MERCHANTS ASS'N. WILL CONVEINE IN CHARLOTTE TUES.

Twenty-Ninth Annual Convention State Merchants to Begin Its Session at 2:30 p. m.

Charlotte, May 18.—The twenty-ninth annual convention of the North Carolina Merchants Association will convene in Charlotte tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. Vanguard delegates arrived this afternoon. More are expected tonight. A large attendance upon the sessions of the convention is indicated.

The opening session will be called to order by W. N. Dixon, of Winston-Salem, president of the State Association. The Rev. R. H. Daugherty of Charlotte, will offer the invocation, after which Clarence O. Keuster, secretary of the Charlotte Chamber of Commerce, will welcome the visiting merchants to the city. J. C. Williams, of Wilmington, will deliver the response.

Reports of officers, directors and standing committees will consume the remainder of the afternoon.

Tuesday evening will be devoted to group meetings, starting at 8 o'clock, and on Wednesday morning there will be addresses by visitors from other states. Francis E. Kampfer, of Atlanta, former president of the National Retail Grocers' Association, will speak. He will be followed by Stephen H. Talkes, of Washington, D. C., secretary of the Associated Retail Credit Men of the National capital.

Following an open discussion of credit problems, there will be held the annual meeting of the Merchants' Mutual Fire Insurance Company.

There will be a banquet Wednesday night, when the principal speaker will be Harry Collins Spillman, of New York.

Thursday's sessions will be devoted to topics of interest to merchants and at night the delegates will be the guests of the Charlotte Pageant Association at the pageant celebration the signing of the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence.

On Thursday afternoon there will be a presentation of the silver cup donated by Wilson S. Bell, of Tarboro, to the local Association showing the greatest progress during the past year in its report to be submitted to the convention.

Crisis in Arms Conference Was Averted Today

Geneva, May 18.—The crisis in the international conference for the control of traffic in arms and ammunition, which had been created by America's refusal to have the League of Nations' counsel appoint the Central, was averted today by a decision to abandon the plan to establish the proposed Central Bureau.

Chairmanship Senate Elections Com. May Go to Senator Ernst

The Chairmanship of the Senate Elections Committee made vacant by the death of Senator Spencer, of Missouri, will probably go to Senator Ernst, of Kentucky Senator Watson, of Indiana, is by seniority entitled to the place, but he prefers to retain his Chairmanship of the Interstate Commerce Committee.

SWEDEN OUT TO COLLECT FEES FROM RADIO FANS

Stockholm. — Twelve percent of Sweden's entire population are now licensed radio fans, the latest statistics show, and since the police have begun for the first time to round up illicit listeners the demand for official permits has grown by leaps and bounds. To meet the expense of operating the public broadcasting stations the department of telephones and telegraph, which has charge of the country's radio system, charges a license fee of \$3.25 for each receiving set. At the beginning of 1924 only 4,530 such permits had been issued, but today the figure is about 70,000.

By July 1 government officials plan to have completed the five principal broadcasting stations at Stockholm, Malmö, Gothenburg, Sundsvall and Boden, all connected by wires for relay purposes, and so placed that every part of the country will be equally well served.

FORTY-THREE MEN DEAD AS RESULT OF MINE EXPLOSION

Every Effort Possible Made to Rescue the Miners Who Were Trapped in a German Mine

Dorstfeld, Germany, May 18.—The number of known dead in a mine explosion here Saturday has reached 43 with 27 injured.

The work of the trapped miner's comrades in recovering the bodies and rescuing the wounded constitutes one of the heroic pages of mine history of this region. The approach to the victim was both difficult and dangerous. Oxygen apparatus could not be carried on with the rescuers, but had to be dragged with difficulty through narrow passages. Many of the rescuers were overcome by poisonous gases, but their places were heroically taken by others. Many of the rescuers worked 24 hours continuously.

President Von Hindenburg, Chancellor Luther, and Otto Braun, Prussian Minister, have telegraphed condolence.

SUB COMMITTEE TO REPORT SOON ON SHIP SCRAPPING

Committee to Be Composed of O'Connor, Plummer and Benson; Indications That They Will Command Majority

Washington, May 18.—Adoption of a policy looking to the scrapping of upwards of 400 government ships possibly will be recommended to the shipping board shortly, by its sub-committee on scrapping.

