NEGRO SHOTS AND KILLS NEGRO WHO CHALLENGES HIM

**James Little, Alias
James Hines, Visits
Logging Camp, Kills
Negro and Makes Get-
Away**

Walter Hines, negro, was shot and killed yesterday by another negro by the name of James Little alias James Hines, at the logging camp near Grimesland. The body of the negro was brought to Greenville and is being held awaiting some one to claim it, while officers with blood hounds are searching for Little.

According to information three negroes were standing in and near the cherty, while another was cooking breakfast. Little approached the crowd and one asked him to lend him a quarter. Upon answering that he did not have a quarter, another negro, who was standing in the door, asked: "How about letting me have a quarter." Little then pulled his pistol and pointed it at the man in the door. In an effort to get out of range of the pistol the negro stepped back falling over a negro who was sitting down. The negro, who was in the chair, after getting up went to the door and challenged Little to shoot him. Without another invitation Little pointed the pistol and fired, the bullet taking effect in the negro's forehead.

The coroner's jury returned the verdict that Hines came to his death by a shot fired from a pistol in the hands of James Little alias James Hines, with intent to kill.

Officers were immediately notified but Little succeeded in making his get away. Every effort possible is being made to apprehend him.

MURRAY'S PLAN TO COLONIZE BOLIVIA HAS STRUCK SNAG

**Says Tract is Nothing
But Jungle Land in
Unhealthy Locality;
Had Hoped to Colon-
ize it With American
Farmers**

New York, April 6.—The plan of former Representative William H. Murray, of Oklahoma, to colonize Bolivia with American farmers, has struck a snag. Sometime ago, the Bolivia government granted Murray 192,000 acres of land in the interior. Returning from Bolivia on the Voltaire, William Charles Cifner, of Colgate, Oklahoma, said the tract sold to them was nothing but jungle land, and rocky soil in an unhealthy locality, and far from any means of transportation. They said that Murray bought the land for ten cents an acre and sold it for sixty cents.

HEAD OF CHEMISTRY DEPARTMENT DIES AT WAKE FOREST

Professor Robert Prichard, Head of Chemistry Department, Dies Suddenly on College Campus

Wake Forest, April 6.—Professor Robert S. Prichard, died suddenly this morning of a heart attack on the college campus. Professor Prichard who was head of the Chemistry Department was talking to some students in front of the gymnasium building shortly after 9:30 when the attack seized him, and before the students could carry him to the hospital, about 100 yards distance, he had died.

Professor Prichard was a graduate of Colgate University, and Pennsylvania State College, and fourteen years taught chemistry in the latter institution, before coming to Wake Forest. He was about 40 years old, and is survived by a widow, two children, several brothers and a father, who live at Scranton, Penn., his home city.

As a tribute of respect, classes were suspended at Wake Forest today, and the Elon College-Wake Forest baseball game, scheduled for this afternoon, was cancelled.

Great Interest Being Manifested Chamber of Deputies Today

Paris, April 6.—The lobby of the Chamber of Deputies and Senate were crowded this afternoon with members of Parliament and others in political groups, of whom forecasted the downfall of the Heriot Ministry, and already were speculating on the composition of the next cabinet. Meanwhile, the cabinet ministers were debating on a reported difference of policy between M. Heriot and M. De Monzie, as new Minister of Finance. M. De Monzie, who came into the limelight as successor to M. Clementel, as Finance Minister, has suddenly acquired a prestige that makes him leader in the possible race for the Premiership if the Heriot Cabinet falls.

Doughton Goes to Country for Rest

Raleigh, April 6.—"I am going out into the country and take a few days' rest before long," said Commissioner of Revenue R. A. Doughton. "I am going to where I will not hear a telephone ring."

Commissioner Doughton, on April 1, took over the North Carolina State automobile registration facilities heretofore operate under the direction of the Secretary of State but transferred to the Department of Revenue by the General Assembly of 1925.

Commissioner Doughton has dismissed a part of the force transferred to him and has reduced the salaries of many who remained. He said he believed he could dispense with the service of some and still run the department with efficiency. However, it will be necessary to add some temporary workers during the rush season of mid-summer, when renewals are in order.

