VON HINDENBURG TO BE CANDIDATE FOR PRES. OF GERMANY

Nominated Today By the National Conservative Bourgeois Bloc; Election to Be Held on April 26th

Berlin, April 8.—Field Marshal, Von Hindenburg, was nominated today for candidate for President of the German Republic by the National Conservative Bourgeois Bloc.

It was announced that Von Hindenburg had accepted the nomination, and would run for the office.

Von Hindenburg's nomination was forecast several hours before he actually accepted, as it was known this morning that he had agreed to run against former Chancellor Wilhelm Marx in the election of April 26, if assured of the united support of all the parties comprising the National Conservative Bourgeois Bloc.

Despite the opposition of Foreign Minister Stresemann, it was stated before hand that the German people's party would not oppose the Field Marshal in the event he was nominated.

Von Hindenburg protested against entering the race on account of his age, but this was met by supporters who told the aged war hero that many men on the verge of 80 had made good as statesmen. They pointed out that Bismarck, when he retired, was considerably older than the Field Marshal, and that Clemenceau, of France, and Balfour, of England, had also served to an old age.

Office of Governor Provided for in First Charters and Plans

The office of Governor was provided for in the first charters and plans for colonizing English-speaking America. Sir Walter Raleigh, founder of English-speaking America, through the promotion of expeditions to what is now North Carolina, instituted the office of Governor in his scheme of government for the first "Lost Colony" by appointing Ralph Lane the first Governor of "Virginia" in 1585.

The office was continued in Raleigh's subsequent colonies, likewise in the founding of Virginia at Yorktown.

The beginning of North Carolina government was the organization of a government for Albemarle.

William Drummond was the first Governor. Though there were modifications of the office, there were no breaks in the succession of Governors in which North Carolina was a proprietary government, 1663-1728. The Governor was appointed at the pleasure of the proprietors. His chief duty was to represent them and not the people. He was limited in his executive authority by a council of from six to twelve men.

The Governor, however, was supreme, as the council usually consisted of men recommended by him. His limitations, therefore, were theoretical.

138 Children Under Sixteen Confined in North Carolina Jails

Raleigh, April 8.—The State Board of Charities and public welfare has announced that there are 138 children under sixteen confined in the jails of North Carolina. This does not mean county jails but all places of confinement, including local and municipal lock-ups. The total is based on reports from 546 detention houses.

Of the 138 reported confined, 49 were white boys, 18 white girls, 60 negro boys and 11 negro girls.

There are, reported the board of Charities and Public Welfare, 1,765 persons between 16 and 21 years of age in jail in this state, 782 white boys, 612 negro boys, 186 white girls and 185 white girls.

Although no trace has been found of missing Raimonde von Maluski, Jr., three years old, who disappeared several days ago from his parents' home, in New York City, Mrs. Mary Jones has been positively identified by little Anna Logan, ten, as the woman she saw riding in a taxicab with the boy. Mrs. Jones was held to \$100,000 bail. The police believe the child has been slain. Mrs. Jones was a friend of the boy's mother, but was said to have plotted revenge when Mrs. von Maluski had her arrested on a theft charge.

DOROTHY ELLINGSON HAL DONAHEY OWNS TAKES STAND IN HE CARRIED LILLIAN TRIAL FOR INSANITY VOGEL TO COLUMBUS

Gives Her Responses in a Low But Clear Tone to Categorical Questions

San Francisco, April 8.—Dorothy Ellingson, 17 year old sister of her mother, took the witness stand in Superior court today at her trial for insanity. Judge Louderback satisfied himself that the defendant understood the nature of an oath before allowing her to be sworn.

The court then informed the girl that she would not be forced to answer any questions which might incriminate her. Assistant district attorney, Skillin, began to interrogate the witness. He asked her categorical questions, where the county jail was—the name of her attorney, and where in the court room they were seated. She gave her responses in a low but clear tone, answering tersely.

San Francisco, April 8.—The trial to determine the mental condition of Dorothy Ellingson was near completion today with indications that it would soon be in the hands of the jury. The court was drawn into a confusion yesterday when the girl angered at the efforts of her attorneys to have her adjudged insane, jumped up and hurled paper cup of water at them, and shouted "you can't talk about me like that. Wait until I take the stand and tell about it, then the truth will come out."

