PERRY RESIGNS AS HEAD OF LENOIR RHYNE COLLEGE

Gives No Reason for His Action But Friction Among Members of Faculty Believed to Be the Cause

Hickory, N. C., March 26.—With the resignation of Dr. John C. Perry, as President of Lenoir-Rhyne College announced yesterday, there came to light today a long story connected with Dr. Frank C. Longaker, who is charged by members of the faculty with having gained his diploma through the Potomac University, which is listed as a "Diploma Mill." Dr. Longaker is secretary of the faculty at Lenoir-Rhyne. Resignation of Dr. Perry was announced yesterday morning at Chapel exercises, and it came as a bolt out of a clear sky to the student body. Dr. Perry has made no announcement of his plans, and there has been no mention of his successor. The fight now is centered around Dr. Longaker.

Several months ago, the Catalogue Committee called on President Perry, and requested that the P. H. degree be left off the name of Dr. Longaker in the Catalogue. The President took the matter up with Dr. Longaker, it is claimed, and it was agreed that the degree should be left out of the catalogue. Following this, it is charged by members of the committee, that Dr. Longaker got in conference with the Reverend William A. Deaton, pastor of the West Hickory Lutheran Church, who is a member of the Board of Trustees, and that with the help of several other directors called on Dr. Perry and demanded that the degree be left in the catalogue. Dr. Perry, in response, gave no reason for his action.

Charles Will Not Be Electrocuted

Raleigh, March 26.—Albert Charles, 18 year old negro, convicted of first degree murder in Robeson county, and sentenced to the day, was snatched from the chair by Executive Clemency, this morning shortly before the hour appointed for the execution. The Governor in granting the prisoner a commutation to life imprisonment, stated that he had been informed that the youth was mentally irresponsible.

DETROIT DAILY WILL MOVE INTO NEW HOME IN JUNE

Detroit.—On a site that once was part of the old Fort Shelby military reservation, but now is in the heart of Detroit's downtown business district, is nearing completion a new 14-story building, the new home of the Detroit Free Press. Detroit's oldest daily newspaper.

When, some time in June, the completed building is ready for occupancy by editorial and mechanical staffs, just 64 years will have elapsed since the Detroit Free Press was founded as a weekly.

Covering a ground area of 27,000 square feet, the new structure occupies the entire block between Cass Avenue and Wayne Street. Above the main body of six floors rises an eight-story tower.

While structural work is in process mechanical equipment already has been set up in the two basements which form virtually two additional floors as a sub-structure to the whole. Production of the daily issue is expected to get under way in the new building some time before the editorial and other staffs are housed there. Equipment looking forward to years of expansion is being installed.

The new building, to be known as "The Detroit Free Press Building," will be in marked contrast to the modest little plant in which Sheldon McKnight on May 3, 1831, founded the paper as a weekly. This was at the corner of Woodbridge and Bates streets, not far from the water front.

San Francisco, March 26.—The trial of 16 year old Dorothy Ellingson, charged with having shot and killed her mother, Mrs. Anna Ellingson, was resumed here today with attorneys for the defense and prosecution, making a painstaking selection of the jury to try the young defendant, and with precautionary measures being taken to guard against a physical and mental collapse of the girl. Miss Ellingson yesterday fainted in court, for the fourth time since the trial has opened, and her attorneys announced last night that they might petition the court to have her examined by physicians every day before she is brought into the court. The girl's father was quoted as expressing belief that his daughter will not be able to stand the unintermitted progress of the courts proceedings, and that a postponement might be necessary.

San Francisco, March 26.—The possibility that the defense may attempt to contest the charge of the State that Dorothy Ellingson actually shot and killed her mother, appeared in a new phase of interrogation opened by the defense in examining a juror at this morning's session of the murder trial.

Walter McGovern, of the defense counsel, asked Mrs. Julia Ott, a prospective juror, whether she would be prejudiced against a verdict in favor of the girl, should the evidence disclose that Dorothy did not actually shoot her mother, but had admitted the act to shield someone else.

