HOKE RESIGNS AS CHIEF JUSTICE OF SUPREME COURT NORTH CAROLINA

Governor Accepts Resignation and Elevates Associate Justice Stacy Position Chief Justice

Raleigh, March 16.—Chief Justice William A. Hoke, of the Supreme Court, resigned today and Governor McLean appointed Associate Justice William P. Stacy to be Chief Justice.

At the same time Governor McLean appointed L. Robert Varner, of Lumberton, to be Associate Justice succeeding Justice Stacy.

Sketch of Stacy.
Walter Parker Stacy the new chief justice was born at Ansonville, N. C., December, 1884 the son of the Reverend L. E. and Rosa (Jonson) Stacy. He was graduated at Weaverville College in 1908, the Morven High School in 1902 and in 1903 received the bachelor of arts degree from the University of North Carolina. For the next year he attended the law school of the University and was licensed shortly thereafter to practice law in the state.

In 1915 he was elected to North Carolina General Assembly from New Hanover county, he having established himself in the attorney's profession at Wilmington. The following year he was elected to the Superior Court, bench of the Eighth Judicial Circuit and served in that position until 1920.

The following year he was elected to fill a vacancy on the supreme court and thus the youngest member of the highest court in the state, he being but 38.

During the summer of 1922 and 1923 the Associate Justice was invited to lecture at the Summer Law School of the University of North Carolina and attracted much attention to himself by reason of his thorough knowledge of his subjects and the breadth of mind which he displayed. In 1923 the University awarded the jurist the degree of doctor of laws.

The late justice owed his rapid advancement in legal circles to his attractive personality and thorough knowledge of the law. Recognized as one of the ablest of judges on the Superior Court Bench, he soon attained the same reputation after being elevated to the Supreme Court.

Assembly Protects Capitol Squirrels

Raleigh, March 16.—Although they were not included in the general appropriations bill or put on a budgetary basis, the squirrels in the capitol square at Raleigh came in for their share of legislation during the 1925 session of the general assembly. There was a law passed forbidding the running at large of unmuzzled and unattended dogs on the capitol square. In times past many of these squirrels have been killed by free lance dogs.

Although there has never been a census of the squirrels taken, they are very numerous and multiply very rapidly in the capitol square. Squirrel houses have been built and placed in the capitol square. Squirrel houses have been built and placed in many of the oak trees there. Until the trees were treated several years ago by experts who filled up the hollows, these hollows formed the homes of many of the squirrels.

These little animals are kept supplied with peanuts and other "dainties" by persons passing through the square. They make frequent trips to pecan trees throughout the city during the fall season and lay up a supply of nuts for the winter months.

Raleigh, March 16.—Miss Lucile C. Knoffel, of Black Mountain, N. C., has been adjudged the winner of the \$100 offered by the Travelers' Protective Association for the best essay on "Safety on the Public Highway." Thirty-five essays were submitted. The contest was open to high school students throughout North Carolina.

Ben Dixon McNeill, Miss Mattie Berry and J. E. Westerspoon were the judges making the award.

Conference Would Be Welcome if Founded Upon Understanding Between Kellogg and Chamberlain

London, March 16.—The British Government has not yet been informed by the Washington authorities, nor by Sir George Howard, British Ambassador, of the latest suggestions from the White House for a disarmament conference. It has been expected in official circles here, however, that concrete proposals would be forth coming when Frank K. Kellogg, assumed office as Secretary of State, as a result of the conference, which Mr. Kellogg had with Austin Chamberlain, the Foreign Secretary before the retiring Ambassador left London.

A new proposal, if founded on this unwritten understanding between Secretary Kellogg and Mr. Chamberlain, will be welcomed by British authorities.

Award Contracts for New Type of Aircraft

Washington, March 16.—Contracts totaling more than \$1,000,000 for new types of aircraft development by Curtis Company, of New York, and the Douglas Company, of California, were awarded by the Army Service today, it was announced.

