REV. LEE SADLER RESIGNS AS PASTOR CHRISTIAN CHURCH

Beloved Pastor of Local Church Accepts Pastorate of the Hanover Avenue Christian Church, Richmond, Va.

Rev. Lee Sadler who for the past two years has served as pastor of the Eight Street Christian Church has resigned to accept the pastorate of the Hanover Avenue Christian Church, Richmond, Va., one of the largest churches of this belief in the South. The resignation will probably become effective in the early summer after the local church has secured a supply.

Rev. Mr. Sadler announced his resignation at a call meeting of the membership of the church last evening. The announcement was received with genuine regret by every member of the church as was evidenced by the emotion which was displayed. Mr. Sadler expressed his regret at leaving Greenville because as his stated he loved the Christian Church, its members and the people of Greenville. He told how he had struggled with the matter through prayer and he was convinced that it was God's plan for him to go.

The pastorate of the Richmond church was offered to Rev. Mr. Sadler about six months ago but he declined the offer not withstanding the fact that at that time more than one hundred applications had been made for the pastorate by the best preachers of the Christian Church throughout Virginia and adjoining states. Since the time that Mr. Sadler declined, the Richmond church has insisted that he accept and would not be satisfied with his refusal. After giving the matter undue thought and after much prayer, Mr. Sadler accepted.

During his two years as pastor of the local church the Sunday school has almost doubled its membership while the church membership has also increased. The various organizations of the church under his influence and direction have increased in interest and membership.

The acceptance of the Richmond call will not interfere with Mr. Sadler's European trip this summer as the expenses will be paid by the Richmond church just as agreed by the local church. On this trip Rev. Mr. Sadler will be one of the seven delegates selected to represent the Christian church at the World Alliance which will be held in Sweden. One other North Carolinian, Dr. A. B. Corey, of Kinston, will also attend. During their stay in Greenville Rev. Mr. Sadler and family have endeared themselves to the people of Greenville who will regret to give them up, but who wish for them every success and blessing in their new field of service for the Master.

Case of Newspapers Will Be Reached for Argument This Week

Washington, April 13.—The Kansas City Journal Post and the Baltimore Post, filed in Supreme Court today separate briefs in appeals brought by the government to punish them for publishing income tax lists made public by the direction of Congress. The case will be reached for argument this week.

General Reid, of Missouri, as counsel for the Kansas City newspaper, declared in his brief "that the contention of the government is that as the liberty of speech and of the press, we gained nothing by the revolution."

"If that contention be true," he said, "then the Revolution was a failure, and the adoption of the constitution was a solemn farce. We dissent entirely from that view."

TWELVE SUSPECTS NEEDLEMAN CASE GIVE STATEMENTS

Three Members, Ring Leaders, Refuse to Make Statement; The Trial is Scheduled for May 4

Tarboro, April 13.—Twelve of the 15 alleged members of the mob, which two weeks ago took Joseph Needleman, tobacco salesman, from the Martin county jail, and performed an operation upon him, have given statements outlining their degree of participation in the actions of the mob, according to a statement here today by Solicitor Don Gilliam, who has the case in charge. Three members of the alleged mob, who are said to have been the ring leaders, refused to issue any statement on the subject, it was stated.

Solicitor Gilliam said that there were approximately 25 to 30 men involved in the mob's actions, and that he expected the balance to be arrested between now and May 4, when the case is scheduled to come to trial at Williamston. He declared that he intended to present the case of the members of the mob to a grand jury at the same time that he handed them the bill of indictment charging Needleman with an attack upon a young girl, and that he expected the mob members will be tried at the special term of court along with Needleman.

Easter Observed By City Churches

Yesterday, Easter Sunday, was appropriately observed by the various churches of this city. At 5:30 o'clock, Sun Rise services were held at the court house. These proved very inspiring and most enjoyable. A large crowd was in attendance, considering the early morning hour, and the singing was a feature which will long be remembered. At 6:30 o'clock, services were held at the Eighth Street Christian Church. These were also largely attended and proved interesting and enjoyable.

The 11 o'clock services in the churches were featured by Easter sermons and beautifully rendered musical programs. In the Memorial Baptist Church the ordinance of baptism was administered to nine candidates. In the evening Easter Cantatas were given in both the Free Will Baptist Church and the Eighth Street Christian Church.

AMERICAN LEGION ENDOWMENT FUND WEEK BEGINS TODAY

Raising a National Foundation of \$5,000,000 for Rehabilitation of Disabled Veterans and Homes for Children

Lexington, April 13.—Today marked the beginning of "American Legion Endowment Fund Week" in North Carolina.

