NATIONAL GUARD TO SERVE WITHOUT ARMORY DRILL PAY

After July 1, for Two Years the Armory Drill Pay Will Be 25 Cents Instead of 50 Cents; Federal Funds Curtailed

Raleigh, March 27.—Thirty-six hundred officers and men of the North Carolina National Guard will serve without armory drill pay from the State until July 1, according to a letter mailed officers and men of the Guard yesterday by Adjutant General J. Van B. Metts. After July 1 and extending over a period of two years the armory drill pay to National Guardsmen from State sources will be twenty-five cents, instead of fifty cents as heretofore. Heavy increases in enlistments and failure of the last General Assembly to increase the appropriation for the Guard to meet the added expense of these enlistments is given as the cause.

National Guard armory drill pay from Federal sources will also be curtailed on account of President Calvin Coolidge withholding \$1,300,000 which Congress appropriated to meet the expense of added enlistments. One dollar per man per drill has been allowed by the Federal government. This amount will be cut to fifty cents unless President Coolidge releases the appropriation, of which he has charge in his capacity as commander-in-chief.

The deficit in the funds of the State National Guard on account of increased enlistments amounts to \$47,000.

Coolidge Names Members of Muscle Shoals Commission

Washington, March 27.—The following were appointed today by President Coolidge as members of the Muscle Shoals Commission.

Former Representative McKinzie, of Illinois; former Senator Dial, of South Carolina; Professor Harry C. Curtis, of Yale University; William McClellan of New York; and Russell F. Bower, of the American Farm Bureau Federation. Contrary to expectation no cabinet members were placed on the commission, which will determine the most practical methods of utilizing the facilities available at Muscle Shoals.

Shiloh, N. C., March 27.—The Camden county Sunday school convention will be held at Shiloh Baptist church, April 4 and 5.

75 Bus Lines Apply For Licenses Operate In North Carolina

Raleigh, March 27.—75 bus lines have applied to the corporation commission for licenses to operate under the 1925 law regulating commercial motor transportation in North Carolina. It was announced at the office of the commission today, that schedules had been agreed upon by the two bus companies operating between Raleigh and Greensboro. Buses operated by one of these companies will leave the two cities every hour on the hour, and those of the other company every hour on the half hour. It was announced that an agreement also had been reached as to a basis of schedules for bus lines between Goldsboro and Kinston, although no actual schedule had been filed.

BODY OF DEWEY TO BE PLACED IN NATIONAL CATHEDRAL, WASHINGTON

Washington, March 27.—Attended by a Naval Guard of Order, the body of Admiral George Dewey, hero of Manila Bay, will be moved from Arlington National Cemetery tomorrow or Monday, and placed in the Bethlehem Chapel of the National Cathedral here. The removal was requested by the widow of Admiral Dewey.

Despite his youth, Carusi has served as secretary to Governor Billings, of Vermont, and to Lieutenant Governor A. W. Foote, as well as acting in other executive capacities.

The judges will come from Washington. Mr. Earl Adams of Teachers College will preside at the debate.

Richmond, Va., March 27.—Election of officers and decision as to whether the 37th district Rotary Clubs, now embracing about 50 cities in Virginia and Eastern North Carolina, shall be divided, were before the district convention here today. Nomination for candidate for district Governor and other officers were made at the morning session, and ballot on the nominees was in process. Should the convention decide to divide the district the Governor elected in ballot will serve as head of the district in which his club is located, and another Governor would be elected for the other district. SAVING PROGRAM USHERS IN NEW ERA OF LETTER HEADS FOR THIRTY DAYS

Fancy Letter Heads to Be Replaced by Uniform Type in All State Offices

Raleigh, March 27.—A memorandum a day seems to be the definite pace of the Budget Bureau of which Governor A. W. McLean is ex-officio director although the Governor has not appointed an Assistant Director or otherwise perfected his organization and "nothing too small and nothing too large" would appear to be an apt slogan for the newly established department of the State government.

