DECLARES FINANCIAL CONDITION FRANCE IS NOT SO CRITICAL

Premier Herriot Says That He Can Show Figures That Will Prove Condition Not as Critical as Broadcasted

Paris, April 9.—The Chamber of Deputies shortly after three o'clock this afternoon began the discussion of the financial situation requested by the Government. The Government seemed to have a majority of about 70 in the first test vote by a show of hands, as to when the discussion should take place.

Premier Herriot began speaking amid a terrific uproar. His followers welcomed him noisily, while the opposition scorned. Every deputy was present in the Chamber. Premier Herriot said he had decided to speak immediately because of the "imprudent campaign now going on in the finance domain, injuring France before her own public opinion, and what is more dangerous, the opinion abroad." He declared he would show with figures that France's financial situation was not so critical as has been broadcasted by his political enemies. The Premier said the present financial crisis was a logical outcome of the policies of all the governments since the armistice. His government was not alone responsible, as it has taken over an exceedingly hard situation.

"I won't speak of our foreign debts," continued the Premier, "because you are aware of the uncertainty of the situation. You know how heavily it weighs upon our financial situation, even at times interfering with our very political liberty." Pandemonium broke loose at this juncture with shouts from his followers and hisses from the opposers.

James B. Dudley Out Spoken Opponent Negro Migration

Greensboro, April 9.—James B. Dudley, for 29 years president of the Negro Agricultural and Technical College at Greensboro, was an outspoken opponent of negro migration. He voiced this opposition in speeches and through the press.

During the recent pronounced exodus of negroes to the North, President Dudley said he sent speakers to all parts of North Carolina, "warning negroes against migration to any section in large numbers," because, he said, this tends to agitate the race question. He added that "it is better for the negro to face inevitable trouble and adversity at home, among friends, than in strange lands among foreigners and foes."

In one letter, written in response to his views on migration, he declared that "the race prejudice of the North is more deadly than the race prejudice of the South."

During President Dudley's term of office, the State, which owns and operates the Negro Agricultural and Technical College, made larger appropriations to that institution than had ever been made to a negro institution in North Carolina, probably in the entire South. Nearly \$500,000 was appropriated for permanent improvements by one session of the general assembly since 1920.

Describes Relations Between Mexico and U. S. Most Cordial

Mexico City, April 9.—Aaron Saez, the minister of foreign affairs, in a talk last night described the relations between Mexico and the United States as most cordial. All the differences of the past had been settled, he added, and both governments were co-operating earnestly, as was shown by efforts to strike out smuggling activities along the border. Mexico's claim on a big portion of land on the American side of the Rio Bravo, at El Paso, constituted a most delicate internal affair, he said, and it would be necessary to await further developments before making a statement. The foreign minister declared that Mexico did not desire to seek resumption of relations with Great Britain because the government considered the British refusal to recognize Mexico as an affront.

TRIAL OF WILLIAM SHEPHERD TO REST UNTIL APRIL 16TH

Coroner's Inquest Continued Awaiting Report of the Chemists; Lawyers Wage Battle for Bond

Chicago, April 9.—Arraignment of William D. Shepherd, charged with the murder of his foster son, William N. McClintock, was continued today until April 16, while his lawyers continued their battle for bail before the Illinois Supreme Court.

The report of the Coroner's chemist on the chemical analysis of vital organs of young McClintock's mother, and of Dr. Oscar Olson, a friend of the McClintock family, may not be completed until Saturday, it was indicated today. The Coroner's inquest has been indefinitely continued, awaiting the report of the chemists.

National Commander of American Legion Will Visit Raleigh

Raleigh, April 9.—General James A. Drain, National commander of the American Legion, will visit Raleigh Friday. He will arrive during the morning and at 1 o'clock in the afternoon will be guest of honor at a Legion luncheon. Later, he will attend a meeting of the State Legion executive committee. He will be entertained at dinner by Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Daniels.

Governor McLean, State Commander Wade Phillips, of Lexington, and others will take part in the public exercises in the evening, to be addressed by Commander Drain.

Sponges Endorsed As Pets.—Two pet sponges, raised from infancy by Trevor Kincaid, professor of zoology in the University of Washington, has given birth to six young sponges.

The sextet are replicas of the parent sponges, and, although they may never be useful in scrubbing mud off the family automobile, they made remarkably docile pets, said Professor Kincaid.

Professor Kincaid's experiment, as far as known here, was the first successful attempt to raise sponges in an indoor aquarium.

DOROTHY ELLINGSON SLAYER OF MOTHER FOUND INSANE TODAY

San Francisco, April 9.—Dorothy Ellingson, 17 year old slayer of her mother, was found insane, by a jury in Superior Court here today.

The verdict means that the girl will be committed to an asylum. The murder case, for which another jury had been impaneled, will be held in abeyance. Should she ever be released from the asylum, she could be tried on the murder charge.

GERALD CHAPMAN'S REAL IDENTITY IS AT LAST REVEALED

Authorities Say That Notorious Bandit Is George Chartres, Brother of Well-Known New York Educator

New York, April 9.—The mystery of Gerald Chapman is a thing of the past. The stick up man, extraordinary man, who is waiting in a Connecticut jail to be hanged June 25, and who having persistently refused to make known his identity has been declared by Connecticut authorities to be George Chartres, a son of Irish parents, who came to this country many years ago, and a brother of a former New York City employee, who now holds a responsible position in educational work there.

