4,000 PERSONS KILLED, INJURED WHEN TORNADO SWEEPS MIDDLE WEST

Force of Storm so Terrible That Bodies Are Reported Carried a Mile; Desoto School House Razed; Eighty-Eight Bodies Taken From Ruins. Property Damage Amounts to Many Millions

Dead estimated at 500 to 1,000. Injured estimated at 2,500 to 3,000.

Homeless estimated at 8,000 to 10,000.

A mid afternoon tornado, the worst hour to strike when children were packed in schools, and workers in stores and shops, yesterday stormed in five mid western states and still held many victims buried and not reported this afternoon.

Where it did most damage, the tornado lasted less than five minutes. It flattened heavily constructed schools and business buildings, with worse results than the casualties in lighter dwellings. Babies in homes were special sufferers.

Fire still raging, or smoldering, and millions of dollars worth of wreckage delayed the counting of the larger death rate. The hardest hit places were two cities in Southern Illinois, West Frankfort and Murphysboro. Next to Illinois, the worst sufferers were in Indiana and Missouri with fatal echoes coming from Tennessee and Kentucky.

Red Cross, States Guardsmen, Army Aviation Forces, and railroad resources piled into many towns on special trains, and private relief from two of the largest cities, Chicago and St. Louis, with contribution from smaller cities, were concentrated on Southern Illinois.

Chicago, March 19.—In several towns in the path of the storm, especially in Indiana, local companies of militia were mobilized for guard duty and relief. It was announced that a bill authorizing \$500,000 for relief would be introduced in the Illinois legislature today.

Loss of life was reported from 26 towns, most of them in Southern Illinois, but it was believed that death and destruction visited many others in the storm area, from which reports were still to be received.

Chicago, March 19.—The most devastating storm this country has ever experienced swept through portions of six western states last evening, taking a toll in dead and injured estimated at upwards of 4,000 persons and causing property damage of many millions.

So prostrated were portions of Illinois and Indiana, through which the tornado traveled in a series of erratic hops, that definite figures on the loss of lives and property were impossible early today, although an available report trickling in from frontiers where communication virtually was cut off, added to its uncertain casualty list. At dawn, the reported death list stood at 1,000 while approximately 3,963 were injured.

Several towns in the path of the twister, which apparently came out of the Ozark hills, and first struck Annapolis, Mo., virtually were destroyed, while fire in many places added horror to the havoc.

So terrific was the force of the storm that bodies were reported carried a mile, while timbers of the town of Desoto, Ill., were found in Dupon, 15 miles away.

The greatest loss of life, according to available reports, occurred in Southern Illinois, where more than 500 were reported killed, as the tornado tore North Eastward through Murphysboro, West Frankfort, Depoto, and other larger towns of the area.

At Desoto a school house was razed, and only three of the 250 occupants were reported as escaping without injuries, while 88 bodies had been taken from the ruins last night.

DECLARES LEASING OF TEAPOT DOME WAS KEPT SECRET

Robinson Claims That the Transaction Was Concealed From Congress in Order to Get Work Done

Cheyenne, Wyo., March 19.—The leasing of the Teapot Dome to Harry F. Sinclair was deliberately concealed from Congress and the public, according to testimony read at the Government annulment suit here today from the deposition of Rear Admiral John K. Robinson, Chief of the Naval Engineering.

"We concealed what was being done in the Wyoming reserve because we wanted to get it done," Admiral Robinson said in cross examination conducted by Owen J. Roberts, government counsel.

In reply to another question, the Admiral denied that Albert B. Fall had said to him that they would go a half with the leasing plans, "and then let Congress holler."

Admiral Robinson also admitted concealing some of the facts concerning the lease negotiations when asked for them by Peter H. Kelly, of Michigan.

Southern Pacific Liner, Benville is Destroyed by Fire

New Orleans, March 19.—The new Southern Pacific liner, Benville, caught fire as she lay near the naval station here today and despite the efforts of the entire waterfront fire fighting equipment, it was said that she would be a total loss. The vessel was laid up for repairs at the time, and no passengers were aboard. It was reported, however, that several men fighting the flames had been injured.

