VON HINDENBURG IS ELECTED PRESIDENT GERMAN REPUBLIC

"Front Porch" Campaign Proves Successful; Receives 14,639,399 Votes in Sunday's Balloting

Berlin, April 27.—Field Marshal Von Hindenburg "front porch" campaign conducted from his home in Hanover, for the Presidency, has been successful, and next week he will be inducted into office as the first popular elected President of Germany.

The first President, the late Frederick Ebert, was named by the National Assembly, immediately after the revolution which established the Republic, but Von Hindenburg was chosen by direct vote by the people with a plurality of 886,759 over his principal opponent. Running as the choice of the Nationalists-Conservative Bloc, consisting of parties of the United Right, Von Hindenburg received 14,639,399 casted in yesterday's balloting. His principal opponent, former Chancellor Wilhelm Marx, received 13,752,640. Ernst Thaelman, Communists, received 1,931,591.

The race was close from the start. Dr. Marx, backed by the Centralists Democrats and Socialists, conducted a world winning campaign on American plan, delivering several addresses daily, and some of the time from the rear platform of a train. Von Hindenburg, on the other hand, took little actual personal part in the fight, and did not even vote himself, but his supporters were busy everywhere. The Field Marshall's most important speech was delivered before a great gathering of Nationalists in Hanover, when he denied that he represented reaction, or that his candidacy was inimical to the Republic. His only other public utterance, of any significance, was a final appeal broadcasted by radio last Friday night, at which time the war veteran declared that it has always been his greatest intention to prevent war and to help victims of past wars. He asserted that this would continue to be his policy if he was elected to office.

Methodists to Meet in Conference in Bethel Wednesday, April 29

Louisburg, April 27.—A meeting of all the pastors and lay representatives of the Methodist churches in the Washington district of the North Carolina Conference will be held in the Bethel Methodist Church, at Bethel, Wednesday, April 29, at 6:30 p. m.

The purpose of this meeting is to complete the Washington district organization for the Louisburg College Half-Million-Dollar Expansion Fund Campaign.

The meeting is being called by Rev. S. A. Cotton, presiding elder of the Washington district, who is serving as clerical chairman, and Mr. C. G. Morris, of Washington, who is serving as the lay chairman of the Washington district campaign organization.

A complimentary supper will be served by the ladies of Bethel Church at 6:30, following which prominent clerical and lay leaders of the Methodist denomination will present the cause of the College and outline the plan for the district campaign.

The president, A. W. Mohn, will discuss the history and needs of Louisburg College, a junior college for girls, which has a record of 122 years service to the young women of the North Carolina Conference and of the State.

Rev. Cotton will discuss the relation of the College to the church, and Rev. O. W. Dowd, pastor of the Louisburg Methodist Church, will discuss the need for support by Methodists generally, of the Expansion Fund program. Chairman Morris will preside at the meeting and outline the plan of the district campaign.

The Expansion Fund program provides for the raising by popular subscription of \$500,000, which will be used for constructing and equipping additional buildings and for an adequate endowment. Of the total amount needed, \$150,000 has been subscribed by the residents of Louisburg and Franklin county.

M'LEAN APPOINTS MEMBERS COMPRISE JUD. CONFERENCE

List of Appointees Include 16 Democrats and 4 Republicans

Raleigh, April 27.—Governor McLean today announced the appointment of 20 members of the bar, one from each Judicial District of the State, who together with the members of the Supreme Court and Superior Court Judges, will comprise the Judicial Conference created by the 1925 General Assembly.

In the list of appointees are sixteen Democrats and four Republicans. The action on which the Judicial Conference was created provides for continuous study of organization, rules and methods of the Judicial System of the state, and the practical workings and results produced by the system.

"The plan," said the Governor today, "is not a new one. It has been in force in connection with the Federal Judicial System for some years, and in that jurisdiction has brought about beneficial results to the leadership of Chief Justice Taft."

The conference provides for the first time, machinery for the administrative organization of North Carolina Judicial System, and that system may be coordinated for the purposes of expediting trial and bringing about reforms in court procedure.

