## ROTARIANS PLEDGE SUPPORT TO LEGION ENDOWMENT FUND

### High School "Gym" Class Stages Novel Entertainment Before Rotarians at Meeting Last Night

The chief entertainment feature of last night's regular meeting of the Greenville Rotary Club was a demonstration of gymnastics staged by the gymnasium class of the Greenville High School.

Following the evening meal there was a Rotary roll call of the members and guests present.

The secretary was then requested to read several communications which included an invitation to the members of the Greenville club to be present in Snow Hill on next Friday evening when the club of that city will receive its charter. More than half the members of the club signified their intentions of accepting the invitation and the party will leave here shortly before six o'clock Friday afternoon.

D. L. Turnage, president of the club, then read statistics regarding forest fires throughout the United States and made a short talk to the club urging that they join with the Rotary Clubs throughout the nation in an effort to guard against this useless waste of fire.

The guests of the evening included Judge M. V. Barnhill, of Rocky Mount; R. A. Coburn, of Bethel; J. B. Crater, S. O. Worthington; Mr. Hill and the gymnasium class of the high school.

Mr. Worthington addressed the club on the purpose of the American Legion Endowment Fund and urged that every member lend a hand in this noble and glorious work. At the conclusion of his address the club unanimously endorsed the movement and pledged its support to the same.

All those present were then invited to the gymnasium on the second floor of the building where a demonstration of the work was staged by the school boys under the direction of Mr. Hull. The demonstration was a revelation to those present and set forth clearly the great work along lines of physical education that is being accomplished in our city schools. This feature of the program was followed by a short address by J. H. Rose, superintendent of city schools, in which he set forth what the schools are endeavoring to accomplish and urged the hearty support of every Rotarian in the effort to keep the children in school and see to it that every boy and girl receives at least a high school education.

### Many Couples Separated by Divorce Mill Be Remarried

Providence, R. I., May 19.—Many couples illegally separated by a divorce mill here have been remarried, it developed today. State's Attorney General Sisson, who is directing an inquiry that already has resulted in 38 indictments, says that the particular mill under fire, parted 200 persons illegally and that many of these have remarried, or are abroad.

The status of the marital standing will remain unchanged unless they return to Rhode Island. That is improbable because they were non residents and obtained their divorces on fictitious or technical domiciles. It is estimated that not less than \$200,000 has passed into the coffers of the manipulators of the divorce mill, the price being \$2,000 a decree. A boast that he obtained that sum is credited by the Attorney General to one lawyer under indictment.

### Conspiracy in Which Gov. Been Swindled Alleged Revealed

Newark, N. J., May 19.—A conspiracy in which it is alleged the Government has been swindled out of more than a quarter million dollars in taxes and in which this city has been made the center of activities for an alleged bootleg ring, handling thousands of gallons of alcohol, was alleged to have been revealed today. It was announced that 20 officials and two individual firms are under indictment charging conspiracy.

## DENIES ENTRANCE OF FORD INTEREST INTO WALL STREET

### Pittman Declares That Ford Millions Are Not Backing Venture of Guardian Detroit Company

New York, May 19.—The connection of the associates of Henry Ford with a New York Bond House, was generally hailed by financial circles today as meaning the manufacturer's entrance into Wall Street. Yet from Detroit came a denial that it has any such significance. The newly organized Guardian Detroit Company opened for business yesterday in the Equitable Building on Broadway, near Wall Street. One of the directors is Ernest Kanzler, Vice President of the Ford Motor Company. The Guardian Detroit Company is announced as an investment branch of the Guardian Trust Company of Detroit of which Edsel Ford, Henry's son, is a director. The Guardian Trust Company has taken over the municipal bond business of Keane-Higbee and Company of Detroit, and New York, who continue in business as underwriters.

In a denial that the Ford interest are entering Wall Street, Stewart L. Pittman, Vice President of the Guardian Detroit Company said in Detroit. "There is no proof in the statement that Ford interests are backing this venture, both men, Edsel and Kanzler held similar positions with the Keane-Higbee Company of Detroit before its incorporation into the new company."

The committee, which consists of Chairman O'Connor and Commissioner Plummer and Benson, is in agreement on a policy of scrapping 150 of the desirable of the 300 idle vessels, and intends to add to this number 50 vessels of another type. It has asked the fleet corporations for a recommendation covering this 50, and pending receipt of this report, will withhold its recommendations of the board. In case of approval of the plan, bidders will be invited for scrapping the vessels in which case Henry Ford would be expected to be among those tendering offers.