LOCAL PHYSICIAN MAY BE NAMED TO SUCCEED RANKIN

Dr. C. O'H. Laughinghouse Being Mentioned for Secretary of State Board of Health

Raleigh, March 19.—The name of Dr. Charles O'H. Laughinghouse, of Greenville, for the past fourteen years a member of the State Board of Health, is being widely mentioned as the successor to Dr. W. S. Rankin, who is resigning from the secretaryship of the board to assume charge of the newly created Duke Hospital Fund. Dr. Rankin's successor will be elected at a meeting of the board which will be held at Pinchurst April 28, 29, and 30 in conjunction with the convention of the North Carolina Medical Society.

Other physicians who have been mentioned for the position are Dr. G. M. Cooper, who has been assistant secretary of the board for two years, and Dr. C. A. Shore, director of the State Laboratory of Hygiene.

Dr. Cooper last night denied published implication that he had stated that he would resign in the case certain physicians were appointed. He declared that he felt that the new secretary should be a resident of North Carolina and should be an outstanding man in his profession, well acquainted with the technical work of the State's health work.

"I have the best interests of the board at heart too much to raise any disturbance over any appointments," he stated.

Dr. Shore could not be reached at his home last night, but his friends doubted if he would accept the position if it were offered him. They pointed out that he has made a name for himself as one of the greatest men in the country in his particular line of work, that he is vitally interested in his present work, and that the difference in salaries of the two offices would be too insignificant to tempt him.

Dr. Cooper's friends suggest that his long service in the department and his intimate knowledge of the technical details would make him an admirable successor to Dr. Rankin. He had charge of the board's activities while Dr. Rankin was field director for the committee on Municipal Health Practices of the American Public Health Association.

The executive committee of the State Board of Health will meet in Raleigh within the next ten days, but it is thought by close observers that it will pick no candidates to recommend to the board. The date of the executive committee's meeting has not yet been decided upon. It is composed of Dr. J. Howell Way, of Waynesville; Dr. R. H. Lewis, of Raleigh; Dr. Charles O'H. Laughinghouse, of Greenville; Dr. Cyrus Thompson, of Jacksonville; Dr. D. A. Stanton, of High Point; Dr. T. E. Anderson, of Statesville; Dr. A. J. Crowell, Charlotte; Dr. E. J. M'LEAN DECLINES TO HEAD THE STONE MOUNTAIN TRUSTEES

Borglum Proposes That He Turn Over Models to Be Held in Trust Until National Organization Formed

Raleigh, March 19.—In view of the work of the controversy surrounding the Stone Mountain Memorial Association, Governor McLean, of North Carolina, has temporarily declined to head a proposed committee under which Gutzon Borglum, formerly sculptor of the memorial, had suggested that he turn over recreated models, to be held in trust for the United Daughters of the Confederacy until such a time that a National Organization be formed to take over the Stone Mountain Memorial. Other members of the proposed trust committee were Walter W. Fuller, of New York and Durham, and Samuel H. Venable, of Atlanta, owner of Stone Mountain. Mr. Borglum's proposal, together with the North Carolina Executive's report dealing to play the role asked by him, was made public here this morning by Governor McLean.

MEMORIAL SERVICE HELD LAST NIGHT REV. V. P. SCOVILLE

Services Conducted Under Auspices Ministerial Association and Laymen's Federation

The Memorial Service which was held in the Jarvis Memorial Methodist Church last night for the Rev. V. P. Scoville, was most impressive and largely attended.

After a few remarks by the Rev. L. E. Ballard, pastor of the Free Will Baptist Church and President of the Ministerial Association, in which he told of the love and esteem in which the deceased was held by members of the Association, the Rev. Leland W. Smith, of the Memorial Baptist Church, conducted the devotional service.