The new machines of observation type, which have been approved by the Army Aircraft Service as replacements for the war built type, known as "D. H.s." and an award of \$70,000 was given the Curtis Company for development of the new machine and the Douglas Company received an award of \$60,000 for similar work on its production. Awards were made on the basis of tests at the McCook Field, Dayton, Ohio.

Dunlap Named for Agriculture Post

Washington, March 16.—Renick W. Dunlap, of Kingston, Ohio, was named today by President Coolidge to be Assistant Secretary of Agriculture.

MORE REDUCTION IN INCOME TAXES IS SEEN BY GREEN

Forecasts Possibility of \$300,000,000 Cut in 1926 With Treasury Surplus of \$373,000,000

Washington, March 16.—The income tax penalty falls at the stroke of midnight on the heads of all who have not by then filed returns for 1924. The calendar has done its part this year, however, in providing against operation of the clause by supplying an extra day's grace for filing returns, as March 15th, the final day fixed by law, fell on Sunday.

Treasury officials, meanwhile, were speeding operations today to undertake an immediate analysis on the basis of returns of the results under the new Revenue law with its reduced tax rates.

With sharp reduction in the total income due from the majority of tax payers made certain by the new two percent rate of small incomes and one-fourth reduction in net tax allowed on earned incomes of \$10,000 and below. Treasury officials are uncertain in their speculations as to how far this might be offset by increased returns from higher brackets. It was not believed, however, that the reduction in higher brackets has been in effect long enough to show full increase in returns from this source, which they believe eventually will result from stimulation of business. Cheer for the dark hours today, is held out in a statement by Chairman Greene of the House Ways and Means Committee, in which he seen a "favorable" outlook for a reduction of \$200,000,000 in the nation's taxes for the fiscal year 1926. With an estimated Treasury surplus of \$373,000,000 for that year, Mr. Greene, said he saw "nothing to prevent" reducing the maximum surtax to 25 percent, and a general lowering of all other income rates. It was his intention, he said, to have Congress pass a new law in time to apply the taxes payable next year.

NORTH CAROLINIAN REPORTED MISSING

Lyman James, Official of Spray Textile Plant Has Vanished, Says New York Police

New York, March 16.—Lyman Dwight James, a relative of the late Marshall Field, of Chicago, and until recently an official of a textile plant, of Spray, N. C., is missing. The fact that he had vanished was disclosed when his uncle, Phillip L. James, New York manager of the Marshall Field and Co., went to police headquarters yesterday to deliver his photograph to the bureau of missing persons. Mr. James did not discuss the matter other than to admit that he had consulted police at the police headquarters. It was said secrecy had been ordered. Lyman James had been manager of the shipping department of the Carolina Cotton and Woolen Mills Company, of Spray, N. C., and resigned to take a trip to Europe.

Spray, N. C., March 16.—Lyman D. James, Jr., resigned here at the Carolina Cotton and Woolen Mill on March 1st, and left for New York where he was scheduled to sail today for Europe. His mother accompanied him to New York. Young James had lived here for five years and was well known in business and social circles.

French Students Go On Strike Today

Strasbourg, France, March 16.—The strike of the Strasbourg schools today called by Bishop Ruch as protection against the government's institution of an Inter-Confessional Regime, resulted, according to first reports, in the absence of 800 students, or 30 per cent of the regular attendance at each school.

NEW PRISON BOARD HOLDS FIRST MEET THIS AFTERNOON

Indications Are That Present Superintendent and Other Prison Officials May Be Re-appointed

Raleigh, March 16.—The retiring State Prison Board met at 10 this morning preparatory to turning over the administration of affairs to the new board, which was to meet this afternoon to elect officials for the coming four year term. The board spent the morning checking over various accounts, and other items incidental to the conduct of the prison for the last four years.

