PLAY GROUND PLANS PRESENTED LOCAL KIWANIS CLUB

Committee to Work Out Plans to Raise Money is Announced; Minstrel Show to Be Given Before May 10

Despite the rain of last evening, the Kiwanis Club had one of the most enjoyable as well as one of the most profitable meetings yet held by the local club. The meeting was in charge of Berry Bostic and he kept things going all the while.

Key Brown gave a splendid paper on "Running a Drug Store," while Dave Turner gave a no less instructive talk on "Operating a Hotel." The attendance was good and the "cats" under the direction of little Guy Smith had not been overlooked.

R. W. Gorman was initiated and at present is the infant member of the Club.

Dr. Frank D. Merito, of Pittsburgh, Penn., was a visitor of the club.

At the close of the program, Dr. Laughinghouse announced the plan as outlined by the Board of Directors for making the play ground proposition a living reality. He stated that the Board of Directors had voted a sum from the club treasury for \$250.00 and that a committee composed of J. B. James, chairman; W. E. Hooker, R. C. Deal, H. L. Rivers and M. K. Blount was appointed as a general committee with power to act, to work out plans to raise money estimate the cost and have full charge of the project. J. B. James speaking for the committee, stated that an estimated cost for completing the project under way would be about \$6002.00 and that an auxiliary committee composed of Vic. Davis, chairman; Penn. Watson, Bill Bradsher, Chas. Forbes and Guy Smith had been named to begin at once on a minstrel show to be given before May 10th. This plan of proceeding was unanimously adopted by the club with a view and a determination to put the play ground proposition over within the next month.

"Presidential Box" Being Erected for President Coolidge

Charlotte, April 18.—There will be a suitable seat for President Coolidge at the ceremonies incident to the sesqui-centennial of the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence in Charlotte next month, whether he comes to occupy it or not. In building the box seats from which the mammoth pageant will be witnessed by spectators those who have the work in charge are proceeding with the erection of a "presidential box". To occupy this, Mr. Coolidge has been invited, and his declination will not be accepted without protest.

During the past five weeks, great changes have taken place at Independence Park, where the ceremonies will be held. The entire area, covering nearly four acres, has been turned into an assembly ground. It has been fenced off and is being up with screen facilities and other accessories incident to the celebration that will take place during the week of May 20.

The amphitheatre has been widely and favorably commented upon. It has been tested thoroughly as to vision and acoustic qualities.

X-Ray Wizard Loses Eighth Finger

Dr. Frederick Baetjer, roentologist at Johns Hopkins Hospital and Medical School, at Baltimore, Md., and one of the world's chief authorities on the X-Ray, has undergone his seventy-first operation and lost his eighth finger as his sacrifice to the cause of science. The ray-burned finger was amputated by Drs. Follis and Davis. Left with but the thumb and first finger of one hand, and only one eye as a result of accidents met with during his experiments, Dr. Baetjer, undaunted by his sufferings, is continuing his work.

MRS. CUNNINGHAM IS CHARGED FIRST DEGREE MURDER

Arraigned Before Justice of Peace in Cell Today and Bound Over to Criminal Court Without Bail

Crown Point, Ind., April 18.—Mrs. Anna Cunningham, of Gary, Indiana, a widow who has confessed that she killed three of her children by poisoning, was arraigned before a Justice of the Peace in her jail cell today, as she lay on a cot, and was bound over to the criminal court of Lake county without bail on a charge of first degree murder.

Mrs. Cunningham admitted in a confession a few days ago that she administered a death portion to three of her sons, but denied any connection with the death of a fourth son. Another son is in a Chicago hospital as a result of poison, his mother confessed giving him, and may die, physicians said.

Second Victim of Still Explosion Dies This Week

Fred Knight, negro, who received injuries in a still explosion in Chicod Township several weeks ago died during this week. At the time of the explosion Raymond Cannon, white, was killed, while Jim McLawhorn, another white man was also injured. According to reports received at the time of the terrible accident, the men had put the still in operation and finding that it was running too fast, cut off the steam which caused the explosion. The men were hit with the brick, parts of the still, and also badly burned by the hot water.

Death List From Bomb Outrage Has Reached 160

London, April 18.—The death list from the bomb outrage in the Sveti Kral Cathedral in Sofia Thursday has reached 160, including five members of the Bulgarian Parliament, it is stated in an official statement received here today. Many of the wounded are expected to die.

