GERMAN NATION TO ELECT ITS PRESIDENT BY POPULAR VOTE

Candidate Must Obtain a Clear Majority of All Votes Cast to Be Declared Elected; Seven Candidates Are in the Race

Berlin, March 28.—For the first time in its history of more than 1,000 years, dotted with the turbulent reigns of Margraves, Electors, Kings and Emperors, the German Nation tomorrow will be given the opportunity of electing its head through the medium of a popular ballot.

The late Frederick Ebert, first President of the German Republic, held his office by virtue of a vote of the National Assembly in 1919, by which he was designated Provisional President. At various times during the ensuing years, he urged that his provisional status be ended, but it was deemed unwise to cast the country into the throes of a Presidential election, and it was by an act of the Reichstag in October 1921 that his provisional status was changed to a regular one, his term to expire June 30, 1925. His sudden death advanced this date by three months.

The law for election of the President provides that a candidate must obtain a clear majority of all the votes cast, to be declared elected. As there are seven candidates in the running, nobody in Germany seriously believes that any candidate can obtain a majority. The law therefore provided for a second ballot to be taken, and this second election day has been already fixed for April 26th.

Fire Loss in State During February Totals \$511,011.00

Raleigh, March 28.—The State Insurance Department reports the fire loss for February to have been \$511,011, as compared with \$669,928 in February, 1924. The total value of the property at risk was \$5,208,337, with insurance amounting to \$3,350,100.

Of the 196 fires occurring during the month 26 were rural and suburban, with a loss of \$148,735, an average of \$5,720 per fire. One hundred and seventy fires occurred in towns and cities, with an average loss of \$2,000 per fire, or a total loss of \$373,541.

There were 22 fires in which the loss exceeded \$5,000 each, the total of these being \$860,569, an average of \$16,390 per fire. The remaining 157 fires averaged \$960 per fire, the total in this group being \$150,442.

Among the outstanding fire losses in February are included the following:

Wholesale grocery at Winston-Salem, \$75,000; motion picture house at Winston-Salem, \$60,000; veneer plant in Robeson county, \$37,000; dwelling in suburbs of Charlotte, \$35,000; business block at Bunyan, \$24,000; battery station and garage at Goldsboro, \$18,000; store and contents at Durham, \$25,000; block of buildings at Ella station, Swain county, \$13,000; business block at Coats, \$19,500.

Of the 103 dwellings affected by fires in February, 85 were in towns, aggregating a loss of \$43,225, an average of \$508 per fire. Eighteen were in rural and suburban districts, with a total loss of \$82,435, an average of \$4,700.

Shingle roofs and defective flues are held responsible for 70 February fires. Forty were of unknown origin. Twelve caught from adjoining buildings; fourteen resulted from overhot stoves and furnaces. Smoking is held responsible for ten.

DOROTHY ELLINGSON GRATEFULLY ACCEPTS A RESPITE TODAY

Jury of Nine Men and Three Women to Return Monday for the Trial; Chastened Girl Returns to Cell

San Francisco, March 28.—Dorothy Ellingson, 16 year old matricide, gratefully accepted a respite today in the ordeal she has been undergoing in the proceedings for obtaining a jury, which will determine her fate.

The jury of nine men and three women, was sworn in yesterday, and the jurors were allowed to go to their homes. The girl was returned to her cell in the jail; not the same girl who entered there almost two months ago, but a chastened girl whose frequent collapses in court have given an entirely different aspect to her legal status.

The jury trial is to begin Monday. It was stated that the taking of testimony will begin then, and it was denied emphatically that the young defendant would either enter a plea at that time to a charge of murder in the second degree, or manslaughter.

BENNETT CASE IS GIVEN TO JURY

Trial Opened Last Monday in Which Bennett and His Wife Are Charged With Murder

Chattanooga, Tenn., March 28.—The case of William H. Bennett and his wife, of Rome, Georgia, charged with the murder of Miss Augusta Hoffman, was given to the jury today after a trial which had opened Monday, and continued through the week.

