BAR ASSOCIATION WILL HOLD ANNUAL MEET IN ASHEVILLE

Interesting Program Is Being Arranged for Three Days, July 1-3

Raleigh, April 28.—Henry M. London, secretary of the North Carolina Bar Association, today announced the program for the 1925 annual meeting of the Association, to be held at Asheville, July 1, 2 and 3. He said he expected this to be the most largely attended meeting in the history of the Association.

The Asheville gathering will be opened with prayer by the Rev. John H. Griffith, at 8:30 p. m., on July 1. There will be an address of welcome by Thomas A. Jones, of the Buncombe County Bar Association. The response will be made by R. Hunt Parker, of the Halifax County Bar Association. Reports will then be submitted.

On the morning of July 2 John D. Bellamy, of Wilmington, will deliver an address on "The Cape Fear Bar," after which J. H. Dillard is scheduled to speak on "The Judiciary." There will then be a brief memorial service for deceased members of the Association.

In the afternoon of July 2 George E. Butler will speak on the educational pre-requisites for admission to the bar, after which Louis M. Bourne will lead a discussion on the congested condition of court dockets in North Carolina. The jury system will then be discussed, this discussion to be led by Associate Justice L. R. Varas of the North Carolina Supreme Court.

Finis J. Garrett, of Tennessee, will speak in the evening at 8:30 on "The Proposed Amendment to Article Five of the Constitution of the United States."

Concluding sessions will be held on the morning of July 3. At this meeting officers will be elected and unfinished business taken up. There will be an automobile excursion to the summit of Mount Mitchell, the highest point east of the Rocky Mountains.

Searching for Girl and Former Convict Who Went Away Together

Grandville, Vt., April 28.—A score of searchers from Grandville and Hancock led by Deputy Sheriff Ford, pressed forward Northward today in quest of eleven-year-old Lucille Chatterton, and Earl Woodward, a former convict, with whom she disappeared from her home here last Friday. Following reports that the pair were seen on Braintree Hill night before last, and the discovery of a few foot prints bearing northward, the searchers pushed into Bull Run beyond the town of Braintree. Attorney General Archibald has ordered the capture of Woodward "dead or alive."

Ashton Delivers Address-Railroad Meeting Today

Chicago, April 28.—A person today is in far less danger speeding across the country at 60 miles an hour on a railway train than he is in crossing the street of any of the principal cities of the United States, declared Robert H. Ashton, President of the American Railway Association, in an address prepared for delivery at the annual meeting of the Safety Section of the organization here today. Although the railroads in 1924 transported 913,600,000 persons, nearly nine times the population of the United States, only 149 fatalities occurred, and the number of injured was 15 percent less than the average for the previous four years, and the smallest since 1901, he said.

Although the greatest traffic on record was handled in 1924, fewer employees lost their lives than in any year since records were forwarded.

ANNOUNCES REIMPOSITION DUTIES IMPORTED LUXURIES

London, April 28.—Winston Churchill, in his maiden budget laid before the House of Commons today, placed the British Empire on a gold basis and announced the reimposition of McKenna duties on imported luxuries.

ARMY AND NAVY MANEUVERS ENDED MONDAY AT NOON

Entire Engagement Marked by Intense Aerial Activities With Considerable Damage

Honolulu, April 28.—The grand fleet of the United States exemplified the activeness of the defense of the Island of Oahu, the key of the nation's defenses in the Pacific, when it delivered its main attack in the joint army and navy maneuvers, which ended at noon yesterday. The attack was preceded by a preparatory barrage by bombers of the Blue fleet, and subsequent landing, which was accompanied by heavy loss on both the blues. Landing parties were successful in that they occupied a considerable number of Black entrenched places. The weight of numbers were on the side of the blue forces, and the Black first line of defense fell back to previously prepared positions. Reinforcements, which had been pressed forward to that sector by the Black Commanding General, failed to repel the Blue attack. The entire engagement was marked by intense aerial activities on both sides, considerable damage and casualties being inflicted, on which no actual count has yet been made. The umpires are now considering the conflicting claim of high commands of both forces in an effort to ascertain who won the post war.

No Radical Changes Expected in Salaries By Sal., Wage Com.

Asheville, April 28.—No radical changes in the salaries of state employees are expected to be made by the Salary and Wage Commission recently named by Governor McLean, according to Matthew L. Shipman, former State Commissioner of Labor and Printing, who is here to attend a district meeting of the Odd Fellows. Mr. Shipman said he believed that few, if any, state employees are paid "fabulous salaries," but is of the opinion that the commissioners will recommend some changes. The discussion of these plans by Governor McLean has been predominant in Raleigh the past few days, Mr. Shipman said. He declared the cost of living in Raleigh is unusually high, "and that no state employees have easy jobs."