Memorandum No. 5 which came out yesterday is directed at the question of State printing, the Governor having already taken steps to having an inventory made by Secretary of State W. N. Everett of the number of Supreme Court reports, acts of the General Assembly, etc., on hand with a view to disposing of surplus stocks on hand and reducing the number to be printed in the future.

The memorandum sent to all departments yesterday marks the death knell of the beautiful embossed and sealed stationery on which some of the departments have written their official correspondence and ushers in a new era of uniform letter heads, with fractional sizes of letter paper used wherever possible.

DECISION IN TEAPOT DOME NOT EXPECTED

Possession of Teapot Dome Hinged On Legal Points Today; Judge Kennedy Will Render Decision

Cheyenne, Wyo., March 27.—Possession of Teapot Dome hinged on legal points today, and rested in the discretion of Federal Judge Kennedy, before whom the lease annulment suit of the government against the Mammoth Oil Company was completed yesterday. The decision of Judge Kennedy will determine whether Harry F. Sinclair obtained the lease on the Wyoming Naval Oil Reserve as a result of conspiracy and fraud, as the government alleged, or whether the Mammoth Oil Company obtained the grant because it submitted the best bid and because the government was forced by an act of Congress to develop the oil field, as the defense contended. At least 30 days will elapse before Judge Kennedy will have all the documents of the case in his hands, and until then no decision is expected.

TRAINS COLLIDE AT CLARKSVILLE TODAY

Seven Persons Were Slightly Injured When Trains Collide at Clarksville, Va.

Danville, Va., March 27.—Seven persons were slightly injured at Clarksville, 50 miles east of here today, when a Southern Railway passenger train from Durham, N. C., to Keyaville, collided with a train from Lawrenceville to Danville.

The injured were train attaches and one negro woman. Railroad officers here said none of the injured were seriously hurt. No particulars of the wreck were available.

Makes Statement Regarding Resignation of President Peery

Hickory, March 27.—Daniel William Aidenholdt, chairman of the board of trustees of Lenior Rhyme College made public a statement this afternoon, in which he declared that Dr. Peery resigned as president of the college without any inducement whatsoever from the board. The statement also says that the fight over the degree of Professor Longaker was not the cause of the president's resignation.

Suit for Breach of Promise Will Be Filed vs. Dennistoun

Paris, March 27.—A suit for breach of promise and defamation in character against Lieutenant Colonel Ian Onslow Dennistoun, defendant in the sensational London trial just ended, will be filed in London soon, by an American woman, who now is in the United States. It was announced today by Dudley Field Malone, who will represent the plaintiff.

Following on the heels of the Dennistoun scandal, London society has been shocked by the revelations in the suit of Mrs. Alfred Frank Waterhouse against Sir David Wilson Barker, his middle-aged wife, Lady Wilson-Barker, and Robert Peel Sheldon, in which she was awarded a verdict of \$50,000. Mrs. Waterhouse alleged Lady Wilson-Barker, years ago, entered into a liaison with Waterhouse, and then pretending she was being blackmailed, getting his entire fortune. Sir David was sued under the English law that a husband was responsible for his wife's actions. Sheldon was acquitted of being Lady Wilson-Barker's accessory.

PRAIRIE FIRES RAGING FOR TWO DAYS IN THE DEKOTAS WERE EXTINGUISHED TODAY

Sioux Falls, South Dakota, March 27.—Prairie fires in North Central and South Dakota were extinguished today and attention was concentrated on the fire area in Rosebud Indian Reservation, where unconfirmed reports told of extensive damage. Crippled wire communication made it difficult to check on reports from the Southern Fire Zone, where the villages of Tutbill, Vetel, and St. Francis were reported destroyed, and other unconfirmed reports told of six deaths.

The list of dead in unconfirmed reports had mounted to seven today. The all in the Southern South Dakota-Nebraska district. These included a school teacher, and two children, near Crookstown, Nebraska, and an Indian woman and three children near Tutbill, South Dakota.

Approximately 150,000 acres of prairie and hay land in the northern part of the state near Wapulla were swept by the flames before fire fighters extinguished the blaze early today. No fatalities were reported in that area.

