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SENATOR WHEELER IS ACQUITTED BY FEDERAL JURY

Receives Two Messages At One Time, Acquittal—Birth of a Daughter in Washington

Great Falls, Montana, April 25.—Senator Burton K. Wheeler of Montana, late Vice Presidential candidate in political storm center, baked today in the double-distilled sunshine of fortune. As the Senator stood in Federal Court here last night he received simultaneously two messages, one his acquittal, of the charge of wrongfully using his influence with the Interior Department, and the other an announcement of the birth of a daughter in Washington. Verdict was returned in two hours and thirteen minutes after the jury retired to deliberate, and only one ballot was taken. Despite an admonition by Federal District Judge DeLoach that no motion be demonstrated in the court, there was a rush for the Senator after the verdict. He went over to the jury box and shook hands with each of the twelve men. District Attorney John L. Slattery also shook hands with Senator Wheeler. Senator Wheeler, after retiring from the court room, issued a statement in which he said the verdict was what he expected, and thanked Senator Walsh for his services. He also said his concern for Mrs. Wheeler was greater during the trial than was his anxiety over the outcome of the trial.

Senator Wheeler was indicted on April 8, 1924 by a Federal Grand Jury on a charge of accepting \$4,000 fee from Gordon Campbell, Montana Oil Operator, for appearing before the Department of the Interior in presenting an oil land permit for his client. He branded the indictment as "palpably a frame up," and blamed the Department of Justice, which he was investigating at the time as prosecutor of the Senate Doughtery Investigation Committee. The next day the Senate started investigation of the case and later exonerated Senator Wheeler of the charges.

Lowden Speaks in Favor Co-operative Marketing Produces

New York, April 25.—A disastrous increase in cost of living was predicted here by Frank O. Lowden, former Governor of Illinois, unless aid is given the farmers in organizing for co-operative marketing of their products.

The former governor speaking last night at the annual dinner of the Bureau of Advertising of the American News Paper Publishers Association, said that "American agriculture was decaying, that farm bankruptcies had increased 600 per cent in recent years, and that farms are being abandoned in increasing numbers all over the country."

"If we would avoid ruin," he said, "I see but one way out. The farmer too must organize for marketing of his products. Co-operative Marketing Associations are no longer an experiment. Wherever the co-operative movement has been tried, there you will find agriculture in its best state."

American Forest Week Be Observed April 27 - May 3

Raleigh, April 25.—Governor A. W. McLean has issued a proclamation setting aside the week of April 27, May 3, inclusive, as "American Forest Week" and asking for its observance in North Carolina.

The North Carolina Department of Conservation and Development has sent out circular letters asking for the observance of the week by various civic clubs. The State forester has also written to more than 300 local women's clubs and to 12 Boy Scout executives calling attention to the Governor's proclamation and asking their co-operation in the requests set forth therein.

In his proclamation, the Governor pointed out that "neglect of the forest results in continued fires which destroy seedlings and young trees so that cut over lands that should be producing more timber are being turned by thousands of acres into barren wastes that are an economic burden."

Storm Centre

AIKEN SHERIFF SHOT AND KILLED BY NEGRO TODAY

Murderer of Sheriff Is Killed by Deputy Sheriff; Citizens Are Aroused Over Incident

Leesville, S. C., April 25.—Sheriff Henry H. Howard, of Aiken County, was shot and instantly killed by a negro named Lowman, who was himself killed by another officer today near Monetta, in Aiken County.

The shooting took place when Sheriff Howard and other officers went to Lowman's home in search of whiskey. Two other negroes were wounded. Lowman was killed by Deputy Sheriff Roberson. Citizens of the community are aroused over the incident, and more than 100 armed men are said to have gone to the scene.

Monetta, S. C., April 25.—Sheriff Henry H. Howard, of Aiken County, was shot and instantly killed. Annie Lowman, negro woman, was killed, and her daughter, Bertha, was probably fatally wounded in a shooting affray near here that occurred today when officers attempted to search the home of Sam Lowman, the dead woman's husband, for liquor.

