PYTHIANS WILL MEET IN ROCKY MOUNT NEXT WEEK

Mr. Harry Love to Be Honor Guest; Many Other Notables to Attend Pythian and Dokie Events

Harry M. Love, of Minneapolis, Minn., supreme keeper of the records and seals, Knights of Pythias, will pay an official visit to Rocky Mount April 23, when he will conduct a Rathbone Bible class at which a large class of candidates from all over Eastern Carolina is expected to be received into the Pythian order.

Mr. Love's official visitation will be one of the feature events of the Dokie "Week of Fun" which is to be put on here by the uniformed bodies of Ziza temple, D. O. K. K. during the week of April 20. Thursday, April 23, will be the big day of the week as in addition to Mr. Love's visit on that day a monster Dokie ceremonial, at which more than 100 candidates are expected to be staged. A banquet and dance are on the program for that evening.

Mr. Love will be welcomed to Eastern North Carolina by a special committee of prominent Pythians which has been named by W. Gray Williams district deputy grand chancellor of the ninth district. This committee follows: Silas R. Lucas, T. C. Williams, and Geo. W. Stanton, of Wilson; John H. Hawley and Capt. Nathan O'Berry, of Goldsboro; A. B. Ellington, J. H. Waldrop of Greenville; L. T. Turnage, of Ayden; James Best, of Dunn; C. E. Carter, C. E. Gore and N. M. Shearin, of Weldon; R. S. McCain and Rev. Isaac Hughes, of Henderson; W. W. Wilson and H. G. Harrington, of Raleigh; Hugh A. Page and Jesse Ellis, of Clayton; D. W. Sorrell and J. D. Pridden, of Durham; W. B. McCallum, of Rowland; John Hare, of Fremont; Richard L. Mears, of Wilmington; Dr. W. T. Rainey, Mercer Walker, of Fayetteville; and W. Grover Robbins and J. L. McConnell, in addition to Mr. Williams, of this city.

Mr. Love will enter the state of North Carolina Monday, April 20. He will be welcomed to North Carolina at Asheville by D. F. Giles, of Marion, grand chancellor; George E. Lovell, of Charlotte, grand keeper of records and seals, and others. His first stop will be at Marion. Charlotte will be his next stop. Here he will be joined by L. L. Candler, past grand chancellor. Proceeding to Greensboro April 22. Mr. Love will be joined by Richard L. Mears, of Wilmington, grand vice chancellor, and Thomas D. Mears, also of Wilmington, supreme exchequer. Col. Walker Taylor and W. W. Wilson, both of Wilmington, are also expected to join the party which will proceed in its entirety to this city Thursday, April 23. The delegation of prominent Pythian officials will be given a cordial welcome here with the committee named by Mr. Williams handling the affair. Mr. Love will visit Wilmington April 24.

Many candidates from over Eastern Carolina are expected to compose the Rathbone class which Mr. Love will receive here. These classes are held only under the supervision of the supreme keeper of records and seals, who confers the rank of page and administers the obligation on the original Bible used by Justus H. Rathbone at the founding of the Knights of Pythias at Washington in 1864. The complete program of events and entertainment during Mr. Love's visit will be announced later. Lord Pythian and Dokie officials indicated that other prominent heads of the order might be here, and that the event would represent the greatest gathering of notables of the order ever held in North Carolina.

The Dokie ceremonial will be held during the afternoon of April 23, and the special events will include a barbecue dinner tendered by the Rocky Mount Dokie club and a banquet, at which Jules Brazil, Kiwanis entertainer, will occupy chief place on the program, and dance that evening. Jimison's Sentence of 60 Days Changed to a \$500 Fine

Charlotte, April 14. — A fine of \$500 was substituted in city court here today for the 60 days road sentence imposed on Tom T. Jimison, former Methodist minister, when convicted of violating the prohibition law. Jimison announced he would pay the fine. Former Governor Cameron Morrison made a plea in the prisoner.