Weeks of preparation by state and local committees of Legion men, public spirited citizens, and members of the Legion Auxiliary culminated in the beginning of intensive efforts to raise the state quota of the national fund for disabled veterans and war orphans. Governor Angus McLean is State Chairman.

"And groundwork has been laid, and an enthusiastic organization is working, and we feel confident of success," declared Wade H. Phillips, commander of the American Legion, department of North Carolina. "With everybody's help, Arkansas can and will make a record for other states to strive to equal."

Almost simultaneously, the committees previously named in more than one hundred localities began efforts to raise the amounts assigned to them. Much rivalry exists for the honor of being the first to attain its quota.

"Given an adequate understanding of the program to help those who were disabled by their war service and the plans to care for children whose fathers lost their lives, surely no one can refuse to help in this undertaking," Governor McLean said. "Nothing can be more worth while than a proposal to furnish the means of relief to those for whom the war has ended."

The American Legion is raising a national foundation of \$5,000,000 which is intended to guarantee permanently the rehabilitation of disabled veterans and to provide homes for orphaned children.

According to statistics of the United States Veterans bureau, there are approximately 35,000 war orphans in the country, many of whom are in dire need. The Legion child welfare program contemplates either finding or providing homes for this class of unfortunates.

Receipts During March Exceed Disbursements By \$1,924,860.32

Raleigh, April 13.—Governor McLean today released a financial statement for the state, which showed that the receipts during the month of March exceeded disbursements by \$1,924,860.32. The total amount collected in March was \$3,193,630.36, while disbursements amounted to \$1,268,769.04.

The total deficit in the General Fund of the state as of March 31 was given as \$8,327,980.25.

The statement went into an analysis of the total state debt, which was said to be \$113,868,000. This was divided into a funded, or bonded, debt of \$93,868,000, and short term short term notes outstanding totaling \$20,000,000.

Physicians Not to Restrict Narcotics Called by Prescriptions

Washington, April 13.—Physicians, in prescribing narcotics to addicts, are not required to restrict the quantity called for by their prescriptions. The smaller doses, the Supreme Court held today in a case brought from Spokane, Washington, where small doses for strictly curative purposes are prescribed for addicts to be self-administered. The state holds that the physician shall not be required to give only in the size dose called for in the prescription.

In the lower courts, the Government won on its contention that when the narcotics are to be self-administered the physician can only prescribe the quantity which will be curative of the habit, and not place sufficient narcotics, or to administer to himself doses larger than those necessary to affect a cure.

FORD MOTOR COMPANY INAUGURATES FIRST COMMERCIAL AIR LINE

Detroit, April 13.—Ford Motor Company today inaugurated what is said to be the first commercial air line to be established in the United States, when the Maiden Dearborn, an all metal monoplane of the air Pullman type, hopped off from the Ford Air Port at Dearborn, at 9:24 o'clock with a cargo of Company mail and express for the Ford plant at Hegewich, Ill., near Chicago.

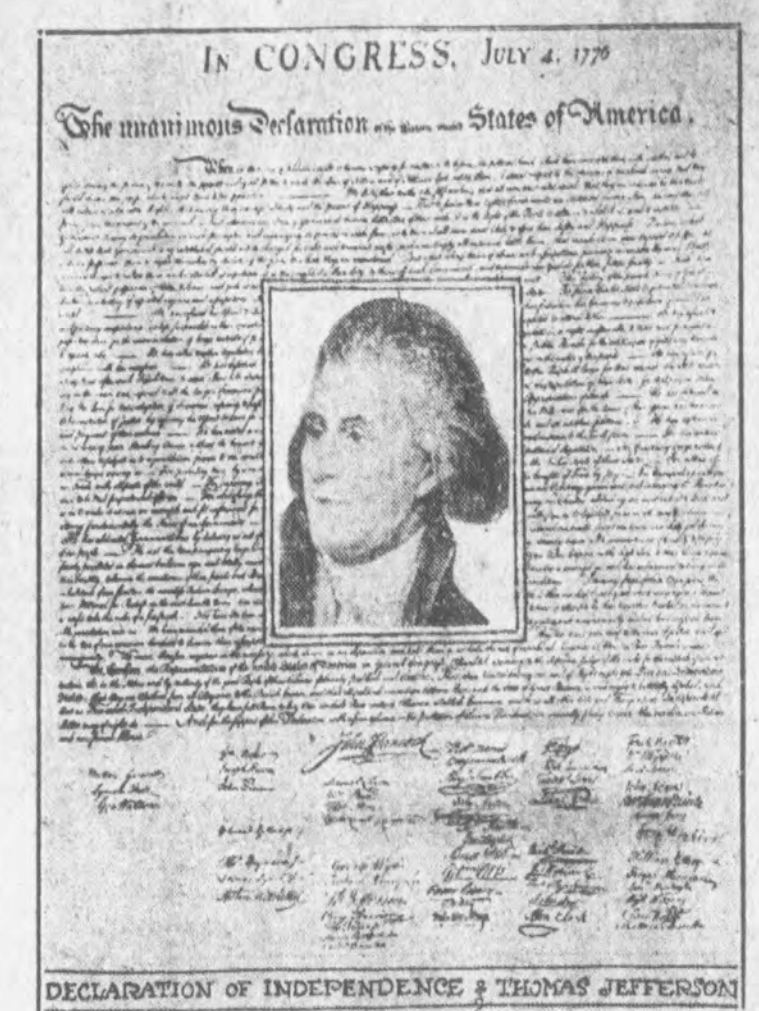
The quartet, "Festival Te Deum," was one of the most beautiful selections of the evening and made the musical program more effective.