SHEPHERD REFUSED BAIL YESTERDAY ON CHARGE OF MURDER

Will Appeal to Supreme Court in Order to Be Released Pending His Trial

Chicago, Ill., March 26.—William D. Shepherd will appeal to the Supreme Court in order to be released on bail, pending his trial, it was announced here today. Shepherd was returned to jail yesterday without bail, following a hearing before Chief Justice Hoffman, of criminal court, on the indictment charging him with killing his foster son, William N. McClintock, by giving him typhoid germs in order that he might get the youth's million dollar estate.

Shepherd's attorney, William Stewart, announced this morning that he would petition to the Supreme Court for writ of habeas corpus in order to obtain release of his client pending his trial on the murder charge.

TRIAL OF GOV. SUIT ANNUL TEAPOT DOME LEASE ENDS TODAY

Fifteen Days Given for Briefs to Be Submitted Before Judge Kennedy Makes Decision

Cheyenne, Wyo., March 26.—The trial of the Government suit to annul the Teapot Dome Lease ended in the United States District court here today.

The closing moments were marked by a verbal exchange between Owen J. Roberts, and Counsel for the defense, after the latter and accused the government attorney of going outside of the record in his address.

Judge Kennedy gave the counsel 15 days to submit a brief of his case, and the defense another 15 days in which to reply. These briefs are to be considered by Judge Kennedy before he makes a decision.

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WEEKS INDORSES MILITARY TRAINING

Declares That it Would Be Worth Money Spent On it Even if There Were Assurance of No More Wars

Washington, March 26.—Military training would be worth every cent the country spends on it even if there were assurance of no more wars, Secretary Weeks declared in a paper read last night before the association on Military College and Schools. "No more convincing evidence of this is needed," the Secretary said. "That the Military Schools and Colleges are noticeably free from the many unwholesome theories, ideas and practices that thrive, like choking weeds, in some of the other educational institutions."

Coolidge to Name Shoals Commission Today or Tomorrow

Washington, March 26.—President Coolidge is expected to name the commission to consider the disposition of Muscle Shoals today, or tomorrow.

The President was urged today by Representative Oliver, Democrat of Alabama, to initiate a thorough investigation at the Nitrate and Power productions plant of the possibility of the Shoals property. The view was expressed that the commission, which the President intends to appoint, should conduct a survey, which would go into the subject in the most comprehensive manner.

APPEAL MAY BE FILED CONNECTION WITH BALLOT BALTIMORE CONFERENCE

Washington, March 26.—An appeal probably will be filed with the College of Methodist Bishops in connection with the adverse vote by the Baltimore Annual Conference yesterday on the proposed consolidation of the Northern and Southern branches of the church.

Review will be sought, unification leaders declared today of the ruling by Bishop Chandler, that 1-5 of the delegation could order an aye and nay vote. The question would be presented to the College at the May term meeting scheduled to be held in Nashville, Tennessee.

The decision was not expected to affect yesterday's ballot, leaders said, but might have a far reaching influence upon the 40 Southern Conferences yet to vote on the question.

MRS. MAE BENNETT DENIES HER GUILT IN MURDER CHARGE

Describes Relations Between Miss Hoffman and Members of the Bennett Family as "Very Pleasant"

Chattanooga, Tenn., March 26.—Mrs. Mae Bennett, indicted jointly with her husband, William H. Bennett, on charge of murdering Miss Augusta Hoffman, today denied her guilt in the matter. Called to the stand as a witness, Mrs. Bennett, told of Miss Hoffman leaving Chattanooga for Knoxville in February 1925. A letter was received by Mrs. Nancy Bennett, Mrs. Bennett's mother, asking that the spinster's clothing be sent to Knoxville. She had taken a small handbag with her, said the witness. Mrs. Bennett testified that the clothing was sent, and later Mrs. Nancy Bennett received a letter from Washington telling of Miss Hoffman's marriage. Other letters or post cards were received from New York, or Cleveland, Ohio. "The last word coming from James A. Brown," in Santa Cruz, California, a post card saying that "Gosie had suffered injury to her wrist in an automobile accident." The next address was at Oakland, California, and nothing was heard thereafter, the defendant said.

Mrs. Bennett testified that she and Mr. Bennett were married 36 or 37 years ago, and that Miss Hoffman had lived in the family at intervals from the time of their marriage until 1915. Relations between Miss Hoffman and members of the Bennett family were described as "very pleasant."

The convention got underway at 10 o'clock this morning and will continue through the week with two business sessions every day.