Judge Williams, in directing a short address from the bench, declared that he had no apology to offer for re-opening the case, and added that he thought the verbal attacks made by Jimison on the police department were made without the advice of legal counsel.

Turning to the original road sentence, the Judge said that because the defendant was a "recognized leader of men" may have caused him to act "rather harsh." The former Governor was the first to speak in behalf of the defendant. He made a plea which lasted more than 30 minutes, asking for judicial mercy for the former minister. Thomas L. Kilpatrick, original chief counsel for Jimison, followed Mr. Morrison, and urged leniency on the prisoner.

DAM AT FORD'S POWER PLANT FLAT ROCK GIVES AWAY

500 Acres Are Reported Under Water While Scores of Families Seek Safety From Rising Waters

Detroit, Michigan, April 14. — Scores of families in the valley of the Huron River, between Flat Rock and Lake Erie, were driven from their homes early today when the dam at the power plant of Ford Motor Company at Flat Rock burst, and released millions of gallons of water into the valley.

More than 500 acres are reported under water to a depth of 12 feet in some places, and the water is steadily rising. The valley's inhabitants were warned of the flood by troopers of Michigan State Police, who started along the river to arouse persons living nearby, as soon as guards at the dam had telephoned the station of the disaster. So rapidly did the water rise, that the officers were forced to take to boats, going thus from house to house with their warning, and ferrying scores of families to places of safety. All the men were commandeered to aid the rescue work. No lives have been lost so far as could be learned, although many houses built below the level of the dam were inundated. Reports from various places along the seven miles from Flat Rock to Lake Erie, indicate that the entire valley, at some places a mile wide, is under water. Hundreds of small houses, many that were set on stilts lined the river and its banks. Although the water is high around the railroad bridge, traffic was not interrupted. Small houses, boat houses, farm implements, trees, bushes, and furniture were rushing down the valley on a current running ten miles an hour. Troopers reported seeing chickens and dogs clinging to sheds and barns, drifting along with the flood.

Man With Record In Liquor Traffic Arrested Sunday

Frank Manning, white man residing near Farmville, was arrested on Sunday charged with selling whiskey, and was placed under bond for his appearance here in Superior Court. The arrest was made by Deputy Sheriff S. A. Whitehurst and C. P. Pierce following a raid in which three gallons of whiskey were found in Manning's home.

Manning was arrested two years ago on the charge of transporting whiskey and being adjudged guilty was fined \$500 and costs and given a suspended judgment of two years. One year later he was found guilty of the same charge fined \$50 and costs, and given a suspended judgment of six months.

The dinner is an annual event and is given in connection with the Eastern Carolina Exposition. At this time representatives of each Chamber of Commerce makes short talks and the work accomplished during the past year is discussed. Plans for the future are outlined. Mr. Bartlett stated in his telegram that prospects are excellent. It is desired that a large delegation be in attendance.

Quits Work at 125 Years. Libga, Latvia.—Boris Unaschek, a farmer who says he has attained the age of 125, and has proved his age to the satisfaction of the Latvian government, has been granted a pension by the government that he may be freed from labor the rest of his days.

SAYS HUSBAND HAS RIGHT TO "SPANK" WIFE UNDER CERTAIN CIRCUMSTANCES

Maltry, Ga., April 14. — A man has a right under certain circumstances to place his wife across his lap and "spank" her, Judge Ogden Person ruled in Superior court today, when he directed a verdict of not guilty in a case against Fred Bannister, a young farmer indicted on a charge of assault and battery.

GUN DISCHARGES KILLING JUDGE OF SUPREME COURT

Judge Joseph Kelly, While Ascending Steps With Gun in His Arm, Falls, Shot Taking Effect in Left Side

Bristol, Va., April 14. — Judge Jos. L. Kelly, of the Virginia Supreme Court of Appeal, died at his home here this morning thirty minutes after a load from a shot gun had entered his left side. Relatives said the Supreme Court Justice was going to the basement when a shot gun went off, the entire load entering his side.