COURTEOUS KATE SURPRISED WHEN LAWYERS READ WILL

London.—Politeness among shop girls received a stimulant recently when it was announced that Miss Susan Plomer, of Hornsey, who died some weeks ago, had willed an annuity of \$450 to Miss Kate Wenham, an employee of an Oxford Street department store, "in recognition of many courtesies received at her hands."

Miss Wenham had waited upon Miss Plomer in the store during the last ten years, but had no idea that her customer was wealthy.

ESSEN DEMANDS SPEEDIEST METHODS TRANSPORTATION

Essen.—Industrialists and business men of Essen have united in urgently demanding the establishment of air communication from the Ruhr valley to connect with the vast system of international air routes which is rapidly spreading over Europe.

Consequently the Ruhr soon will have regular air connections with Hamburg, Bremen, Frankfurt, Leipzig, Hanover, Berlin, Amsterdam, Brussels, Paris and Zurich. The commercial importance of the valley demands these facilities.

NEGRO COMMITS CRIME ON INMATE SCHOOL FOR DEAF

Hurried to Raleigh for Safe Keeping; Will Tyson to Be Tried On May 11th

Raleigh, April 25.—Governor McLean has ordered a special term of court at Carthage, opening on May 11, to try Will Tyson, negro accused of attempting to attack a young white girl near Carthage last Monday. The negro at present is consigned to the state prison for safe keeping.

The Governor also has indicated that he will call a special term of Burke county court to convene at Morganton to try Arthur Montague, negro who was placed in the state prison last night for safe keeping, on a charge of attacking a young inmate of the Deaf and Dumb Institute at Morganton. The attack is alleged to have occurred during Thursday night, the negro being captured early Friday morning while asleep in the child's bed at the institution. The negro had been employed as waiter in the dining room of the institution.

FRANCE AROUSED OVER AMBUSHING OF LEAGUE MEET

Three Youths Were Killed and One Was Wounded Presumably by Communists

Paris, April 25.—The ambushing of a meeting of the National Republic League in the Rue Darnetmont early yesterday morning, in which three youths were killed and a fourth wounded, alleged presumably by Communists, has made a deep impression upon the French public. The newspapers today printed columns about the affair, and it is the outstanding topic of conversation on the streets and in the homes.

Maurice Ricaud, a student who was one of those wounded, died in a hospital today, bringing the number of deaths to four. Premier Painleve, accompanied by other officials, called at the hospital where the wounded were receiving treatment, and expressed sympathy of the city and nation to the victims and their families. Funeral services of the youths is set for 1 o'clock tomorrow in the Notre Dame Cathedral, and is to be an impressive ceremony.

Police continue the search of homes and offices of Communists and there have been no arrests, except two men who were found with pistols in their hands at the scene of the shooting.

Gomez Consents to Withdraw Resignation

Lisbon, Portuguese, April 25.—President Gomez has consented to withdraw his resignation. His action followed a visit to the palace of the delegation of members of Parliament, which had previously rejected the resignation. The delegation requested him to reconsider his action.

State Salary and Wage Commission Meets With McLean

Raleigh, April 25.—The State salary and Wage Commission met today at the Executive Mansion with Governor McLean, and elected Julian Price, of Greensboro, as its chairman. The commission was in conference with Mr. McLean most of the morning, and it was stated that it would hardly be able to go into the details of its proposed work at this time, owing to the absence of data necessary for extensive proceedings. Questionnaires have been furnished various state employees, and heads of departments have been notified by Governor McLean to have all necessary information relative to salaries as soon as practicable.

TRAPPED MINERS SUBDUED FIRE AND ESCAPE FROM MINE

After Remaining in the Mine for 12 Hours They Succeeded in Effecting Their Escape; Heroes of Burke Today

Wallace, Idaho, April 25.—14 miners, who subdued a fire in the 2,000 foot level of the Hecla mines at Burke, seven miles from here, and escaped by their own efforts late yesterday afternoon after being trapped in the mine for more than 12 hours, were the heroes of Burke today.

