GERALD CHAPMAN NOTORIOUS BANDIT ON STAND TODAY

Declares That He Had Never Been in Store in Which Skelly Was Murdered

Hartford, Conn., April 2.—Gerald Chapman this morning took the stand in his defense on a charge of having murdered Patrolman James Skelly in New Britain last October 12. Chapman, cool and collected and speaking in clear tones, denied that he had been in the Davidson and Leventhal store in New Britain at any time. It was in this store that Skelly was murdered.

His direct examination was brief. Under questioning of Frederick J. Groehl, he told of having met Walter P. Shearn, of Springfield, Mass., who first accused him of the Skelly murder through the agency of "Dutch" Anderson, his pal in the New York mail robbery.

Under cross examination, he refused to be rushed into answers at the hands of State's Attorney, Hugh M. Alcorn. Alcorn went into the prisoner's past life, over the objection of Groehl, which Judge Jennings overruled.

Coolly and candidly, he discussed his spectacular criminal record under Alcorn's urging. He admitted four previous criminal convictions, and discussed them dispassionately.

When Alcorn asked the witness if he had a gun when he held up the mail truck in New York in 1921, he said: "I had not. Anderson had, but I had not." Alcorn disagreed with Chapman's version of the mail robbery, and the witness looking straight into the prosecutor's eyes said: "I don't want to argue this matter with you. I don't wish to go into the case at all. It has nothing to do with this charge of murder."

He had fired a shot at a Muncie Policeman at the time of his arrest, because "I thought him a hold up man," he said. "I did nothing before he poked a gun under my heart." Chapman stated and added "that he was an unprepossessing fellow at best."

The car so much discussed in the case was owned by Anderson and himself, Chapman said. The Saturday afternoon before the murder October 11, I spent in Holyoke and Springfield, Mass., leaving the latter city about four o'clock for New York. He went by train, he said.

PROBE OF CO-OPS MOVES HEARINGS TO WILSON TODAY

Franklin County Man Declares Before In- vestigating Commit- tee That Organization is Failure

Raleigh, April 2.—The committee investigating the Tri-State Tobacco Growers' (Co-operative) Association today moved its activities to Wilson, N. C., after a day spent here in hearing complaints from individuals yesterday. The committee also delved into the legal and field departments of the association.

Colonel Wiley Person, of Franklin county, appeared before the committee yesterday, and declared that the Co-operative Association had been a failure. He expressed the belief that the farmers of Franklin county had no intention of turning any more tobacco over to the association.

At Wilson today, the committee was expected to hear complaints against the association from growers. Wilson is one of the largest tobacco markets in the world.

Wilson Thomas Is Knocked Down By Car, Now in Hospital

Wilson Thomas, son of Mrs. W. A. Hyman of this city, is in Pitt Community hospital suffering from injuries which he received yesterday when he was knocked down by an automobile driven by Mrs. Frank Johnston. Reports at noon today stated that Wilson was resting quietly and getting along as well as could be expected.

Wilson is well known in Greenville being the little boy who sells peanuts. According to information Mrs. Johnston had stopped her car to buy a bag of peanuts. In starting off the clutch caught causing the car to back. In the meantime Wilson, had started to cross the street behind the car, and was knocked down.

He was immediately rushed to the Pitt Community hospital. Although no bones are broken he is suffering from internal injuries.

Denies Good Prospects for Oil In Eastern Section of This State

Raleigh, April 2.—Brent S. Drane, director of the geological and economic survey today denies that the survey had become optimistic of the prospects of locating oil in eastern North Carolina, and warned prospective buyers of oil stocks that salesmen using the purported endorsements of the survey, were making misstatements. The director asserted that word had come to him of the use of the survey's name in selling arguments by salesmen of stock in development companies.

MURDERER OF HENRY BANKS SENTENCED TO ELECTRIC CHAIR

Wiley Singleton, Negro, Found Guilty of Kill- ing Banks, to Die On May 8

New Bern, April 2.—Wiley Singleton, negro, this morning was sentenced to death by electrocution at the state's prison for the murder of Henry N. Banks on March 7. The date of execution was set for May 8 by Judge Charles C. Lyon, who sentenced the negro.

Banks was killed and robbed of a \$1,200 pay roll on the afternoon of March 7, the negro was arrested a few hours later, and had approximately that amount on his person. The verdict of guilty was returned last night.