Arnold Says He Has Not Been Notified of Any Libel Suit

Columbia, April 6.—Nathan Edwards Arnold, President of the Federal Land Bank here, stated today that he had not been served with copies of any complaint and that he knew nothing except what he had seen in the papers of a libel suit, in which he is said to have been a defendant. The suit was filed in Raleigh by John H. Boush, former President of the Agricultural Tobacco Credit Corporation at Raleigh, against Mr. Arnold, George A. Norwood, Goldboro banker, and President of the Tri-State Cooperative Marketing Association, and the Raleigh News and Observer, asking for \$50,000 actual and \$50,000 punitive damages from every defendant, as a result of his forced resignation nearly two weeks ago.

SEVERE WIND AND HAIL STORM DOES DAMAGE FLORIDA

**Four Dead and Twenty
Two Injured as Re-
sult of Tornadoes
Which Swooped From
the Everglades Yes-
terday**

Miami, Florida, April 6.—Four persons were dead today, and 22 others nursing their injuries in a Miami hospital after a tornado which swooped erratically from the Everglades yesterday, and did a \$150,000 property damage before it vanished in the Atlantic Ocean.

The bulk of damage was done at the White Belt Dairy, six miles west of Miami, where an aged woman was killed, several injured, and building demolished before the tornado from the ground and swooped down on the westward Inn, a road house near Little River. Three persons were killed and several injured in the destruction of the Inn.

After crashing through buildings of the White Belt Dairy, the gigantic cone demolished four small dwellings, a large garage, and a dining hall of the dairy before it swept on to the westward Inn. From here it passed through the air for one and a half miles into Elizabeth Park, where ten houses were demolished, and then it shifted its course from north eastward to eastward, and between Elizabeth Park and the ocean, several dwellings were partially demolished as the tornado hit them with destructive force.

NEW INCOME TAX RETURNS BE READY FOR PUBLIC JULY 1

**Will Be Withheld From
Public Inspection. Un-
til Authority From In-
ternal Revenue Bu-
reau**

Washington, April 6.—Internal Revenue Collectors have been ordered to withhold the new income tax returns from public inspection until given further authority from the Internal Revenue Bureau. The tax returns will not be available before July 1 for public perusal, and officials expect that the constitutionality of newspaper publications of tax lists will have been determined by Supreme Court by that time.

Commissioner Blair will set a date on which all of the tax books will be opened for public inspection in the event that the law is interpreted to permit it. The Internal Revenue Collector at Kansas City, some days ago made public the tax list in his district, but was immediately ordered to close them again.

Grand Fleet of the United States Gets Big Welcome Today

San Francisco, April 6.—After a night, through which the riding lights of the ships of the United States Grocers fleet, flicked like stars in the darkness of San Francisco Bay, the personnel of the matter was prepared for its first appearance before a Northern California audience. A parade of approximately 10,000 sailors through the canyon of color into Market Street has been transformed.

The parade, preceded by 16 flag officers, was expected to be three miles long, and to be as spectacular in its way, as was the entrance of 107 ships in a line 25 miles long into the bay yesterday. Police, marines, and soldiers were to participate.

The 16 admirals headed by Admiral Robert E. Coontz, Commander in Chief of the fleet, formed the largest body of flag officers ever in San Francisco at one time. They were to be received by Mayor Ralph at the City Home. Following the parade, the sailors are to engage in a baseball championship contest.

NEGRO ARRESTED CHARGED WITH THE MURDER OF B. HILL

**Bahnsen Hill Instantly
Killed and Joseph
Byerly Seriously
Wounded Near High
Point**

Highpoint, April 6.—Floyd Cummings, who is alleged to have shot and killed Bahnsen Hill, and severely wounded Joseph Byerly, near this city last night, was arrested here early this afternoon.

Cummings was captured by Deputy Sheriff Robert Parker, in the home of a negro in a South Eastern section of the city. The deputy sheriff said Cummings admitted having shot Hill and Byerly. The negro is being held in a city jail.