## SUPERIOR COURT FOR TRIAL OF CIVIL CASES CONVENES IN CITY

### Will Continue for Two Weeks; First Day's Session Featured by Compromises and Judgments

The May term of Superior Court for the trial of civil cases convened in this city yesterday for a two week's session with Judge M. V. Barnhill presiding.

Monday's session was featured by compromises, judgments and granting of divorces. The session was largely attended.

Florsie Powell was granted a divorce from J. F. Powell. In the case of National City Securities Corporation vs. T. W. Parker, judgment was rendered in favor of the plaintiff in the sum of \$300.

The National City Securities Corporation was awarded a verdict of \$800 in a case against C. L. Parker. Verdict in favor of the plaintiff in the sum of \$720, was rendered in the case of R. L. Smith vs. Harvey Allen.

In the case of R. L. Smith vs. J. J. Mills, the plaintiff was awarded a judgment of \$927.89.

### Members of Tri-State Tobacco Co-Op Ass'n. In Annual Meet

Raleigh, May 19.—Members of the Tri-State Tobacco Growers Co-operative Association estimated to total 1,000, met in Pullen Hall at the State College today, to hear the annual reports of officials and to consider further policies.

## EUROPEAN NATIONS STRIVING TOWARDS SETTLING DEBT

### Belgium to Take Independent Steps in Negotiating Refunding Settlement

Washington, May 19.—The war debt situation, in apparent reprieve until just recently, has resumed lively activities with indications that three European Nations are striding toward agreements for meeting their obligations to this country.

Belgium and Estonia are now disclosed, as in company with France, in preliminary negotiations looking to the funding of their debts. It is not evident here, however, that the Belgium and Estonia action is the result of this government's recent announcement that it was expecting offers from its nine European debtors.

The Belgium government, dispatches from Brussels said, was interrogated by American Ambassador Phillips early last month regarding its funding plans, and it was learned yesterday that the Estonian Ministers here had discussed the question with Secretary Mellon over a period of several weeks.

The first break in the tangle of the inter-allied debts was seen by high government officials here today in the determination of Belgium to take independent steps in negotiating settlement with the United States. In official quarters the information conveyed from the Belgium Foreign officials in last night's dispatches was accepted as being highly significant, since Belgium must be classed as one of the major debtors to whom the United States extended financial aid. The Belgium statement to the Associated Press created a feeling of optimism at the treasury.

## OFFICERS CAPTURE STILL AND OPERATOR NEAR GREENVILLE

### Daniel Lockamy And 100 Gallon Copper Still Fall Into Hands of Deputies Monday

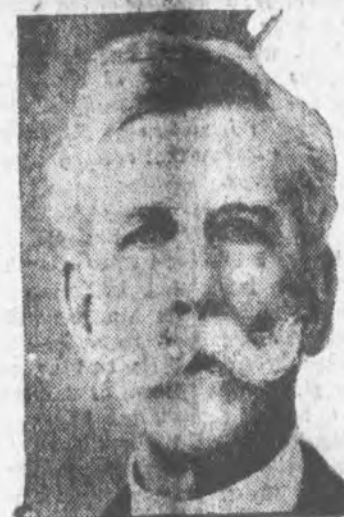
Yesterday Deputies Whitehurst, Savage and Pierce staged a raid for moonshiners over near the Pactolus and Greenville Township line about five miles from Greenville, and succeeded in locating a gin mill together with Daniel Lockamy the operator. It seems that the officers came first upon a negro who was carrying wood in his arms to the still site, but seeing the officers the negro immediately took to his heels and soon outdistanced all pursuers. Finding themselves unable to catch the negro the officers turned their attention to locating the still, which they came upon without the operator being aware of their presence until told to "hands up." The liquor making outfit consisted of a 100 gallon copper still with all necessary paraphernalia, together with about 500 gallons of beer and 10 gallons of whiskey. All of the stuff was confiscated or poured out.

T. V. O'Connor, chairman of the United States Shipping Board, engaged in a lengthy conference with Henry Ford relative to the possible sale by the Government to the manufacturer of 400 of the 1,200 ships now federally owned. ## SWIFT OPENS UP A DEPOT IN THIS CITY

### Has Warehouse and Offices in Building Formerly Occupied By the Greenville Supply Co.

### Irish Standardize Porter Bottles.

Dublin.—The Free State government has made an order standardizing the size of porter bottles. Porter is largely sold by the bottle and the quantity of the contents varied. Some traders got 16 and the more generous ones only 14 bottles out of a gallon.