Counsel for the defense denied that the 17 year old girl, who on January 13 shot and killed her mother after a quarrel over the daughter's companions, would take the witness stand. Two expert alienists for prosecution testified during the day that it was their belief that she was sane.

Herriot Has Issued Summons Immediate Cabinet Meeting

Paris, April 8.—Premier Herriot has unexpectedly issued urgent summons for his ministers to attend an immediate cabinet meeting.

Paris, April 8.—The Herriot Government raised the question of confidence on a minor detail of an education budget in the Chamber of Deputies this afternoon, obtaining a majority of only two votes, the vote being 142 to 140.

Governor, Who is Father of Donahey, Says He Will Cooperate in An Effort to Bring About Justice

Columbia, Ohio, April 8.—Lillian Vogel, 15 year old girl, is in Columbus, and she was brought here Sunday night by Hal Donahey, 17 year old son of Governor Donahey.

The girl is in a Columbus rooming house, it was announced. It is presumed she will be taken back to Zanesville by her mother who is reported enroute to Columbus.

The young Donahey admitted to his father that he brought the girl to Columbus Sunday night and immediately the Governor communicated with the chief of police of Columbus and with Prosecutor Crossland, of Mucklingum county, advising them that he would co-operate in every way possible to bring about justice.

The girl was located at an East side address, after a person, whose identity was not divulged, called the Governor's office at noon and announced that she was in the city. When confronted with this fact, young Donahey broke down and admitted to his father that he had brought the girl with him Sunday. Previously to that time, Hal had steadfastly adhered to his story that he knew nothing of the girl's whereabouts, and that he had left her at her home in Zanesville before returning to Columbus.

The girl disappeared from the Columbus rooming house some time between nine o'clock and noon today. Shortly after nine o'clock, the rooming house keeper told newspapermen that the girl had received a telephone call, and that she came down stairs and talked. At noon when the land lady went to call her for newspapermen, she was not in her room.

Columbus, Ohio, April 8.—Investigation of alleged connection of Hal Donahey, 17 year old son of Governor Donahey, with the disappearance of Lillian Vogel, 15, of Zanesville, was re-opened today with indications of sensational developments.

The Chief Executive dispatched his son and James W. Huffman, his Secretary at Zanesville, to investigate statements made there placing his son in a compromising position.

DEBATE ON GOVERNMENT BILL FIXED FOR NEXT FRIDAY EVENING

Paris, April 18.—The Chamber of Deputies this afternoon fixed Friday evening for the discussion of the Government Bill for the relief of the fiscal difficulties of France. The Finance committee promises to have its report on the measure ready at that time.

Paris, April 8.—The Parliamentary debate on Finance Minister De Monzie's measures to relieve the fiscal difficulties of France can not take place this afternoon, and perhaps not on Thursday, for the Finance Committee, which is to meet this afternoon, will first of all have to deal with all tentative plans that have been submitted to it. Among these plans is a drastic out and out capital levy presented by the Socialist and a scheme from the Radical Left group, hitherto supporters of the government, but which now seems to have wavered. It is understood that other plans will also be presented for consideration.

TWO INJURED WHEN ENGINE ON S. A. L. OVERTURNS TODAY

Buckling Rail Said to Have Caused Wreck; Engineer Cramer and Fireman Puddy Receive Injuries

Wake Forest, April 8.—Engineer Henry Cramer, of Richmond, sustained a fractured knee cap, and fireman Robert Puddy, of Raleigh, was slightly injured when the engine and tender of the Sea Board Air Line through train No. 104 turned over two miles from here shortly before noon today.

A buckling rail was said to have caused the wreck. Though every car in the train except a rear pullman left the track, no passengers were injured. According to a report here, Engineer Cramer saw the broken rail before the engine reached it, and managed to bring the train almost to a stop before the rail was reached. The fireman jumped from the cab, and was injured in the jump. Traffic on the line was delayed for some time.