TWELFTH JUROR IN CHAPMAN TRIAL BE SELECTED TODAY IN STOKES TODAY

Third Special Panel of 20 Men Summoned to Select Last Juror From

Hartford, Conn., March 26.—Eighteen prospective jurors in the case of Gerald Chapman, charged with the murder of a New Britain policeman last October, were rapidly disposed of without result in an attempt to get a 12th juror today.

Most of those disqualified expressed themselves as having definite opinions on the guilt or innocence of the prisoner. Others were opposed to capital punishment, and four were excused through peremptory challenge.

Court adjourned at 11:30 until 2:00 this afternoon, and in the meantime a third special panel of 20 men was summoned to select the 12th juror from.

of the shrines of North Carolina's early history. From Wilmington to Jacksonville, N. C., the road passes through the undulating sandy country of Pender and Onslow counties close to the ocean. Many a view of the broad Atlantic is possible along this section of the road which is lined with live oaks with their graceful trimming of Spanish moss. At Jacksonville the road crosses the New River. The road then winds lazily along until New Bern is reached. At this point a modern bridge 1.5 miles long bridges the Neuse river. The road then goes northward through the rich truck and tobacco sections of Craven, Beaufort counties, passing through Washington and Williams- ton.

At Wilmington the road crosses the Roanoke river over a bridge across a swamp, and the river, the structure being four miles in length and representing the most expensive investment of the State Highway Commission in structures.

The road leaves Martin county at Wilmington and enters Bertie county, passing through Windsor and thence to the Chowan river where the new bridge is to be built. After crossing this bridge into Chowan county and passing through the lower section of a fine county, the highway enters Edenton, once capital of North Carolina in the Colonial days. Perquimans county is then crossed, followed by Pasquotank county, where Elizabeth City is reached. For twelve miles the road traverses the historic section north of Elizabeth city and in Pasquotank and Camden counties to the Virginia border.

On the Chowan river and close to the western terminus of the new bridge is the site of the colonial mansion of North Carolina's first chief executive, Governor Eden. In crossing the proposed bridge the traveler will glimpse what is said to be one of the most beautiful water scenes along the coast. Eastward 60 miles stretches the open waters of Albemarle Sound. This sound is rich in history and tradition. At its head

is Roanoke Island where Sir Walter Raleigh's colonists landed in 1585. The island is marked with a monument erected by the Roanoke Historical Association.

At Edenton, once the proud capital of North Carolina when that state extended westward to the Mississippi River and included most of the present state of Tennessee, the Edenton Tea Party met.

Natives claim that the date of the Edenton Tea Party was before the famous Boston Tea Party. In the Masonic Hall over the court house erected in the early 18th century is a chair formerly used by the Masonic Lodge at Alexandria, Virginia and which is said to have been used by George Washington when he presided over the Lodge's proceedings.

In Perquimans county the traveler may see the first deed conveying real estate in North Carolina. This document is kept at Hertford and conveys land from the Yoplin Indians to John Durant.

In Pasquotank county is Hall's Creek where the first popular legislative assembly in North Carolina met in the latter part of the 17th century.

From Elizabeth City to Norfolk the road passes through Dismal Swamp following the Dismal Swamp Canal the survey for which was made by George Washington acting under orders of Governor Fairfax of Virginia. The road passes in close proximity to Lake Drummond. This lake is surrounded by cypresses and tangled vegetation and is said to have inspired Thomas Moore's poem, "The Lake of the Dismal Swamp."