### General McArthur Will Deliver Address at Re-union Which Will Be Held June 10-11

General Douglas MacArthur, now Commanding the Fourth Corps Area, will be the guest of honor and deliver the principle address at the Rainbow Division Reunion in Marion, S. C., June 10th and 11th. General McArthur commanded an infantry brigade in this famous Division overseas and was greatly loved by all the men in the Division because of his ability, daring and consideration for the men under his command. After the war he was commandant at the United States Military Academy at West Point.

Various committees are now busy completing arrangements to care for the comfort and pleasure of these Rainbow Men from North and South Carolina and a royal good time is promised the three hundred or more who are expected. Among the features will be a real Marion County Fish Stew for supper June 10th. This will be served under the elms on the square, where members of "A" Company 117th Engrs. did some hard drilling in 1917. Another feature will be the showing in the Rainbow Theatre, the famous war picture "Fighting in France." This picture has been secured especially for this occasion. June 11, Cool Springs and Conway will join in welcoming the Rainbow along the route to the Beach. Dancing, sunbathing and a beach dinner will make up the program.

Los Angeles, May 19.—Charles S. Chaplin's balloon pants, snaky cane, and flapping shoes when used in conjunction with other characteristic touches of make-up, were declared to be his private property in a court ruling here today that gave the film comedian a legal victory in his suit to injure Charles Aador from using them and the stage name of Charles Apla.

## SEVERAL PERSONS INJURED IN PANIC ON SUBWAY TRAIN

### Blown Fuse Followed By Series of Electric Lamp Explosions Re- ported as Cause of Ac- cident

New York, May 19.—At least 75 persons were injured, two of them probably fatally in a mad panic which swept a crowded east side subway train, as it was about to leave the Grand Central Terminal Station today. A blown fuse followed by a series of electric lamp bulb explosions was reported to have been the cause of the accident. As clouds of smoke enveloped the train, the passengers, many of them women and children, became panic-stricken and kicked out the windows of the cars. Shattered glass flew in all directions and many of the imprisoned passengers were cut when they frantically fought to make their way out of the train.

Ambulances were summoned from nearby hospitals and many of the injured were carried to the grill room of the hotel Vanderbilt, which was turned into a temporary hospital.

New York, May 19.—The train literally jammed with humanity came to a short stop a block from the terminal. Men, women and children rushed into everyone of the cars were swept from their feet in the confusion, which grew to panic when the cars began to fill with stifling smoke caused by burning installations.

Scores were knocked to the floor and trampled. The confusion was added to when the guards prevented the opening of emergency cars. The electric current in the third rails of the subway was discontinued to permit the panic stricken thousands to stream their way through the tubes to emergency and other exits, some of them several blocks from the scene of the accident.

## FIVE RESORTS WERE PADLOCKED MONDAY IN NEW ORLEANS

### Old Absinthe House, Known Country Over, Closes; Rum Row Is Dwindling Day by Day

New York, May 19.—With Rum Row dwindling day by day, enforcement sponsors are getting busier and busier on land, the whole general situation in New York is indicative of greater dryness than in any time since the enactment of the Volstead act, according to Richard G. Merrick, Divisional Prohibition Chief. He believes there will not be a ship in Rum Row in ten days. The next move is to cut off the runners now operating off St. Lawrence River and the Great Lakes, he said. From New Orleans comes the news of the closing of the Old Absinthe House, known the country over since 1824. It has been operating since prohibition as a soft drink stand, and yesterday was padlocked along with five resorts in New Orleans.

### Greenville Golfers to Play Goldsboro On Next Friday

The golf tournament scheduled to be played between Goldsboro and Greenville teams in Goldsboro Wednesday afternoon has been postponed until Friday afternoon.

Greenville has been playing splendid golf and in the tournaments for the Eastern Division championship of the Eastern Carolina she has won three and suffered only one defeat. The team will go to Goldsboro with the determination to win.

## GIVES FIRST CASH DONATION LEGION ENDOWMENT FUND

### Mr. L. W. Tucker Makes First Donation to Pitt County's Quota of \$1,078.00

Mr. L. W. Tucker, on yesterday, made the first cash donation to the Pitt county quota of the American Legion Endowment fund. Our quota is \$1078.00.

The American Legion Endowment Fund has been established as a perpetual trust with a corporation being organized for the purpose of the supervision, custody, investment and care of the principal, and supervision of the expenditure of the income. The American Legion, by declaration of trust, turns over to this corporation the net proceeds of all of the funds collected, to be held as a perpetual trust for the purpose outlined; it being understood that when the Legion ceases to exist or the uses to which the fund are devoted are no longer necessary, the future of the fund will then be determined by a board to be appointed by the person then acting as President of the United States, it being provided, however that the use at that time shall be as nearly analogous to the present uses as possible, and that the fund shall be held as a perpetual trust for the American Legion and the income only expended.

