FUNERAL SERVICES FOR VICTIMS OF TORNADO NOW BEING CONDUCTED

Latest Casualty List Gives 800 Killed With 3000 Injured; Large Number of Men Engaged in Preparing Graves; General Funeral Services May Be Conducted Sunday

Chicago, March 21.—The casualty table of the Associated Press, prepared at noon today, showed 822 known and estimated dead from Wednesday's tornado, and storm in five mid-western states, and the injured were listed at 3,000.

Chicago, March 21.—The storm swept territory of the Ohio Valley today continued its tragic duty of burying its dead while relief workers completed their task of bringing order out of chaos and plans for rehabilitation were advanced.

Funeral services for some of the victims of Wednesday's storm were held yesterday but most of the burials are arranged for today and Sunday with memorial services to be held later. In towns where the loss of life was the heaviest, community funerals are planned with one great grave.

Reports from the destroyed districts said relief work was well organized. Floods of material continued to pour in for the sufferers of the greatest tornado disaster in American history which snuffed out more than 800 lives, injured 3,000 persons and left entire communities homeless. While some cases of pneumonia were reported from southern Illinois, there is little other illness to add to the storm horror and there is no threat of a tetanus epidemic. 700 units of anti-tetanus serum sent by aeroplane from Indianapolis was available for emergency use.

A few isolated cases of looting came to light but generally there has been no disorder. At West Frankfort a man was caught taking a ring from a woman's finger and was killed by a police officer. Business generally is at a standstill but with the work of clearing the debris in the demolished district proceeding rapidly commercial activities in some communities are expected to be resumed next week.

A re-check of the casualty list early today indicated the death count slightly more than 800. Additions to the list were reported by some towns and subtraction of some duplications left the figures at 809 dead and 2,916 injured. The toll at Murphysboro rose to 201 with the finding of eleven additional bodies while belated reports from rural districts made further additions.

The Red Cross, at St. Louis, today issued an appeal for all sightseers to remain away from the stricken area stating that all available buildings were packed to capacity in taking care of the injured and homeless.

Only a Few Cases Featured This Week's Session Civil Court

Pitt County Superior Court for the trial of civil cases adjourned yesterday. Although the calendar consisted of a large number of cases only a few were disposed of.

Monday's session consisted of compromises, while the case of R. A. Mobley vs. L. R. Whichard, consumed the entire Thursday session. After several hours deliberation the jury returned a verdict in favor of Mr. Whichard. The case grew out of a suit in which Mr. Mobley claimed he gave Mr. Whichard \$200 with which to buy war savings stamps. He claimed that he never received the stamps and that the money was not returned to him. He had no evidence to substantiate his claim while Mr. Whichard declared that Mobley received all the stamps for which he made application.

Only two cases were given a hearing Friday. Judgment was rendered in favor of the plaintiff, John Stoneham in a suit for a note for \$500 against W. W. Moore.

In the case of G. H. Rouse vs. Sam Edwards, in which Rouse was suing for an account which he claimed Edward's tenants owed him, judgment was rendered in favor of the defendant.

Forty Children Were Killed by Tornado West Frankfort

West Frankfort, Ill., March 21.—One of the most striking features of the tornado here was the large portion of women and children that were killed. More than 1,500 coal miners were working beneath the surface of the devastated area, and thus escaped injuries or death. Nearly 40 of the dead in West Frankfort were small children. On the heart rendering scenes after the disaster was the long row in the morgue of little bodies, from which life had been snapped almost in the twinkling of an eye. West Frankfort and other stricken communities in Frankfort county were busy today going about the burying of the 163 citizens who were killed in the tornado.

Davidson Man Injured in Auto Wreck Dies Today

High Point, N. C., March 21.—Ivey Lanier, 50 years old, who was injured in an automobile on the Thomasville Highway, three miles from here last night, died in a local hospital this morning at 6:00 o'clock. Lanier, who resides in Davidson county, was returning to his home when the automobile in which he was riding collided with a car driven by Samuel Tucker, of this city. Tucker was arrested and later released, under a \$5,000 bond on a charge of manslaughter. He is said to have been driving his automobile at a rapid rate in attempting to pass another machine when the fatal accident occurred.

Applications for Official Executioner Being Received

Raleigh, March 20.—Applications for the job as official executioner at the state's prison continue to come in. The fee that can be paid, under the new law authorizing the appointment of an electric chair operator, is \$25 for each execution. Up until a few days ago there had not been an application for the place. Publication of this fact brought many applications.