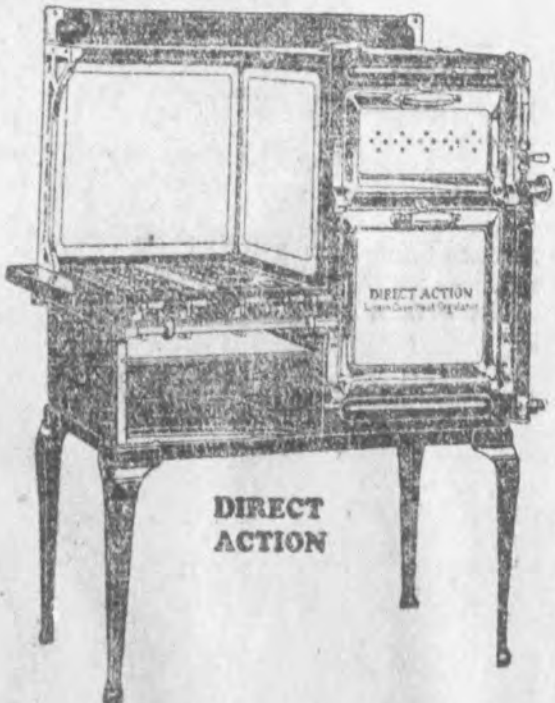

ENGLISH CREW MISS AMERICAN OARSMEN IN THIS YEAR'S RACE

Oxford. — For the first time in several years the Oxford crew is without an American oarsman, and the cartoonists who have annually portrayed a crew in horn spectacles with the coxswain smoking a cigar and bawling "atta boy" must now seek other employment.

The loss of Mellen, the Brasenose American who stroked Oxford so well in 1923, though unsuccessfully last year, is very apparent in this year's boat. Campbell, the Etonian, who is stroking, is a less finished oarsman and lacks both Mellen's timing and his hard, quick drive off the stretcher. With four Etonians in the boat and a coach who captained that school, the work is much after the traditional Eton style, save that the "swing together" of the boating song is still a rare achievement. Shrewsbury, Radley and Westminster, all noted rowing schools, have each one representative, while Mower-White, the heavyweight of the crew, comes from Rugby.

In the Cambridge crew Eton has three representatives. The Cambridge captain recently resigned because of ill health, and this misfortune, with the resulting uncertainty in the final choice of a crew, has slowed the Cambridge start and made Oxford the

present favorites. Oxford's supposed superiority rests largely upon their neatness and style in paddling a very slow stroke. Tho the actual university race is rowed well up in the thirties, both crews have been training at a stroke below 25. Last year Mellen set the stroke too high for the heavy men behind him and they splashed and floundered through, nearly five lengths astern of a light Cambridge crew rowing a slower but long and rhythmic stroke. With this lesson large before them, the Oxford coaches have attempted to give to the lighter candidates of this year the winning Cambridge style. The result is polished rowing at 20 strokes to the minute, and ragged rowing at 32.

Oxford's coaching this year has been in charge of the aged Dr. J. C. Bourne, a Fellow of Merton College, and the Linacre Professor of Anatomy, who rowed for Oxford in 1882-1883.

With the increasing interest and participation in other sports, especially rugby football and tennis, university enthusiasm for rowing has declined. It is still a popular sport, but no longer the one popular sport.

Of past races, Oxford has won 40 and Cambridge 35. In 1877 the crews rowed a dead heat. In 1912 both boats sank at the first attempt, and the race was rowed over. The date for this year's event is March 28.

The weights of the two crews are nearly equal, Cambridge averaging a little over 160 pounds a man, and Oxford 166 pounds.

LONDON POLICE FINDS TROUBLE IN RECRUITING

London.—The after effects of war time privations on the nation's physique are shown up strongly in the number of police recruits rejected on medical examination, says Sir Leonard Dunning, reporting on the county and city of Borough Police

Forces in England and Wales for 1924.

"Perhaps," Sir Leonard continues, "90 per cent of the applicants for appointments never get so far as the doctor because they are manifestly unsuitable, while the single educational test knocks out so many more that the chief constable is lucky if he finds five suitable men among 100 applicants."