Although there was no intimation as to the personnel of the prison staff to be elected over incumbents including George Ross, Pen. Superintendent; Hugh Love, Chief Clerk; Sam J. Russell, Warden, and Dr. John J. Norman, Hospital; are slated for re-election.

FALL BANK ACCOUNT IS BARRED FROM TEAPOT DOME TRIAL

Judge's Ruling Deprives Government of Hope to Prove Exchange of Bonds for Lease

Cheyenne, Wyoming, March 16.—Evidence intended to reveal the secrets of the bank accounts of Albert B. Fall, former Secretary of the Interior, was barred from the record in the Teapot Dome lease annulment suit here today.

The rule barring the evidence handed down by Federal Judge Kennedy deprives the government of its only known means of attempting to prove an exchange of Liberty Bonds between Fall and Harry Sinclair, whose Mammoth Oil Company was given a lease on the oil reserve.

Judge Kennedy offered the matter in question as involving something of unusual importance in the plaintiff's case, but as the matter stands it was manifestly incompetent, and would be barred as such until it was shown to be competent. Judge Kennedy's ruling left the government's case up in the air so completely that a recess of ten minutes was allowed to permit Owen J. Roberts and Alton Pomerooy, government counsel, to get their remaining witnesses in shape.

After the recess, Attorney Roberts announced that he would reverse the procedure previously followed in an attempt to show the alleged passage of bonds between Sinclair and Fall, by tracing the bonds from Sinclair to Fall, instead of from the former Secretary to the head of the Mammoth Oil Company.

The court had warned Roberts that he was approaching the matter from the back door.

The Court Grants An Early Hearing Henderson Case

Washington, March 16.—The Supreme Court today granted the request of the Henderson Water Company to have advanced the hearing of its appeal against the North Carolina Corporation Commission, and others in its efforts to increase water rates at Henderson, N. C., and placed the case on summary for hearing November 2nd, next.

Japan Passes Alien Land Law

Tokio, March 16.—The Alien Land law was passed by the House of Peers today. The law liberalizes conditions under which foreigners may obtain land in Japan, and bars from land ownership all countries in which Japanese are prohibited from owning land.

WARREN NOMINATION REJECTED BY SENATE FOR THE SECOND TIME

GOLDSBORO BARBER MURDERED ON ROAD NEAR SEVEN SPRINGS

Rural Mail Carrier Finds Dying Man Beside Road With His Throat Slashed

Goldsboro, March 16.—David Hobson, 35, white barber of Goldsboro, was found lying by the side of the highway near Seven Springs, this morning with his throat cut. The man was alive when discovered by a rural mail carrier, but died before medical assistance could be obtained.

A coroner's jury, empaneled to sit on the case, returned a verdict of "Death at the hands of parties unknown."

An automobile, said to be Hobson's property, was in the road nearby, and it was said that marks on the ground about the car indicated there had been a struggle. Hobson leaves a widow and one child. Mr. Hobson is practically an invalid and it is said that her death is momentarily expected.

AMERICAN-ITALIAN CABLE NOW IN USE

Greetings From President Coolidge to King of Italy is First Message Over New Cable

New York, March 16.—A message containing greetings from President Coolidge to the King of Italy, was the first communication sent over the direct Western Union cable between the United States and Italy, which was opened today. It is the first direct cable connection between the two countries, and opened up a new artery of transmission to Europe, independent of any other cable channel.

Barron Giacomo De Martino, Italian Ambassador to the United States, presided at the ceremonies in the head offices of the Western Union Telegraph Co. The second message to go over the new cable was from the Secretary of State to President Mussolini.

Two Thousand Cases Are On Court Docket In Buncombe Co.

Asheville, March 16.—The issue and summons dockets of the Buncombe county superior court are congested with something like 2,000 cases, according to the report of a special calendar committee, headed by James G. Merrimon. The committee made recommendations for relief. Among other things, it was recommended that the superior court should not be used as a "dumping ground" for the purpose of staying the collection of judgments rendered in lower courts.

