M'LEAN ANNOUNCES FIVE PER CENT CUT IN STATE BUDGET

Departmental and Institutional Heads Noted to Furnish Estimates of Needs

Raleigh, May 21.—Governor McLean has notified heads of State Departments, institutions and agencies that, based on new estimates of revenue just received by him, it will be necessary to scale appropriations only 5 per cent at present. The Governor had previously announced that he anticipated a cut of seven per cent. However, following a conference with R. A. Doughton, commissioner of revenue he announced that the percentage of estimated reduction had been lowered two per cent.

Coincident with the issuance of his latest statement, Governor McLean notified all departmental and institutional heads to furnish him with estimates of their needs at the earliest possible moment.

The Governor, as director of the budget, under the legislation enacted by the last general assembly, will insist on a "balanced budget." He has announced that he does not propose to allow any branch of the State government spend more than it is allowed.

In his statement accompanying his final call for estimates from all branches of the State government, the Governor said:

"At its recent session, the General Assembly, made appropriations which in the aggregate, exceeded the total estimated revenues for the fiscal years 1925-26 and 1926-27, and placed the responsibility for balancing the budget up on the Director of the Budget.

"The Governor, as Director of the Budget, with the co-operation and assistance of the various departments and institutions, must, therefore, total expenditures within the total revenues during the biennium.

"The spending agencies of the State have already been advised that, based upon previous estimates, a balanced budget would probably require a reduction in the appropriations.

"At that time it was estimated that a pro rata reduction of approximately seven per cent, would be necessary.

"Based upon estimates just received, the Director of the Budget is glad to state that the percentage of reduction is lowered two points, making the net pro rata reduction in the 1925-26 appropriations five per cent.

"This five per cent reduction should, therefore, be applied to your biennial and quarterly statements now called for. For example, if your total appropriation for the fiscal year 1925-26 is \$100,000, you will deduct five per cent, or \$5,000, leaving a net balance of \$95,000 upon which you will base your biennial estimate and also the allotment request for the first quarter."

The Governor then made the following citations:

"1. The total appropriations for the fiscal year 1925-26 of \$12,937,362 less total interest, sinking funds and bond redemptions of \$2,866,844.

"2. The total estimated revenues (as revised) for the fiscal year 1925-26, less total interest, sinking funds and bond redemptions of \$2,866,844 aggregate \$9,558,844 as the net amount available for pro rata distribution.

"3. The total revenue available of \$9,558,844 divided by the total net appropriations of \$10,070,518, equals approximately 95 per cent which will be available as of July 1, 1925."

FIVE WOUNDED IN ATTEMPT TO TAKE NEGROES FROM JAIL

Officials Guarding Jail Drive Back Mob After About 30 Shots Had Been Fired; Negroes Being Held in Connection With Two Murders

Dallas, Texas, May 21.—Five men were wounded, one seriously, in an exchange of shots between officials guarding the Dallas County jail, and a mob of about 300 persons shortly after one o'clock this morning. The mob, bent on taking Frank and Lorenzo Noel, negroes and brothers, indicted yesterday in connection with the two murders and criminal assault cases, was driven back after about 30 shots had been fired. All of the injured were civilians. The only officer wounded was Sheriff Schuyler Marshall, who was struck by a flying brick. The wounded are Dwight Stewart, N. Edward Duncan, J. J. Young, Tim Jolly, and Charles J. Pullman. Stewart was seriously wounded, being shot in the side. His recovery is doubtful. The others were only slightly wounded. About 100 men and a woman were arrested and placed in jail. No charges were filed against them.

After the attack, the crowd around the jail, which began congregating early in the night, and at one time was estimated at 5,000, gradually dispersed, although several hundred persons maintained an overnight vigil.

Governor Angus McLean, Representative Adam Wyatt, and Miss Sara Butler, daughter of Nicholas Butler, President of the Columbia University, were among the speakers on the program last night at the outdoor theatre where the pageants picturing the history of Mecklenburg for the past decade were shown.

REAL BEER ON SALE LEGALLY TODAY IN ONTARIO, CANADA

Thirsty Americans Visit Canada's Banner Province to Buy Beer for First Time in Eight Years

Ottawa, Canada, May 21.—Real beer was on sale legally today in Ontario, Canada's banner province, for the first time in eight years, and thirsty Americans in border cities took full advantage of their opportunities.

In 1917 the whole dominion went dry as a war measure. After the war the liquor question in each of the nine provinces was left to referendum.

Quebec, Manitoba, British Columbia, Alberta, and Saskatchewan have returned to a full wet state. The Maritime province, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edwards Island, remain in the prohibition column. Ontario voted twice on the subject, the dries winning each time. The provincial legislature lately amended the act to legalize the sale of 4.4 per cent beer under restriction.