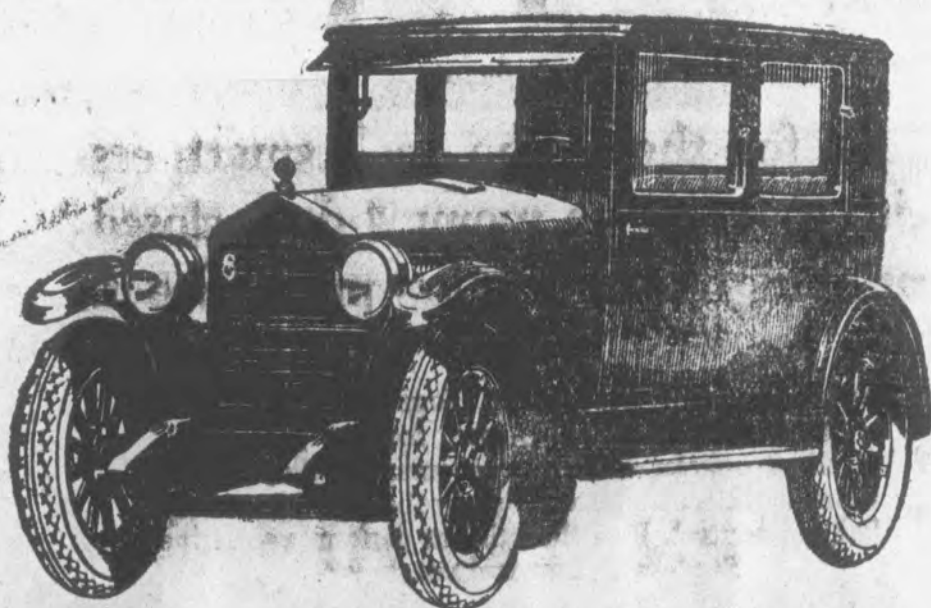

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CONSOLIDATION OF SCHOOLS A GROWING TENDENCY

Country schools in the United States are being centralized with reasonable rapidity and increasing intelligence and forthright. According to estimates recently made in the Bureau of Education of the Department of the Interior, approximately 9 million children

of the farm population and 3 million additional rural children living in small villages and other farm communities, in all 12 million children, are enrolled in schools which may properly be called rural. These schools are classified as follows: One-teacher schools of which there were at the close of 1921 about 168,000 enrolling approximately four and three-fourths million children; two, three, and four-teacher schools in the open country enrolling on the same date approximately one and one-half million children; schools in villages of 500 and under enrolling approximately two and one-fourth million children; consolidated schools enrolling approximately two and three-fourths million, and three-fourths of a million rural children enrolled in schools of the larger towns and in others not included in above classification. It is also estimated that there are approximately 150,000 teachers now employed in 14,000 consolidated schools in the United States. That these children are receiving educational advantages superior in quality to those generally afforded by the small isolated schools of the one, two, and three-teacher type is generally acknowledged. Wherever feasible, there is a tendency, growing in strength and extent, to consolidate small rural schools.

Your Car's Electrical System

(By Mr. J. B. Chandler, Willard Service Station)

From the beginning of electric starting and lighting of automobiles, the storage battery has been and continues to be the most important part in the entire system. In recent years, his importance has been still further increased by the growing tendency to depend altogether on the battery for ignition. This was a perfectly natural development, for in order to have the car lighted when the engine was not running, one must have a battery. This in turn, necessitates a generator connected with the engine, so that one can use engine power when running to keep the battery fully charged and not be compelled to have it recharged frequently from some outside source at expense to the owner.

If the car owner could only realize the years of incessant labor and thought that have gone into the making of the units of the electrical system on his car, he would better understand why it deserves a little careful attention from him. It is amazing that the various manufacturers involved have managed to produce types of apparatus that so successfully resist the neglect which they often receive.

NOTES ON TARHEELIA

The first superintendent of public instruction of North Carolina was S. S. Ashley, of New Hanover county, who served from 1863 to 1872. From 1872 to 1885 Calvin H. Wiley, of Guilford county, was "superintendent of common schools." Wiley's graded school in Raleigh is named in his honor.

The adjutant-general of the state of North Carolina is appointed by the governor. His term of office is four years. He receives a salary of \$4,500 a year.

Swamp lands of North Carolina cover an area of between 3,000 and 5,000 square miles, situated chiefly in counties bordering on sounds and the Atlantic ocean.

The peanut industry is rapidly coming to the front in North Carolina, reports the State Department of Agriculture.

There are 531 flour mills in North Carolina.

North Carolina has a comprehensive mining law, and by this statute the commissioner of labor and printing is constituted mine inspector with large powers.