Funeral Services for Judge B. F. Long To Be Held Today

Statesville, March 16.—Funeral services for Judge Benjamin F. Long, of the Superior Court, of this district who died at his home here Saturday, will be held this afternoon. Death was caused from a stroke of paralysis. Judge Long was 72 years old.

Duke Alumni to Celebrate June 9

Durham, March 16.—Extensive plans are being made for an alumni celebration at Duke University on June 9, which will be "Alumni Day." Speakers and other participants in the program will come from many sections.

The President Makes Known Intention to Offer Warren for a Recess Appointment to Attorney General Post

Washington, March 16.—The Senate today rejected for the second time the nomination of Charles B. Warren to be Attorney General.

Every one of the 39 Senators voting for confirmation was a Republican. The opposition was a combination of Democrats and Republican insurgents. The vote was 46 to 39, and compared with the tie vote of 40 to 40 on which the nomination was first rejected last Tuesday.

President Coolidge has announced that he will offer Mr. Warren a recess appointment, but the nominee has not indicated whether he will accept.

The vote was preceded by fiery debate tilted with the accumulated bitterness of a long history making struggle. President Coolidge's announcement that he would offer a recess appointment to Mr. Warren, filled the opposition with a new and flaming determination, and inspired the Democrats and Republican insurgents to direct many of their thrusts at the President himself.

Washington, March 16.—The Senate moved forward today in probably the final engagement of its battle of the nomination of Charles B. Warren, as Attorney General, with the opposing forces directing their strategy chiefly against President Coolidge's challenge of a recess appointment for Mr. Warren in case of a second rejection of the nomination.

The unanimous consent agreement for a vote on confirmation at 2:50 o'clock left only four hours for debate from the time the Senate convened at 10:30 o'clock. An equal division of time between supporters and opponents of the nomination with each speaker limited to 30 minutes had been arranged.

Confident that they held a margin of from three to six votes with which to defeat the nomination for the second time, claiming that administration leaders were not disposed to dispute, the opposing forces were laying their plans for another test of strength as a volley. It was their purpose to attempt to hold the Senate session long enough to give the President, as stated by Senator Robinson, the Democrat leader, ample opportunity to submit another name for the office.

Rehearsal of a new Senate session that would equal in dramatic quality that of last Tuesday, when the Warren nomination was first objected to in the vote, had drawn crowds together for adjunction to the Senate galleries more than an hour before the time fixed for the Senate to convene.

Dr. Stewart is a wonderful evangelist and accompanied Bishop Lambuth on a tour through the Orient. He is a man of attractive personality and unusual culture and his sermons are interesting as well as spiritual.

Throughout the meeting two services will be conducted daily at 10 a. m. and 7:30 p. m.

PUZZLE CRAZE RIDES ORCHARDISTS ARE INTO POPULARITY IN SOUTHERN EUROPE OFFERED AID SEND FRUIT TO EUROPE

Rome. — The crossword puzzle craze has reached Italy in its triumphal march from the United States.

The engaging pastime which has made dictionaries best sellers, first took Great Britain by storm and then crossed into France where it overcame the prejudice of thousands of citizens of that nation which, more than any other in Europe, had been famous for its philological insularity and for its passionate insistence upon the purity of its verbal expression.

Now, the fad, disguised as "L'Indovinello delle Parole Incrociate" has crossed the Alps into Italy and its proponents predict confidently that nothing can stop its advance into the heart of central Europe and even into the Balkans where languages and dialects abound.

Foreigners in Italy had for some time interested and disturbed the natives by their peculiar antics and gesticulations in front of black and white squares in foreign newspapers, but it remained for a weekly newspaper to explain the mystery and incidentally to introduce the cult.