High Point, April 6.—Police and other officers continued their search early today for Floyd Cummings, a negro, who is alleged to have shot and instantly killed Bahnsen Hill, and seriously wounded Joseph Byerly, a white man living near here, last night. Blood hounds were brought here to be used in the search, but abandoned the trail near Jamestown this morning. Officers are of the opinion that Floyd Cummings was picked up by a passing automobile at that point.

At a local hospital here Byerly is a patient, and it was reported today that he was in a very critical condition. Chief of Police Blackwelder, said that Byerly told him that Hill and a negro came to his home last night about 11:30 o'clock, and called him out. Byerly declared, according to the chief, that Hill shot him, but members of his family asserted that both of the white men were shot by the negro.

Lady Astor Withdraws Statement Against Arthur Hayday Today

London, April 6.—After Arthur Hayday today had demanded in the House of Commons that Lady Astor withdraw remarks she made concerning him on Friday, the American born woman member of Parliament, unreservedly withdrew her statement and the incident was closed.

Lady Astor's impetuous temperament led to her overstepping the bounds of Parliamentary decorum on Friday, and brought down upon her a reproof from the speaker when she made personal criticism of Hayday, who reportedly had interrupted her remarks on a drink bill. She attempted to quiet the heckler by saying if she told the House all she knew about Hayday and the company he kept, it would not reflect credit upon him, nor the labor party. Lady Astor later said she had no sinister implications on Mr. Hayday's personal affairs, what she had not liked was his attitude towards the drink question.

MATRICIDE QUOTED AS SAYING INSANITY TRIAL A FARCE

**Dorothy Ellingston Is
Credited as Saying
That She Will Insist on

San Francisco, April 6.—Cross examination of Dr. Jaudon Ball, an alienist for the defense, was in progress today as the trial to determine the sanity of Dorothy Ellingston, 17-year old matricide, was resumed. With the final submission of evidence by Dr. Ball, who has expressed belief that the girl is insane, the defense will rest its case. The girl is quoted as having said last night that "her insanity trial is a farce; they are making a monkey out of me, and before the trial is over she is going to insist that the jury give her a hearing."

ARE YOU FREE FROM BLAME

In seven years, from 1915 to 1923 inclusive, defective chimneys and flues caused a loss of \$104,289,206 in the United States. At an originator of fires, only matches and smoking have a greater record than chimneys and flues.

"Safeguarding America Against Fire" shows by photographs the type of chimney in the average dwelling place which has caused this terrible loss. There is apparently no excuse for their existence other than the carelessness of the people who live in the houses where they are located.

These chimneys are shown to have open cracks between the bricks where the flames and sparks can come in contact with wooden walls. It makes one shudder to think of the thousands of helpless children, sick persons and cripples who are in houses where this lurking fire menace is ever-present.

Reflect for a moment that the greatest known fire starters are matches, smoking and defective chimneys, and that control over them rests entirely with the individual. Losses caused by these agencies are almost wholly chargeable to the individual. Such a record of fire loss from these controllable causes is a terrible arraignment of the average American for his negligence or indifference toward life and property.

In France the fire-starter is liable for damage caused by his carelessness. The fire-loss record in United States has more than doubled in the last ten years. If it doubles in the next ten years, the annual destruction by fire will aggregate over a billion dollars in money and the death of 30,000 persons.

Unless we check our own carelessness the law may have to check it for us.

NOTES ON TARHEELIA

The average rainfall for North Carolina is 50.06 inches—45.38 for the Coastal Plain, 47.22 for the Piedmont and 54.97 for the mountain section.

The value of North Carolina's standing timber is estimated at \$167,150,000 divided as follows: Mountain region, \$48,000,000; Piedmont region, \$35,150,000; and Coastal Plain, \$81,000,000.

More than 150 plants and herbs used for medical purposes are found in North Carolina.

Two hundred and nineteen species and sub-species of minerals have been identified in North Carolina. Some of these are new species that were first identified in this state. Various gems have been found here, including the diamond. North Carolina boasts of its fine variety of the Rhododendron.

