20,000 PERSONS MADE HOMELESS BY FIRE IN TOKIO THIS AFTERNOON

Firemen Helpless in Attempt to Check Flames Because of Drought Which Has Exhausted the Reservoirs; Great Confusion Prevails

Tokio, March 18.—20,000 persons were rendered homeless when a major conflagration swept north eastern Tokyo today, destroying 3,000 buildings and resulting in unestimated casualty. The fire was brought under control late tonight.

Tokio, March 18.—A conflagration, which swept over northern Tokyo this afternoon, fanned by a gale, destroyed more than a thousand homes, and at 10 o'clock tonight was spreading in all directions. Great confusion prevailed.

Troops were on the scene tearing down houses in an effort to prevent a further spread of the blaze, while hundreds of residents laden with household effects were making their way toward safety. Firemen were helpless in their attempts to check the conflagrations, because of the drought that had exhausted the reservoirs.

The fire started in a factory in North eastern Tokyo and tonight was sweeping in a South Westerly direction toward Metropolitan Park, and the famous Imperial Museum, and the Zoological Garden.

Simultaneously with the outbreak of the conflagration, fires started in two other districts, but these were controlled.

McLean First Gov. to Congratulate Mr. Coolidge By Radio

Raleigh, March 18.—The first radio message from the governor of a state to reach President Coolidge following his inauguration was that of Governor A. W. McLean, of North Carolina, according to a statement issued by Avera Wynne of Raleigh. He and James A. Briggs, Jr., of Raleigh, radiographed the message from Raleigh. They were advised by the Washington receiver that this was the first to reach the capital city.

The amateur radio organizations throughout the United States set about to get a congratulatory message from each governor to President Coolidge. Mr. Wynne and Mr. Briggs approached Governor McLean on the subject and he gave them a message to send. It reached Washington direct, being sent in the daytime, a few minutes after the president took the oath of office.

Similar messages from the far west, especially from states on the Pacific coast, had to be relayed. This was rendered more necessary, on account of the fact that they were started from their destinations in middle of the day.

Condition of Marquis Curzon is Giving Increased Anxiety

London, March 18.—A bulletin issued at three o'clock this afternoon by the physicians attending Marquis Curzon, of Kedleston, says the patient is showing signs of lung complications. This followed an earlier bulletin stating the Lord Curzon's condition was giving increased anxiety. It was reported in the House of Lords, this afternoon that Lord Curzon's condition was hopeless.

Government Rests Case Against Tex Rickard and Others

Trenton, N. J., March 18.—The government today rested its case against George Louis (Tex) Rickard, and five others charged with conspiracy to violate the law against Interstate Commerce in light films at the conclusion of the morning session of the trial before jury in Federal Judge Rodin's court.

Former Attorney General Daugherty, who had been called as Government witness, and who had waited, did not testify. Nor did the government call Jack Kearns, manager of the world heavy weight champion, Jack Dempsey. Defense attorneys indicated they would not set up any defense when the case was resumed this afternoon.

Havana, Celebrates Treaty Giving Cuba Isle of Pines

Havana, Cuba, March 18.—A parade, in which 112 representatives, civil, business and military organizations participated, was the expression of joy in Havana this afternoon, in celebration of ratification of the treaty giving Cuba the title to the Isle of Pines by the United States Senate.

President Zayas started the parade by placing a wreath on the Statue of Antonio Maceo. From there the parade went along the sea front to the Presidential Palace, where the President and American Ambassador, Edward H. Crowder, who had marched with the President, reviewed the parade. The President also placed a wreath on the statue of Jose Marti, and Gonzalo De Quesada, the first Cuban Minister to the United States, and signer of the treaty.

Much Speculation as to Personnel Auto Registration Force

Raleigh, March 18.—There is much speculation here as to the personnel of the automobile registration force which will on April 1 be transferred to the supervision of the commissioner of revenue, R. A. Doughton. Mr. Doughton up to this time has made no announcements along this line. Several of those employed at the present automobile registration headquarters, under the secretary of state, have announced they will resign, including J. E. Sawyer, supervisor.

Jay Nominated As Ambassador To Argentina

Washington, March 18.—Peter A. Jay, of Rhode Island, and present minister to Rumania, was nominated today by President Coolidge to be Ambassador to Argentina.

Orders Investigation Recent Fluctuations in Wheat Market

Washington, March 18.—Secretary Jardine today directed the Greene future administration to make an immediate investigation of the recent price fluctuations in the market of wheat.

SHEPHERD, FAIMAN INDICTED TODAY BY GRAND JURY

Two Men Charged With Murder of William McClintock After Long Investigation

Chicago, March 18.—William D. Shepherd and Charles Faiman were charged with the murder of William C. McClintock, Shepherd's foster son, in an indictment returned today by the county grand jury.