Since Chartres, alias Chapman, was found guilty of the murder of policeman Kelly, of New Britain, Connecticut, officials of that state have been investigating his past life. The convicted man himself put them on his trail, on April 13, 1907, when he was convicted of grand larceny, in New York, he gave the name of his nearest relative as Mrs. Catherine Connors, 171-107th street, New York City. Mrs. Connors, it is said, is an aunt, and is still alive, but no longer resides at that address. Chartres also has a sister, who it is said, whose whereabouts are unknown. Officers refused today to divulge the names of the brother and sister.

Beaufort County Making Progress in Poultry Shipments

Washington, April 9.—Beaufort county continues to make progress in the way of hog and poultry shipments. A carload of hogs has just been shipped from the Pantego section. Another was shipped from the Belhaven section, and a third from Washington, all in one week. This made a total of ten carloads shipped from Beaufort county in sixty days.

Fire Situation in Blue Ridge Mountains is Reported Worse Now

Blacksburg, Va., April 9.—New fires broke out in different sections of the Blue Ridge mountains near here yesterday, and last night, and dawn today found the situation worse than it has been since the main blaze began to eat its way into the forest of Brush Mountain last Saturday. Calls for assistance from new areas necessitated the dividing of the fire fighting forces, which had been concentrating on the six mile front of the original conflagration. The heroic efforts last night prevented the seething flames from sweeping into the settlements which had been considered safe, before the high winds of yesterday started. Captain James Hogan, of Virginia National Guard, which has been fighting the fires since Tuesday, declared today that he believed incendiaries were setting fires as fast as his men got them under control. Officers said that yesterday as his company had gotten the main fire under control, new blazes broke out and rapidly spread beyond the crest of the mountains, to Blacksburg. From Brush Mountain, the fire spread to both sides of the mountain, and moved swiftly in a north east direction toward Craig county, and the James River. 100 men are combating the flames, and calls have come for aid from the sector toward which the flames were progressing this morning.

Raleigh, April 9.—Attorney General Daniel George Brummitt has announced the appointment of John Harwood, of Bryson City, as Assistant Attorney General to be assigned to the State Department of Revenue. Mr. Harwood was appointed in place of William L. Vaughn, of Washington, to whom the place was tendered, but who declined to accept the post.

AMERICANS IN CHINA UNITE TO HELP NEEDY TRAVELERS

Shanghai.—Any wandering American who becomes stranded in China in future will have a better chance of being helped home than has any of his long line of predecessors in the same predicament.

Realizing the necessity of doing something in this field, the American Association of China has decided to raise a fund of \$15,000. Mexican, from American residents, to be expended in caring for destitute countrymen.

EASTER HOLIDAYS CALL FOR TRUCE IN PRES. CAMPAIGN

All Parties' Activities in Germany Election Abandoned Until Next Week When Final Battle Will Set in With Full Fury

Berlin, April 9.—With the Easter holidays calling for a traditional political truce in the German Presidential Campaign, all party's activities will be abandoned until next week, when the final battle will set in with full fury. The United Rights, of the Conservative element, puts forth the claim that it represents the National Bourgeois movement. The nomination of the old war hero, Field Marshal Von Hindenburg, however, has caused the three Republican parties, who will back the candidacy of former Chancellor Marx to throw the battle as a test between the elements of reaction and the champions of Democratic progress. While declaring that injury has been inflicted on Germany's prestige through the election of the Field Marshall, the leaders of the Marx candidacy insist they will welcome the challenge issued by the United Right.

The United Right insists that the election is to determine whether Socialism is to be perpetuated while the other parties made the defense that the Republic constitution and the promulgation of a just program of taxation is the key to their nomination.

Presidents' Reply to Peruvian Memorial Delivered Today

Washington, April 9.—President Coolidge's reply to the Peruvian Memorial in connection with the Tacna-Arica arbitration case, was delivered to the Peruvian Ambassador today for transmission to his government. The President's communication was sent to the Ambassador by a State Department Messenger. It was signed by Mr. Coolidge as Arbitrator and countersigned by Frank B. Kellogg, as Secretary of State.

Washington, April 9.—President Coolidge's reply to the Peruvian Memorial on the Tacna-Arica Arbitration award, which was forwarded today, is believed by those who have followed the developments of the situation, to be unfavorable to the request submitted in behalf of Peru.

