GREENVILLE LOSER'S DECLARES BARLOW CROSSCOUNTRY RACE NEVER MADE GIFT TO THE MEMORIAL

High School Relay Teams Carry Letter 23 Miles in One Hour and Fifty Minutes

The track team of the Washington High School yesterday afternoon defeated the team of the Greenville High School in the first cross country relay race ever held in this section. The race started at the court house here and ended at the court house in Washington, distance of 23 miles. The Washington runner crossed the finish line exactly one hour and fifty minutes after the start and the Greenville runner finished three minutes later.

The number of runners in the race totaled 184 there being 92 on each team each runner covering a distance of one quarter of a mile.

The runners at the start and finish of the race were: Washington, starter, Gurkin; finish, Ed. Darden; Greenville, starter, Willis Whichard; finish, Bob Forbes.

Following delivery of a letter to each of the starters by Mayor D. M. Clark, of this city, with instructions that same should be delivered as early as possible to Mayor C. H. Sterling, of Washington, the crack of the pistol sounded at 3:40 and the two runners were off amid the cheers of hundreds who lined the streets through which they passed. Maintaining a lead of several yards, the Washington runner gained the lead which they steadily increased until a space of nearly a mile separated the runners. At the one mile mark the Greenville runner showed more speed gradually recovering a portion of the lost distance, but the end of the course was too near for full recovery and the Washington runner crossed the finish line three minutes ahead of his opponent delivering his letter to T. H. Meyers, President of the Washington Rotary Club, acting for Mayor C. H. Sterling.

To the hundreds who witnessed the finish of the race Mr. Meyers read the message delivered by the runners which was as follows:

Greenville, N. C., April 29, 1925.

Hon. C. H. Sterling, Mayor, Washington, North Carolina, Greetings:

The people of the City of Greenville, through me, their Mayor, extend to the people of the City of Washington, felicitations, with all good wishes for their continued prosperity and happiness.

Concurrent with our ambitions for Greenville, are our hopes and desires for a greater Washington, until the ultimate blending of our two fair cities into an indissoluble union, with but a single thought and ambition. Today we clasp hands across all that separates us and our Boy Scouts will carry to you this, our hearty greeting. May God ever bless and prosper you and the fair City of Washington.

The race created no little interest not only in the two towns contesting but also throughout the section through which it passed as at each relay post crowds had gathered to speed the runners on and when Washington was reached probably two hundred automobiles loaded to capacity were accompanying the runners and the streets of that city were lined with crowds who had gathered to witness the finish.

Yesterday's race was sponsored by the Boys' Work Committees of the Greenville and Washington Rotary Clubs and will become an annual event. The starting and finishing points of the race will alternate each year and next year's event will finish at the court house in Greenville.

Winters Says That Contribution or Subscription of \$100,000 Was Never Given to Stone Mountain Association

New York, April 30.—Rogers Winters of Atlanta, Georgia, Secretary of the Stone Mountain Association declared here today that no gift had been made to the association by Lester H. Barlow, of Cleveland, Ohio, who yesterday in a letter to Samuel Venable, one of the owners of the Stone Mountain, which was published in a Raleigh newspaper said he would withdraw a \$100,000 subscription unless Gutzon Borglum were reinstated as sculptor of the memorial.

Mr. Barlow has never made any subscription or contribution to the memorial, said Mr. Winters. "He has given nothing but a newspaper story some weeks ago, for which the association was not responsible to the effect that he intended to contribute \$100,000 of an alleged war claim against the government if, and when the Government paid the claim. Secretary of War, Weeks, has reported that there was no merit in Barlow's claim."

Mexican Gov. Suspends Import Duties on Corn for Period of 2 Months

Washington, April 30.—Import duties on American corn have been suspended by the Mexican Government for a period of two months beginning April 27. Consul Gen. Weddell at Mexico City reported today to state department that the duties had been suspended by Executive decree but no further details on the Government's action were given in the brief message. Officers, however, were inclined to believe that Mexico's corn crop had not produced the needed quantities of that product for internal requirements and consequently shortage had effected prices, causing increase to consumers. This relieves shortage, and at the same time reduces the level of prices. It is believed the government desired to let in American shipments for a while with duty exempted.