They stated later that Judge Kelly and his son started to the basement after a rat. The boy, it was declared, insisted on taking his rifle, but the father told him he would take his shot gun instead. The family said the Jurist had just started to ascend the stairs, which they described as faulty in construction, when he fell and the gun was discharged. It was found 15 feet from Judge Kelly's unconscious form. Relatives also declared that the Supreme Court Judge regained consciousness before he died and told that the gun was discharged accidentally.

BRIAND DECIDES ABANDON ATTEMPT FORM MINISTRY

Bases Decision on the Refusal of Socialists to Collaborate; Considers Condition Impracticable

Paris, April 14. — Former Premier Briand, shortly after six o'clock this evening definitely decided to abandon the attempt to form a new ministry. M. Briand announced his intention to abandon the attempt to form a ministry to the Socialist-Republican group, to which he belongs, basing it on the refusal of the Socialists to collaborate, and on the condition they wished to exact in return for their support. He stated he considered the condition impracticable with his conception of the rule of premier.

BASEBALL FANDOM STARTS ITS ANNUAL PILGRIMAGE TODAY

National and American Leagues Start Their Battle for Leadership; Several Other Circuits Open Today

Chicago, April 14. — Baseball fandom today started its annual pilgrimage to National and American League arenas for the initial battle for the six months campaign leadership. Fresh from weeks of limbering up in southern and western training camps, but handicapped also by an unusually large list of injured players, 16 league teams prepared for the opening games that will bring the National game back into the line light after months of partial eclipse by winter sports. Good weather conditions was in the prospects in most of the game cities.

As the two major leagues dressed for action, the summer time sport was gotten under way in several other circuits. The American Association, and Southern Association had opening today, while one game was on schedule in the International League. With many of the major league organizations strengthened by the infusion of new blood, and with encouraging pre-season record in training camps, game managers expressed optimism of the outlook.

Washington, April 14. — Cotton consumed during March aggregated 584 bales of lint, and 58,845 of lint compared with 550,132 of lint and 55,598 of lint in February this year, and 485,840 of lint and 44,197 of lint in March last year, the census bureau announced today.

Mother Being Held Connection 5 Deaths Collapsed in Cell

Crown Point, Ind., April 14. — Mrs. Anna Cunningham, of Gary, Ind., collapsed today in her cell at Lake County jail, where she is being held in connection with the death of her husband and four children within six years. She passed into a coma and physicians believe it impossible to remove her to Gary for a sanity hearing set for 2:00 o'clock.

Calls Roumania's Attention to its Debt To United States

Washington, April 14. — Minister Jay, at Bucharest, has presented a communication to the Roumanian Government calling their attention to the fact that that government has negotiated debt refunding agreements to other nations, but has taken no such action in connection with its debt to the United States. The Roumanian debt to last November was \$36,128,495 principal, and \$9,477,000 interest.

Court Marshall Appointed to Try Lieut. for Murder

Manilla, April 14. — A court marshal consisting of 13 officers was appointed to try Lieutenant John S. Thompson for killing Miss Audrey Burleigh, who was shot to death on April 4. The court marshal will meet at Fort McKinley on April 15, and will be led by Brigadier General George Summonds. Thompson has never denied killing the girl, but has said he committed the act while suffering from mental aberrations, due to uncontrollable jealousy. Major Thomas Lynch has been selected to prosecute Thompson, and Major Edward J. Sherburn will act as the defense counsel.

Fire Wardens Much Concerned Over 2 Forest Fires Today

Blacksburg, Va., April 14. — Fire wardens were much concerned today over two forest fires, which broke out fresh yesterday, and which at last reports were assuming dangerous proportions. A fire east of Blacksburg, along the North Fork of the Roanoke River, between the North West and Virginia railroads, was threatening several houses, chief fire warden McKenna was notified, and a blaze on the south side of Brush Mountain was moving northeast toward Poverty Hollow, where fires raged all last week.

Bank Employee Is Shot and Killed By 3 Men Today

Detroit, Mich., April 14. — Charles Flaggart, teller of a branch of the American State Bank of Oregon Avenue, was shot and killed by three men, who held up the bank shortly after noon today. The men scooped up an undetermined amount of money and escaped.