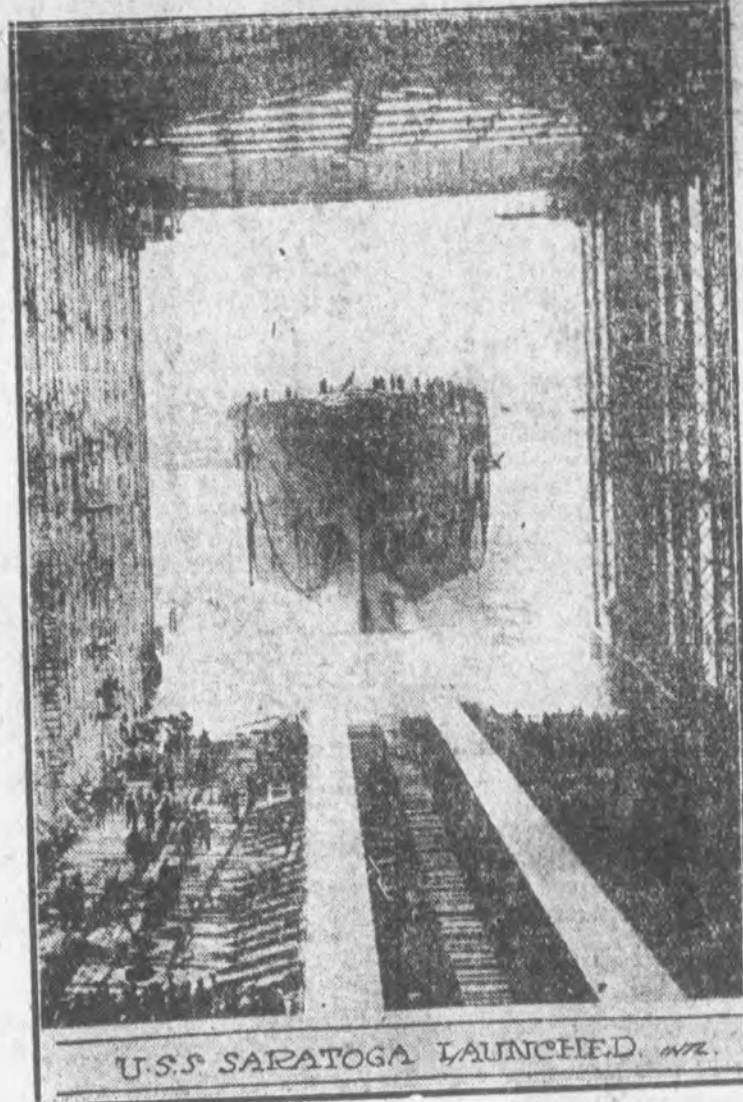
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Great Plane Carrier Launched

GOVERNOR'S SON IS FINED FOR TAKING GIRL TO COLUMBUS

Hal Donahey Placed Under Control of the Juvenile Court Until 21st Birthday; Lillian Vogel Placed Under Strict Probation

Zanesville, Ohio, April 9.—Hal Donahey, 19 year old son of Governor Donahey, today was fined \$100 and cost by Probate Judge Clarence Graham, on a charge of contributing to a delinquency of Miss Lillian Vogel, 15 year old Zanesville girl, whom he took to Columbus, Ohio, Sunday night.

He was remanded to the custody of the sheriff until the fine was paid. He was also placed under the control of the Muskingum county juvenile court until his 21st birthday. Miss Vogel was placed under strict probation of the court for 12 months.

State Board of Agriculture Made Crop Pest Comm.

Raleigh, April 9.—Under the provisions of Article 16 of Chapter 81 of the Consolidated Statutes of North Carolina, the State Board of Agriculture is made a "Crop Pest Commission." Functioning as such, the board has power to regulate the importation into the State of plants in which pests are believed to exist.

It is further provided that the "Pest Commission" shall have power to "investigate and inspect premises suspected of being infested, and where found to remove pest or have same removed by owner, costs in either case to be borne by owner."

Also, under the terms of this law, the board is charged with the responsibility of preparing lists of dangerous pests and distributing information as to their extermination. This provision is carried out through the department of publications and other departments.

McKENZIE APPOINTED CHAIRMAN OF MUSCLE SHOALS COMMISSION

Washington, April 9.—The Muscle Shoals Commission appointed recently by President Coolidge, elected former Representative McKenzie, of Illinois, as its Chairman today at its first meeting.

SUSPECTS HELD IN NEEDLEMAN CASE TAKEN TO TARBORO

Three Men Taken From Local Jail to Tarboro; 17 Suspects Now Being Held Awaiting Plans for Bonds

The Martin County Sheriff visited Greenville this morning and carried Sparrow, Gurkin and Griffin, three men held here in connection with the mutilation of Joe Needleman in Williamston several days ago, back to Tarboro. The three men with the other fourteen men who have been captured are in the Tarboro jail while arrangements are being made for bonds which will range from \$5000 to \$20,000. It is believed that nearly all the prisoners will be able to give bond.

Furney W. Sparrow, Sr., and Clayro Heath, of Kinston, were on yesterday taken into custody charged with complicity in the attack on Needleman. Sparrow is the father of Furney W. Sparrow, Jr., the first man arrested in connection with the crime and who has been in the local jail since his arrest. According to reports he denied all knowledge of the affair.

Every effort possible is being made to apprehend other members of the mob who took Needleman from the Williamston jail and maltreated him. Rewards have been offered both by the Governor of the State and by Martin county.

Babe Ruth Suffers Attack Influenza

Washington, April 9.—Reports that Babe Ruth, base ball premier batsman, had died enroute from Asheville, N. C., were dispensed early today with the arrival here of the train on which he is traveling. Those in charge of the train said that Ruth had collapsed in Asheville Tuesday with a recurrence of influenza, and still was ill, but so far as they knew was not serious.

Accompanied by representatives of New York Yankees, Ruth left Asheville yesterday morning, and arrived here this morning. The train is due in New York this afternoon, and the base ball player will be taken to a hospital.

Dr. McNairy Delivers Splendid Address

One of the best meetings of the year was held by the Parent-Teachers Association in the J. H. School, Wednesday afternoon when Dr. McNairy gave a most forceful address on "Inheritance and Its Effect."

