WINSTON-SALEM IS AGAIN PREPARING FOR EASTER EVENT

Easter Tide Mecca of State and Adjoining States Entertaining Many Distinguished Visitors

Winston-Salem, April 11.—Winston-Salem, the Easter-tide Mecca of North Carolina and many adjoining States, is again preparing for the event that distinguishes this city. That event is the annual celebration of the Feast of the Resurrection by those of the Moravian faith. Already, visitors are beginning to arrive, and by Saturday night the city will be thronged with men and women of all Christian creeds, to witness the solemn rites which will begin before daybreak on Easter Day and reach a climax as the sun sheds its first rays across the old Moravian cemetery here.

Although the continuation of an ancient Moravian custom, the characteristic manner in which members of that branch of the Christian Church celebrate the ever-recurring anniversary of the resurrection has come to be of more than denominational interest.

Beginning with trumpet blasts, with responsive singing, processions and other features, the ceremonies continue throughout the early morning hours. The music at first pierces the darkness. Groups of men and women, stationed here and there, tell in song and speech, the story of the resurrection.

In addition, there is the time-honored "love feast," during which the celebrants partake of food and refreshments. This in the wee sma' hours of the day.

Finally, the procession to the cemetery. Worshipers find their way there, in order to greet the dawn from the city of their dead.

The significance of the Moravian way of celebrating Easter was told by the Rt. Rev. Edward Rondthaler, Moravian Bishop stationed in Winston-Salem.

Bishop Rondthaler said: "This service, which has now grown from a little band of people in Winston-Salem to from 20,000 to 30,000 persons of all Christian denominations, is the largest meeting of the kind in the world."

"The custom began in the Year 1732 A. D., when a little band of Moravian Christians had fled from persecution in what is now Czechoslovakia, in Central Europe. This band of earnest young men held an early sunrise service of praise and prayer in the little hill-top graveyard. They enjoyed it so much that it was repeated on the Easter of the next year and has, ever since, been celebrated by the Moravians in the home lands and on mission fields all over the world."

"The service begins in the Himalaya Mountains of Asia, twelve hours ahead of our time; it is next celebrated in Jerusalem, then passes on to Europe; next it is observed in America, from the Arctic circle to South America, and then across the Pacific, ending in Australia—at some places in the ice-bound fields of the Arctic, at others in the forests of the Tropics, all in honor of our risen Lord and Savior."

NORTH CAROLINA DRAINAGE CONFAB MEETS HERE APR 21

Greenville Selected as Point of Meeting on Account of Interest in Drainage and Its Central Location

The seventeenth annual meeting of the North Carolina Drainage Association has been called to meet in Greenville on April 21st, and 22nd.

These annual meetings have been of very great value to the state, fostering as they do the progress of one of our ever existing problems—drainage. Great development of much of our latent resources has resulted from these conferences, vast areas of the most fertile lands of the south have been transformed from a menace to the health of the communities in which they are located into fields of magnificent production.

Drainage under the North Carolina plan was a new departure for the south and its history has been one of trail blazing and at these annual meetings the digested results of actual operation are subjects of analysis.

By these annual conferences it is possible to pass along facts gained by experience that are of great value to the progress of drainage.

Much of the immediately beneficial and lasting results of these meetings come from personal exchange of views of interested farmers. The sessions are always open to the discussion of any thought which may occur at the time.

Greenville has been selected as the point of meeting this year for several reasons, among which is the great interest Pitt county is manifesting in drainage, its central location to present drainage activities and the expressed desire of its civic and business organizations that the call be made for their city.

A complete program, one full of interest will be given within a few days.

BRITISH EXEMPT FROM THE INCOME TAX ON HORSE RACE WINNINGS

London.—Winnings from bets on horse races, if the winner is not a professional bookmaker and places his bets at starting prices only, are not subject to the British income tax the King's Bench Division of the law courts ruled in a recent case.

The income tax commissioners had sought in the case to recover a tax on \$1,500 from a man whose livelihood was alleged upon his winnings from bets, apart from a certain amount of interest on his bank deposit. The defendant denied that he was a professional bettor, although he admitted he lived largely upon his winnings.

