ROTARIANS HOLD ENJOYABLE MEET HERE LAST NIGHT

Club Members Will Leave Tomorrow to Attend District Conference in Richmond

Last night's meeting of the local Rotary Club included final arrangements for attending the District Conference in Richmond this week, completion of plans for the coming track meet and was featured by short addresses by two of the Rotarians together with remarks by some of the guests present.

Following the evening meal J. H. Rose, chairman of the Boys' Work Committee and in charge of the Pitt County Track Meet which is to be held at the Pitt County Fair Grounds here April 6, made a report on the preliminary contests held last Friday afternoon throughout the county and appointed assistants to aid in handling the contests and crowds here on the day of the meet. Chairman Rose declared that the results of the preliminaries indicated much closer contests in this year's meet than heretofore and also that the enthusiasm being displayed throughout the county pointed to larger attendance than ever before.

D. L. Turnage, chairman of the "On-to-Richmond" committee reported that twenty one of the local members had signed their intentions of attending the Richmond meet. Other members indicated that they may decide at the last minute to make the trip so no doubt, as heretofore, the Greenville club will be well represented at the conference. Several of the Rotary-Anns will also attend the conference.

The two program addresses of the evening were delivered by K. B. Pace and D. D. Overton. Dr. Pace spoke on the "Aims, Accomplishments and Obligations of Rotary" while Mr. Overton's subject was "Why I Came to Greenville and Something About My Business." Both these addresses were full of real Rotary and held the attention of all those present.

Judge M. V. Barnhill, of Rocky Mount, and Rotarian Henry R. Brown, of Greenville, Tenn., two of the guests of the club made short talks in which they complimented the club on its real Rotary spirit and expressed enjoyment at being present.

"North Carolina Boll Weevil Program '25" Bulletin Is Issued

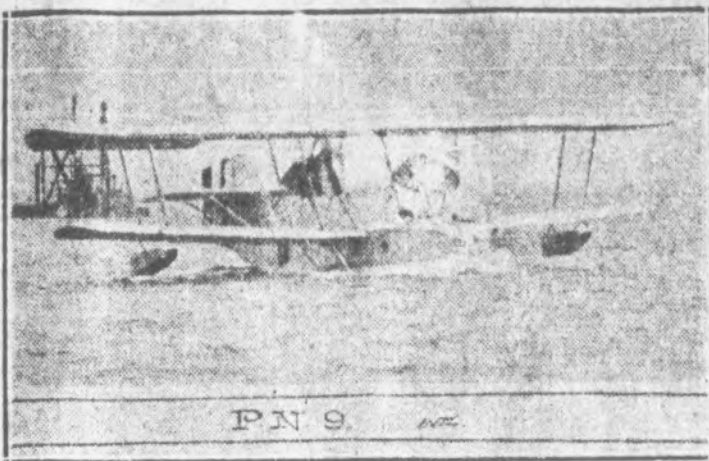
Raleigh, March 24.—To help farmers, bankers and other business men to thoroughly understand the boll weevil situation in North Carolina and to meet the menace of the boll weevil during the coming season, the Agricultural Extension Service of the State College has issued Extension Bulletin No. 17, entitled "North Carolina Boll Weevil Program For 1925." About 50,000 copies have been printed and will be distributed to county agents and through them to farmers and business men residing in the counties in which they are employed.

The folder contains facts about the boll weevil's damage to cotton farming and its resulting effect upon business interests in the years following complete infestation of a state.

This information was prepared by J. O. Schaud, director of the extension service, and is based on figures secured from crop reports each year. In addition, the folder gives technical facts about growing cotton under boll weevil conditions and shows how the weevil may be fought directly with poison by other means.

The State College is anxious to get copies of these folders into the hands of all farm leaders in the cotton section of the state. Bankers and business men having dealings with farmers are requested by the department to secure copies. The folder is free and is being distributed through F. H. Jeter, at Raleigh.

Ready for Cross Pacific Flight



The new giant navy ship, the P.N. 9, will fly from San Francisco to Honolulu in the joint maneuvers of the combined Atlantic and Pacific battle fleets, which opens April 12. DEFENSE ARGUMENT COMMISSION WILL IN TEA POT DOME CONSIDER DISPOSAL SUIT MADE TODAY OF MUSCLE SHOALS

Government Alleges President to Appoint Commission Which Will Possibly Include a Cabinet Officer

Cheyenne, Wyo., March 24.—The defense argument in the Teapot Dome Lease Annulment suit was made in Federal Court here today. John W. Lacey, counsel for Harry F. Sinclair, and the Mammoth Oil Company consumed the greater part of the day in defending the contract between Sinclair and Albert B. Fall, former secretary of the Interior. The government alleges that the contract was executed in secrecy and with fraud. Mr. Lacey, before beginning his argument, said he would cover the case from many angles. Martin W. Littleton, and George P. Hoover, of the defense, have yet to present their argument, and the government has rebuttals statements to make.