Facts Concerning Fruits and Berries Grown in the State

Raleigh, March 27.—North Carolina was long ago noted for its scrupulous grape vines, but it was more recently that it was found that strawberries grew to perfection. Hundreds of carloads are sent from the eastern sections of North Carolina daily, during the season.

Dewberries, also, grow well in North Carolina. They bear well and are largely planted. Whortleberries, commonly known as "huckleberries," grow wild and in great profusion in many of the eastern counties and find a ready market. They are used to make pies and preserves.

Early pears, peaches and plums are profitably grown, and the peach tree is coming rapidly into its own.

Figs, also, are grown with great success in eastern North Carolina. Agricultural experts have expressed the opinion that there is no reason why the fig industry should not be made one of the major industries of the eastern counties. Some have advocated the establishment of canneries there, in order that the fruit might be put up where it is so successfully raised.

The mountain plateau of western North Carolina produces apples in great variety of the finest quality. Winesap, Stayman, Rome, Beauty, York, Imperial, Ben Davis and Limber Twig are among the many varieties.

North Carolina apples find natural markets in the cities of Florida, Alabama, Georgia and South Carolina. In any of these cities the fruit can be placed with a comparatively short haulage.

Large apple orchards have been planted in the apple sections of western North Carolina. Haywood, Yancey and Watauga are among the leading apple growing counties. Many are raised in the Brushy Mountains. Polk and other counties in the west are noted for grapes. The Brushy Mountains and other sections furnish late peaches.

SINK APPOINTED COMMISSIONER OF PARDONS TODAY

Will Hear Appeal for Executive Clemency, Investigate Same and Report to Governor

Raleigh, March 28.—Governor McLean today appointed Henry Hoyle Sink, of Lexington, to be Commissioner of Pardons under the act passed by the 1925 General Assembly. The Governor's action put an end to speculation in official circles, which has been rife during the past few weeks as to who would be given the commission. The position was first tendered to former Judge Loyd Horton, of the Superior Court, who declined it because of his desire to return to the practice of law. Mr. Sink is a lawyer.

As commissioner of pardons, Mr. Sink will hear all appeals for executive clemency matters which heretofore have taken a major portion of the Governor's time. He will make investigation of all cases and report his findings to the Governor. The Clemency Power still will be vested in the executive, the Pardon Commissioner being an advisory and investigatory officer.

Prince of Wales Leaves for South Africa and South America

London, March 28.—The Prince of Wales left for Portsmouth to board the battle cruiser Repulse, for South Africa and South America.

Mrs. Margaret Buchanan Convicted on Charge Forgery

Washington, March 28.—Mrs. Margaret Buchanan, former Secretary to Representative Kendall, of Pennsylvania, was sentenced today to three years' imprisonment following her conviction in the District of Columbia Supreme Court on a charge of forgery.

Miss Lillian Hooker Chosen Greenville's Beauty Queen

Miss Lillian Hooker, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. T. Hooker, was chosen by the Chamber of Commerce to represent this city in the "Queens Contest" at the Eastern Carolina Exposition to be held in April in Smithfield. Miss Hooker's name was today certified to the committee who is to be in charge of the contest.

Cambridge Wins in Oxford-Cambridge Boat Race Today

Putney, England, March 28.—The annual Oxford-Cambridge boat race ended again today this afternoon when Oxonians, after rowing about two miles in very rough water, were forced to abandon the contest, owing to the water logged conditions of their boat. Cambridge had led almost from the start, and at the time of the Oxford collapse was leading by about 120 yards.

Brown Finch Killed When Train Strikes Automobile Today

High Point, March 28.—Brown Finch, 30, was instantly killed when the automobile, in which he was riding, was struck by a Southern Passenger train at a crossing near Thomasville, at 8:30 this morning, according to advice received here.