MOTHER BEING HELD FOR QUESTIONING REGARDING DEATHS

Arrest Follows Investigation of Deaths of Five Members of Family in Last Six Years; Son Now in Critical Condition

Developments today in the investigation of the poisoning of David Cunningham, Jr., of Gary, Ind., caused Coroner Oscar Wolff to announce that he would ask that the bodies of Cunningham's father, a sister, and three brothers, all of whom died under suspicious circumstances within a period of six years, be exhumed. Coroner Wolff's decision that the exhumation ought to be made, came after State's Attorney Crowe had had detectives bring Mrs. Anna Cunningham, widow of David Cunningham, Sr., to this office for interrogation, and after the Coroner had questioned David Jr., who is under treatment at a hospital here. Dr. Thomas Carter found the young man suffering from poisoning.

Chicago, April 11.—Mrs. David Cunningham, of Gary, Indiana, a widow and mother of David Cunningham, Jr., who is in a critical condition, diagnosed as caused by poison, today was taken into custody by the state's attorney for questioning.

The arrest of Mrs. Cunningham followed an investigation by authorities of the deaths, after short illness, of five members of the family in the last six years. Cunningham's organs seem to be filled with arsenic. He was first taken sick a few weeks ago, but recovered and returned to work. Two days later he became violently ill after eating a meal at his home, and since has been near death. The family deaths began in 1919, relatives told the coroner. David Cunningham, the father, became suddenly ill, and died in his home. The next year, Isabelle, an 18 year old daughter died, after a two week illness. Harry, a son, 24, died after a 10 day illness, and Charlie, 18, another son, died in 1922 after a short illness. Walter, 15, died after a 10 day illness in 1923. The mother and a daughter, May, 17, are the only surviving members of the family except for the man who is now sick. The mother has been left almost without support, the neighbors said, except for the earnings of David, and proceeds of insurance policies, which have been her sole support.

Coroner Wolff's office said it was probable the report would be further investigated by the State's attorney, and action would be taken on a request of relatives to open the graves of the dead members of the family.

TRIAL OF BURTON WHEELER TO BEGIN THURSDAY, APR. 16

Montana Senator Accused of Receiving \$4,000 From Oil Operator, Says He Has Nothing "to Conceal"

Great Falls, Montana, April 11.—Senator Burton K. Wheeler will take the witness stand in his trial, which begins here April 16, and tell the entire story of the circumstances leading to his indictment for accepting money for appearing before a Government Department after being elected to the United States Senate, he stated here today.

The Montana Senator, who is formerly accused of receiving \$4,000 from Gordon Cammell, a Montana oil operator, for prosecuting oil claims before the Department of the Interior, declared he had nothing "to conceal" and that he would insist upon telling his story in Federal Court here before a jury. "I must assuredly will take the witness stand," he said, "I have nothing to conceal, and am not worried about legal expediency. When I appeared before the Senate investigating committee, they reviewed the facts in the case and exonerated me, and I have nothing to conceal in telling the report to the jury."

86,496 Babies Born in This State During Last Year

Raleigh, April 11.—There were 86,496 babies born in North Carolina, the whole Union's champion birth-rate State, in 1924. This total was announced by the Vital Statistics Department of the State Board of Health today.

The 1924 total exceeds that of 1923 by 2,306. In 1923 there were only 84,190 births reported. Giving the figures by months, Dr. F. M. Register, of the Vital Statistics Department, pointed out that December led all other months, with a total of 8,770. Its nearest competitor was June, with 7,898.

Sergeant at Arms of N. C. Senate is Reported Quite Ill

Fayetteville, April 11.—Sergeant at Arms, David Gaster, of the North Carolina Senate, is ill at his home here, and little hope for his recovery is held out by physicians. He is said to be suffering from an attack of pneumonia, which followed a stroke of paralysis earlier in the week.

WEALTHY GEORGIA MAN CHARGED WITH DESERTING FAMILY

William H. Bryant Arrested Charged With Deserting Wife and Children in Wilmington, N. C.