National Elimination Balloon Race Takes Place Tomorrow

St. Joseph, Mo., April 30.—Five balloons, piloted by veterans, will take the air here May 1 in the National Elimination Balloon race. The first bag will get away at 4:30 p. m. with the others taking to the sky at intervals.

On hand for the event will be all available army aircraft now at Scott Field, Belleville, Ill., sent on instructions of Major General Mason M. Patrick, chief of the air service. Airplane races and parachute leaps will be staged, and for the first time there will be a public demonstration of the feat of hooking an airplane to a dirigible in flight.

Major General Patrick is expected to reach St. Joseph tomorrow. He will arrive with Godfrey L. Cabot of Washington, president of the National Aeronautic Association, who has called a meeting of the board of governors of the association for the day before the race.

Rosecrans Municipal flying field, where the race will be held, has been placed in condition for the event under the direction of Carl L. Wolfley, manager of the race, and governor-at-large of the aeronautic association. Officers of the army air service who were detailed to inspect the field reported upon it favorably.

Yawl Capsizes Off Cape Henry Today

Norfolk, April 30.—A 20 foot yawl in which apprentice Pilots Thomas B. Cullison, and Kenneth Broadbent of Maryland Pilots Association were coming ashore from the Pilot's boat Maryland, capsized off Cape Henry today. Cullison's body was washed ashore and physicians were trying to resuscitate him.

SEARCHING FOR NEW CLUES IN MYSTERY DEATH YOUNG GIRL

Possible Identification of Victim May Depend on Finding Arm

Gary, Ind., April 30.—Hope of solving the mystery death of a girl, whose mangled and burned body was found Sunday near here, was waning today as authorities searched for new clues and followed out clues now obtained. The upper half of a woman's file stocking and a burned bit of paper bearing the name of Henry Schmidt was found late yesterday by a police dog, which on Tuesday found a partly burned shoe and lead the searchers to a hidden pool.

Plans to drain the pool in an effort to find the missing legs and arms of the girl have been abandoned in favor of dragging it. Possible identification of the victim as Mrs. Gertrude Thompson, 27, missing Gary shop girl, may depend on finding the missing arms. Mrs. Thompson had a finger amputated from one hand.

Believe They Save Prisoner From An Attempt at Suicide

Ossining, N. Y., April 30.—John Farina, who is to be electrocuted tonight with Joseph and Morris Diamond, brothers, for the murder of two Brooklyn bank messengers in 1923, was prevented from an attempt at suicide, Sing Sing authorities believe, when the keeper today took from him the sharpened handle of a tooth brush, which he had concealed in a piece of quilt.

BRITISH WOMEN SOUGHT FOR AGRICULTURAL WORK

London.—A back to the land movement designed to stimulate interest among girls and women in agricultural pursuits has been launched late by the Women's Farm and Garden Association of which the king's sister, Princess Louise, Duchess of Argyll, is president. Despite approximately a million men being listed among the unemployed in the city districts, there are times, especially in the spring and summer when farm work is at its height, when farmers have great difficulty in finding sufficient hands to reap their crops, and there have been recent proposals that the Women's Farm and Garden Association try to help them out during the busy season in the country.

The organization already has been furnishing some women to the farmers, particularly from their list of skilled woman land workers, but the movement now is planned to supply agriculturists with feminine workers who are willing to pick small fruit, help out in the milking, attend to the horses and pigs, and do the numerous other chores about a farm which are often the bane of the men workers.

The demand for skilled or educated women farm workers has been so great lately that the association has frequently been unable to supply the demand.

GOV. EMPLOYEES OF DISTRICT COLUMBIA WILL BE VACCINATED

Requested by Public Health Department to Submit to Vaccination Against Smallpox

Washington, April 30.—All government employees of the District of Columbia, have been requested by Public Health Department to submit to a vaccination against smallpox, and there were indications today that President Coolidge was among the first to comply with the request. As the result of the order by Sergeant General Cummings, department heads today sent circular instructions to all employees advising them that vaccinations should be accomplished at the earliest possible moment. Orders affect approximately 65,000 persons.