Blue Ridge Mountains Near Twin-City Are Covered With Snow

Winston-Salem, March 28.—The Blue Ridge Mountains, 50 miles north of the city, were covered with snow this morning for a distance of 30 or 40 miles, according to a dispatch received here from North Wilkesboro. While the mercury was far below normal, throughout the Piedmont section, no frost was visible this morning in the mountain countries on account of high winds during the night.

No Session Was Held Today in the Trial of Chapman

Hartford, Conn., March 28.—There was no session today in the trial of Gerald Chapman, notorious mail robber and jail breaker, who is charged with the murder of a New Britain policeman last October. Judge Jennings yesterday adjourned court until Monday, ordering the jury kept in the custody of the sheriff. An entire floor of a local hotel has been retained for the jurors.

Serious Charges Made Against Charles C. Faiman

Chicago, March 28.—An affidavit that Charles C. Faiman, once operated illegally upon a woman in his science school and that the woman died, was taken into criminal court today. The affidavit was produced by counsel for William D. Shepherd, who is charged with the murder of his foster son, and against whom Faiman is the principal witness. The affidavit was sworn to by William Sams Steward, attorney for Shepherd, who is fighting to have the court reconsider its decision denying Shepherd freedom on bail, further charging that the body was disposed of by turning it over to a laboratory.

The affidavit stated further, that according to Earl Clark, former agent for the Faiman school, the woman was taken to the school by a man, and the operation was performed by Faiman, and that death followed. The name of the woman was not given.

The affidavit also stated that he had information and believed that John Sharboro, Assistant States Attorney, had promised immunity to Faiman, who was indicted with Shepherd but had been held in a hotel and has not yet been arrested, and also had promised that the Faiman's school would not be interfered with.

Says Method of Land Companies Great Lake States Very Near Fraud

Washington, March 28.—Land Companies operating in Great Lake States have employed sales methods "which approach very close to the border line of fraud," declared a statement today by the Department of Agriculture, based on its investigation of a land settlement and colonization in the Great Lake States.

Baltimore, March 28.—Dr. Edwin Greenlaw, Professor of English at the University of North Carolina, has been appointed Professor of English at Johns Hopkins University.

AUTO BUREAU TO BE SUPERVISED BY COM. DOUGHTON

Vacancies of Motor Supervisor and Chief Clerk Not to Be Filled; Doughton to Be Assisted in Work By Thompson

Raleigh, March 28.—No appointments will be made to fill the positions of Motor Supervisor and chief clerk of the Automobile License Bureau, but the work of the bureau will be supervised by Revenue Commissioner Doughton and Assistant Commissioner Thompson. Commissioner Doughton made this announcement last night in discussing the vacancies, which will occur in the bureau when it passes from control of the Secretary of State to the Revenue Department, on April 1st, brought about by the resignations of Joseph E. Sawyer, present motor supervisor, and Arthur L. Fleming, his chief clerk. Mr. Doughton said he expected to save the salaries, which are now paid these two officials, together \$9,600, by utilizing the Revenue Department head for supervising the work of the Automobile License Bureau.

DECLARES FAIMAN NEVER HAD GERM CULTURE IN SCHOOL

Mrs. Lulla Rheubell Says There Are Documents Which Will Clear Shepherd of the Charges Against Him

Chicago, March 28.—Edward P. Clark, one of the first witnesses in the inquiry that lead to the indictment of William D. Shepherd, as slayer of his foster son, William N. McClintock, the orphan millionaire, was questioned by the State's attorney today on information that he had been offered \$5,000 to leave the city.

Detectives were sent out to bring in, also for questioning, the head of a detective agency, who was said to have made the offer. Clark, formerly was a salesman of the National University of Science, whose President, Charles C. Faiman, was pointedly indicted with Shepherd after he had said he had given Shepherd typhoid germs, and instructions for administering them to McClintock, on promise of \$100,000 from the youth's estate.

A declaration that Faiman never had any germ culture in his school was made by Mrs. Lulla Rheubell, who said she was formerly secretary of the school, and who yesterday obtained a writ of replevin for the recovery from her landlord of certain documents she said would have a bearing on the Shepherd case. The documents, which she said had been taken from her last Monday, would clear Shepherd of the charges against him.