The next electrocution at the state's prison is scheduled to take place March 26. Whether the new executioner will have been appointed at that time is not known. Execution for hanging in North Carolina went into effect in 1909 there have been, according to Warden S. J. Busbee, about 65 to pay the death penalty. These executions were all performed by the late J. P. Sale and the present warden, Mr. Busbee. Former Warden Sale died following a double execution, having succumbed to heart failure.

Under the new law, the duties incident to electrocutions will pass from the warden, who has heretofore been performing them.

PETULANT BRITON ADVISES OVERLORDS OF HOLLYWOOD

London.—In penance for his sins, or perhaps just for the fun of it, a Briton by the name of B. Southcombe has "seen all the leading moving picture films that have come to Europe during the last 15 years." He has some suggestions to make for the Hollywood and Long Island producers. If the suggestions go unheeded, Mr. Southcombe firmly expects to see Germany beat America in the movie business within five years.

Here is Mr. Southcombe's advice to the movie magnates of America: "1. Great Britain is tired of scenes in which hotel waiters are shot dead because the eggs are spoiled too hard. "2. In Europe no right-thinking man ever goes out in a straw hat with evening dress. "3. We are tired of pictures showing a man hanging on a scaffold in Broadway. "4. Cut out all cinema artists with horn-rimmed glasses. No more dining saloons with the made-up blacked Edward's tenants owed him, waiter. "5. No motor-cars in films that date back 50 years."

ONE WAY IN WHICH BRITISH PARLIAMENT WASTES TIME

London.—Members of the British parliament who have telephones in their homes were somewhat startled recently when they ascertained that, because of the instruments, they might be deprived of their seat in the house. They are asking whether they have committed a breach of the famous act of George the Third's parliament, which says that any person undertaking a contract with a government department shall not be entitled to sit in the house. The telephones here are owned and operated by the government.

The question was brought to light by Captain T. J. O'Connor, himself a member of parliament and having a telephone in his office, who announced that he would ask the attorney general if he proposed to introduce legislation to safeguard members who have contracts with the postmaster-general for the installation of telephone services.

IRELAND REPORTS GOOD HEALTH AND INCREASING POPULATION NOW

Dublin.—According to the official figures of the registrar general of the Irish Free State the year 1923 was the healthiest ever known in Ireland. The marriage and birth rates increased and the death rate decreased. The death rate was 13.34 a thousand as compared with 15.89 for the ten years average 1913-1922. The births numbered 61,690, of which 31,285 were boys and 29,405 girls. The estimated population there has been no regular census since 1811—is 13,160,000.

STONE APPOINTED EXECUTIONER TODAY

**Guard at State Prison to
Serve as Temporary
Official Executioner
for State Penitentiary**

Raleigh, March 21.—Joe Stone, of Robeson county, guard at State Prison, was today appointed by Warden Busbee as temporary official executioner for the penitentiary.

Stone received his appointment under the law passed by the 1925 General Assembly which gives the executive \$25 a head for each man executed by him. Albert Hardee, also of Robeson county, will be the first man executed under the new law his electrocution being set for March 26.

Mrs. George Whitehurst Buried Last Wednesday At Family Burial Place

Grimesland, N. C., March 21.—The body of Mrs. George Anna Whitehurst, beloved woman who died early Wednesday morning, was laid to rest Thursday in the family cemetery by the grave of her first husband, B. F. Anderson who died more than 20 years ago.

The services were held at the home at one o'clock by Mr. R. F. Pittman, pastor of the Free Will Baptist Church, of which she was a member. Mrs. Whitehurst was 62 years of age at the time of her death which occurred at the home of her sister, Mrs. W. P. Buck, with whom she had made her home for 2 years, since the death of her last husband Richard R. Whitehurst.

Floral tributes were of unusual beauty and there was a large gathering at the grave to witness the last rites of the highly respected woman. Mrs. Whitehurst is survived by one sister, Mrs. W. P. Buck, of Grimesland and one brother, Mr. John House of Greenville, N. C., and many nieces and nephews.

DECLARES "IROLINE" CHEAPEST SUBSTITUTE GASOLINE YET TRIED

Paris, March 21.—Remarkable clause in the making of a new automobile fuel, Iroline, which is known to have for its basis a solution of sugar, is said to cost less and go farther than any of the other so called substitutes for gasoline yet tried.