Founder of Baracca Philathea Movement Will Visit Raleigh

Raleigh, April 18.—Marshall A. Hudson, of Syracuse, N. Y., founder of the Baracca-Philathea Sunday school class movement, will attend the Baracca-Philathea Silver Jubilee in Raleigh, June 11-14. Dr. W. F. Powell, of Nashville, Tenn., and others will be on the program.

DRAINAGE ASS'N. TO MEET HERE TUESDAY

Sessions Will Continue for Two Days and Will Be Featured by Splendid Talks and Discussions

The North Carolina Drainage Association will meet here Tuesday, April 21st, and will remain in session for two days. This being a live subject, especially so far as Pitt county is concerned, it is hoped that the citizens of the county will take an interest in the meeting.

Representative men including several state officials will be in attendance and the sessions will be featured by splendid addresses and discussions.

Reception in Honor of Prince of Wales Colorful Spectacle

Kano, Nigeria, April 18.—The Prince of Wales, who has seen many gorgeous pageants in strange corners of the earth today witnessed one of the most stirring and colorful spectacles of his career in the Durbar, or reception for native princesses held here in his honor. To the unceasing throb of tom toms and weird strains of native orchestras, more than 29,000 African troops marched in the maneuvers with amazing skill before the Prince's reviewing stand for several hours.

A vast native crowd of spectators giving every evidence of wild excitement cheered constantly. Before the Durbar began at 8:00 o'clock this morning, every jungle road for many miles was jammed with persons endeavoring to reach the scene. Most of them had walked all night. Many had traveled for several days and numbers died of the heat and jungle perils.

Condition of Ruth Was Described As "Good" This A. M.

New York, April 18.—Although Babe Ruth spent a restless night, his condition this morning was described as "good," physicians attending him, said they expected the home run king, who was operated on yesterday for the removal of an abscess, would improve steadily.

Painleve Preparing Ministerial Statement Be Presented Tues.

Paris, April 18.—France's new Premier, M. Painleve, is devoting most of his time and all of his skill to the preparation of the ministerial statement, which, after its approval by the cabinet on Monday, is to be read in Parliament on Tuesday. Upon the contents of this document depends the new government's future.

DECLARES SOUND BUSINESS METHODS NEED OF THE HOUR

President Coolidge Delivers Radio Address on Opening of the Women's World Fair in Chicago

Washington, April 18.—President Coolidge, in his radio addresses delivered today on the occasion of the opening of the Women's World's Fair in Chicago, declared that an advantage to be gained from Government economy and efficiency is the inspiration provided for pursuit of such methods in public and in the home. "If the people," asserted the President, "in the daily management of their modest domestic affairs note that the greatest interest of their government and of their semi-public institutions are dealt with in a spirit of laxity, and a mood of carelessness, they find little inspiration to apply better methods in the management of their own concerns."

"The great business operations, which are constantly under the public eye, ought to be handled so as to make them an example in sound procedure."

"The importance of sound business methods was never so great as it is today. It is particularly true that the government business should be placed on a basis of rigid economy."

"In our modern society, public and private savings are quickly transmitted into capital available for production. The increased production makes goods more plentiful, and therefore cheaper, and at the lower level, people can afford to consume more."

"The real disaster to a modern community comes with easy and ill considered consumption, and prevents the storing away of new capital to meet the ever increasing demands."

Mr. Coolidge commended the sponsors of the fair for placing their work on a business basis, by establishing a budget with a result that all expenses were met before the doors were ready to be opened. intheriuplow-vogkqcmfwyppp p ppu

REV. R. R. FLEMING WAS ACCIDENTALLY KILLED YESTERDAY

Deceased Was Former Pitt Countian and Resided in Arkadelphia, Ark.; Funeral Held This Afternoon