That the "parole incrociate" is but a distant relative of our own crossword puzzle is immediately apparent after a literal translation of some of the explanatory definitions. Here are several furnished with the second puzzle: In water I am strong and gay; smiles at everyone but rarely of him who touches it; it is pure; tells when death appears; an immense adjective; always sacred; beyond the octave; renowned for works of genius; found in Italian politics; perfectible; more luminous am I and more impalpable.

In this puzzle there are eight right and left words and 13 up and down. No word has less than four letters and eight have eight letters each. The newspaper announces it will publish a puzzle each week and offers \$2,000 lire in prizes for accurate solutions during the year.

One large Roman daily has already announced its intention to publish the puzzles, and other newspapers are said to be preparing to follow suit.

CITY ZONING SYSTEM RECORDS PROGRESS THRUOUT COUNTRY

Washington. — There are now 320 cities in the United States which have embarked the area within their boundaries into zones, setting territory apart for exclusive use as business, residence, industrial or transportation property, the department of commerce reported today in a summary of conditions affecting the proposal.

The most marked progress was made in this form of city planning during 1924, when 62 municipalities adopted the system, fitting the zones to the particular requirements of their localities.

"In adopting zoning ordinances," the department's statement said, "these cities, towns and villages have sought to protect home owners, and other land owners, in the reasonable use of their property. Zoning seeks to regulate the use to which buildings may be put, the area of the lot which they may cover, and their height in different sections of the city, that the land in each district may be used for the purpose to which it is best suited.

"New Jersey still leads in the number of zoned municipalities, having 72; New York has 56; California, 38; Illinois, 36; Massachusetts, 24; Ohio, 21; Wisconsin, 14; Michigan, 9; Indiana, 5; Kansas, Missouri, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island and Virginia, 4 each; Florida, Minnesota, Oklahoma and Washington, 2 each; and Alabama, Arkansas, Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, District of Columbia, Georgia, Iowa, Maryland, Nebraska, North Carolina, North Dakota, Oregon, South Carolina, Tennessee and Utah, one each.

"An increased interest is being shown by the people of the United States in the enactment of zoning legislation to control the use, height and area of buildings in various districts in their communities, and in consequence zoning laws have been enacted or are being considered by nearly every state in the Union.

"The legislature of 24 states meet during 1925. Most of them are now in session and zoning legislation is receiving more than passing attention due to the widespread interest in the subject shown by the public at large."

Want Ads Get Results

Berlin. — When the apple growers of northern New York or of the far northwest want to know when, where, and in how great quantities it is advisable to ship their product to Germany, they will hereafter be able to obtain accurate advice from the department of agriculture at Washington, or from its Berlin office at the Pariser Platz.

They will thereby avoid the situation that obtained with reference to the 1924 crop. Relying upon the advice of European brokers the apple growers shipped large quantities of apples to Germany in September and October. These shipments arrived about the time that apples from Czechoslovakia, Austria, and France poured in, and German apples still further helped to glut the market. The result was a loss to apple growers all around.

This concentration of shipments in the late autumn has meant also that in March and April Germany will have practically no apples. The European market will keep so long, it seems, and no provision has been made for American apples to be shipped. Apparently nobody has ever made it his business to supply the American apple growers with authentic information, and the department of agriculture's foreign service proposes to remedy this defect.

With this in view, an expert on apples is making a careful survey of European apple growing. He is visiting the apple centers and is organizing an information service by which American growers will next year know exactly how good and ample the European crop is, when and where it is being moved, and at what time and in what quantities American growers can hope best to dispose of their export product.

ALASKAN TRAVELERS OFTEN OWE LIVES TO INTELLIGENT DOGS

Nome, Alaska. — The diphtheria epidemic in Nome, Alaska, bringing its desperate race between death and dog teams with anti-toxin, centered the attention of the country on what has become a commonplace to "sourdoughs," the usual method of transportation in the frozen interior of the northern territory in winter — an adventure at best.