Rev. Lee Sadler, of the Eighth Street Christian Church, spoke on "Mr. Scoville as a Man" and in a few appropriate words commented on the greatness of the deceased, telling wherein his greatness lay. He spoke of Mr. Scoville's passion for saving souls, and of his untiring energy in the work for the promotion of God's work throughout the community, stressing the point that "Mr. Scoville was a good man."

The Rev. W. S. Harden, of the Presbyterian Church, spoke on the "Influence of Mr. Scoville's Life in the Various Organizations of the Community." After declaring that it was impossible to give an estimate of the real service and influence of the deceased, Mr. Harden told of his useful endeavors in an effort to be of service to his fellowmen. Always interested in the organization, of which he was a member, Mr. Scoville was ready at all times to render service and his presence at the meetings always created an atmosphere of happiness and encouragement. "If I should be asked for an epitaph for his monument," stated Mr. Harden, "I would suggest, 'In My Eagerness, I Have Outrun My Strength, and I Am Tired.'"

Truly this would be most appropriate, because in his eagerness to be of service to his community, he forgot self and lived for others.

Mr. R. C. Flanagan, a member of the Laymen's Christian Federation, of which Mr. Scoville was a chapter member, and in which work he devoted his time and energy from his organization, in a short talk, told of Mr. Scoville's relation to the Federation. Always present at the meetings, he was an inspiration and his words of encouragement will forever live in the hearts of those who went to him for consolation and prayer. Mr. Flanagan told what the friendship of such a man had meant to him, and in concluding his remarks read a little Christmas booklet which Mr. Scoville sent him entitled "You and I."

Rev. H. H. Leach, Secretary of the Ministerial Association, read the resolutions of respect.

The musical program consisted of Rev. Mr. Scoville's favorite hymns.

The Breakers and Palm Beach Hotels, Several Shops and Cottages Lay in Ruin; No Verification to Report Two People Lose Lives in Breakers

Palm Beach, Fla., March 19.—More than \$4,000,000 worth of property lay in ruins here today after the fire of last night, which swept through the Breakers and Palm Beach hotels, destroying several shops and cottages, and for a time threatened the destruction of that entire section of the city.

Smoldering ashes were all that remained of two of the most noted hotels of the play ground of millionaires, as efforts were made to check the damage to property and verify reports that there had been a loss of life. No verification had come early today of the rumors that an elderly man and woman had lost their lives in the Breakers. The city presented an unusual scene in the early morning light as groups poised in the dull glow of the embers to discuss the fire, or made an effort to identify or recover valuables that had been flung from windows during the excitement of last afternoon.

Baptist Women to Hold Convention in Twin City March 31

Winston-Salem, March 19.—The Baptist women of the state are eagerly looking forward to the meeting of their convention in this city March 31 to April 2. U. of the Southern Baptist Convention, Miss Emma Leachman, Atlanta, a field worker of the Home Mission Board, Mrs. Eph Wisenbunt, Lincoln, and Mrs. A. R. Phillips, Dalton, both being returned missionaries from the foreign field, Mrs. W. N. Jones, Raleigh, president of the Convention, and Dr. Chas. E. Burris, Nashville, general director of the 1925 Program of the Southern Baptist Convention, and Dr. Chas. E. Maddy, Raleigh, corresponding secretary of the Baptist State Board of Missions. Dr. Charles L. Greaves, pastor of the Baptist Tabernacle, Raleigh, will preach the annual Convention sermon the first evening of the meeting.

HAVARD SCIENTISTS STRIVE TO MEASURE REMOTE STAR CLOUD

Cambridge, Mass. — Determination that the object in the universe most remote from the earth among those visible through the highest powered telescopes is the faint star cloud known to astronomers as NGC 6822, is one of the latest contributions of the Harvard College Observatory to astronomical lore. Through studies made under the supervision of Professor Harlow Shapley, director of the observatory, it has been estimated that this star cloud is about one million light years distant. In the language of the layman this means a distance of approximately sixteen quadrillion, seventy trillion, four hundred billion miles.

