CONTRACT EASTERN OBSERVANCE CRUISE CAR. EXPOSITION TO RUM ROW REVEALS BE LET JUNE FIFTH ONLY TWELVE SHIPS

Bids for the Fourth Show Must Be in by June 4, at 6 p. m.; Program to Open on April 4, 1926

The Executive committee of the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce decided in session yesterday, to let the contract for the 1926 Eastern Carolina Exposition, at its regular monthly meeting, Friday June 5th. The rules and regulations governing the Fourth Show are being mailed out by the Secretary now, and all bids must be in by June 4th at 6 p. m.

The committee decided to make the program for the 1926 exposition the best of any of the others. It will be different in many ways from either of the other three already had, according to announcement made recently by the officials. The program will open on Monday, April 4th and run through Friday night of that week. There will be so Saturday program. The intimation is now that all local talent, except the "Queen" and the style show will be eliminated from the 1926 program and in their stead a high class "professional" entertainment, above the ordinary. The President and Secretary were authorized to make a selection of talent and report at meeting in June. The kind of talent we want to be signed up right away, or we will not get them" said Secretary Bartlett while discussing the program recently. The announcement of the full program will be awaited with much interest by the hundreds of Exposition friends from all over Eastern Carolina.

ITALIAN STEAMER SENDS OUT S. O. S.

Norfolk, May 16.—A radio call for assistance at 8:45 o'clock this morning from the Italian steamer, Adige, anchored in Hampton Rhodes, said an explosion aboard the vessel was followed by fire.

Norfolk, May 16.—Two sailors were injured, one critically in an explosion today aboard the Italian steamer, Adige, anchored off Cecil Point. Both were brought to the Public Health Service Hospital where physicians have spared of the life of one. The explosion thought to have been caused by an accumulation of gas in the bunkers, which was followed by a fire which was extinguished by the assistance of the Coast Guard Cutter Caryabassette, the Norfolk Fire Boat.

The explosion is believed to have followed the opening of the bunker by the two injured members of the Adige's crew. The men were badly burned. They were brought to the Naval Base Hospital here by a pilot boat that was passing the Adige when the explosion occurred and later were transferred to the Health Service Hospital. The extent of damage to the ship has not been determined.

Declares Caswell Training School Will Continue to Function

Raleigh, May 16.—"There is no basis whatever for the report that there will be any neglect of the inmates of the Caswell Training School, or that any of the inmates will be 'turned out,'" declared Governor McLean today. "The institution will continue to function and its needs will be taken care of. It has an entirely new board, the members of which informed me that they see no reason why the school should not go ahead on the appropriation allowed it. There have been some internal differences, but these will be straightened out. In fact, they have just about been straightened out."

The governor stated that "no emergency exists," and that question is not one to be considered at the present time. He stated further that he had no idea but that the school would continue to function to the best interest of all affected by it, and that he saw no reason for any alarm, or any reports that it might become necessary to dislodge any inmates who are being cared for there.

Only Twelve Rum Carrying Ships Found in Area Where More Than 80 Were Anchored

New York, May 16.—A semi-official observance cruise of the Atlantic from Narragansett Pier, Rhode Island, to Atlantic City, N. J., which ended today, revealed only twelve rum carrying ships in that area, which provided anchorage for more than 80 rum vessels at the time that the coast guard blockade was inaugurated on May 5th.

It was further indicated on the cruise, which took a party of newspaper correspondents to points between 80 and 40 miles from shore, that virtually no contraband liquor is being smuggled into the country from this area.

As a result of the inspection, Lieutenant Commander Stephen S. Yeandle, chief aid to Rear Admiral Frank C. Billard, Coast Commandant, announced that he considered the rum blockade in this area entirely successful. Only 12 rum carriers were seen by the newspaper men. These were anchored at widely separated berths, and each vessel was closely guarded by various types of Coast Guard Craft, which literally ringed them, keeping them absolutely cut off from the shore. An investigation of the inlets of Long Island Coast, revealed one or more government boats lurking in each waterway, that could possibly provide an entry way for shore running boats.

GEN. NELSON MILES DIED YESTERDAY

Was Noted as Indian Fighter, Diplomat and Author; Died While Attending Circus

Washington, May 16.—Nelson A. Miles, 88, retired Lieutenant General of the army has reached the last bivouac of the soldier. He passed on yesterday to meet again the Indian braves who were his principal foemen in other days.