The band, under the direction of Prof. Roberson, began the program with well rendered selections, and Miss Helene Higgs delighted her hearers with two lovely songs.

Then Dr. Laughinghouse, in his capable way, presented Dr. McNairy as an authority on the subject that is becoming a vast economic problem in the state.

In comparing the types of life to a wheel, Dr. McNairy graphically revealed to his hearers, truths of inheritance, that must be acknowledged and remedied. He pleaded for charity and mercy in judging others by their deeds. His appreciative audience gave him a most hearty and realized as suspected of being infected, and never before their obligations to their children.

BOXING BECOMES POPULAR AMONG STUDENTS IN JAPAN

San Francisco.—James K. Fisk, state adjutant of the American Legion, has received word that as the result of Legion activities in Tokio, boxing has been introduced into the curriculum of Japanese military academies.

This came about through a mixed boxing-jiu-jitsu match arranged by the Tokio post of the legion at the request of General Ugaki, minister of war. An American army captain competed with a Japanese expert. The jiu pitsu exponent won the first fall, but on the resumption of the match the American officer crossed a right to the jaw that ended the exhibition. General Ugaki then ordered that boxing be taught in the military schools.

FOREIGN STUDENTS FIND CHRISTIANITY LACKING IN AMERICA

New York — America has the largest enrollment of foreign students in the world and many of these youths, composing the greatest student migration in history, are struggling against heavy odds of inhospitality and race prejudice while carrying on their studies, according to the findings of a committee of investigators. An expansion of the Friendly Relations committee of the Young Men's Christian Association and the Young Women's Christian Association, the investigating group is composed of 24 representatives of many welfare and denominational bodies. It is called the Commission on Survey of Foreign Students in the United States, and its labors in this field have taken three years.

The need for self-support has been no small factor in the lives of these young students from distant lands, the commission found, and many have taken back a sense of disillusionment as to America's ideals and practices. Some find that "the Christianity acquired from American missionaries was not confirmed by the Christianity they met in the land which sent the missionaries forth."

There are more than 8,000 of these students in colleges and universities of the United States and 6,000 more in secondary schools, the report sets forth. Fifteen hundred are women. The condition of these young people, the problems involved, and suggestions as to their treatment are set forth in the report.

"American life and the Christian church never have met a more severe and searching test," says Dr. Robert E. Speer, secretary of the Board of Foreign Missions of the Presbyterian church, "than in the presence of these foreign students. They will not carry

back what they do not get, and they will not get what we cannot or do not give."

Dr. Speer points out that not all these students have been disappointed and that thousands have gone home with strength and faith. In general the results of study abroad are more beneficial than detrimental to the cause of international friendship and of the church.

The other side of the picture is suggested in detailed statements by students of painful experiences, and their complaint of political and commercial dishonesty in America, moral laxity, craze for organization, and "imperialism," which they compare with what they have seen and heard of American ideals and achievements. "Much of this criticism," says the report, "is unquestionably sincere. Some of it comes from intolerance and from lack of energy in appropriating what is offered."

A Japanese observer writes: "I can readily name 20 young Japanese who intend to become ministers and entered American theological seminaries, but later changed their minds, and entered education, or business or official service." Elmer Yelton, executive secretary of the commission, asserts that there is among foreign students in the United States a rising tide of criticism of the whole Christian movement.

Suggestions from representative American leaders show unanimity of opinion that responsibility for work among foreign students rests upon the Christian people of America working through the church and its agencies, the Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A., college faculties and student boards of advisors, with the special help of the Friendly Relations committee already organized.

The data upon which the report is

based has come from hundreds of sources at home and abroad. Replies to questionnaires were received from 830 foreign students in more than 400 different colleges and universities of the United States. About 25 per cent of college administrators who have to do with foreign students' problems replied to questionnaires. These were also replies from church pastors and Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. leaders.

"We can, if we will," says Doctor Speer, "send back each year to their many lands, an army of ambassadors of goodwill and helpful intercourse. The church may find in these thousands of students as many missionaries to carry Christianity back to their own people."

COURT ASSESSES MOTORIST FOR DAMAGING LOCOMOTIVE

San Mateo, Cal. — A man should show some consideration for a locomotive, held Justice of the Peace, Walter Bird recently in assessing Hugh Jamieson \$67.72 for damaging with his automobile a Southern Pacific engine proceeding peacefully along its own right-of-way.

The evidence indicated that Jamieson drove his car down the railroad, parked it on the tracks and went to sleep. Members of the train crew said they had to awaken Jamieson

after he had been carried for 90 feet on the engine pilot. The locomotive got the worst of the encounter. Jamieson was not hurt. His car was badly damaged. Railroad officials said it cost \$67.72 to fix up the engine, and the court entered judgment accordingly.

MAY STORE HELIUM GAS IN FOREIGN COUNTRIES

Washington — The Bureau of Mines, under an act passed late in the last congress, will take over from the navy about July 1 the production of helium, the gas used in inflating the giant dirigibles Los Angeles and Shenandoah. This transfer is not expected by Dr. S. C. Lind, chief chemist of the bureau, to involve any marked change in policy.

No appreciable quantity of helium is being exported now, and the new law provides that export applications must be made to the secretary of the interior and permission obtained

from the President, on the joint recommendation of the secretaries of war, navy and interior. This provision was put into the law to permit future American trans-oceanic air lines to have a supply of helium on hand at their foreign terminals.