NGC 68, was thought by the astronomers Perrine, Duncan and Hobb to be analogous to the Magellanic clouds. Studies made at the Harvard Observatory, however, seem to indicate that it lies well outside this Milky Way system. It has been estimated that a dirigible making a non-stop flight and traveling night and day at a speed of 60 miles an hour would require 33,215,000,000 years to reach this distant spot.

Another accomplishment of the observatory is the recent completion of Volume 90 of Harvard Annals, the last of nine volumes of the Draper Catalogue, an astronomical work covering information concerning 250,000 stars. Work on the Draper series, planned in detail by Professor William Henry Pickering in 1911, has been in progress for more than 13 years.

These volumes show the position, magnitudes and spectral classes of the stars. Analyses of the data thus collected are now in progress. It is estimated that on the spectra plates in the Harvard collection there are 1,000,000 faint stars still unclassified.

This priceless collection of astronomical photographic plates, for years surrounded by a fire hazard, is now well safeguarded. Professor Shapley said that tests had been made which demonstrated that the plates were secure from either fire or water damage. They are kept in a brick structure, equipped with a water sprinkler system.

Since the first photograph of a star was made in 1850 under the supervision of Professor George C. Bond, the Harvard collection has been growing steadily. Systematic photographic work with several telescopes was begun prior to 1900. Dozens of telescopes at the observatory and at its stations in Arequipa, Peru, and elsewhere are constantly adding to the collection, which now numbers some 300,000 plates. Nearly all of these are considered of value in the study of current astronomical problems, and those taken prior to 1900 are said to be unduplicated elsewhere.

ITALIANS GRATIFIED AT NEW CABLE LINE TO NORTH AMERICA

Rome. — The conclusion this month of the work of laying a submarine cable from Anzio, Italy to Malaga, Spain, whereby Italy is for the first time joined by direct cable to the North American continent, is being hailed with enthusiasm by that large section of the Italian population which turns avidly towards the United States for inspiration for Italy's fast growing commercial and industrial life.

But the completion of the cable also is having the effect of emphasizing the extent to which Italy has up until the present occupied a peculiarly insular role in regard to daily news communication with the Americas, and even with northern and western Europe.

The Roman newspapers, and there are but few large Italian newspapers outside of Rome, are fashioned in conformity with the Latin journalistic idea that opinion is more important than news, and that news should have the color brought to it by the personal viewpoint of the reporter or the political creed of the journal.

Each newspaper publishes but a scant few columns of news from abroad, and most of that comes from nearby countries, France most often. These columns treat almost exclusively of political happenings, and only occasionally of news events.

Fresh news is scarce and for local and human interest stories, which the Italians love as much as do the Americans, the Rome dailies rely on venerable foreign newspapers rewriting news without bothering about the time of its origin.

Practically all news from the United States comes by way of London and Paris, and much of it suffers strange distortion which indicates the relay race it has run.

EQUADOR PROSPERS AS AMERICANS EAT CHOCOLATE CANDIES

New York. — Ecuador is making a complete commercial comeback, the Foreign Trade Council reports, wholly because of the popularity in the United States of chocolate-covered ice cream confections.

The sudden vogue here for ice cream served in a chocolate jacket, the council says, placed chocolate overnight at a new premium the world over. This re-established the demand for Ecuador's staple agricultural product, cacao, from which the highest grade bitter chocolate comes, and lifted that country out of financial depression.

The chocolate boom, the council says, proved lucky for the United States as well as Ecuador, for it restored to the former one of its good customers of five years ago. Commerce between countries being a simple matter of give and take, Ecuador is now spending its chocolate money freely here again, notably for our player plans.

That Ecuador "plays" when, as and if the United States "eats," does not constitute a comparison of tastes in the two countries, the council adds, so much as it reveals anew that foreign trade, after all, is pretty human.

Confectioners in the United States prefer the Ecuador grade of bitter chocolate both for its flavor and because it takes a lot of sugar, and thus enables them to market their sugar at the highest price of candy, according to the council.