Reservations from Detroit exhausted the supply of tables at Windsor, Ontario hotels. Windsor a 10 minute ferry trip from the Motor Metropolis, expected a lucrative trade from America. Approximately 1600 application blanks for licenses were obtained in Windsor alone. One hotel fitted up an old English tap room and hired Cockney bar maids. Another reported reservations from as far South in the states as Arkansas.

OWNER 'BABY FARM' IS INDICTED TODAY FOR MANSLAUGHTER

After Investigation the Grand Jury Indicts Mrs. Geisen - Vulk for First Degree Man- slaughter

New York, May 21.—Mrs. Helen Auguste Geisen-Vulk, owner of a "baby farm" in East 86th street, today was indicted for first degree manslaughter by a grand jury after investigation which shows that William Winters, six months old, died in the woman's place after his skull had been fractured.

The Winters infant was one of 30 children who died in the baby farm. Experts said the inquiries indicated that the infant had been thrown against a wall. Health department records show that 14 other children died in another baby farm which Mrs. Geisen-Vulk formerly conducted in Upper Park Avenue.

The woman was indicted by another grand jury Tuesday on a charge of substituting children placed in her care. She also pleaded guilty to this charge in the general session today when manslaughter indictment was returned. Her bail of \$36,000 on child substitution was continued and she was returned to jail.

LITTLE PROGRESS BEING MADE IN THE SHEPHERD CASE

Charge of Tempering With Jurymen and Witnesses Lead to In- vestigation by Prosecu- tion

Chicago, May 21.—An alleged attempt to tamper with a prospective jurymen, is the latest sensation of the trial of William D. Shepherd, charged with killing his millionaire foster son, William N. McClintock, with typhoid germs.

Robert E. Crowe, state's attorney, charged some one connected with the defense with making the attempt and has directed a complete investigation. Detectives were ordered to arrest a man who approached Phillip J. Barry, a venireman, on Tuesday before he was questioned for jury service.

Barry said he was acquainted with the man who urged him to "work a way on to the jury" and promised to "make it well worth your while."

His story led to brief detention of a private detective agency head, who was released when Barry said he was not the man. After he had told a detective that he had been approached, Barry was excused from jury service, and later made his statement to the prosecutor. The state's attorney said Barry's was not the only information he had, and that his inquiry also included alleged tampering with witnesses. Investigation of the first sensation of the trial of the disappearance of Robert White, one of the chief state witnesses, was undertaken by a special grand jury session late yesterday. Arthur Burne, an investigator, for the law firm defending Shepherd and Mrs. Sylvia Adams, who previously had said White told her and her husband that he had been offered \$25,000 and a bungalow in Florida to leave Chicago, were called before the jury.

No announcement of any action voted was made at the conclusion of the special session. William Scott Stewart and W. W. C'Brien, Shepherd's attorneys, were not taken before the jury, but were questioned by Mr. Crowe. Both denied knowledge of White's whereabouts and said he was wanted as a defense witness.

Scant progress has been made towards the selecting of a jury.

MANY PROPOSALS RECEIVE ATTENTION CONFEDERATE VETS

Resolution Suggesting That Government Be Asked to Take Over Confederate Pension Rolls Opposed By Many Veterans

Dallas, Texas, May 21.—Confederate veterans at their reunion here today considered proposals on which many of the delegates expressed divergent views. One is a resolution asking that the government take over Confederate Pension Rolls from the Southern states and pay the pensions of the former confederates just as they do the Union survivors. The other is a proposed request to place several officers of the organization on the Executive Board of the Stone Mountain Memorial Association.

Many of the veterans are opposed to asking the Federal Government to take over the pension. A resolution suggesting this was introduced yesterday and is before the Resolutions Committee.

Officials of the Stone Mountain Memorial Association here have taken issue with the resolution asking for their representation on the Executive Board.

General William A. Collier, of Memphis, Tenn., was re-elected for the eighth time, commander of Forest Cavalry Corps. General John A. Johnson, of Chattanooga, Tenn., was chosen commander of Eastern Department of the Corps, and General Felix H. Robertson was re-elected Commander of the Western Department.

Washington, May 21.—Addressees dealing with America's Commercial Treaty policies and group luncheon meetings devoted to domestic distribution, foreign commerce, insurance, and transportation, today held the attention of delegates to the convention of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. Secretary Hoover and former Representative Winslow, of Massachusetts, for chairman of the House Commerce committee, will speak at the general session tonight.