A body of prominent automobile engineers, who tested the new fuel on a long run in an ordinary machine, is quoted as expressing themselves as astounded by the results. The Iroline used in the test was made the night before by the chemist who discovered it is his own kitchen. The only modification made in the automobile was the attachment of a vaporizer to the exhaust pipe.

Training School for S. S. Teachers to Be Held in Gastonia

Gastonia, March 20.—The program has been announced for the Gaston County Co-operative Standard Training School for Sunday school teachers, to be held in this city, March 29, April 3. General courses will be offered by a faculty in charge of the Rev. C. S. Kirkpatrick, the Rev. Claude T. Carr and the Rev. Dr. G. F. Bell.

Special courses are to be taught by Mrs. E. R. Michaux, Mrs. W. B. Ferguson and others. The training school is conducted by Methodist, Presbyterian, and Associate Reformed Presbyterian churches.

Charlotte, N. C., March 21.—Announcement has been made that Senator William E. Borah, of Idaho, will speak here during the Mecklenburg celebration on May 20.

TURKEY AND BULGARIA LOOK TO BETTER TRADE

Constantinople.—Negotiations are to be resumed without delay at Angora for the restoration of friendly and commercial relations between Bulgaria and Turkey. Simeon Radeff, the Bulgarian plenipotentiary, before his recent departure for Angora, said:

"The work of restoring diplomatic relations between Turkey and my country already has made much progress. Important details now engage my attention.

"As neighboring states, Turkey and Bulgaria have many economic interests in common. It is my task to co-operate in the arrangement of a mutual agreement for the furthering of these interests, which are vital to both countries.

"Although Bulgaria is only partly an industrial state, with manufacturing interests, she is able to supply Turkey with some manufactured articles, notably textiles. On the other hand, Bulgaria needs many natural products coming from Turkey. Of natural products Bulgaria can supply Turkey with wheat, cattle and sheep."

DEFICIT OF STATE SHOWN IN REPORT IS \$10,251,660.57

**Total Debt, Bonded and
Funded of 113 Mil-
lions Also Recorded;
Operating Deficit
From July to February
\$3,566,940.28**

Raleigh, March 21.—The deficit in the general fund of the State of North Carolina which was reported as \$8,569,480.28 on July 1, 1924 had increased to \$10,251,660.57 on February 28, 1925 according to a statement issued last night by Governor McLean on the basis of figures submitted to him by the State Treasurer and Auditor.

In addition, according to the statement, the state had on that date a total bonded and current indebtedness of \$113,868,000. This figure includes \$10,000,000 borrowed to take care of the deficit in the general fund.

The figures issued last night show that the State's fiscal deficit was cared for by short term financing to the amount of \$10,000,000, and by a transfer from the special funds of the state to the general fund of \$251,660.57. The total disbursement of the state from the general fund for the period of July 1, 1924 to Feb. 28, 1925 were \$7,822,284.97, while the total receipts for the same period were \$4,255,344.49, showing an operating deficit during the eight month period of \$3,566,940.28. This added to the deficit reported as of last July 1st, brought the total deficit to \$10,251,660.57. The deficit for the month of February 1925 alone was \$812,175.55, according to the statement.

The statement showed that on February 28, 1925 the State in short term notes \$20,000,000, divided as follows:

General fund \$10,000,000; Highway fund \$5,000,000; special school building fund \$500,000.

Outstanding bond issued and funded indebtednesses total \$93,868,000, divided as follows:

General fund \$29,315,400; Special school building fund \$5,000,000.

The total of short term obligations and the bond obligations brought the total state debt on Feb. 28, 1925 to a grand total of \$113,868,000.

Faiman Continues To Testify Against William Shepherd

Chicago, March 21.—Testimony that William D. Shepherd, under indictment charged with the murder by Typhoid germs inoculation of his foster son William Nathan McClintock, millionaire orphan, had said he would have the McClintock will drawn to suit himself, was given at a bail hearing today by Charles C. Faiman, indicted with Shepherd.

Faiman said that Shepherd had agreed to give him \$100,000 when he had completed the big deal, which the witness told him was working on. He said that this "big deal" was said by Shepherd to relate to the McClintock estate.