Public Health Service have arranged to send surgeons to the various departments of the state that the administration of vaccine can be accomplished with the least interference with the government's business. In the Veterans Bureau where several thousands were crowded together daily, vaccination began several days ago when it was discovered that a woman clerk had continued to come to work after being exposed to smallpox.

While the White House officials declined to discuss the reported vaccination of the President, it was pointed out that he receives and shakes hands daily with several hundred people and occasionally attends public gatherings here. The President had a number of engagements today, but was late in appearing at his office, and cancelled plans to attend the base ball game this afternoon.

There have been 19 deaths here from smallpox since January 1, out of 54 cases reported. Two of the deaths occurred yesterday.

Dr. Cummings considers the disease to be in a violent form.

M. L. Wright Made Executive Secretary of Teachers College

M. L. Wright, Supt. of Education in Carteret County has been made Executive Secretary of East Carolina Teachers College. Mr. Wright is a well equipped school man, thoroughly conversant with public school conditions and needs in North Carolina, and comes to the Teachers College with the best wishes of his many friends in the state.

MAN AND GIRL BELIEVED TO BE WOODWARD AND LUCILLE CHATTERTON LOCATED

Grandville, April 30.—A man and a girl believed to be Earl Woodward and Lucille Chatterton, abducted from her father's farm here last Friday, were located today in East Brookfield, by one of the party of searchers. Both died when searchers opened fire on the man.

OFFICES RECEIVING PRES. ATTENTION

Acceptance of Solicitor General Beck's Resignation Expected at An Early Date; Re-appointments to be Considered

Washington, April 30.—Acceptance by President Coolidge of the resignation of Solicitor General Beck is expected to take effect at an early date as another prospective vacancy to four others already existing in important offices, which are receiving the president's attention. In addition, the executive also will be called upon soon to consider some re-appointments in the administration.

Acceptance of Mr. Beck's resignation, definite and formal announcement of which is expected in the very near future, had been delayed by the president since it was submitted at the beginning of the new administration. In March, in order to give him opportunity to decide on a successor, Mr. Beck expects to leave on a trip to Europe in May. Other vacancies now existing and to which appointments are expected shortly are on the Tariff Commission, and offices of Assistant Secretary of State and Assistant Secretary of Labor. A vacancy also exists on the International Joint Commission.

HOLLOW MOUNDS AROUSE INTEREST OF SCIENTISTS

Anderson, S. C.—Archaeologists from several colleges in this state are to join an expedition being organized here for the purpose of exploring the great mounds on the Tugaloo and Seneca rivers, near here, which are said to have been built by a race that antedated the red men.

Some of the mounds, especially those along the Tugaloo river, are so large that they cover approximately three acres and are, about 100 feet high.

Following an examination of several of the mounds Andrew Todd, of this city, expressed the opinion that their interiors are hollow and contain relics of an ancient race that only await the explorer's pick to bring them to light.

A large mound near Calhoun Falls was demolished during the floods of 1908, revealing a number of pieces of pottery and other evidences of a past civilization.

Hindenburg Formally Accepts His Election German Presidency

Berlin, April 30.—Field Marshal Von Hindenburg, today formally accepted his election to the German Presidency.

BUCHANAN BIBLE BILL WAS VETOED BY DONAHAY TODAY

Declares it Opposed the Principals of Civil and Religious Liberty That Inspired the Founding of America

Columbus, Ohio, April 30.—The Buchanan Bible Bill passed by the recent session of the Ohio General Assembly to make daily reading of the Bible in all public schools of Ohio compulsory, was vetoed today by Governor Donahay because it opposed the principals of civil and religious liberty, which have made our government a model for the world.

Contrary to expectation, the governor did not make any comment on the action of various factions in legislation which supported or opposed the bill. The bill was actively supported by the K. K. K. men of both branches of the Assembly. In considering the bill, the veto message said: "Let us remember it was the hope and desire for religious freedom that inspired the settling and founding of America."

"The Assembly seeks to compel the state to teach religion to all the school children without regard to the teaching received at their mother's knees. It is my belief that religious teachings in our homes, Sunday Schools, and churches, by the good fathers and mothers, and masters, of Ohio, is far preferable to compulsory teachings of religion by the state."