WILLIE STEWART PAROLLED TODAY

Son of C. W. Stewart and Brother of Elmer Stewart Was Serving Sentence of 15 Months

Raleigh, April 27.—Governor McLean, on his own motion, today parolled Willie Stewart, son of C. W. Stewart, and brother of Elmer Stewart, who were electrocuted in state prison for the murder of Sam Lilly and Leon George, of Brunswick County. Willie Stewart was sentenced to serve fifteen months in New Hanover County on a charge of fighting and resisting arrest.

"The Governor wanted to let the Stewart family know that the state does not want to take anything, and give nothing," said Pardon Commissioner Sisk, in announcing the parol. Several letters came in telling about the Stewart family, and the Governor thought that some consideration ought to be shown them, so he parolled Willie Stewart.

FARMERS MUTUAL FIRE INSURANCE ASS'N. HELD FRIDAY

Police Department Agree to Round Up All Communists

London, April 27.—Lieutenant Colonel Cecil Malone, who has returned from the Balkans, quoted that the Chief of Police, Schober, of Vienna, has declared that all the Police departments of Europe have agreed upon a general round up of Communists, and the expulsion of suspected aliens within the next few days.

Great Britain at least contemplates some such steps as that outlined by Lieut. Colonel Malone, according to the morning post, which says the Government will take direct action against Communists activities here almost immediately. The methods to be followed are not disclosed.

Farms in Currituck County Increased 111 Since Jan. '20

Currituck, N. C., April 27.—The number of farms in Currituck county has decreased from 984 to 873 since January, 1920, and tenancy has increased, according to Department of Commerce figures, made public here. The number of farms operated by owners on January 1, 1920 was 639, compared with 460 on January 1, 1925, the government reports show. On January 1, 1920 there were 350 farms operated by tenants. The total for January 1, 1925, was 413.

Acres devoted to farming dropped from 88,843 on January 1, 1920, to 57,829 on January 1, 1925, while the value of farms, including lands and buildings, dropped from \$3,751,336 to \$3,160,692.

The number of horsemen farms dropped from 1,136 to 780, cattle from 3,369 to 1,761 and swine from 10,696 to 9,335. The number of mules increased from 793 to 862.

GREEK LETTER FRATERNITIES CELEBRATE AT SCHENECTADY

Schenectady, N. Y.—The founding of the Greek letter fraternity system at Union College 100 years ago will be celebrated with fitting ceremonies here this fall. Nearly every national Greek letter organization will send representatives to participate in the centennial festivities.

The so-called "Big Three" of the national fraternities, Kappa Alpha, Sigma Phi and Delta Phi, all were formed at Union College, Kappa Alpha, which claims to be the oldest of all the country's national Greek letter fraternities, was begun in 1825 and Sigma Phi and Delta Phi were instituted two years later. In connection with the celebrations these three fraternities will erect a memorial gate at the entrance to Jackson's Garden on the north side of the United Campus to commemorate the founding of the fraternity system.

BATTLE OF DAHU IS MARKED INCREASE AIR CRAFT ACTIVITY

Second Day Witnesses No Major Engagement Between Attacking Fleets and Black Land Forces

Honolulu, April 27.—The second day of the battle of Oahu was marked by notable increase in activities of air craft and light cruiser forces, but no major engagement has thus far occurred between the main bodies of attacking fleets, and the defending Black land forces now engaged in the war game off the Hawaiian Islands.

Two destroyed and one mine layer of the Blue attacking fleet were sighted off Diamond Head last night, moving eastward along the coast of Honolulu, and were fired on by the coast defense batteries. Along the southern coast of the Island of Oahu one of the enemy crafts was theoretically sent to the bottom. The Ludlow submarine tender of the Black defending forces sighted two submarines of the attacking Blue forces 10 miles from Barber Point. The Ludlow immediately opened fire at close range, and theoretically succeeded in sinking one of the submarines.

SHACKLETT ELECTED CHAPLAIN TODAY

Rev. W. S. Shacklett Elected Chaplain and Welfare Officer at the State Prison

Raleigh, April 27.—The state prison board in conference with Governor McLean today elected the Rev. William S. Shacklett, of Burlington, chaplain and welfare officer of the state prison. The appointment was made under the reorganization plan of the state prison authorized by the General Assembly. Mr. Shacklett is an Episcopal minister and served in the world war.