After battling smoke and flames for several hours, the men reached the main shaft, and calmly rang for the cage. They were hoisted to the surface unharmed. When the alarm sounded, all of the men in the mine were hoisted to safety except the 14 who were two miles away in the far workings. They disconnected the pump used in the drilling, and with compression air drove back the smoke until they were close enough to pump water on the burning plant.

New Parish House St. Timothy's Church Opens in Wilson

Wilson, April 25.—The new parish house of St. Timothy's Protestant Episcopal church has been formally opened. The new building was architecturally designed to serve as a companion piece to the church. St. Timothy's is one of the leading Episcopal churches of this section. One of its former rectors, the Rev. Morrison Bethea, is now archdeacon of the Convocation of Raleigh and maintains his residence in the capital city.

Orange and Black to Be Color Scheme of New Auto Tags

Raleigh, April 25.—Orange and black will be the color scheme of North Carolina automobile license tags from June 30, 1925 to the corresponding date a year hence. These tags will be the first selected under the new order of things, that is, since the transfer of automobile registration from the department of state to the Department of Revenue.

Orders have been placed for 420,000 tags this year. Some of them have arrived. After June 30, all cars will have to be equipped with new tags, under the law.

Lettuce, Strawberries Shipped From Wilm. in Large Quantities

Wilmington, April 25.—Shipments of lettuce from Wilmington from April 16 to 22 included: April 16, six cars; April 17, twelve cars; April 18, twelve cars; April 20, twenty-nine cars; April 21, twenty-four cars, and April 22, fifteen cars.

Last year a total of 1,180 cars of truck moved from Wilmington, of which seventy-five per cent was lettuce.

Strawberries shipped from this section thus far this season total 217. The heaviest movement was on April 20, when 100 cars were forwarded. The strawberry season will reach its peak about April 30.

King George and Queen Mary Return to England Today

Dover, England, April 25.—King George and Queen Mary arrived at Dover today on their return from a long voyage in the Mediterranean. The voyage was undertaken after King George had suffered an illness and his Majesty appeared in much better health today than when he left.

D. A. R. FAVOR CAMPAIGN AGAINST INTERNATIONALISTS AND ENROLLING ALIENS

Washington, April 25.—The Daughters of the American Revolution went on record today in favor of an extensive campaign in every state against red internationalists and the enrollment of aliens. A resolution declared that "The plan for destructive revolution in the United States is not amiss, but a proven fact." Emissaries, it is said, are planning to overthrow the present Government and will set up a Communist Soviet rule in its place.

AGED WOMAN IS VICTIM OF THEFT

Daughter Found Guilty in This Session of Court of Stealing \$500.00 From Mother

Mrs. Mollie Fields, her husband Alex Fields and their daughter Sallie Fields, were during this week, given a hearing in Superior Court on a charge of larceny of \$500 from Mrs. Nancy Parrish, the 90 year-old mother of Mrs. Fields. Alex Fields and daughter were found not guilty while Mrs. Fields was adjudged guilty and judgment was suspended upon payment of cost and the restitution of the funds.

Mrs. Parrish was living with her daughter at the time that the money was stolen. She testified that the Fields had access to her trunk and that when she needed the money and went to look for it, it was gone.

The trial on account of the unusual nature of same, attracted much attention. Mrs. Parrish is now making her home with other relatives.

Acts of Terrorism Occur in Bulgarian Provinces Last Night

Sofia, April 25.—Three acts of terrorism attributed to Communists occurred in the Bulgarian Provinces last night, a theater and a library in Plevna, capital of the Province of the same name, and other Communist strongholds were destroyed by bombs. Unsuccessful attempts were made to destroy three bridges in the region of Vratsa, in North Eastern Bulgaria, a military patrol was fired upon during the night, one soldier being killed and two wounded.