Body of Dr. Olson Exhumed Today

Chicago, Ill., March 27.—A second exhumation in connection with the McClintock death mystery was made today when the body of Dr. Oscar Olson, who died three years ago, was raised from the grave for an autopsy and coroner's inquest.

Chicago, March 27.—A third exhumation was to be made today when the body of Mrs. Emma Nelson McClintock, who died 16 years ago, was to be raised.

The bodies are to be submitted to the same chemical tests for evidence of poison, or other unnatural deaths, as in the case of William McClintock, millionaire orphan, who it is charged in an indictment naming William D. Shepherd, the youth's father and her by a will, and Charles U. Fairman, head of a school of science, met death due to the inoculation of typhoid germs. Shepherd is in jail, and Fairman is held in custody by State's attorney. Mrs. McClintock, mother of the youth, was a widow and asked Shepherd and his wife to live with her, and her son. When she died she left the boy in their care.

MRS CLARILLA MANN DIED THIS MORNING

Interment Will Take Place Tomorrow in Morehead City

Mrs. Clarilla Mann, died at the home of Mr. J. L. Williams corner Cotah and Thirteenth street, early this morning. Interment will take place tomorrow in Morehead City. Mrs. Mann was born on Nov. 27, 1848 and was married in 1865. She possessed a lovely christian character and for the past fifty-eight years has been a loyal member of the Methodist church of Morehead City. A short while before her death she announced to her friends her wishes in connection with her funeral. She left a note thanking her friends for their many kindnesses during her sickness and telling them of her faith in God. During her stay in Greenville she has won a host of friends, and she will be greatly missed.

JUNE BRIDES WILL COME HIGHER SAYS RECENT MADE LAW

New Law Increases Fee for Marriage Licenses From \$3 to \$5; Effective June 1

Raleigh, March 27.—Those who fall before Dan Cupid's onslaught between now and June 1 must pay the register of deeds only \$3 for marriage licenses.

After June 1, the amount will be \$5. Of this amount \$1 goes to the register of deeds, \$1 to the county and \$3 to the state or North Carolina.

The law for this is found in the revenue act of 1925. For a number of years the price of a marriage license in North Carolina has been \$3.

Casting about for an additional source of revenue the finance committee of the general assembly decided to increase the tax on getting married. There was no objection raised on the floor of either branch of the general assembly.

Commissioner of Revenue R. A. Doughton pointed out today that prospective groom have a little over two months left, which to have two dollars.

McKinnon Arrested Last Night Charged of Immoral Conduct

Raleigh, March 27.—Daniel P. McKinnon, member of the General Assembly from Roberson county, was arrested here last night on a charge of immoral conduct, by Raleigh Police acting on a complaint filed at police headquarters.

The complaint, according to police officers, was received at a residence near to that where McKinnon was found in company with a married woman, who also was arrested. Both defendants were released on a deposit of a bond of \$100 each, pending trial in Raleigh court.

McKinnon, who has served two terms in legislature, and was prominently mentioned as a possible appointee of Governor McLean to serve on the pardon commission, could not be located today. Solicitor Gooney, of police court, today said that he would call the trial in the near future.

The woman gave the name of Mrs. John Julius Smith. However, she was arrested at the residence of John Julius Guildorf, and was said to be the wife of the man of that name.

Burgaw, March 27.—Judge Albion Dunn, of Greenville, who succeeds Judge J. Loyd Horton, resigned, as judge of the superior court of the fifth judicial district, opened his first term of court here Monday morning.

This session is devoted entirely to the civil cases.

In the first case called, that of Burroughs vs. Sears, involving land and timber rights, the new judge displayed an intimate grasp of the law, although confronted with several knotty problems.

BRAZILIANS EMBARK UPON CAMPAIGN TO REPRESS DRINKING

Rio de Janeiro. — Reports from Sao Paulo announce the opening of a prohibition campaign, the publicity to be in charge of a prominent newspaper O Estado de Sao Paulo.

There are three temperance organizations in Brazil, the International Order of Good Templars, with three chapters; the National League Against Alcohol, whose president is Dr. Miguel Calmon, minister of agriculture, and a municipal club in Porto Alegre, Rio Grande do Sul, where the medical students have initiated a fight against intoxicating drinks.