Such a step would pave the way for the sale of junking of a large block of vessels to Henry Ford, or other bidders under opening competitive terms. The sub-committee consisting of Chairman O'Connor, and Commissioners Plummer and Benson, is understood to favor such a policy, and while it will encounter opposition on the board, there are indications that it will command a majority. Mr. O'Connor was again at his desk today after an absence of over a week, during which he discussed ship sales with Mr. Ford, but he issued no call for a session of the board prior to its regular meeting tomorrow. Meanwhile he declined to amplify his statement of yesterday expressing the belief that Mr. Ford would make an offer to buy ships both for operation and for scrapping.

DOLE SYSTEM DESCRIBED AS CRIME AGAINST SOCIETY

London. — Young men should be taken out of the city settlements, transferred to the country and taught how to work as they were taught during the war how to fight, George Lansbury, newspaper editor and socialist member of parliament, told the House of Commons during a debate on what he described as "the wretched, miserable dole system" of the state, and its effects on young men between the ages of 18 and 25.

"I would stop giving these young men a farthing for doing nothing," Mr. Lansbury asserted, "and unless they were prepared to earn money in the country or somewhere under decent conditions, they could do without things to eat, so far as I am concerned. The government is ruining the characters of tens of thousands of our young people, and any state of society that trains people to believe they should live by doing no work is committing a crime against the individual and against society."

According to figures presented to the house by T. Thompson, a Liberal member, \$1,505,000,000 has been paid out by the government since the armistice in unemployment benefits.

Navy Plane Prepared for Flight to Pole

The United States Navy seaplane, which was to be used in a flight in North Polar regions in connection with the polar exploring expedition of Commander Donald B. MacMillan, was uncrated and tested near New York City by naval officers and found to be in excellent condition for the trip.

SHEPHERD FACES TRIAL TODAY ON MURDER CHARGE

Charged With Slaying William McClintock, Millionaire Youth; Selection of Jury May Consume 3 Weeks

Chicago, May 18.—Caught in the trial of disaster that has followed the McClintock fortunes for generations, William J. Shepherd, the last titular owner today faced trial for murder. He stood the charge of slaying by typhoid germs the last possessor of \$1,500,000 legacy, William N. McClintock, a youth, who as the ward of Mrs. Shepherd, had lived with them 16 years.

Shepherd, countercharged that it was a plot fostered by a dozen cousins of McClintock to break the will in order to come in for the division of the property, and thereby deprive him of his inherited rights. He entered an absolute denial of the 21 counts of the murder indictment. State's Attorney Robert E. Crowe, will direct the prosecution. It was indicated that the office of the Attorney General of Illinois would keep close watch on the proceedings through an "observer" at the trial. Selection of a jury was expected to consume two or three weeks.

Plans for Funeral of Lt. Gen. Nelson Miles Awaits Son's Approval

Washington, May 18.—Plans for the funeral of Lieutenant General Nelson A. Miles, were ready today for the approval by his son, Major Sherman Miles, upon his arrival here.

Major Miles was enroute home from Constantinople when his father died suddenly in a circus, and he left New York as soon as possible after his ship docked. Full military honors are to mark the General's funeral tomorrow. The army, navy, and marine corps will have places in the ceremony. While President Coolidge is expected to lead the contingent of non military officials, who will present the government tribute to the noted campaigner. Accompanied by an escort of honor including soldiers, sailors, and marines, the body will be born on an artillery caisson to the family Mausoleum in Arlington National Cemetery, where the General's wife is buried.

Dispatch Reveals Is a Secret Organization Operating in Koslenitz

Berlin, May 18.—A dispatch from Sofia says that police have discovered a secret organization operating in Koslenitz and other nearby communities, and confiscated a large amount of dynamite, 200 revolvers, quantities of ammunition, and funds amounting to 150,000 leva. The dynamite, it is alleged, was intended for use in the destroying of railway bridges.

At Plevna, a store of ammunition was uncovered containing hand grenades, two machine guns, and a quantity of dynamite.

CELEBRATION WEEK INAUGURATED IN CHARLOTTE TODAY

Commemorates 150th Anniversary of the Signing of the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence

Charlotte, May 18.—A week of celebration commemorating the 150th anniversary of the signing of the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence, will be inaugurated here today with sundry festivities attended by many personages of note, including a Congressional delegation, Major T. Allen, and officials from surrounding states. A pageant composed of more than eight hundred persons will tonight enact the historical background of the Mecklenburg fight for freedom from England and the signing of the declaration fully a year before the American declaration. The open air is the theatre, and the seating capacity of 8,000 has been constructed for staging the pageant.