Ex-Financier Hanged for Murder

Russell T. Scott, who at the age of thirty was the head of a \$10,000,000 Canadian corporation, has been hanged in Chicago for the murder of Joseph Maurer, a seventeen-year-old drug store clerk, whom he killed in a holdup there in April, 1924. Scott said that the cause of his downfall was the suit of Miss Dorothy Newbury, a manicurist, who charged that he, posing as an unmarried man, had wooed and won her. The girl's story brought her a verdict of \$10,000. Unable to pay, Scott fled to Canada, became a cheap actor, then bootlegger and pay peddler, finally to end up on the gallows. Scott's arrest followed the finding of a key in the pocket of his overcoat which he dropped in the store after the murder. Search of his room revealed a slip of paper bearing the address of Helen Bullard, a chance Chicago acquaintance, with whom he had lived for some time. He was found in her room and apprehended.

Washington, April 8.—A charge that the recent sky rocking of wheat prices of the Chicago Board of trade was due to activities of price fixing speculators, is made by Senator Shipstead from labor of Minnesota, in a letter to Julius Barnes former, President of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States.

The Senator also asserted that the Department of Agriculture "whether by good intentions or otherwise" assisted in the "bull" movement by incorporating with the issue of "false propaganda," making a threatened shortage of world wheat supplies. The communication made public by the Senator today was in reply to an article published by Mr. Barnes recently in which he asserted that the farmers last fall, a market their wheat crop then, made it impossible for the farmers to take advantage of the higher prices of wheat prevailing this year until a recent break in the market.

Denying that he so advised the farmers, Senator Shipstead said he did warn producers not to be "fooled by the money powers pushing up quotations for political and financial purposes." By following this warning, Senator Shipstead said the producers had escaped being caught in the "awful thrash" in the market.

Custom Receipts for Port of Wilmington March \$478,095.40

Wilmington, April 8.—Customs receipts for the port of Wilmington in March totaled \$478,095.40. This brought the total for the first nine months of the present fiscal year, which ends June 30, to \$4,416,552.44. It is predicted that the year's total will be \$6,000,000. Receipts so far are under what they were the corresponding period last year, by \$1,242,074.

MARCH ENJOYS DESERVED FAME AS MONTH OF WIND

Washington.—March of all months in the year still continues to hold the record for high winds, although the highest wind ever actually measured blew across Mount Washington on a January day.

This record was made Jan. 11, 1878, when a velocity of 186 miles an hour was recorded on an official anemometer there. But high winds reach their greatest number on March, particularly in the country east of the Mississippi river.

"How strong was the wind" is a question often asked after a destructive storm. The American Nature Association says the answer is liable to be misleading, for it is almost always stated in terms of speed rather than force. The force of a wind can O. GOLFERS COUNTING ON GLENNA COLLETT TO WIN IN ENGLAND

New York.—Upon the hitting prowess of a demure miss of Providence, R. I., and a shiny new dime given her by John D. Rockefeller, are pinned hopes that an American will become queen of the British links and empress of world's golfdom this year for the first time.

Having won every title on the links this side of the Atlantic she sought before she was old enough to vote, Miss Glenna Collett is leaving shortly to seek the British women's open title at Troon, Scotland, in the tournament beginning May 15.

Golfers who have followed her exciting career at national, eastern and southern championships in the United States are certain that she has the ability to win British laurels, even against the clever Miss Joyce Wethered, present British titleholder, sister of another famous golfer, and far ahead of other linkswomen of Great Britain.

But there must be considered the matter of breaks of the game on the hazy sea-side course at Troon, and also the jinx that seems to have pursued American golfers of both sexes in their quests of honors in the British place of the royal and ancient game. Perhaps the time which the 25-year-old linkswoman gave recently to young feminine star at Ormond Beach, Fla., for good luck, will have an effect in this connection.

No American girl has yet won the British title, although such stars as Miss Alexa Sterling, of Atlanta, and Miss Edith Cummings have tried it. And while both the British amateur and open titles have been won by American male golfers, it was only after several attempts. Walter Hagen, now British open champion, fared poorly in his first quest for this noted cup. Francis Ouimet, Bobby Jones and Chick Evans are others whom fortune seems to have deserted when on the links in the British Isles.