Ambassador to the Court of St. James Presents Credentials

London, April 27.—Atanson B. Houghton presented his credentials to King George today as new Ambassador to the Court of St. James.

Declares Russia Is Backing the Bulgarian Outrages

Sofia, Bulgaria, April 27.—The authorities of Varna claimed to have seized 200 kilograms of explosives collected by conspirators plotting to blow up police headquarters, the town hall, and several other public buildings. It is stated that a document was seized proving that the Bulgarian Communists were responsible for the recent outrages, and were receiving money from Russia.

Charges of Russian Communists complicity in the Bulgarian outrages have been repeatedly made by Bulgarian authorities since the attack on King Boris, and the bomb tragedy in the Sveti Kral Cathedral, where 160 lives were lost. An official communication given out in Sofia yesterday said it has been established that several other outrages had been planned in the capital and provinces.

Maxwell Appoints Bailey to Assist Him Blue Sky Law

Raleigh, April 27.—A. J. Maxwell, recently designated by Governor McLean to administer the Blue Sky Law in North Carolina, today announced appointment of Isadore M. Bailey, of Onslow county, as his assistant, at a salary of \$45.00 a year. Mr. Maxwell stated that Mr. Bailey would devote his full time to office. He was a member of the General Assembly in 1925, and had been practicing law in Jacksonville.

First Service Medals for Military Service in Peace Time Given

Washington, April 27.—Major L. Martin, first commander of the Army World Flyers Exposition, and First Lieutenant Wade, and Leslie P. Arnold, members of the exposition, received today the first distinguished service medals ever given for military service performed in the time of peace. Presentation ceremonies took place at the War Department and were attended by officials representing governmental departments. By special act of Congress, medals were awarded to the eight world flight officers, and at the same time some of them were made eligible for promotions in rank. Only Major Martin and the two lieutenants were in Washington today, however, to receive the decorations.

Facts Concerning North Carolina Corp. Commission

The North Carolina Corporation Commission was established by an act of the General Assembly of 1899, superseding the Railroad Commission, which was established in 1891. Members of the Corporation Commission are elected, one every two years, for a period of six years. Thus, the terms do not expire simultaneously. For instance, W. T. Lee was re-elected in 1922, Judge Geo. P. Pell in 1924, and the term of A. J. Maxwell will expire in 1927. These make up the membership of the present commission.

The Corporation Commission has general supervision over railroad, telegraph, telephone, street railway, steamboat, canal, waterworks and all other companies exercising the right of eminent domain. The general assembly of 1925 placed commercial motor transportation under its supervision also.

The Commission also is charged with the duty of providing the public with adequate train facilities.

Under an act passed in 1913 the Commission has supervision over electric light, power, water and gas companies, and in 1923 there was passed an act giving it authority to require adequate warehouse facilities to promote the more expeditious handling of freight in North Carolina. In 1921, it was given supervision over State banks. Several attempts have been made to create a separate State banking department, but these attempts have failed. The last was made during the session of the General Assembly this year.

M'LEAN EXPLAINS WORK SALARY AND WAGE COMMISSION

Says Main Purpose is to Give State a Classification and Equalization System

Raleigh, April 27.—Repeating what he termed as "either a very great misunderstanding" or "the effort on the part of some designing person to discredit in advance" the work of the State Salary and Wage Commission, Governor McLean has issued a statement outlining what he feels is the work laid down for the commission by the legislature.

"I desire to emphasize the fact," stated the Governor, "that there is no disposition on my part or on the part of the Salary and Wage Commission to treat any employee of the state unfairly. The main purpose is to give North Carolina a classification and equalization system such as United States Government, and the most progressive city, and the state government have had since the year 1910."

Governor McLean said that it was pointed out to him during the recent session of the General Assembly that growth in equalities existed in the pay of employees; that in some instances there was a big difference between the salaries of certain persons in the state's service doing the same class of work.

The Governor said there were certain persons engaged in technical work for the state, whose salaries could not be fixed on a class basis. He added that members of the Salary and Wage Commission had themselves been employees and later had assumed the status of employers, and would be able to handle the situation. He declared he believed the people of North Carolina would give them full support in their efforts to equalize and standardize salaries paid, and to classify state work.