JAPAN'S RULERS WILL HONOR AGED COUPLES WITH GIFTS

Tokio. — The silver wedding anniversary of the imperial couple, May 19, will be made the occasion of an elaborate official celebration. Some 200 public men and members of the diplomatic corps will be entertained at a banquet, and 30,000 men and women above the age of 80 will be presented with silver cups or other royal souvenirs. Two hundred young women and an equal number of men, selected by the officials of the various provinces as most exemplary in all ways, also will be presented with gifts. The capital is organizing a superb lantern parade and festival.

NEW POSTAL RATES BECOME EFFECTIVE ON WEDNESDAY

Increased Salaries of Postal Employees Makes a Slight Increase in Postal Rates Necessary

Washington, April 14. — Reminding the public that congress has decreed that the users of the postal service must help pay the increased salaries of postal employees, which became effective January 1, Postmaster General New today issued a statement setting forth the new postage rates which go into effect Wednesday, April 15.

"So far as the rates on first-class mail are concerned, the postmaster general said, 'there are no changes whatever except in the case of private mailing cards, including souvenir post cards. The rates on second, third and fourth class mail have been increased in certain contingencies, but this increase is very slight and will not work any hardship on the mailing public. The excess revenue derived from such sources will enable the post office department to meet its obligation, and at the same time provide increased compensation for its army of faithful employees.'

Some of the changes in rates which go into effect April 15, follow:

First class mail: Private mailing cards, including souvenir post cards, whether bearing written or printed matter, increased from 1 cent each to 2 cents each. The present 1-cent postal cards will continue in use, the new rate applying only to post cards other than those issued by the government.

No other changes in the first-class rates of postage have been made.

Fourth-class (Parcel Post) mail: "The same matter, weighing more than eight ounces, as handled in third-class mail. Limit of weight 70 pounds in first, second and third zones, and 50 pounds in all other zones. Present pound rates in the various zones have not been changed. Service charge of 2 cents in stamps to be affixed to packages in addition to postage has been imposed for each parcel, except those collected on rural delivery routes.

Special handling charges of 25 cents in stamps, with the words "Special Handling" written or printed on the wrapper, or by use of the new special handling charge 25-cent stamp, in addition to postage and 2 cent service charge, secures the same expeditious handling, transportation, and delivery for parcels as though handled as first-class mail.

Registered Mail: Minimum registry fee increased from 10 cents to 15 cents on all domestic registered mail, including that to island possessions of the United States and the Canal Zone. For the present the increased rate does not apply to registered packages: Canada, Cuba, Mexico, the Republic of Panama, or other foreign countries.

Young Woman, An Alleged Victim of Attack, Dies Today

Indianapolis, Ind., April 14. — The 28 year old woman alleged to have been the victim of an attack by Daniel C. Stephenson, former Grand Dragon of the Ku Klux Klan, died today.

The young woman had been in a critical condition for several days as a result of poison, which she told her parents she took following Stephenson's alleged attack. Stephenson was indicted on five charges by a grand jury after an investigation.

Alleged Slayer of Two Officers Was Apprehended Today

Bristol, Va., April 14. — Kenneth Wagner, alleged slayer of policeman John Smith, of Kingsport, and Deputy Sheriff Hubert Webb, of Bluff City, who was shot and killed at Kingsport yesterday, was apprehended today and is in the Blountsville, Tennessee jail, authorities here were notified by telephone.