It is only on such occasions as epidemics that the mushing is carried out at such hazardous speed, but the usual progress across the center of Alaska is made once a fortnight throughout the winter by the mail carriers, who travel 876 miles from Nenana to Nome. Numerous other traders, prospectors and trappers are on the go frequently for long or short journeys.

French-Canadians in the employ of the Hudson's Bay Company 300 years ago, learning the use of dogs and sleds from Eskimos in the far northwest of America, used to shout "marche" when they wanted the dogs to speed up. In the mouths of English-speaking men this became "mush," which has struck as a "set-up" to the dog and has a designation for travel by dog-drawn sled.

Tragedies of the trail, for men, are comparatively few, partly because the winter drives are undertaken only by hardy, experienced men, and largely because of the uncanny ability of the dogs to avoid hazards of the trail. Overflows are dreaded possibilities.

Most of the mushing is done on the ice of rivers or seas and the rest of it overland from one body of water to another. Sometimes the swiftness of the current or the entry of a side stream causes the water to flow above the ice, making slush of the snow. These links death for man. If he gets into it his legs will freeze — temperatures of 50 degrees below zero are frequent on the trail. Freezing follows instantly after emergence from the slush, and the musher is helpless. But a good lead dog detects an overflow a mile off. He scents it, and suddenly departs from the deep trail and leads the team off through unbroken snow. Around the overflow he detours, coming back to the trail when past the slush.

On ice covered with sharp projections, called spear ice, occurring on rivers and seas, the dogs wear moose-skins. Sometimes under pressure, such as when 300,000 units of anti-toxin were taken from Nenana on the Alaskan Railroad Jan. 27 and delivered to Nome by relays of dog teams Feb. 2, several dogs are carried on the sleds, the animals taking turns at riding and running.

The principal sled dogs are Huskies and Malamutes. Huskies are crosses of domestic dogs and prairie wolves. They weigh 60 to 65 pounds. Malamutes are crosses of domestic dogs and timber wolves. They weigh 75 pounds and up. The leaders are light in weight. They are brain workers, and really lead. They do not work, but watch the trail.

Trail dogs sleep comfortably in the snow. In a severe blizzard an Alaskan will leave his dogs to burrow in the snow and outlast the storm if they can, and he will make his way to shelter.

The bond between a driver and his runners so it may all on the snow. feel no love for sled dogs, and even that the dogs feel none for them. On the other hand, such a writer as Hudson Stuck, Episcopal archdeacon of the Yukon and Arctic regions, affirms that some sled dogs love some men.

Dogs are used in Alaska for winter travel only. In the summer they live in camps, where they are chained each to a trolley wire that gives him a run. For if they could reach each other, there usually would be trouble. In winter, work and the blacksmoke whip keep them in order. On the trail they are fed once every 24 hours on whatever the master is able to give them. Often it is dried fish.

A passenger may ride on the sled, but the driver runs behind it and rides on the rear runners alternately. A good day's travel is 40 to 50 miles, but in a storm and in bad going among hills a team and two men may work from six in the morning until nine at night advancing only ten miles.

In the diphtheria epidemic the dogs got through and an airplane, primed for the flight, failed to start. But airplanes are being used increasingly in the north, though usually in summer, not exactly that pictured by mer for winter flights are considered extremely hazardous. The government is working on a plan to deliver mail in winter by a plane equipped with retractable. Most sourdoughs profess to be a dog-lover in the States. The mushing dog, being half wolf except for