Officials of the bureau are careful to point out that the new law against helium exportation will not militate against foreign scientists who desire a small quantity of the gas for their laboratories.

JAPAN DISCOVERS IMPERIAL EMBLEMS 1,000 YEARS OLD

Tokio.—What is believed to be a remarkable archaeological find has been made in Tango province, just north of Kyoto, in the shape of a great stone chest six feet high, seven feet wide and 14 feet in length. In it were reposed five ancient sword blades, five neck decorations and six magatama, or royal beads, besides many fragments of earthenware.

The age of these relics is said to be about 1,000 years and there are indications that they date back to the reign of Emperor Go-Shirakawa, and possibly may be even connected with that ruler. He built a temple in that vicinity and the magatama are one of the three sacred emblems or treasures, the others being the sword and mirror, which are passed on at a ruler's death.

WEALTHY INVENTOR WARNS ALL WOMEN THAT HE WONT WED

San Francisco. — No flapper is going to spare George Campbell Carson, elderly self-styled "desert rat," who became, theoretically at least, a multimillionaire as the result of a decision of the United States Circuit Court of Appeals here recently upholding his claim to profits for the use of inventions for treating copper. Asked what he intended to do with his millions, when he gets them, he said he expected to do a lot of things involving chemistry which laymen wouldn't understand, but one thing sure, he was not going to get married.

The decision in favor of Carson was rendered on appeal from a federal district court in the state of Washington. He had sued the American Smelting & Refining company, which he accused of appropriating illegally a patent of his that improves and speeds up the smelting of copper.

According to counsel in the case, several other companies are involved in the ruling, which if not upset by the Supreme Court may net him as high as \$20,000,000. Officials of the American Smelting & Refining Company, however, say that they are not involved to the extent of more than \$250,000. They expect to appeal.

Meanwhile Carson continues to live in the modest water front hotel that has lodged him in recent months. Since the news of the decision has spread, he has been receiving more mail than he can read. He said he was getting many letters from women who complained of loneliness and enclosed addresses and telephone numbers.

Usually Carson prefers to talk of laboratories, test tubes and such. Late ly, since the high court sided with him, he has been more attentive to long neglected social amenities. The walls of his room are adorned with photographs of movie actresses, but that doesn't mean anything, he explains.

None of these flappers are going to get me," he affirms.

Carson is 58. At the age of 14 he ran away from the family farm in Kansas. He had but two years of schooling.

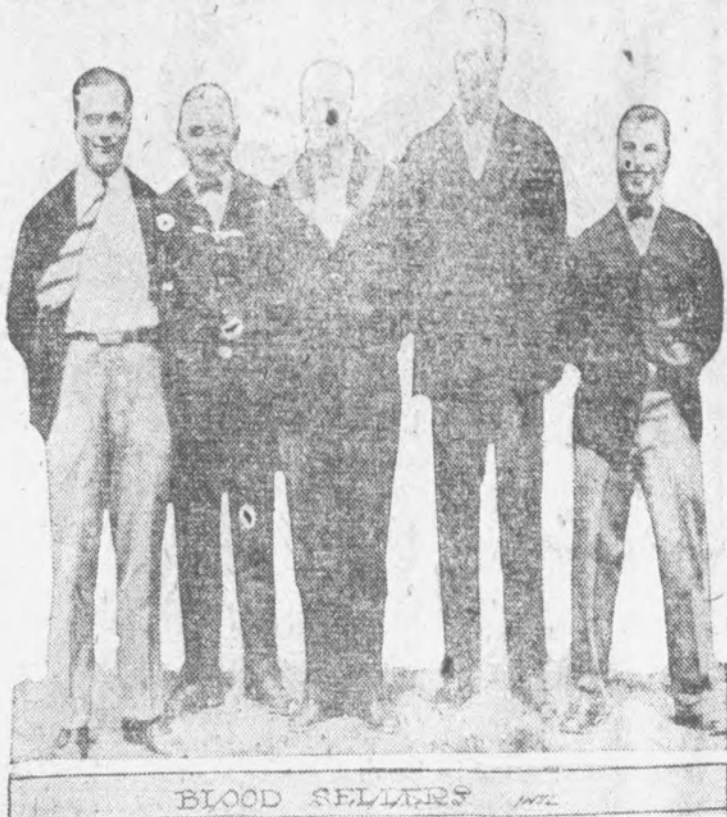
In 1886 he discovered the Wonderful mine, a cropping of surface silver ore near Clifton, Ariz. He sold his claim for \$1,500. In his prospecting he absorbed a great deal of metallurgy and geology.

For a time he disengaged from mining to join an expedition sent into Mexico by the American Geographical Society. He left the expedition in the wilds of the Sierra Madre mountains a year later and drifted to Chihuahua, where he worked at the smelting end of mining.

Later Carson wandered over Colorado, Idaho and Oregon, following far as Birmingham, Ala., and then, in Pittsburgh, began an intensive study of metallurgy, but lacked the funds to pursue it. His invention lagged for the gold camps. For a while he ran an assay office. He got back east as eight years. It took him all that time to get the papers ready for the patent office. Carson's diary, which figured in the evidence at the trial, is a long record of semi-starvation, of ill-clothed wanderings during years of reverses.

