HEARING IN SUIT

MRS. LILLIAN DUKE
BE HELD APRIL 8TH

Suing Divorced Husband, James B. Duke, for Separation and Maintenance

New York, March 31.—The suit of Mrs. Lillian Natt Duke against James B. Duke, tobacco magnate, who divorced her 20 years ago, for separation and maintenance, is based on the ground that in the divorce case she refused to recognize the jurisdiction of the New Jersey court and reserving of her rights, according to a statement by her attorney, Allen Caruthers.

Her complaint charged that Mr. Duke lived with her from November 1904 until July 1905, when he deserted her. During the ensuing 20 years, the complaint states he has refused to provide for her.

According to Mr. Caruthers, when Duke sued his first wife for divorce in New Jersey, Mrs. Duke claims that both she and her husband were residents of New York, and the New Jersey court could not try the case. He said that when she filed her answer to her husband's complaint, she reserved all her rights. When asked why she had waited 20 years to take action, Mr. Caruthers answered that she had never been in need of money until she was swindled out of nearly \$400,000 in 1922 by stock frauds. He said she now has to earn her living by giving music lessons. A hearing in the case will be held April 8th, when Mrs. Duke must show cause why her suit should be dismissed on the grounds that the divorce is balanced.

G. O. P. "Out of Luck" When it Comes to State Appointments

Raleigh, March 31.—Republicans are "out of luck" in North Carolina for the next four years, insofar as appointments from the executive office are concerned.

Governor A. W. McLean has announced that he will not appoint Republicans to any of the sundry offices which he will have to fill during his term of office.

Governor McLean made this statement when asked if he would appoint a Republican to the budget commission. Under the law in effect in past years, the Governor was charged to appoint a Republican on the budget commission. The new law passed by the 1925 general assembly merely states that the governor shall appoint two members of the budget commission to serve with the chairman of the senate and house finance and appropriations committees.

The Governor in stating he would not appoint a Republican to this office or other state offices which might become vacant during his administration said "the Democratic party is charged with responsibility for carrying on the state's affairs, therefore, Democrats should be appointed to discharge this responsibility."

50 Men Drown When Bridge Over River Caves In

DELMOLD, Germany, March 31.—Fifty members of the German Reichswehr were drowned in the river Weeser this morning when a bridge being constructed by pioneers in connection with the Reichswehr Military Manoeuvres caved in. The victims were part of a column marching in full field equipment, which attempted to use the temporary structure. More than 100 soldiers were precipitated into the river on the river on the Pontoon bridge when it gave way, and the first estimate of 50 drowned may be exceeded. The men thrown into the water had to struggle against handicap of their heavy equipment, and it was said that the inability of a number of them to free themselves from it might greatly increase the death list.

Gov. McLean Will Attend Conference Of Social Workers

Raleigh, March 31.—Governor McLean has tentatively accepted an invitation to attend the conference of social workers in Asheville, in June. The invitation was extended by Mrs. Elizabeth C. Morris.

Admiral Dewey's Body Moved

At the request of Mrs. George Dewey, wife of Admiral Dewey, of Spanish-American War fame, the casket containing his body was taken from the mausoleum in Arlington National Cemetery, Virginia, where it had laid since 1917, and reinterred in the National Cathedral in Washington. The coffin containing the remains of one of America's greatest warriors was carried through Washington's streets on a caisson, and laid to rest in the Bethlehem chapel of the Cathedral, where the body of ex-President Woodrow Wilson also rests.

WEEKS TO PROCEED WITH THE PROGRAM OF ARMORY DRILL

Program of Armory Drill for National Guards to Be According to Requirements of Law

Washington, March 31.—President Coolidge has directed Secretary Weeks to proceed with the War Department's program of Armory drill for National Guards up to the requirements of law. Mr. Coolidge has not been informed as to what extent the program will require expenditures of the fund for that purpose appropriated by Congress without the sanction of the Budget Bureau. Use of these funds had been held up by the President, pending an investigation of the need for them.

ENGLISH GOES ON WITNESS STAND

Federal Judge Takes Stand in Own Behalf and is Asked a Long Series of Questions

St. Louis, March 31.—Federal Judge George W. English, under investigation by the House Judiciary Sub-Committee, charged with reporting on recommendations as to whether the jurist should be impeached, took the witness stand in his own behalf today.

Judge English was interrogated by William M. Action, of Danville, Ill., one of his lawyers, who asked him a long series of questions before launching into an examination calculated to refute much of the testimony built up against the Judge during the past six days.

HELPING STALLED CARS DISCOURAGED BY COURT

New Orleans, La.—The Louisiana State Court of Appeals has decided that if you crank somebody else's automobile, you do so entirely at your own risk.