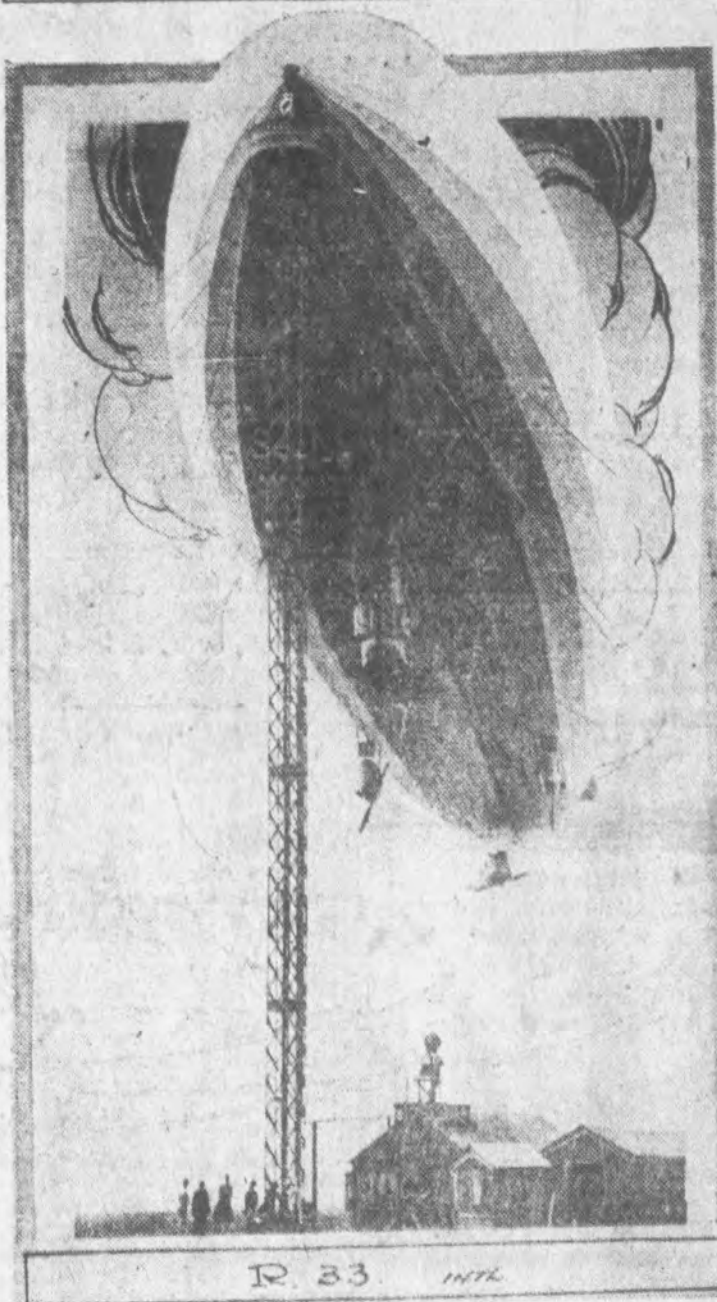
Rev. R. R. Fleming, Jr., pastor of the Baptist Church, Arkadelphia, Ark., was accidentally killed yesterday. The funeral took place this afternoon.

The telegram which was received by relatives, gave no details other than that he was accidentally killed and that the funeral would take place today.

Rev. Mr. Fleming was born in Pactolus, this county, a son of Mr. R. R. Fleming, Sr. He was married in early manhood to Miss Pennie Daniel, also of this county. To this union three children were born who with their mother, survive. For several years Mr. Fleming was a major in the United States Army winning for himself an enviable reputation in services for his country during the recent world war. For the past few years he has been the much beloved pastor of the Arkadelphia Baptist church, and was held in high esteem by a host of friends not only in this state and Arkansas, but throughout other states where he was well known.

The deceased is survived by his wife, two daughters, Misses Blanche and Harriett Fleming, one son, Master Guy Fleming, his father, Mr. R. R. Fleming and a large number of relatives. News of his death has been received with great sorrow by the people of this county who knew and loved him.

R-33 Breaks Loose in Storm



The British Zeppelin, R-33, sister ship of the R-34, first dirigible to make a round trip across the Atlantic, broke loose from her mooring mast at Pulham, Norfolk, Eng., during a terrific gale, and was swept out over the North Sea. The accident was almost identical with that sustained by the American dirigible Shenandoah, which was torn from its mooring mast at the naval air station at Lakehurst, N. J. The R-33, which has been undergoing extensive alterations for a year, was shortly to have been flown to India. She is pictured here moored to the very mast from which she broke loose. There were twenty men on board.

BASEBALL MAGNATE KILLED IN ATTEMPT DIED EARLY TODAY TO AVOID STRIKING CHILD WITH AUTO

Charles H. Ebberts, President of Brooklyn Baseball Club Dies From Heart Trouble

New York, April 18.—Charles H. Ebberts, president of the Brooklyn National League Base Ball Club, died at six o'clock this morning. He was 66 years old.

Heart trouble from which he had been a sufferer for many years, was the cause of death. The baseball magnate made a brave fight against the malady, and had just returned from Florida, where he went in an effort to regain his health. He was nationally popular in the game, which he had helped to improve through the years during his connection with the Brooklyn club.