Atlanta, Ga., April 11.—Allegations that a man deserted his wife and five children in North Carolina, disappearing so far as they were concerned for eight years, only to reappear as a wealthy Georgia lumber man, with another wife and three small children, today were investigated by Atlanta police. The man in the case is William H. Bryant, of Macon, Georgia. He was arrested at the home here of his present father-in-law, and is being held, pending the arrival of a warrant from Wilmington, N. C., which charges desertion of wife and minor children. Mrs. Peter M. McWhorter, of Wilmington, who said she is one of Bryant's children, and was a minor at the time of the alleged desertion, was responsible for the arrest. She and her husband recently heard that Bryant was in Macon, so they went there to investigate. Bryant had left for a business trip to Atlanta, they learned, and together with several officers they located Bryant here, and had him arrested. Bryant denied Mrs. McWhorter's identification, asserting he had never seen her before.

Finals of Golf Tournament Taking Place This Afternoon

Raleigh, April 11.—Ed Edgerton and Paul Smith, both of Raleigh, went into the finals of the Annual Golf Tournament of the Eastern Carolina Golf Association here this afternoon. Edgerton defeated Eugene Mills, of Raleigh, in the semifinals this morning, two and one, while Smith eliminated Bryson Rizer, of Raleigh in the same score. In the second flight, John D. McNeil, Jr., the boy wonder of Fayetteville, entered the finals and eliminated Norwood Schaum, of Wilson, three and two, while other finals of the flight will Peter R. Gravelly, of Rocky Mount, who defeated his brother, Lewis L. Gravelly, won up in twenty holes.

HERRIOT AND HIS CABINET RESIGN AS RESULT DISPUTE

"Now for the Battle," Says Premier, Regarding the Resignation as Beginning of Struggle Over France's Finances

Paris, April 11.—"Now for the battle," said M. Herriot speaking of the resignation of his cabinet, and plainly showing that he, his party, and their allies, regard yesterday's defeat in the Senate as not the end, but the beginning of the struggle. The Ministers held, that having been elected directly by Universal Suffrage last year, they alone represent the nation, and that the Senate in overthrowing them defied the will of the people.

The cabinet placed its full resignation in the hands of President Doumergue, who accepted it shortly after ten o'clock last night. The decision to leave the office being taken at a cabinet counsel in the Foreign Office after the Senate voted against a motion expressing confidence in the government.

It was the second time in three days that the Senate had shown itself not in sympathy with the Herriot Regime; therefore the ministers decided there was nothing for them to do but resign. The vote came as a sequel to a six hour debate in the upper house, in which the Premier was the subject of a scathing denunciation by M. Francois Marsal, former Premier and Finance Minister, who charged M. Herriot with the responsibility for the internal policy, which provoked the crisis.

President Doumergue's task in settling the Ministerial crisis is one of exceptional difficulty, there being few precedents to guide him. The cabinet of M. Herriot is only the fourth to fall on the Senate vote since the Republic was founded a half century ago.

Feeling is running high among M. Herriot's supporters, and there has been talk of a manifestation by all the 315 deputies comprising his backers, who insist on maintaining him in office. The more sober headed deprecate such a demonstration, pointing out that if M. Herriot had resigned after the first adverse vote in the Senate, reconstruction of the Senate, reconstruction of the cabinet would have been possible, but that subsequent events had made his position untenable.

Identity of "Long Kid" Wanted for Robbery Is Revealed Today

Ann Arbor, Mich., April 11.—Ann Arbor police said today the "Long Kid" who for two years has been robbing several sorority houses at the University of Michigan, is now in custody and has admitted his identity. Lee A. O'Toole, 21, who was arrested Thursday night on a larceny charge, has confessed, police say, that he is the "Long Kid," who signed that name in soap on mirrors in the rooms that were burglarized.

Two years ago, the Long Kid began leaving his trade mark. Then after several robberies, his activities ceased, with the arrest, in Chicago, of Nathan Leopold, Jr., and Richard Loeb, for the murder of Bobbie Franks. It was believed that they were the "Long Kid." Both had been students there. O'Toole was arrested after he had left one sorority house and was entering another, and confessed to a series of sorority house robberies. The police recovered several necklaces and trinkets, amounting in value altogether to about \$350, police said, and representing virtually all that has been stolen from the houses on the university campus. O'Toole is not a university student.