He offered testimony intended to show that his contrivance found instant acceptance in smelters and were widely used, while he received no compensation. He said that it was possible under his process to treat 700 tons of ore in a furnace in 24 hours, whereas under the old system but 240 tons could be treated. Two years ago Carson lost his case in the federal court at Seattle. The reversal of this finding was his first victory in 19 years of struggling to patent and market his invention.

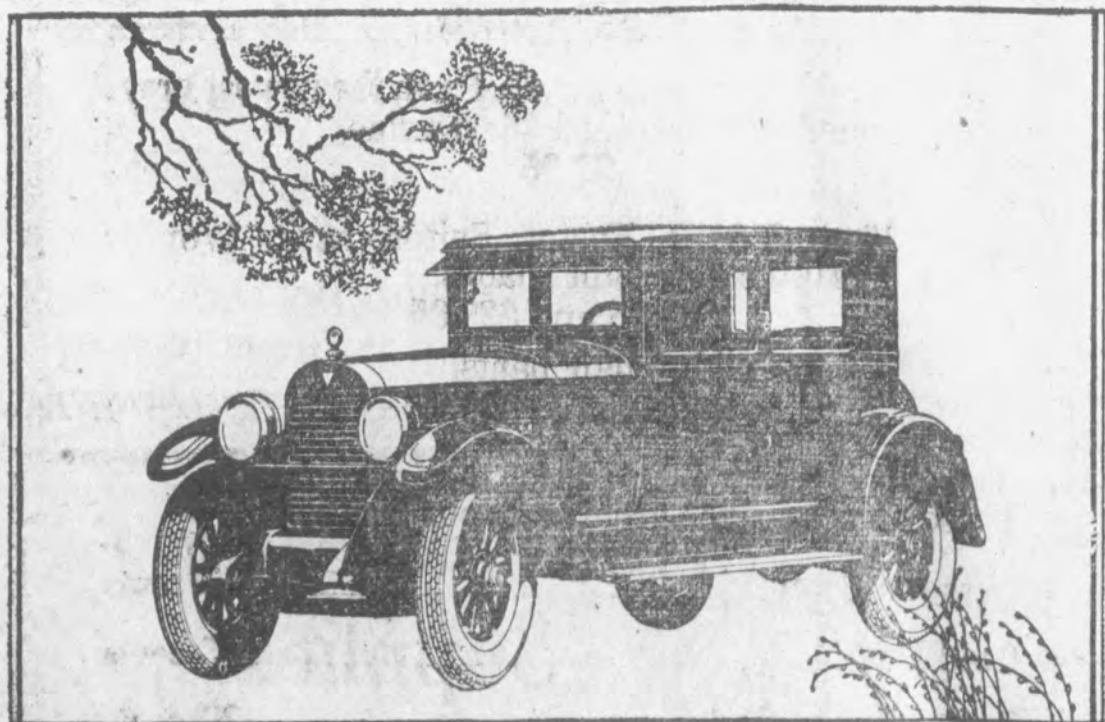

M. HERRIOT DRAFTS A PROGRAM

To understand what M. Herriot is trying
to do in Paris and to follow one's way through
the political quarrels which obscure French
finances it is necessary to keep five points in
mind:

(1) The Bank of France has exceeded the
legal limit of its circulation by more than 1-
500,000,000 francs. It is short by that sum
with credits needed to straighten its accounts.
This is quite aside from the heavy obligations
on short-term bonds (totaling more than 20-
000,000,000) which will come due later in the
present year.

(2) To make good on the 1,500,000,000
francs which constitute its immediate prob-
lem the Government planned to issue new
money and to increase by several billions the
francs in circulation.

(3) This proposal had the backing of
French manufacturing and industrial inter-
ests, which look kindly upon a policy of in-

flation.

(4) It was opposed by the holders of
French bonds—that is, by the non-industrial
interests which have been the chief purchas-
ers of securities—because those interests
foresaw a depreciation in the value of their
bonds.

(5) Behind party manoeuvres, therefore,
the essential struggle is between industrial
interests which favor inflation and bondhold-
ers who are more inclined to favor some form
of capital levy. The owners of bonds are
probably in a majority in France, but the in-
dustrial interests are better organized, and
especially in Paris.

M. Herriot's own proposal, made in the
Chamber of Deputies yesterday, is a double
proposal for both a 4,000,000,000-franc in-
crease in circulation and a "capital contribu-
tion" (instead of a straightout capital levy),
which, under penalty of special taxes, will
attempt to collect a 10-per-cent assessment
upon French wealth and which will pay 3 or
4 per cent interest on that assessment.

There are two criticisms of this latter plan
now voiced in Paris. One is that it will not
work; that if France will no longer buy short-
term securities at 7 per cent, it is difficult to
see how, even under penalty of special taxes,
the Government will raise a great new loan
at 3 or 4 per cent. The other is the objection
that a voluntary "capital contribution" con-
stitutes an entering wedge for a compulsory
capital levy later on.

M. Herriot, like his predecessors, still
shrinks from a thoroughgoing use either of
direct taxation or a direct capital levy or of
a drastic devaluation of the franc to put
French finances on a sounder basis. Mean-
time a debt of 70,000,000,000 in short-term
bonds, a debt which has grown out of ever-
lasting borrowing to-day to pay what was
borrowed yesterday, relentlessly pursues
him.—New York World.