Noted as an Indian fighter, Diplomat and Author, General Miles died suddenly while seated at a circus here awaiting the opening pageant. Apparently in his usual robust health, the General collapsed into the arms of a physician seated behind him, only a few moments after he had complained that he felt ill.

Few of the spectators, who included Mrs. Coolidge, were aware of the identity of the man as he was carried away beneath the rows of seats. The body was hurried to a hospital where it was disclosed that death was due to Myocarditis, an acute dilation of the heart.

It is expected that a mausoleum, built under the direction of General Miles in Arlington, near the Lee Mansion, will be the body's resting place. The General's wife is buried there. Funeral arrangements have not been completed.

May Issue Statement Fixing Allotments During Next Week

Raleigh, May 16.—Following a conference with Richard A. Douglass, Commissioner of Revenue, today Governor McLean stated that he hoped to be in a position to issue a statement the first of next week fixing basis for allotments to State Departments and institutions for the next fiscal year. "I am now waiting to get all estimates in," said the governor, "after which I shall proceed." He added that whatever basis were adopted would be subject to increases should state finances justify them.

Movies Divert Air Passengers.
London.—In the future airplane passengers who become bored while flying may be able to take in a movie during the voyage. One of the large Paris-London air expresses was recently equipped with a movie picture projector, and, during a trial flight, a film was flashed on a screen inside the cabin, with 12 passengers as spectators.

NOELL APPOINTED SERVICE OFFICER

Paul H. Noell to Join Force of the Department of Labor and Printing

Raleigh, May 16.—Paul H. Noell, of Lexington, will join the force of the department of labor and Printing as survey officer. In this capacity he will be empowered to aid ex-service men at the filing of their applications for compensation from the Federal Government.

The official appointment of Mr. Noell to the position was announced last night by Frank D. Grist, Commissioner, of the Department. Mr. Noell is now state adjutant of the American Legion. Mr. Grist, in making the appointment public, stated that he felt the work outlined for the new officer was important enough to justify curtailment of other work of his department, so that the additional salary of \$3,900 for Mr. Noell might be provided without any extra appropriation.

DIPLOMATS WILL DISCUSS FRENCH DEBT SETTLEMENT

Important Question to Be Divided Into "Political" and "Commercial" Debts

Paris, May 16.—The part of the diplomats, in the settlement of the French debt to the United States, will be mostly a discussion of what are called her "political debts" as distinguished from borrowing catalogued as "commercial debts," it was said today in official circles.

Frequent references have been made lately to the fact that the accounts between France and the United States have never been audited, and that it is necessary to go over them and ascertain the exact amount France really owes.

Despite the tendency shown lately in official circles to recognize the total borrowing for which French receipts have been given as the total amount absolutely due, there remains a lingering idea that the money borrowed by France from the United States before the Armistice, was a sort of political aid by America, while the amounts advanced by Washington after the Armistice must be considered as commercial debts. Some ideas still exist that the former may yet be subject to discussion.

Foreign Minister Briand is expected to deal with the "political debts" phase of the question, while Finance Minister Caillaux, who is obliged to find the money, will take direct charge of negotiations regarding the terms of the payments.

OFFER SERVICES DEFENSE COUNSEL FOR PROF. SCOPE

Darrow and Malone Offer Services When They Learn That William J. Bryan is to Aid Prosecution

New York, May 16.—Clarence Darrow, of Chicago, and Dudley Field Malone, of New York, today telegraphed Judge John Randolph Neal, at Knoxville, Tenn., offering their services as defense counsel for Prof. Scope, who is to be tried for teaching evolution in violation of the Tennessee law. The action was prompted, Mr. Malone said, by the offer of William J. Bryan to aid the prosecution.

The telegram made public by Mr. Malone follows: "We are certain you need no assistance in your defense for Professor Scope, who is to be prosecuted for teaching evolution, but we have read the report that William Jennings Bryan has volunteered to aid the prosecution."

"In view of the fact that scientists are so much interested in the pursuit of knowledge that they can not make the money that lecturers and Florida Real Estate Agents command in case you should need us, we are willing, without fees or expenses, to help the defense of Professor Scope in any way you may suggest or direct."