\$160,000,000 Finances Operation New Dodge Bros. Completed 'Day

New York, April 11.—The \$160,000,000 finance operation for the new Dodge Bros. Automobile Co. was completed in record time today, when bankers disposed of a \$75,000,000 six per cent bond issue within an hour. A large oversubscription was reported duplicating the success of the \$85,000,000 stock offering earlier in the week.

EASTER—RESURRECTION MORN

In commemoration of that sunshine morn-
ing of the far distant past when the glad-
some tidings went out to His followers that
Christ had risen from the dead on the third
day after his crucifixion—even as was told
by the prophets before His birth—the world,
and more especially the church, now pro-
claims anew that fact which means so much
to mortals here on earth—Christ is indeed
risen from the dead.

All nature joins in the glad refrain. The
birds sing their sweetest, the grass and the
leaves add their green beauty to the scene,
and the flowers in their natural purity and
loveliness lend significance to the story of
new life immortal that is promised the human
race through the blood and resurrection of
the Christ.

Who be there among us who can look upon
nature as it arises anew each spring from the
desolation and death of winter and hold a
doubt of that greater resurrection which is
promised men and women of all ages through
life, the death and triumphant resurrection
of our Lord. Every bird that sings, each flow-
er that spends its sweet fragrance upon the
air and every bud that blossoms forth on the
trees, proclaims with beauteous significance
that Christ has risen.

HINDENBURG TO THE FRONT AGAIN

A weary old man who lives in a dream
world and still signs himself when he writes
to the former Kaiser "Your Majesty's devoted
servant" yields to the arguments of his
friends and agrees to stand as candidate of
the right wing for President of Germany.
Hindenburg will attempt to prove himself a
better politician than Ludendorff and von
Tirpitz, two fellow-heroes of war days, have
proved themselves. He begins his campaign
with the formal support of the National Par-
ty, the German People's Party, the Bavarian
People's Party, the so-called Economic Par-
ty, the Hanover Party and the Peasants' Or-
ganization: a bloc of parties now holding 43
per cent of the seats in the Reichstag and
polling 44 per cent of the popular vote in last
month's preliminary election.

It can be said for Hindenburg that he has
kept aloof from those party bickerings and
theatrical plots which have so largely con-
sumed the energies of Ludendorff and von
Tirpitz. Nevertheless, he is admittedly a
monarchist; he is a perfect symbol of a dis-
established and discredited order; and he is
surrounded by men who will manipulate his
prestige, however much or little remains of
it, to destroy republican Germany if they can.
In these circumstances his election would be
a calamity for Europe.

Hindenburg's republican opponents are
quick to point this out. They say that his
nomination gives Germany a clear chance to
choose between the old order and the new;
and they are quite right, of course, when they
declare that the defeat of Hindenburg would
strengthen the hand of liberalism everywhere
on the Continent. But the danger in the situ-
ation lies in the fact that many Germans will
vote for Hindenburg not as a monarchist but
for Hindenburg as a conservative, or for Hin-
denburg as an alternative to a candidate
backed by the Socialists, or for Hindenburg
as an opponent of a coalition which includes
an anti-Catholic party. Yet every vote for
Hindenburg will be interpreted outside of
Germany as a straight vote for the Kaiser.

It is the measure of the Nationalist lead-
ers that they see these facts and shrug their
shoulders, caring little what is thought of
Germany abroad.—N. Y. World.

The General Assembly of North Carolina appropriates \$200 annually to the Confederate Museum in Richmond, Va. This museum, maintained in the "White House of the Confederacy," is an institution fostered by the United Daughters of the Confederacy. It is visited by 15,000 persons annually.

A section of the Constitution of North Carolina provides: "The General Assembly may provide that the indigent deaf mute, blind and insane of the State shall be cared for at the charge of the State."