Drunkenness is not a vice of wealthy and middle class Brazilians, who prefer light wines, soft drinks and mineral waters. Public saloons in Rio de Janeiro are as respectable and quiet as tea shops, and it is not uncommon to see a Brazilian and his wife enter a saloon at midnight for ice cream. Although the city has more than 1,000,000 inhabitants, there are only three saloons which cater to prosperous business, the Brahmas, the National and the American Bar. There are four additional public saloons in the city located in the principal hotels. All tea and coffee shops serve beer.

Brazil's problem is among the laborers, who drink large quantities of very strong rum. Scores of beer and rum shops are scattered through Rio de Janeiro in the districts inhabited by the poor people. The drink habit in the rural communities is said to be universal.

Students of social conditions claim that a growing problem in Brazil is the increase of the drug habit, especially cocaine, morphine and hashish.

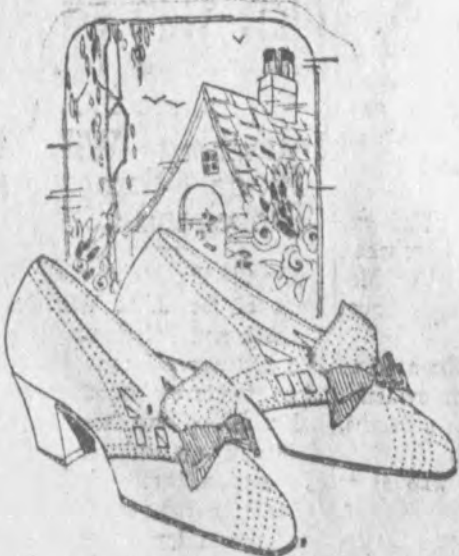

ESKIMOS OF ALASKA THRIVE WELL UNDER AMERICAN TUTELAGE

Copenhagen.—American methods of treating and caring for the Eskimos were urged upon Denmark by Dr. Knud Rasmussen, the Danish explorer, in a recent lecture here before the upper and lower houses of parliament. Dr. Rasmussen has just returned to Denmark after an extensive survey of Eskimo life in Greenland, Canada and Alaska.

American Eskimos, the explorer said, were better educated than those living in Canada or Greenland, spoke good English and in every way demonstrated their ability to meet the white man on his own ground.

"The Americans are absolutely right in their viewpoint," the speaker said, "that as soon as a primitive race has made even the slightest acquaintance with civilization, even in its crudest form, it is impossible to preserve the primitivity of such a race. It is then far better to make these men and women into ordinary American citizens, with the citizens' privileges and duties."

Dr. Rasmussen declared that the importance of the work of the American bureau of education, as represented by the many schools for natives in Alaska, could never be over emphasized. American school

teachers, he said, not only taught the natives the English language, but helped them in many other ways, such as in the carrying on of infant welfare work. He criticized the policy of the Danish government in attempting to keep the Greenland Eskimo away from any contact with the white man, and pointed out that while the Greenland Eskimo lived in a state of primitive squalor, it was no strange thing for the Alaskan natives to own motorboats and large reindeer herds, and to be supplied with the most modern equipment wherewith to carry on his family life and business.

One fault with the American system, Dr. Rasmussen said, was that often the Alaskan native was not taught properly how to read and write his native tongue, and he urged that this be given particular attention in the case of the Greenland Eskimo. Reindeer, he said, had proven a great source of wealth to the Alaskan natives, and he urged that herds be established in Greenland wherever possible.

Manila.—Figures obtained from the bureau of public works show that 15,676 motor vehicles are in use in the Philippine Islands, including 8,648 private cars and 1,087 garage cars.