Harry Perkin of this city broke his arm in obliging J. K. Lewis, a produce broker, whose car would not start, and then sued Lewis for \$1,250. The court's decision was that Perkin knew, or should have known, the risk he was running.

Perkin claimed Lewis asked his aid in cranking the automobile, and also asserted that Lewis gave the engine too much spark as it was being cranked.

ALIENISTS TO TESTIFY MENTAL CONDITION DOROTHY ELLINGSON

Trial Halted Yesterday When Jury Was Impaneled to Pass on Mental Qualifications

San Francisco, March 31.—Dorothy Ellingson came into Superior Court here today prepared to hear alienists employed by her counsel, testify as to her mental condition, in hope that she will be sent to an asylum and thereby escape the possibility of a penitentiary sentence for the killing of her mother, Mrs. Anna Ellingson.

The trial was halted yesterday when the court dismissed the regularly impaneled jury temporarily, and ordered a new jury picked to pass on Miss Ellingson's mental qualifications. The basis of the testimony, according to the court, was whether a person accused of crime reprehended the proceedings, and was able to present an intelligible defense.

Rev. J. W. Kincheloe Conducts Y. W. C. A. Services At College

Reverend Mr. Kincheloe of Rocky Mount, conducted the Y. W. C. A. service of East Carolina Teachers College Sunday evening.

He made a very interesting talk, basing his message on these words: "The Wise Man's eyes are in his head, but the fool walketh in darkness." He was of the opinion that too many words are used to make an impression, and stated that the wise man uses his God given power of vision.

The speaker stated his belief that, if one is wise and uses his eyes to see what he ought to see and his mind to grasp what it ought to grasp, then one accomplishes his mission in life.

Mr. Kincheloe stressed the fact of the amazement which is caused by looking at our own lives and the lives of others to see the usefulness of them; a life which is not a bit appreciative. He told the young women that one of the finest things in the world is the tendency to view people from other angles than the critical ones. He said that there were some things we should strive to see in common. There are some things of which every one should be able to see the dangers. He expressed his belief that one might not be able to see the dangers alone, but their eyes must be open to grasp the opportunities of life. Most of the time opportunities are seen too late. He urged the young women to open their eyes to the dangers and opportunities and to lift up their eyes to the great world God has given, and live consecrated lives.

WANTS NATIONAL TAX BILL REDUCED BY \$500,000,000

Washington, March 31.—Senator King, Democrat of Utah said today that he would introduce a bill in the next session of congress to reduce the National Tax Bill by \$500,000,000. He wants surtaxes cut, and exercise and nuisance taxes abolished.

SALARIES IN AUTO LICENSE BUREAU WILL BE REDUCED

Reductions to Become Effective April 1 With Highest Salaries Being \$150.00 a Month

Raleigh, March 31.—Cuts of from ten to fifty dollars a month in the salaries of the employees of the Auto License Bureau have been announced by the commissioner of Revenue, R. A. Doughton, in his statement last night made public. Mr. Doughton asserted the reductions would become effective on April 1st, when his department takes over the supervision of the Auto License Bureau.

Commissioner Doughton stated that the highest salaries for a clerk in the Bureau will be \$150 a month. Heretofore a number of the clerks have gotten salaries as high as \$200 a month. One salary was raised by the commissioner, that of a young lady who was getting \$90 a month. It is announced that she will be increased to \$100 a month on April 1st.

Practically all of the employees will retain their positions in the Bureau, except for about a dozen who have been notified that their services are no longer needed.

Greenville Debaters Eliminated From Finals Chapel Hill

Greenville, Washington and New Bern formed one triangle in the state wide series of debates held the past week end under the auspices of the University of North Carolina Extension Division. None of the members of this triangle will be represented in the finals at Chapel Hill since it is necessary that both the affirmative and negative teams of any competing school must be successful in order to enter the series for state championship.

Under the rules adopted for 1925 the development of all arguments in the individual debates is left entirely to the students, their coaches being permitted only to make suggestions as to organization, rhetoric and delivery. The work of Mr. Davis in directing and assisting the Greenville debaters was of material benefit to them and the excellent debates produced deserve a high place in the list of Greenville High School's achievements for this year.

Work on \$700,000 Dam At Lake Sule Will Be Underway By April 15

Gastonia, March 31.—Work on the \$700,000 dam at Lake Sule, at Chimney Rock, will be well under way by April 15, it has been announced here. The dam will be 104 feet high and 350 feet long across the top.

Convict Guard Charged With Allowing Convicts to Escape

Greensboro, March 31.—John Snider, Guilford county convict guard, has been arrested and placed under a \$200 bond, on the charge of allowing convicts to escape. Snider claims that he fired shots and tried to prevent the escape.