The "Education of Idiots and Inebriates" is provided for in the Constitution of North Carolina.

The Negro Agricultural and Technical College at Greensboro, a State institution, was established in 1891. The plant is now worth nearly a million dollars.

The General Assembly of 1921 provided for the erection and maintenance of a reformatory, or training school, for delinquent Negro boys.

Gilbert, Nev. — Days of the old Western frontier are recalled vividly by this new mining camp, a gold boom town that has sprung up at a place where only rocks and sand and distant mountains were visible a few weeks ago.

Scenes here are reminiscent to old-timers of such camps as Goldfield, Manhattan and Hawide 20 odd years ago.

Gilbert now has a Main street, lined with wooden structures of all sizes and sorts. There is even a weekly paper, the Gilbert Record. The hill-sides are dotted with 100 or more tents. Almost hourly big trucks arrive from Tonopah and Mina, the nearest railroad points, loaded with lumber, coal, machinery and supplies. New houses are going up, and almost every line of business incident to a mining camp is represented. There are saloons, restaurants, an assay office, law offices, a garage and service station, a dance hall.

The real story of Gilbert starts in 1896, when Charles Lampson, a desert prospector, picked up a piece of rich gold quartz near an Indian camp in the Monte Cristo range. Lampson spent many months searching the hills for the outcropping from which the gold had come. Finally he gave up and wandered away to other fields.

J. B. Gilbert took up the search. He met with no more success than Lampson. His sons, however, persisted in the hunt. The older Gilbert died many years ago. Nearly 23 years later his three sons, Fred, Herman and Logan, located the Last Hope. They had called it that because they had planned to make it their last effort to wring gold from those hills.

The Gilbert boys began to get values from the surface. They took out a shipment, and the excitement started. A few days later Dick Rycraft, a veteran prospector, working for the Gilberts, discovered the "jewelry shop" in a badger hole on top of a hill now known as the Black Mammoth. Some of the rock assayed \$1 or more a pound. This started a stampede.

The exposed rock on the surface of the Gilbert holdings is so rich that an armed guard patrols the place night and day. Thousands have visited the site. It is estimated that not less than \$3,000 has been given away in specimens.

Hundreds of prospectors are in the

surrounding hills. Many new strikes have been reported. Every day the interest grows more intense. Old time gold-seekers are coming back from Mexico, from Canada, and elsewhere.

While the Gilberts' Last Hope first drew attention to the new gold field, it is the Black Mammoth and the Homestake that bid fair to make the camp world famous. The Homestake is just beyond Black Mammoth, and recently it gave up a ledge 1,000 feet long which pans gold the entire distance. There are eight different locations where gold specimens may be taken from the surface at random. Much development work is in progress.

EDUCATORS DECLARE VISUAL INSTRUCTION OF LIMITED VALUE

Chicago. — Motion pictures as a supplement to existing methods of instruction in the classroom are becoming more popular, but there is no basis at present to believe that the movie will in any way supplant instructors, textbooks or other traditional methods of teaching, in the opinion of directors of departments in a number of universities which have been experimenting with visual education for several years.

A recent survey made in the United States showed that there were more than 20 state bureaus of visual instruction in educational institutions, 16 of which were located in universities.

Educators generally recognize the value of visual education, but at present the movie lesson is considered more or less of an entertainment period, according to F. Dean McCusky of the University of Illinois. Prof. Frank N. Freeman of the University of Chicago, is announcing the results of more than 20 experiments in visual education, asserted there was no justification for unusual enthusiasm for the movie as a medium of instruction. He said, however, that the motion picture does have a value, but its use requires the same careful presentation as other subject matter in order to be made effective as teaching devices.

"The practice of using motion pictures as a teaching aid is in its infancy, or in the same place that physical and chemical laboratories were 25 years ago," said William D. Dudley, chief of the University of Wisconsin bureau.

"While visual education should never and probably will not entirely supplant other methods of instruction, it will continue to be used more as a supplement to discussion and lecture."

"Criticism made against their use because the movie lesson merely offers diversion and amusement to the children is unfounded when teachers will take the proper attitude."