Germans Turn to Tobacco.

Berlin.—The consumption of to-
bacco in Germany shows a notable
increase. The tobacco taxes in Jan-
uary amounted to about \$12,500,000,
the greatest sum ever received in
a month from this source. Seventy
percent of the tax came from cigar-
ettes.

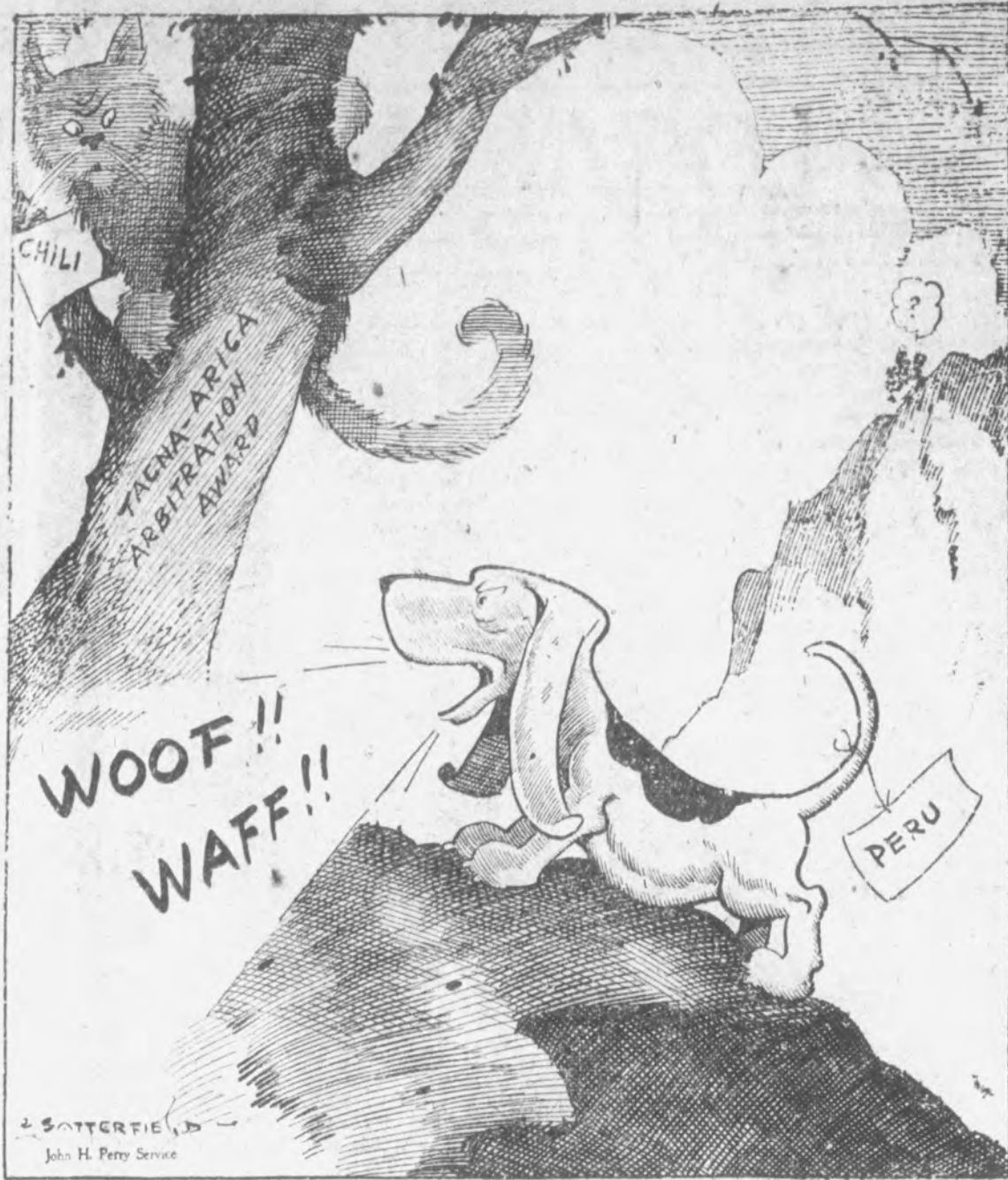

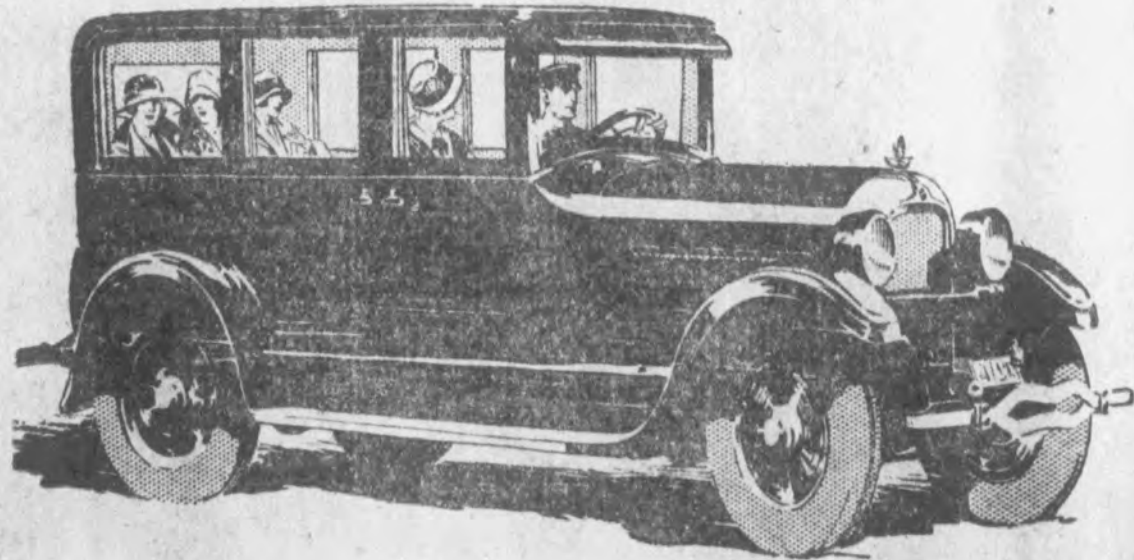

ENGLAND WOMEN AROUSED BY THOSE WEARING FEATHERS

London. — Use of stuffed humming birds for decorative purposes in dress has aroused the ire of the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds, which issued a new appeal recently to women, urging them to abstain from wearing the feathers of egrets, birds of paradise, herons and other rare species in the name of humanity and common sense. Importation of the plumage of these birds and others is prohibited by an act of parliament passed in 1921.

There is a tremendous illegitimate traffic in the plumage of these rare birds, not only in England, but in the United States and other parts of the world, according to statements made at the annual meeting of the society in London, when ways and means were discussed to put an end to this business. A proposal was made to form an international committee under the League of Nations, and the Duchess of Somerset likened to savages the women who adorned themselves with these contraband feathers.

ITALY TO TELL THE WORLD OF THE WORK OF HER SONS

Rome.—Italy is to have a national encyclopedia which its creators hope eventually will compare favorably with the Encyclopedia Britannica.

A committee of the Italian Cultural Institute, which was created through a gift of Giovanni Treccani, is now at work drafting the plans for the encyclopedia, which will offer to the world a statement of Italy's work in nearly every branch of human knowledge. The first edition will be of 32 volumes in quarto of about 1,000 pages to each volume.

TELL 'EM & SELL 'EM



RODEOS LIKENED FOR RUTHLESSNESS SPAIN BULLFIGHTS

Chicago — The only reason or excuse for the rodeo is "to entertain a sensation-loving crowd, indifferent to anything except being entertained and when aroused, a bloodthirsty one," said a statement of E. K. Whitehead, of the Colorado bureau of child and animal protection, issued here today by George A. H. Scott, chairman of a committee named by the American Humane Association to study ways and means of eliminating the practice. For the brute "there is nothing except unwillingness, force, fear, suffering and often death."

"Every spectator at a rodeo is the worse for being one," declared the

statement, "as he is a little harder, a little more ruthless, a little more indifferent to the suffering of other creatures, a little more reconciled to injustice, to cruelty, to the pain and blood of helpless creatures."