SEC. WILBUR WILL DELIVER ADDRESS DUKE UNIVERSITY

Will Deliver Address Before Graduating Class on Wednesday, June 10

Washington, May 18.—Richard L. Flowers, Secretary of Duke's University, Durham, announced here today that Secretary Wilbur had accepted an invitation to deliver the commencement address at the University on Wednesday, June 10. About 125 will be graduated. William H. Chase, President of the University of North Carolina, called on President Coolidge today with Commissioner of Internal Revenue, Blair, who is a native of North Carolina.

President Coolidge was invited by President Chase to attend the ceremonies to be held October 12th at Chapel Hill in connection with the 50th anniversary of the reopening of the University of North Carolina after the Civil War. President Coolidge took the invitation under advisement.

Edward Ferguson Suffers Broken Arm

Edward Ferguson, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. B. Ferguson, is suffering from a broken arm which he received this morning while practicing in the gymnasium at the Rotary building. He was resting quietly this afternoon.

Edward was practicing for the exhibition which the Boy Scouts will present at the Rotary meeting tonight. His many friends will regret to learn of his accident and wish for a speedy and successful recovery.

AMERICA AWAITS WORD FROM NINE DEBTOR NATIONS

Asked to Arrange a Funding Settlement Without Undue Delay

Washington, May 18.—The Washington government is awaiting with interest some word of the reception accorded in the nine European Debtor Nations to the news that this country desires to arrange a funding settlement without undue delay. Meanwhile, there is speculation as to which of the nine will be the first to submit a proposal, even though it provides a basis merely for preliminary negotiations.

France, whose debt to the United States is the largest of the lot, is regarded as the hub of the situation, and it is known that officials would welcome an opening move for that quarter. Recent authorization by the French Cabinet to its Finance Minister to take up the debt problem, strengthens the belief here that a contract will be made with the American Debt Commission.

Gastonia Chamber Commerce to Entertain National Commission

Gastonia, May 18.—The Gastonia Chamber of Commerce will entertain the National Commission in attendance upon the sesqui-centennial celebration at Charlotte, on May 21. The Commission will be tendered a barbeque at the Gastonia Country Club and will spend a portion of the day visiting manufacturing plants. There are more than 100 cotton mills in Gaston county.

Included in the list of visitors will be: United States Senator McKellar, of Tennessee; United States Senator Lee S. Overman, of North Carolina; Representative Jeremiah E. O'Connell, of Rhode Island; Adam M. Wyatt, of Pennsylvania; Charles O. Faust, of Missouri; Miss Sara S. Butler, of New York City; Hoke Smith, of Georgia, and former Representative Charles G. Washburn, of Massachusetts.

Smith and Holt Arrive at Mitchell Field During Today

Mitchell Field, N. Y., May 18.—Major Samter Smith, Commanding Officer of the 19th Observing Squadron of Alabama National Guard, and Thaddeus Holt, President of the Chamber of Commerce of Birmingham, Alabama, arrived here flying the last lap of their journey from Belfort, Pennsylvania, in two hours and 57 minutes.

Major Smith and Holt flew from Birmingham to Cleveland last Saturday, carrying 1,000 letters addressed to persons in the Ohio city. Their flight is in promotion of a Cleveland to Birmingham United States Air Mail Service, and also to bring them to New York for the Alabama dinner to be held at the Hotel Astor tomorrow night.

INTERNAL TROUBLES PROVE HANDICAPS COAST GUARDSMEN

Nine Members of the Guardsmen Blockading Rum Row Have Been Court Martialed for Two Offenses

New York, May 18.—Internal troubles are proving handicaps to coast guardsmen blockading New York's rum row. Six members of the coast guard have been court martialed for smuggling liquor and three for intoxication, it was revealed today. Officials have refused to discuss the affair, but it is known that 19 men have been confined for varying periods in the county jail on Staten Island, awaiting court martial for various offenses. Six convicted of smuggling have been sentenced to six months imprisonment and three got three months each for intoxication.

A far greater handicap is the prospect of the shortage of men in the fleet. Fully 30 percent, it is said, will not enlist when their service terminates on July 1. Conditions on the coast guard ships call for unusually hard work, and few and brief shore reliefs. These are sufficient reasons to induce the guardsmen to seek other openings.