Miss Collett has victories over noted British linkswomen to her credit, however. When she won the American national women's title in 1922, her opponent in the final round was Mrs. W. A. Garin, then competing from a club in the New York district, but who has since returned to live in her native England. The 25-year-old Alexa Sterling several times, lost to Miss Collett in 1921 in competition for the Bertha Lyle cup, an annual feature in the Philadelphia district that attracts leading feminine link stars from all parts of the country.

Miss Collett is unquestionably the outstanding medal player of her sex in the United States. As with Bobby Jones before he won the open and amateur titles, one wonders why she ever is beaten. She is the only player to have broken 80 in the women's national tournament, having set the record at 79 on her own course, the Rhode Island Country club, in last year's tournament. In practice matches she often has been as low as 75, much to the envy of many male golfers of good caliber, not to speak of thousands of male duffers.

For six years, ever since she was 16, Miss Collett's mighty hitting has attracted attention. Excellent technique, with a full flat swing, involving the complete application of power with hips and shoulders, enables her to hit a ball from the tee that would do credit to a professional. In fact, in practice rounds with professionals, she is never far behind them, and recently just after John D. gave her that new dime, she outdrove Joe Kirkwood, the trick shot artist at several holes in which she and her feminine partner won handily. Frequently, with wind behind her and the course sun-baked, she has driven more than 300 yards. Without wind or turf favorable for a long ball, she drives 225 and 250 yards regularly. Yet her physique, though sturdy, is girl'sh.

Her defeats have been due to errors in her short game, of which keen opponents, such as Miss Mary K. Browne, in last year's national tournament, have taken profitable advantage.

Hitting a ball comes naturally to Miss Collett. When a little girl she used to play baseball with the boys in Providence. Her father, George H. Collett, is a golfer, and Glenna soon was swinging a club proficiently instead of a bat. As with the case of Miss Edith Cummings of Chicago, one of Miss Collett's great rivals, the tutelage of a father is a great aid in this game.

In her short career Miss Collett has won the national, eastern, Canadian, north and south and many sectional and club titles. She is a fine swimmer and a motorist that would do credit to the annual race at Indianapolis, friends say. Her hobby is a car presented her by admirers through Sir Thomas Lipton, after she won the national women's title.

Miss Collett has an ideal temperament for golf. Even the disappointment given her last year by Miss Browne, when after preparation of a year she failed to win the national title again on her home course, did not disconcert her. Her smile as she congratulated Miss Browne was not the least bit forced.

In a speech in Chicago, United States Senator William E. Borah declared, "We are building up a bureaucratic form of government—the most hardhearted, the most inefficient and the most arbitrary ever permitted to torture the human family." ENGLISH QUEEN OUTFITS KITCHEN AT BUCKINGHAM

Windsor-on-the-Thames. — Almost the last journey away from Buckingham Palace made by Queen Mary, known as England's most "housewife-like" queen, before departing with the king for his Mediterranean cruise, was a one-day visit to Windsor Castle to see that the spring cleaning had been started in proper order, so that every thing would be spick and span for her return toward the end of April.

Incidentally, the queen brought with her to the castle, her summer home and one of the world's most magnificent structures, a number of labor-saving devices which she had bought herself the day before at an ideal home exhibit in London. One of these was a new kind of knife-cleaner, the queen examining the apparatus and making several inquiries as to whether the dealer was certain that the polishing roller would not harm certain old fashioned knives of very delicate make which were used generations ago in the kitchens of Windsor.

Another exhibit which interested the queen keenly was an improved kind of mop. She watched the demonstration with interest, and even took hold of the handle herself for a moment, but she did not buy, much to the disappointment of the dealer.

Economy, however, is the watchword at Windsor as well as the royal palace in London. Under the present regime there is no encouragement for wastefulness such as obtained in the days of other rulers.

One of the favorite stories among residents of Windsor concerns Queen Victoria and is known as "The crocuses and the sentinel." Soon after

her ascension to the throne, Queen Victoria was delighted by the appearance of the first crocuses of the season near the castle terraces. Fearing that the blooms might be destroyed by sparrows or other birds, the queen sent for a soldier to protect them.