Seeking to Recover Confederate Pension Money From Sessoms

Raleigh, May 21.—Seeking to recover the total sum of \$21,292.50 of Confederate pension money alleged to have been misappropriated by former Superior Court Clerk of Sampson County, W. F. Sessions, the State of North Carolina, through the department of the Attorney General, today filed suit in the Wake County Superior Court against Sessions, and his bondsmen for three terms. Sessions was convicted on October 20, 1921 of misappropriating pension funds and sentenced to serve from two to four years in the state's prison. Papers were served on him at the prison today.

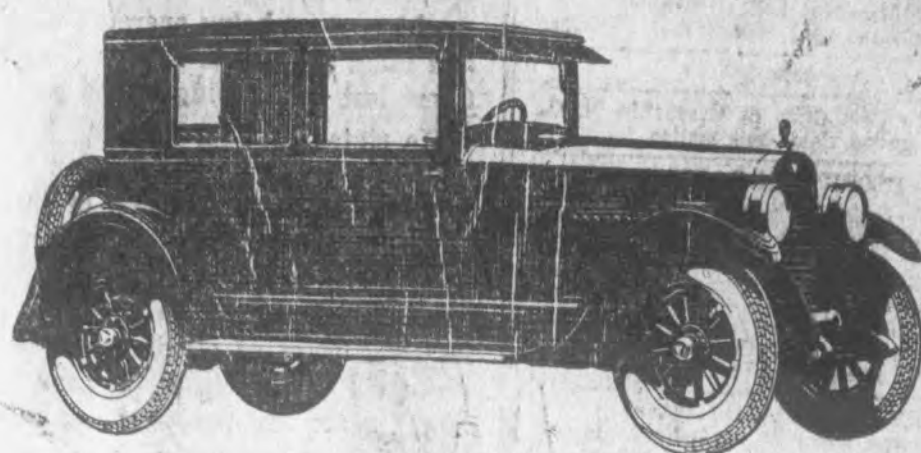

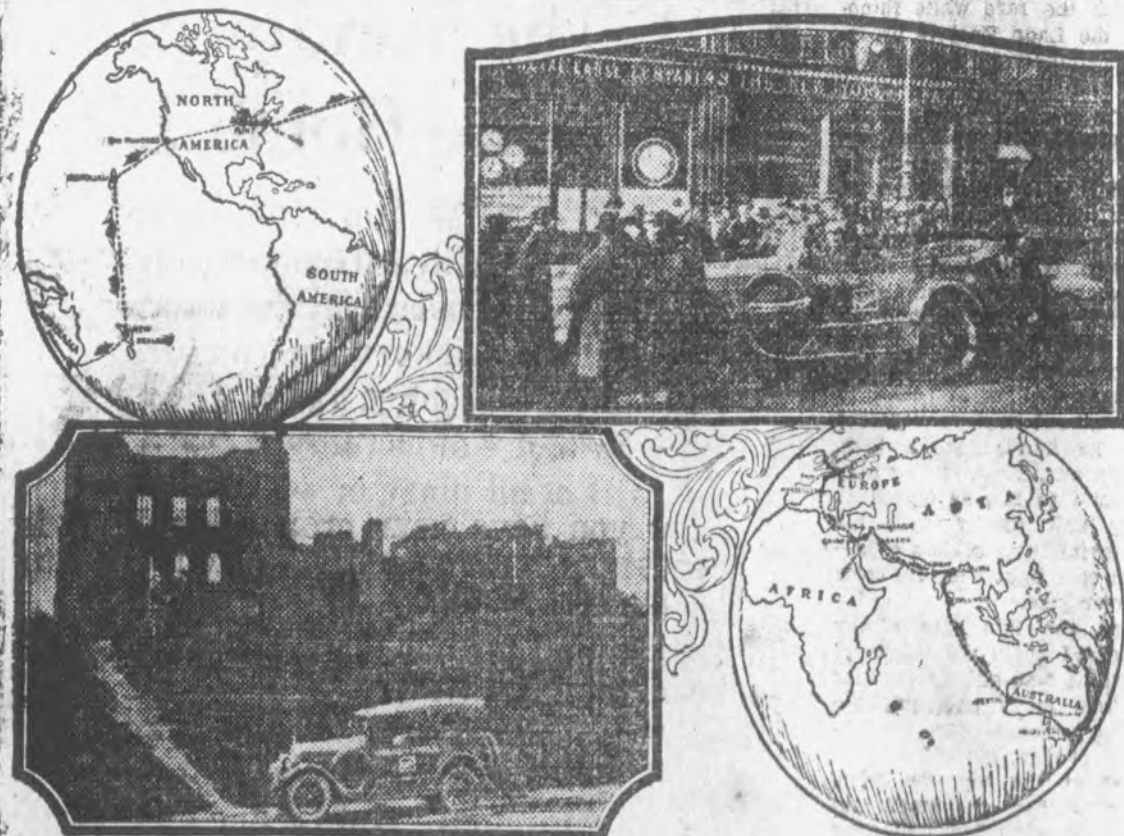

Buick Loops Globe in Record Run



The above illustration shows the route taken by the "round the world" Buick. The lower left photograph shows Kenilworth Castle, Warwick, England, in the background; the photo at the upper right shows the globe circling in front of the Paris office of the New York Herald. The car is being driven by dealer representatives. It will have had 350 different drivers when it completes its world tour in New York.

A Buick car, which departed unharmed from New York City last December to be driven from one Buick dealer to another in a trip around the world, is nearing the end of its long journey.

The car, a Standard Six Touring model, is strictly "on its own," being unaccompanied by mechanics or special drivers. When it returns to New York City the machine will have been handled by approximately 350 different drivers.

The last difficult leg of the trip has been completed, a long run over the questionable roads across the continent of Australia. The car is now enroute to New Zealand and Honolulu, from whence it will be shipped to San Francisco and driven across the United States through Detroit and Flint to New York.

The trip around the world was conceived to demonstrate that a Buick will travel to the remote corners of the earth and that on such a journey it is always safeguarded by service facilities.

The globe-encircling car has made its trip without faltering. Driven from dealer to dealer by dealers' representatives only, it has demonstrated Buick's ability to withstand the "man-handling" from hundreds of drivers of various nationalities and degrees of skill.

After coming from the regular assembly line in the factory at Flint, Mich., it was equipped with four spare tires and a shovel. Supplementary tanks on the running boards provide oil, gasoline and water for the long runs over deserts and other uninhabited regions.

After being boxed and sent to New York City it was shipped across the Atlantic to Liverpool, where its land journey started on December 31, 1924. The car was passed from dealer to dealer enroute to London.

It then was shipped from London to Amsterdam. With frequent changes of drivers it passed south through Europe, visiting Brussels and Paris and finally reaching the Mediterranean at Marseilles, France.