State Salary and Wage Commission to Meet Thursday

Raleigh, April 27.—The State Salary and Wage Commission, created by the 1925 General Assembly, will meet in the Governor's office tomorrow, for the purpose of organizing and performing such other duties as provided in the law creating the commission. The call for tomorrow's meeting was issued last week by Governor McLean.

The Commission, appointed by the Governor, is composed of J. H. Hanes, Jr., Winston-Salem; Julian Prier, Greensboro; Robert N. Page, Aberdeen; S. L. Rogers, Franklin, and George A. Holderness, Tarboro.

The law creating the commission, passed at the request of Governor McLean, who asked for it in a special message to the General Assembly, confers upon it broad powers. All finalities, however, must be approved by the Governor. When the classification and wages of state subordinates are fixed, they will be open to public inspection. This is provided in the law.

ALASKAN RAILROAD FACES HEAVY YEARLY DEFICITS

Washington.—The expenditure of more than \$11,000,000 will be needed to complete the government-owned Alaska Railroad, in the belief of Noel W. Smith, its general manager. For the next few years, Mr. Smith expects in addition an annual loss of about \$1,500,000 in operating expense.

The construction program contemplates spending \$8,955,861 on roadway, track, bridges and telegraph and telephone lines. A minimum of four years will be required for completion of this, although six years is recommended. Buildings for employees will cost \$202,000 and will be completed, Mr. Smith said, as soon as practicable.

The estimated cost of a tunnel between Tunnel Station and Hunter is \$1,280,000, and will take about two years to complete.

Mr. Smith believes the only two possibilities of more than a slow, gradual growth in traffic lie in the possible development of gold mining in the Fairbanks district, or coal mining.

SUSPECT ATTACK ON NEEDLEMAN SHOOT HIMSELF

Tom Lilly, Alleged Member of Mob, and Who is Under Bond, in Critical Condition

Williamston, April 27.—Tom Lilly, 35, is in a serious condition at his home in Griffin township, as a result of an attempt to commit suicide last Friday night, it was learned here today.

Lilly was one of those arrested in connection with the removal from Martin county jail of Joseph Needleman, and is under bond to appear at a special term of court on May 4, when indictment will be presented against him to the grand jury.

Physicians said today that it was doubtful if he would recover. He is said to be a first cousin of the girl who was alleged to have been attacked by Needleman, and which brought about the jail delivery.

SCOUTMASTERS BE TRAINED BY RADIO

Sessions to Be Conducted Each Monday at 9 P. M.; Will Conclude June 1

Scout leaders of the Southeastern States are showing their alertness by using radio as a means for training Scoutmasters. Under special arrangement with the Mercer University station on a course in Scoutmastership will be broadcasted the first session being held at 9:00 this evening.

Probably the greatest problem Scout Councils have, especially those as large as our own Pamlico Area Council, is to give training to the Troop leader located far from any large center, and to overcome this the radio is being used.

Mr. H. O. Hunter, Regional Scout Executive will conduct the first lesson, which will deal with the problems of Troop Organization, Patrol Methods, The Scoutmaster's Job, and Scouting Objectives and Relationships. In addition to Mr. Hunter the faculty for the course will include Regional Field Executives Lincoln McConnel and Alfred A. Pullen, Dr. Peyton Jacob, Millard Westcott, and W. E. Dunwoody of Mercer University.

Sessions will be conducted each Monday at 9:00 P. M. from Station WMAQ (Wave length 361 meters) and will conclude with an examination to be held June 1.

PARENTS FOUND NEGLIGENT IN DUTIES TOWARD CHILDREN

Berkley, Cal. — Professor C. D. Mead of the department of education in the University of California said recently that the parents of today were shifting their responsibilities to the already-overburdened shoulders of the teachers. "They are expecting too much of the schools," he asserted. "They now demand that the teachers give esthetic and moral as well as mental training. They have shifted the burdens from the home to the class room, and expect perfect results."
 Parents also, Professor Mead continued, say their children cannot read, write or spell as well as they could. He maintained that present day students were far ahead of their parents or grandparents at the same age. He pointed out that some tests given in Boston in 1850 were repeated recently and in practically all instances the modern child came out on top.
 "What we need, instead of complaints, is some whole-hearted support and training at home, and more of the 'woodshed' spirit among the parents."