Ecuador's principal competitor is the Congo, but the African cacao is called milder and is said to run second with the candy trade. When the World War shut off deep sea transport on the Congo's output was blocked, to the advantage of Ecuador, but it meanwhile piled up in such volume that when ocean communication was opened again after the war it came in a flood and broke the market. Ecuador found its own cacao selling at a loss or not at all, and trade there was brought to a temporary standstill.

In 1920, before the break came, figures show that Ecuador was selling its products in the United States at an annual rate of \$12,244,000, which gave it the money to buy American products at a rate of \$14,480,000. The mutual effect of the slump there was shown in figures for 1921, when Ecuador's exports to the United States fell almost 75 percent to only \$3,541,000, and its imports dropped more than 67 per cent, to \$3,209,000.

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KEEN ORIENTAL WINS IN PACIFIC RACE TO BUY LUSTROUS PEARL

Papeete, Tahiti. — What undoubtedly is the largest and most valuable pearl ever discovered in the South Pacific was brought to Tahiti from the Gambier Islands in January. Its weight is 26 3/4 carats. The coloring is very brilliant, with green and golden hues predominating. One hemisphere of the pearl is marked by two distinct iridescent bands, which give the jewel, on that side, somewhat the appearance of the planet Saturn encompassed by its rings.

When the news of the finding of this pearl reached Tahiti, the European buyers who make Papeete their headquarters during the diving season, chartered schooners to take them to the Gambiers, distant nearly 1,000 miles, only to find on their arrival there that the pearl was at sea in the possession of a Chinese trader, who had purchased it from the native diver and was bringing it to Tahiti. The price was brought to the Tahiti. The price paid to the native is said to have been 110,000 francs. Experts at Papeete who have examined the jewel appraise its value at from 500,000 to 600,000 francs.

An unusual number of fine pearls have been found in the islands during the diving season just passed. Lagoon closed for many years had been opened for diving, and it was from them that the most valuable pearls were taken.

Many years ago the Gambier Islands were a center of great importance in the South Seas. From the lagoons came the most valuable shell and the choicest pearls. That was before the days of restriction on pearl diving, and the lagoons were stripped year after year until they became fished out and trade drifted to other quarters.

During the last 10 or 15 years the Gambiers have been the last visited islands in the eastern Pacific. Before the French took over the islands the natives were ruled by missionaries of the Church of Rome. Under their direction the natives built a cathedral of heavy masonry, the altar of which is inlaid in many designs in mother-of-pearl, the figures of the Virgin and saints being adorned with the finest pearls. In the crown of the Virgin is a priceless pearl, said to be the most beautiful jewel ever found in the South Seas. But rumor has it that long ago the real pearl was taken to Europe and that the pearl now in the cathedral is only an imitation.

About the cathedral are other buildings of massive masonry, a seminary, where all the young women were segregated whenever a ship came to the islands, and other ecclesiastical structures.

But of late years evil days have befallen the Gambiers. The population which was numerous, has been wasted away by tuberculosis and other European diseases until a bare handful of natives remains. The fine buildings are roofless and falling into ruin, and the whole group has an air of desolation.