Japanese Operetta Presented by High School Glee Club Proves Big Success

ELECTION FOR PRES. GERMAN REPUBLIC BE HELD SUNDAY

Former Chancellor Marx and Von Hindenberg On the Last Stretch of Race for the Presidency

Berlin, April 25.—Former Chancellor Marx, choice of the Weimar Coalition, or Republican Block, and Field Marshal Von Hindenburg, champion of the parties of the United Rights today were on the last stretch of their race for the presidency of the German Republic with neither expected to have a walk-away in tomorrow's balloting. Political leaders say the result is equally problematical as was the contest in the United States between Charles E. Hughes and Woodrow Wilson in 1916.

With no tangible figures on other data available, spectators are occupying themselves with guessing the whereabouts of that familiar, but elusive election apparition.

If the total vote falls below 28,000,000, there is belief that Dr. Marx will command a safe majority. On the other hand if the turn out of voters advance the total pole to more than 30,000,000, it is believed that Von Hindenburg will be benefited by the increase.

The field marshal's managers are depending upon his popularity as a war hero, and his reputed non-partisanship as attraction for indifferent voters, and believe that any appreciable increase in the total vote will be gathered in by their candidacy. The campaign, which closes tonight, has been marked by unwonted severity, and regardless of which candidate is victorious, it is already quite plain that the decision of the Ultra-Bourgeois and Liberal elements, into two sharply defined camps, will continue to have its effect long after the official count of Sunday's recording. Even if the Republican Block is victorious, it still will be opposed by a strong minority of Germany's post election developments; while on the other hand the election of Von Hindenburg, his opponents say, would pressage internal, political and economy ramifications, and possibly foreign reaction, which they shun from contemplating.

Peace Institute Launches \$200,000 Building Campaign

Raleigh, April 25.—Peace Institute has launched a \$200,000 building campaign. The initial meeting incident to the drive was held in the First Presbyterian church at Raleigh and was presided over by Governor A. W. McLean, who is prominent in the Presbyterian denomination.

It is planned to erect two new buildings at Peace Institute if the drive is successful. These, it is said, will materially enlarge the school's capacity.

At the head of the drive in the State is Captain Nathan O'Berry, of Goldsboro. A committee was appointed to serve with him composed of the Rev. Dr. W. McC. White, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Raleigh; R. W. Young, Mrs. Joseph Daniels; the Rev. D. H. Scanlon, of Durham; Mrs. Mary Howard Clark, of Wilson; and B. S. McCain, of Henderson.

TO ENFORCE HEALTH ORDINANCE

The Health Department has called attention to the fact that the grocery stores and other places that dispense foods are not complying with the city ordinance that requires such establishments to be properly screened and to protect their stocks, especially fresh or green foods, from flies or other insects. Foods placed in front of stores and exposed to flies and dust from the street should not be sold to the public and the County Health Officer warns the merchants that the ordinance will hereafter be strictly enforced.

A PROGRAM OF MARKING TIME IN FRANCE

The Painleve Cabinet (Caillaux included) came off with a better showing in the French Chamber on Tuesday than the Herriot Cabinet made in a last test-vote before it disappeared. The best that M. Herriot could do was to poll 290 votes for his Government, as against 246 in opposition; these figures the Painleve Cabinet changes to 304 supporting votes and 218 opposing.

A margin of 92 votes, however, is not interpreted by M. Painleve and his colleagues as authorization for a sweeping series of reforms. The fiscal program which M. Caillaux laid before the Chamber is a program which touches at no basic point the problems of French finance. It is a program meant to tide France over; little more.

No doubt that is as far as either M. Painleve or his Finance Minister wished to go. A real attempt to solve the financial problems of the country is complicated by two factors: first, by the fact that the dominant power in the Chamber now represents French creditors, while the dominant power in the Senate represents French debtors, and the two are at loggerheads; second, by the fact that the present Parliament was elected on no fiscal issue and lacks a mandate from the country in a choice between taxation, a capital levy, depreciation of the franc and a policy of sheer delay. We may well find that the first attempt by a French politician to deal realistically with French finance must wait upon a new election.—N. Y. World.