Fairmont, West Va., March 18.—Robert M. Lambie, chief inspector of West Virginia, declared in a statement issued shortly after noon today that rescue workers could not be able to reach the 34 entombed miners in mine number 41 of the Bethlehem Mines Corporation before late tonight. Rescue miners held out little hope that any of the miners would be taken out alive.

Faiman previously had confessed that he had conspired with Shepherd to introduce typhoid germs into the young millionaire as soon as McClintock had made a will leaving his \$1,000,000 to Shepherd. Robert White, formerly a student at Faiman's School, identified Shepherd last night as the man who attended the school in the fall of 1923.

Shepherd, according to White, seemed much interested in bacteriology and laboratory equipment. His story coincided with the time that Faiman said that Shepherd attended the school.

The accused man, who has not broken down under days of questioning, denied White's story as he did those of Faiman, and John P. Marshall, a former clerk of the school, who said Shepherd had written regarding courses. Further corroboration of Faiman's statement that \$100,000 had been fixed by Shepherd and himself as his portion of the McClintock fortune, if their plans were successful, was added, the prosecuting attorney said, in a letter showing that Faiman planned \$150,000 worth of improvements of his school immediately after the millionaire orphan's death.

Attorneys for Isabelle Pope, McClintock's fiancée, who was left \$88,000 annuity in his will, said that they would contend that Miss Pope was entitled to the same share of the estate as if she actually married him, under a construction of the law by judging she might be regarded as his equitable widow. They were ready to ask for continuance of the case when Shepherd asked to probate the will, making him chief heir, came up in court today.

The indictment returned before Chief Justice Hopkins, of criminal court, charged that Shepherd and Faiman inoculated the victim with typhoid bacilli. The indictment further charged that poison in the form of Aconitina Prussic acid and morphine were administered. The indictment contained 22 counts, each count placing the date of poisoning as Nov. 15, 1924, and the death as December 4, 1924.

Judge Hopkins ordered the two men, who now are prisoners of the state's attorney, to be brought before him at 2 p. m. for arraignment on the indictment.

Liquor Distilling Outfit is Captured in Camden County

Salisbury, March 18.—The second largest and one of the most complete liquor-distilling outfits ever captured in the state, it is said, was that confiscated by federal prohibition agents five miles from South Mills in Camden county, according to a report made public here by Director Coltrane. The outfit contained two 250 gallon copper stills and was in full blast.

Richmond Rotarians Hear Reports of Committees; Everything in Readiness for Annual Event

Richmond, March 18.—Every member of the Rotary Club is looking forward to the meeting tomorrow at 1 o'clock, at Chamber Club, at the final announcements about the forthcoming district conferences are to be made by Chairman L. Gordon Shearin and his various committees. An enthusiastic meeting of the chairman of the committees, held Saturday, revealed the fact that every detail has been attended to, and that more help is needed in the shape of additional committeemen, to assist in handling the big crowd that is coming to Richmond from North Carolina and Virginia, besides from practically every other section of International Rotary.

Reservations have been made for 2,000 people, and more are yet to be heard from. Several bands will accompany delegations, and in some instances the delegations will represent a 100 per cent membership of the clubs.

It was estimated by Chairman Shearin yesterday that one-third of the attendance would be represented by wives and daughters of delegates. 34 MINERS ENTOMBED BY EXPLOSION WHICH WRECKS MINE IN W. VA.

TRUJILLO DESTROYED BY INUNDATIONS

Lima, Peru, March 18.—Official and private radio advices from Trujillo, the third largest city of Peru, say that the city has been completely destroyed by inundations, caused by torrential rain.

The inhabitants abandoned their homes, taking refuge in higher fields nearby. Efforts made to erect flood gates to prevent further advance of rising waters, were useless. Advices from Trujillo are incomplete. Trujillo was founded in 1335 by Pizarro, and is in Northern Peru about one and one-half miles east of the Pacific Ocean. The population is about 11,000.

NEGRO WANTED FOR MURDER BEING HELD IN THE LOCAL JAIL

William Fleming, Who is Charged With Murder of Will Newsome On May 21, 1922, Arrested in Philadelphia

William Fleming, negro, of Carolina Township, charged with the murder of Will Newsome, negro, on May 21, 1922, was given a hearing before A. L. Woodard, of Carolina Township, this morning and committed to Pitt County Jail without bond for his appearance at the next term of criminal court.

Fleming, on the day of the murder, made his get-away and despite every effort made by officers has succeeded in evading arrest. Deputy Sheriff H. D. Gurganus has worked untiringly on the case and a short while ago his efforts were rewarded when he learned that the negro was in Philadelphia. He left immediately for Philadelphia and with the aid of detectives, ascertained that Fleming was living under the assumed name of Henry Spirewell.

He was arrested and brought back to this county.

According to information Fleming passed the home of Newsome on the day of the murder, called him to the door and shot him.

Coolidge Resubmits Woodlock's Nomination

Washington, March 18.—President Coolidge today re-submitted to the Senate, the nomination of Thos. F. Woodlock, of New York, to be a member of the Interstate Commerce Commission.

