GREENVILLE HIGH SCHOOL WINS LOVING CUP AT TRACK MEET YESTERDAY

Large Crowds Attend the Fourth Annual Public School Track Meet; Local High School Wins Loving Cup Given By Rotarians With 77 Points; Grifton Wins Second Place With 65 Points

The Fourth Annual Public School Track Meet for Pitt county, sponsored by the Greenville Rotary Club, was held yesterday afternoon at the Fair Grounds. Greenville High School won the cup offered by the Rotary Club with a total of 77 points. Grifton was a close second with 65 points, while Farnville was third with 47. The Falkland School won more points than any other school in the county outside of an incorporated town. Their total was 22 points, while Fountain came second with 21 points. The prize for this was a bunch of bananas given by the Merchants Produce Co., of Greenville. A tremendous audience of four or five thousand folks watched the events and cheered their favorites in the various contests. A bitter cold wind, laden with dust swept across the field during the whole contest and while it slowed down the time of some of the contestants, it did not dampen their enthusiasm nor did it affect the crowd. In addition the awards mentioned above the people of Greenville gave prizes to the winners of all first places. Charles King of the Greenville High School took the lead in amazing points winning five first places and one second for a total of 28 points. Velt McLawhorn of Grifton came second with 22 points. Cora Harris of Grifton led in the number of points scored by any winning 15 points. Irlia Nichols of Arthur came second with 11 points to her credit. The meet began at two o'clock promptly and was over by 4:30. The judges were Messrs. D. E. Oglesby, Farnville; Vance Bunting, Bethel, and J. F. Barwick, Ayden. The officials of the meet were Messrs. GOLF EDITOR FALLS FROM WINDOW AND DIES FROM INJURIES

Leon B. Paton, Golf Editor of the Boston Herald, Falls Four Stories and Breaks Spine

Boston, April 7.—Leon B. Paton, golf editor of the Boston Herald, and a well known amateur golfer, died today at a hospital as the result of a fall several hours earlier from the window of his apartment. Paton, who was about 40 years old, had recently moved into the new apartment, and was putting in some window screens when he is said to have lost his balance and fallen four stories to the ground, breaking his spine.

Bank of France Exceeds Legal Limits On Its Circulation

Paris, April 7.—The Bank of France, it was said in official circles today, has already exceeded the legal limit on its circulation by more than 1,500,000,000 francs, so that it became imperative to regulate this situation by increasing this limit by the law for regulating the financial position of the country. A bill embodying this position was introduced in Parliament this afternoon.

The Weekly statement of the Bank of France last Thursday showed a circulation of 96,000,000 francs, but the bills accepted showed a sudden increase of over a billion francs, and it is declared that this, with other accounts were used to back the situation. This state of affairs, it is said in government circles, will be revealed to the country by Finance Minister De Monzie in the Chamber of Deputies this afternoon, where he will, as has been hinted of late, tell the whole truth about the situation.

Kurdish Insurrection Spreads Over Turco Persian Frontier

London, April 7.—An exchange telegraph dispatch from Constantinople, reports that the Kurdish insurrection has spread over the Turco-Persian frontier. Therefore the dispatch says, the Teheron Government has sent troops to that locality.

EVIDENCE LIQUOR VICE SYNDICATE IS FOUND IN CHICAGO

Raid Headquarters and Record of Wealthy Liquor Customers, Account of Beer Deliveries, Etc., Confiscated

Chicago, April 7.—Evidence of liquor and vice syndicate, which the police said, has been doing business of millions of dollars a year, was found here yesterday in a raid on the headquarters of an organization where eight men, who are alleged to be subordinates, were arrested. Record of wealthy liquor customers, names of bribed prohibition enforcement officers, accounts of beer deliveries, and details of the channels whereby liquor was brought from run fleets of New York, Miami, Fla., and New Orleans, were confiscated. The raiders said they found an accounting system as efficient as that of a big business firm. Several thousands of dollars in checks of saloon men and druggists, including one for \$15,000 from a North Side drug store, were seized. John Paton, former mayor of Burnham, a suburb, was one of those arrested and was charged with having offered the raiders \$5,000 to forget the bookkeeping system. Search is being made for the higher men in the business.