Youth Dies From Self Administered Dose of Poison

Wake Forest, March 21.—John M. Brewer, Jr., 17 year old son of John M. Brewer, recently appointed member of the directors of the State Prison, died here this morning as the results of a self administered dose of poison at his home here today. The body was found lying on the floor at noon, and he died two hours later without giving any reason for taking the poison. He told his father that he had taken the poison, but became unconscious before he could say anything further about his condition.

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ATTACKING THE SENATE

The inaugural address of Vice President Dawes, vigorously dissenting from the established customs of the senate aroused, it is said, deep feeling among the senators. Prominent Republicans are quoted as declaring that present prospects for reform have been destroyed. The Democrats were not so reticent in expressing their disapproval of his attack.

The important thing is public opinion, and from this angle, we are inclined to think that the majority of the voters agree with the vice president in stressing the need for reform, although doubting the efficacy of the effort by Mr. Dawes.

With the senate clearly in the public mind and its customs under attack, the country has witnessed a distinct clash between the President and the upper house over the matter of appointments. The rejection of Mr. Warren, named for attorney general, was repeated when his name was resubmitted. Shortly thereafter the President resubmitted to the senate the name of Mr. Woodlock, for the Interstate Commerce Commission, in spite of a previous rejection by the senate.

The issue raised by the renominations has

been discussed throughout the country. As a general rule there should be no question of the right of the President to name his own cabinet, and his right has been rarely questioned. Yet, the constitution requires that they be appointed "by and with the advice and consent of the senate." If this part of the constitution means anything it means that the Senators, upon proper occasions in their opinion, shall refuse to confirm those nominated, and that the President shall not appoint such persons.

The marvelous feature of our governmental system, to many minds, is the wonderful balance preserved as a safeguard against encroachment. The rights, duties and privileges of each of the three departments are zealously guarded. While there may arise conflicts from this phase of our government, and while one, or the other, department may act unwisely towards the others, the basic soundness of the balance provided is by no means disproven.

A DAY'S DISASTER

The newspapers of the world this week heralded three widely separated disasters. Peru reported that its third largest city had "been completely destroyed by inundations caused by torrential rains." Japan reported that its capital, not yet rebuilt on the ruins of the late earthquake, suffered the loss of 3,000 buildings in a fire which left 20,000 people homeless. In our country a bouncing twisting tornado, sweeping through five states, wiped out towns and killed hundreds of people.

The average reader hardly realizes the tragic seriousness of such major disasters, blithely unconscious that his town may be the next to suffer severely. Of all the disasters mentioned above our heart goes out most to the victims of the unknown and terrifying power of the wind. Its suddenness, its appalling efficiency in destruction, and the inability of man to meet its blow with any counter-stroke combine to make it the most awesome of the terrors by which peaceful families are without warning swept into the great beyond.

Notes on Tarhelia

There have been since its establishment, five presidents of the North Carolina College of Agriculture and Engineering, formerly the "A. & M." College. The incumbent, Dr. E. C. Brooks, elected in 1923, was preceded by Dr. Alexander Q. Holliday, 1889-1909; Dr. George Taylor Winston, 1899-1908; Dr. Daniel Harvey Hill, 1908-1916, and Dr. W. C. Riddick, 1908-1923.

Seventeen tobacco factories doing business in North Carolina in 1924 reported the value of manufactured products at \$251,555,165. The total value of these plants is \$50,198,170, with an annual payroll of \$14,172,446. The number of persons employed is 9,247. The wage scale runs from \$4.51 daily down to \$1.43 daily.

There are five members of the State Board of Commissioners of Navigation and Pilotage. They are appointed by the governor for terms of four years each. Four have to be residents of New Hanover county. The State Board of Vocational Education is composed of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, the ex-officio executive officer, and three members appointed by the governor. Their terms are four years.

There are ten woolen mills in North Carolina, with a total capital stock of \$1,898,000. They employ 19,564 spinners, 649 looms and 649 and 66 cards, besides other minor accessories. Employed in these mills are 1,557 persons. Their annual output is valued at \$3,722,300.

One hundred and thirty-one knitting mills in North Carolina report a total capital stock of \$33,994,485. They use annually 34,062,705 pounds of raw material annually and their output is valued at \$29,058,702. They employ 208,948 spinners and 19,898 knitting machines and afford work for most than 12,000 persons.