Shepherd's Case Will Probably Be With the Judge This Afternoon

Chicago, March 24.—William D. Shepherd, indicted on charges of killing with typhoid germs, his foster son, William N. McIntock, whose \$1,000,000 fortune he inherited, may know before night whether he remains in jail, or is freed on bail, while he awaits trial. With hearing resumed today before Judge Hopkins it was said that the case probably would be with the Judge by late this afternoon for his decision as to bail.

Pres. Awaits Decision of Woodlock Before Filling Vacancy

Washington, March 24.—President Coolidge intends to ascertain whether Thomas F. Woodlock, of New York, will accept a recess appointment as a member of the Interstate Commerce Committee before reaching a decision as to what steps should be taken to fill the vacancy by the resignation of Commissioner Potter.

Mr. Woodlock's nomination was twice transmitted to the Senate, but in neither instance was any action taken. If he accepts a recess appointment, he will be obligated to serve on the commission during congressional recess without pay.

Officials Present Argument in Favor Appropriation Bill

Washington, March 24.—A group of National Guard Officials presented to President Coolidge today their argument, why the \$1,332,000 carried in the deficiency appropriation bill for National Guard drill pay should be allowed. The President has ordered the appropriation with held until he can ascertain the necessity of it. The President was told that unless the money is made available for expenditures during the remainder of the fiscal year, drills of National Guard men in several states will be interfered with, and in many states will have to be dispensed with altogether.

Reports That Cabinet Officers Will Retire Was Denied Today

Washington, March 24.—Widely published reports that several cabinet officers were soon to retire, were denied today at the White House. President Coolidge had not been informed that any member of his Cabinet expected to resign, and he believes the present membership will remain unchanged.

Witness Says Bennett Had Made Statement Against Mrs. Hoffman

Chattanooga, Tenn., March 24.—Testifying in the trial of William H. Bennett and his wife, Mrs. Mae Bennett, charged with the murder of Miss Augusta Hoffman, Henry A. Parker today stated that Bennett would never see the woman again. Bennett also said, the witness testified, that Miss Hoffman "stirred up a row all the time." On cross examination, Parker said, he had never observed any intimation of a row between the Bennetts and Miss Hoffman.

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IRISH ISLANDERS SUFFER AS STORMS SWEEP COAST

Tralle, Kerry Ireland, March 24.—The inhabitants of the Inagett Islands, off the coast who ran short of food recently during the gales which swept over this part of the world, lit bonfires at night as signals of distress. The fires were seen by people along the coast and life savers were sent to the rescue. The islanders who were able to travel, were brought to the mainland, and food was sent to those who remained behind. A bad fishing season, due mainly to the stormy weather, was the principal cause of the distress among the island inhabitants.

NOTORIOUS ROBBER GOES ON TRIAL FOR LIFE THIS MORNING

Gerald Chapman Charged With Murder of James Kelly Carried From State's Prison to Court Room Heavily Guarded

Hartford, Conn., March 24.—Gerald Chapman, picturesque mail robber and jail breaker, went to trial for his life in Hartford county Superior Court this morning. The mail robber is to be tried on indictment charging him with the murder of a policeman, James G. Skelly, last October 12.

A community tense with expectation of a "great show" had awaited the trial for several days, and the court room was crowded this morning when the jail breaker was led into the court room. Elaborate preparations were taken to conduct him from the State's prison at Wethersfield, four miles from here. He was heavily shackled, and transported in a motor car with heavily armed guards. Another car with deputies followed close behind. Chapman's array, of five counsels, said they would submit to Judge Jennings a challenge on a jury panel attacking the personal of 150 talismen chosen. They insisted that there were too few city men in the panel. The rural jurors, Frederick J. Groch, one of the lawyers said, would be influenced by the flood of publicity given the case during the case few weeks, and would be less open-minded than their city brothers. The state, it was said, will produce about 60 witnesses. Two of the principal witnesses expected will be Walter E. Shean, who was also concerned in the New Britain Department store robbery, which ended in Skelly's death, and Alfred E. Atwater, one of Skelly's brother patrolmen. Shean, who is the son of a prominent hotel owner of Springfield, Mass., said that Chapman had been his accomplice and was actually the murderer of Skelly. Atwater later identified Chapman as the man he had seen fire the fatal shot at Skelly.

SUGGESTS DEFINITE STEPS TOWARD AN ARMS CONFERENCE

Work as President Coolidge Sees it Divides Itself Into Two Important Phases

Washington, March 24.—President Coolidge has suggested to Secretary Kellogg that certain definite preliminary steps be taken toward laying the ground work for a Naval Limitations Conference.