NEARLY 50 KILLED AND 100 INJURED WHEN TRAINS COLLIDE

Moscow, March 31.—Nearly 50 persons were killed and 100 others injured in a head on collision between the Tashkent Express and a Moscow suburban train last night.

Three Men Held In Local Jail In Connection With Attack On Needleman

Furney W. Sparrow, Jr., of Kinston, Johnnie Gorkin and John A. Griffin, of Martin county, were arrested yesterday as suspects in connection with the mutilation of Joseph H. Needleman, brought to Greenville and placed in the Pitt county jail. Griffin is the 15 year old brother of Ellie Griffin, the alleged victim of assault, with which Needleman is charged.

The three suspects would make no statement today other than to deny any connection with Saturday night's affair in which Needleman was taken from the Martin county jail and carried to the woods and operated upon. Sparrow indicated that he could prove his presence in Kinston at the time which it is said the affair took place.

Williamston, N. C., March 31.—Charged with performing a serious operation upon Joseph H. Needleman, a tobacco salesman, Furney W. Sparrow, Jr., of Kinston, and John Gorkin and John A. Griffin, of Martin county, were under arrest here today. The operation was performed upon Needleman last Sunday after he was alleged to have attacked a young woman Friday night near here.

At Washington, N. C., where Needleman is in a hospital, it was said that he would recover, although permanently mutilated. Sparrow, according to Sheriff Robeson, was married Sunday afternoon to the girl, whom it is alleged was attacked by Needleman. In a statement made Sunday when it was said he would die, Needleman named the three men as his assailants, and warrants were issued at the order of Solicitor Donald Gillan, and served last night. It was expected that the three men will be given preliminary hearing today.

PREDICTS ANOTHER ARMS CONFERENCE

Utah Senator Says Conference Will Be Sponsored by U. S., and Be Held "Before Next Winter"

Washington, March 31.—Another Arms Conference sponsored by the United States will be held "before next winter," Senator King, Democrat of Utah, predicted today after a conference with President Coolidge and Secretary Kellogg. He said the conference should seek to curtail land as well as Naval Armament. The Utah Senator said he also had discussed the world court with the President.

Inspection of National Guard Units Is In Progress in State

Raleigh, March 31.—Inspection of the National Guard units of North Carolina is in progress. First Lieutenant Charles M. Hurt, Cavalry, U. S. A., will make inspections this week at Andrews, Asheville, Hickory and Lincolnton. Next week Lieutenant-Colonel Paroy L. Jones, M. C. U. S. A., stationed at Atlanta, will inspect at Asheville, Henderson, Washington and Edenton. On the following week inspections will be made at Whiteville and Canton, by Captain H. L. Kidwell of Montgomery and Captain E. O. Baker of Atlanta.

Shepherd's Case is Discontinued Until Thursday Morning

Chicago, March 31.—Judge Jacob Hopkins today refused to hear witnesses in support of William D. Shepherd's fight for a reconsideration of the question of his release on bail, because the witnesses were not named in the defense affidavit charging that the principal testimony against Shepherd had been framed. Future hearing was discontinued until Thursday morning.

Grand Lodge of Masons to Be Held Gastonia in May

STATE'S PRINCIPAL WITNESS CHAPMAN TRIAL TAKES STAND

Walter E. Shean on the Stand Today for Cross Examination; Partly Contradicts Direct Story of Yesterday

Hartford, Conn., March 31.—Walter E. Shean, son of a wealthy Springfield, Mass., family, and the state's principal witness against Gerald Chapman, charged with the murder of Patrolman James G. Skelly, during the looting of a New Britain store last October, took the stand today for cross examination.

Shean answered questions hesitatingly and apparently was nervous. He said he had met Chapman, and met him as Waldo Miller.

"Chapman told me he was a friend of George Brown," said Shean.

At this point Federal Judge Groehl, chief counsel for the defense brought out that Brown was known as a safe blower, and was now in the Federal prison at Atlanta.

Shean said he met Brown years ago, and knew him for eight weeks when he disappeared. He had not seen him since, he said, but admitted he had accepted Chapman as a friend although he knew Brown was a crook.

Shean admitted he had had trouble over a stolen bond case. Joseph Marshall, a Springfield Book maker, told him that he had \$100,000 worth of stolen bonds, and asked Shean to help him dispose of them. Shean said he stalled Marshall until he had time to telephone the Department of Justice at Washington to inform that bureau of the stolen bond offer. A government operative called on him, but Shean had neglected to get Marshall's address, and the bonds never were recovered, nor was Marshall arrested.

Shean partly contradicted features of his direct testimony yesterday. This occurred when Groehl asked Shean sarcastically, if he had gone into the New Britain burglary with Chapman on a burning desire to help the government. Shean answered, "I went into the burglary to get all the money I could get out of it." The witness admitted that he had issued many fictitious checks through his advertising concern, and that his "poor old father had to make good for them."