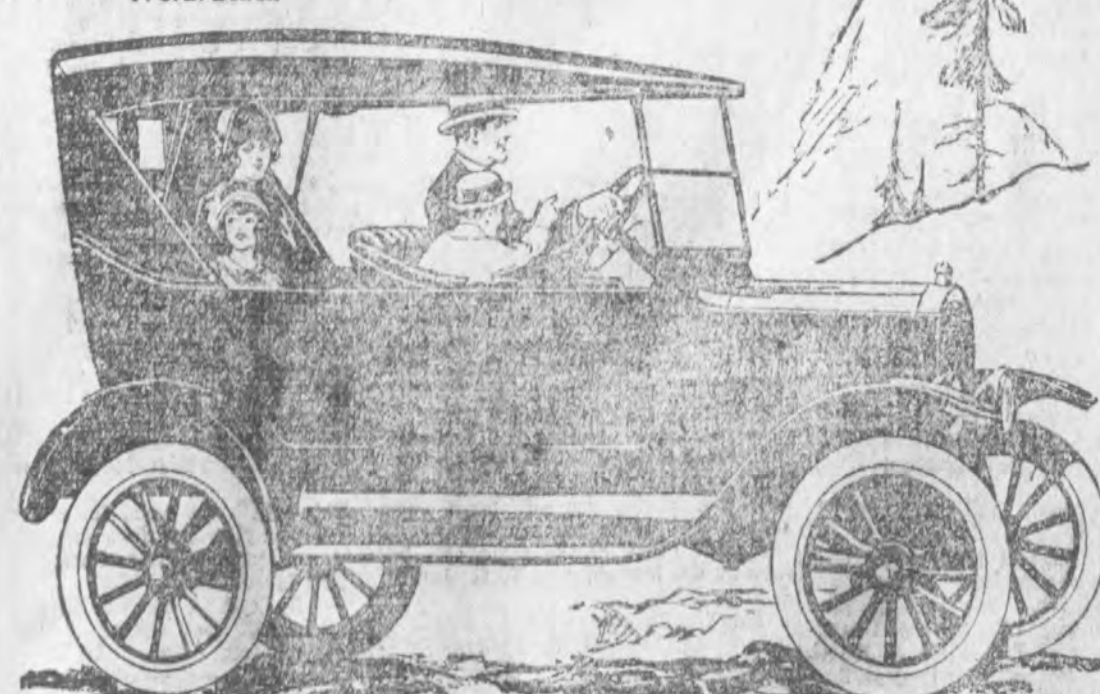

NO FREEDOM LIKE UNITED STATES

An anti-Bolshevik meeting was held recently in New York to hear Morris Gordin tell "Why I Lost My Faith in Communistic Russia."

Newspaper reports stated that "One-third of the 600 persons at the meeting were women. The audience applauded every point Gordin made against present conditions in Russia, and there seemed to be unanimous approval of his declaration that Russia was slowly but surely progressing toward a 'republic of the United States of Russia.'"

"The speaker, formerly a student at University of Chicago, was a draft-soldier in the American army during the World War. Until 1921, when he went to Russia, he was one of the leaders of the New York Communist Party. He returned here last September. Describing his conclusions regarding his nearly three years of experience in Russia, Gordin said:

"I went there expecting to find a heaven of the people and for the workers; instead I found a hell. The people have no say in their government, and little if any freedom in commercial or social activities. It is all a sickening dead level of political and industrial slavery, where the people are directed by a little group of dictators.

"The people may change this situation at

any time, but when I left they seemed everywhere, so far as I noted, to be passively resentful, too hopeless to assert themselves. All around there was going on the economic, industrial and moral ruin of Russia.

"In the meantime the leaders of this terrible situation are holding on to the shred of Communism in their visionary scheme of getting, through propaganda among other nationals, support for Communistic domination.

"These selfish, misguided men, now in control, have trampled Russia politically into a big prison, a red dungeon. Before the unfortunate Russian people, most of whom would like to end their sufferings under this colossal failure, can expect any concrete help from other countries they must show their resentment of this false doctrine by attacking it themselves."

