents of deceased veterans. The Government can do so much and no more and beyond the point of what the Government can do, the burden is shouldered by The American Legion.

Director Hines rightfully believes that the purpose of extending help to the orphaned and needy dependents of service men has an even greater appeal than the purpose of giving help to the disabled man, since, as he says, "the Government through the appropriation of a program Congress has attempted

to fulfill every possible need for the disabled man."

But there are needs of the disabled men—emergency needs, in many cases—which are beyond the power of Congress to anticipate or provide for. It is such needs which the Legion's National Rehabilitation Committee, the fourteen district rehabilitation committees and the service and welfare officers of the Legion's 11,000 posts are caring for. And Director Hines adds that "it is a well-known fact that many detailed types of assistance fall into the hands of local Legion posts for fulfillment, and it has been further disclosed that funds for the carrying out of specific emergencies have been noticeably deficient."

Legionnaires who are closest to the problems arising out of governmental assistance to the disabled man frequently encounter business men, uninformed concerning the need and magnitude of the Government's effort, who believe that the Government has already done all it can do and that present problems are insignificant. Director Hines clears up this information, therefore, when he says:

It is true that millions of dollars have been appropriated for rehabilitation and hospitalization, and these expenditures will continue in decreasing number as the work nears completion, but the continuing liability remains in the instance of the mentally disabled and of the minor dependents of the veterans of the World War.

Mr. Hines could have cited many statistics showing that the number of service men developing mental and nervous ailments at this time, seven years after the ending of the war, is in an increasing ratio. Minds and nerves impaired by battle or hardships or anxiety have been subjected to seven years of pressure in the battle of everyday life, and each year the peace casualties proceeding from war weaknesses become more numerous. The Legion is in a position to help these men before their disabilities come to the attention of the Government. In scores of cases the Legion must, in the role of best friend, champion the claim of the man with wrecked mind or nerves, who cannot logically prepare the evidence and proof which the Government requires before granting him relief.

The Veterans Bureau will give the Legion notable assistance in its work for the children, Director Hines promises, and his letter summarizes existing conditions as follows:

From a survey of disclosures obtained through the intensive study of records in the guardianship sub-division recently organized in the Bureau, circumstances affecting the children of veterans are not in many instances what the public or the Bureau would desire them to be. The initiative taken by the Legion in launching a campaign for \$5,000,000

is to be commended and ought to meet with the endorsement of all public-spirited citizens, as in the securing of these funds each veteran of the World War feels his personal obligation to the children of his less-fortunate comrades. Up to this time the legislation providing in general for beneficiaries of the Bureau is not imminent in the instance of minors denied the rights of childhood

and the privileges of training conducive to economic independence.

The citizen who is anxious to do what he can to help the disabled service man and the orphans of those who gave everything for their country naturally wishes to be assured that his contribution to the Legion's \$5,000,000 Endowment Fund will be used for a necessary cause. He may take Director Hines's word that it will be. — American Legion Weekly.