938 Farms Were in Operation in Camden County January 1st

Raleigh, April 2.—The Department of Commerce at Washington has announced figures on a farm census of Camden county, North Carolina, showing that there were in operation in that county 938 farms on January 1, 1925, compared with 875 on January 1, 1920. Of these, 593 were operated by white farmers and 345 by negroes.

Tenancy is shown to be on the increase in Camden county. On January 1, 1920, 367 farms were operated by owners and 503 by tenants. On January 1, 1925, 345 were operated by owners and 593 by tenants.

The farm acreage in the county increased from 52,845 on January 1, 1920 to 55,547 on January 1, 1925. There was a reduction in the value of farm lands in Camden during the past five years. Total values aggregated \$2,693,785 on January 1, 1925, as compared with \$2,720,007 five years ago. There was also a decline in the number of cattle and swine on farms.

PRIVATE CAR OF NOTED SINGER IS RAIDED BY OFFICERS

40 Bottles Champaign, Whiskey and Beer Is Found in Private Car of Miss Geraldine Farrar

Rouses Point, New York, April 2.—The matter of prosecution of Geraldine Farrar, noted singer, as a result of the seizure of liquor in her private car yesterday is in abeyance today, pending a report from customs agents here to collector of a port of Ardenburg.

The singer's private car was boarded by four deputy customs collectors after it had crossed the border, en route from Montreal to Rutland, Vermont, where Miss Farrar was to have appeared in concert.

The four deputies said they found about 40 bottles of champagne, whiskey and beer concealed in the car, in a piano, in the maid's room, and behind ventilators. Miss Farrar was in her stateroom, and was not disturbed, neither did she appear in the search. The singer and her party was allowed to proceed to Rutland without furnishing bond.

SHEPHERD DENIED FREEDOM ON BAIL

For Second Time Wil- liam D. Shepherd, Charged With Murder is Denied Freedom on Bail

Chicago, April 2.—William D. Shepherd, charged with murder, for the second time today, was denied freedom on bail by Chief Justice Jacob Hopkins. Judge Hopkins, after denying the petition for bail with Shepherd's formal arraignment for a week after today, after the defendant's attorneys had indicated they proposed to appeal to State Supreme Court on the bail question.

Bing Says He Has Made No Decision Regarding Resignation

Raleigh, April 2.—Arthur E. Bing, secretary and treasurer of the North Carolina Cotton Growers Co-operative Association, stated this afternoon that he had made no decision on whether he would resign as requested by the directors of the organization.

"I have my course to consider," he said "but am not ready at this time to make any announcement."

Clementel Declares France is Honest and Will Pay Debt

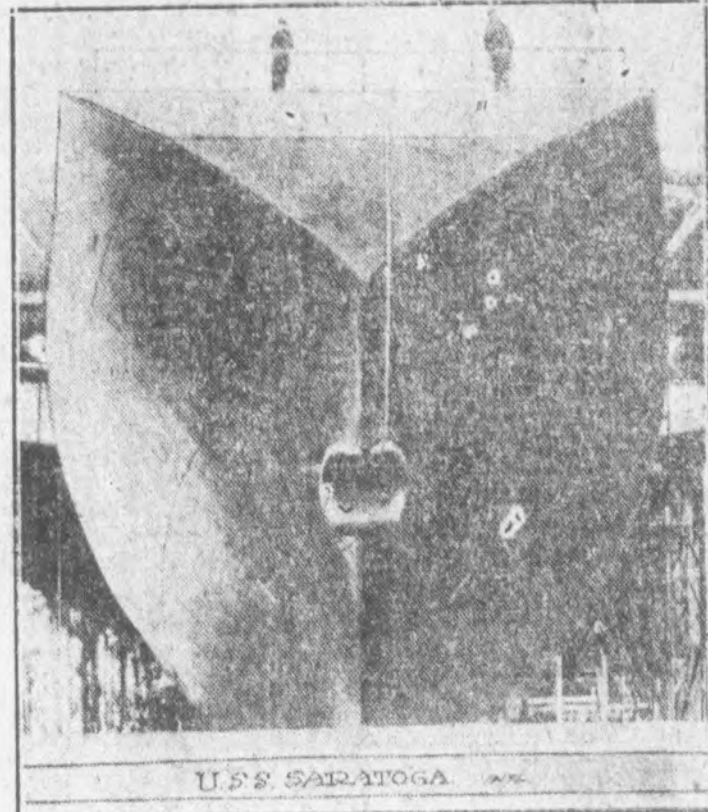

FATHER AND SON TO CLEMSON COLLEGE BE ELECTROCUTED ON FRIDAY, APRIL 10TH

Charles W. Stewart and Son Convicted for Murder of Two Prohi- bition Officers on July 29, 1924

Raleigh, April 2.—Charles W. Stewart and his son, Elmer, white men of Brunswick county, will die in the electric chair on April 10 unless Governor McLean intervenes. In an opinion handed down yesterday afternoon, the Supreme court held that there had been no error in the trial, and affirmed the death sentences imposed by the lower court.