When Mr. Woodlock's name first was submitted at the last session of the Senate, so much opposition developed that Republican leaders decided not to bring it to a vote. They said today, however, they hoped for confirmation.

After another canvass of the situation, it was indicated that there might be no attempt to confirm the nomination, and after adjournment since die had been taken the President would give Mr. Woodlock a recess appointment. Senator Smith, Democrat of South Carolina, who lead the fight against the nomination when it came before the Interstate Commerce Committee, of which he was chairman during the regular session, declared, "I will not stand for it," and immediately started taking a pole of the Senate.

Explosion Demolishes Shaft and Shakes the Buildings 300 Feet Away; Crowds of Frantic Women and Children Rush to Mine in Effort to Get Word of Loved Ones

Fairmont, W. Va., March 18.—Hope of reaching the 34 men entombed in mine number 41 of the Bethlehem Mines Corporation, three miles west of here, sometime this afternoon was expressed shortly before noon today by members of rescue parties, who were entering the mine that was wrecked by an explosion last night. No bodies had been found at the hour the statement was made, and in a telegram to Governor Gore, Robert A. Lambie, Chief Mine Inspector of West Virginia, declared it was impossible as yet to tell whether any of the imprisoned miners would be found alive. His telegram described the situation as bad.

Fairmont, W. Va., March 18.—A hundred, or more men, frantically but cautiously, pushed their way through the underground recesses of mine 41, of the Bethlehem Mines Corporation, three miles west of here in effort to find out where the 34 entombed last night when explosion wrecked the shaft.

Not since a sheet of flame burst up through the opening that extends 300 feet below the ground, has anyone on the surface received any word from the imprisoned men. A few rumbling preceded the explosion which wrecked the mine's lighting equipment and fans, demolished the shaft, and shook buildings in Fairmont, and broke windows and shook doors from their hinges, in houses 300 feet away.

Since that moment, crowds of frantic women and children have milled about the mines, trying to get some word of the entombed men. Only two rescue workers had been able to send word to the surface, and that word was not encouraging. These men had pushed their way past the debris to stables, where the mine horses were kept. All of the animals were dead.

They reported they could find no trace of the men, and when they came to the surface with a report that the air was very bad, experts from every mine in the district were organized into groups ready to explore the further reaches of the mine.

Next Recorder's Court To Be Held March 31

There will be no Recorder's court during this week and next on account of Superior court which is now in session.

Former Oxford Man Killed in Lynchburg, Va.

Oxford, March 18.—Simmon H. Smith, aged 63, died early Monday at his home in Lynchburg, Va., following an automobile accident Sunday. The deceased was for years a resident of Oxford. He is survived by one son, Wilber Smith, of Captown, Africa, an aged mother, five brothers and two sisters. The burial took place Tuesday at Crystal Hill, Va.

Mr. Smith was an uncle of Mrs. J. R. Hodges and Joseph Palmer of Greenville.

EMPIRE STATE LOSING ITS FARM POPULATION

Ithaca, N. Y. — For the past eight years New York state has experienced an almost steady decline in its farm population, according to statistics compiled by the New York State College of Agriculture.

On January 1 of this year there were approximately 165,000 less people living on farms than there were in 1917, according to the figures. In 1917 the farm population was 838,000. Now the total has dropped to 733,000. In 1918, 40,000 tillers of the soil left to engage in other occupations. In 1919, 34,000 more followed and in 1920, 23,000 relinquished agricultural pursuits. The exodus in 1921 was 16,000.

There was a "back to the farm" tendency in 1922, when 11,000 returned. In 1923, however, 32,000 deserted farms for the cities or other pursuits more profitable than farming, and in 1924, 21,000 left the farms in the state.

The figures show, also, that farm hands have deserted their calling. In 1917 there were 77,000 hired hands on the farms of the state. On January 1, 1925, there were 26,700, a decrease of 50,300.

The report indicated that despite these reductions in farm population and labor, the farms of the Empire State produced record crops last year. It was pointed out, however, that the production was made at the expense of other important farm work, and that in many instances farmers neglected buildings, drainage and fences to devote their time to the production of normal yields.

hell for all loyal Southern people to live in.

General Forrest of Tennessee, was first to see the necessity of an organization to combat this destructive combination, that would destroy our civilization. He called this organization The Ku Klux Klan. It spread like wild fire throughout the South, I organized in 1868 a Klan in Beaufort county, and we soon drove out of the county all the Carpet Baggers, the deserters and traitors, and closed the Union Leaguers. Moved into Pitt January 1869 and duplicated what had been done in Beaufort and blazed the way for white supremacy rule and better times.

I am now appealing to the daughters and grand daughters, sons and grand sons of all true Ex-Confederates to vote for me for Mayor, I have filled many positions in your county, and I believe to the satisfaction of the people.