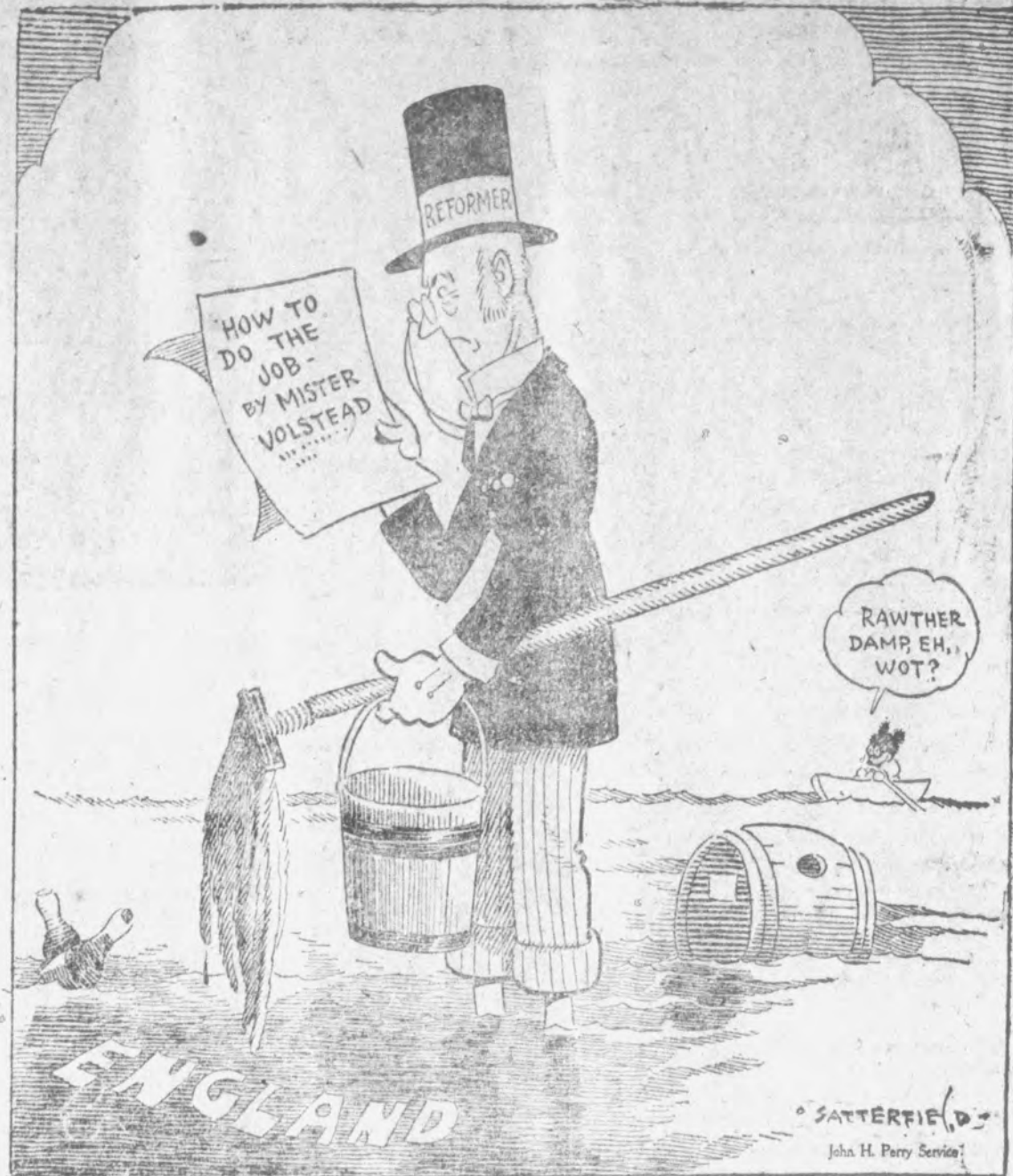