Sam H. Mellison is Now Private Sec'y. Gov. of West Virginia

Rocky Mount, April 18.—Sam H. Mellison, formerly city editor of the Rocky Mount Telegram, is private secretary to Governor Howard M. Gore, of West Virginia. Mr. Mellison went from here to Clarksburg, West Virginia, to accept a newspaper position and was closely identified with Governor Gore in his campaign. Since becoming private secretary, he has been entrusted with some important matters, including those incident to the settlement of coal strikes. He and Mrs. Mellison were given a home in the executive mansion at Charleston.

Hearing on Nickel Plate Merger in Recess Until Thurs.

Washington, April 18.—After three days of testimony in support of the Van Sweringen Nickel Plate merger plans, and vigorous cross examination by the counsel of opposing stock holders, the Interstate Commerce Commission hearing, on the proposal, was in recess today until Thursday. Only two witnesses have testified thus far.

Robert M. Dillard Runs Car Into Telephone Pole; Dies in Rocky Mount Hospital

Rocky Mount, April 18.—Robert M. Dillard, night superintendent and manager of a local automobile company was almost instantly killed when in an attempt to avoid striking a negro child on the Tarboro Highway near this city, his car ran into a telephone pole. His head was hit by the pole, and he was rushed to a local hospital, but died a short while later.

He was a native of Mebane, N. C., and was a veteran of the world war.

Motorcycle Cop Is Found Guilty of Manslaughter

York, S. C., April 19.—Forrest McFadden, a Rock Hill motorcycle policeman, was last night found guilty of manslaughter by a jury in York county court here, for slaying Dewey Simpson, of Chester, S. C., on the night of February 27. Simpson was alleged to have been speeding in a car with three others, when he was killed by a bullet fired by McFadden in an effort to halt the automobile. The verdict carries a maximum sentence of 30 years in the penitentiary. Sentence was expected to be passed today.

F. Cameron Church, Jr. To Wed Miss Muriel Vanderbilt, New York

New York, April 18.—Frederick Cameron Church, Jr., of Boston, who is to wed Miss Muriel Vanderbilt, will obtain the perfect wife among the 400, it is said by those familiar with New York social life.

Miss Vanderbilt is said to have none of the habits, which at times causes comments on the modern girl.

Long before her debut she discouraged smoking and drinking. At Palm Beach, last year, she used conservative bathing suits, and used no lip stick and rouge.

BISHOP CONVICTED HERESY FORBIDDEN TO PREACH SUNDAY

Bishop William M. Brown Forbidden to Preach at St. Mark's in-the-Bouwerie, New York

New York, April 18.—Bishop William M. Brown, convicted by a court of Bishops of the Episcopal church of Heresy at Cleveland last fall, has been forbidden by Bishop William T. Manning, of the Episcopal Diocese of New York, to preach tomorrow at St. Mark's-in-the-Bouwerie. Bishop Manning also censured the rector of St. Mark's, the Reverend Dr. William Norman Guthrie, for having extended a invitation to the former Bishop. Bishop Brown at the present is appealing to the House of Bishops for a review of the trial, and meanwhile Bishop Manning has ruled that he shall not speak nor officiate within any Parish or Mission within the New York Diocese. The ruling was made known last night when two letters, one addressed to the Rector of St. Mark's, and the other to Bishop Brown, were made public by Dr. Manning. In the letter addressed to him, Dr. Guthrie was accused of acting in open contempt and defiance of the authority and law of the church, and also warned that if he did not obey command to exclude Bishop Brown from the pulpit, he would be acting in direct violation of the constitution and canons of the church, and his conduct would be regarded "as unbecoming a clergyman."

Bishop Manning's letter to Bishop Brown, was in reply to a letter of the latter asking that he might be allowed to preach in the Cathedral of St. John, the Divine. Bishop Brown and Bishop Guthrie said they were surprised when the letter was received last night, but would make no further comment.

Disregard of Gov. Order Proves Costly to Wedding Party

Canton, China, April 18.—Disregard of the government's order forbidding all music for one month, as a mark of respect to the late Dr. Sun Yat San, recently cost a wedding party much money and jewelry, said to have been worth one half million dollars. The wedding party was parading one of the principal streets of Canton, to its customary din of a Chinese band. They were stopped by soldiers, who forced them to surrender all of their valuables.

National League of Women Holding Session in Richmond

Richmond, Va., April 18.—Program of study and legislation presented by the committees on Efficiency in Government, and the legal status of Women, were adopted by a majority vote in the convention held here today. Action on a third program, that for social hygiene, was deferred until Monday.

The National League again went on record in favor of suffrage in the District of Columbia when the convention today inaugurated legislative recommendation to that effect in its program of work in 1925 and 1926, recommending provisions for the District of Columbia representation in Congress, and the electoral college with access to the Supreme court of the United States.