W. B. Pace to Leave N. C. Agricultural Extension Service

Raleigh, April 7.—W. B. Pace, district agent in charge of county work in Northeastern North Carolina for the Agricultural Extension Service of the State College, has resigned, effective May 1. B. Troy Ferguson, now county agent in Wilson county, has been appointed to succeed him. Mr. Pace was appointed two years ago, being promoted from the position of county agent. He is a native of Mississippi and a graduate of the A. & M. College of that State.

Headquarters for the Northeastern District were moved to State College several months ago. Mr. Pace then moved to Raleigh, bringing his family. He will go to Arkansas, May 1, to enter commercial work.

Mr. Ferguson, who will succeed Mr. Pace, is a native of Chatham county, North Carolina. He was reared in Siler City. He graduated from State College in 1903, immediately following which he taught school. He then entered the service of a large nursery company, after which he was manager on an extensive plantation in Eastern North Carolina.

Mr. Ferguson attracted the attention of the Agricultural Extension Service, and was appointed county agent in Pitt county. After three years, he was transferred to Wilson county, where he has been for the past seven years. He is married and has one child. He will maintain headquarters in Raleigh, at the college, and will bring his family here.

Sigman Convicted In Catawba County Charge Immorality

Hickory, April 7.—Thomas L. Sigman, former superintendent of business instructions of Burke county, and twice its representative in the legislature, was convicted today in Catawba county superior court on a charge of immorality. He was given his choice to six months on Burke county roads, or six months in the county jail, and was fined \$250 and cost of the action.

Solicitor Robert L. Huffman rested the state's case after Miss Myrtle Godfrey, Sigman's former stenographer, swore that the legislator was the father of her illegitimate child. The rest of the time was taken up with testimony of the new character witnesses, who swore to the previous good character of Sigman, who is a man of about 55 years, and who is a man of a large family.

GEORGE ROSS POW RE-ELECTED SUPT. OF STATE PRISON

Hugh Love Elected Asst. Supt. While Warden and Prison Physician is Awarded Dr. J. H. Norman; Busbee Loses His Position

Raleigh, N. C., April 7.—The board of directors of the State prison this afternoon announced the re-election of George Ross Pow, as superintendent of the state prison, on a salary of \$4,000 a month. Hugh A. Love was elected assistant superintendent on a salary of \$2,667.50.

Positions of warden and prison physician were combined and awarded to Dr. J. H. Norman. This means that Samuel Busbee, who has been warden for the past ten years and in the employ of the state prison for almost double this time loses his position as warden.

Raleigh, April 7.—Following a four-hour session of the State Prison Board, announcement was made at 1:30 o'clock this afternoon that the board's decision with reference to the election of prison officials would be announced by the Governor at 3:00 o'clock. No intimation as to the board's action was given out. The meeting through was executive. A part of the time, however, Superintendent Pough and Chief Clerk, Love, were present at the meeting.

Haffey Appointed Bishop Roman Catholic Diocese at Raleigh

Baltimore, April 7.—The Reverend William J. Haffey, Chancellor of the Arch Diocese of Baltimore, has been appointed first Bishop of the new character of Arch Bishop Curley here today.

Father Haffey, who is 37 years old, is a native of Chicopee, Mass. He was ordained at Mount St. Mary's College, Emmettsburg, N. Y., in 1914, and is Maryland State Chaplain of the Knights of Columbus, and in charge of the Catholic Daughters of America.

Tank Wagon Price Gasoline in State Is Now 18 Cents

New York, April 7.—A new reduction of one cent a gallon in gasoline prices was announced today by the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey, throughout its territory, except West Virginia, where no change was made, and South Carolina, where the reduction was one half cent. The tank wagon price in North Carolina is now 18 cents, and the Gulf Refining Company met the Standard Oil Company reduction.

Forest Fire Raging Near Blacksburg, Va.

Blacksburg, Va., April 7.—59 Virginia Polytechnic Institution cadets and more than 100 citizens of Blacksburg left here today for the scene of a forest fire in the mountains four miles northwest of here, where 150 houses and several saw mills are menaced by flames which have raged uncontrolled for several days. While the town of Blacksburg and the grounds of the Virginia Polytechnic Institution are not yet threatened, one half dozen home and saw mills are in the immediate path of the fire, and it is estimated that 150 houses on the side of the mountain were in the danger of the fire path.