NATIONAL BANK QUARTERS NOW BEING REMODELED

When Completed Will Be One of the Most Up-to-Date Banking Establishments in the State

Work of remodeling the quarters of the National Bank here has been begun and when completed it will be one of the most up-to-date banking establishments in this section of the state. The bank purchased the building at Five Points, known as the National Bank Building in January of this year and when the present work of remodeling is completed the institution will occupy most of the first floor of the building.

The barber shop located on the Dickinson Avenue side of the building has moved to the part of the building beyond the Dickinson Avenue entrance and the space formerly occupied by the barber shop will be taken into the bank's quarters.

The remodeling will include the construction of a new vault and the present vault will be converted into a safety deposit box vault bringing this phase of the bank's equipment to more than three hundred boxes with space to increase it to a thousand when the needs of the town should require. The banking department will occupy practically the entire front space of the building with entrances on Fifth Street, Five Points and Dickinson Avenue. Behind these will be the offices of the bank of officials, the bookkeeping departments and a rest room for ladies. New fixtures will be installed throughout.

The directors' room will be on the second floor. Since its organization the bank has shown steady growth and progress and has reached the point where more commodious quarters are necessary. Those in charge of the remodeling hope to have the work completed before August 1.

FLORIDA PLANS HIGHWAY ALONG WESTERN COAST

Tallahassee, Fla.—A proposed state west-coastal highway between Miami and Pensacola by way of Tallahassee is before the legislature in a bill introduced in the senate.

The highway would follow the Tamiami Trail from Miami to Tampa and, from the connection there with St. Petersburg, would trace the west coast through Clearwater, Crystal River, Cedar Keys and Hampton Springs, connecting at the latter point with State Road No. 19 into Tallahassee.

From Tallahassee the road would run south to St. Marks, thence to Apalachicola and from there along the coast through Port St. Joe, Panama City, Camp Walton and Milton, connecting there with State Road No. 1 into Pensacola.

DARROW TO OPPOSE WILLIAM J. BRYAN EVOLUTION TRIAL

Says That Bryan's Opposition Will Enhance the Spread of Great Doctrines

New York, May 18.—Clarence Darrow, Chicago lawyer (who is to oppose William J. Bryan, in a Tennessee evolution trial, came out today with a few opinions about the Commoner. Nero and Bryan were linked by Darrow as men whose irrational opposition enhanced the spread of great doctrines. Offers of Darrow and Dudley F. Malone, of New York, to assist in the defense of John T. Scope, of Dayton, Tenn., public school teacher charged with a violation of law forbidding the teaching of evolution, have been accepted. Mr. Bryan is to assist in the prosecution, "handicaps." Mr. Darrow is in New York at present.

"Nero," he said, "tried to kill Christianity with persecution and law, and Bryan would block enlightenment with law. Nero failed, as will Mr. Bryan. More persons are studying evolution in Tennessee now than before the law was passed, just as Nero's acts made Christians."

"Man may be sure of his ideas, but if he is intelligent he knows there is room for doubt and debate, and he welcomes both. Mr. Bryan would block both because of his views. He was brought up on certain beliefs, which he has never questioned, or about which he sought to be enlightened to the end that he might be wrong. That is lack of intelligence."

Mr. Darrow said he and Mr. Malone were willing to pay all the expenses of the Tennessee trial, "in order that they might triumph over night." "Any man of ordinary intelligence could topple Mr. Bryan in such a fight; the lawyer continued. "The Tennessee lawyers are good, they will not need help."

Armed Bands Are Harassing Country Central Bulgaria

Sofia, Bulgaria, May 18.—A resurgence of communists activities has been noted in the last few days armed bands composed of desperate men, all good marksmen, and possessed of thorough knowledge of the terrain are harassing the country side in central Bulgaria. They operate only at night, and thus far have eluded the police and troops sent after them.

Special Term of Court to Be Held In Gastonia in June

Gastonia, May 18.—A special term of the Superior Court of Gaston county will be held here the latter part of June, with Judge W. F. Harding, of Charlotte, presiding. The special term was made necessary by the accumulation of civil cases on the docket.

Says German Gov't. Will Continue to Carry Out Dawes Plan

Berlin, May 18.—Foreign Minister Stresemann announced today at the Reichstag that the German Government will continue to carry out the Dawes Plan.