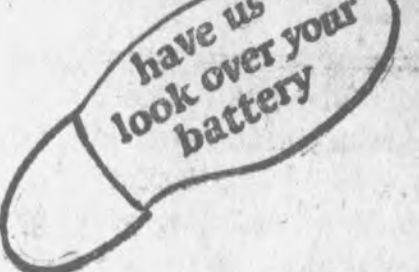

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WHAT IS A BOY?

The following definition of a boy contained in an article, the author of which is unknown, fully describes just what the boy is and means to our country and the world and it is fitting this should appear during this, National Boys Week, when the attention of the whole nation is centered upon the boys.

It ran something like this, "What is a Boy? He is a person who is going to carry on what you have started. He is to sit right where you are sitting and attend to those things you think are important when you are gone. You may adopt all the policies you please, but how they will be carried out depends upon him. Even if you make leagues and treaties, he will have to manage them. He is going to sit at your desk in the Senate and occupy your place on the Supreme Bench. He will assume control of your cities, states and nation. He is to move in and take over your prisons, churches, schools, universities and corporations. All your work is going to be judged and praised or condemned by him. Your reputation and your future are in his hands. All your work is for him and the fate of the nation and of humanity is in his

hands. So it might be well to pay him some attention."

MAKING GOOD CITIZENS

In a bulletin recently issued by the Bureau of Education of the Interior Department we read: "The United States is prosperous * * * but * * * only half of our eligible voters actually vote even at the presidential elections: five millions of our people over 10 years of age are illiterate; ten millions of our children of school age are not attending school; we spend more for tobacco, cosmetics, and chewing gum than we do for education; half of our young men were found physically unfit for unlimited military service; our wage earners lose wages amounting to over two billion dollars a year because of preventable sickness; in 1870 there was one divorce for every 18 marriages; last year there was one divorce for every eight marriages."

These are some of the problems confronting the state. It needs to help more of its people to become good citizens. The fewer the number of ill and privations of life, and the greater the happiness of humanity, the nearer we approach the social ideal. A progressive school is a miniature of society. Not only is its structure much the same but it carries on many of the same activities. It seeks to promote the welfare of the pupils through the best methods in use in society.

What are some of the school tasks confronting 730,000 teachers? The school should give every child an equal opportunity to develop fully his initiative and ability. It should assure to him healthful conditions for mind and body. It should imbue him with the principles of personal honesty and a strong sense of his obligations to his family, his community, and his nation. It should give him the education and training necessary to support himself and to bear his just share in maintaining a community with high American ideals. It should develop his capacity for the wholesome use of leisure time. It should inculcate a broad and understanding patriotism which insures our country's highest good.

shall be inspected, and if found to be free from disease, and otherwise sound, healthful, wholesome, and fit for human food, they shall be marked and branded with the official stamp, and admitted. If found to be diseased, unsound, unhealthy, unwholesome, or otherwise unfit for human food, they shall be marked condemned and disposed of as required by the U. S. Government order 156, Bureau of Animal Industry, or by the Board of Health.

Sec. 6. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation, except the meat inspectors herein provided for, and the Health officer, to have in possession, keep, or use any mark, stamp or brand provided or used for stamping, marking, or branding any article herein required to be stamped, marked, or branded, or to keep make or use any mark, stamp or brand having thereon a device or words similar in character or import to the marks, stamps, or brands provided or used for marking, stamping or branding such articles.

Sec. 7. No one shall kill and offer for food, animals affected with the following named diseases:

1. Anomalies of the blood, (anemia, leucemia, hemoglobinemia, icterus, uremia).
2. Poisoning from any mineral, drug or vegetable.
3. Parturient paresis (milk fever).
4. Animal parasitism, the parasite known to be directly or indirectly transmissible to man.
5. Putrid intoxication (septicemia).
6. Pyemia.
7. Septicemia.
8. Malignant edema.
9. Anthrax.
10. Foot and mouth disease.
11. Cowpox, sheep pox when animals show fever.
12. Rabies.
13. Glanders.
14. Tuberculosis.
15. Actinomycosis.
16. Contagious pleuropneumonia.
17. Hemorrhagic septicemia.
18. Diphtheria.
19. Dysentery.
20. Hog cholera.
21. Swine plague.
22. Chicken cholera.
23. Mycotic gastroenteritis.
24. Texas fever.
25. Tetanus.
26. Malignant epizootic head eczema.