Richmond, April 7.—Authority to turn out the National Guard Company at Blacksburg, to help rangers combat forest fires raging in the mountains near that town, was asked of the Adjutant General's Office here shortly afternoon today.

FAMOUS CHINESE ARSENAL MAY BECOME AUTO FACTORY

Shanghai.—Tired of armed conflict and realizing that men cannot fight without rifles, revolvers and ammunition, Shanghai has welcomed a project to turn the Kiangnan Arsenal into a motor car factory. Deprived of this local source of weapons, warring factions may become more peaceful, it is argued.

The arsenal was built some 20 years ago, near Shanghai, and for half a century it has been the objective of much strife and many warlike clashes.

Recent orders from Peking said the arms making machinery in the arsenal should be removed from the Shanghai district, possibly to Nanking, and that the building be turned over to the Shanghai Chamber of Commerce for commercial uses. Thereafter came the proposal that China's first automobile factory be inaugurated in the old arsenal, and Canton capitalists have the matter under favorable consideration.

Dairymen Drum Up Trade

Berlin.—Berlin drinks today only a little more than one-half the quantity of milk it consumed before the war. The reason evidently is that the use of milk substitutes still prevails. A municipal exhibition is planned to bring milk back to its former popularity.

TEXTILE MEN IN SEMI-ANNUAL MEET IN WASHINGTON

President Coolidge Addresses Session and is Very Optimistic Over Increased Prosperity

Washington, April 7.—A first hand study of governmental activities in relation to Textile industry with a meeting for that purpose at the Department of Commerce and Bureau of Standards occupied most of the program today, for members attending the semi-annual session of the National Association of Cotton Manufacturers. The meeting at the commerce department was arranged to include a brief address by Secretary Hoover, with opportunity later given the Association members to interview, personally, some of the department's trade representatives in foreign lands, as to trade prospects and conditions in various countries. President Coolidge delivered an address in the Association Bureau last night, in which he viewed the business outlook as one of increased prosperity, and saw in that a justification of the tariff. In his general discussion of business, the President again pledged an administration of justice in its relations with business, and for the cotton industry gave assurance of the government's full assistance in fighting the Boll Weevil and endorsed the suggestion for a treaty of cooperation among the cotton producing states. Director Lord of the Budget, who was another speaker, discussed governmental economy and declared that "with no change in the program as carried in the 1926 budget, we will end the year with a balanced budget and a surplus of \$67,884,489."

New Financial Bill Introduced in the Chamber of Deputies

Paris, April 7.—The Government's new financial bill embodying the provision of the proposed capitol levy, or forced loan, was introduced in the Chamber of Deputies this afternoon by Finance Minister De Monzie. The measure was agreed to by the Cabinet this morning. Mme. De Monzie asked for its immediate reference to the finance committee and for a report on it before the end of the day.

The mechanism of the system as explained by the Finance Minister after adjournment of this morning's Cabinet meeting for the intention of affording property owners and capitalists of France a chance to come forward and contribute proportionately of their wealth to the renovation of French finances. There are condition provisions obliging them to do so if they refrain from voluntary contributions.

"It is a plebiscite of questions of free voluntary contributions as according to his own means," was the way M. De Monzie put it. "If the French capitalist understand the system of the patriotic call, and respond to the call of the government, it will work without the slightest annoyance of private affairs, but on the contrary, if they make constraint necessary, it will be resorted to." Declarations for income tax will be taken as a basis for obligatory subscriptions of loans in cases where the capitalist fails to come forward voluntarily. Subsequently these declarations will be verified if there are reasons to suspect their incorrectness. Contributions under forced loans may be spread over a period of years, and contributions will receive three percent perpetual rent.

WOMEN HOCKEY PLAYERS HEADED FOR AMERICA

Belfast, Ireland.—Announcement that Scotch-Irish women's hockey team would make a tour of the United States and Canada in September, has aroused interest here, and more than a score of aspirants for the team have already entered their names for the try-outs. The team, which will include eight Scotch and eight Irish players, will be chosen in April.

DR. McNAIRY WILL SPEAK JOINT MEET PARENT-TEACHERS

Model and Evans Street Schools to Have Joint Meeting of Parent-Teacher Associations April 8, 8:30 p. m.