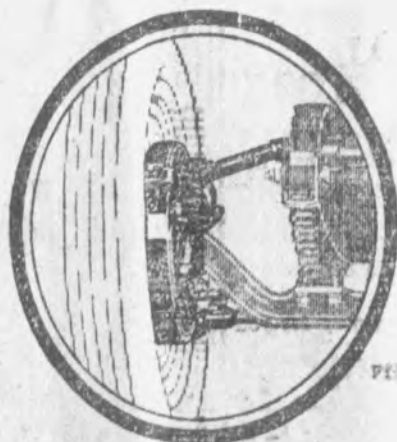

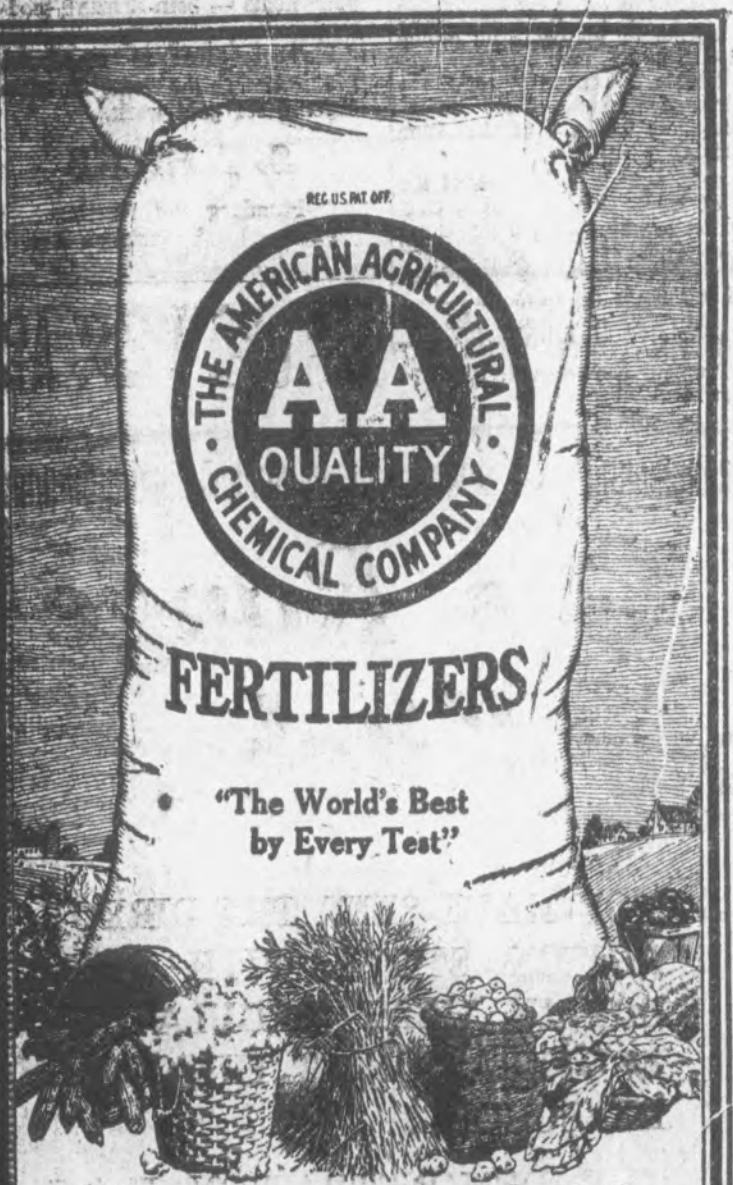

FARM PROSPERITY AND SCHOOL SUPPORT

Improved methods of marketing farm products are among the essentials to more liberal school support and consequently to good

schools for country children, according to addresses and discussions at the Department of Rural Education which held its annual meeting in Cincinnati, February 23-26. The trend of the three-day discussions centered around the idea of conservation. There must be conservation of the products and resources of the farm itself in order that sufficient revenue may be forthcoming to enable the farm family to participate in the world's accumulation of culture as well as in a realization of higher ideals of comfort and happiness. Conservation of the combined resources of the farm communities which make up the unit of school support is necessary in order that these may be tapped and distributed to the best advantage. Last but not least, there must be conservation of the children's educational interests through a professionally administered school or school system as represented by intelligent centralization of the units of taxation as well as the consolidation of school units.