Local Highs Win in the Debate With Washington Highs

The Greenville High School on Friday night won from Washington a favorable decision in the debate at Washington. Ada Orton Moore, Freshman, and Harry Waite Perkins, junior, represented the negative side of the question, "Resolved that North Carolina should ratify the Port Terminals and Water Transportation Act." Their excellent arguments, matched against those of Washington's affirmative team, carried conviction to the judges and scored for Greenville its first debating victory in a number of years.

On Saturday morning, Georgia Johnson and Raymond Walters, seniors, comprising Greenville's affirmative team, met New Bern in the Greenville High School auditorium. The decision was two to one in favor of their opponents. The work of the Greenville debaters compared favorably in every respect with that of the New Bern team, but it is generally conceded that the former had the unpopular side of the question to defend.

Hamel Resigns as Chairman Board or Tax Appeals

Washington, March 31.—Charles D. Hamel, of North Dakota, has resigned as chairman of the Board of Tax Appeals, and probably will be succeeded by John George Korner, of North Carolina, already a member of the board. Mr. Hamel will return to the practice of law.

Coolidge Unresponsive With Regard's Russia's Administration Policies

Washington, March 31.—President Coolidge is still unresponsive to suggestions from any quarter that the administration policies with regard to Russia be changed.

STATES FIGHT FOR THEIR RIGHTS

Among other forms of tax reduction, there is a strong movement for repeal of all federal estate and inheritance taxes on the ground that the states need all the revenue which they yield.

A tax on capital or estates is only justified by the necessities of war and in time of peace should be abolished as rapidly as possible.

The states are fighting for their existence and their political rights on the subject of taxation as conceived by the founders of our government.

This was shown in the refusal to give Congress power to enact labor laws and allow the states to provide reasonable protection for children and families in this field.

The movement of the states to assert their rights against double taxation in any form is a protest against all new federal powers of taxation. In asserting their rights in this matter in peace times, the states are only saying that accumulated capital shall not be dissipated and scattered by federal interference.

By the same token, the states are repeating Webster's dictum that "the power to tax is the power to destroy," and unless a check is placed upon Congress and the bureaus

which it creates, the state governments will be reduced to unimportant administrative units.

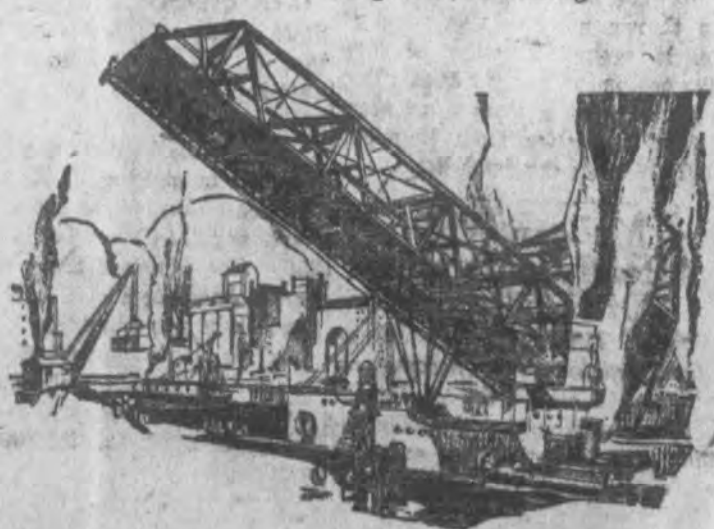

GRAIN

The explanation of the break in wheat, which was regarded by trade leaders here and exporters in New York as without justification, lies in the withdrawal of the public from the buying side the failure of the week's statistics to show as bullish as was expected, the smaller reduction in United States stock than the trade had expected from reports given out two months ago, and a reduction in the export buying and sea-board clearances. On top of these is the heavy selling by professionals. Selling by the big fellows, as one large commission man put it, naturally brought out selling by small holders, all of which helped to depress prices. It was said after the close that liquidation was believed to be over and that prices were down to a level where it was safer to buy.

COTTON

Hicks: The decline of \$9 a bale during the past two weeks has largely discounted the temporary relief in Texas and the lower level is likely to attract buying of new crops by spinners.

Hirsch Lillenthal: While sentiment at the moment is bearish we would prefer buying on any further decline. Chapin: New purchases of July or October contracts should only be made during fresh weak periods from the present level for trading purposes.

Munda and Winslow: We would not be surprised to see a substantial rally though we doubt if any advance will be sustained for the present.

Hontz: As soon as the unsettling influence of disturbances in the grain and stock market is removed we think cotton should do better.