Queen Victoria never rescinded the order, and year after year a sentry stood at the same spot, day and night. During the war when every available soldier was needed at the front it occurred to a castle official to look into the archives to learn why and when the sentinel had been stationed near the crocus bed, and this led to the disappearance of one of the sights of Windsor.

PRINCETON INVENTOR FUSES METALS BY WIRELESS HEAT

Trenton, N. J. — Recent reports from England that the wireless furnace was to be adopted by the steel industry of Sheffield for use in melting solid metals, brought to light today that Dr. E. F. Northrup of Princeton, inventor of this furnace, recently has perfected a process whereby an alloy of copper, nickel and iron is made which protects electrical meters from the effects of wide temperature variations. This alloy is made in a wireless heated crucible.

Dr. Northrup's invention consists of a crucible surrounded by a cold copper coil which, having no contact with the crucible, heats the metal placed inside by electrical induction or radio. Inasmuch as heat is generated only in the contents of the crucible the metal is said to "melt itself" being vigorously stirred, meantime, by the electrical current flowing into it. It is described as a radio process with the distance spanned only a few inches compared with the miles of distance spanned in most radio operations.

The invention of "permalloy," which gives the newest submarine

cables a capacity of about 1,700 letters a minute, is said to have been made possible by the wireless furnace.

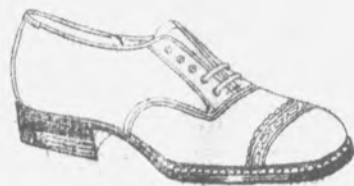
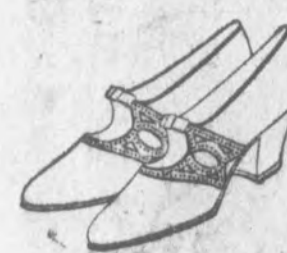

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DIFUSING KNOWLEDGE

"Knowledge is power." There seems to be in our country today an unprecedented thirst for education. The practical result of a trained mind in the business world demonstrate just how valuable fundamental knowledge proves. Our public schools are taxed to capacity, institutions of higher education report flourishing conditions. Young America is absorbed in its textbooks to the end that successful careers may be mapped out, and prosperous conditions assured.

Thinking men and women are promoting every constructive educational activity. Legislators, both state and national, are taking more than a cursory interest in our schools and colleges. America is faced with the difficult problem of instructing vast numbers of alien children, receiving the raw material from Ellis Island and turning out at graduation brilliant, promising young citizens of this republic.

Our teachers and professors are nobly

striving to inculcate in the youthful mind the highest sense of democratic ideals for which this country stands. Theirs is no easy task, but rather calls for the maximum of devoted effort and patience.

It seems advisable, therefore, to give the American public school the best support, reward the conscientious teachers and professors with adequate wages, at all times remembering that our children are being carefully trained in the essential subjects of education as well as good citizenship. The splendid men and women of our city and state educational boards are sparing neither time nor effort in their endeavors to guarantee America's welfare by graduating thousands upon thousands of clear thinking, right acting, patriotic young men and women who have been educated to love the flag and revere our national institutions.

Office of Secretary State Outgrowth of Secretary Province

The office of Secretary of State of North Carolina is an outgrowth of that of "Secretary of the Province," which began in 1675.

With the appointment of Robert Holden and was continued by the Constitution of 1776.

The "Secretary of the Province" was appointed by the Crown at pleasure and received his patent from the Governor's Council. He was a Justice of the Peace, Clerk of Pleas of the Crown and issued land grants. The retention of the latter duty had survived.

The Constitution of 1776 made the term of office of the Secretary of State three years and provided for his appointment by the General Assembly. The Constitution of 1835 reduced the term to two years. The Constitution of 1868 made the term four years and the Secretary of State subject to popular will.

NOTES ON TARHEELIA

The East Carolina Teachers College at Greenville was founded in 1907. There are now 17 buildings that make up the plant, together with 91 acres of ground. The plant is worth \$2,250,000. From 1903 to 1924 8,702 students were enrolled. The president is Dr. R. H. Wright, who has served the school since it was founded.

Peaches and dewberries raised in the Sand Hill-section of North Carolina bring millions of dollars annually.

North Carolina produces approximately 2,000,000 pounds of butter

annually. In 1817 it produced less than 1,000,000.