The National Executive Committee of The American Legion, authorizing the raising of the Endowment Fund in accord with resolutions of the Sixth Annual National Convention of The American Legion, declared:

"That portion of this income expended for rehabilitation work will be used to make certain for our disabled comrades the physical, mental and vocational restoration to which they are entitled, both by insuring the proper application in every instance of the generous provision made by the nation through governmental agencies, and by supplementing such provision where necessary to give just relief to them and their dependents."

"That portion of this income expended for child welfare will be used to carry on the administrative and relief work for the care, education and training of orphan children of all ex-service persons."

### W. J. Bryan on Way to Columbus, O., to Attend Gen. Assembly

New York, May 19.—After a tour of the east during which controversies involving modernists, fundamentalists, and evolution, burst forth with renewed vigor, William J. Bryan is on his way today to Columbus, Ohio, to attend the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church and become, it is reported, a candidate for moderator on a strictly fundamental platform. The Commoner, whose speech at Brown's University Providence, R. I., was followed by hissing, and was accorded a somewhat similar reception at one of the three addresses on evolution that wound up the Eastern Campaign yesterday.

### Officials of Submarine S-19 Are Ordered Court Martialled

Washington, May 19.—The officials of the submarine S-19, which went aground last January at Nauset Beach, Mass., today were ordered court martialled by Secretary Wilbur.

### Finals at Salem College Will Begin On Friday, May 29

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## A STITCH IN TIME

The Pitt County Health Department has called attention to a few cases of typhoid fever reported during the past month and points out that this disease can be prevented in our county if the citizens avail themselves of the opportunity to take the typhoid treatment.

The use of the serum as a preventive has proved very effective and during the past few years the number of cases of typhoid fever in this county has shown a great decrease and people should not become careless along this line.

If you have never taken the treatment you can do so and insure yourself against the dreaded disease for a period of three years at least. If it has been three years since you took the treatment you should take it again now in order to be sure that you are immune.

As summer advances it is natural that typhoid fever should be on the increase and to be on the safe side you should take the treatment. Your doctor can administer the treatment or if you desire it can be obtained free at the Pitt County Health office on Wednesdays and Saturdays.

It is foolish to run the risk of having typhoid fever when there is a sure preventive for it and the treatment is yours only for the asking.

## EDUCATIONAL INEQUALITIES

As a nation we spend over a thousand million dollars a year to educate the twenty-four million children who are in our schools. Of that amount but a fraction over one per cent is expended to insure that they will grow to strong manhood and womanhood. According to the U. S. Bureau of Education but one-tenth of the nation's school children are receiving "anything which even pretends to be adequate physical education and health training."

It is estimated that we pay one billion four hundred million dollars a year for the services of physicians and other healers, for nurses, hospital services, drug and patent medicines, while for health work, part of which at least is preventive, we spend through Federal, State and municipal agencies only sixty millions. We actually spend a larger sum in this country for chewing gum than we appropriate through legislative bodies for health activities.

Ten million school children in our rural districts are beyond the reach of the better health facilities of the city, and this inequality of opportunity is demanding the attention of educators and statesmen. Every child should have a square deal.—Union Labor Record.