Conversations thus far between the President and the Secretary of State have been limited to a general outline of the situation. Mr. Kellogg has had no opportunity to take up with Naval experts, as he expects to do, the practical possibility of a future limitation upon cruisers, aircraft, and other naval auxiliary craft.

The work as the President sees it, divides itself into two phases.

CABINET MEMBERS PREDICT CONTINUANCE BUSINESS PROSPERITY

Washington, March 24.—Cabinet members at today's regular session with President Coolidge were asked to give him a summary of their views on business situations, and they agreed generally in predicting a continuance of business prosperity.

WORK OF REBUILDING TORNADO STRICKEN AREA PROGRESSING

Drive for Relief Funds Continues and is Increasing Daily; Section Humming With Industry as Work of Rehabilitation Continues

Chicago, March 24.—Southern Illinois, Indiana, and other states in the path of last Wednesday's tornado, hummed with industry today as the work of rebuilding, and restoring progressed. Warm sunny weather prevailed in most of the stricken territory as carpenters applied their hammers and saws on new dwellings, and relief work continued.

Danger of epidemic was lessened today as sanitary measures were effected. Water supplies in the stricken communities were watched, and a supply of diphtheria anti-toxin was rushed to Carbondale, the relief center. Doctors reported the weather had decreased the fear of the extension of diseases. The drive for relief funds continues and is increasing hourly. Chicago expected to raise its quota of \$500,000 within 48 hours. Another \$500,000 was provided when Illinois legislation passed an Emergency Relief Bill. From Washington, it was announced, that the Chamber of Commerce of the United States and The Red Cross had arranged for commercial organizations to turn over to the Red Cross all relief contributions.

Washburn Resigns as Minister to Austria

Vienna, March 24.—Albert H. Washburn has tendered his resignation as United States Minister to Austria, it became known here today.

VASSAR REPORTS RADICAL CHANGES IN LAST DECADE

Poughkeepsie, N. Y., March 24.—Ten years have wrought vast changes in the characteristics of Vassar college students, charts prepared by the college officers show. In 1910 a total of 58 per cent of the students prepared for Vassar in public high schools and only 42 per cent in private schools. By 1920 the public schools were furnishing 35 per cent.

MRS. DENNISTOUN WINS SUIT AGAINST DIVORCED HUSBAND

Plaintiff Is Awarded Judgment of Nearly \$25,000 With Support to Be Given in Accordance With Her Means

London, March 24.—A judgment in favor of Mrs. Dorothy Muriel Dennistoun was rendered this afternoon by a jury in her suit against her former husband, Colonel Ian Onslow Dennistoun, for money she claimed she had loaned him.

The jury also found that the support to be given her was to vary in accordance with Mrs. Dennistoun's means, and Colonel Dennistoun was only bound to assist her when the necessity arose; nor was he bound to support her if she became the wife or mistress of a Spaniard Bolin, of the wife of a rich man.

The consideration for the agreement, the jury said, was Mrs. Dennistoun's abstention from claiming maintenance or alimony, before the French court at the time of the divorce. The jury also found that Colonel Dennistoun, before issuance of the writ in the case, was financially able to support his former wife.

Revenue Collected Since January First Totals \$3,358,336.41

Raleigh, March 24.—State Revenue collections for 1925 to date are approximately \$317,000 under what they were on March 3, 1924, it was announced by Commissioner Ruf. A. Doughton today. Collections last year between Jan. 1, and March 24, totaling \$3,675,664.62 as compared with \$3,358,336.41 for the corresponding period this year. Commissioner Doughton attributed the slump to the falling off of income taxes from cotton mills. Industrial incomes have held up, and so have incomes for railroads and other sources, but the cotton mill industry is perceptibly shy in its 1925 return.

Golf Tournament At Club Wednesday

A local golf tournament will be held at the Country Club on Wednesday afternoon and will be followed by a barbecue supper served at the club house. A great deal of interest has been manifested by the members in club tournaments and it is expected that a number of players will participate. The tournament will be a Sweepstakes and every member of the club has an equal opportunity regardless of experience or ability as a player. Play will begin at two o'clock but matches can be arranged to start to suit the convenience of the players, it only being necessary to complete the full eighteen holes.

REV. J. W. KINCHELOE PREACHES STRONG SERMON "REVIVALS"

Services in Memorial Baptist Church Largely Attended; Rev. R. E. Pittman Conducts Song Service

The revival services which are in progress in the Memorial Baptist Church were largely attended last night, and the Rev. J. W. Kincheloe, pastor of the First Baptist Church, of Rocky Mount, preached a strong sermon on revivals, taking for his text, Psalm 85-6. "Wilt thou not revive us again; that thy people may rejoice in thee?" The Rev. R. F. Pittman conducted the song service which proved an attractive feature of the services.