The former commissioner made it clear here today that he believed strongly in the policies of the new governor, and that Governor McLean has "taken steps in the direction of cutting corners here and there" and seeking "to eliminate dead timber, if any is found."

GREENVILLE-WASHINGTON RELAY RACE WILL TAKE PLACE ON WEDNESDAY

Athletic Event of Boys' Week Sponsored by Rotary Clubs May Be Annual Event; Nearly 200 Boys to Participate

The chief athletic event of National Boys Week in this section will take place tomorrow when the track teams of the Washington High School and the Greenville High School will compete for honors in a cross country relay race between this city and Washington. The event is being staged under the direction of the Boys' Work Committees of the Washington and Greenville Rotary Clubs and if successful will be made an annual event.

The runners of both teams will start at the court house here at 3 o'clock and each will carry a sealed message from the Mayor of Greenville addressed to the Mayor of Washington. They will follow the paved highway and at each quarter of a mile the message will be passed on to the next runner and so on over the distance of approximately twenty-three miles to the finish at the court house in Washington. More than ninety boys from each school will participate in the event and great interest in the outcome is being shown. The race has been under consideration for some weeks and the coaches of the two schools have been whipping their boys into shape for the event.

No doubt a large number of citizens from each of the towns will follow closely the progress of the race but it is to be hoped that they will follow rather than go ahead of the runners in order that the boys will have, so far as possible, a road free from traffic over which to run.

JAMES APPOINTED REPRESENT FIFTH DISTRICT JUDICIAL CONFERENCE

Mr. J. B. James, of this city, has been appointed by Governor McLean to represent the Fifth District, as a member of the Judicial Conference, which was advocated by the Governor and adopted by the 1925 General Assembly as a practical means of devising methods that will expedite the business of the courts.

The appointments are for two years and the conference is required to meet at least twice a year.

HUDSON IS FOUND DEAD ON SIDE OF ANNAPOLIS PIKE

Hilary L. Hudson, Former Secretary to Senator Overman Dies From Heart Failure

Washington, April 28.—Hilary L. Hudson, 56, attorney and former secretary of Senator Lee S. Overman, of North Carolina, was found dead on the side of the Annapolis Pike, 18 miles from Washington, last night. A certificate of death from natural causes was issued after the coronor's inquest today. Heart failure was said to have been the cause.

Mr. Hudson is survived by his wife, who is now in Shelby, N. C., and three sons all of Washington.

Six Negro Boys Arrested on Charge Of Larceny Mon.

Roy Little, Herbert Riddick, David Blount, Charles Johnson, William Riddick, and Julius Slaughter, negro boys, ranging from the ages 9 to 15 years, were arrested and placed in jail last night on a charge of larceny, and will be given a hearing in the Juvenile Court at an early date.

For the past several weeks a series of thefts have been reported from the Country Club. Several members reported that their lockers had been entered and articles missing. The negroes arrested have been serving as caddies at the Country Club.

H. B. Varner Dies From Pneumonia

Lexington, April 28.—H. V. Varner, for many years the publisher of the Lexington Dispatch and widely known as an operator of moving picture theatres and as a former Labor and Printing Commissioner, died in a hospital last night of pneumonia. He had been ill about two weeks. His funeral will be conducted at ten o'clock Wednesday morning from the First Presbyterian church by the pastor, Rev. J. R. McGregor.

THINKS CALLING WOMAN OF FLORIDA "FLAPPER," AGAINST STATE'S DIGNITY

Tallahassee, Florida, April 28.—Reference to any woman as a "flapper" in Florida would be considered against the dignity of the state, under a provision of a resolution introduced in the House today.

Speaking on the measure, its author, Representative Branch, stated that he was serious in the matter. "The women of Florida are about all we have to look forward to for decency," Mr. Branch said, "and I resent the reference to young women of Florida that they are like a house-painted in front, shingled in back, and empty in attic. I trust the measure will meet serious consideration."

WHITE MAN IS ARRESTED WHILE OPERATING STILL

Lester Latham, of Chi- cago Township Arrested and 75 Gallon Still Destroyed

Lester Latham, white man of Chicago township was arrested today and placed in the Pitt county jail on a charge of manufacturing and possessing whiskey.

Latham was arrested today by Deputy Sheriff Sam Whitehurst and Officers Manly Sellers and Gus Stokes, while operating a still in Chicago township. His accomplice succeeded in evading the officers and made his escape.