On January 29, it was placed on a steamer bound for Port Said, Egypt. From there it was driven south to Cairo. Then the route swung "east of Suez" where the real test began. Through Palestine and the biblical country, the car proceeded to Beirut. On February 5, it left there for Damascus and Bagdad, accompanied by one of the desert convoys of the Sair Transport Company, which incidentally uses Buicks in its desert fleet.

The Syrian desert was crossed without difficulty. The Buick distributor in Beirut, however, gave some idea of the country traversed, in the following letter excerpt:

"The road was terrible in places, being nothing more than a cart track strewn with large boulders. In the run over the Lebanon Mountains the car climbed to a height of more than a mile. After spending the night at Damascus, the 540-mile run to Bagdad was made at an average speed of 35 miles an hour."

The Mesopotamian distributors took the Buick at Bagdad and drove it to Basra on the Persian Gulf, from whence it was sent to Bombay, India. From there it was driven over indifferent trail-roads across India to Agra, and finally Calcutta.

It then went to Ceylon, where the Buick distributors drove it for three days before sending it to Perth, on the southwest coast of Australia, where it arrived April 1. The desert waste of southern Australia between Perth and Adelaide was regarded as the most difficult part of the trip. The distance is something more than half-way across the United States. This long stretch of bad going was negotiated successfully, as was the shorter journey from Adelaide to Melbourne, near the southeast end of the continent. The car since was driven to Albany and then to Sydney, from which point it was shipped to New Zealand.

After completion of the globe journey it is planned to preserve the car as an object of historical interest.

The fact that a number of slot machines are being operated in places of business throughout this county has been called to the attention of Judge Albion Dunn who in an interview with a representative of this paper

has requested that the public be informed that the operation of these machines is illegal and unless same is discontinued immediately charges will be preferred against the operators. Persons in whose places similar machines were being operated were convicted and fined \$250.00 in Pender County Superior Court last week, Judge Dunn said.

He stated that he did not believe these machines would be in operation in this county today were the owners of the places of business in which the machines are placed aware that they were violating the law in operating same and he desires this information and word of warning in order that the operation of this form of game of chance might cease immediately and disposition made of the machines.

Judge Dunn stated emphatically that the operation of slot machines in this state is against the law and that if the same continued the violators would be haled into court.

This word of warning from Judge Dunn should be sufficient to rid the various business places of the county of this evil and it is to be hoped that there will be no necessity of bringing the violators into court in order to stop the operation of these slot machines.