MOB SEARCHING FOR MAN CHARGED WITH ATTACKING A GIRL

200 Men With Sheriff and Deputies Form Two Searching Parties to Find Negro Assailant of Child

Bristol, Tenn., April 13.—A constantly growing mob formed on the streets here this afternoon to search for a negro, who is alleged to have attacked an eleven old girl. The child's clothing was torn, and she was choked, but she managed to cry loud enough to attract attention of passersby, who approached, and the man fled. About 20 men were formed in the mob soon after the attempt on the child became known. The sheriff and his deputies, and city policemen are also searching for the man.

Both bodies are working toward Blountville, Tenn. A negro, said to answer to descriptions of the assailant, was said to have boarded an automobile going in that direction.

Four Men Arrested Charged Transporting Receiving Liquor

J. J. Redding, Slade Perkins, James Daniel and John Flood, negroes, were on Saturday arrested on the charge of receiving and transporting and allowed to give bond for their appearance here for trial.

Sheriff Jackson, deputies Pierce Stokes, and Williams raided the stores of Redding and Flood, in Pacolet Township and found one half gallon liquor in each place. Perkins and Daniel were caught drinking, and with the other negroes, were immediately placed under arrest.

The arrest of the four men, brings the total number arrested for the month to seven, while four still have been captured. This speaks well for the sheriff and his deputies, who are making every effort possible to put a stop to the liquor traffic in this county.

QUESTION POWER OF PRESIDENT TO REMOVE OFFICIALS

Myers, Fired Postmaster, Suing for Back Payment on Ground of Illegal Removal

Washington, April 11.—Compulsory arbitration in industrial disputes is constitutional, the Supreme Court held today.

Washington, April 13.—The President's power to remove from office his own, or his predecessor's appointees, was the issue in a case reached today in the Supreme Court with the Executive and Legislative branches of the Government represented.

The case became one for construction by the highest court of the President's power under the constitution to remove executive appointees under offices created by Congress when the Senate intervened. The question was raised in the hearing of the appeal of the late Frank S. Myers, who was removed as postmaster in Oregon in 1920, by President Wilson. Myers sued for back payment on the ground that his removal was illegal.

Prior to presenting argument today, brief forming the basis of their opposing contentions were filed by Solicitor General Beck, for the President, and Senator Pepper, for the Senate.

Contending that Congress has full power over government offices, excepting those created by the Constitution, Senator Pepper in his brief upheld the provisions of the law prescribing the "consent of the Senate," as a condition of the President's removal of first, second, and third class postmasters. Congress, in creating all offices, the brief stated, can fix the tenure of office, determine how the appointment shall be made, and how incumbents may be removed.

Solicitor Beck, on the other hand, declared in his brief, that by "attacking the independence of the Executive," the question at issue struck at a principal involving "the very foundation of our government." The responsibility of the President for the faithful execution of the laws, he contended, must as a vital necessity be considered as carrying out, at the constitutional power, to move the unit or unworthy without the consent of Congress.

BRIANE ENTRUSTED WITH ORGANIZING A NEW CABINET

Asks for Time to Select Ministers; Transition Ministry Has Been Suggested to Settle the Financial Problems in France

Paris, April 13.—Senator De Monzie, Finance Minister in the Herriot Cabinet, was summoned to the palace of the President this afternoon and there discussed with President Doumergue a proposal to form a one day ministry to vote a bill extending the limits of currency circulation and borrowing by the state. M. De Monzie had been widely suggested to head such a ministry.