The still, a 75 gallons affair, was in full operation when the officers visited it. They destroyed 2000 gallons of beer and captured five gallons of whiskey.

Reorganization of Prohibition Unit Is Now in Prospect

Washington, April 28.—Reorganization of the prohibition unit is in prospect, as Assistant Secretary Andrews indicated today, as a result of the months study he has given the Bureau since he assumed office.

Secretary Andrews did not disclose the nature of changes to be made, but reiterated that Commissioner Haynes will remain in charge of enforcements for the present. There was every reason to predict satisfactory co-ordination between Mr. Haynes and his office, the Secretary declared.

The new Field Marshal of Prohibition, Decree, reports that he would be "hard boiled" in putting through the proposed reorganization. What was intended, he explained, was to give trusted workers encouragement and support, and to weed out crooks and others who are not functioning in law and order, and to "eliminate sentiment."

Miss Saunders to Be In Charge Art Dept. Lake Junaluska

Nashville, Tenn., April 28.—Miss L. Pearl Saunders, director of the School of Art and Applied Design, of Nashville, will again be in charge of the art department at Lake Junaluska, N. C., this year. Announcement to this effect was made today by J. Dale Stentz, manager of the Southern Methodist Assembly.

Miss Saunders is a member of the Southern States Art Association, the Artists' Guild of Chicago, the Nashville Art Association, the Independent Artists' Association, the National Association of Women Painters and Sculptors and the Art Alliance of America.

SEE NOTHING TO FEAR IN CHANGE GOV. OF GERMANY

From Economic Stand- point American Bank- ing Interests It Is Be- lieved Have Nothing to Fear in Change

Washington, April 28.—While there is an evident disposition among American, as well as British, and Italian observers, to regard developments of the next month or two before judging the import of the Hindenburg election in Germany, there is a more or less confirmed pessimism in French circles of the event. Among French views, however, it means an unmasking of German militarism ambitions to the German construction, and that rather than a victory for reactionary action, it is a blow to Communism in Germany.

As to apprehension from an economic standpoint, treasury offices believed the indication of a swing toward conservatism in Germany could hardly be viewed by American Banking Interests as anything to fear in supporting Germany's reconstruction movements. It is regarded as reaction in many members as only a temporary effect.

Miss Alexander Was Defeated in Race For Mayor Monday

Charlotte, April 28.—Julia M. Alexander, candidate for Governor in 1923, was decisively defeated in the city primary yesterday when she appeared before voters as candidate for Mayor. Mayor Harvey W. Moore polled 4,896 to 1191 for Miss Alexander. Two women running for a place on the school board also trailed behind three men candidates.

NATIONAL MUSEUM WILL DISPLAY PATENTS OF SCIENTIFIC WORTH

Washington.—The task of sorting out, from the 155,000 models in the custody of the patent office, those of historical and scientific interest has been delegated to a commission whose membership includes Thomas E. Robertson, commissioner of patents, and Charles D. Walcott, secretary of the Smithsonian Institution.

Congress recently appropriated \$10,000 to pay the commission's expenses. The work will consist largely of unpacking the models from some 2,500 wooden boxes in which they are stored, and choosing the scientifically and historically valuable.

These may be retained at the National Museum or the patent office, but the mass of them will likely be distributed to museums throughout the country that desire them, or sent to the original depositors or their heirs.

GOLD STANDARD WAS RESTORED IN ENGLAND TODAY

To Date From Today by a Special License to the Bank of England to Export Gold Bul- lion

London, April 28.—The gold standard in England will be restored today from today by a special license to the Bank of England to export gold bullion, it was announced by Winston Churchill, Chancellor of the exchequer, in the budget speech, in the House of Commons this afternoon. The bank's special license, Mr. Churchill said, would be operated from today, pending the formal lapsing on December 31, next, of the 1920 act prohibiting the export of gold bullion.

Mr. Churchill characterized the yield from internal revenue as "satisfactory." Excess profits and corporation profit taxes show a deficit of 9,000,000 pounds sterling, but these "were moribund" taxes, and were more than counterbalanced by the yield from income tax, super and death taxes, he said.

The interest on the British National debt, Churchill announced, has been reduced since 1920 by more than 70,000,000 pounds. It was most important, he said, that the policy of debts repayment should continue.

Mr. Churchill said he was making arrangements to obtain credit in the United States for not less than \$300,000,000 with possible expansion. The American Credit by an arrangement, he said, would only be used if, and when required, and he did not expect that it would be necessary to use them.