SERVICES IN BAPTIST CHURCH THIS EVE.

Services Last Night Largely Attended Despite the Inclement Weather; Three Services Sunday

The revival services now being conducted in the Memorial Baptist Church will continue tonight. The evangelist, Rev. J. W. Kinchele, will preach and Rev. R. F. Pittman will sing. Despite the down-pour of rain at the assembling hour last night a goodly company greeted the preacher and singer. The theme of the evening was "The Sufficiency of God's Grace," a truly helpful and inspiring service.

The Sunday services will be as follows: Mr. Kinchele will address the Sunday school at 10:30 a. m. and preach at 11 o'clock and again at 7:30 p. m. Mr. Pittman will sing at the evening hour.

Investigating Comm. In Finances Co - Op Adjourned Today

Richmond, March 28.—The committee investigating the finances of the Tobacco Growers' Cooperative Association at the request of certain growers in Virginia, North Carolina and South Carolina, adjourned its two day session here today, and will meet again in Raleigh on Wednesday. It will sit in Raleigh Wednesday, but will probably meet in some other North Carolina city on Thursday, it was stated. The final meeting will be held in Richmond soon afterward.

No announcement was made as to the result obtained thus far in the investigation, members confining themselves to the statement that the inquiry had not been finished, and probably would not be until after another meeting at the request of members of the association, who were not satisfied with the 1924 final statement of the organization.

50,000 Horse Power Hydro Electric Plant Be Built Catorba River

Charlotte, March 28.—Announcement of a 50,000 horse power hydro electric plant to be built on the Catorba river by the Southern Power Company, was made here this morning by William S. Lee, Vice President of the Company.

Details concerning the site of the plant were withheld by the officials of the Company. Mr. Lee declared there were a number of things to be taken into consideration before a final decision could be reached.

1,234 Children Have Received Treatment Orthopaedic Hospital

Gastonia, March 28.—Children from eight North Carolina counties, a total number of 1,234, have been treated at the North Carolina Orthopaedic Hospital in Gastonia, during its three years of work, according to a statement issued by Robert B. Babington, president and founder. The hospital has passed through its experimental stage. It is now an established curative factor and has a status among state institutions receiving regular appropriations. Its beneficiaries live in all sections of the State, from the mountain to the seashore.

The Orthopaedic hospital has an ever-increasing waiting list. Records show that, so far, 583 cases have been dismissed, cured or materially improved. The average time a hospital case has occupied a bed has been 78 days. The few cases reported unimproved are, Superintendent Babington reports, mentally defective children.

Of the 83 counties represented by cripples at the North Carolina Orthopaedic Hospital, Gaston and Vance made the most constant use of its facilities, although others follow closely. It is said that the patronage of the institution has been governed largely by activity of public welfare and public health agencies and by proximity. The Bureau of Child Welfare at Raleigh, with its field workers, has constantly promoted the interests of crippled children throughout the state and has given valuable assistance to Mr. Babington, he reports.

About \$275,000 has been spent in acquiring, building and equipping the present plant. The greater portion of this was appropriated by the general assembly, as the hospital is a state institution. The general assembly of 1921 allowed \$35,000 for annual maintenance, and the hospital operated a lower number of beds and a shorter personnel to make this meet expenses. Two years later, in 1923, a more substantial allowance was made.

The board of directors of the North Carolina Orthopaedic Hospital is composed of the following: Robert B. Babington, president; George Blanton, chairman; Morgan B. Spier, secretary; J. Lee Robinson, treasurer; Governor McLean, ex-officio chairman; W. C. Bivens, J. G. Jack-ett, Archibald Johnson, R. R. Ray and Paul C. Whitlock.

Dr. Oscar L. Miller is surgeon-in-chief and Miss Ila M. Alexander is superintendent.