Collecting Minerals For Display at the Southern Exposition

Raleigh, April 30.—At the request and in co-operation with the Asheville Chamber of Commerce, Dr. Jasper L. Stuckey, geologist of the State Department of Conservation and Development, is in Western North Carolina aiding in the collection of an exhibit of representative minerals for display at the Southern Exposition, to be held in New York the last two weeks of May. Emphasis will be placed on minerals which are either now in commercial production or which promise to support new industry.

While in Asheville, Dr. Stuckey will meet and confer with members of the National Geographic Society of Chicago, who are making a field trip in the mountain region. He will also confer with Major Harold C. Fiske, U. S. A. in connection with an inspection of the proposed great reservoir on the French Broad River, which is a feature of the survey now being made of the Tennessee Basin by Army Engineering Corps, with relation to the suitability of the geological formations for the proposed dam.

COAL MINERS SEEK PROFITS WHERE MINE OWNERS FAILED

Raibon, Wales.—Trade union and industrial circles of England are watching with interest a new adventure in coal mining in the case of the Vauxhall Colliery, at Raibon, which has been taken over and is to be operated by the managers and 700 men entirely independent of the owners.

The men decided to take over the business when it was announced recently that the plant was to be closed because the owners had been losing heavily financially for many months. The experiment will continue for three months.

LEEDS WILL ATTEMPT TO RUN CIVIC THEATRE. ON COLLECTIONS

Leeds, Eng.—A theatre devoted to the "production of intelligent drama" is to be run here and no charges of admission will be made. It is to be called the Leeds Civic Theatre, and many leading citizens have promised their support. The expenses will be met, it is hoped, by collections to be taken at each performance.

It is the contention of the promoters that performances of "little theatres" on a subscription basis, or with necessarily restricted audiences are in danger of becoming unrepresentative in character.

Five productions will be given at the Civic Theatre during the winter months and it is hoped to get 5,000 people to attend each of them.

MISS M'SWEENEY'S PRESENCE HERE IS BEING INVESTIGATED

Entered This Country Without a Passport; Says Her Answer Will Be a "Hunger Strike" if Arrested

Chicago, April 30.—Miss McSweeney, sister of Terrence McSweeney, Irish Hunger Striker, entered this country without a passport, and has no intention of ever getting any, she said here before leaving for Minneapolis to speak today.

A hunger strike would be her answer to the arrest in connection with investigation of her entry into the United States, she said. The investigation was started by the Labor Department in Washington, and Miss McSweeney was questioned by officials here yesterday.

"They asked me if I had a passport," Miss McSweeney said. "I said I had none and was not aware that I needed any. They next wanted to know the ship I came over on, and when."

"I told them that I could not see that that concerned the United States Government. I will be able to satisfy the United States authorities if necessary, that I did not come over the border."

Washington, April 30.—The next step of the Labor Department officials is investigating the presence in this country of Miss Mary McSweeney, Irish Republican worker, apparently is being today on the report of investigation officials, at Chicago, who questioned her yesterday concerning her passport.

The Labor Department authorized the inspection in Chicago of Miss McSweeney's pass papers after the matter of her presence in this country had been made the subject of inquiry at the State Department on behalf of Irish Free State Government. Prior to the forwarding of report by the immigration authorities here said that in the event Miss McSweeney's had entered the country without proper inspection, her presence was illegal and she might be deported.

Believes McMillan Polar Expedition Has Chance Success

New York, April 30.—Walter Wellman, former Arctic explorer, and the first air navigator to attempt to cross the Atlantic in a dirigible has declared that he believes the McMillan Polar Expedition this summer, which will be accompanied by three naval planes, has a good chance for success. He does not believe, however, that a dirigible would be able to reach the pole, nor does he believe that the Los Angeles or the Shenandoah could be used effectively there in rescue work, should rescue be necessary.

Secretary of the Navy, Wilbur, has announced that the dirigible would be utilized as a rescue craft in case any mishap should befall the party.