Advances One Cent Demand Sterling

New York, April 28.—Demand sterling advanced today to \$4.82, the highest price in 10 years and less than four cent under par, within fifteen minutes after the news of Great Britain's return to the Gold Standard had been received in New York.

Commissioner of Pardons, Busy Man

Raleigh, April 28.—With 300 cases stacked up in his office to be acted on and new ones coming in at the rate of from five to ten a day, Hoyle Sink, Commissioner of Pardons, is a busy man. He goes to his office at 9 o'clock each morning and tries to call it a day at 5 in the afternoon. But more often it is past 5 before he leaves.

"I just don't see how I would have gotten along without someone to help me in the matter of pardons," said Governor McLean. "Not only is Mr. Sink a very valuable and efficient man, but the work he is doing is a great relief to me."

Since the enactment of legislation increasing the power and duties of the State's Chief executive, the Governor has had his hands full. Numerous laws were passed by the 1925 General Assembly giving him additional work and responsibilities. While the appointment of a pardon commissioner did not take from him the final say as to the exercise of clemency, yet under the new system all details are turned over to Mr. Sink who works them out and presents his findings to the governor for his approval.

Commissioner Sink has a secretary and a private office. The secretary receives the petitioners in the waiting room and they are ushered in the order of their arrival.

One woman applying for a pardon for her husband was the mother of ten children, said Commissioner Sink and he cited numerous other instances where there were from five to eight children involved.

Mr. Sink said that he was bending every effort to pass upon as many cases as possible but that the task was a Herculean one and that it was impossible to pass on more than ten or fifteen a day.

Longest Arch Bridge Started

Sydney, Australia.—The foundation stone of a new Sydney harbor, which when completed will be the longest arch bridge in the world, was laid recently by R. T. Ball, the New South Wales Minister of Railways. It is expected that the bridge will take about five years to build.

NOTED GUN MAKERS DIRECT ENERGIES TO PATHWAYS OF PEACE

Essen, Germany. — Quantity production three years ago of battle-ship turrets and rapid-fire guns was a feature of the work here of the firm of Friedrich Krupp, once the symbol throughout the world of armament manufacture; today this organization is making artificial teeth and surgical instruments.

Swords, or their more hideous modern successors, the "Big Bertha" cannon, have literally been beaten into ploughshares. The Krupps now turn out agricultural machinery, railway engines, automobile trucks, merchant ships, steel bridges, and a thousand and one smaller things. Artificial teeth and surgical instruments are but two of the many minor articles manufactured in what was once the most formidable armament plant in the world.

A striking feature of the transformation is the fact that the change has come about without change of technical engineers or skilled workers. In fact one reason for turning into such activities as watch and clock making, moving picture manufacturing, and the construction of delicate mechanisms for optical and microscopical instruments was the consideration that a large staff of skilled workers and engineers used to be engaged in perfecting the delicate mechanisms of rapid-fire guns and the like. These men, after the war, were compelled to turn from inventing and constructing engines of death to devising machinery for the advancement of civilization. Thus new types of turbine engines are being evolved. Diesel motors are being improved upon, better processes of steel are being experimented with.

A word as to the magnitude of the Krupp plant at Essen: the area covered by the various buildings is almost 300 acres. The private railway which connects the various sections with each other travels nearly five miles from one end of the plant to the other. The largest of the buildings, that devoted to locomotive construction, covers an area of 800,000 square feet and has a frontage of 1,440 feet. The four hydraulic presses or compressing blocks of steel exert a pressure of 4,000 tons each. Some of the smelters employed for bringing high-grade steel to the melting point have a capacity up to 90 tons each.

The plant is equipped to employ 115,000 men. That was the figure reached during the peak of wartime production, and applies to Essen alone. If one adds other plants, at Kiel and in the Ruhr valley, the Krupps can furnish employment to 180,000 men.

As a matter of fact, however, only 28,000 workers are now on the payroll. The Krupps are going through the same readjustment which great numbers of American firms had to face when the war was over. Before the war they were doing a thriving business with 20,000 men employed. If they can get back to the pre-war footing, they will probably consider themselves lucky.

The impression made by the Krupp works today is a rather desolate one. Only in the department devoted to the construction of agricultural machinery does the place seem really busy. The railway locomotive construction department, for instance, is equipped to turn out one locomotive each working day, or about 300 a year. At present it has orders for only 20 German locomotives, and a small number of wood-burning engines intended for Brazil. Ship construction is at a low ebb, as the world generally is overstocked with ships.