At this time the School Band will play a number of selections and Miss Helene Higgs will sing. Then Dr. McNairy of Kingston, will address the meeting. Everybody is invited to hear Dr. McNairy. The patrons of the schools will be counted and credited for the attendance prizes.

Coolidge Unable to Attend Charlotte Celebration May 20

Washington, April 7.—President Coolidge today notified those in charge of the Mecklenburg county celebration to be held at Charlotte on May 29 that he would be unable to attend. The celebration is the 150th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence of Mecklenburg county.

State Sunday School Convention to Be Held Greensboro Apr. 28-30

Greensboro, April 7.—Sunday School workers of all denominations throughout the state are planning to attend the annual state Sunday School Convention in Greensboro, Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, April 28, 29 and 30, according to the report of D. W. Sims, Raleigh, General Superintendent of the North Carolina Sunday School Association.

At a full meeting of the General Committee on Arrangements and the Entertainment Committee on Thursday night, April 2, plans were perfected for entertaining the convention. Superintendent D. W. Sims, who is now 83 counties in state organized into County Sunday School Associations, and that the majority of these organizations would be well represented at the convention in Greensboro.

Saratoga Launched At New York Ship Bld'g Corp. Yd. Today

Camden, New Jersey, April 7.—The Saratoga, the world's greatest and swiftest airplane carrier, was launched at the New York Ship Building Corporation Yard at 1:18 o'clock this afternoon.

WEATHER FORECASTS NEED REPORTS FROM DIST. CONTINENTS

Washington. — Two additional observation stations, located probably in America and Asia, and accurate recording of the sun's changes of radiation over a period of years will be necessary, in the opinion of Dr. C. G. Abbott, assistant secretary of the Smithsonian Institution and director of its astrophysical observatory, to determine the exact extent to which weather depends upon solar changes.

The sun's heat, Dr. Abbott believes, governs the earth's temperature and rainfall, and a change in it must modify these. The astrophysical observatory began with the problem in 1902, commencing to observe solar radiation in Washington but the impure atmosphere here necessitated its removal. The institution now maintains observing stations at Mount Harqua Hala, in Arizona, which has been continuously occupied since Oct. 1920, and on Mount Montezuma, nearly 10,000 feet high and about 12 miles from Calama, in the nitrate desert of Chile.

Two additional first-rate stations are desirable, Dr. Abbott believes, at well separated points in cloudless regions, where winter observations might be more favorable. Due to the lack of funds at the present time, the Smithsonian Institution is unable to undertake this program. Before selecting sites for the proposed new solar observing stations, Dr. Abbott thinks \$5,000 would be needed to make a preliminary survey. For each station it would require from \$10,000 to \$15,000 for original installation, and from \$8,000 to \$12,000 annually for continuous operation, depending on location.

Pointing out that during the past two and a half years, on the whole, the solar heat appears to have been continuously below normal, Dr. Abbott said that of late months the tendency to rise has become apparent, so that it seems likely that higher values soon will prevail again.

During the past year the Institution has received from its Arizona and Chile stations each day a report of solar observations of the day preceding. These have been made the basis of forecasts for the temperature of New York City for several days in advance. Mathematical methods, Dr. Abbott said, show that these forecasts "indicate some degree of real provision, based on the solar observations, even to five days in advance." A continuation of this work is intended.

SAILOR COMPLIMENTS MANILA AFTER 36 YEARS' ABSENCE

Manila.—Captain John Bradshaw of the steamship Belgenland, which is carrying some 500 excursionists around the world, recalled his previous visit to the Philippines 36 years ago, when he tied up his big ship here recently to what he said was one of the finest piers in the world.

"Thirty-six years ago," said Captain Bradshaw, "I put into Hoilo with a shipload of sick men, and we buried them all but three. All but three, and one of the three was myself. Feyer and ague took them off. I'll wager you have but little of that nowadays, everything looks so clean."

"You know it's a very strange thing! From here we are going to Batavia. There 38 years ago the Japanese had me all tied up to a tree ready to send me into Kingdom Come. But I got away."

"The Philippines look very different to me, very different, indeed. The last time I was here with the old Cambay, a 1,000 ton ship, and now I have a 27,000 ton ship. There's a great difference."

1925 LAUGHS AT HATS WORN BY MEN IN 1825

Berlin.—Men's hats of olden days afforded the Berlin public much amusement during the recent exhibit of clothing, held to contrast the styles of the last 100 years with the styles of today.