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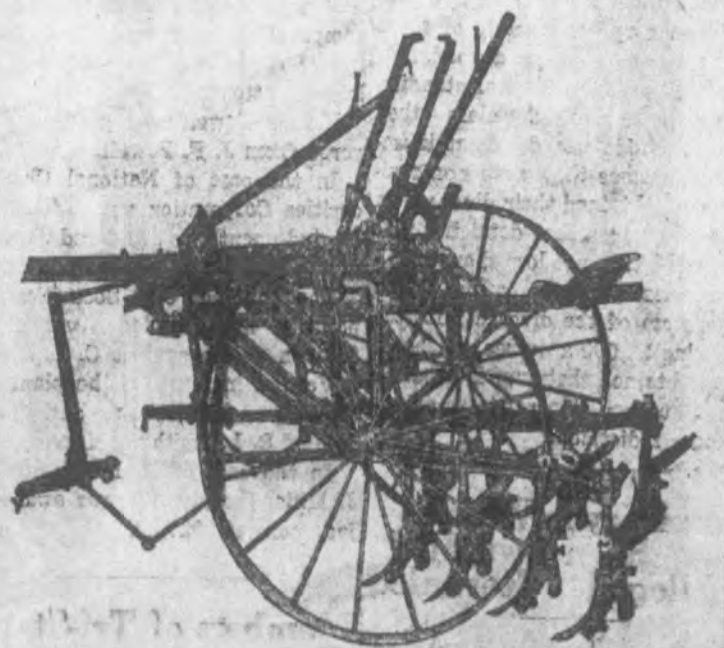
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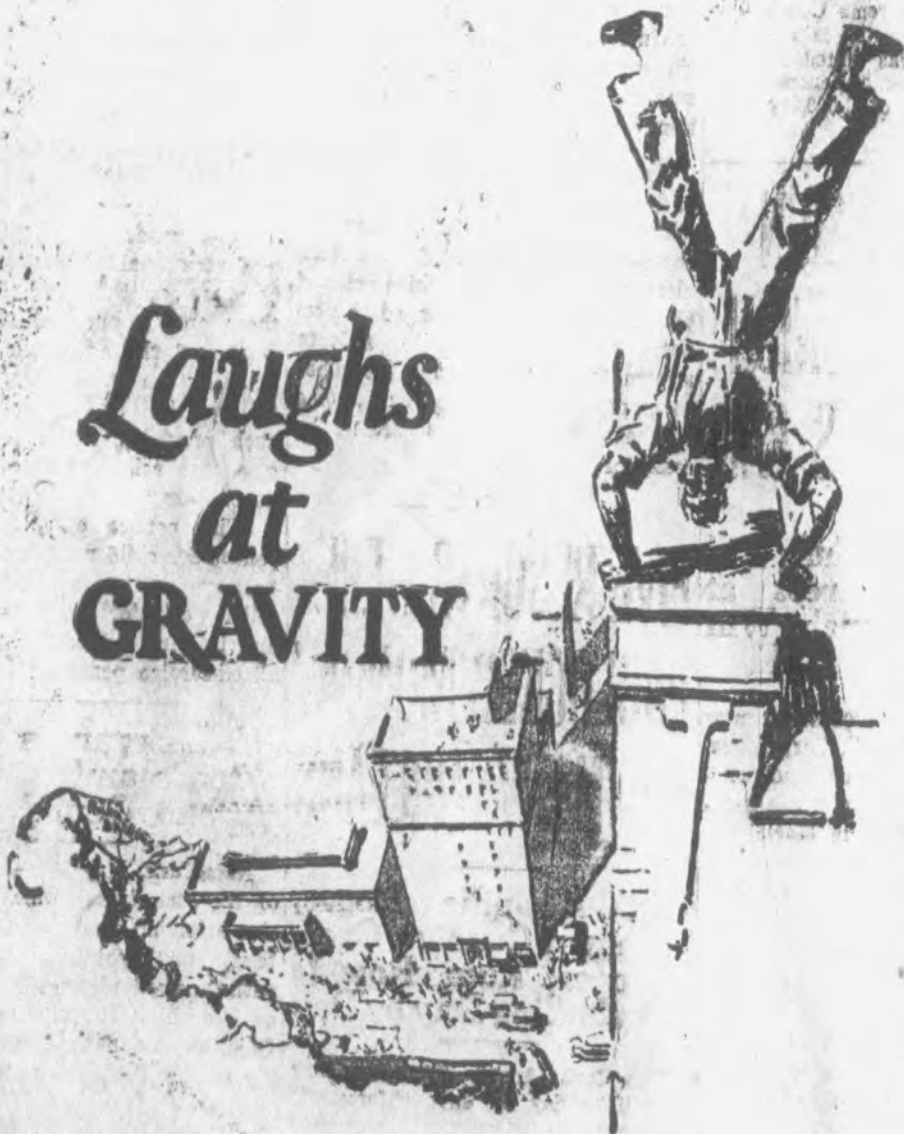
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"I must in turn ask you," he said, "to cease to make assertions which are not in strict accordance with scientific fact."

## Employment Bureau For Deaf Mutes Proving Success

Raleigh, May 19.—An employment bureau for the deaf mutes of North Carolina is conducted under state supervision, in connection with the department of Labor and Printing. It was created by an act of the general assembly of 1923 and has continued to function since that time.

"The labor problem confronting the deaf of North Carolina," said Hugh G. Miller, chief of the bureau, "has been solved and adjusted on a permanent basis. 'Before this bureau was established,' he continued, 'the State Department of Labor and Printing was unable to aid the deaf in securing employment. This was not due to a lack of interest but to a lack of understanding as to the needs of the deaf.'

In order to bring about the understanding referred to by Mr. Miller as being, framers of the bill creating the employment agency provided that there should be a mute at its head. An appointment was made as soon as the proposed bill became law.
