Billard, Coast Commandant, announced that he considered the rum blockode in this area entirely successful. Only 12 rum carriers were seen by the newspaper men. These were anchored at widely separated berths, and each vessel was closely guarded by various types of Coast Guard Craft, which literally ringed them, keeping them absolutely cut off from the shore. An investigation of the inlets of Long Island Coast, revealed one or more government boats lurking in each waterway that could possibly provide an entry way for shore running boats.

Denver, Colo., Prof. Thomas Russel Garth, of the department of education in the University of Denver, leclares that preferences in colors enote types of civilization and orlers of intelligence.