In the beginning of his sermon Mr. Kincheloe showed how revivals had been asked for and conducted long before the birth of Christ up to the present time. In a most interesting manner he told of how Luther's reformation shook Germany from its center to its circumference and how the echoes of that revival are still ringing throughout the world. In developing his sermon the speaker showed how the origin of the Methodist and Presbyterian churches was the direct results of the great revival movements of Bronx and the West. Other churches including the Baptist have been started by revivals in an indirect manner. "Nearly every person who has made a profession of faith has made it as a result of a revival," declared Mr. Kincheloe.

He then told of how he was converted and of the happiness which he has received in the years in which he has been serving God.

The public is cordially invited to attend the services.

Plans for Duke's Building Program Be Announced Soon

Durham, March 24.—Complete plans for Duke University's \$6,000,000 building program are to be announced before commencement in June, it has been learned here.

Owing to the size of the program, architects, engineers and officials are, of necessity, required to draw up the plans with utmost care, it is pointed out.

As the program will cover a period of several years, there must be no flaws. While it will take several years to complete the actual construction work in contemplation, the result of this building activity must cover a period of twenty years or more, it is said.

It is, therefore, with care and deliberation, that the architects and officials of the University are co-operating in the undertaking.

Just when the plans will be announced has not yet been stated. The few who are conversant with details arrived at up to the present have made no announcements so far.

Never before have plans been formulated for the expenditure of \$6,000,000 outright by a North Carolina institution and no little interest is being shown in Duke University's plans.

It has been stated, however, that two more months may be required to perfect the hundreds of blue prints which are to describe the University's physical equipment.

WIDOWS ADD NEW BURDEN TO PATIENT TAXPAYERS

London, March 24.—British war widows seem loath to take unto themselves a husband for the second time and, because of this coyness, the British taxpayers has to suffer.

When the ministry of pensions submitted its budget in March, 1924, for the amount of money to be paid in pensions to war widows, it estimated that seven per cent of them would remarry during the year. Unfortunately the calculations were wrong. For, up to the present time, only four per cent have declared their widowhood. Consequently the exchequer has had to grant an extra \$10,000,000 to pay their pensions.

WHY HE IS A MEMBER

Some weeks ago W. O. Saunders, then editor of the Elizabeth City Independent, wrote an article for Collier's on "Why I Am Not a Church Member," which created deep interest throughout the country. Mr. Saunders fell into the common error of blaming inconsistent Christians and justifying his failure to join the best of them in making church members true disciples of Christ. His indictment of members of the church who do not walk in the light was true as to many, more's the pity. But the man who stands on the side and blames the pitcher rarely improves the game. If he is an athlete he should get in the game, and the challenge of the Bible to mankind is to put on "the breastplate of righteousness."

Prizes were offered for the best reply to Mr. Saunders' challenge on "Why I Am Not" and "Why I Am a Church Member." One thousand one hundred and thirteen were in favor of church membership and 401 approving the position taken by Mr. Saunders in his article. The prize for the best answer on

"Why I Am a Church Member" closed in this brief summary:

"I, too, have been dragged through irreligious revival meetings as a boy. I, too, once left the church. I, too, reread the words of Jesus. I, too, see the church's weakness. I am a man, however, and a part of the world as it is, a recipient of its benefits as well as its problems. It is because of this I say—'Give me a job—in the best institution for good in the world, the church. Give me a job,' I say, 'let me help lift.' That's why I am a member of the church."

The writer sees that, with its slow advance because of the imperfections and narrow vision of its members, the church is "the best institution for good in the world," and instead of standing on the side-lines, he wishes to take his part and help secure strength and power by association with those who are seeking the Way, the Truth, and the Life.—The News & Observer.

ELECTRICITY TO CHEAPEN BUILDING

Electricity is responsible, perhaps more than any other one thing, for improved methods of building construction, making easier the burden of our workers and decreasing costs of production.

The American Society of Mechanical Engineers and others interested predict that the din of the steel riveter on building girders may soon give way to the flame of the electric arc, and the steel skeleton of the future skyscraper may be a single, welded unit.

Decreased cost, greater strength and lighter materials are all factors in the welded building that will, it is said, bring about the adoption of the new method of erection. Steel parts will be cut to pattern, much as a tailor cuts the parts of a coat, but without the necessity for the precise accuracy needed when lines of rivet holes must be matched.

The cost of drilling thousands of rivet holes will be saved; the strength of an arc weld is equal to that of the parts welded, and a welded joint is impervious to water, oil or gas, while the expense of welding is said to be only three-fourths that of riveting.