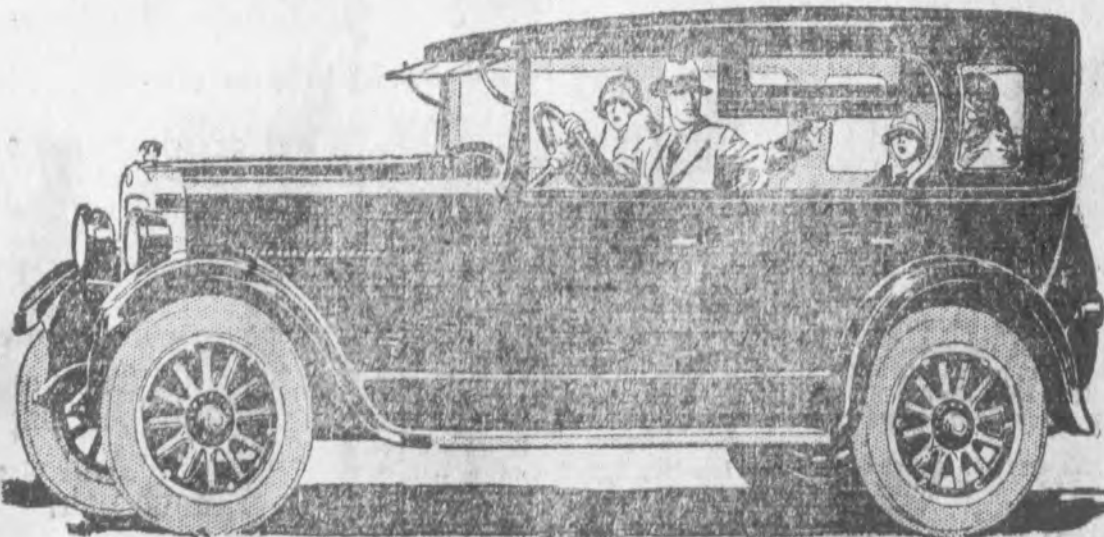

NOTES ON TARHEELIA

Until 1868 the state official corresponding to the auditor was known as the comptroller. The first state auditor was Henderson Adams, who served from 1868 to 1873.

The North Carolina Sanatorium for the Treatment of Tuberculosis was established in 1907. It now has thirty-five buildings, and the plant is valued at \$752,000. There was recently added a building for negro patients, erected at a cost of \$100,000. The sanatorium has had four superintendents, including the incumbent, Dr. P. P. McCain.

North Carolina has ninety-nine furniture factories, with a combined capital stock of \$12,734,849. The value of the plants is \$10,805,400; the value of their yearly output \$41,619,906, and the persons employed receive annually wages totalling \$7,799,901. More than 11,000 persons are on the payrolls of furniture factories in North Carolina. The first governor of North Carolina, then Virginia, was Ralph Lane, who was appointed by Sir Walter Raleigh, who promoted the expedition to Roanoke islands in 1585 and for whom Raleigh is named.

ENGLAND SEEKS IMPROVED METHODS TO SHIP FRUIT

London.—In order to discover the reason for what has been called "brown heart," noted in apples arriving in England from Australia, the Government Food Investigation Board has sent a scientific expedition to Australia. On the journey out English apples were tested, operated upon and vivisectioned on board ship. As a result it was established that "brown heart" appears only in atmospheres containing too much carbon dioxide.

Le Havre. — Every year, before

unusual interest to the ceremony.
The whole town turned out, and the
church of St. Etienne was covered
with flags and bunting and glittered
with lights. The sailors filed rever-
ently up the aisles, accompanied
by the women folk, and the whole
congregation, in picturesque Norman-
dy attire, sang hymns and prayer for
those who go down to the sea in ships.
As part of the ceremony a bluff old

the choir and made an address in
the rough poetic language of the sea-
farers, to which the archbishop re-
plied.

All the fishing fleet in the docks
was gay with flags, their crews gath-

Marseillaise, the sailors cheered, and
the 1925 Newfoundland Banks fish-
ing season was declared open.

State's New Fiscal
Policy Goes Into
Effect on July 1

Raleigh, March 18. — Beginning
with July 1, the date on which the
state's new fiscal policy goes into ef-
fect and the executive budget law
becomes operative, all departments
of the government and institutions
collecting money will be required to
make deposits daily with the state
treasurer.

Heretofore, heads of departments
have been placing funds collected by
them on deposit in various banks
scattered over the state. Reports
were made to the treasurer at cer-
tain intervals.

After July 1, the state treasurer,
under the new system, will be en-
abled to report daily on how much
money the state has to its credit.

On the same date the executive
budget bill will become operative.
Under this new system, its advocates
claim, there will be no reason why
any department or institution should
exceed its allowance. In fact, there
will be no provision for them to do
so.