The Oxford Orphanage, which is operated under the jurisdiction of the North Carolina Grand Lodge of Masons, was established in 1872. The present value of the plant is \$750,000. The plant consists of 28 buildings, surrounded by 242 acres of ground. The orphanage cares for 400 children.

POLISHED BRASS LOSES OUT BEFORE WAVE OF ECONOMY

Liverpool—Brass work, with which the front doors of most British homes have been adorned for centuries and which contributes to the furnishings of numerous officers, is going out of fashion because of the expense involved in keeping the fixtures shiny. Many new buildings in Liverpool and elsewhere in England are going up without brass or copper decorations.

TESTS SHOW THAT SUGAR AND STOCK BEETS WILL GROW IN MOUNTAINS N. C.

Raleigh, April 6.—Professor Fred E. Miller, assistant director in charge of branch station farms of the North Carolina Experiment Station, has reported that tests made with sugar or stock beets show that this crop will grow all in the mountains of North Carolina. Further, he said that it will furnish an abundant supply of excellent winter feed for dairy cattle.

The sugar beet was grown for the first time last year on the Mountain Branch Station, near Swannanoa. Five varieties were tested and while all of them showed up well, two varieties did exceptionally well, giving yields at the rate of about ten tons to the acre.

The beets were stored in the newly completed storage house on the mountain station farm and were used during the winter as feed for the poultry and dairy cattle.

Professor Miller said that the hens liked to pick the beets during the winter months when green feed was not available. He added that beets were hung up in hen houses and that hens jumped up to pick them, thus going through a beneficial form of exercise. This exercise, he said, added to the hens' capacity for laying.

Continuing, Professor Miller said: "While the beet is a new crop for our farm, the Biltmore farms, near Asheville, have been raising it for some two or three years, with success. This led us to believe we could afford to make some tests to determine the best method of growing the sugar beet for the benefit of the average farmer in our mountain counties. Our results last year bore out the soundness of this idea."

Gish Suit Ends; Duell Held

Charles H. Duell, Jr.'s suit for a permanent injunction to restrain Lillian Gish, film star, from breaking her seven-year contract with him came to an unexpected end in New York Federal Court when Judge Mack held the film producer in \$10,000 bail for alleged perjury and directed the District Attorney to begin procedure to bring about an indictment. The court held that Miss Gish's contract had been substantially breached by Duell and said that the actress's confidence had been overreached and taken advantage of by the plaintiff. Judge Mack called Duell's affidavits "downright perjury."

BANKER EXPLAINS
LOW MONEY RATES
LOANED IN WALL ST

New York.—Newspapers throughout the country publishing daily New York money rates on call and short-term loans, often are asked by the readers where they can get some of the money Wall Street is loaning at, say, four per cent when local banks are asking six.

A leading metropolitan banker here offers in reply that this lower-priced money is not available to the general banking public. It is put out under special conditions which he sums up as "wholesale versus retail." Wall Street, he explains, can afford to make a wholesale price, such as four per cent money represents, because it makes these loans only in wholesale amounts, with \$100,000 as a minimum.

The borrowing as perforce restricted, this banker says, to larger interests whose high credit rating saves the usual time and expense of investigation. Placing the money in bulk accordingly costs the bank no more than arranging \$1,000 for a private borrower, and becomes an obvious saving over placing the amount in 100 separate retail transactions. Furthermore, these large loans are for definite and limited periods, and are protected by pledged securities which could be converted, if need be, overnight. Average commercial loans being made under conditions just the reverse, in his opinion, a higher retail price must prevail.

Such loans represent smaller amounts, and "overhead" mounts up as loaning operations are repeated. There can be less taking on faith and expense looked up. Collateral is less liquid. Loaning periods are usually longer, and they carry a hazard of indefiniteness in the chance that many have to be renewed.

Furthermore, the banker says, although a merchant's or a farmer's resources in proportion to what he wants may be fully as good as those of a corporation, he is necessarily limited to the community where he is known. With a community having only so much money available, cash is at a higher premium than in a money center where large borrowers may shop.