BIBLE STUDENT PREPARES

FOR ORIENTAL RESEARCH

Baltimore.—Dr. Raymond P. Dougherty, professor of Biblical literature at Goucher College, has been appointed annual professor of the American Schools of Oriental Research at Jerusalem and Bagdad for 1925-26. He has been granted a year's leave of absence by the local institution, and will leave for the near east the latter part of July.

Dr. Dougherty said his work will include lecturing and field work along archeological lines, with special time given to a study of the topography of the land and an examination of mounds with the possibility of identifying sites of ancient cities. The new appointment is well known for his work in the translation of Babylonian tablets.

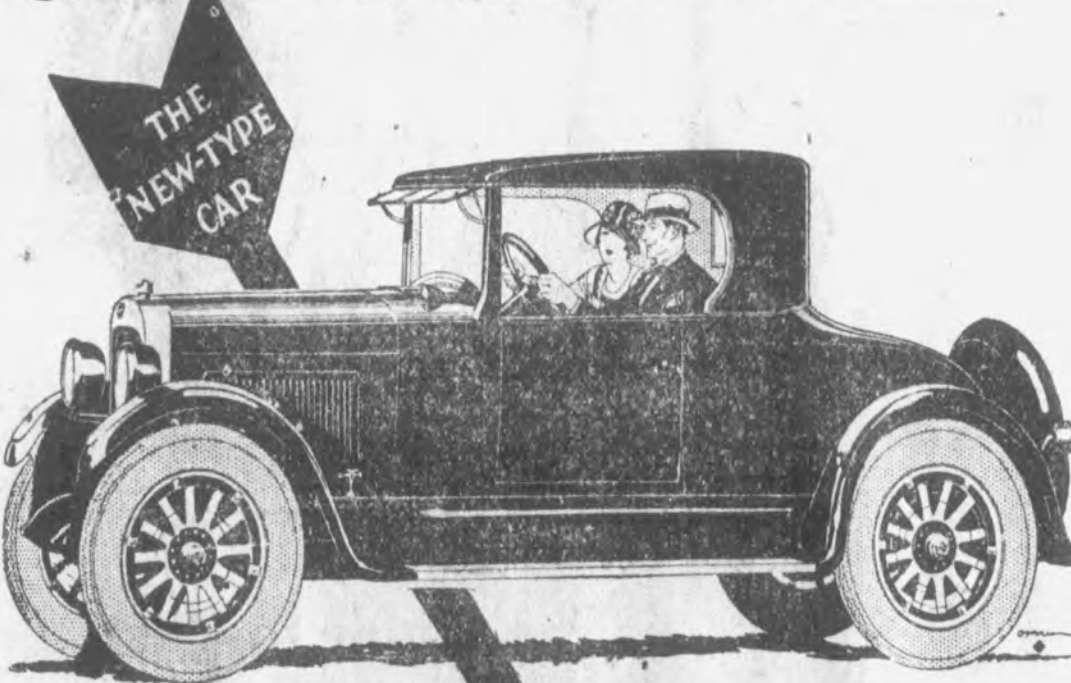

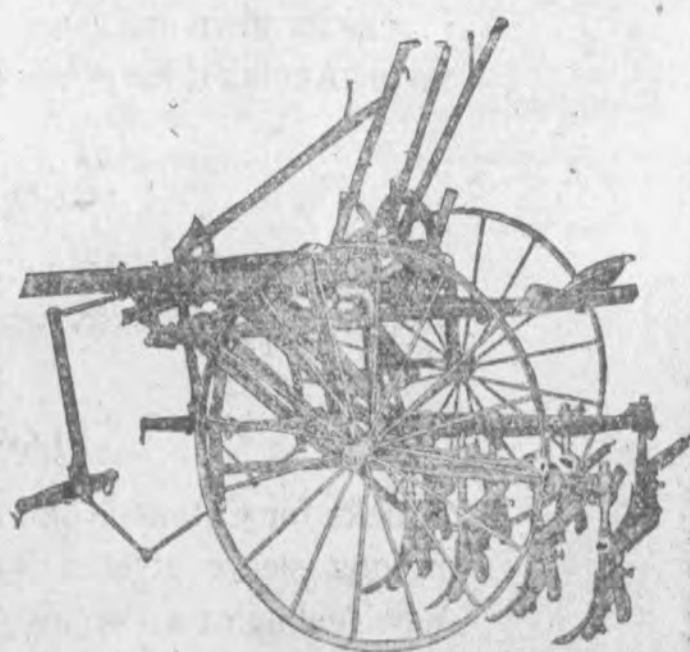