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MORE WORKERS NEEDED IN A BROADENING FIELD

Six times as many boys and girls will be graduated from the public high schools this year as were a quarter of a century ago. Then what! Forty-six per cent will continue their education: 112,000 will enter college and 50,000 will enter other institutions. Guidance should be given them to assist in choosing and preparing for that vocation for which they are best adapted and in which they can render their greatest service to society.

Education offers one of the greatest fields of service. The teacher is entrusted with (1) preserving and passing on those experiences of the race most worth while and (2) directing the development of the latest ability of each child in order that he may make his fullest contribution to society.

Women are becoming better prepared for and are entering more than heretofore the fields of administration and research. Men

are entering the ranks as teachers in increasing numbers. The number of men students enrolled in teacher-preparing courses in normal schools and teachers colleges during the last biennial for which statistics have been compiled increased over 71 per cent. The percentage of men teachers increased in the past four years from 18.1-2 to 22.1-2 per cent of the total number employed.

The field of education is not a one-track affair; it offers a variety of types of occupation. (1) Administration has added new fields for specialization. (2) Research is of growing importance. (3) Teaching itself offers numerous new fields for specialization.

The field of education is not overcrowded. The increase in educational facilities to meet the needs of a growing population demands more workers. The development of better standards in education demands more adequately trained workers.

SPEED!

Sixteen engineers, working in seven cities, missed their Sunday dinner, let the afternoon pass, and tinkered into the night, testing out the first long-distance circuit of the fastest thing in news transmission. This intricate little machine sends 2,160 impulses over a telegraph wire in one minute. A press association operator who sends "prans" when his copy reads "The President today sent to the Senate the following nominations:" and "pow" for "The Prince of Wales;" and "gx" for "great excitement," can send on one wire about thirty words a minute. The new telegraph printing machine, sending six impulses for each letter of each word, can transmit sixty words a minute; doubles the speed of the fast press wire. Two of them deliver 120 words a minute; 7,200 an hour; or nearly 60,000 words in eight hours. This would fill eight or ten solid pages in a newspaper.