High hats, much taller than those worn today, and as shaggy as a New foundland dog, appeared in the windows of many haberdashers. Curious straw hats loaned by museums also produced broad smiles among the throngs which gathered about show-windows. Many of these were shaped like old-fashioned silk hats, and were made of bamboo and oriental grasses.

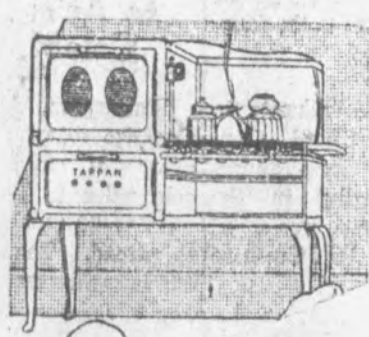

RACING MOTORBOATS CEASELESS RAVAGES ON THIS SUMMER OF TIME AND TIDE T AMAZING SPEEDS DOOM NOTEX BRIDGE

Detroit. — The greatest speed test all time, so far as power boats are concerned, is anticipated when Commodore Gar Wood and a French driver, as yet unnamed, match skill and craft on the Detroit river for the Harnsworth trophy. When the trophy was defended Wood was preparing to show a speed of between 85 and 90 miles an hour. The speed was not necessary, however, for his opponent met with mishap and sank before the race was completed.

That was in 1921, and Wood's Miss America II, which had developed more than 80 miles an hour in official trials, never has been raced since. A new craft of the hydroplane type, powered as was Miss America II, with four Liberty motors of 12 cylinders each, probably will be built for Wood to defend the "B. I. T." as the Harnsworth trophy is designated.

Since the deed of gift covering the old cup trophy has been revised to meet competition to craft the "gunboat" type, the British International Trophy is the only remaining event that gives free rein to contestants seeking speed records. The gold cup went back east last fall for the first time since 1915.

Wood first won the Harnsworth at Dover, England, in 1920, and successfully defended it in Detroit in 1921. Whether he can make it three straight victories, a feat so far unaccomplished by any other American power boat racer, is a question being discussed by his local supporters.

Wood's defender in 1921 was a single step hydroplane. Since that time, however, he has obtained the patents on multiple step hydroplanes, and it is known he plans the fastest craft that ever skimmed the surface of a racing course.

The committee in charge of the local regatta is making tentative plans for a three day contest. Under the rules governing the "B. I. T.," a contesting country may enter several boats and must win two heats to lift the trophy. The heats will be from 10 to 40 knots, to be decided by the racing committee.

CLUB SEEKS HEROIC DOG TO PAY HIM GREAT HONOR

Cincinnati. — The American dog which in the year between April 15, 1924, and April 15, 1925, performs the most heroic deed of self-sacrifice and devotion to the human race, will be sought and crowned by the Cincinnati Kennel Club in connection with the National Dog Show, which will be held here April 17-19.

The dog so found must himself be exhibited in order that the gold medal significant of the fact may be awarded with proper ceremonies on the stage at Music Hall the evening of April 19.

Any dog in the county of any breed may be entered by his owner, and no dog will be barred on account of lack of pedigree or pure breeding, according to the regulations. There is no entry fee of any description. The dog must be shown at no expense to the owner.

A full description of the heroic deed is required, blanks for which the club has prepared.

It was bad enough when they wrecked almost every vestige of Nash's comely rows of stucco buildings in Regent Street last year. It was lamentable the other day when Piccadilly Circus was rubbed of the handsome bronze statue of Eros, and the weather-beaten "flower girls" who sat as his feet were shooed away. But now they say the graceful arches of Waterloo bridge, far and away the most beautiful of the structures that span the tidal Thames must vanish stone by stone. And nobody knows yet just what is going to be done about the dome of St. Paul's which has been adjudged dangerous.

Things may not be as bad as they seem to some of the admirers of the older, cherished structures of London. Eros, next year or later, may be carted back to Piccadilly Circus, when the completion of a vast underground railway station has brought order out of today's chaos of iron and wood and cement. Gilbert created Eros with his slender boyish body and his downward-drawn arrow, to add a "touch of foreign joyousness" to stoic old London, but he doesn't want the statue returned to the Circus. Nearly everyone else does, however, for it has become a part of Piccadilly as the world knows the place.