JUDGE DUNN

The Hon. Albion Dunn, of Greenville, who succeeds the Hon. J. Lloyd Horton as Judge of the Superior Court from the fifth district, made his debut as a jurist Monday in the civil court at Burgaw. Wilmington lawyers, who attended the opening session of the Pender tribunal were very favorably impressed with the new jurist, and complimentary in their expressions as to his demeanor on the bench. Judge Dunn, we are informed, displayed a comprehensive grasp of the law an even judicial temperament and a dignified demeanor in keeping with the best traditions and records of the North Carolina bench.

Such was to be expected of the Greenville man. In his active practice as a lawyer, he has time and again proved his knowledge of the law and his high sense of justice. It is gratifying to know that one has been chosen to succeed Judge Horton who will carry on in the same admirable way.

The courts, of all our institutions must be kept on a plane above reproach, and only through the selection of men of the highest more calibre may we expect to uphold the majesty of the law in its truest sense.—Wilmington Dispatch.

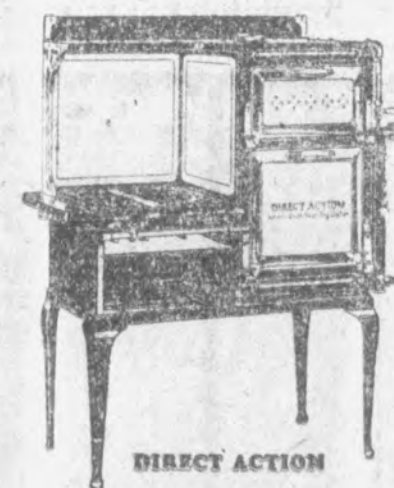

Sheriffs Required to Send Certain Reports to Doughton

Raleigh, March 27.—R. A. Doughton, state commissioner of revenue, has sent letters to the 100 sheriffs in North Carolina, citing the 1925 law requiring the rendition of certain reports.

Under the terms of this law, it shall be the duty of the commissioner

of revenue to report to the chairman of the boards of commissioners of the various counties once every three months all collections by the state in the county to which a report is made of revenue collected by the state department of revenue under the provisions of schedule B of the general revenue act.

It shall likewise be the duty of the various sheriffs to report to the commissioner of revenue once every three months the amount of revenue collected by them under schedule B for and on behalf of the counties.

In both instances the reports must contain the name and postoffice address of each tax payer, the character and amount of tax paid.

"I shall appreciate it," writes the commissioner of revenue to each sheriff, "if you will have these reports filed in this department, on March 1st, June 1st, September 1st and December 1st, showing the information required under the act for the previous three months."

"I will also thank you to have this report made on legal size paper, listing the parties having secured license under different sections of Schedule B of the revenue act, in numerical order. In other words, show under section 23 all persons having secured license for the operation of theaters, followed by section 24, showing persons having secured license for traveling theatrical companies, etc."

"It is earnestly requested that you give this matter prompt and careful consideration and file the reports when called for and thus avoid the necessity of correspondence tracing for same."

"This department will make its reports under the same method to the chairman, of the board of commissioners of your county as provided in the act, to which you will, of course, have access and thus aid you in the collection of taxes for your county."

On the back of the letter to each sheriff is printed the law requiring the reports to which the commissioner of revenue makes reference.

Eastern North Carolina Becoming Trucking Center

Raleigh, March 27.—Climate and soil and its proximity to ready markets by means of ready transportation facilities, make eastern North Carolina one of the leading trucking centers of the county.

The State Department of Agriculture points out that "such a list of money making truck crops can be grown that one might enumerate all the common vegetables."

The more important vegetables raised in the eastern sections of North Carolina include Irish potatoes, cabbage, peas, beans, asparagus, onions, lettuce, beets, spinach, radishes, egg plants, tomatoes, peppers, cantaloupes, cucumbers and squashes.

So steady has been the growth and development of trucking in eastern North Carolina that "no one," declare agricultural experts, "can predict with certainty the proportions it will ultimately reach."

One eastern North Carolina county was once accorded the reputation of being "able to plant enough corn to feed the south."