The need of rough riding and bucking horses has gone, and the need of catching and holding cattle has been developed far beyond the requirements of its original usefulness, continued the statement, which pointed out that most of the sports of the rodeo today were never performed on the old cattle ranges, and many never at all.

"In some of the other features of the average rodeo there is less chance for suffering or injury, but in none of it is there anything but fear and pain and sometimes death for the unfortunate dumb animals," said Mr. Whitehead. "Men also are often injured in the violence between man and beast. But the man can choose, can do as he likes and is not forced in any way."

IRELAND ARMS POLICE TO PUT DOWN YEGGS

Dublin. — When the Free State abolished the Royal Irish Constabulary, a semi-military force, and established its new police, the Garda Siochana, it was decided that the new police should be unarmed. The men carry no weapon but a baton.

This condition has facilitated the operations of the thief with a gun; raids on banks and bank messengers have been frequent in all parts of the country. The situation is now being met by the creation of a special detective force of 200 armed men, available for duty anywhere, and Vice-President O'Higgins says that in future "the gunman, the bank robber and the midnight thief will be met by men who will be as quick, or perhaps quicker, on the draw than they are."

MANILA WANTS DRYDOCK TO MEET ALL DEMANDS

Manila.—A movement for the establishment here of a drydock and yards of sufficient capacity to accommodate the largest ships on the

Pacific has been started by shipping men and government officials. It is pointed out that under present conditions vessels under the American flag which make Manila their terminus, are compelled to proceed to Hongkong or Shanghai when repairs of any considerable importance are necessary.

BRITONS PREFER BALDNESS TO ABANDONING TOBACCO

London.—Assertion by H. J. Harper-Roberts, a Manchester scientist, that smoking is one of the causes of baldness, which, he said, was greatly on the increase, has caused much comment throughout England. If the spread of baldness was not checked, said Mr. Harper-Roberts before members of the London College of Phy-

siology, the result would be a race of hairless people throughout the civilized world.
Baldness, the speaker averred, was more pronounced in cities than among the peasantry. There were three classes of baldness, namely, congenital, senile and premature. In ten percent of the premature cases cures could be effected at a definite age by proper treatment. In cases of feverish illness or poisoning of the system, the blood pressure and low condition of the patient brought about baldness. Smoking, said the speaker, which introduced poison into the blood, was also unquestionably a cause of it.