The lamentations over Rennie's masterly bridge, with its nine arches crossing the Thames from Somerset House toward Waterloo Station, are more serious. When one of the central piers and arches began sagging some time ago, it was thought that the bridge would merely have to be taken down stone by stone and then re-erected, after strengthening the piers. But now the experts who conducted a long diagnosis of the bridge's weakness, say such a process won't serve at all. They want to do away with the nine arches that for so long have reared themselves over passing pedestrians, trams, ways, automobiles, puffing tugs and barges, and put up an entirely new bridge, with only five arches, and much wider than Waterloo. After

all, it is the slimness of Waterloo that gives it the appearance of a dark ribbon spread across the flowing Thames on top of beautiful arches. There is just a faint possibility that the bridge, sentenced to death, may receive a reprieve. No stone is to be touched until July. By then the London Council, which passed the death sentence, concedes that there may be "a new fact which will require consideration." Most people doubt it. They fear that Rennie's great work is done for.

Vienna. — Because the 30,000 pleasure automobiles, motor trucks and motorcycles in Austria are cutting up the roads not built originally to stand such traffic, owners of the vehicles will have to contribute to road maintenance. The money will be collected through a system of taxation.

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TOO MUCH NOISE

On a recent visit to one of the Virginia cities we noted along its main thoroughfares large signs which read "Use your brakes more and your horn less." How striking is such a warning to the motorist and how well an ordinance along these lines could be brought into good use here at this time. It would be a difficult problem to attempt to describe the various noises heard continuously on our city streets caused by motorists who evidently think that the world must move at the foot of their horn regardless of conditions. Especially at Five Points does this situation exist. It is noticeable more so at the noon hour when traffic is heaviest with those going to and from the noon meal in addition to the thousand school children who pass this corner. During this hour there is always a traffic police on duty at this corner and the manner in which the traffic has been handled without accident is indeed commendable but the continuous roar of all manner of sirens is almost unbearable for those in business houses nearby and those who have occasion to pass this corner. A check-up shows that nearly 10,000 vehicles pass Five Points daily, which means that there are several vehicles at this corner at all hours of the day. The corner is a stop corner and when one vehicle, in compliance with the law, comes to a full stop there is no need for another vehicle to come up from behind and press down upon his horn in an effort to clear the right of way for himself. Every-

one knows, that the average motorist is going to move on just as soon as the officer gives permission to do so and this roaring of horns does not help matters in the least.

Horns on automobiles are a necessity for sounding a warning at dangerous intersections or for warning pedestrians who are in danger but they were not meant to be used as continuous noise makers as some of the motorists here seem to think, for from all appearances about ninety per cent of the horn blowing here is superfluous. The Board of Aldermen would do well to give consideration to the matter of ridding the town of this ever growing nuisance.

WAS IT ONLY A NIGHTMARE?

When one recalls the oil scandal excitement of a year ago, the righteous indignation with which Republican leaders repudiated those black sheep of their party who had compromised its record for honesty, and the high consecration of President Coolidge to the task of punishing the guilty without delay and without fear or favor, the present situation seems fantastic and unreal. While the civil suits drag their way to a dubious end, and the criminal indictments are quashed, temporarily or for good, the principals in the most reprehensible Government scandal in 50 years, hold their heads high and are even engaged in lecturing the Government for its bad manners. Hardly a week passes unmarked by a statement from some where near the Dohenys, charging the whole prosecution to political blood lust. While the Teapot Dome suit is still undecided at Cheyenne, there is released to the press from mysterious sources an article "summary" of the proceedings indicating that the Government's case has broken down and that the vastly abused Sinclair interests are headed for a belated and well-deserved vindication. In the untoward atmosphere of a year ago former Secretary Albert B. Fall seemed to be a physical wreck and not long for this world. In the more salubrious atmosphere of today he is reported to be in excellent health and putting on weight.