LONDON'S LORD MAYORS YEARS FOR EXERCISE AND THE FRESH AIR

London.—Like Gilbert and Sullivan's operatic policeman, the lord mayor of London finds his official life "not a happy one." Lord Mayor Sir Alfred Bower told a meeting recently it is impossible for him to get fresh air and exercise except on Sunday. Other days in the week he works 15 hours a day. After expressing a wish that there were a half holiday for lord mayors, Sir Alfred said:

"I begin work at 8:30 when my letters are brought to me. After I have dealt with them I have to sit in court, but have also other magisterial duties which are not public. Every afternoon I have to preside over some meeting or attend to official business and every evening I have to attend a dinner which I cannot eat. "I am not the man I was four months ago before I became lord mayor."

Its officers and teachers number 44. It has an annual income from the State of \$30,000 and receives \$142,874 from other sources.

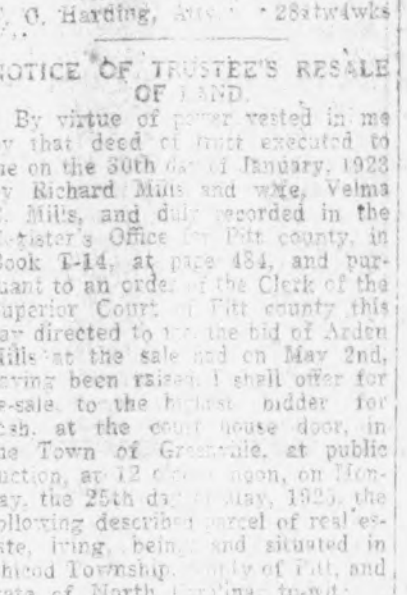

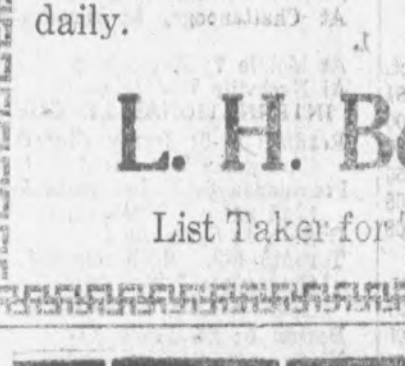

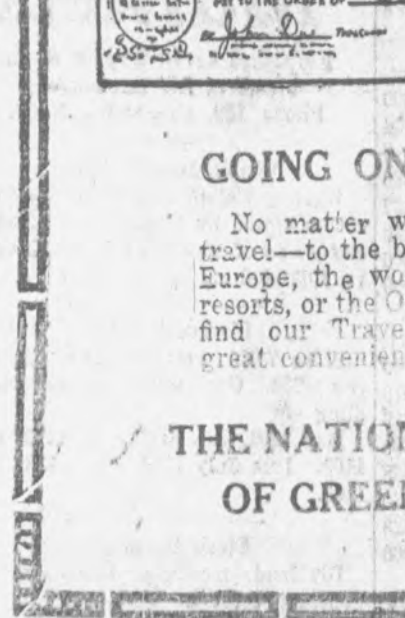

Local cloth markets were quiet but slightly steadier at close of week; yarns declined one to two cents a pound during week; Fall River market quiet; Yokohama silk market unchanged. Of 14 opinions ten bullish, two bearish, two non-committal. Broad Cloth imports declined nearly five million square yards during April compared with March. Showers fell yesterday quite generally from Miss. Valley eastward except along South Atlantic Coast. Indications are for showers today and tomorrow in portions of east gulf and South Atlantic Gulf States.

The Weather

Temperatures cooler over belt, light rainfall in New Orleans, Vicksburg, Montgomery, Chattanooga, Atlanta, and Jacksonville districts. Forecast: Monday eastern and central mostly part cloudy unsettled; western generally fair except East Texas part cloudy; warmer western belt.

Cotton

London cables to the World states: Manchester cotton trade shows signs of expansion on a basis of cheaper raw materials but the depression in iron and steel trade deepens.

Grain

Tribune says: Wheat trade is mostly bullish with expectations of statistics today strongly favoring that side. Estimates on the visible are for a decrease of two to four million bushels. There is a reduction of round a million and half bushels in Minneapolis stocks. Kansas City will also show a decrease. The short interest has been considerably reduced in expectation of an advance. Chicago July wheat is due to open unchanged to 1-8 up on 215 cables. Liverpool wheat 2:15 p. m. up 2 to 2 1/4; corn unquoted.

Sugar

While there were no particularly fresh bullish developments in either the cost and freight or the refined markets at the close of the week, opinion in local trade circles seems to be that prices were again heading for 21-16 to be followed by another advance in refined sugar advances, in an effort to promote another buying movement for granulated sugar. Cuban centrals are now reported to be rapidly closing down for the season and private cables indicated that the rainy season was on. All indications point to a continued good withdrawal demand for refined sugar.