27. Malignant tumors.
28. Puerperal fever.
29. Emaciation.
30. Advanced pregnancy.
31. Recent parturition (at least 15 days must have elapsed).
32. Overheated, feverish animals.
33. Exhausted (fatigued) animals should have 8 hours rest before being slaughtered).
34. Fractures, bruises, contusions (when fever present).
35. Advanced stages of mange.
36. Advanced stages of footrot.
37. Suppurative or gangrenous inflammation of the udder (when fever is present).
38. Wounds (when fever is present).
39. Any disease of the heart, lungs, liver, kidney, spleen, peritoneum, pleura, or any organ which would render the meat unfit for human food.
40. Animals less than 30 days old.
41. Animals wounded or killed by accident.

Section 8. All animals that have been fed on slaughterhouse refuse within six weeks of the time of slaughter, or animals that have been fed waste of any nature that might cause the carcasses of said animals to be unfit for food, shall not be offered for sale or sold. Male or female animals that are in such state at the time of slaughter that their carcasses shall have a strong or

Section 9. That all meats however described, slaughtered within the Town of Greenville or within one (1) mile thereof, whether for the purpose of delivery within the Town of Greenville or elsewhere, shall be subject to inspection and chargeable with the fees therefor, as set out and prescribed in this ordinance.

Section 10. That all meats delivered in the Town of Greenville, shall be properly wrapped or covered in clean cloth or paper, which shall remain on same from point of slaughter to point of delivery.

Section 11. That fees for the inspection of carcasses shall be collected by the meat inspector, at the time of inspection, and receipt issued for same. All fees shall be turned over by the meat inspector to the City Clerk, weekly. The fees charged for each carcass inspected shall be as follows:

Section 12. That all meats sold in the Town of Greenville shall conform to the regulations and requirements of the Bureau of Animal Industry, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The exception to this rule applies only to carcasses to which the head and all viscera, except the stomach, bladder and intestines, are held by the natural attachments. Such carcasses, if offered for admission into official establishments or markets,

That all meats however described, slaughtered within the Town of Greenville or within one (1) mile thereof, whether for the purpose of delivery within the Town of Greenville or elsewhere, shall be subject to inspection and chargeable with the fees therefor, as set out and prescribed in this ordinance.

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Section 12. That all meats sold in the Town of Greenville shall conform to the regulations and requirements of the Bureau of Animal Industry, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Sec. 13.—That all ordinances, or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 14. That any person, firm or corporation violating this ordinance, shall upon conviction thereof be fined fifty (\$50.00) dollars, or imprisoned for thirty (30) days.

Sec. 15. This ordinance shall be in effect on and after March 1, 1925. The foregoing is a true and correct copy of the Meat Ordinance passed by the Board of Aldermen of the Town of Greenville on the 3rd day of April, 1925.

Two telegraph companies in North Carolina operate over 3,963 miles of pole and cable line.

The North Carolina Sanatorium for the Treatment of Tuberculosis was established by the General Assembly of 1907. The initial appropriation was \$15,000 for construction and \$5,000 for maintenance. There are now 35 buildings at the Sanatorium, valued at \$752,000, and 2,000 acres of land, valued at \$100,048. The sanatorium has approximately 250 patients. There have been four presidents of the sanatorium, these being Dr. J. E. Brooks, Dr. M. E. Street, Dr. L. B. McPherson, and Dr. P. P. McCain, incumbent. A negro division has been created at an initial cost of \$100,000.

Treasurers Who Have Served North Carolina Since 1715

The office of treasurer in North Carolina originated in 1715, with the appointment of Edward Moseley. From 1740 to 1779 there were two districts in the State — a northern and a southern district. Each had a treasurer.

From 1779 to 1782 there were six districts, each with a treasurer, as follows: Edenton, Salisbury, Hillsboro, Halifax, New Bern and Wilmington.

In 1782 a seventh district was created, called Morgan.

Then, in 1784, the district system was abandoned altogether, and a treasurer for the State as a whole.