At Iowa State an entire division of the college is devoted exclusively to this work, due to the schools and organizations having learned the benefits to be derived, said Prof. Charles Roach. Consequently the popularity of the service has substantially increased. Visual instruction offers more spectacular display and thru it the instinctive desire to see it capitalized, he declared. "Somehow, humans will spend enormous sums and time to see an object. Working on the theory that 'seeing is believing,' we have enlarged our service."

In the survey made it was disclosed that the 14 university libraries contained more than 7,800 reels of film and that 27 per cent could be classified as dealing with entertainment subjects, 16 per cent industrial, 15 per cent literature and the remainder miscellaneous.

IDEAL HOMES SOUGHT

FOR DISABLED VETERANS

Detroit. — An endowment fund with which to maintain Spencer Manor as the home of disabled and aged veterans, their widows and orphans, is contemplated by the National Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Spencer Manor, a 472-acre tract of rolling country land near Eaton Rapids, Mich., and fronting for a mile on the placid Grand river, was the gift of Corey J. Spencer, wealthy clubman of Jackson, Mich., and a member of the order. "A village full of life, hope and happiness" is Mr. Spencer's idea of what Spencer Manor should be. The tract of land which he deeded to the organization lies between Jackson and Lansing and is of clay loam. All but 100 acres of the soil is tillable.

Giant trees, small brooks and springs and numerous glens add to the attractiveness of the site.

It is here the V. F. W., looking forward, hopes to see grow a village of neat little homes, with well kept gardens, a school for children and a place for Sabbath worship. "A home rather than an institution, is the way officers of the organization outline the project. It is intended there shall be work for those who can work, and comfort for those unable to labor."

SCIENTISTS TO SEEK TO SOLVE MYSTERIES OF 'HEAD SQUEEZERS'

London. — Efforts to solve the mystery of the "human head squeezers," a tribe of which almost nothing is known and which lives in the wilds of the mountains between the main Amazon basin and the northern Andes, is to be one of the aims of an exploring expedition to South America to be made next summer by Dr. William M. McGovern, one of England's most daring anthropologists. Dr. McGovern, who was born in Brooklyn, N. Y., visited Lhasa, the forbidden city of Tibet, disguised as a Buddhist monk, last year, and has headed numerous other expeditions in various parts of the world in the interest of anthropological research work.

The "human head squeezers" who have a way of reducing the heads of their victims to the size of a person's fist, according to Dr. McGovern, also are supposed to be the possessors of gold and diamond mines in their native haunts just to the north of the Amazon jungles. The Londoner plans to spend seven to ten months in their midst, studying their habits and cus-

oms. No white man has ever solved the process of how heads are reduced in size without so much as disfiguring any of the victim's features and in the interest of science Dr. McGovern hopes to be able to overcome this riddle in the course of his explorations of this tribe and its haunts.

Dr. McGovern plans to leave London early in May and in the trip across the Andes will cover parts of Brazil, Colombia, Ecuador and Peru where no white man, so far as known, has ever before set foot.

Dr. McGovern will carry a wireless receiving set, cameras and other apparatus necessary for expeditions of this kind. He proposes to make observations and drawings which will be of future use to scientists throughout the world.

"I shall be particularly interested in anthropological research work in the Amazon basin where interesting remains, such as great rock temples, of prehistoric tribes, are supposed to exist but to this day have never been seen by the white man," said the explorer. "Diamonds and gold nuggets have been brought from some of the natives on the edge of the unexplored country, and there is a belief that the natives have discovered mines within their native haunts from which they extract the precious stones and metal now and then. These natives of the interior have not even been seen by white men, so far as I know, and have been carrying on feuds for generations with all persons, white or black, who have at-

tempted to invade their territory." The expedition will terminate at Lima, Peru, perhaps early next year, from which place Dr. McGovern will go to the United States before returning to London.

Pensions Up Fourfold.

London.—Great Britain has extended in war pensions \$3,000,000,000 since 1917, according to Major Tryon, minister of pensions. Incidentally the minister points out that the pension paid a totally disabled man today is four times greater than before the World War.