The illuminating oil business in North Carolina during the two years ending with 1924 increased to a marked degree. The volume increased from 46,069,344 gallons during the two years ending 1922 to 66,417,040 during the two years ending 1924.

The total estimated value of boats employed in the fishing industry in North Carolina is \$1,702,000; nets, \$555,000, and other apparatus \$24,398, making a total of more than two and a quarter million dollars. From 1728 to 1776, North Carolina was a Crown Colony.

The status of the governor remained the same during this period, except that the Crown took the place of the Proprietors.

The independent State government was organized under the Constitution of 1776. This Constitution continued the office of Governor but strictly defined his eligibility and powers:

1. He was to be elected jointly by two houses of the General Assembly for a term of one year and was not eligible for more than three terms in any six successive years.

2. The Governor was not to be younger than thirty; he must have been a resident of North Carolina for five years and possessor of property worth a thousand pounds.

3. He was to be advised by a council of State elected by the General Assembly.

4. His powers were strictly defined by the constitution, by the General Assembly under the Constitution.

5. He was subject to impeachment. Such was the status of the Governor of North Carolina until the Constitution of 1835. This Constitution made the Governor an elective officer, fixing his term at two years, his eligibility limited to four years in any six. The property qualification was omitted.

The Constitution of 1868 made the Governor's term four years and fixed

SPRING BRINGS RESTLESSNESS TO BUSINESS MEN OF HULL

Hull, Eng.—Headed by John Riley of this town, a party of business men are planning an expedition this month into Alaska on a search for hidden treasure. Riley is the only man who has an exact knowledge of the whereabouts of the treasure in question, which he says consists of a vein of pure silver from two to eight inches thick and weighing probably hundreds of tons.

Riley claims to have discovered the vein during the great Klondike gold rush of 25 years ago, and has persuaded three men to join him in the quest. They propose to obtain samples of the metal and float a company. If successful in their quest an airplane will be used to convey the silver to Vancouver, B. C.

HOMING AIRMEN TO BE GUIDED THROUGH FOG BY ELECTRICITY

London.—An electric current is to be used shortly to guide pilots through the fogs of England in safety to the airfields below them.

The landing space is encircled by a cable, just under the surface of the ground, charged with an alternating current which creates a magnetic field. The presence of this field is detected by instruments carried on the plane and, according to Sir Philip Sassoon under secretary for air, no matter how dark the night or how thick the fog the pilot will know when he is over the landing stage.

AMERICAN EXAMPLE LEADS BRITISH GOLF FROM BOGEY TO PAR

London. — British golf clubs have begun to adopt par as the standard of their courses. Instead of the ancient but easier goal known as bogey. In most cases the bogey figures for 18 holes are six strokes higher, and that much easier to attain than par.

So far only a few clubs have adopted the severer standard, long since universal in America. Most of the courses that have broken away from bogey are in the London district. To make the change nation-wide will perhaps require several years, for the British has an ingrained aversion to giving up his accustomed ways, whether in business or pleasure. Until now the general run of British golfers have always played "against bogey" in their medal competitions, and their handicaps are all based on that standard. For the vast majority of players it is, and always will be, more fun to think 78 is a perfect card, than to be told that a total of more than 72 or 73 strokes confesses a flaw somewhere in one's play.

From first-class players, bogey figures have seldom demanded brilliance. To attain them merely demands, in most cases, steady, unfaltering play. Even those who can hit a golf ball only a moderate distance can do a course in bogey if they keep a straight line and stay out of trouble and, of course, have a bit of luck.

But with par 4's asked for on holes from 400 to 445 yards in length, instead of bogey 5's, only those who can get long and accurate carries with driver and brassie are likely to experience, with any frequency, the achievement of the goal of the game.

The change from bogey to par which has set in among British golfers is, to a great extent, attributable to American influence. Three of the last four British open championships have been won by Americans, who have trained themselves to play against the more exacting standards prevailing on the other side of the Atlantic.

But, more influential than the accomplishments of American professionals upon the British golfing mind, have been the reports from across the Atlantic, describing how an amateur, Bobby Jones, has schooled himself to play "against par," instead of merely against the strokes of an opponent, even in match play.