LOSS OF DIRIGIBLE TRACED TO IMPACT OF RADIO WAVES

Tokio.—Dr. T. Terada, science professor in Tokio University, says that the destruction of the dirigible SS3 last March with the loss of her crew, was caused by a broadcast radio wave.

Dr. Terada was a member of the board appointed to investigate the explosion, and after it had ended its labors without finding a theory, he continued his experiments. Costing a miniature of the airship with the aluminum paint that was used on the SS3, he found that radio waves directed against it proceed sparks measuring nearly an inch, and while he has not fully disclosed the nature of the experiment and its result, he expresses his conviction that he has found the cause of the disaster.

BUILDING AND LOAN ADVANCES STATE'S WELFARE

Much has been said in recent years concerning the material growth of North Carolina—and indeed there is much to be said. But after all the mere accumulation of wealth is not the most important factor in a state's development. Wealth may increase and welfare actually decrease. Figures concerning wealth increase alone have little significance beyond indicating a possibility.

In order to put true meaning into such facts we must translate them into terms of living conditions. Is there any more general happiness? Are people in general, as in contrast to members of a small fortunate group—any happier? Do they live better? Have they any better homes, better clothing, and food? Are they able to educate their children better now than they formerly could? If these and similar queries can be answered in the affirmative then the state is truly prospering.

Status of Home Ownership.
If we direct our attention to one of these factors, that of home ownership, we find that according to the 1920 census North Carolina ranks far from the top in this respect. Her place is twenty-eighth. A trifle over fifty-two percent of the North Carolina homes were rented. Our position may be partly explained by the large number of negro tenants in the state.

Making a comparison between North Carolina and her neighbors where the conditions are similar we find that she makes a better showing. She ranks above any of the Southern states to the south of her. In Maryland fifty percent of the homes are rented; in Virginia forty-nine percent; in Tennessee fifty-two percent; in South Carolina sixty-eight percent, and in Georgia sixty-nine percent.

Improvement in Home Ownership.
It is also true that North Carolina has made some improvement in the ten year period between 1910 and 1920. During this same period North Carolina was one of the three states showing a decrease in the percentage of mortgaged homes.

One of the most important agencies in the United States in helping those who desire to own their homes are the numerous building and loan associations scattered all over this country. It is perhaps not a mere coincidence that Philadelphia is known as the city of homes. The explanation may be found in the fact that the first building and loan association in this country was established there; and the idea once started has grown steadily until today the building and loan associations of Philadelphia are among the most flourishing in the United States.

Spread of Building and Loan.
From the small beginning made in Philadelphia less than a century ago the movement has spread until today there are more than 10,000 local associations with combined assets of more than \$3,300,000,000.

This movement is of great interest to sociologists as well as economists. It is one of the few instances of co-

operation which has not only lived but grown. There have been isolated failures here and there—and these are very rare—but the plan has stood the test of time.

Nature of Building and Loan.

There are two outstanding characteristics of building and loan associations: first, they are local in scope. There are no national building and loan associations. Second, they are purely co-operative. There are no stock holders to make profits. The associations are usually administered very economically, there being few paid officials. Because of its co-operative nature the associations are able to secure much valuable advice without cost. The plan of operation is rather simple.

Functions of Building and Loan.
These associations perform two distinct functions. They afford a convenient method for people to make small systematic savings at intervals of a week or month. A "member" may elect to pay in an amount most convenient to him. They are usually in multiples of twenty-five cents. These payments—or deposits—are

Growth of Building and Loan.
The importance of building and loan associations to the advancement of North Carolina may be estimated from the fact that in 1923 they helped build over 6,000 homes valued at more than \$17,000,000. That year they loaned in all \$21,500,000. Some idea of the growing importance of these associations to our state is shown by a comparison of the assets. In 1904 they were \$2,542,800; in 1914, \$12,703,300; and in 1923 \$56,800,000. — J. Merritt Lear, in N. C. Commerce and Industry.

Among the good stocks we believe that California Petroleum around 29, Central Leather around 16, Simms Petroleum around 22 1/2, Studebaker around 44 1/2, Sinclair Oil at 18 1/2, and possibly Virginia Carolina Chemical around 4, would prove a good investment for a long pull.

The grain market is so erratic that position is the only thing we can see at the moment.

We believe sugar around its present level is a purchase, as it is much below cost of production, and while the visible supply is large, yet with a good fruit season and increased consumption of summer drinks it should show a good profit.