There have been twenty-one state treasurers of North Carolina since 1784. The incumbent, B. R. Lacy has already served longer than any one of his predecessors except one. He was elected to office in 1900 and assumed his duties in 1901. John Haywood served from 1787 to 1827. Governor A. W. McLean is the first chief executive of North Carolina ever elected from Robeson county. There have been, however, many from the eastern section of the state.

CHINESE STUDENTS RESENT CONTROL BY FOREIGNERS

Foochow. — To forestall a proposed strike by students, the Anglo-Chinese college, a middle school here, supported by the Methodist Episcopal church, has been closed, the faculty declaring that it intends to maintain control rather than surrender to student domination even if it results in permanent dissolution of the school.

The proposal to strike was the result of the faculty's refusal to observe a holiday which none of the government schools in Foochow recognize.

The school has recently made long strides in the direction of Chinese control. Fifteen months ago there were 15 foreigners on the staff. Now there are only five, the places of the others having been filled by Chinese of similar educational standards. In addition both deans are now Chinese. One of the latter was stabbed last spring, supposedly by students who were angered by one of his rulings. The students in their propaganda are promoting an anti-Christian sentiment.

ARGENTINA PREPARING FOR BOOM IN OIL FIELDS

Buenos Aires. — The satisfactory results obtained by the state owned petroleum wells in 1924 has encouraged the government to give additional impulse to boring in 1925. In the Comodoro Rivadavia field alone 156 wells will be sunk this year, while in the Salta and Jujuy oil fields a considerable number of borings will be begun.

In other respects also great strides will be made, especially in the installation of refineries, the most important of which, at La Plata, is fast approaching completion.

MUSIC OF OLD MASTERS ON RARE INSTRUMENTS WILL FEATURE FESTIVAL

Haslemere, Eng. — A festival of the chamber music of the sixteenth, seventeenth and eighteenth centuries is being arranged for August at Haslemere, where instruments will be used representing those of olden times. The festival is to be staged by Arnold Dolmetsch who with other members of his family and pupils will play numerous rare instruments.

PESTIFEROUS JACK RABBITS YIELD PROFITS AFTER DEMISE

Cordova, Alaska. — Washington
and other states of the Union might
profit from the jack rabbit pest if
they killed the animals, powdered the
meat and sold it to Alaska for farm-
ers to use as feed, in the opinion of
J. Williamson, owner of the largest
farm along the Russian River on the
Kenai peninsula.

More than 5,000 rabbits were
slaughtered by Williamson last win-
ter. The meat was ground, placed
on racks over a stove where it was
dried, and then pulverized and stored
in sacks.

The rabbit powder was mixed with
water and vegetables, boiled and
served to foxes during the summer,
making an agreeable change of diet
from fish and porcupine.

Another form of preserving the
meat is to pack it when fresh into
five gallon oil cans. About 35 rab-
bits are put into one can. Water is
poured over the meat and the can
set outdoors until its contents freeze.
The can is then thawed loose and
removed from the block containing
the meat. The block is stored in ice
houses that prevent it thawing un-
til feeding time in summer.

DUTIES AT OXFORD SIT LIGHTLY UPON VENERABLE HEADS

Oxford, Eng. — The twentieth cen-
tury fashion of raising young men
to high places has as yet found no
champions in Oxford. The average
age of the present heads of col-
leges is just under 70 years, despite
a number of recent elections. A
master once lived to somewhat over
100, and several heads who are now
well on in the eighties are ambitious
of bettering his record. The prodig-
ious age and spryness of these very
learned men proves the error of the
old monastic founder who, with a be-
lief that a sane mind could not exist
in a sound body, are said to have
picked upon Oxford as the most un-
healthy town of their acquaintance.

The duties of an Oxford College
head are neither onerous nor agitat-
ing. He personally admits all new
undergraduates once a year, and be-
sides that sees very little of them.
Heads of colleges are not called upon
to teach or to lecture, they do not
speak at Rotary Club lunches, or
indulge in frenzied financing cam-
paigns.

Curiously enough, these men who
have so little to do in managing
their respective colleges, have every-
thing to do in the administration of
the university. While they dispute
with the university and deny its
powers and authority and objects to
its schemes, the fact remains that
they are, for all practical purposes,
the university themselves. Meeting
in solemn and heavy convocation
business, choose the university pro-
fessors and elect one another in turn
to the office of vice-chancellor, an
annually created office analogous to
the presidency of a great American
university.