Bodies of Two of Victims of Norman Recovered Today

Memphis, Tenn., May 16.—Bodies of two men, victims of the capsizing of the United States steamer, M. E. Norman, at Cuthoma Landing, Miss., 8 days ago today were taken from the Mississippi River several miles below the scene of the disaster, says a wireless message received here.

SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION WILL MEET IN HOUSTON

1926 Sessions to Be Held in Texas City Beginning Wednesday After Second Sunday in May

Memphis, Tenn., May 16.—The Southern Baptist Convention today voted to meet in 1926 in Houston, Texas. The Reverend Fred F. Brown, of Knoxville, Tenn., was chosen to preach the convention sermon with Reverend George W. Clark, of Lake Charles, Louisiana, as his alternate.

The time of the convention will be Wednesday after the second Sunday in May. The convention will complete its business today, leaders said, and will adjourn after religious services tomorrow.

DEBT SETTLEMENT IN PROGRESS WITH FIVE COUNTRIES

United States Advises Five Governments That Early Solution of Question is Desired

Washington, May 16.—Debt settlement negotiations are in progress not only with France, but with Italy, Belgium, Czechoslovakia, and Rumania.

The American debt funding commission has advised all five governments that the United States would like to bring the debt question to a solution promptly.

Mr. Henry Hardee, 74, died this morning at 2 o'clock at his home near Simpson. Services will be conducted from his late home Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock by Elder Jim Corbett and Luther Joyner, with interment following in the family burying ground.

Mr. Hardee was one of Pitt county's best known farmers and was held in high esteem by a host of friends. He will be greatly missed throughout his community.

The deceased is survived by his wife and one brother, Mr. Richard Hardee.

Large Crowds Witness \$52,000 Kentucky Derby

Louisville, Ky., May 16.—Thousands of souls with but a single thought—to witness the Titanic struggles between the outstanding three year old kings of the American Turf, descended upon Louisville today for the 51st running of the \$50,000 Kentucky Derby. As soon as the gates of the Churchill Downs course were thrown open, the turn styles started clicking like the second hands on a watch, giving indications that a record breaking attendance of 80,000 to 100,000 spectators would witness the struggle of speed, stamina breeding and fitness of the nation's best thoroughbreds.

Twenty four colts and one gelding were named to face the start, but it seemed certain early today that the field would be narrowed down to possibly 20 and perhaps less, depending on the track and weather conditions. The race, the fifth on program, is scheduled for 4:50 P. M., Central Standard time.

Refuses to Sign Death Warrants Men Guilty Bombing Cathedral

Cienfuegos, May 16.—The Sofia correspondent of the Allgemeine Zeitung telegraphed his newspaper that it is doubtful whether the men sentenced to death for the Sveti Kral Cathedral bombing will actually be executed. This dispatch points out that King Boris has always resolutely refused to sign death warrants, and that the Bulgarian Government would hesitate to apply the death penalty without his confirmation.

BRITAIN'S TRADE PROSPECTS PAINTED IN DISMAL COLORS

London.—A gloomy view of Britain's trade outlook was expressed by Sir Robert Horne at a recent dinner of the British Overseas Banks Association. He said he had just come back from a journey abroad, which had taken some months, and he was of the opinion "that we are in a worse position today than we were six months ago, and that was bad enough. If we look at the staple trades of the country we cannot help having a feeling of anxiety and apprehension as to the future."

Sir Robert referred to the state of the shipbuilding, coal, heavy steel, woolen and cotton trades, and said it was his deliberate belief that every section of society had to combine to find some solution of the problem, otherwise there was no hope for the country.

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NEED FOR REFORESTATION

In the rush to occupy and use the American continent our citizens have assumed that all land topographically suitable could and would be used for agriculture. Experience has now demonstrated that hundreds of millions of acres of cut-over-forest land are not usable except for tree crops. Scores of thousands of forest-land farms have been abandoned. Such regions have reverted to virtual deserts or scrubby wildernesses. Re-

storation of their forests will revive many dead towns and bring back industrial populations that migrated with the old lumber mills. Some kinds of agriculture can well be carried on in association with permanent forest industries, but not without them. After a hundred years of settlement some of the forested states have much less than half their area in farm land. As a rule the rest ought to be growing trees.