M. Briand, yesterday, was entrusted with the task of organizing a new cabinet to take place of the Herriot cabinet, which resigned on Friday, but he called at the President's Palace this morning and asked for more time to select his ministers. Briand appears determined to have no power behind the throne, and wants to know definitely whether the Socialists are willing to bind themselves to his leadership. By tomorrow night it is expected that the Socialist party will have made up their minds, but it is known that there are many members of the party who are bitterly opposed to M. Briand.

Wednesday, however, is quarterly settlement day, and it is pointed out that if the needs of commerce and industry are not satisfied, if applications for discounts are not met, as usual, many firms may be forced in to stopping all payments. Besides the treasury will have to face the fact that 400,000,000 francs to pay salaries of officials. For this reason, many senators and deputies have suggested that for the present, political questions should be laid aside and exceptional measures adopted. For this reason, a transition ministry such as M. De Monzie, will talk over with the President today has been suggested to pass over the time during which the government will have to deal with its serious financial problems, and thus avoid a financial crisis in the country. The sole aim of such a ministry, it is explained, would be to regularize the position of the Bank of France, which has exceeded the legal limit of circulation of currency.

FIFTH STRAIGHT FLAG IN NATIONAL LEAGUE AIM OF JOHN MCGRAW

New York. — John McGraw, this season, enters upon his 24th National League campaign at the tiller of the New York Giants at the pursuit of his fifth consecutive senior circuit pennant.

A managerial record already studied with unrivaled achievements leaves to the New York chief only an opportunity to embellish the milestones of his successes. With 10 championship flags streaming back over his picturesque career, and with the outstanding feat of leading one club to four straight pennants, McGraw can merely add in the 1925 race to baseball marks which now surpass those of any pilot in the long chase of the horseshoe pellet.

McGraw took command of the New York Club on July 19, 1902, and two seasons later his first triumph as a leader came in the clinching of the championship. He followed this performance by repeating the next season. Then, after six unsuccessful pennant drives, the doughty diamond marshal produced another title combination good enough to gain and hold the peak in 1911, 1912 and 1913. The Giants won their sixth pennant in 1917.

Four years later McGraw developed the team with which he broke precedent by standing off all opposition in the last four summers from the National League pinnacle. Unlike other clubs which have distanced the field in more than two straight races, however, the line-up entering upon the present diamond struggle has felt many changes and welcomed many new faces to the fold during the period of its supremacy.

Pennant winning streaks in the major leagues have usually resulted from the holding intact of a powerful combination—such as the Athletics of 1910-1914 and the Cubs of 1906-1908—but McGraw has not hesitated to juggle his line-up often since the beginning of his championship winning streak.

The team which triumphed in 1923 was substantially the same as the 1922 line-up, although McGraw counted upon an almost completely new pitch-

ing staff. Neph was the lone star of the 1921 team to take a regular turn with Watson, Bentley, Ryan, Scott and McQuillan contributing their share to the triumph.

Jackson took the veteran Bancroft's place at shortstop last year, while McGraw seemed entirely satisfied with only one outfielder. Young, and at times sent Kelly to the gardens and installed young Terry on first base. Wilson, Walker, Meusel, Kelly and Southworth all had a hand in the flycatching in left and center.

McGraw's triumphs as a manager have placed the team one pennant ahead of Chicago, last year's success giving the Gotham team a total of 12 championships to 11 for Chicago. Boston ranks third with nine, then comes Brooklyn with five and Pittsburgh with four.

SWEDEN ACTS PROMPTLY IN VINDICATING AMERICAN

Boras, Sweden.—Full redress for unjust imprisonment has been accorded by the highest Swedish judicial authorities to an American citizen, Charles Winter of Moorhead, Minn., who, armed with a power of attorney, came here in October 1923 to collect an inheritance for a client.

On the accusation of a rival claimant, a woman resident, who charged that his power of attorney was a forgery, Winter was arrested and kept confined for 15 days. As soon as the genuineness of the client's signature was established he was immediately released and the chancellor of justice himself took action against his accuser and her attorney.

COMPULSORY LITERARY STUDIES OPPOSED BY BRITISH AUTHOR

London.—"There is too much literature and not enough mechanical arts being taught in the schools today," This opinion is from Hilaire Belloc, the author of a goodly number of volumes of essays and other literary works, in a lecture on "Education."

The pupil should determine what his natural bent is, Mr. Belloc argued and if it is not in the line of literature he should not be forced to study it or allied subjects. The pupil, he said, should spend his time learning the profession or trade he is most interested in and be capable of entering it when he leaves school, instead of having to serve an apprenticeship because he spent his time on useless subjects, as is the case under the present system.