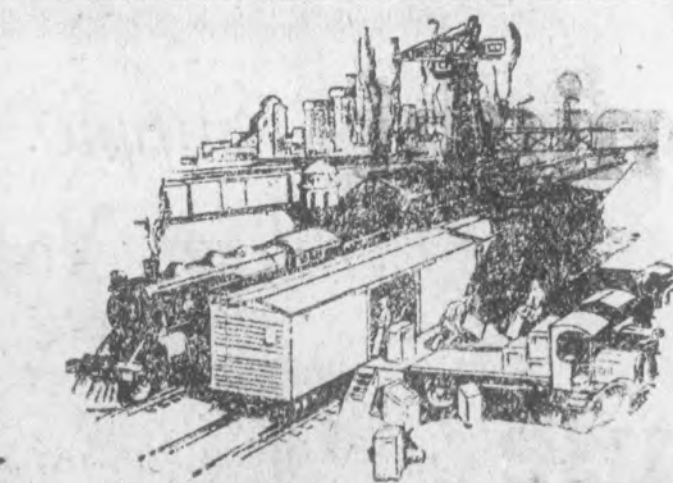

WARFARE DECLARED BY ACTORS UPON MANAGERS OF BERLIN

Berlin.—A group of about 100 prominent actors and singers of the Berlin stage have signed an agreement not to enter into contract with any theatre whose management adheres to a plan recently framed by the managerial association, which divides all actors and singers into four categories and stipulates the maximum salary which those in each category shall receive.

Stage folk say they will not be arbitrarily branded as first, second, third and fourth class, according to the whim of managers, and insist that it is an insult to the profession to try to rob actors of all individual-

ity and herd them together as if they were merchandise.

When the managers announced their new plan they explained that many artists were demanding such high salaries it was impossible for them to meet their terms without increasing the price of seats to a point where the public would refuse to pay.

VATICAN ADMITS PUBLIC TO VIEW NOTED TREASURES

Rome.—Priceless art treasures connected with the history through the ages of St. Peter's, the mother church of Christendom, hitherto jealously guarded in the impenetrable chambers of the Vatican, now may be examined by visitors to Rome thanks to the opening to the public several days ago of the Museum of the Vatican.

Among its treasures are many associated with the old basilica which was destroyed on orders of Pope Julius II in 1505 to make way for the construction, started April 18, 1506, of the present church. There are models in wood by Michelangelo and Sangallo, the statue of Sixtus IV done by Pollaiuolo, the huge statues of St. Peter and St. Paul done on orders from Pope Pius II by Paolo Romano, the magnificent sculptures carried out for the tomb of Pius II by Mino da Fiesole and Giovanni Dalmata, one of the angles of the famous Giotto mosaic, and countless other remarkable works.

SOUTH AFRICAN WOMAN LIVES IN RANCE FIFTEEN YEARS

Rietfontein, South Africa.—Scientists from England who have heard recently of the case of a woman here who has been in a trance for 15 years may come to Rietfontein to make extensive investigations with the hopes of helping the victim. The woman is Miss Anna Swanepoel, of Litchenburg, age 35, who became unconscious in 1910 when she was notified of the sudden death of her fiancé.

Not once, according to the attending physicians, since that time has the woman been fully conscious. After 11 years in her own home, under the care of relatives, she was taken to a hospital where attendants administer food and water every two hours.

SLUM CHILDREN OF LONDON INTEREST OLGA NETHERSOLE

London.—Miss Olga Nethersole,

who came into prominence in New York in 1900 as Fanny Legrand in "Sapho" announced recently that in the spring she would establish in England a national boarding school for delicate children which is to be conducted as a model institution.

Miss Nethersole plans to take 100 sickly children at a time from the slums of London and to bring them back to normal health by providing proper food and plenty of outdoor exercise. Her aim is to interest the government health officials who, she hopes, in time may build similar institutions on a large scale for the benefit of the population at large.

"I hope we shall prove to the state authorities within four or five years," said Miss Nethersole recently, "that our national boarding school scheme is not only a humane and common sense project, but also an economic one."

TRAMPS MADE COMFORTABLE KEEP FROM TRAMPING

Nuneaton, Eng.—In order to discourage vagrants from tramping the road, Poor Law authorities have turned the local workhouse into a work-mansion.

The old casual ward has been abolished and replaced by a cheerful room with bright colored wall-papers, linoleum covered floors and comfortable chairs in which casuals may sit while having meals at a long polished table.

A supply of books and newspapers is provided for evening reading in a steam-heated room, and spring mattress beds await the weary traveler at night. Regular inmates have the use of a piano and a radio set, and there is a supply of toys for the children.