Stewart and his son were convicted in Superior court of Brunswick county for the murder of United States Deputy Sam Lilly, and Leon George, prohibition officers of Wilmington. The crime was committed July 29, 1924, while the two officers were on a still raiding expedition.

Gaston County Textile Mills Will Continue Their Operations

Charlotte, April 2.—The proposed program of curtailment of operations by Gaston county textile mills set for April 10, has been abandoned temporarily at least, it was announced today. New orders justify continued operations on a full time basis, and called the change in plans, it was said.

ROCKY MOUNTAIN FEVER MAY YIELD TO VACCINE

San Francisco.—The State Board of Health reports that the outlook is encouraging for the production of a vaccine to make people immune from Rocky Mountain fever, a dreaded disease in the plateau regions of the Far West.

The board quotes this report from Montana: "The research laboratory of the United States public health service at Hamilton is doing valuable work in its attempt to solve the whole Rocky Mountain spotted fever problem. SUPREME COURT SUSTAINS WILL OF ROBERT E. LITTLE

Efforts Had Been Made to Break Will on the Ground That Man Had Been Incompetent to Draw Deed

Wadesboro, April 2.—A verdict sustaining the will of the late State Senator, Robert E. Little, in which he disposed of an estate valued at around \$200,000, was returned by a jury here today.

The verdict was given at 8:30 o'clock this morning. Deliberations on the case began yesterday, and at mid night the jury was locked up without reaching a decision. At day break, however, they had agreed, and notified Judge Thomas D. Bryson, who has presided over the special term of court.

The trial was an outgrowth of executors seeking to break the will on the ground that the man was incompetent to draw up a deed at the time it was made.

More than 100 witnesses testified in the case, some of them well known throughout the state. Contesting of the will was on the ground that approximately \$100,000 specified to go to the Wadesboro hospital, was not valid on the ground of the incompetency of Mr. Little.

Indians Charged With Deaths of a Papoose, Mexican

Cortez, Colorado, April 2.—An Adept Indian Medicine Man of the Ute tribe in South Western Colorado and son in law were prisoners here today while "pale face" brothers set in motion the laws of civilization to bury a papoose buried alive, in accordance with tribal rites, and for the killing of a Mexican.

Chided for bringing about the death of an infant, Mormon Joe, the Medicine man, tore a leg from a chair yesterday and flogged Joseph Chavez, Mexican cell mate, to death. Chavez was held for bootlegging, and was killed by the Indian before other prisoners or the sheriff could intervene.

Federal officers were to arrive from Denver to take charge of the investigation as the burial was on an Indian reservation under Federal charge. The state, however, will probably prosecute for the killing of Chavez, which occurred outside the reservation.

The Government charges that Pate May, the son in law whose squaw recently died, wrapped the body in a blanket with the child, and buried them on "Coercion of Mormon Joe," in order that the tribal rites might be carried out. The ladies were examined on the reservation last week, and the verdict of the coroner's jury was that the infant was buried alive, while the mother died of natural causes. May is held on a murder charge while Mormon Joe is charged as an accessory.

Wilmington May Have Paper Mill

Wilmington, April 2.—Prospects for the manufacture of wood pulp for paper in this section are claiming the attention of local interests. State Forester H. M. Curran, while in Wilmington, said that he had great faith in the possibilities for development of this industry in the Wilmington district. While here the State Forester visited Pannett Island and also looked over timber in Brunswick county. He was accompanied by General E. F. Glenn.

Labor Commission Says Workmen Needed

Raleigh, April 2.—Frank D. Grist, State Commissioner of Labor and Printing has announced that 1,000 laborers are needed to aid truckers in eastern North Carolina. Mr. Grist said he had been informed there would be a massive crop of straw-berries to be picked. The strawberry picking season will open very early. Workers will also be needed to help truckers dig potatoes and, later on, pick peaches.