NEW MEMORIALS TO GRACE POTOMAC AT WASHINGTON

Washington.—The Potomac River's proverbial serenity will be seriously troubled this summer, for work is under way on two memorials on its banks, and a majestic bridge to span its bosom.

One of the monuments, at the foot of New Hampshire Avenue and E Street, will commemorate those who lost their lives in the Titanic disaster, in a figure with outstretched arms. John Ericsson, inventor and constructor of the Monitor of Civil War renown, will be remembered in the other piece of statuary, 900 feet south of the Lincoln memorial, not far from the Titanic statue.

The Arlington Memorial Bridge, running southwesterly from the Lincoln memorial to Columbia Island, so as to for man avenue toward the Le mansion at Arlington, is to become one of the most beautiful in the world. For its construction the Sixty-eighth Congress authorized an appropriation of \$14,750,000 over a ten-year period. Preliminary work on laying the foundations, which will link the Lincoln and Lee highways, has just been started, under the direction of Colonel C. O. Sherrill, officer in charge of public buildings and grounds.

The Arlington Bridge commission, headed by President Coolidge, has planned the span as a fitting approach to the national capital and a symbol of the union of north and south. It will be faced with the Colorado yule marble of the Lincoln memorial, and from the southern approach will have that memorial, the Washington monument and the dome of the capitol for a background.

Your Car's Electrical System

How Your Storage Battery Works, By Mr. Chandler, Willard Service Station

The three principle units of an electric starting and lighting system are the starter—the generator and the storage battery. Practically every automobile driver will say, "We know that, tell us something we don't know." But very few people have a clear idea about the way these three units work together to give the result that most of us would be lost without.

A simple explanation of this intricate part of the modern car can be made by comparison with a common water system. Imagine a tank of water being filled by a pump forcing water through a large inlet pipe. The speed of the pump, (therefore its pressure) keeps water going into the tank. If the pump slowed down to the point where the weight of the water already raised to the tank would be greater than the force of the pump, water would return through the same pipe, pass the pump and drain the tank. For this reason a check valve is placed in most hydraulic systems and this check valve is analogous and this turns out-out switch that prevents the storage battery sending current through the generator when the car is running slowly.

Doors, window frames and furniture are generally the only wood to be seen in the majority of Havana's homes and office buildings. Floors

are tile.

Visiting American firemen have said that Havana is the best constructed city they have ever seen, when fire risk is considered. The Spanish style of architecture is generally pleasing to the eye and residences with ceilings 15 or more feet from the floor are the rule. This provides greater coolness during the heat of the summer days. An even temperature, falling below 75 only

on rare occasions and generally never reaching above 88, makes heating arrangements unnecessary.

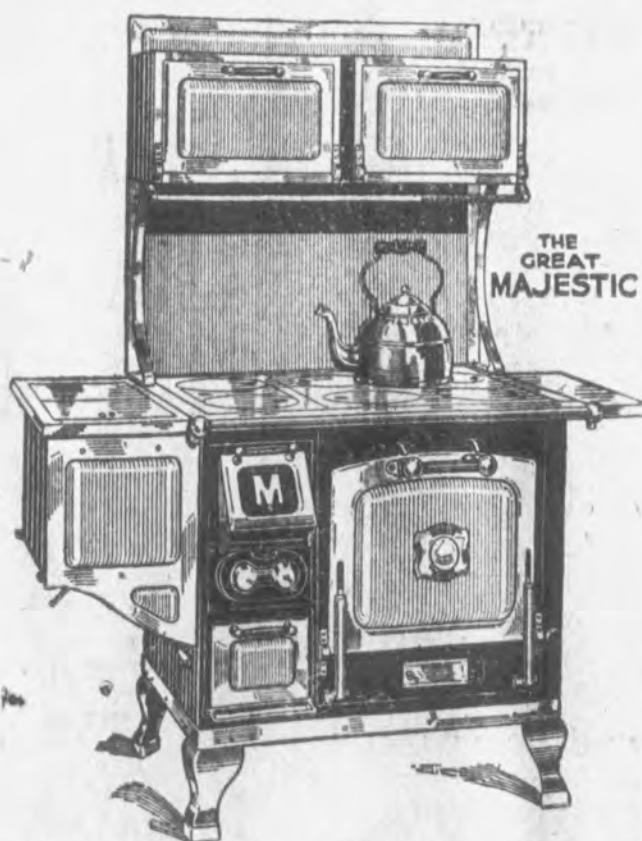