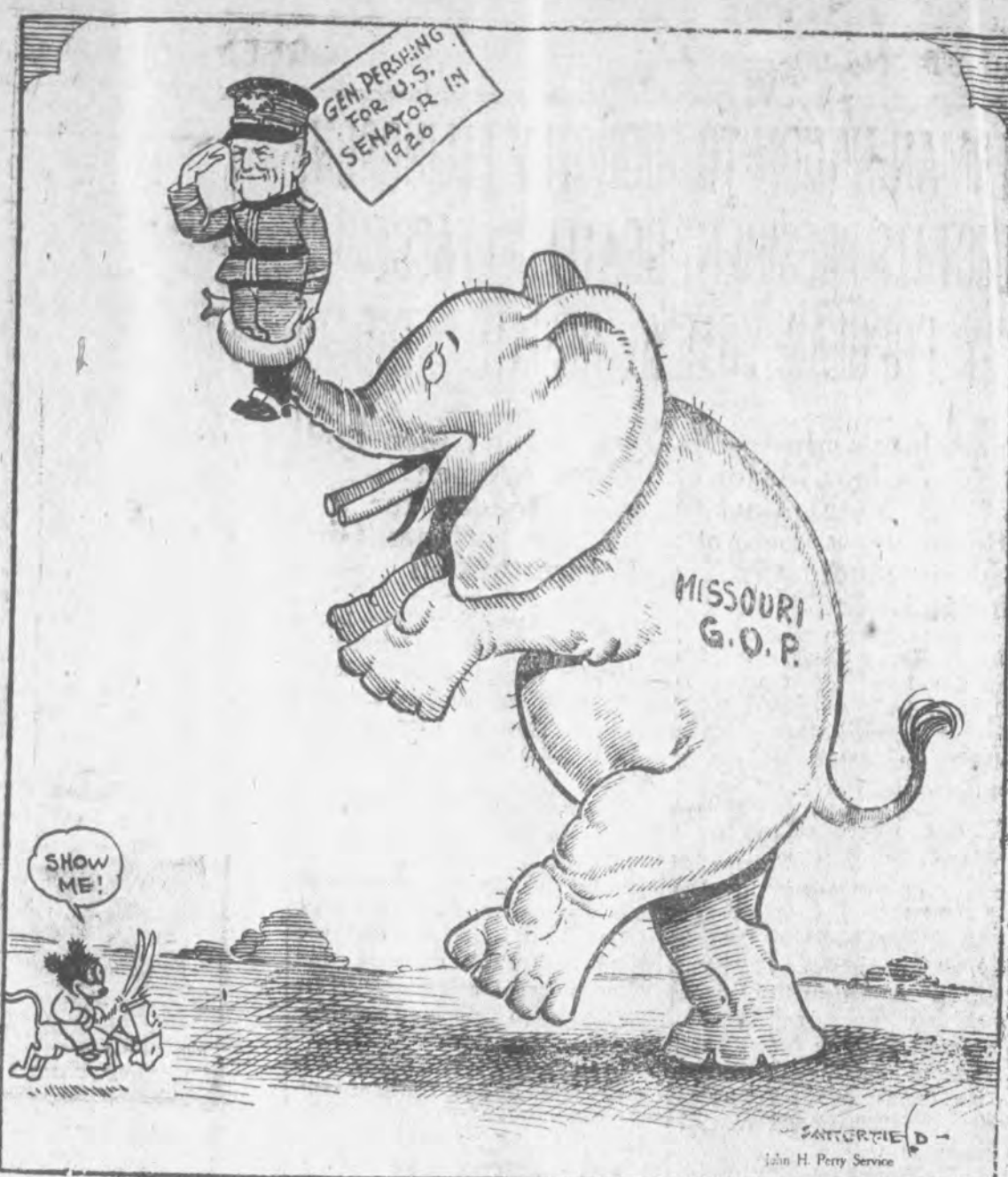

H. — In an attempt to propitiate Madame Pele, the Hawaiian goddess of fire, into activity at her home, the Halemauau pit, "House of Everlasting Fire," of the Kilauea volcano on this island, ancient Hawaiian ceremonies and rites in honor of the old gods will be carried out at the pit mouth on Sunday, March 29, according to announcement of Mrs. P. C. Beamer, an authority on Hawaiian ceremonies and legends, who will direct the affair.

The purpose is to persuade Pele to stir herself from her present condition of sloth and laziness, which has persisted since the last great eruption and explosion in May, 1924, in which one person was killed and several others injured, and to exhibit some of her ancient activity for the benefit of the personnel of the United States fleet which will visit the islands this summer.
There will be no lights at the pit on the night of the ceremonies save the flaming torches of ancient pagentry which will be used in the exercises. All the old Hawaiians of the island will be invited to participate in the rites, which will be an elaborate reproduction of those used in the past to honor the goddess.

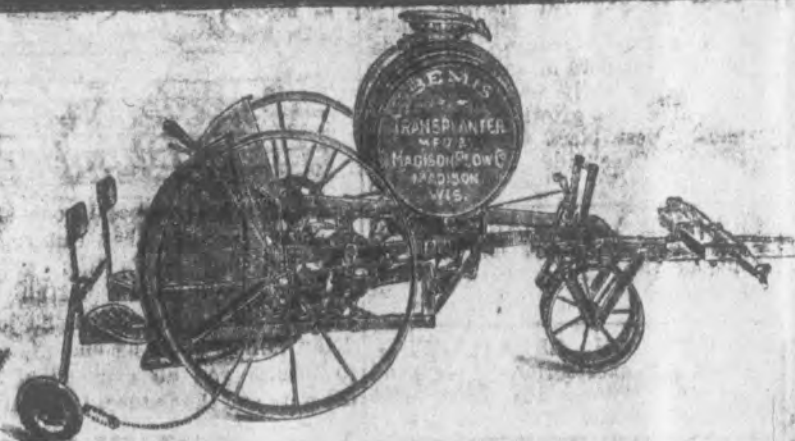