As far as the agricultural machinery department is concerned, its present orders are largely of Russian origin. It will be remembered that in 1923 the Krupp concern signed an agreement with the Russian Soviet government by which 67,500 acres of rich soil in the Don region of Russia are to be cultivated under the auspices of the Krupps. The Krupps have undertaken to put into the venture all the most modern agricultural machinery necessary, and to develop the region into one vast model farm.

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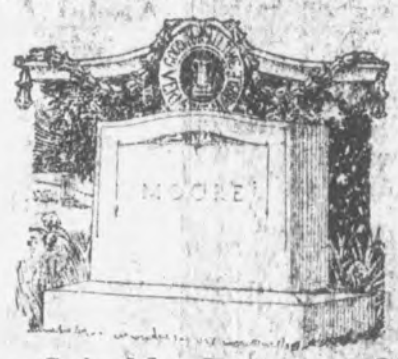

Water Supply Industry U. S. in Generally Sound, Healthy State

Louisville, Ky., April 28. — The water supply industry of the United States is in a generally sound and healthy condition, although it has not entirely recovered from losses encountered in the war period, asserted Leonard Metcalf, engineer of Boston, speaking today before the American Water Works association. He said the industry suffered a loss of approximately a quarter of a billion dollars during the war.

Rate increases have enabled water works to recover earning power to a point probably one-fifth above the pre-war basis, Mr. Metcalf declared, but the war loss probably would never be made good. He characterized it as the industry's contribution to the fighting in the world war.

"This earning power basis is far below the actual plane of costs and values, however, and the works have not been able to earn anything like the legal fair return upon the fair value of their properties," the speaker continued. "It gives point to the

fact that in times of serious crises the commissions can not give fair rate of return to such properties and therefore do not in fact remove the hazards of operation from them as has frequently been asserted." Mr. Metcalf said a general revision of water property values was essential to make them conform to general property values.

PRINTERS EVIDENCE CARE IN SELECTING YOUNG DEVILS

Indianapolis. — Haphazard selection of printers' devils, youths who are to become apprentice printers, is to be superseded by a scientific method of determining who shall take up the trade, according to James M. Lynch, president of the International Typographical Union.

Intelligence and psychiatric tests will be employed to determine candidates' fitness to take up the business, Mr. Lynch said. Educational requirements will not be severe, but the tests have been designed to determine the applicant's capacity for learning and his steadiness of

purpose. William Turnbull, a journeyman printer of Toronto, and chairman of the apprenticeship committee of the union, has worked out a method of examination for apprentices in collaboration with professors at the University of Toronto, President Lynch said. The international will consider its adoption.

New York, April 28.—The cotton market was steadier in today's early trading on reports that the first May notices were being stopped by trade interests with relatively steady Liverpool cables, and covering by recent sellers. The opening was steady at an advance of 2 to 12 points, and before the end of the first hour active months showed net gains of 11 to 16 points.

Bonded Warehouses

Experience Wonderful Growth Past 4 Years

Raleigh, April 28.—"The number of bonded warehouses under the United States Warehouse Act has experienced a remarkable growth within the past four years," said James P. Brown, in charge of administering this act in North Carolina, South Carolina and Virginia.

"In 1920," said Mr. Brown, "the capacity of warehouses licensed for the storage of cotton was 40,050 bales, grain, 136,000 bushels and tobacco none. The high water mark of the licensed storage capacity in 1924 for cotton was 2,800,000, for grain 38,000,000 bushels and for tobacco 590,000,000 pounds."

"These figures explained Mr. Brown, 'do not represent the amounts of products handled through the warehouses but simply the amounts that could be stored at any one time. Originally,' he said, 'the act provided only for the storage of cotton, grain, tobacco and wool. It has since been extended to provide for the storage of peanuts, late crop potatoes, broom corn, dry edible beans, dried fruit and syrups from cane and maple.'

Mr. Brown recently returned from a meeting in Washington, where he attended a conference of field and staff representatives of the United States Department of Agriculture who are engaged in administering the federal warehouse act. This conference was attended by those in charge of offices at Dallas, Tex., Atlanta, Ga.; Portland, Ore.; Colfax, N. C.

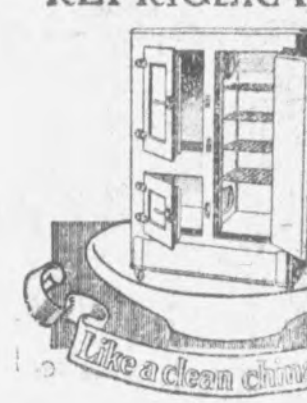