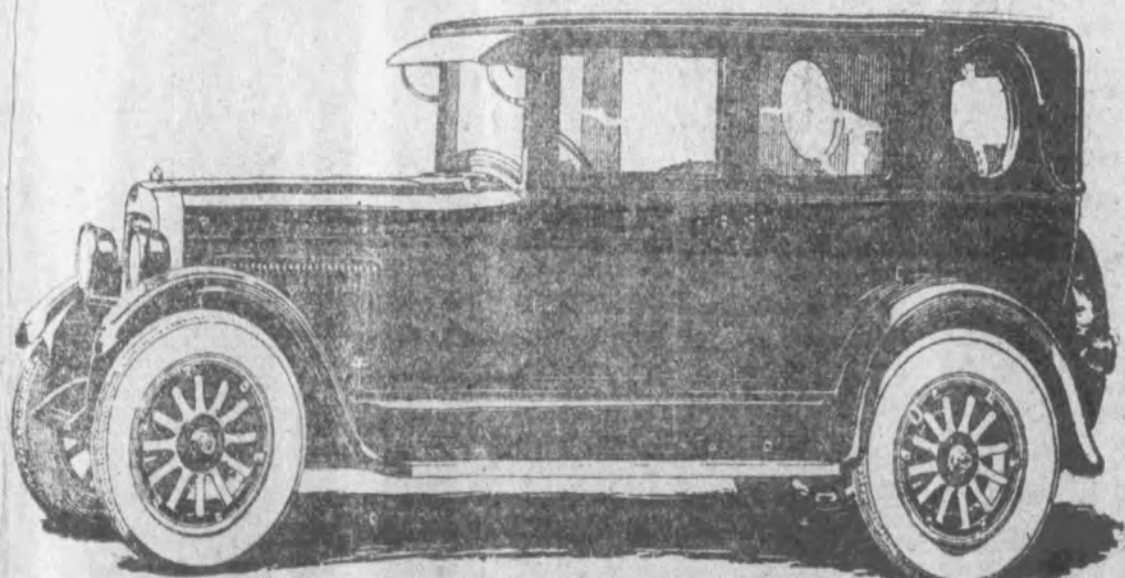

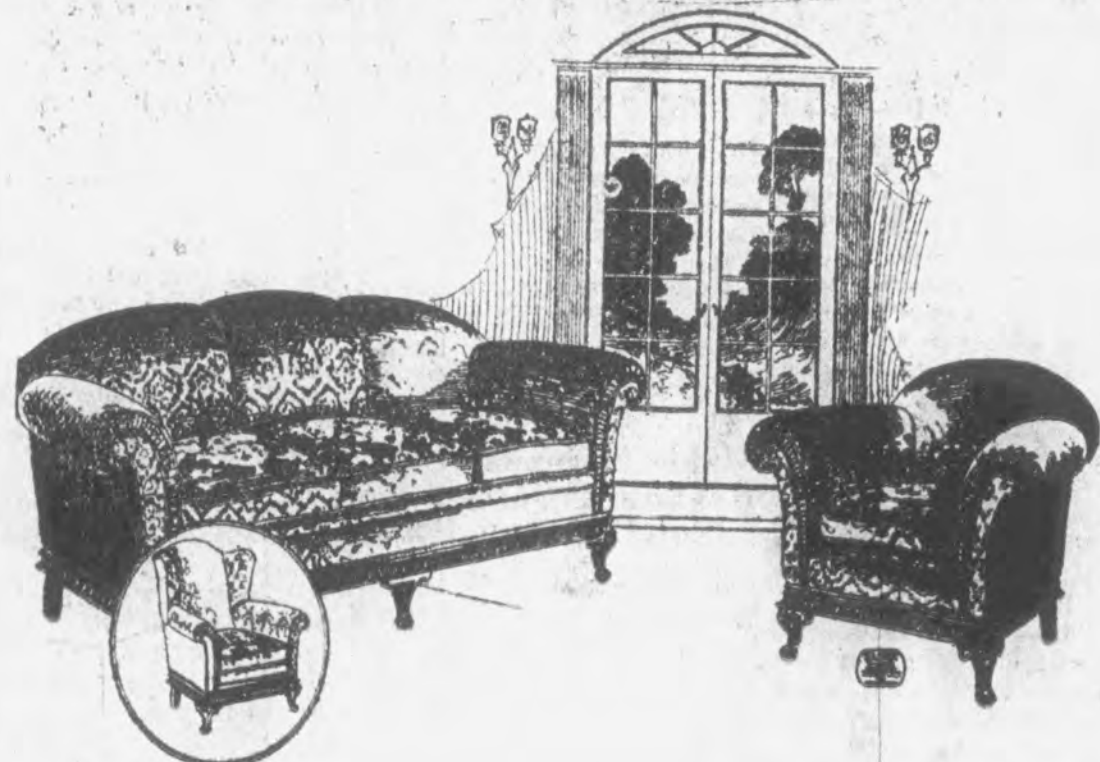