The coast guard service is starting a major offensive against rum traffic on the coast, the fleet comprising 50 vessels. The bootlegger business is a disgrace to the country and the greatest enemy of respect for law. Even those good people who are opposed to prohibition should recognize the fact that when a law is flagrantly violated from one end of the land to another without quail of conscience it has a strong tendency to break down respect for other laws that they do approve of. The important question now is, not whether one favors prohibition, but whether or not the laws of the land are to be obeyed. If a citizen can pick and choose those laws that suit him and ignore the others, large numbers will be disobeying various laws all the time and many of the laws will break down entirely. A citizen should respect the few particular laws that irk him for the good of the many necessary to his safety and happiness. —Masonic Journal.

BUENOS AIRES WRESTLES WITH TRAFFIC PROBLEMS

Buenos Aires.—The city authorities of Buenos Aires, whose population is approaching the 2,000,000 mark, are faced with a transportation and traffic problem that is ever growing more serious. The city possesses over 520 miles of surface and subway lines, the former carrying 600,000,000 passengers annually and the subway 60,000,000, but these are insufficient to handle the daily passenger movement without overcrowding, delay and congestion. Additional subways linking up distant separated railway terminals with motorbus feeder lines are the necessary solution of the problem, transportation authorities say, but although the company operating the present subway presented a proposition to the city some three years ago to construct a new one, inability to agree on terms has so far prevented its being started. Many motorbuses have been in operation during the last year, but have eased the transportation facilities of the city only to a slight extent. Indeed, traffic congestion is

increased largely by their use, together with the increasing numbers of automobiles.

Streets in the business section of the city are restricted to one way traffic, but even so vehicles in them move at a snail's pace during the busy hours.

TASTE IN COLORS CALLED CRITERION OF CIVILIZATION

Denver, Colo., Prof. Thomas Russell Garth, of the department of education in the University of Denver, declares that preferences in colors denote types of civilization and orders of intelligence. He pointed to a recent test made by the University of Texas, which found that white children cared most for blue and evinced a particular distaste for yellow. "The more white people are educated," said Prof. Garth, "the less they esteem red. In fact, they suppress all colors except blue as they become more educated." A previous examination of 1,000 Indians showed that red was their favorite color. They dislike yellow, avoiding its use whenever possible.

One thousand Chinese children, given the same test, displayed the white children's preference for blue.

Prof. Garth is planning an expedition to a number of Indian reservations to continue his study of color preferences.

Total benefits in the sum of \$126,981.25 were paid to these aged preachers and others during the year just closed, it was shown, while \$10,103.58 was paid to members of the annuity department of the board who either became totally disabled during the year, or reached the age of 65, at which time the annuity benefits become available.

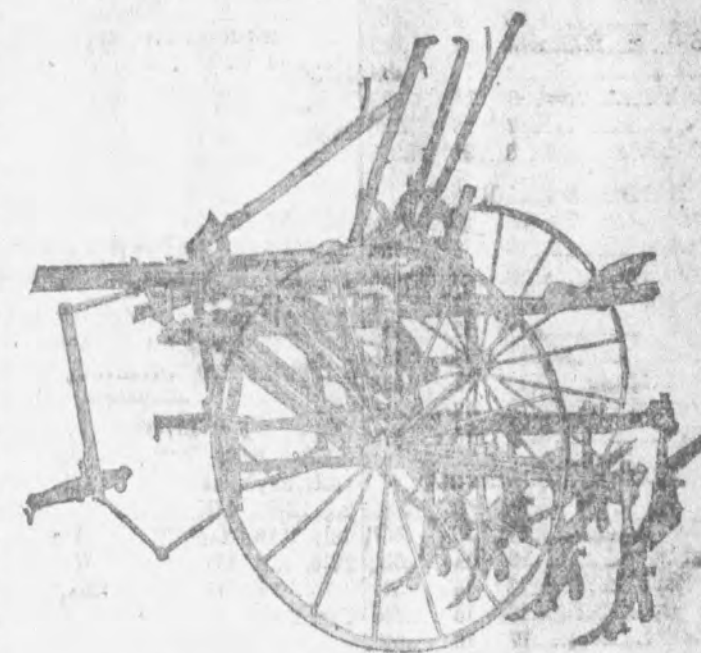

The progress of the new crop will continue to influence sentiment and while a record advance seems almost assured, it is well to remember that prospects at this time of the year have been proven misleading.