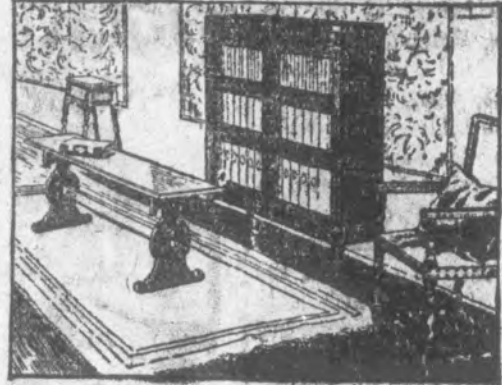

About the Capital

(By M. L. Shipman)

Raleigh, April 14.—The outstanding event of the past week at the capital was the re-appointment of George Ross Pou as Superintendent of State Prison; the reactions to the re-appointment. These were varied. During the week, Governor McLean took action looking to speedy trial of the Needleman case in Martin County, while the Attorney-General announced the appointment of an assistant. Solicitor Evans discussed vice in Raleigh, while National Commander Drain, of the American Legion, visited the city and made addresses. The State Fair and State Hospital directors met and the head of the newly created Roman Catholic Diocese of Raleigh was named.

George Ross Pou was re-appointed as Superintendent of State Prison after a fight had been made on him in which it was charged that he had wasted the State's funds, and, from a business standpoint, was unfitted to head the institution. While Governor McLean did not himself appoint Mr. Pou to the Prison Board does not take action without his consent and approval before naming a superintendent, so it amounted to the same thing. In re-appointing Pou, the Board dropped Sam J. Busbee who has been on the Prison Staff for many years, combined the offices of warden and physician, gave the job to Dr. J. H. Norman and re-elected Hugh A. Love as prison chief clerk and assistant superintendent. The prison officials were all given increases in salary, but in the future will have to furnish their own board and house furnishings, these have been furnished by the state in the past. It is estimated \$4,000 a year will be saved in this manner.

The chief reaction to the re-appointment of Pou has been unfavorable to Governor McLean. Though the Board, when taking its action, stated that nothing wrong with the affairs of the prison had been found during an investigation it made, still no effort is made to get around the fact that Pou's administration during the last four years cost the state \$75,000 approximately each year, that being the annual deficit of the prison under his management. Opponents of his re-appointment naturally stress the fact that for 25 years before Pou took office the prison had been a self-supporting institution. The question is being asked repeatedly how Governor McLean will square this appointment with his announced intention of placing the State on a sound business basis. Pou can hardly be regarded as a good business man, says the opposition, on the basis of his record and it is well known that his appointment by Governor Morrison four years ago was a political move, for he is not known to have any particularly good record behind him which would warrant his being given political preference. The general opinion here seems to be that politics and economy in state government clashed for the first time since the McLean administration opened and politics won out.

It is generally believed that Pou's support of McLean in the primary was the determining factor in his appointment. Warden Busbee, who has served the state for thirty years, was dropped—was the political sacrifice—

and he issued a statement after the action had been taken declaring that the vote he cast for Bailey in the primary cost him the job at the State Prison. Whether this be true or otherwise, Governor McLean's action has disappointed some of his strongest supporters.

The case of Joseph A. Needleman, charged with an attack on a young girl, and those of the crowd of men who took him from the Martin County jail and mutilated him will be tried at a special term of court in Williamston on May 4. Fifteen men are under indictment as members of the mob.

Some interest was manifested in the capital over the conviction in Charlotte of Tom Jimison, former Methodist preacher, on a charge of transporting liquor and his sentence of sixty days on the roads. While the labor leader-preacher is not overly popular in Raleigh, still there are many who feel that his sentence was unnecessarily harsh for a first offender. The point is made that the professional liquor runners very often escape with a fine while Jimison, who was accidentally caught, it appears, when he had a little hooch for a friend, was the victim of circumstances. He is not the type of man to run liquor for a living.

Solicitor Evans of Wake started a crusade against vice in Raleigh during the week in connection with the city elections. He made a number of general charges, but did not mention any names, though he says he has the "dope" when the right time comes to present it. He charged the police department with various and sundry derelictions. The general reaction to his address at this early stage of the game is that as Solicitor he should present his evidence to the grand jury and get indictments there.

John Harwood of Bryson City will be assistant to the Attorney-General in place of attorney W. C. Vaughan, of Washington, who declined the appointment. It was generally believed that Vaughan was being rewarded for his friendship for the Attorney-

General over a long period of years, but, at any rate, he prefers private life.