MAKING THE "POOR" PAY

MARKETS OF EUROPE MADE AVAILABLE TO AMERICAN FARMERS

Berlin.—Ready always to help American farmers find markets in Europe for their produce, the department of agriculture at Washington is showing increased activity on the continent. After the war it took over the records and offices of the American system of food administration, and today has bureaus in London, Berlin, Paris and Rome, with sub offices in various other strategic centers. **William A. Schoenfeld** has been sent to this city as general director for Europe.

The products bought by Europe from America are, in the order of their importance, cotton, grain, tobacco, fruit and meat. The various European bureaus study local crop reports, the needs of the population for the various articles imported, and the time when the American crop is wanted in Europe. They inform the European purchaser of current prices and, wherever the department has established standards recognized among the American producers, place these at the service of the European buyers. This increases confidence in American business honesty, and thus helps the American producer in winning back the European market which he lost in large part during the war.

Another phase of the work of the European bureaus is that of keeping information on improved methods of agricultural development discovered or introduced by European farmers. If a sugar beet grower in Germany succeeds in raising a particularly fine grade of beet through a method peculiar to his farm, the bureau in Berlin immediately investigates and sends its information to Washington.

The department of agriculture in Europe works in close cooperation with the commercial attaches and the consulates, but limits itself strictly to raw products. Take the case of fruit, for instance. Apples, pineapples or oranges in their natural state are the concern of the department, but the moment an apple is canned or dried, it falls within the jurisdiction of the commercial attaché. In this way overlapping and conflict are avoided.

New Treaty With Mexican Government Awaits Signatures

Washington, March 16.—A new extradition treaty with Mexico, the most comprehensive convention of such a character ever negotiated by the United States, which is awaiting signatures covers, not alone narcotics smugglers, but provides for extradition of customs and prohibition law violators along with the treaty have not been completed, but it was indicated in the State Department today that no delay was expected.

Washington, March 16.—Congress can not collect, by access to the books and papers through a Federal investigation body all the information it desires for consideration in the formulation of a legislative policy the Supreme Court held today in substance affirming the decision of a lower court in three cases from the state of Maryland.

Church Activities Draw Women.

Berlin.—Recent elections in the Evangelical church throughout Prussia, the largest Protestant area in Germany, resulted in the choice of 33 1-3 percent of women as church officials in many parishes, and women assumed a much more important part in church affairs than in the days of the monarchy. About 75 percent of the church membership voted in most parishes, which is regarded as a manifestation of unusual interest in church affairs.

to very heavy and concentrated sell-
ing but on all declines trade buying
was in evidence in the technical posi-
tion strong materially. We expect
the market to do better unless the
western belt has copious rains.

Hubbard Bros: Another week has
passed with the drought unrelieved in
Texas we continue to stress this point
because we think it most serious even
though it will not have its real ef-
fect until the growing months of July
and August.

GRAIN
The wheat market has passed from
an over-bought to an over-sold con-
dition. Foreigners have put on mil-
lions of bushels of hedges against
purchases of wheat on ocean passage
from the Southern Hemisphere of
Europe. Big speculative shorts are
said to have sold millions of bushels
with those who are in Florida taking
the lead.

It is understood that the largest
holders of May wheat have not un-
loaded and that there is enough wheat
sold for exports between now and the
end of May to give leading holders
of May contracts a position which
may make it uncomfortable for the
shorts when they start to cover and
the hedgers try to buy in their grain,
as it is disposed of abroad.

Cash corn situation is regarded as
mostly bearish, as low grades are
selling at too great a discount under
futures. The futures market however
is said to be over-sold.

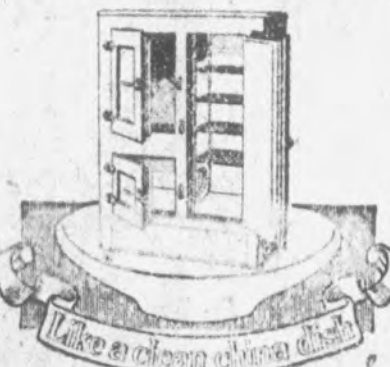