"A dirigible would not have one chance in a thousand of rescuing anybody from the Polar section," Mr. Wellman said. "She would be lucky to get back herself." Besides being unable to aid stranded explorers, because of the impossibility of landing without a big ground crew, Mr. Wellman pointed out, there would be grave danger of the Los Angeles becoming narrowed and wrecked through the loss of her buoyancy. He asserted that such a loss might mean disaster for any air ship whose buoyancy is dependent on gas, which is affected by sudden changes in the temperature. He asserted that the air above the ice fields sometimes changes from 70 to 75 degrees to the freezing point in less than an hour, and that a drop would mean disaster to any dirigible dependent upon gas.

Testifies That He Has Been Offered Bribe By Shepherd's Atty.

Chicago, April 30.—Earl P. Clark, testified today in the resumed inquest into the death of William N. McClintock, that he had been offered a \$5,000 bribe by an attorney for William S. Shepherd, under an indictment charged with the murder of McClintock by typhoid inoculation, to sign an affidavit, which Clark said he had never seen.

The United States has been a leader in many movements but none gives promise of greater benefit for mankind in ages to come than the proposed Walter Hines Page School of International Relations to be founded at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, Md.

It is the belief of public spirited citizens and the Board of Trustees of the Endowment Fund to be raised for the establishment of this school that only by such practical steps

to include the practical study of facts relating to the problems of various nations can future international misunderstandings be averted.

Young men are to be trained at this school to study such problems and to arrive at methods for settling them by reason rather than by the sword. A million dollars is necessary as an endowment to establish this most important branch of study and provide proper instructors to begin this work.

It is the desire of the Trustees to raise this money not from a few persons who could well afford to give it, but from thousands of people in order that representative citizens in every part of this nation may take a moral as well as a financial interest in the movement.

What a grand thing it would be if a million Americans sent \$1 apiece to Owen D. Young, President of the Board of Trustees of the Endowment Fund at 120 Broadway, New York City! How much more inspiring it would be if 10 million Americans sent 10c apiece as an expression of their desire to help in the establishment of a scientific course of study the purpose of which is to create a science of peace rather than a science of war.

This whole movement is voluntary. The time to act is now.

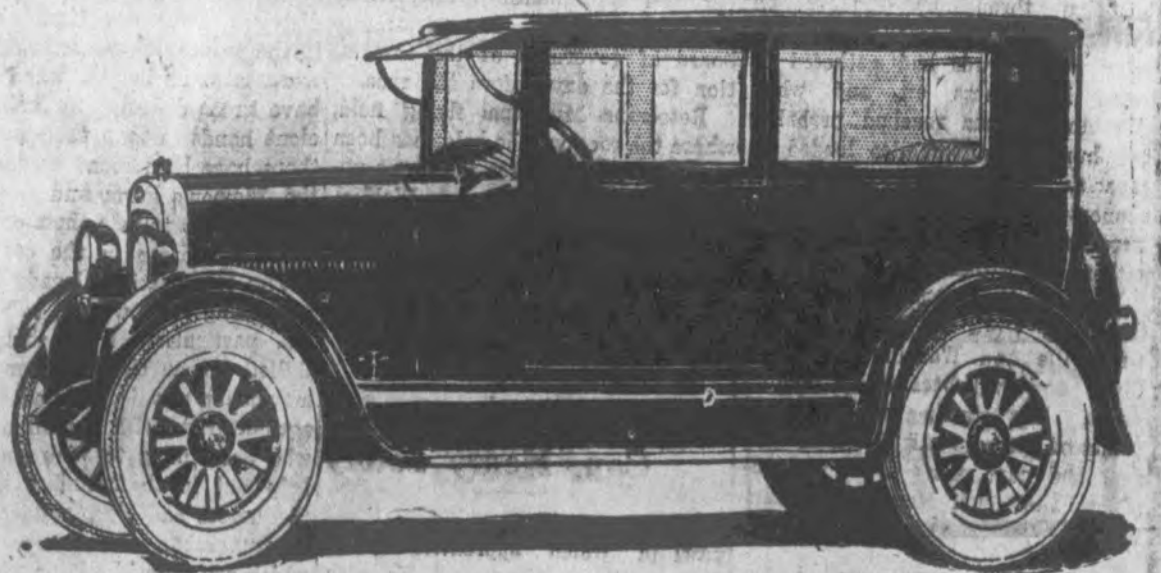