Governor McLean will not remove the death sentence hanging over C. W. Stewart and his son Elmer of Brunswick County to a later date as he does not believe in delaying executions. The men are sentenced to die on April 17 and the Governor will hear an appeal in their case on Monday. If he does not decide to commute the sentences, then he will not further delay the executions by granting a reprieve.

A larger State Fair will be operated in the future as the result of a decision reached at a meeting of the State Fair Directors this week. The Fair will operate six days instead of five as heretofore and there will be a horse show in connection with it, this being an added feature.

The Commissioner of Labor and Printing estimates the State will save \$10,000 a year as a result of Governor McLean's order that a cheaper grade of stationery be used in place of the present finely embossed grade. The State stenographers, however, do not like the new paper as it's so cheap it does not take well to erasures. There is little doubt also that it looks mighty cheap to send printed stationery out from the "Great State of North Carolina" to poorer but prouder sister Commonwealths who feel that a certain dignity must be maintained by the State governments.

Monsignor W. J. Hafey of Maryland has been appointed as head of the recently created Roman Catholic Diocese of Raleigh and will assume his duties shortly.

The directors of the State Hospital held a routine meeting but did not take up the election of officers. This is expected at a later meeting.

Commander Drain of the American Legion visited Raleigh in connection with the Legion's drive to care for disabled soldiers and their dependents. He made a very favorable impression.

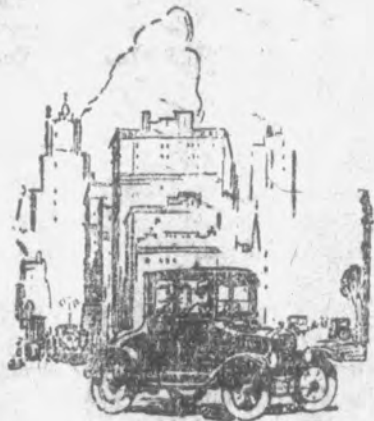

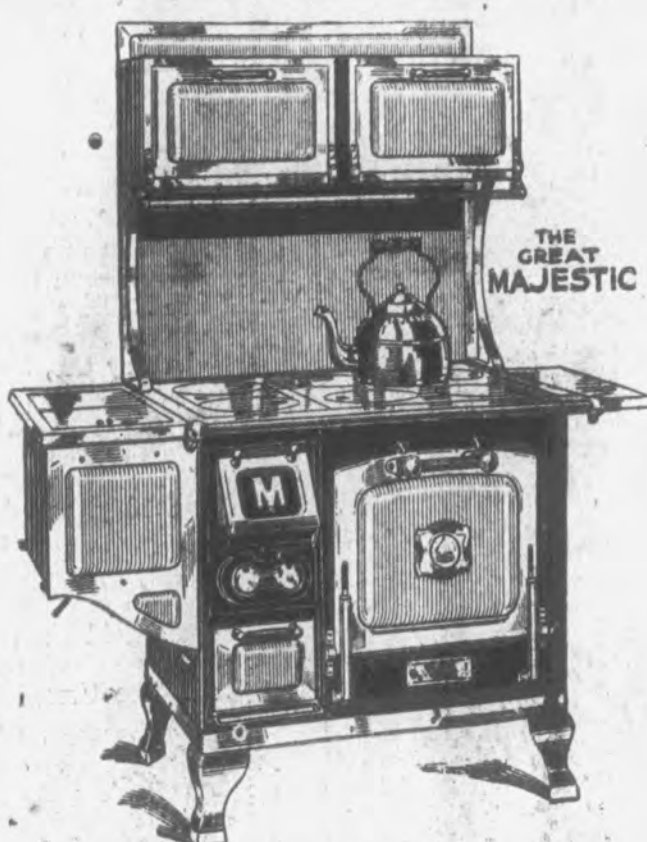
SKELETON OF HUGE DINOSAUR UNEARTHED IN EAST AFRICA