Coffee

Uncertainties in the coffee market has for a long time encouraged buyers of actuals to adhere strictly to hand to mouth quality. Erratic daily price fluctuations both here and in Brazil have tended to greatly limit interest and to promote pressure from the selling element upon every opportunity.

Statistically the position of coffee has favored bullish viewpoint, but up to the present time little or no attention has been paid to the statistical showing.

Julian's Cotton Letter

New York, May 18.—Belief in an increase in acreage of 5 per cent more giving a planted area of 43 to 45 million acres has been the chief influence of depression during the week, and a sudden weakness developing in Liverpool, where bullish ideas have been tenacious carried prices for the new crop to practically their initial opening price in November. Bearish sentiment has been further promoted by continued poor textile reports from dry goods centers. There was a meeting held in this city the latter part of the week at which a resolution was passed recommending curtailment of

production as the best remedy to the present unfavorable situation. It appears that quite a large number of mill executives continue hopeful of a stoppage of the hand-to-mouth buying policy by retailers, ignoring the fact that textile plant capacity in this country is larger than is warranted by domestic or foreign demand. The progress of the new crop will continue to influence sentiment and while a record acreage seems almost assured, it is well to remember that prospects at this time of the year have been proven misleading. Withal it seems that a turn to real damaging weather must come to sustain more than temporary rallies.

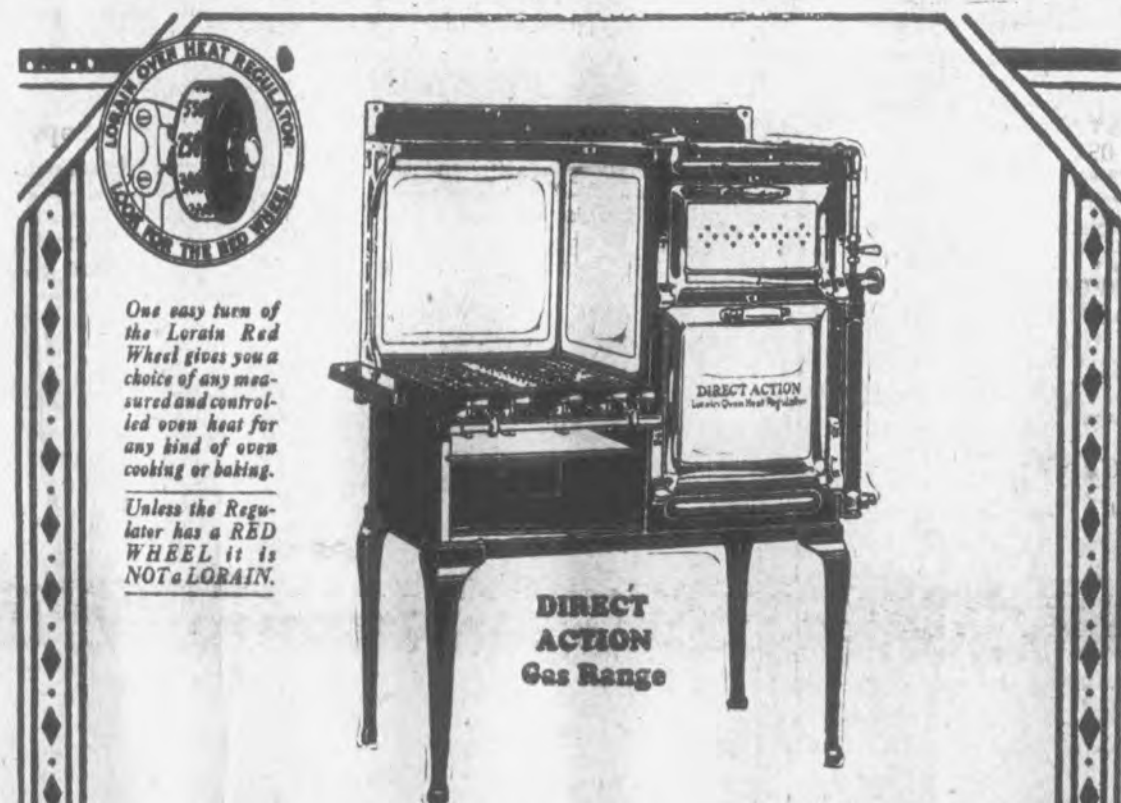