WARSAW ALARMED BY STRANGE INFILX CHINESE TRADERS

Warsaw, Poland. — Fearing a so-called Chinese invasion because of the visits to this country of nearly 1,000 Orientals during the last few months, the Polish government has decided that no more Chinese will be admitted until their applications have been passed upon by the Warsaw Foreign Office. The Chinese government, it is understood, is awaiting further details of the Polish government's action before taking up the question with the Warsaw officials.

The invasion began last fall when Chinese peddlers began arriving in Warsaw with Chinese wares and curios, most of them coming by way of Berlin, where visas had been granted by the Polish consulate. Some weeks later several hundred additional Chinese applied for permission to come to Warsaw and were granted visas, and early this year there were further applicants until it is estimated that approximately 1,000 peddlers had visited the country, all representing themselves to be tradesmen. Recalling the fact that several

months prior to the outbreak of the war Poland, then under Russian rule, was visited by several thousand Chinese, all representing themselves to be tradesmen and speaking Russian and German fluently, the Polish authorities have become suspicious. They have received reports from their agents that some of the Orientals posing as tradesmen are in reality engaged in espionage, probably for the Bolshevik government. They speak Russian as well as German, and appear to be prosperous whether they do much business or not.

AVIATION IN AUSTRIA REPORTS GOOD YEAR

Vienna. — Aviation in Austria experienced considerable development in the past year. The number of flights recorded on the routes Vienna-Munich, Vienna-Prague and Vienna-Budapest increased 30 percent, and the mileage flown was greater by 60 percent. The carriage of passengers showed a like increase, while the transportation of goods doubled. The distance flown by the various companies last year over Austrian territory was equivalent to 14 times around the world.

The opening up of new routes, namely Vienna-Berlin, Vienna-Gratze and Vienna-Trieste, are in contemplation.

THEATRE DEVELOP NATIVE DRAMATISTS WELCOMED ROME

Rome. — The opening in Rome this month of the Teatro dell'Arte under the direction of Luigi Pirandello, known to American audiences by "Six Characters in Search of an Author," "Henry IV," and several other productions, is considered in the theatrical circles here an event of considerable importance for the Italian drama in general, but of incalculable consequence to the theatrical life of the Italian capital.

The announced plan of Signor Pirandello to give Rome a theatrical playhouse worthy of the best traditions of the capital of the Caesars, in which native talent will be fostered and foreign works of quality welcomed, is heartily commended here in artistic circles, especially because of the noticeable absence at present of such an institution.

In fact, Rome is perhaps one of the few great centers of European culture where stage productivity has not kept pace with dramatic development, and where the theatre has not been stimulated by the post war wave

of interest in the drama. While scores of theatres and many artistic and experimental companies are busy in Paris, Berlin, Prague, Budapest, Bucharest, Vienna and London, the Italian capital has but an approximate ten playhouses, and of these only a few devote themselves to important native talent.

The Romans have been fed international fare. At one playhouse a Viennese light opera has had a long run and is still playing. At several other theatres translations of light French plays have held the boards, while at another a famous French company has just closed an engagement.

The most active company is directed by a Russian actress who has produced with varying success pieces by Wilde, Shaw, Chekhov, Pierre-Louis, W. Somerset Maugham and works by other foreigners.

WIDE RANGE COVERED
PROGRAM OFFERED
WOMEN'S LEAGUE

Richmond, Va. (The proposed program of work for the National League of Women Voters carries as one of its principal recommendations the outlawry of war and its abolition as a legalized institution. It will be submitted to the annual convention here April 10-22.)

The tentative program, a comprehensive outline covering all phases of the league's activities, is now being sent out for consideration and discussion by state and local leagues. It includes two new federal recommendations, the first being "support of resolutions permitting United States official representation in the disarmament conference when called by the League of Nations." The second calls for "support of measures designed to make effective the Permanent Court of International Justice and providing for the codification of international law," also measures designed for the outlawry of war and its abolition as a legalized institution.

Appointment of women to positions in the national, state and local governments this year is supplemented by the plea for their placement on commissions "and other bodies having international representation."

While a holdover on the program from last year urges ratification of the child labor amendment, in addition this year urges legislation to bring state child labor laws up to a reasonable age, education and physical standard.

The committee on education would have given the task of urging "adequate financing of the federal department of education and of public schools in the District of Columbia, as well as federal aid to states under the public school system research."

Another addition to the work of this committee under the state legislative section is the plea for "equalization of the financial burden by apportionment of state school funds, according to community need, and effort to maintain good educational standards" and "the equalization of educational opportunity through qualified persons on the board of education."

The measures outlined on the program of work for the committee on the legal status of women range from the removal of all common law disabilities of married women, to a plea that women voters be "adequately represented at all party conventions and on all partisan committees and boards elected by the voters."

The development of Muscle Shoals as a national asset through legislation which will provide "wide and economical distribution of electrical power" is one of the chief clauses on the program outlined for the committee.

LONDON, ASKS INVENTORS
FOR FOG EXTERMINATORS

London. — The latest effort of science to rid London of its annoying fogs by means of suction fans has been a failure. The fans were attached to a condenser box, which received the dirt-laden fog and, by means of heat, reduced it to ordinary atmosphere, which was allowed to escape minus the soot and dirt. The suction fans varied from three to 18 inches in diameter and were powerful enough to handle several hundred

cubic feet of fog a minute. The inventors took advantage of the several dense fogs during the winter to test their exterminator, but they have now admitted its impracticability because it would take, they say, at least 750 condensers working together materially to affect even a light fog. The condensers would have to be placed in the streets on roofs and poles throughout the city, and such installations would cost about \$25,000,000.

The London County Council is attempting to arouse interest among inventors to produce a fog exterminator, and has offered to finance testing arrangements. The offer of a prize for a successful machine several years ago brought many inventions from Germany and Austria, but they all failed to affect the thick mist which wanders into the Thames valley in wintertime.

GASOLINE AND TOBACCO
COME CHEAP IN TEXARKANA

Little Rock, Ark. — While the other people of Arkansas pay four cents tax on every package of cigarettes they smoke, four cents a gallon on every gallon of gasoline and ten cents a gallon on motor oil burned in their automobiles, the city of Texarkana is "sitting pretty."

Texarkana, over on the southwestern border of Arkansas, with part of the city in Texas and part in Arkansas, does not have to pay the cigarette and tobacco tax, and pays only one cent a gallon on gasoline. Even the remainder of Miller county, in which the Arkansas city is located, must pay the taxes.

The state of Texas does not levy a tobacco tax and levies only one cent a gallon on gasoline. As a result, when the tobacco and gasoline tax laws were passed Texarkana was exempted from their provisions. It was provided, however, that whenever the state of Texas adopted such tax laws they also should apply to Texarkana.

Thus, Texarkana, in Arkansas, stands in the unique position of having its tax laws, insofar as gasoline

and tobacco are concerned, regulated entirely by the laws of Texas.

Interesting Facts Revealed in Review Fed. Reserve Bank

Richmond, Va., March 31. — The monthly review issued by the federal reserve bank of Richmond, released for publication today, showed that debits to individual accounts reported by the banks in 23 leading business centers of the fifth district during the four weeks ending March 11, 1925, amounted to \$1,176,095,000. This exceeded the total reported by the same cities for the four weeks' period ending February 11, 1925, by \$26,431,000, or 2.2 per cent. Twelve of the 23 reporting cities showed. Increased figures during this more recent period and about half of the decreases shown were very small. The most notable increase was reported by Raleigh, but much of this gain was attributed

to transfer of state funds and did not reflect a material increase in business there.

The review showed that the total number of building permits issued for new construction in 27 fifth reserve district cities during February was greater than the number issued during any February on record. The estimated valuation of the proposed work was also very large. The 27 reported cities issued 2,073 permits for new work, estimated to cost \$15,216,690, in February, compared with 1,715 and a valuation of \$10,998,256 in February, 1924, an increase of 20.9 in the number of permits and 38.4 in valuation.

Fourteen cities reported highest valuation figures in February, 1925, than in February, 1924, Cumberland, Md., Parkerburg, W. Va., Charlotte, N. C., Raleigh, N. C., and Salisbury, N. C., showing gains of more than 100 per cent.

Permits for new construction were issued in North Carolina cities last month as follows:

Asheville, \$195,840; Charlotte, \$1,134,170; Durham, \$76,250; Greensboro, \$157,312; High Point, \$131,065; Raleigh, \$187,724; Salisbury, \$175,615; Wilmington, \$38,675; Winston-Salem, \$591,265.
